**TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Hall in said Hebron on Tuesday, the eighth (8) day of March, next, at five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Polls open from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. Business meeting will open at 7:00 p.m. A supper will be served at 5:30 for those who wish it (\$3.00).

2. To hear the reports of any standing and/or other committees.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow two percent cash discount on property taxes if paid within thirty days from date of tax bill.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for capital improvements to the Hebron Town Beach.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for reconstruction of approximately four-tenths (4/10) mile of the Hobart Hill Road.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to have a survey of the Hebron Common done.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to Make pre-application and application for and to accept, on behalf of the Town, any or all grants including grants from the Community Development Act of 1974 which may be forthcoming from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and to expend such funds.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive in the name of the Town any and all grants or relief from any other Governmental Divisions.

11. To see if the Town will vote to spend the Capital Reserve Fund "for a future refuse system" for the Hebron Bridgewater Refuse Disposal District.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Capital Outlay to the Hebron Bridgewater Refuse Disposal District.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$397 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Lakes Region Planning Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purpose.

14. To see if the Town will vote to spend the 1977 Revenue Sharing allocation to help defray its share of Capital Outlay for the Hebron-Bridgewater Refuse Disposal District.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Trust Fund a \$50 savings account from the Hebron Bicentennial Committee to the Hebron Tricentennial Committee. All interest to be left in the fund to accrue. If there is no Tricentennial Committee, the fund would go into the Town Treasury, (Requested by H.B.C.)

16. To see if the Town will accept the money in the Hebron Bicentennial Committee treasury and from future sales of the History to be put into a fund for the establishment of a Hebron Historical Society. This fund would be kept by the Town Treasurer until such Society is established. If this has not been done in 10 years the fund would go into the Town Treasury. (Requested by H.B.C.)

17. To see if the Town wishes the Committee to return the \$695 appropriated for the printing of the Town History in the 1975 Town Meeting. (Requested by H.B.C.)

18. To see if the Town will Vote to raise and appropriate \$32,000 for the purchase of a fire truck; to raise \$8,000 by taxes in 1977; to authorize the Selectmen to borrow an amount not to exceed \$24,000 by long term notes (4 yr.) under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

HEBRON FIRE DEPARTMENT 1976 ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1976 was the busiest year on record for the Hebron Fire Department. We responded to a total of 40 calls. This is double the 19 calls we had during 1975. For example, 1975 showed one chimney fire. During 1976 we had eight. The reason? More people burning wood. Two of the three major structure fires in 1976 were the direct result of improper and unsafe installation of wood burning stoves.

At one of our major fires the value of belonging to the Twin Rivers Mutual Aid really proved itself. Had we not been a member that one fire could have cost us as much as \$1,500. In turn, your fire department helped other towns on eight occasions when they were faced with major fires. While no one likes to see anyone have a fire, our personnel have gained valuable experience in firefighting and as a result are better able to handle emergency situations when they arise in Hebron.

While experience comes from working on actual fires, training is a regular part of the fire department program. In addition to our monthly training sessions, most of the personnel have participated in state run classes and schools taking such diverse courses as: "Rural Water Supply Technology", "Structural Firefighting Theory," "Salvage and Overhaul," "Communications," "Fireground Command," "Fire Department Management," "Breathing Apparatus," "Portable Extinguishers," "Flammable Liquids," "LP Gas Emergencies," "Ladders," and "Forceable Entry."

As far as organization, personnel, and training, it is my feeling that the Hebron Fire Department is second to none in terms of small town departments. However, as far as apparatus (fire trucks) we are sorely lacking. Our first response truck does not even have a chasis mounted pump. It uses a portable pump tied on the rear step. Our Engine 2 is a 1941 Chevy with a 250 gal. per min. front mount pump. It is unreliable in that it will not pull a prime if the lift is over 5 feet (a good pump should pull 20 ft.). It carries 230 gal. of water, but there is no piping between the tank and the pump hence no water from the tank to the pump. Our Tank 1, the converted army truck, is by far the best piece of apparatus we have. It carries 1500 gal. of water and has a 500 gal. per min. front mount pump (it has piping between the tank and the pump too).

The point is, we are going to have to consider very shortly replacing apparatus. And by this I mean replacing it with a new "store bought" engine. Yes, they are expensive, but the cost is more than made up in

the fact that with a new truck fire insurance premiums will take a substantial reduction. Presently, the Hebron Fire Department is not recognized by the insurance companies because our apparatus is too old and does not meet any standards, so you are paying top premiums. With a new truck your premiums would be reduced 20-25%. This, of course, is not to mention the superior fire protection you would receive with a first class truck. How much will it cost? Right now about \$30,000. In 3 years about \$40,000.

Finally, I think it is worth noting that the firefighters themselves have contributed over \$400 this year to the Hebron Fire Department Improvement Fund.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.
