# SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

#### DISTRICT NO. 1.

Prudential Com., M. H. Barstow.

Two terms of school during the year—summer and winter. The first term was taught by Miss Grace Darling, who fully maintained her previous reputation. The second term was taught by Miss Ella R. Bragg, who was employed in one of the departments of the High School the term preceding.

#### DISTRICT No. 2.

Prudential Com., A. D. Burnham.

The Primary Department for the entire year of three terms, was taught by Miss Mary C. Morris. And the fact that she has completed her 17th consecutive engagement with this district speaks much in her praise.

The higher department during the first two terms was under the instruction of Miss Millie M. Miller, who has hitherto held a good report as a teacher, having been employed in several other districts to their satisfaction, especially in No. 3. But the evident lack of discipline the last term, suggests the thought that to obtain the best results, a male teacher should be employed throughout the year. This idea is confirmed by the history of this department, not only for this year but for the preceding one also.

The Winter Term was under the management of Mr. L. B Purmort, and the committee are glad to record their entire satisfaction with his methods and their result. From the start, a new feeling seemed to prevade the entire school, and it became a busy and orderly one; good progress was made, and it was the best in the town that came under our observation. The "Roll of Honor" in both departments was a lengthy one.

#### DISTRICT No. 3.

Prudential Com., Miss M. A. Wood.

First two terms taught by Miss Grace V. Wood, and the third by Miss Carrie Low. It is one of the largest schools in town; has improved for the past three years and will soon have some of the finest scholars in town. The district ought to spare neither pains nor means in continuing to employ good teachers. It would be effort and money expended in the right direction, giving promise of good results. School in session.

#### DISTRICT No. 4.

Prudential Com., Bradley T. Stockwell.

Two Terms. First taught by Julia C. Austin; the Winter by Fred O. Stearns. Fair progress was made during both of the terms. We are glad to observe that the district have added to the equipments of the school-room, and that the teachers make good use of them as they are added, to the evident advantage of the pupils.

#### DISTRICT No. 5.

Prudential Com., Henry Hall.

Three terms, taught successively by Miss Nellie M. Smith, Miss Ella F. Hill and Miss Carrie F. V. Gove. The Committee have visited this school as often as was required; find the average attendance to be only 1 1-2 and 2; the school-house a wreck; equipments none, feeling unpleasant in the district—all things considered, but little to encourage parent, teacher or scholar.

#### DISTRICT No. 6.

Prudential Com., Henry Farnham.

Taught by Miss Alice H. Peck. A small school; good attendance; both teacher and scholars appeared to be interested.

#### DISTRICT No. 7.

Prudential Com., Stephen T. Cole.

Teacher of Summer Term, Emma J. Barker; teacher of Winter term, Hattie Dyer. Scholars regular and punctual in their attendance and did well under the increased experience of the teacher, who had already fulfilled several engagements in the schools of the town.

#### DISTRICT No. 8.

Prudential Com., Wm. Towle.

Three terms; first by Alice H. Peck, second and third, Nina L. Gile. The district was fortunate in securing the services of such teachers, for so small a school. The third term was interrupted for a few days by the destruction of their school-house by fire. At the time of making this report the school is in session in a private house, and doing as well as it can considering its inconveniences.

#### DISTRICT No. 9.

Prudential Com., Chas. E. Morse.

Two terms, taught by Miss Lora Chase—a teacher of great experience. The school, although a small one, always appeared well on our visits. The Committee was fortunate in securing one so well qualified for a larger school.

#### DISTRICT No. 10.

Prudential Com., J. M. Paddleford.

First term of twelve weeks, taught by Jas. M. Post. Second term of same length by C. E. Lord. It is a large school composed of nearly forty pupils, of every grade imaginable; and, although no outbreaks occurred, as in the previous year, still remains a difficult school to teach, requiring wise and rare qualities on the part of the teacher.

#### DISTRICT No. 11.

Prudential Com., John S. Freeman.

First term taught by Miss Katie A. Simonds. Second term taught by Harry M. Hildreth. Third term taught by M. Millie Miller. Each of these teachers was well qualified for the position occupied.

During the first and second terms the attendance was fair. During the Third term, owing to various reasons, the attendance was small, about fifty per cent of the total number residing in the District. Recitations were good and school always appeared well. With more enthusiasm on the part of the parents, the attendance might be better and the school made more profitable for the District.

#### DISTRICT No. 12.

Prudential Com., P. Bliss.

Two terms—Summer and Winter. First term taught by Miss A. R. Lord. Second term taught by Mary J. Briggs. We are pleased to say that both of the above mentioned teachers have had much experience and the school prospered in their hands. It was a pleasure to visit and examine it.

#### DISTRICT No. 13.

Prudential Com., John T. Breck.

Three terms. 1st. and 3d. taught by Miss S. A. Bryant, 2d taught by Miss Pauline S. Miller. Both of these teachers have been long known in the town and invariably given satisfaction. If the Committee were disposed to criticise, it would be in the direction of allowing scholars from *outside* districts to enter a school already crowded, as it robbed the scholars residing in the District of time and attention that belonged to them.

#### DISTRICT No. 16.

Prudential Com., John Lahaye.

One term only. Miss Rosa Manahan—same teacher as last year. School still in session.

#### CONCLUSION.

We are pleased to state, in connection with this report, that no troubles of a serious nature have arisen in any of the schools under our supervision for the entire year. The teachers employed have generally been of experience and well adapted to their work. Not one has been dismissed or left before term of service expired.

We would respectfully call the attention of the various districts, soon to hold their annual school meetings, to the propriety of providing suitable outline maps for the walls of the school-room. These have been purchased in a few instances during the past year, and we consider them as useful in teaching Geography as is a black-board in Mathematics.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

FOR LEBANON HIGH SCHOOL.

We have had but two terms the past year. The seven schools reduced to six; five of these have been under the general charge of Prof. E. W. Westgate our former principal, a veteran in the work. The higher department, solely under his care, was increased from the first Grammar School, thereby changing the grade somewhat in all the schools and abolishing the second Grammar School. Winter term, the same grading was sustained with more advanced studies, and at the close was witnessed a better examination than for years before in this school; as well as more visitors.

The first Grammer School was taught seven weeks in the spring term by Miss Pauline S. Miller, with her usual good success; when a vacation occurred of one week by sickness of the teacher. The school was then consolidated with Mr. Westgate's and classes assigned to the recitation room, under the charge of Miss Emma J. Barker for the remainder of the term. Winter term, Miss Miller resumed her position with renewed vigor and effort and was eminently successful. The examination at the close exhibited much skill and thoroughness in her manner of teaching as well as efficient improvement on the part of the scholars, and was enjoyed by a crowd of visitors.

The first Intermediate in spring term was in charge of Miss Emma L. Chapman of Plainfield, a tried and successful teacher in the same school. She taught and governed well, so that we were satisfied to engage her for the next term, but her health proved insufficient for the work and Miss Emma J. Barker was

employed for the Winter term. She worked hard in a difficult place, and the examination showed she had not worked in vain. This school was full.

The second Intermediate in spring term was taught by Miss Helen M. Hough, an industrious and conscientious worker in the school-room. Winter term, Miss Carrie Williams of Cornish had charge, one of the new teachers employed this year. This school in many respects was advanced beyond our expectations. A thorough and efficient system of teaching combined with the essential in every school, discipline, could produce only geod results. The examination was decidedly interesting and satisfactory to the Board, and doubtless to the numerous visitors present.

Primary Department. Both spring and winter terms were taught by Miss Henrietta Hatch; this was her first effort in teaching and proved to be a decided success. The right teacher in the right place. This school-room is the nursery of all our schools, and requires much skill and wisdom to commence their career aright.

#### GRANITE STREET SCHOOL.

Spring term was in charge of Miss Hattie A. Freeman, who was competent in every sense to do her work thoroughly, and did it. Winter term was supplied by Miss Alice H. Peck. This school proved to be larger than was anticipated from the number present at our first visit, and too large for pleasant or profitable work, yet there were not scholars enough to warrant the establishment of another school. It will be necessary to devote special consideration to this school in the next assignment in order that some of the trials and difficulties of a teacher here may be removed.

There has been some hesitation in establishing the grade of the schools on account of a multiplicity of text books that have existed for a long time, and some that ought to be replaced with better ones, though we have been unable as yet to recommend from many solicitations we have had. There is certainly a strong necessity for a change in our Geographys, so that the different classes may all have one series, and same one, too, that more geography can be learned easier. Those we have now will answer good purposes for a reading book, reference and a little geography. We find more or less the same difficulty with all the new published ones, and, therefore, have declined a change. As soon as good ones can be obtained it would be desirable to adopt them. Our spelling books, too, can be improved and certainly the spelling ought to be.

We were glad to see so much interest on the part of parents rnd friends manifested towards our schools the past year, and especially so many of them at the public examination. In behalf of the teachers and scholars we thank them for their interest and presence at the examination, and in behalf of the parents we thank the teachers and scholars for so many good scholars.
