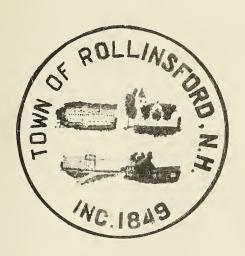

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SELECTMEN'S PROGRESS REPORT

In July, 1974, the ball began rolling towards the implementation of a Housing Program for the elderly in Rollinsford. After 6 months of meetings, red tape and much frustration, the program was finally accepted by the voters at a special Town Meeting in December, 1974. But, that was not the end of waiting. It was another 6 months before we finally received a favorable nod from the Governor and Council. July, 1975, brought the first rent subsidy checks and the program has been working well since.

Welfare was a serious problem this past year. We now have appropriate forms for welfare recipients to fill out which makes things a lot easier as far as keeping records.

The work-study student who spent the bigger part of the summer working throughout the village was certainly a big help. Our streets were kept clean of litter, the inside of the Town Hall was given a much needed cleaning, and an accurate census of the Town was taken. And our share "of Mike's salary for the summer was only \$200.00. We'd like another workstudy student this summer, but we doubt if we'll get another one like Mike Riggs.

Partridge Lane and Beccaris Drive were finally accepted as Town roads in December.

Another problem which is becoming very serious is the dog problem. Many people are overlooking the fact that we do have a leash law on the books, and it's been there since 1972. More and more, dogs are on the loose, running in packs, knocking down garbage cans, and making a general nuisance of themselves. It certainly is not fair to the people who do abide by the law and keep their dogs tied.

We've spent much time studying different land fill operations and what could be an economical and workable solution for Rollinsford. One concern offered a good plan but there were many problems to study. The law has been extended to July, 1977. Something will have to be done - and soon.

Next summer, hopefully, we can take advantage of County prisoners working here in our Town. Much could be done in the cemetery and on town streets. When labor is free, there is always much we can find to do.

We've given some very serious thought to the much needed help of a part time clerk in the office. It is getting harder and harder for the Selectmen to do all that needs to be done. There are always so many forms to fill out, letters to answer, material to file, complaints to deal with, etc, etc. Four or five hours at the office on Monday nights is just not enough! A clerk at the office from perhaps 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. daily would be a tremendous help to the residents of Rollinsford, and certainly to the Board of Selectmen. This is something we will definitely study this year and at the next Town Meeting hopefully we can come up with figures to offer you and an article in the warrant for your consideration.

Another area we hope can be studied this year is the school set-off. It's time we start thinking of keeping \underline{all} our tax dollars in Town. Our school system is adequate, we serve a hot lunch and we have buses to transport the children to the local school. Approximately \$25,000 tax dollars are going to Dover and should come to Rollinsford.

We'd like at this point to say a very sincere thank you for a job well done to the following committees: Budget, Planning Board, Board

of Adjustment, Parks & Playgrounds, Com ervation Commission, our recently reorganized Town Hall Building Committee and our very active Bicentennial Committee. All these people have contributed much towards the betterment of Rollinsford.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD, COUNTY OF STRAFFORD, STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, OUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified that the polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., at the Rollinsford Town Hall, on Tuesday, March 2, 1976, to bring in your ballots for the Town Officers to be elected in Article I, and to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School at 8:00 p.m. on the same day to act upon the budget and other articles in the Warrant, as follows:

ARTICLE I:

To bring in your ballots for:

One (1) Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for three (3) years.

Town Clerk for one (1) year.

Town Treasurer for one (1) year.

Chief of the Fire Department for one (1) year.

Three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three (3) years.

ARTICLE II:

To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE III:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as set off against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and to further authorize Selectmen to make prorata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereof:

To hear a report from the Town Hall Building Committee.

ARTICLE V

To see if the Town will accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE VI:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE VII:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

ARTICLE VIII:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Committee to manage the town owned forests, including sale of marketable timber and related forest management practices with any funds generated to to to the Conservation Committee for further development of Town owned land.

ARTICLE IX:

To see if the Town will vote to ban the use of rifles with centerfire for the purpose of hunting wild game on town owned property within said town. (By request)

ARTICLE X:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the future needs of a Tank Truck or a combination Pumper and Tank Truck for the Town of Rollinsford.

ARTICLE XI:

To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

1975 POLICE DEPARTMENT AND FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Police Department

This year, in writing an annual report, I have decided to delete all of the usual statistics that have appeared in past issues of the Town Report and try and sum up the events of 1975 within this message. The Police Department last year had the highest number of calls for services in its history and perfected almost twice as many arrests as the previous year and returned a large amount of monies collected from Court fines back to the Town's General Fund. This can be noted by checking the Clerk of Courts Report. This department as well as departments all across the Nation, have noted a general upswing in all types of crimes. Burglaries and vandallism alone have risen almost 21% and is one of this town's most increased crimes. Being a small force of men, this department has worked long and hard hours trying to keep law and order and to make Rollinsford a safe place to live in. We did not have a rape, murder, holdup or any major crime take place in the year 1975, and I attribute this to increased patrols and good basic police work. My officers, during 1975, logged many hours of school time at their own expense and time, to bring professionalism to their performance as Police officers. There is always the same argument come budget time that the Police budget is higher than it should be and I would like to interject the following at this time: The Police Department is full time organization bringing full time services to the residents of Rollinsford and with the rise in the cost of living and general materials to operate a good department, our budget is bound to rise. I believe that 1975 has been a productive and busy year with the department improving with each day and we plan to try and make 1976 an even better and safer year for town residents. I would also at this time like to thank my Police Officers for the extra hours that they have worked and for the fact that they all cared enough to upgrade themselves through attending all of the special schools and training sessions that make them better Police Officers. I would also like to thank the Fire Department and Highway Department for working so well with the Police Department. I also thank the Town Selectmen and the citizenry for their understanding and patience and generally good attitude with the Police Department during the year 1975.

- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ROLLINSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT February 13, 1976

To Residents of the District:

The proposed school budget for the 1976-77 school year is being presented by the Board in two parts. The second part should be considered an addendum to the regular operating budget. In preparing the regular operating budget the Board worked with a "hold the line" attitude and succeeded in producing a budget of \$527,668.91, which would maintain current program operations. This figure is \$12,752.91 over the 1975-76 budget which is a 2.48% increase.

To realize this small percentage increase reductions from current budget allowances have been made in many accounts. The increases are for the most part unavoidable. Significant increases include a 5% budget allowance for salary increases (\$7,420), increased cost in utilities (\$790), and increased allowances in maintenance accounts (\$3,500) to make certain necessary repairs and to offset underbudgeting in this account in the current budget.

Tuition costs for students in Grades 7-12 show an increase of \$3,463, which indicates a "leveling off" of these costs. This account has seen dramatic increases in the past. A per pupil decrease of \$16 is actually seen at Somersworth High School, but this is offset by an additional seven students scheduled to attend. The Middle School shows an increase of \$93 per pupil, with a decrease of eight students scheduled for attendance. Enrollments at the Middle School have now "peaked" with the high school enrollments scheduled to "peak" in 1977-78, based upon current enrollments.

Upon completion of its work on the basic operating budget, the Board was advised by State Department officials that State Foundation Aid to Rollinsford would be increased by approximately \$45,000 which would permit a decrease in the amount to be raised by local taxes of \$30,488. Rather than go back to a reassessment of its proposed budget, the Board retained the integrity of its "hold the line" attitude and decided to write in a one year special request for needs that it has not chosen to address previously because of economic conditions.

Particularly, the Board has addressed heating efficiency. Currently class-room heat is often uneven and much heat is lost through windows and ceilings. The Board is proposing that corrections be made to the heating system, that ceilings be insulated, and that storm windows be installed. In addition, the Board has addressed certain electrical, plumbing, and other maintenance problems which should be provided for to improve building efficiency. Certain requests for equipment are made which are usually unattended because of other budget pressures.

The Board is hopeful that an architectural inspection of the building will provide information for the district of future maintenance needs to extend and improve the life of what we consider a sound community building. The total special request is \$25,000 which increases the gross budget to \$552,668.91 or a \$37,752 increase and the net budget to \$432,668, which still provides a tax levy decrease of \$5,488.

The Board believes it has taken a "common sense" approach to the current economy in its normal operating budget and to the long range maintenance and efficiency of the building in its special request. The Board now seeks your support. Thank you for your consideration.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The following is extracted from the manual published by the New Hampshire State Department of Education entitled, "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Approved."

Each elementary school shall provide to all children in attendance a broad and well-balanced elementary school curriculum, that has been prescribed by the New Hampshire State Board of Education.

A. AREAS

- 1. ART
 Art shall be taught in the elementary school and provide each child with opportunities to be creative and expressive with art media. The program shall include experiences in two and three dimensional design through drawing and painting, modeling, weaving and printing.
- 2. HEALTH
 Health education shall be an integral part of the instructional program of the elementary school. This program develops attitudes and behavior which maintain and promote mental and physical health. Effective health instruction associate the child and his interests with his personal health needs, as well as with home, school and community health responsibilities.
- 3. LANGUAGE ARTS
 Language arts shall be taught in the elementary school.
 This program shall include skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- 4. MATHEMATICS

 Mathematics shall be taught in the elementary school.

 The content of this program shall include the study of numbers and operation. Also emphasis shall be given to concepts of geometry, measurement, applications and informal algebra.
- 5. MUSIC
 Music shall be taught in the elementary school and aid each child in developing sensitivity to sound through creative discovery aspects as well as through the traditional ways of singing, listening and playing.
- 6. SCIENCE
 Science, including observational and investigative type of experiences, shall be taught in the elementary school program. Major program areas include Earth Apace, Earth and its Resources; Plants, animal and Man; and Energy and Matter.

7. SOCIAL STUDIES
Social studies shall be taught in the elementary school. The content of this program shall be selected from United States, New Hampshire and World history; geography, sociology; political science; anthropology and economics.

8. PHYSICAL EDUCATION
Physical Education shall be taught in the elementary school. The physical education program for each child shall include experiences for his physical growth and development. The well planned physical education program includes games, contests and activities that develop strength, vigor, vitality, skills and coordination for personal and social accomplishments. It aids the child in developing desirable attitudes for his own well-being.

B. SERVICES

- 1. LIBRARY SERVICES
 Library services shall be provided for all children.
 Library services are a basic requirement for individualized and quality education; the library supplements and differentiates the basic knowledge through various media for differing abilities and interests; these resources update textbooks, provide depth of subject matter for able students, and visual materials and varied reading level resources for the average and below-average readers; its resources are basic to the development of independent and self-directed learners.
- 2. GUIDANCE SERVICES
 Guidance services shall be provided for all children.
 Guidance is all those experiences which the child has under the direction of the school which help him in realizing his potential in becoming a self-directed individual. The pupil-personnel program is built around a sound guidance program.
- 3. <u>HEALTH SERVICES</u> <u>Each school shall</u> provide adequate health services for all children.
- 4. SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

 Special Education services shall be provided to all children who differ from the average to a significant degree in intellectual, emotional or physical characteristics. Special Education services embody the following three elements: (1) trained professional personnel possessing special competencies for serving a certain type or types of exceptional children (2) a special curricular content for certain areas of exceptionality (3) special facilities often including ramps, such special equipment as group hearing aids, braille books and other related items.

FACULTY

The New Hampshire State Department recommends a class size of 20 students or less in Grades One and Two. To meet this recommendation the following teachers were assigned to new positions: Miss Pat Young to Grade One, Mrs. Linda Lash to Grade Two, Mr. Rick Vezeau to Grade 3-4, Ms. Sandra Meyer to Grade 4, and Mrs. Linda Lord to Grade 5-6. Class sizes for Grades Three through Six were at or slightly above recommended levels.

The Grade School had the services of Elaine Lauterborn, Guidance Counselor two days per week; Lesley Myers, Speech Therapist one day per week; Lillian Dodier, Nurse one day per week; Chris Reishus and Jackie Pulkkinen, Title I Reading Tutors daily; Susan deMoya, Physical Education four days per week; Barbara Lawton, Music Supervisor one day per week; Chellis Carville, nusical instrument instruction (private lessons) one day per week.

Psychologists and other specialists from Strafford Learning Center serviced the Grade School on a consulting basis.

CONCLUSION

Once again the Grade School personnel extend thanks to the Rollinsford P.T.O., Police Department, Friends for the Library, American Legion Auxiliary and numerous volunteer teacher aides for contributions to the educational program.

The Principal wished to especially thank Mr. Tom Berry, Mr. William West, Miss Sue de Moya, and Miss Pat Young for the many hours spent coaching basketball and cheerleading teams. The services of Mrs. Linda Dolan and Mr. Doug Matson for supervising evening adult recreation programs has been

appreciated.

Much of the 1975 calendar year was devoted to curriculum revision. National educational testing has indicated that many children are not reading, writing, computing, and comprehending at expected grade level norms. With this in mind, administrators and teachers have reorganized the mathematics and language arts curricula. The 1975 budget provided funds for the purchase of unified reading and mathematics programs. Health instruction was implemented in September, 1975. The physical education program was expanded to provide special coordination and balance exercises, as well as occupational and rhysical therapy programs for children with special needs. The music program has continued to offer a fine Spring Rusical.

A team teaching program was implemented for Grades Three and Four. In the team teaching situation two teachers share the responsibility for planning, presenting, and evaluating lessons prepared for the students. The program utilizes the special abilities of each teacher to expose the children to additional re ources. The teachers have realized such advantages as greater flexibility in assigning children to instructional groups, and more provision for large group, small group and individual instruction.

Many plant improvements were accomplished during 1975. Seven classrooms and all hallways were painted using federally-funded employees. Aluminum doors were purchased to replace worn wooden doors. A fire door was installed in the boiler room. Student workers were employed through the Neighborhood Youth Corps Program to assist the custodian with an extensive summer clean-up. The gymnasium floor is now being treated and resealed on a regular basis.

- ARTICLE 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

A motion was made by Mrs. Rollins to follow last years' salaries, seconded by Ovid Viel. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion made by Edmund Jansen, Jr. to accept article 6 as read, seconded by Robert Garneau. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

A motion was made by Lester Eldridge to accept article 7 as read, seconded by Mr. Cass. After much discussion on who the audits are done by and the fact that they are not always available at the School meetings, Mr. Eldridge amended the motion by empowering the school board to either have the state tax commission or a private auditor audit the school district books, seconded by Jean Dionne. This came about because of costs. The general feeling was it may be more expensive. The amendment and the original motion were both carried.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department

or agency thereof.

A motion was made by Mr. Spencer to accept the article as read, seconded by Ruth Emerson. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

A motion was made by Martin Lussier to accept the budget as presented, seconded by Edmund Jansen, ${\rm Jr.}$

Hollis Furlong made a motion to have this article decided by a secret ballot, seconded by Mr. Chase. This motion was defeated.

Mr. Lewis Janetos made a motion to reduce the budget by \$20,000, seconded by Joseph Porter. Motion to cut the budget by \$20,000 was defeated by a vote of 40-44.

A motion was made by Ovid Viel to amend the article by reducing the budget by 10,000, seconded by Mr. Fogarty. This motion was carried by 68-5.

Vote on the original motion to accept the article as read and as amended was carried.

ARTICLE 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

A motion was made by Mr. Chase to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Mr. Garneau. Motion carried.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING ROLLINSFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE March 4, 1975

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Albert Labrecque, at 8:05~p.m. The Warrant was read by Mr. Labrecque. He also stated that only registered voters would be allowed to cast votes.

There were 320 ballots cast at the polls.

ARTICLE I.

To bring in your ballots for:

One (1) Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for three (3) years.

Town Clerk for one (1) year.

Town Treasurer for one (1) year.

Chief of Fire Department for one (1) year.

Three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three (3) years.

After the votes were counted, the moderator announced the following results:

Ovid Viel, seconded by Martin Lussier, nominated Paul Janetos.

Mrs. Robert Whitehouse moved that all nominations cease, seconded by Martin Lussier.

Mr. Janetos was elected unanimously.

Surveyors of Wood & Lumber

Martin Lussier, seconded by Gary Mitchell, nominated Paul Hanson. Edmund Jansen, seconded by Lester Eldridge, nominated Albert England. Ruth Emerson, seconded by Albert England, nominated Joseph Porter. Albert Viel, seconded by Martin Lussier, nominated Edward Glovinski. Ovid Viel, seconded by Albert England, nominated Albert Viel. Paul Hanson, conded by Howard Hammond, nominated Basil Mitchell.

Martin Lussier moved all nominations cease. Helen Rollins moved that the clerk cast one vote for each of the nominated. All of the above were elected.

 $\mbox{\rm Mr.}$ Martin Lussier moved to accept the Article as written, seconded by Edmund Jansen.

George Leuchs questioned the estimated \$16,000 - stateing that the

figure should read \$13,000. He also asked why we only received \$8,000 last year. Mr. Lauze explained that because the Town was late with their Revenue Sharing report, the remainder of the funds were received in January, 1975. There would show an overage in the 1975 revenues.

Joseph Porter explained that there was \$21,000 in the savings account plus interest for 1974 and 1975, to date.

Basil Mitchell asked how the need to appropriate \$16,000\$ had been decided when we had <math>\$21,000\$ in the bank. Albert Labrecque explained that these funds were not an appropriation but simply an allocation required by Federal Standards.

Joseph Caouette asked why these funds were not expended previously. Mr. Lauze explained that these funds cound not be spent without approval at the Town Meeting.

Helen Rollins asked if these funds could be used to off set the cost of the budgets involved. After more discussion, Myron 0'Neill moved the Article be put to a vote, and it was seconded. The Article was accepted.

ARTICLE XI:

To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

Martin Lussier moved to accept the Article as written, seconded by Lester Eldridge.

Carlton Spencer stated that \$2,500 for radio equipment was a lot of money. Chief Brown explained the type of radios needed and where they would be installed.

After some discussion between Mr. Spencer and Mr. Brown concerning prices, Mr. Robert Brunelle explained that the equipment in question was not citizen ban equipment. There was more discussion on this item.

Basil Mitchell moved to take each item in the Budget, one at a time, and discuss it. Albert Labrecque asked that Mr. Mitchell specify what items he would like to cover. Mr. Mitchell named several items. There was no second to the motion.

Carlton Spencer asked why the Police Department budget was up \$11,000. Chief England explained that \$7,835 would be reimbursed by the Crime Commission. This would cost the Town \$405 for one more full time man. The actual appropriation was only up by \$3,000. Mr. Spencer asked how long the full time man would be funded. Mr. England stated that the first year would cost the Town 5% of the salary and 50% the second year.

Mr. Spencer questioned the hours worked at present with Chief England explaining the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act that was effective January 1,1975 requireing all full time Police officers be paid at the rate of time and one-half after 60 hours worked within one week.

Ruth Emerson went on record saying she felt that the Police Department had done an excellent job.

Basil Mitchell asked if there wasn't some way that the officers could rotate their hours with the specials to off set some of these hours worked. Chief England explained the proposed plan for the new three man force and have full time men working weekends, when most needed, and specials working during the week with full time. Mr. Mitchell said that the Police Depart-

ment had been updated tremendiously in the last five or six years but the budget had to be cut somewhere.

George Leuchs stated that the incidents of crime were increasing and that meant more work for the Police Department. He felt the Town needed another officer.

Martin Lussier moved to accept the Article as read, seconded by Honore Ouellette. The motion was put to a vote and defeated.

Richard Bradbury moved to amend the Article and take each item line for line, seconded by Basil Mitchell. After some discussion, the amendment was defeated.

After some discussion concerning the decrease in the Planning Board Budget, the results of Article 2 through 8 were read.

ARTICLE II.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

This amendment makes changes in the title of land use regulations with the effect of expanding and liberalizing selected land uses by zones.

After these results were read by the Moderator, a five minute recess was called. (9:22 p.m. to 9:27 p.m.)

After the recess, we proceeded to take up Article XI.

There was some discussion concerning the Parks and Playground appropriation.

At this time, Edmund Jansen stated that the School portion of the Budget was primarily fixed charges, and that the Town Budget should be cut to off set the School and County increases. He suggested several areas that he felt could be cut including the heat in the Police Station and other Town buildings (replacing with electric heaters) and was told that the Police Station was not heated by the furnace in Town Hall now but by electric heaters. Mr. Jansen also felt that some of the street lighting could be cut.

Mr. Joseph Caouette questioned the 1974 expenditure for the audit, the 1975 proposed expenditure for the County Tax of \$32,523.83 and what would happen if all the Towns and Cities around refused to ray the tax.

It was explained that the legallity of such an act would have to be checked.

Mrs. Helen Rollins asked why a certificate of audit was not printed in the Town Report and was told that we had not received the audit report at this time.

There was a discussion as to whether or not the 1973 audit should be printed in the local newspaper five days after receipt of same. It was decided that it would not be necessary.

At this time, D. Chase moved to amend the Article and cut the total budget by \$10,000. with the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee to do the cutting where they see fit.

This motion was seconded by Carlton Spencer. After brief discussion a vote was taken on the amendment. There were 56 in favor of the amendment and 51 against. This amendment was passed.

There was a vote taken on the Article as amended. The vote was passed to accept the budget of \$209,085.46.

ARTICLE XII:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes.

Martin Lussier, seconded by Honore Ouellette, moved to accept the Article as written. There being no discussion, a vote was taken. This Article carried.

ARTICLE XIII:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Ovid Viel, seconded by Martin Lussier, moved to accept the Article as written. There being no discussion, a vote was taken and the Article carried.

ARTICLE XIV:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept the (2) roads in Presidential Park, when said roads are brought up to State and Local specifications.

Ovid Viel, seconded by Lester Eldridge, moved to accept the Article as written.

Carlton Spencer asked if all roads were paved at present and was told that they were.

Michael Weston asked what would be necessary for acceptance of these roads. Ronald Bisson asked Douglas Rollins, developer to answer this question.

Mr. Rollins explained that all specifications had been met but the manholes or catch basins overflowed at present. He also stated that he had already hired a contractor to correct this situation and that when completed, the work would have an eighteen month guarantee.

After some discussion concerning the developer's bond, Michael Weston moved to amend the Article to read that the Selectmen must force the developer to bring to standard within 30 days or the developer's bond must be called. This motion was seconded by Michael Gately.

Honore Ouellette stated that 30 days was not allowing enough time to complete this project.

Kenneth Shorey asked if this was a Town or a private problem.

Lewis Janetos asked if the problem was with the sewers or the roads. Albert Labrecque stated that he did not know.

Edmund Jansen asked that a meeting with the Selectmen, the Planning Board, the Sewer District Commissioners and Mr. Rollins be set up and this situation be taken care of as soon as possible.

Mr. Michael Weston withdrew his motion to amend, pending a meeting and possible solution to this problem. Michael Gately seconded.

After another reading of the Article, it was passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XV:

(If ARTICLE XIV is accepted.)

To see if the Town will vote to name the existing road running from Main Street throught Presidential Park to Pine Street Beccaris Memorial Drive, and the land running East off said road to be named Partridge Lane.

Honore Ouellette, seconded by Ronald Brown, moved to accept the Article as written.

It was asked why the name Beccaris Memorial Drive was to be given to Millbrook Road. Mr. Lauze explained that this change was in honor of the young fireman that lost his life on December 18, 1974, Robert Beccaris.

John Piwowar moved to amend the Article to strike the word "Memorial" seconded by Michael Weston.

A vote was taken on the amendment - carried.

At this time, a vote was taken on the Article as amended - carried.

ARTICLE XVI:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell through competitive bidding, land off the end of Washington Street consisting of 1,502 square feet, more or less.

Gary Bisson moved to accept the Article as written, and it was seconded.

Honore Ouellette moved to amend the Article to discontinue or abandon public way and then authorize the Selectmen to sell through competitive bidding. Edmund Jansen seconded the motion.

After a discussion on the location of the public way, a vote was taken on the amendment - carried.

A vote was then taken on the Article as amended - carried.

ARTICLE XVIII:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

John Piwowar moved that a meeting regarding Article XIV be held within 30 days to determine necessary action for the Millbrook acceptance, seconded by Shiela Johnson.

A vote was taken and the motion carried in the affirmative.

Martin Lussier moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Lester Eldridge. The meeting adjourned at 10:50~p.m.

TOWN HALL BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Selectmen called a meeting of the Building Committee in November, 1975 and added four new members to the committee. At this reorganizational meeting, the committee selected a chairman, reviewed its previous work, and discussed the structural engineering report on the Town Hall. In essence, this report had stated that the Town Hall is structurally sound and can be renovated provided the weak roof rafters are strengthened.

As directed by the Selectmen, the Committee gathered information on three alternative solutions for the Town Hall problem. The three alternatives proposed were:

- 1. Tear down the Town Hall and put the town offices in a house.
- 2. Tear down the Town Hall and erect a new town office building.
- 3. Renovate the Town Hall.

Proponents of putting the Town offices in a house argue that town business only requires a couple of rooms and a house would be sufficient and much cheaper. Proponents of building a new Town office building argue that it is a waste of money to fix up that "old victorian gray elephant fire trap." Proponents of renovation argue that it will be much cheaper to renovate the existing Town Hall than to build a new one. The Building Committee considered each of these alternatives. After estimating the Town's current and future needs for space, the house proposal was eliminated as a viable alternative. No suitable houses with adequate parking space are available.

The building of an adequate new office building was rejected as being too expensive. It was estimated that the town offices, the police station, and the municipal court would require nearly 5,000 sq. ft. to fulfill expected future needs. With construction costs estimated at \$37.00 per sq. ft., a 5,000 sq. ft. building would cost \$185,000. The addition of of a sprinkler system, tearing down the existing Town Hall, and site preparation for the new building would increase the building cost another \$25,000. Hence, a new office building would cost approximately \$210,000. Providing another \$20,000 for cost overruns and inflation would increase the building cost to \$230,000. Finance charges would increase the total building cost to over \$300,000. In light of this high projected cost, the Building Committee gave no further consideration to this alternative.

Most of the Committee's time was spent on drawing floor plans, preparing construction specs, and developing cost estimates for the renovation of the Town Hall. Copies of the proposed floor plans for the renovated building follow this report. The basement floor would be renovated for use by the Police Department and the Municipal Court. The first floor would be renovated for use as town offices and meeting rooms. No renovations are recommended for the second floor at this time, except for the installation of storm windows, a dry type sprinkler systerm, and the leads for heating and electricity.

New heating, plumbing and electrical systems are proposed for the building. Some new walls, wall panelling, insulation, dropped ceilings, flooring and a sprinkler system are included in the renovation plans. The sprinkler system would pay for itself in a few years by reducing insurance rates. Without a sprinkler system, it would be difficult to secure adequate insurance at a reasonable rate.

New roofing, new outside siding, storm windows, doors, and a ramp on the west side of the building represent the major outside renovations.

After preparing specs for the proposed renovations, cost estimates were made by contractors on the Committee or secured from other contractors. The breakdown of costs by the major components of the proposed renovations follow:

On the basis of these estimates, the cost of the renovation is expected to range between \$90,000 and \$100,000. (If some space was not renovated at this time, this cost might be reduced by \$10,000 or \$15,000.)

What does this mean for the tax rate if the renovation plan is approved? Well, that will depend upon the availability of non-tax revenues and finance terms. Some revenue may be available from the New Hampshire Crime Commission to pay part of the renovation costs for the Police Station. The availability of other funds and low interest F.H.A. loans is being investigated. If the total renovation costs were financed with a 20 year, seven percent interest rate, the principal and interest charge would be approximately \$12,000. for the first payment. This means that the tax rate would increase slightly more than \$1.00 per thousand of assessed value.

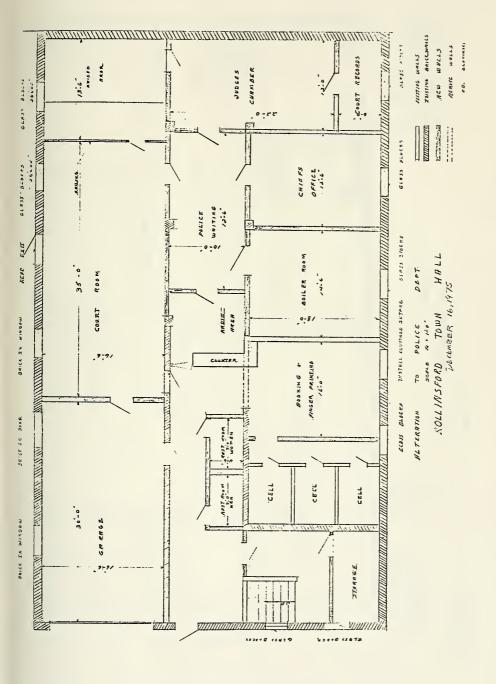
As Chairman of the Building Committee, I would like to give special thanks to Mr. Edward Glovinski for spending many hours drawing the renovation floor plans and developing specs for the interior work. Special appreciation should also go to Mr. Robert Soucy who prepared specs and cost estimates for heating and plumbing and to Mr. John Burke who prepared the electrical "specs" and cost estimates. The other members of the committee provided valuable input by participating in discussions and securing cost estimates from contractors for various phases of the proposed renovation.

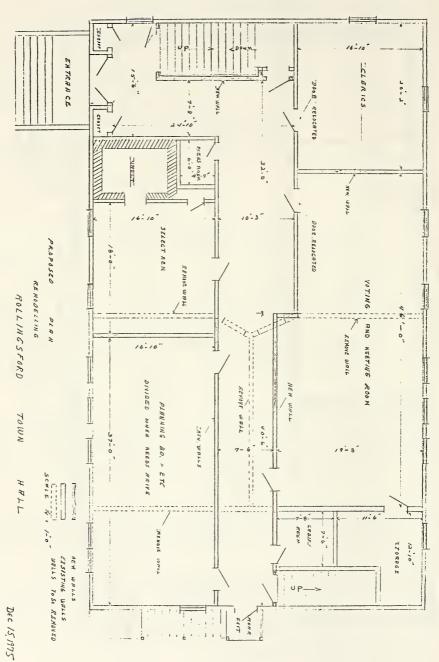
The Building Committee has completed its initial charge to secure cost estimates for renovation and for a new building. Now it is up to the voters to decide where we go from here. If steps are not taken soon to repair the leaking roof on the Town Hall, we will have no option except to build a new town office building.

The Building Committee recommends that the voters decide to either renovate or construct a new office building this year. The specific costs and financing arrangements would then be prepared for submission to a special Town Meeting.
