MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING Lincoln, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 8, 1960.

The Meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A. M.

Before the start of the meeting, Moderator Maguire read the following rules which he said would eliminate confusion, and he stressed that these rules would be enforced.

- 1. Personalities brought into any discussion would not be allowed.
- 2. No discussion would be allowed on any article until the article had been acted upon by motion and seconded.
- 3. Everyone would be given 5 minutes to speak and there were to be no interruptions while the person was speaking. No person would be allowed to speak a second time on the article until everyone having something to say had been heard.
- 4. Any discussion not pertaining to the article being acted upon would not be allowed.

Moderator Maguire said that any person refusing to abide by the above rules would be out of order and if after a warning they refused to follow the above rules, they would be forcibly ejected from the meeting by Chief of Police Fred Johnson at his request.

The Town Warrant was then read by Moderator Maguire.

The following articles were acted upon:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Charles Doherty to pass over this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the town raise the sum of \$7,150 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year; \$4,050.00 for Town Officers' Salaries; \$2,800.00 for Town Officers' expenses and \$300.00 for Election and Registration expenses.

Charles Doherty asked the Selectmen why it was necessary to pay \$400.00 for the Town Clerk's office. He said that never in the history of the Town of Lincoln has the town been known to pay rent except in buildings owned by the town. He was of the opinion he said that the Town Clerk's office should be in the Court House.

In explanation, Mr. Arthur Asselin said that he had sold his place of business to Louis Blanchard and that he did not feel that Mr. Blanchard should be asked to furnish an office for the Town Clerk rent free even though his office had been in the building for a number of years. Mr. Asselin further explained that when he took over the office of Town Clerk, the largest amount of business handled by his office was in the neighborhood of \$2,900 but that the figure was now three times as much and more.

Mr. MacDonald further explained that there wasn't enough space in the Court House to hold all the equipment such as files, books, safe, sup-

plies, etc., that this town office requires and has. He told the voters that the town pays Louis Blanchard \$240.00 per year rent or \$20.00 a month for his office which was a reasonable price.

As there were no further comments or discussions Mr. George Houle said he would like to hear from the voters on this question. He said there was plenty of criticism before the meeting about this subject as well as the inadequate equipment of the fire department, etc., but at Town Meeting those same people just sat back and said nothing. He said that instead of criticising on the outside, they should express their views at the meeting.

George McGee said that the Office of the Town Clerk had been in Mr. Asselin's building for four or five years prior to his selling out to Louis Blanchard and when Mr. Asselin did sell the building it posed a problem. He suggested that something be done at this meeting in the form of a motion to either change the location of the Town Clerk's office or let it remain where it is.

Charles Doherty asked why he couldn't have it in his home like all the other former Town Clerks had done.

James MacDonald said that he had a lot of equipment in his home pertaining to his work as a Selectman and that it was far from being a satisfactory arrangement and that he did not blame Mr. Asselin for not wanting the office in his home where people would be bothering him at all hours, day and night.

Emery Houle expressed the opinion that he thought the Town Clerk's office was in an ideal location; the sign posted on the building marking its location was a sign of progress and was easy to locate by out of town people as well as town residents.

Amendments to the motion made by George Houle and seconded by Emery Houle that the Town Clerk's office remain where it is. Vote in the affirmative.

Amendment to the Amendment made by George McGee and seconded by Emery Houle that the rent for the Tax Collector's office also be paid for by the Town.

Mr. Leslie Sargent asked if the town was going to pay rent for the School Board offices as well. He said it seemed to him that if we were going to pay rent for the Tax Collector's office it would bring further demands on the Town from other Town Officers.

George McGee withdrew his amendment to the amendment, seconded by Emery Houle.

The Moderator then reverted back to the original motion that the sum of \$7,150 be raised to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Motion made by Edward Levasseur and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$5,300.00 be raised for the Police Department.

Amendment to the motion made by Emery Houle and seconded by George Houle that the sum of \$5,000 be raised for the Police Officer's salary and that he drop all side jobs such as Health Officer, Fireman, Truant Officer and Dog Licenser. Also that the Selectmen be authorized to get two dozen bids for a police cruiser with signs on the side so that the Police Officer's car could be easily recognized.

Upon a raised hand vote called for by the Moderator, this amendment was defeated.

Edmond Gionet then gave comparison figures of salaries and expenses of the Ashland and Lisbon Police Departments as compared with ours.

Mr. Edmond Gionet then made an amendment to the amendment which was seconded by Mr. Edward Fournier that the sum of \$5,000 be raised for the total Police Department and the job remain as it is. His amendment to the amendment to be acted upon by secret ballot.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the check list be used and the ballot clerks were instructed to check off the voters as they entered the booths to vote.

When the votes were counted the result was 73-No and 75-Yes but several of the ballots were found to be illegal by the Moderator. Several of them had the sum of \$5,000 written on them with neither a "yes" or "no" vote and one ballot had what could be interpreted as an "s" or a "5."

Mr. Edward Clark made the statement that legal or not, the assembly had the peoples' opinion on the article in question.

A discussion followed which showed that the voters were confused as to what they were voting for so a Motion was made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that we revert back to the original question of raising or lowering the proposed \$5,300 for the Police Department. An amendment to the motion was made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Edward Clark that the sum of \$5,000 be raised for the Police Department.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Mary Marden that a division of the house be in order at this time.

At the request of the Moderator there was a division of the house and all those in favor of raising \$5,000 were asked to stand on one side of the room and all those in favor of raising \$5,300 to stand on the opposite side of the room.

37 votes for \$5,000.

87 votes for \$5,300.

Vote in the affirmative to raise the sum of \$5,300 for the Police Department.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Roger Thompson to recess Town Meeting to take up the School Meeting at 11:00 A. M.

The Town Meeting was recalled to order at 12 noon by Moderator Maguire.

Motion made by Gertrude Lynch and seconded by Mary Plummer that the Town Meeting recess for one hour for lunch. Vote in the affirmative.

Meeting was again called to order at 1:00 P. M. by Moderator James Maguire.

A motion was made by George McGee and seconded by Edward Levasseur to pass over Article 4 and take up Article 22. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 22. As a member of the budget committee, Murray Clark explained to the voters that the Insurance Companies had notified the Town to the effect that when a town owns only one piece of fire equipment, the rates get increasingly higher. In order to keep the insurance rates for the townspeople down, the Insurance Company recommended that the town have another piece of equipment. It was his opinion he stated that the town raise the sum of \$5,000, set it aside and add a similar sum every year until sufficient funds were available to get this equipment.

Kenneth McInnis, Fire Chief, said he had also been notified by the Board of Underwriters and also by the Fire Commissioner that the town must have added equipment and that they would come in and make a survey at no cost to the town.

Edward Clark pointed out that at the Budget meeting the cost of this new piece of fire equipment had not been stated.

James MacDonald said that since the meeting the town got estimates from the bank and found that the equipment would cost \$20,000.

John Patterson asked how the sum of \$20,000 was arrived at.

Kenneth McInnis said he had talked with one man only to get an idea of the cost.

Edward Gionet told what Ashland and Woodsville had for a fire truck with a pumping capacity of 600 lbs., which he said cost \$11,000.

Motion made by Murray Clark and seconded by Emery Houle that the town raise the sum of \$5,000 and set it aside in a fund to purchase a new fire truck

Amendment to the motion made by Charles Doherty and seconded by Kenneth McInnis that the town raise the sum of \$5,000 for a fire truck and that the truck be bought this year.

Motion made by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by George McGee to accept the article as read.

Amendment to this motion made by Murray Clark and seconded by Joseph Landry that the town vote to raise the sum of \$5,000, set it aside in a fund for the eventual purchase of a new fire truck.

George rose in objection to the amendment to the motion. He asked Fire Chief Kenneth McInnis if this would solve his problem and Kenneth McInnis said it would not, that the recommendations had been made by the Fire Marshal to acquire the second piece of equipment as soon as possible.

On a vote from the floor requested by the Moderator, the amendment to the motion that the town vote to raise the sum of \$5,000, set it aside in a fund for the eventual purchase of a new fire truck, was defeated. 56 against 21 for the amendment.

James MacDonald said that it was possible for the Selectmen to go to the bank and borrow \$15,-000, buy the truck, then pay \$1,500 a year plus interest and we would have a new fire truck this year.

George McGee then asked that the following words be added to Article 22 — that the Selectmen be given the right to reject any or all bids and that the fire truck be purchased immediately.

In a show of hands requested by the Moderator it was voted that Article 22 be accepted as read with the following addition — that the Selectmen be given the right to reject any or all bids and that the fire truck be purchased immediately. Result of vote: 69 — Yes. 12 — No.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Joseph Landry that the sum of \$3,000 be raised for the Fire Department. Vote in the affirmative. Amended motion by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by Charles Doherty to authorize the members of the Lincoln Fire Department to apply for State Firemen's Retirement Board R. S. A. 102:19 at their own expense. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the sum of \$1,950.00 be raised for the Public Health Department. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

Motion made by Edward Levasseur and seconded by Robert Welsh that the town raise the sum of \$18,000 for Town Maintenance. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the town raise the sum of \$4,800.00 for Street Lighting.

Edward Clark asked the Selectmen if increase in power was the reason for the increased cost in the department. He asked the Selectmen if they did not have the authority to say how large a light and fixture was to be put up as in the case of the new lights installed on Main Street.

James MacDonald told him that Franconia Paper Corporation were the owners of the utilities and it wasn't up to the Selectmen to tell the Company what they could or could not put up.

Murray Clark said he wanted to go on record in wanting to instruct the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen not to request that the present lights on Main Street be replaced.

The motion to raise the sum of \$4,800 for Street Lighting was voted in the affirmative.

Article 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George Houle that the sum of \$1,000 be raised for cemeteries. Vote in the affirmative.

Murray Clark asked what the Town was going to do about the cemetery at Dodgeville.

James Maguire, Moderator, explained that at the budget committee meeting the Town agreed not to take any action on this cemetery until the land was deeded to the Town. He said there were about eight or ten graves in it, among them some unknown soldiers.

Motion made by Murray Clark and seconded by Charles Doherty to authorize the Selectmen to accept the cemetery property on the Kancamagus Highway if and when it is deeded to the Town. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George Martell that the sum of \$1,600.00 be raised for Public Library. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

Motion made by Edward Levasseur and seconded by Robert Welsh that the sum of \$4,000 be raised for Town Poor.

Edward Clark asked the Selectmen how many town poor we had at this time.

James MacDonald explained that we had two in the County Farm Hospital at a cost of \$5.00 per day to the Town and three people here in Town. Vote in the affirmative to raise the sum of \$4,000 for Town Poor.

Article 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Emery Houle that the town raise the sum of \$700.00 for old age assistance. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by Emery Houle that we skip to Article 23. The motion was not seconded.

Motion made by Guy Hiltz and seconded by James Adzarito that we go through the Warrant and take up each article as we come to it. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

Murray Clark said that some suggestions should be made at this meeting to make the Loon Pond repairs and make appropriation for same.

Mr. James MacDonald explained that with the chlorinator which No. Woodstock is installing and by enlarging the pipe lines there will not be any extensive repairs necessary to Loon Pond.

Mr. MacDonald explained further that some of the \$10,000 appropriation was to lay the water lines on the proposed extension of Pleasant Street and West Street.

Motion made by Lester Gulley and seconded by William McGee III that the Selectmen be given the right to accept deeds on the right-of-ways on the various streets where water lines are to be extended. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by Murray Clark and seconded by Edward Clark to raise the sum of \$16,000. The additional \$6,000 to be used only for the purpose of putting through the water lines on the Goodbout road.

Edward Clark explained that there have been a number of lots sold on the Goodbout road and that building was to start on new houses this summer. He said that in view of the fact that the people already living on that road having been so patient in past years in pumping their own water supplies, the Town should give them the consideration of extending the water lines to these homes this year.

Motion made by George McGee that we reconsider the action taken on Article 12 and that the sum of \$16,000 be raised instead of the proposed \$10,-000. Seconded by Edward Clark. Vote in the affirmative.

James MacDonald explained that the extra \$6,000 would not extend the water lines very far on the Goodbout road with prices what they are at the present time but Edward Clark said it would at least be a start and next year, the voters willing, a similar appropriation could be made to further the work.

Article 13. How much money will be raised for White Mt. Region Association.

Motion made by Henry Waldo and seconded by Murray Clark that the sum of \$357.95 be raised for White Mountain Region Association. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by Lawrence Woodward and seconded by Amedi Theriault that voting be carried on while the Town Meeting continue. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration.

Motion made by Roland Bourassa and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the sum of \$500.00 be raised for a 4th of July Celebration. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1960.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Albert Clogston that the sum of \$2,000 and Interest be raised to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1960. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 and apply same to the \$12,000.00 received from the Insurance Co. to pay off our loan of \$13,000.00 to the Bank.

Motion made by Robert Russell and seconded by Jos. H. Landry that the sum of \$1,000. — be raised and same applied to the \$12,000.00 received from the Insurance Co. to pay off our loan of \$13,000 to the bank. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the Town: School Street: and to authorize the Selectmen to raise through the issuance of bonds or notes the sum of \$4,000.00 for a five year period, the Town to be reimbursed by State Funds, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3. Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Albert Clogston that the town vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the Town: School Street: and authorize the Selectmen to raise through the issuance of bonds or notes the sum of \$4,000.00 for a five year period, the Town to be reimbursed by State funds, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3.

George McGee explained that at the time of the Budget Meeting, the Selectmen were not aware that T. R. A. appropriations would be available for this work but since then they found this to be the case so that it would be necessary to raise the sum of \$1,800 instead of the \$2,000 in view of the fact that the T. R. A. appropriation would be available for two years. He then made an amended motion to the effect that the sum of \$1,800 be raised which was seconded by Edward Levasseur. The chair recommended that a substitute motion be made instead of the amended motion that the sum of \$1,800 be raised instead of the \$2,000 stated in the article.

Substitute motion made by George McGee and seconded by Joseph H. Landry that the sum of \$1,800 be raised instead of the \$2,000 as listed in the Article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

Motion made by Roland Bourassa and seconded by George McGee that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of Taxes. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band.

Motion made by Joseph H. Landry and seconded by George Houle that the sum of \$350.00 be raised for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see how much money will be raised for Civil Defense.

Motion made by Edward Levasseur and seconded by Albert Clogston that the sum of \$400.00 be raised for Civil Defense. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see how much money the town will raise for Parks and Playgrounds.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Emery Houle that the sum of \$2,500.00 be raised for Parks and Playgrounds. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To see how much the Town will raise for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

Motion made by Joseph H. Landry and seconded by Lawrence Wodward that the sum of \$400.00 be raised for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

There followed a heated discussion between Emery Houle and Larry Woodward over a letter supposedly mailed out by the Chamber of Commerce to the Cabin owners and Emery Houle said that he for one would not be dictated to by the Chamber of Commerce or anyone else. The letter in question was not produced.

George McGee asked why Lincoln was asked to raise \$400.00 while No. Woodstock was asked to raise only \$250.00.

Lawrence Woodward explained that the population in Lincoln being much larger than in No. Woodstock, the larger appropriation asked for was to cover this. He also stated that the increase was to enlarge the Chamber's advertising program.

Edward Clark said the efforts of this Chamber of Commerce were one of the few benefits that the business men have of selling themselves to out-of-staters.

Murray Clark said it was the intent of the Lincoln-North Woodstock Chamber to take care of the maintenance of the Town Signs.

George McGee explained that the Chamber had approached the Selectmen about these signs and were told at that time it would have to be acted upon at a Town Meeting before the Selectmen could do anything about them. The Selectmen, he said, suggested that an Article be put in the Town Warrant to that effect which they failed to do, so he recommended that a decision be made at this time, by the meeting, as to what their wishes were about the signs. In this discussion it was voted to leave the signs under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen.

The motion to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Chamber of Commerce was voted in the affirmative.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Lincoln Inn Property.

Motion made by Robert Russell and seconded by George McGee that the town defer action as to the disposal of all or any part of the Lincoln Inn Real Estate Property and authorize the Selectmen to administrate the said property, other than disposal in whole or part of the Real Property, to the best interest of the Town.

Amendment to the motion made by Leslie Sargent to the effect — that the property purchased at the last Town Meeting and commonly referred to as the Inn Property and containing some twenty-five (25) acres, more or less; be set aside until further vote of the town shall change its status, for use as a Town and School Forest. The area to be used by School Science and Conservation classes, Scouts and others as a field laboratory for purposes in aiding in the teaching of botany, biology, forestry, all forms of conservation, woods lore and other subjects.

The area to be given protection from fire, insect and other damage as well as vandalism and squatters. Permission is granted, subject to approval of Selectmen, for development of picnic areas, nature trails, lecture areas and camping areas for use of children whether they be Scouts or other organized youth groups. These developments to be made only where and when there is to be no expense incurred by the Town or School District. Seconded by Mrs. Dorothy Burak.

Amendment to the motion made by Edward Clark and seconded by Robert Welch that any scrap iron not usable as salvage by the Town, the Selectmen be directed to sell under sealed bids.

Robert Russell said he was in favor of leaving the disposal of scrap from the fire up to the Selectmen.

George McGee asked Edward Clark to give his definition of a "sealed bid." He asked Mr. Clark if he meant "posted in a public place or advertised in newspapers."

Mr. Clark said "posted" was what he meant.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that Article 24 be accepted as amended. Vote in the affirmative.

Before taking up Article 25, George McGee rose on a point of personal privilege to clear up any misapprehension on the part of the townspeople with regards to purchasing the Lincoln Inn properties.

He introduced the following letter and asked to have it inserted in the records of this Town Meeting.

Gentlemen:

In order to clear up any misapprehensions there may be as to the sale of land by Grafton Realty Corporation to the Town of Lincoln, I will try to give a brief history of how the trade was arrived at.

Grafton Realty Corporation was primarily interested in selling the Inn building and lot No. 45. The Selectmen showed interest in making use of the Inn building for Town purposes, but wished additional land besides the lot No. 45. Various proposals and counter proposals were made by both sides. The Town's interest in acquiring the three (3), lots (Nos. 39, 41 & 43) adjacent to the Inn was opposite to Grafton Realty's interest in selling all this frontage while still retaining the land northerly of these lots and the Inn. Prices were put on the various parcels involved, with stipulations that, providing the Inn were purchased, the other parcels could be purchased in order, the purpose being on our part to sell the frontage near the Inn only if the land back of it were also purchased. The intention was not to force the Town, but to protect our own interests. The Selectmen made inquiry also about the frontage lots westerly of Mrs. Lehouilliers (Nos. 15-29). Our price on these, however, brought the total higher than they considered right for the Town to pay at that time.

The record will show that in 1958 the Town purchased the library for \$3,000; and that in 1959 the Town purchased The Inn building, with lot

No 45, frontage lots Nos. 39, 41 and 43, together with 25 acres, more or less, of land lying northerly of the Main Street lots — all for \$12,000.

The above was the business transaction. Actually, Martin Brown had made it clear to the Selectmen some time ago that if they (the Town) purchased the Inn, he would see that they had a deed to the Library for a gift. Although the business transactions would make it appear differently, the idea and purpose were carried out. The price on the Inn was \$10,000, the three (3) lots were priced at \$1,500 and the land at \$3,500 in our talks with the Selectmen, making a total of \$15,000, with nothing allotted to the Library. These prices are no different than prices we have been asking or getting on similar property. In other words our prices to the Town were not inflated to cover the Library. In fact, I believe that Lot No. 188 on Church Street was also deeded without price.

At no time, did Grafton Realty understand that the Town wished to pay the additional \$4,500 asked for the nine (9) lots 15-29.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application to the Federal Government for a loan, interest free, from the Housing and Home Finance Agency under the Provisions of Public Law 560, 83rd Congress. And to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Federal Government to obtain said loan. Also to authorize the Selectmen to utilize the proceeds from said loan for the conduct of an engineering study and preparation of plans, specifi-

cations and cost estimates of the sewage disposal requirements for the town. Said loan shall be repaid only if and when construction of such a project is undertaken.

Motion made by Robert Russell and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the article as read. Vote: 125 yes. None against.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to approve the proposed local protection project for the Restoration of the Flood Control Dike at the Franconia Paper Company, and authorize the Selectmen to enter into, and execute an Assurance or other agreement in reference thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to acquire any real estate interests for said project.

Motion made by Charles Doherty and seconded by Albert Clogston to accept the article as read. Voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to name Main Street.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Charles Doherty that the Selectmen be authorized to name Main Street and that the name remain "Main Street."

Substitute motion made by George McGee and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the street remain "Main Street" from the Town Line to the intersection of Forest Highway No. 8. Voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to have the property tax list printed in the Town Report.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by James Adzarito that we pass over this article.

Amendment to the motion made by Edward Clark and seconded by Albert Clogston that a poll be

taken of the voters to see what their choice was in this matter. Polled vote resulted in 63 no and 6 Yes. Amendment defeated.

Mr. McGee said he was opposed at this time to having the property tax list printed in the Town Report. He said it was the intent as he saw it to have a revaluation of properties in Lincoln by the Tax Commission. He said that if the Tax Commission did come to Lincoln and revaluate the properties, the townspeople would find that their taxes would be much higher than they are at the present time.

The Moderator, James Maguire, called for a vote on the original motion made by James MacDonald which was seconded by James Adzarito that we pass over this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald to keep the polls opened until

7:00 P. M. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue plowing driveways and business places.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Lena Bouchard that we pass over this article.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to purchase a Portable Electrocardiograph.

Motion made by Charles Doherty and seconded by Edward Clark to raise the sum of \$500.00 to purchase a Portable Electrocardiograph.

George McGee told the assembly of the difficulty the Town had been through to secure a good doc-

tor to come and settle in Lincoln. He explained that Dr. Dooley, when he settled here had just been released from the Army and that the cost of getting settled and setting up his office had been a real burden to him and he thought it would be a nice gesture for the voters to raise the money to purchase a Portable Electrocardiograph for his use. He pointed out the necessity for such a machine and said that at the Budget Committee Meeting the Town had been given a figure of \$500.00 for this machine but it carried no guarantee. He then made a substitute motion that the Town vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for a machine which carries a five (5) year guarantee. Motion seconded by Edward Levasseur. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

shall be called and polls opened according to law, but that action on all Articles exclusive of choice of officers shall be deferred until 7:30 in the evening of that same day." Vote in the affirmative. Motion made by George McGee and seconded by George Boyle that we come out of recess for Town Meeting. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by George Boyle that the polls be closed at 7:00 P. M.

Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by George Boyle to adjourn Town Meeting. Vote in the affirmative. Time of adjournment 6:45 P. M.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 17. To see huw much money will be raised for Civil Defense.
- 18. To see how much money the Town will raise for Parks and Playgrounds.

Total number of visits made during 1960 were 1,248. Of this number 790 were to medical and chronic cases, 23 to prenatal cases, 24 to new mothers, 35 preschool, Crippled Children's Services 27, visits to persons not taken under care; Welfare, etc., 349.

Conferences with Social Workers and Supervisors from various State departments 27, Work Shop and Professional meetings attended 12. Four children transported to State conducted Pediatric Diagnostic clinics, 1 to Orthopedic clinic, 1 adult for chest x-ray.

Total number of school visits made in the area were 200. Visits to homes in behalf of school work 28.

Nurses examinations on 311 pupils consisted of heights, weights, vision testing, hearing tests when it was found necessary, and general inspections, athletic examinations were carried out on 79 high school pupils by Dr. Dooley. Nurse's home visits were made when results warranted such. Hearing tests were given to all high school pupils.

Classes in baby bath procedure were given to the Seniors of the Home Economic Class.

For the Christmas season, gifts of toys, money, clothing and food were donated for the needy children and families. Special mention should be made of the students of the high school and the three upper grades of the Lincoln elementary school for the help on this program.

My thanks also to the organizations and friends who helped in any way on the Christmas program and for cooperation during the year.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1959 — December 31, 1960:

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1959 and December 31, 1960, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$6,715.18 in 1960.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

(Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These are as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$18,885.98, less a revenue surplus of \$4,397.03, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$14,488.95.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1960, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness:

(Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1960, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

Current Deficit:

The current financial condition of the Town changed from a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$288.60, to a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$17,-426.58, in 1960, as shown herewith:

Current Surplus or (Deficit) \$ 288.60 (\$17,426.58)

To remain in sound financial condition the total assets of a town should be sufficient at all times to offset the current liabilities. It is therefore recommended that provision be made in the 1961 budget for an appropriation for the whole or a part of the current deficit of \$17,426.58, and that an annual appropriation be made thereafter, if necessary, until the current deficit is entirely liquidated.

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1960, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$18,885.98. In other words — total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount.

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, R.S.A., Chapter 32, under date of January 10, 1961, application was made to the Tax Commission by the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures in excess of budgetary appropriations in an amount of \$13,800.00. This authority was granted by the Commission on January 11, 1961.

It is noted, however, that the actual net overdraft of appropriations of \$18,885.98, exceeded the authorized excess expenditures by \$5,085.98, as indicated herewith:

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Lincoln qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said District on the fourteenth day of March, 1961, at 10:30 A. M., to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the School District for the ensuing year.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

- 6. To hear the report of the School Building Study Committee, and take any action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to petition the Superior Court for a special meeting for the purpose of school construction and raising money for the same, prior to the next annual school meeting.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to set up a Building Committee, to consist of the School Board, one member of the Board of Selectmen and four members at large, to be appointed by the School Board Chairman and the Moderator, and to raise the sum of \$500.00 to be used by this committee in presenting building plans to be voted on at the next annual school meeting or a special meeting called for that purpose.
- 9. To see what sum of money the District will vote for lighting of the Elementary and High School grounds.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State Agencies.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SCHOOL BOARD'S REPORT

To the Voters of Lincoln:

We shall begin this report with a note of optimism. At the time of writing of this report, it appears that the Lincoln School Study Committee will have available shortly a report to the voters of Lincoln which in essence will outline two or more possible solutions to the problem of accreditation of the Lincoln High School as an Approved Comprehensive High School. The board feels that this is a necessary step if we intend to maintain a high school here in Lincoln. Basically we need additional space for offering courses in shop and fine arts as well as space to relieve current below standard conditions now existing in physical education and gym facilities, the library, below standard class rooms and the overcrowded typing room. We trust that you, the voters and taxpayers of Lincoln, will give this committee report your serious and studied consideration before reaching a decision. We ask that you get all the answers before making your decision.

There are many matters which should be covered in our report. however, it is not possible to discuss all the progress made during the past year nor is it possible to discuss in detail all the plans for the coming year. We shall attempt here to mention a few points especially deserving of your attention.

Mr. Arthur Dean has been ac'ded to the high school faculty as a driver training, physical education and social studies teacher. All of the high school boys are now taking physical education two periods weekly. The fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade pupils have classes once weekly. It is hoped that next year we may include the freshmen and sophomore girls in this program.

A driver training car was obtained through arrangements by Mr. Arthur Asselin, from the Pease Motor Company, for the sum of one dollar. Twenty-four students will have completed the program of classroom work and on the road training by the end of the school year.

Our athletic teams have had a successful year. The Cross-Country team was the winner of the Pemi-League meet and competed well at the State Meet. We have a State Championship Ski Team. The basketball and baseball teams, although not in the championship category, have been a credit to the school.

We have a very active music program in effect in both schools. Of the pupils taking instrumental instruction, there are twenty-eight who have progressed sufficiently to join the band. We have enjoyed a fine Christmas concert and are looking forward to a Spring concert with a theme based on the Civil War Centennial and an operetta. Selected members of the high school cherus will participate in the All-State Chorus.

A successful bowling program has been instituted in the seventh and eighth grades for the benefit of the children, as a winter activity. This will be continued again this next Winter.

A very effective Grammar School field day program, held on the last day of school this past year, seems to warrant the continuance of this practice.

A small sum has been budgeted to experiment this coming year with a school camping program at Camp Sargent, located in Peterborough. There will be one grade in the Grammar School involved in this program.

We are heartily encouraged by the increase in participation on the part of our teachers in professional improvement courses offered at the Plymouth Teachers College during the past year.

One direct result of this participation has been reflected in the fact that a committee of teachers has made a study of the science curriculum in both the high school and grammar school. After consultation with Mr. Wagner, from the New Hampshire Department of Education, the committee made definite recommendations to the board as to means of improving the science program. These recommendations are now being carried out.

Adult education in Lincoln has been somewhat neglected during the years. Interest was evidenced on the part of several persons this year in taking a course in Basic English. A study was made of the situation and the board is happy to report that an organizational meeting for this course has been held under the supervision of Mr. Shea and Mrs. John Dooley, who will serve as the instructor. There were fifteen interested persons attending and all indications are that the course is well under way. The board believes these courses should be somewhat self-supporting but has allocated a small sum of money to assist with the program. If there is interest on the part of others in any subject matter it is suggested they should contact either Mr. Stewart at the High School or Mr. Shea at the Grammar School and make their wishes known.

The school board has enjoyed excellent working relations with the principals, faculty and staff of the schools. The interest and cooperation of parents and

residents has been most encouraging throughout the year. The board feels especially indebted to Superintendent Perham and his office for assistance and advice.

- Article 4. Motion by Mrs. Burak that the District continue to have the State Tax Commission audit the District accounts and request the Commission to return the Audit in ample time to be printed in the School District Report. Seconded by Mr. Hooker. Vote in the affirmative.
- Article 5. Mrs. Burak moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$138,540.00 and to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board, exclusive of State Aid, and upon the determination of the amount of State Aid to be received by the School District during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from State Aid and with the School District Clerk certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. Dear Sir:

This letter is to confirm our inspection of the High and Grammar School buildings made on Oct. 18, 1960.

We were happy to find that all of our recommendations of 1955 had been complied with and that this inspection was to further fire safety in your schools.

I want to say at this time that the housekeeping was excellent and the custodian should be commended for this fine work.

The following recommendations are made in the interest of further fire safety but are not mandatory to be in compliance of any State regulation. State regulations were complied with in our 1955 report.

Of course, the ideal fire protection is complete coverage by automatic sprinklers, not only does it protect the life of the occupants but also gives 24 hour protection from fire destruction to the buildings. Some thought should be given to this protection in planning for the future.

In lieu of sprinklers we recommend a heat detector system, of the "rate-of-rise" principle. Such an installation will alert the children and teachers in the matter of minutes that a fire has occurred, and give the necessary first few minutes to evacuate the building. If the system is tied into the town fire alarm system the fire department will also receive the alarm at the same time.

Grammar School

- 1. When we inspected the fuses in the electric distribution cabinet the fuses were so hot that you could hardly hold a hand on them. Most fuses were of 30 amperes, these 30 ampere fuses should be discarded and only 15 ampere fuses on No. 14 wire, and 20 ampere fuse on No. 12 wire, be used. If this is not satisfactory then the wiring should be checked. The overloading and heating of the fuses can be overcome by either adding more circuits or rewiring the building.
- 2. Clean out all ventilator rooms of all combustible material. If a fire should occur in a ventilator room it could spread the fire throughout the building.
- 3. A sprinkler head should be installed in the paint room.
- 4. Clean out closet under basement stairway (north entrance) and lock it up permanently.
- 5. Existing fire alarms are sounded in the bell system which is used for all purposes. The fire alarm signal should be on a separate circuit with horns of the Klaxon type, so that the fire alarm would not be confused with any of the bell signals.
- 6. The tubing on the Liquefied Petroleum Gas equipment from the coupling to the tanks should be replaced and run under edges of shingle siding so that it cannot be tampered with. The existing tubing is hanging from the tank because it is too short to be located under the shingle siding and can be broken off at the tanks by children fooling with this pipe.

To confirm our conversation regarding the other matters, I will state that the standpipe and hose can be eliminated due to the fact that we do not want to make firemen out of your school teachers, as I believe it is their responsibility in case of fire to get the children out of the building, and call the fire department

and let them take care of the fire. Also, when the fire department responds they will use their own equipment.

As to the use of wired-glass in the windows beneath the fire escapes I do not recommend wired-glass in wooden sash. Wired-glass is alright in steel sash. I believe that if a fire of such magnitude to blow or burn out your windows should occur that the children would have been evacuated.

The existing window opening on to the fire escape (High School) should be cut down and replaced by a door opening on to the escape. Until this is done, we recommend steps be provided on both sides of the window sill to effect easier egress.

Another step in the right direction in fire prevention is; when repainting or redecorating it would be wise to use flameproof paint. The flameproof paint of today is easy to spread and is obtainable in practically all colors. This paint will definitely stop any fire spread.

Regarding the trouble with ventilation since the installation of smoke screens in the corridors, I am a little stumped over the situation. I will not recommend the doors being kept open by a wire and fusible links, because a fusible link would not operate fast enough to shut out any smoke and in thinking the matter over on my way home we do not think that an automatic door closer would be any better. In talking the matter over with a technical man he could only think of one solution (which might not work in your situation) but his only solution was; cross ventilation between the rooms inside the smoke doors.

If I can obtain further information on this I will contact you.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 34 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 34, during 1959-1960, received a salary of \$7,800.00 which was made up as follows: \$4,250.00 paid by the State Department of Education from the per capita tax and \$3,550.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,100.00 for travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

A statement of the School District Tax Account with the Town of Lincoln is contained in Exhibit G. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1960, the balance of the 1958-59 tax and the whole amount of the 1959-60 tax had been received by the School District.

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$898.36. In other words, total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount as shown herewith:
