# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$115.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$15,800 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town; Road No. 61 and No. 60, Nubanusit Road, any balance to be spent in location recommended by the Selectmen and approved by the State, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 83, Laws of 1951 as amended by Chapter 31, Laws of 1953, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Hancock, or take any other action relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild and black top the road from Tuttle Corner so called on the old Dublin Road, four tenths of a mile on the Kings Highway, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
6. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the maintenance of the Bathing Beach, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to Memorial Day, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to Old Home Week, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To hear reports of the Water Survey Committee and see if the Town wishes to vote to raise and appropriate money for the expansion of the water supply system as voted at the 1954 Annual Town Meeting, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in the name of the Town to exchange a portion of the Ware property so called, now owned by the Town, for the right to install and maintain a water line across the property of Robert English, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to take over the High School Building and land from the Hancock Educational Association, together with such trust funds as have provided income for the operations of the High School and such sums of money as may remain in the treasury of the Hancock Educational Association after all outstanding debts are paid. Full ownership of all assets of the Hancock Educational Association would then be vested in the Town of Hancock to do with as the vote of the citizens may direct.

12. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to fixing the fence in the cemetery, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the fire escape for the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Fire Hose reserve fund, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see what action the Town will vote in regard to a suitable memorial for the Veterans of World War II and the Korean War Veterans of this town, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes paid within thirty days after date of bill, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or take any action relating thereto.

18. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in Hancock, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the Town, or take any action relating thereto.

20. To hear reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any action relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In looking over the records I find that over one-third of the fires in District One in 1954 were from incinerators and burning without first securing a permit from the forest fire warden of the town where fire occurred. As all these thirty-three fires were in violation of the law, all of us citizens who own homes or rent property should try to the best of our ability to cooperate with the forest fire warden and fire chief in the town or city in which we live.

After the snow leaves the ground and the spring season arrives we all like to get out of doors and start to clean up the grounds and back sheds so before we start to burn, let's contact the forest fire warden of the town in which we live and get his view and permit.

35. Permits. (b) No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn or cause to be burned any material, and no city or town shall kindle or maintain a fire or a public dump, in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste, or cut-over land, or where fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the forest fire warden of the town where the burning is to be done unless the same is in the presence of the warden or his agent.

36. Liability for Fires Without Permit. Any person causing or kindling a fire without permit of the forest fire warden, when such permit is required, and any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil action for the payment to the town, or the state or both, of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.

## REPORT OF WATER SURVEY COMMITTEE

Paid State of N. H., Copy of 1907 Charter \$3 00

With the best of intentions your Water Survey Committee went ahead with the help of the engineer, drawing up the contracts to be mailed out for bids on the water extension to Juggernaut Pond.

Before they were completed we found that the original Charter of 1907, limited the borrowing of funds by the town for water to \$20,000. This fact stopped the Project immediately for 1954 as the legislature was not in session.

We had an amendment drawn up to be presented to the legislature in January of this year changing the limit from \$20,000 to \$75,000. This was introduced by Mr. Dutton the Peterborough Representative; a public hearing was held attended by two members of the Hancock Water Board, Senator English, Mr. Dutton and a representative of the State Board of Health. No opposition was apparent and we hope the bill will be passed through the house and senate before our meeting in March.

Also section two of the 1954 motion should be voted by ballot and a record kept so that the company that buys the bonds will have a clear picture of the town's action in regard to this project.

Section three should be voted again and this is just to re-appropriate the money from the Water Capital Reserve Fund.

The Committee has an article in the warrant to take care of this.

## HANCOCK 1954

For 175 years Hancock has been a pleasant town, delightfully situated. This year on Old Home Day, the day when former inhabitants, many of them sons and daughters who left to seek their fortunes, return in carnival spirit, there was something extra—we were marking significantly an anniversary. Between the bell tower and the grammar school hung the same huge handmade flag that drifted in the breeze seventy-five years ago when our 100th Anniversary was the occasion of a gay birthday party.

As it happened, it proved to be a cool summer and unusually wet. Cordwood easily cut with modern chain saws in the light snow dustings of last winter dried little stacked outside during the rainy summer. This caused little inconvenience. For the Wrights, the Welches, Emil Hugron and a few others are about the only ones in this decade who bother to cleft hardwood; burning oil is much easier. But the wet summer meant inconvenience to housewives with sheets on the line and to picnickers, to make up for the lack of wear and tear on snow shovels earlier in the year.

People say winters get warmer, summers cooler; statistics offer proof. Meteorologists, however, are still not smart enough to know why. Is it temporary or will some of our great grandchildren see palm trees growing in New England? We do know sap buckets were hanging on Washington's birthday, earliest in seventy years. And we do know Will Curtis of the Elmwood section, our champion wildcat hunter (500 cats), hasn't said their pelts were getting thinner or the twenty dollar bounty.

Speaking of bounties, naturally leads to legislation, for the General Court decides how much will be paid for predatory animals. This was an off-year election and without a President to elect for the White House, interest in things political declines. Yet 273 citizens (466 on the checklist) showed up at the polls in November; 167 to vote a straight Republican ticket and 24 going down the line with the Democrats. That leaves 82 independent voters, those who checked names from both columns. Lane Dwinell for Governor gained 221 votes, Styles Bridges for United States Senator 218, and Norris Cotton (for the unexpired portion of the Tobey U. S. Senate seat) 232. Perkins Bass of Peterborough for Congressman polled 223, and Robert English for State Senator 261 (the first from Hancock since William Weston in 1941). As usual, Hancock voters picked winners.

But the real contest in Hancock was over closing the High School. At the annual School Meeting it was voted by a narrow margin to send these students mostly to Peterborough. At another meeting the matter was reconsidered, and finally a third gathering in July reaffirmed the original decision. Closing Hancock High School was painful. At graduation this year there



were only four to receive diplomas, but that didn't prevent the school from putting on a successful play, "I'm A Family Crisis," the lead part played by Anne Fisher. For years Hancock felt it was worth extra expense to keep high school students in town, but the number of students drastically declined to fifteen—a number which educators say cannot constitute an effective school. The fine brick building will not be torn down, it awaits developments.

The drop in high school students is related to a change in character of our Town. It ages gracefully. The change has come imperceptibly as farming waned, as opportunities elsewhere increased, and our population slid up to a higher age bracket, living in beautiful surroundings more and more off pensions or interest on monies accumulated earlier.

Hancock is envied. The interest and dividends tax collected by the State is returned to the Town. This year—the final figures are not available yet—some \$17,000 paid by about 66 citizens will lighten the burden on our real estate. This source constitutes some 28% of our total budget. Few towns are as lucky. Providing a setting attracting retired people is a sort of industry making up other sources lost. It means a lower property tax rate for all.

And we've been lucky about fires which hit hard on the individuals concerned and indirectly on all of us when property goes off the tax list. Our Fire Department is ever alert under Charlie Gleason and his assistants Foster Avery and Roy Finan. This year Wendell Crowell was again reelected President, Perley Dunbar, Vice President and John Hill, second Vice President. Others are active—ready for emergencies.

A good Fire Department attracts citizens to Hancock and so does our much photographed church. This year the Meeting House built in 1820 (moved and remodelled in 1851) was redecorated and rededicated on April 11th. The Trustees, Bessie Hanson, Hal Fuller and Warren Kinney, have reason to be proud and so have the rest of us. The drapes sewn by Abbie Sawyer and other ladies of the parish harmonize with the coverings on the foam rubber cushions. Incidentally, Mrs. Henry Tudor presented some additional foam rubber cushions for the vestry where in winter the citizens gather to worship. We all know that Dr. and Mrs. Billings have stimulated the increasing interest in our renowned landmark. As Miss Hurley, who this year was awarded The Palms of the Academy by the French Government for her years of teaching French, might say, "bien fait." Lettie Goodhue, our beloved eldest citizen who died in January, would have been ninety-four at rededication and pleased.

And so it was with our gentle people and their gentling climate in 1954, in part.

A meeting of the inhabitants of the School District of Hancock qualified to vote in District affairs, was holden at the Town Hall on the 5th day of March, 1954 at 8 o'clock in the afternoon.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William J. Eva, who proceeded to read the warrant.

Article 1: "To choose a Moderator for the coming year."

Ballots were cast, and William J. Eva was elected Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2: "To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year."

Ballots were cast, and Alice Brown was elected Clerk for the next year.

Article 3: "To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years."

Ballots were cast using the town checklist. Otis H. Wilder was elected.

Article 4: "To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year."

Ballots were cast, and Errol A. Simonds was elected Treasurer for the coming year.

Article 5: "To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district."

It was moved, seconded, and voted that the salaries of the School Board and other district officers be as follows:

Clerk	5.00
Moderator	1.00 per hour
Auditors	1.00 per hour

Article 6: "To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto."

Such reports were accepted as printed.

Article 7: "To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant."

Ballots were cast and F. R. Hutchison and Herman Schlichting were elected Auditors for the ensuing year.

Article 8: "To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town."

Moved, that the district raise and appropriate \$25,789 and authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. The town checklist was used and one hundred thirty-three votes were cast as follows: 70, Yes; 63, No. (This sum of \$25,789 did not include any funds for the running of the Hancock High School, which will be discontinued as of June 30, 1954.)

Article 9: "To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800 to make the necessary alterations to the old school building to provide an additional classroom, or take any other action relating thereto."

Moved, seconded and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800 to make alterations to the old school building to provide an additional classroom.

Article 10: "To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make contracts for the transportation of high

school students, and to raise and appropriate money for same." It was moved, seconded, and voted that the School Board be authorized to make contracts for the transportation of the High School students, \$1,800 to be raised and appropriated for this purpose.

It was also voted that the District pay tuition of each student, namely \$300 per year, the students to go wherever they choose.

The meeting was declared adjourned.

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### SPECIAL MEETING

**Hancock School District, June 11, 1954, Hancock, N. H.**

Meeting called to order at 8:00 P. M. by the Moderator.

Warrant, petition and certification were read by the Moderator.

Motion made by Warren Pierce to suspend rules. Seconded and voted in affirmative.

Moderator then asked Rev. Dr. Billings to give invocation.

Moderator explained use of ballots as given out, use of check list and rules governing general conduct of the meeting.

At request of Moderator nominations for ballot clerks were made from floor. Elijah J. West nominated Miss Cynthia Upton and Charles Adams. Nominations being closed, the names of Miss Upton and Mr. Adams were seconded and the motion voted in the affirmative. The two ballot clerks were then sworn into office by the Moderator.

Regular business of the meeting was resumed.

The Moderator read Article 1 of the warrant as follows: "To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to take appropriate action to continue the operation of Hancock High School. (By Petition.)"

By motion of Dr. Ceres, seconded by Mr. Dillon, voted affirmatively, Article No. 1 was laid on the table.

Article No. 2 was then read by the Moderator. "To see if the District will vote to rescind the action taken at the 1954 Annual School District Meeting under Article 8 of the 1954 School Warrant. (By Petition.)"

The following motion was made by Dr. Frederick Ceres and seconded by Warren Pierce: "I move that the action taken at the 1954 Annual School District Meeting under Article 8 be rescinded."

After reasonable discussion the motion was balloted upon. Results were: Total votes cast 243 of which 142 were "yes" and 98 "no."

At this time it was pointed out by the Moderator that since the check list contained 444 names, it was necessary to have a minimum of 222 votes cast each time for a legal vote at this meeting.

Article No. 3 was next read by the Moderator as follows. "To see if the District will vote to rescind the action taken at the 1954 Annual School District Meeting under Article 9 of the 1954 School Warrant. (By Petition.)"

Moved, seconded and voted to lay Article No. 3 on the table and proceed to Article No. 4.

Article No. 4 read by Moderator: "To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. (By Petition.)"

Warren Pierce then made the following motion: "I move that the sum of \$36,363.00 be raised and appropriated for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, for the year 1954-55, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town."

This motion was seconded. Considerable discussion followed on both sides of the question.

This was interrupted by a request from Mrs. Filbin for an expression of opinion as to how many wished to keep the High School. A voice vote requested that a ballot be taken. The Moderator warned those present that this was merely an expression of opinion and not a legal ballot. Mrs. Filbin made the following motion: "I move that the people assembled here use one of the ballots given to us to vote "yes" or "no" whether we would like to have the High School in Hancock continued or not." The results of the ballot were as follows: Of the 219 votes cast, 119 were "yes" and 100 "no."

Discussions on Article No. 4 were resumed following which the issue was put to vote by ballot. The results were as follows: Votes cast, 135, of which 111 were "yes" and 24 "no." This did not constitute a legal vote in this meeting.

A motion to adjourn was made from the floor, seconded, and by voice voted affirmed at 12:45 A. M.

This motion was seconded.

Mr. Wilder also stated that the School Board has decided to take the Junior High over to the Elementary school building next year regardless of what plans are made for the High School pupils.

Mr. Daly questioned the School Board still proposing the same budget when the will of the people as expressed in the vote at the June meeting showed them to be against this budget.

Mr. Charles Adams reported that the Advisory Committee is 100% for the budget as proposed by the School Board.

Mr. Paul Daly offered the following amendment to the motion: "I move that the figure \$25,789 be amended and the figure \$36,263 be substituted." This was seconded.

After considerable discussion for both the amendment and the motion, the amendment was put to a vote with the following result: Total votes cast 176 with 108 "no" and 68 "yes."

Miss Cynthia Upton and Mr. Charles Adams were appointed Ballot Clerks.

Voting was on printed ballots previously passed out.

Results of the vote on the original motion were as follows: Total votes cast 157 with 109 "yes" and 48 "no."

A motion to adjourn was voted affirmatively at 10:15 p. m.

Due to the reorganization of the Elementary School and the addition of a new room to the Elementary School Building this year a new teacher has been added to the staff. She is Miss A. Virginia Walsh of West Roxbury, Massachusetts, who teaches Grades 3, 4 and 5. Mrs. Rutledge is principal again this year and teaches Grades 6, 7 and 8, and Miss Merrill due to the increased enrollment in the first and second grades teaches only the first two grades instead of grades 1, 2 and 3 as she did last year.

Mr. Filbin resigned as Art Supervisor in June to accept the position of Helping Teacher for the Supervisory Union. Donald G. Bostrom was employed as Art Supervisor. Due to the death of Mrs. Ola M. Myhaver in October Miss Gladys Newhall, R. N. was employed as school nurse. Due to the resignation of Dr. Fredrika Moore, a physician who has given the schools of Hancock faithful and meritorious service, Dr. Alfred Chandler was appointed physician.

## B. PROGRAM AND METHODS

The hot lunch program was started in September and was terminated on October 12th due to the resignation of Mrs. Kierstead. It was reactivated on November 29th by Mrs. John A. Wirz of Greenfield as director.

This year Miss Merrill and Miss Walsh took reading courses in order that they might better help those children having difficulties with their reading.

Special visits were made to the town library by the boys and girls with their teachers in order that the children may become familiar with the use of the library.

Educational films pertaining to the course of studies have been shown weekly to the children.

A special program for Halloween with costumes, a parade and judges and prizes was presented at the school and at Christmas, carol singing by the children was conducted on the Common around the Community Tree.

A testing program was organized this year so that Achievement and Mental maturity tests are being given throughout all the grades.

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### PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

Due to the reorganization of the Elementary School a new room was added upstairs in this building next to the present lunch room and kitchen to house the 6th, 7th and 8th grades. The room was designed with the assistance of Mr. Paul Farnham of the State Office of Education and the general construction was carried out by Mr. Errol Simonds. The room is very attractive and useful with its storage cabinets, bulletin boards, sink and asphalt tile floor. In addition the hallway outside of the new classroom was painted. Mr. Filbin acted as color consultant in selecting the colors of the walls and the floor covering.

New swing equipment was installed on the playground and materials provided to fix the teeters.

### A. HEALTH

On October 8, 1954 I accepted the position of Nurse-Teacher for Hancock. Between this date and the end of the year, physical examinations have been started, a dental clinic has been held, and the audiometer examinations for hearing have been started.

### B. HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

#### WHO . . .

is your helping teacher and what does he do? This is a natural question which is ably answered in the Laws of New Hampshire Relating to Public Schools. It can be paraphrased as follows:

The helping teacher . . . is defined as a teacher with specific training and experience which will enable her or him to:

1. Give **helpful advice, counsel and assistance** to teachers, pupils and parents of a school system as a constructive **means of improving the educational growth and development** of children.

2. Help solve pupil **problems of retardation and maladjustment**.

3. Adopt (adapt?) the program of studies to meet the needs of the children and the community.

4. Bring **resources outside of the school to classroom teachers**, pupils and parents and community.

5. Act as a **consultant** to the entire staff and community in recognition of the educational needs.



## WHAT . . .

are some of the things the helping teacher has been doing since July of this year?

a. Contacting, interviewing and recommending many of the 29 new teachers, principals, supervisors and nurses in the Supervisory Union (42 interviewed.)

b. Developing a Handbook of rules and regulations for all teachers and principals in the Supervisory Union.

c. Preparing a Bulletin for new teachers and monthly newsletters for all teachers offering suggestions for the improvement of instruction and public relations.

d. Working with press representatives and school principals in the attempt to get better and more school news in the paper.

e. Working directly with teachers in the rooms (240 visits.)

This includes:

1. Supervision

2. Bringing in instructional materials.

3. Helping with problems.

f. Working with principals and groups of teachers to discuss the improvement of courses of study and instruction.

g. Working with teachers who had specific problems in the classroom.

h. Demonstration teaching.

i. Working with teachers in helping to determine those children who have reading difficulties.

j. Working with the guidance directors to help establish a uniform and worthwhile testing system in our schools.

k. Working with child welfare—individual conferences with parents, children and teachers.

l. Attended Conferences on Remedial Reading.

m. Worked on planning color schemes and floor tiles in three towns of the supervisory union where new construction or remodeling went on.

n. Attended School Board Meetings.

o. Participated in P. T. A. discussion groups.

p. Participated in Supervisory Union Teachers Association in the capacity of President.

q. Worked with Committee of Specialists in examining children under the required age for school entrance.

### What are some of the things observed . . .

1. In general there seems to be a splendid professional attitude on the part of principals and teachers to do the best possible job with the resources they have to work with. Many principals and teachers are spending long hours evaluating what is being done and trying to improve it. Many teachers are taking courses to gain a better understanding and to broaden their concepts of teaching.

2. There are some problems which seem to have no special answer at the present time. They are as follows:

a. **The retarded child:** There are 46 children in the Super-

visory Union who could be classified as retarded. These children should be in special classes with a teacher especially trained to teach them things which will help them to become more useful citizens. There is no real provision made for these children now and I certainly recommend that a study be made to determine what can be done to help these children.

b. Approximately 10% of the children in our schools have what is termed **Specific Reading Disability**. These children cannot learn to read by the ordinary methods of reading instruction. It is not because they are unintelligent but because they do not have the necessary ability to learn by normal methods of instruction. These children are very often very intelligent children. They need special individual help in learning to read. If these children are to develop properly, they are going to have to learn to read properly. Some consideration should be given to providing a person specifically trained to work directly with the children in this group. I would recommend, because of the seriousness of this problem, that some action be taken to provide a person qualified to do this work in the different towns of the Supervisory Union.

There are at least 62 known cases in the Supervisory Union of children with average and above average intelligence who are reading at approximately two years below grade level. I believe more will be discovered when we secure the results of reading tests yet to be administered in some of our schools. It is reasonable to assume these children do have Specific Reading Disability and need assistance outside of their regular classes in reading. This seems most imperative when one realizes that without skill in reading children cannot make the proper progress in their other subjects.

c. In expanding our two high schools we are employing a larger staff which in some measure provides for a more varied curriculum to take care of the needs of all the boys and girls in the schools. There is need, however, for a further study of the curriculum to insure that it is properly co-ordinated in all its departments. This is a natural situation in a period of expansion and while no definite answers have been arrived at yet, the Superintendent, principals and faculties are working on this problem.

The role of the Helping Teacher is a varied and interesting one. The response from school boards, principals, teachers, parents, children and community organizations has been most gratifying.

As the new year approaches I am looking forward to my work and hope in some measure to accomplish the objectives outlined for the Helping Teacher.
