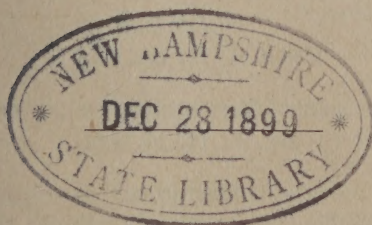

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Selectmen of the town of Newton, the following report of the Superintending School Committee is respectfully submitted :

DISTRICT NO. 1.

John Smith, Prudential Committee.

Miss Cora E. Cook of Exeter, teacher.

Both Summer and Fall terms were taught by Miss Cook. Being quiet, yet firm and decided, she governed and conducted this school without any apparent effort. Order, lessons and whole appearance were worthy of highest praise.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Charles Wormwood, Prudential Committee.

Geo. B. Merrill, Miss Alice Wilder of Newton and Miss A. Josephine Eaton of Hampstead, teachers.

This school has had such a change of teachers during the year that the harmony has not existed which is so important for continued success. Mr. Morrill worked hard in the interest of the school, a fact which did not seem to be appreciated by many of the parents who did not make much apparent effort to keep their children at school.

Miss Wilder taught the second term and marked improvement was made. She labored under the disadvantage of being in her own district but she succeeded well.

The Winter term taught by Miss Eaton of Hampstead though short, owing to the small amount of money left for school purposes, was very successful. She is a teacher of considerable experience, the instruction was thorough and the order and progress of the school was commendable.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Orin S. Carter, Prudential Committee.

Miss Elvira Smith of Newton, teacher.

Miss Smith taught both terms. She brings to her work ability and experience, united with tact and energy for the management of a school; and has a practical and business-like way which is very refreshing. The examinations were very satisfactory.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

John Peaslee, Prudential Committee.

Miss Ellen Kelley teacher.

Both Summer and Fall terms were taught by Miss Kelley who appears to be admirably adapted to the wants of the school. The scholars are young and few in number, but the energy and ambition of the teacher were manifest in every exercise. The deportment and progress of this school were all that could be desired.

DISTRICT No. 5.

Almon Currier, Prudential Committee.

Miss Abbie Nelson of East Kingston, teacher.

Miss Nelson entered this school with an experience of two previous terms in the district and was well qualified to understand its wants and her labors being well seconded by the scholars made it a very profitable term.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

Ezra George, Prudential Committee.

Miss M. E. Boswell, of Newton teacher.

Summer and Fall terms taught by Miss Boswell who is one of our most successful teachers, and under her care the school fully sustained its former good reputation. The examinations at close of terms were alike creditable to both teacher and scholars.

I am gratified in being able to report the schools of the past year so favorably. The teachers have generally been faithful, yet it is not supposable that all would possess the tact in governing, and the skill in imparting instruction, which has crowned several of them with remarkable success.
