WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Lisbon, in the county of Grafton and state of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lisbon on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To vote by secret ballot, "To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally," as permitted under Chapter 99 of the Session Laws of 1933.

Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and to make appropriations for the same.

Art. 4. To see if the town will fix and determine the compensation to be paid each of the town officers.

Art. 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and special committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Art. 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue druggists' permits to any druggist who is a registered pharmacist doing business in Lisbon to sell liquor for medicinal use upon a prescription under the provisions of Chapter 147, Section 14, of the laws of 1917.

Art. 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public libraries in addition to what is required by law, and to determine how the same shall be divided.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to discount all taxes paid on or before such time as the town may vote.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to light the streets of Lisbon Village District all night during the entire year, Sugar Hill from the dwelling of H. J. Field to Hotel Lookoff, from the Baptist church through Lovers' Lane to the Franconia line, from Goodnow school house to the Homestead, and from the Lisbon and Franconia town line to the dwelling of Joseph Pelletier, Sugar Hill and the vicinity to be lighted the entire year until midnight, and from 5 a. m. until daylight, excepting the lights from the Homestead to Hotel Lookoff for six months of the year, all the above premises to be lighted with electricity, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the District Nursing Association.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to properly observe Old Home Day.

Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200 for Grove Hill cemetery.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid construction, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to plow the town roads, and, if so, to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to oil the roads from the corner of the Homestead on Sugar Hill, past the Sunset Hill House to Hotel Lookoff, the road leading to Peckett's from the intersection with the Franconia road past the Veitor cottage to the Baptist church, and the Bishop road to the Ammonoosuc, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for the bond due this year, and interest.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to paint the village bridge.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and deed the gravel bank on the Pearl lake road, known as the Harley Bronson bank.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road known as the new road near Paul Dickinson's house, which passes through his fields and comes into the old road near the David Smith farm, so called.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to adjust, compromise and settle any interest the town may have arising out of tax sales or liens on any real estate acquired by the town, whether same has been deeded to the town or not, and to execute any necessary papers relating thereto, including deeds and releases.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to heat the Town Hall for basketball practice, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to carry Accident Compensation insurance, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to have a survey of the town made, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 26. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to purchase a truck, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint one or more road agents.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the repair of the road in said Lisbon known as the Lovers' Lane road leading from Veitor's to Peckett's farm.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums as they deem necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Donors to the library are Mrs. Oliver, Mrs. Moulton, Mrs. Payne, Mrs. Clough, Mrs. Webb, Mrs. Suttie, Mrs. Woolson, the Century Company, and Messrs. Blake, Hamilton, Kelsea, Godfrey and Webb.

A box of 24 books collected by the library was sent to the CCC camps in October. Also, one of 31 books and four magazines was sent to the Orfordville library.

The Winston Universal reference library dictionary has been acquired and is proving a valuable reference tool. Books not owned by our library may be borrowed from the state library upon application to the local librarian.

The librarians attended the library school held in Littleton Oct. 2-6. It was considered a very helpful session and was well attended.

As in former years the pupils of the public school have shown great interest in the library and borrowed its books very freely. A wise and careful selection of new juvenile books is made each year by the assistant librarian, Mrs. Clough.

In August a flower show, sponsored by Friends in Council, was held in the library rooms.

Periodicals for the reading room and circulation include Ladies' Home Journal, gift of Mrs. C. A. Rich, Woman's Home Companion, and American Magazine, gift of Mrs. Arthur S. Walcott. By appropriation, Cosmopolitan, House Beautiful, Saturday Evening Post, Pictorial Review, Good Housekeeping, American Boy, and Popular Science.

I want to especially thank Miss Dorothy Cornell for a set of 20 volumes of the "World's Greatest Books," and Mr. A. P. Thornton for a set of leather bound books. All of which are most helpful to the children of grammer and high school age.

I also wish to extend special thanks to Mrs. Walcott, Mrs. Kelton and Mr. Otto T. Mallery for their interest in the library.

The members of the Board of Trustees met at the library for the July meeting, at which time \$50.00 was appropriated for books and \$10.00 for magazines. The books were put into circulation Sept. 8th, and the magazines with the Nov. and Dec. issue.

In answer to Miss Julia Mays' call for books and magazines for C. C. camps, I was able to collect, with the assistance of Mrs. Richard H. Summers and Mrs. Hattie M. Sanborn, 150 books and 100 magazines, which I gave direct to Lt. Moore of the Wildwood camp.

While the circulation was not as large as last year, due to better employment among our men, the attendance has been very satisfactory. The building has been used more as a community center, which was the wish of the donor, the late Mrs. C. F. Richardson. Choir rehearsals, Willing Workers' meetings and other social events have been held with no added expense, and always under the supervision of the librarian or her assistant.

The building is in much need of re-decorating, nothing being done to the interior for the past nine years.

A note of interest is that a book loaned to a family 28 years ago (one year before I became librarian) has recently been returned to the library.

The trustees wish it clearly understood that at the annual town meeting a certain sum is voted each year for the support of the Lisbon and Sugar Hill libraries.
