TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector whatever expense for postage and printing he incurs in the performance of his duties as Collector.

4. To see if the Town will vote to make an extra charge of twenty cents (.20) on all poll taxes remaining unpaid on September 1st of the year in which they are assessed; the extra charge to apply to poll taxes for 1941 and for each succeeding year until this vote is rescinded by the town meeting.

5. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$52.00. 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for road construction; raise and appropriate \$991.50 for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote a 3% discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before August 15th.

8. To see if the Town will vote to renew the Town Hall steps; raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the old Post Office Building.

10. To see if the Town will vote to repair the waterhole on Portsmouth Ave.; raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-second in the series.

Undoubtedly the problem of providing efficient schooling, at a cost commensurate with the ability of property owners to pay, is the first duty of a school district. This has been recognized by you and by your predecessors. A study of all the former School Board reports available shows that, since the beginning of the town's history, leading citizens have taught in and managed the Stratham schools. A living testimony to the conscientious work of those concerned with schools through many years, is the body of Stratham men and women who, now in middle and later life, carry on the fine traditions of family life and public service established in the past by their elders.

Stratham has seen many changes in school affairs in the last two or three generations. Instead of four local school buildings each filled with pupils in all eight grades, we now have two buildings each filled with pupils of similar age and grade. Instead of a few boys and girls attending the high school grades, sometimes at large personal sacrifice, now practically all who wish to do so may attend not only the high school grades but also the junior high school grades with their specialized and enriched courses. The transportation which the taxpayers now provide for their children removes from them much of the danger of our swift and heavy motor traffic. The health supervision, likewise provided, is a blessing not only to the pupils but to all their families. Our courses are enriched by systematic work in music. These are only a few of the changes.

All of the work of past school boards and teachers has been done in buildings which, though kept in good repair and given reasonable attention, have no benefit of modern plumbing. The next logical step, especially since so many homes are now modernized and since our school houses are occupied by so many children, would seem to be a serious consideration of the installation of modern toilets in the two buildings in use or the construction of a central school of the modern type. This latter step may seem to be more logical at this time in view of the fact that our schools, as will be seen in Table I, are now about filled to capacity and the further fact that increased opportunity for employment locally and in neighboring towns is likely to bring more families and therefore more children to Stratham. In this case added school-room space would have to be provided. The work which was done during last summer on the interior of the Ridge School resulted in a very great increase in light, a condition much to be desired. The repairs made on the toilets, together with screened windows, and increased use of disinfectants have been beneficial but the needs of thirty-odd children in each school would seem to demand more fundamental improvements.

The good work of conscientious teachers, never better than at the present time, has, of course, been the main factor in the minds of all those who have provided for the schools. The results of our standardized tests at the end of the last school year and the results of the work of the pupils who go on to junior high school indicate satisfactory work on the part of our teachers. It is much more than satisfactory for, besides the formal teaching which they give, the teachers somehow accomplish much in the formation of good character and in arousing ambition for excellent work beyond the grades of our local schools.

The Christmas program of music by the pupils was concrete evidence that they are getting worthwhile training in a subject which will make all their future pleasanter and more nearly complete. I call special attention to Mrs. Sheehy's report on health and would remind you that she makes many special home visits and does many other things in the interest of better health which are not recorded in her formal report. The good school attendance of last year undoubtedly resulted in part from the good home care of children and from the cooperation between home and school in all matters, including health. This leads me to mention the Stratham Parent Teachers' Association, now in its eighth year. Much good has been accomplished by and through this organization and it has proved a valuable aid to the schools.

The statistical tables accompanying this report are prepared in the hope that all will read them. They give many facts in small space and furnish an opportunity for comparison of school conditions in this district with those in the other districts of this Union. It will be noted that our local schools have today more than the total registration of the last school year, that the attendance record of last year equalled the best in the last ten years, that the average salary of teachers compares favorably with that of other districts in the Union, and that Stratham's expenditure for education per \$1,000 of equalized valuation is the smallest in the last ten years.

I am sure that I express the minds of all who are actively engaged in the daily life of our schools when I say that we thank you for your thoughtful and unselfish devotion to the school duties with which the district intrusts you—a devotion which makes our work a pleasure.
