TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the various articles in the Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see what compensation the Town will allow its various officers the ensuing year, also what price per day will be paid for Labor, Trucks and Teams on the Highways.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired through tax collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to allow bank discount on all taxes paid before Nov. 1st, 1938.
- 8. To see what sum if any the Town will vote to raise for Blister Rust Control the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1221.00 for State Aid Construction, State to give \$2442.00 to be expended on the Dorchester road.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to remove the gates and bars from the present highway leading from the residence of N. E. Watts to the residence of Carrie Wells, and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay damage and other expenses caused by said removal, or to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out a new road from the River road to the Carrie Wells residence, discontinuing the present highway, and to see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate to build the same and pay damages caused by said layout.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 13. To bring in your ballots for a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Lyme:

The nineteenth report by a superintendent of schools to the School Board and citizens of Lyme is herewith transmitted. The present Superintendent has prepared ten of these reports in the series.

Purpose

The fundamental purpose of these reports is to place before you the financial and statistical records of the year's work, together with such comments as may seem pertinent to the situation.

Survey

This year has been one of better than average progress in your schools. Those persons who have tried to serve you have shown a high degree of interest and desire to cooperate in the great work of education. It is noted that there is some change in the residence of pupils so that some schools are full while others do not have as large classes as formerly. The improved physical conditions of all of the schools have helped much to create better social habits among the pupils. It is expected that the educational result will continue to be of a high order and that those pupils who extend their school education will find that they have a background sufficiently strong to enable them to do the work of the higher grade.

State Aid

The School District was fortunate again this year in receiving a larger grant of State aid than had been originally anticipated. This has enabled the schools to carry on with the additional teacher without greatly increasing the burden upon the tax payer. This larger amount of State Aid is not likely to be continued after the present year, due partially to the lessened amount of State Aid granted by the legisla-

ture, and partially to the small number of children in some of our schools. It is probable that just as soon as the numbers increase the State Aid will likewise increase.

This act seems to be in keeping with the policies of the State Board in connection with the allotment of State Aid to other towns and communities in the state.

Insurance

The additional insurance which was authorized at the last School District meeting has been placed upon all school buildings. Through a form of policy known as the blanket form the insurance has been adjusted in such fashion that an equal amount of insurance expires each year. This means that it is known in advance exactly what amount to include in the budget for insurance. The amount will not vary over the insuring period to any marked extent. Between ninety and one hundred dollars will be required every year. It is for that reason that one hundred dollars (\$100.00) has been included in the budget for the year 1938-1939.

Teachers

More than half of the teaching staff severed their connections with the Lyme schools at the close of the year in June 1937. Your Board was fortunate, however, in securing the services of young women who were professionally trained and who have already given evidence of being adapted to the work which they are trying to do. We were particularly fortunate in again securing the services of Mrs. Dorothy Lanpher Messer, who served us so acceptably in the lower grade at the Lyme Center School. It is probable that Lyme, in common with other communities in the state will need to continue to pay reasonable salaries in order to be able to maintain a staff of teachers of the quality and desirability that is needed for her schools.

Pupils

Your attention is directed at this time to the increasing number of pupils in attendance upon the Plain School. The current year has seen an enroll-

ment in that building of more than 100 pupils. While some of these have moved away there are at the present time more than 90 pupils in attendance. This means that it will be necessary to continue the plan established last year of carrying on the work of the eight grades in the three rooms instead of two rooms

as formerly.

The pupils in all of the schools have shown commendable efforts in engaging in wholesome sports and play activities at recess and at other times when schools are in session. It becomes more and more necessary to provide both the teacher and pupils with simple playground equipment which may be used in organizing such activities so that the pupils will gain from their recreation periods such advantages as will help to improve their health and physique. At some of the schools the pupils themselves have planned and carried out projects for the improvement of their own surroundings. They have maintained flower gardens and in such way as to have these flower gardens actually produce late fall flowers which have not only added to the beauty around the schools but have made it possible for bouquets to be displayed within the buildings themselves. So also in the winter season has there been a little effort to provide some green by salvaging Christmas trees and using them for outdoor decorations. The greater the interest of the pupils in such projects as these the greater will be the tendency for them to have wider community interests when they reach adulthood. It is through these activities among others that good citizenship is enhanced.

Budget

It is particularly gratifying this year to be able to state that the amount to be raised by taxation is nearly \$1100 less than that requested for last year. This is due mainly to the fact that the State Aid was larger than had been anticipated. This makes possible a larger anticipated balance on June 30. It is also due somewhat to the fact that no additional appropriation needs to be made this year for tuition.

There are only a few slight changes in the other items in the budget. The item for teachers' salaries

calls for an increase of \$100 and the items for textbooks and supplies each an increase of \$50. This latter is due to the increase in the number of pupils and the necessity of additional material for use in the classrooms for instruction purposes.

School Lunches

When we take into consideration the general improvement in attendance of the pupils in the schools we cannot fail to recognize that the provision for hot lunches during the noon hour has some bearing upon this situation. The teachers should be given a great deal of credit for their efforts personally and professionally in making it possible for so many pupils to share in these lunches. Special credit should be given to those organizations and to the parents and citizens who have helped the teachers in any of the schools make these lunches possible. Such a large percentage of pupils live miles distant from the schools that something is due them in the way of a provision for food other than a mere cold lunch which is no doubt carefully prepared at home but which at its best is still a cold lunch. Through you it affords me pleasure to recognize the helpful interest of all parties concerned in carrying forward this project which was begun so many years ago and which has been supported for the past five or more years.

School Buildings

The votes authorizing the sale of school buildings have not yet resulted in a complete accomplishment of such sales. It is expected, however, that these buildings will be disposed of just as soon as the Board feels that satisfactory offers have been made to the Board for the buildings which are now on sale.

It has now become possible to secure additional play area at the Center School building. Since the area now available is still inadequate for the games and activities of the pupils at recess, it is strongly recommended that appropriate action be taken at this meeting to make possible the purchase of the so-called Palmer estate.

It is again my pleasant duty to express full appreciation to all those who have in any way aided in the betterment of the public schools of Lyme. It is indeed a pleasure to be associated with a community which is so wholesomely interested in the general welfare of its boys and girls. This makes it imperative upon all of us to do our part toward improving the educational opportunities of the School District.

It is probable that this enrollment will be even greater for the year 1938. Your attention is again directed to the fact that while we have a small number of tardinesses per pupil on the average, the larger part of the tardinesses seems to be confined to a single school. It would be helpful to the records of the department were the pupils and parents in this school to make an extra effort to have

their boys and girls in school on time and in regular attendance upon every day during which the schools are in session. Had this been done for the past year the percent of attendance would have been even higher than was actually the case, although in all fairness to every situation it must be stated that the percent of attendance was greater than for the last five years. Full cooperation of all parents will have a tendency to improve this record.
