TENTATIVE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, in the County of Carroll qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday the 8th day of March at Ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. \$8500 is approved by the finance committee.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$7200. approved by your committee.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanding roads. \$800 is approved.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing & building bridges. \$1200 approved.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$50.00 for flags and redecorating the Plaque. Approved.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. The sum recommended and approved to be raised as a whole is \$400. Approved.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200. for repair of road equipment, road maintenance and general highway. Approved.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000. for Tarvia. Approved.

12. To see if the Town will vote to elect five firewards and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for the establishment and maintenance of a Town Fire Dept.; as Provided for in Chapter 175 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750. for upkeep and maintenance of the South Tamworth Fire Dept. Approved.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. to be Paid to the Tamworth Fire Precinct for its aid in the extinguishment of fires in Town. Approved.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. for the Chocorua Volunteer Fire Department. Approved.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. to be paid to the Wonalancet Fire Precinct for its aid in extinguishment of fires in Town. Approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real-estate acquired by the town through tax collector's Deeds.

18. To see if the town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$300. to be divided equally, between the Laconia Hospital, North Conway Hospital and Huggins Hospital. Approved.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175. for firemen's insurance, in compliance with the Public Laws of the New Hampshire, Section 4, Chapter 146, Paragraph 16. Approved.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for White Pine Blister

Rust Control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Dept. Approved.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to repair the road on Hacket Hill which extends from LaMont Smith's to the Town Dump. Approved.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350. to aid The Red Cross Water Safety Program in transporting the children to White Lake State Park for swimming instructions.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for the Great Hill road between Samuel Hidden Place and Margrett Steele Place. \$500. of this to be used for Tarvia.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for the White Lake Road. Starting at Route 113 towards Mr. Edward Lefebvre \$500. of this to be used for Tarvia.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000. to grade and improve the road from Lawrence Hayford road to top of Knox Hill. Approved.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 which is $\frac{1}{100}$ of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Approved.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. to be divided equally among the three road agents for cutting bushes on the road side. Approved.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the upkeep and care of shrubs and plants around the Town Buildings. Approved.

29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for the Tamworth Outing Club for promoting and advertising winter business. Approved by Finance Committee.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for Perambulating of Town Lines of Tamworth Which is required by Law. Approved.

31. Article. To see if the Town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949, the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Salary of our Tax Collector from \$250. to \$350. for his services. Approved.

33. To Choose a Selectman for three years, To choose a Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Highway Agents, Auditors, and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

34. To see if the town will vote to keep the polls open until six of the clock in the afternoon.

35. To transact any other business that may come legally before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

 Gentlemen:

Conforming to our usual custom with cooperating towns we have prepared a report on the White Pine Blister Rust Control work conducted in your town, during the season of 1948. We trust this will be retained for your files and also that it will be presented by your Board before the annual town meeting next March.

Control measures of this serious disease of our native pine are conducted only after surveys of the town have been made. Detailed maps of the white pine areas and adjacent lands are prepared, and from such surveys information is obtained which determines the acreage over which it is necessary to destroy currant and gooseberry bushes, the plants which spread the Rust to white pine growth. These maps make for more efficient control work and in addition provide

valuable information needed in future rechecking of such acreages.

The need of protecting white pine from the Rust is indicated by the position which this tree holds in our state economy. For many years the production of white pine has amounted to nearly 70 per cent of all lumber produced in New Hampshire. Last year, 1947, the lumber production of pine totaled 297,654,000 board feet, or 77 per cent of all timber species cut. White pine is demonstrating its ability to reestablish itself in spite of this tremendous cutting, for hundreds of thousands of acres of young, thrifty, growing pine have been observed on areas previously logged off. Since these younger stands are quickly killed, when infected by the Rust, it is important that they receive adequate protection from this disease. That the value of white pine is well known and appreciated generally throughout New Hampshire is indicated by the action of 87 towns and cities, which appropriated over \$29,000 for blister rust control in cooperation with the State.

Since this report must naturally be somewhat condensed, if additional information is desired, it will gladly be supplied by the district blister rust control leader, Mr. S. H. Boomer, Box 436, No. Conway, N. H.

- \$ 21. Maintenance of the Christmas Tree at the Tamworth School — fifty new bulbs and installation of an outlet on the School.
- \$104. Eight pairs of skis, poles and bindings for the school children's ski classes, plus lacquer, wax and parts for broken bindings.
- \$100. Appropriated for the New England Sled Dog Club to cover their expenses of running a race in Tamworth on February 22nd. Other expenses of the race such as prizes and programs were paid by the T. O. C.
- \$ 25. Given to the Tamworth Tigers baseball team toward the purchase of uniforms and other expenses.
- \$ 50. Used for mowing brush on the Mt. Whittier Ski Trail, Page Hill Ski Slope and Great Hill Ski Trail. Brush mowing on these slopes cost \$209. this year, putting them in even better condition than previously. The balance was paid by the T. O. C.

Your Outing Club has been busier than ever during the past year. In the spring we sponsored classes in square dancing and sent a team to the exhibitions at the annual New Hampshire Folk Festival at Gilford. Others from the classes went with the Sandwich team.

Through the summer there was a series of tournaments open to all and with awards of fine utility prizes much appreciated by the winners. Among these events were a Ping Pong tournament, Bridge tournament and Badminton tournament, all held at

the Huckins Barn on Great Hill and attended with considerable enthusiasm. Also a Tennis tournament with Junior Singles, Men's Singles and Senior Mixed Doubles; a Water Carnival at White Lake and a Field Day at the Ball Park in conjunction with the Tigers' final game.

The Huckins Barn, scene of three tournaments and square dances every Saturday during the summer, is a State Recreation Area leased to the Tamworth Outing Club for \$50. a year for the purpose of putting on entertainments open to everyone and for the profit and enjoyment of the entire community.

Although the winter has not begun well from a recreational point of view, it is expected that by Town Meeting time the T. O. C. winter sport facilities will have attracted a good number of people to this area and a Town ski team will have represented Tamworth both here and at neighboring towns.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Tamworth in the Town of Tamworth qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 16 day of April, 1949, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

4. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2944.51 to pay the deficit as of June 30, 1948, and to make this sum of money available in the year ending June 30, 1949.

5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to pay for extra transportation, so that the High school pupils may participate in the recreational program of the high school five days a week.

6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to put additional fire insurance on the main school building in Tamworth.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to sell any or all of the outlying school properties — Downes School, Whittier School, and Chocorua School — after advertising for public bids; if they deem it advantageous to the school district.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

9. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

10. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

11. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

12. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

13. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Tamworth:

Your School Board has added a page in the financial report to the town, following the budgetary requirements for the year beginning July 1, 1949, to show the expenditures at the half school year point and the estimated balance required to finish this school year. We feel that these figures are more up to date than the report of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1948, which is the last complete year that can be reported fully.

You will note in the treasurer's report, a statement of a deficit that was incurred in the 1947 and 1948 school years. In justice to your school board, it should be pointed out that extra expense was put on the district after the budgets had been approved at the school meetings: in 1947 extra money was made necessary by the increased cost of transportation when the schools were consolidated; in 1948 the passage of the minimum teacher's salary law required an increase of \$2000.00 more than was budgeted. Therefore, by special article in the warrant we are asking you to raise the money necessary to pay off this deficit.

The cost of transportation of pupils, being the largest item in our present budget, has been broken down into individual routes in our detailed report so as to encourage more bidding on transportation for next year, as all existing contracts expire this June 30.

The town should discuss what action they wish to take in regard to the **Whittier, Downes and Chocorua** school buildings, as they are an expense against the school district. Additional money will have to be raised in the future to keep these buildings painted and repaired. Your School Board has been able to

save about \$180.00 on insurance for the three year period by renting two of these buildings, and by closing up the Whittier School for all public use. The School Board receives offers to purchase these properties from time to time — but can not dispose of them until they are so instructed by vote of the district.

The hiring of an additional teacher for the primary room has, in the opinion of your school board and superintendent, been more than justified in the results already observed, and we hope that in the future it will drastically reduce the number of non-readers in the upper grades.

Your School Board congratulates the Tamworth Parent - Teachers Ass'n for their interest in the school and for their creation of the hot lunch kitchen in the basement of the school.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To The School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

Teachers in the Tamworth School during 1947-1948 were:— Principal Edwin A. Blackey grades 7 & 8; Mrs. Elizabeth Sutherland grades 5 & 6; Miss Margaret King grades 3 & 4; Mrs. Lois Boothby grades 1 & 2. With the prevailing shortage of elementary teachers Tamworth citizens are very fortunate to have such a well qualified, competent staff. These teachers deserve, and will appreciate, the greatest possible cooperation from all concerned. During the current year Mrs. Dexter Remick is assisting Mrs. Boothby with grades 1 & 2. The size of this group made this additional teacher necessary. Mrs. Remick taught these grades during the latter part of 1946-47.

One of the most significant developments in connection with the Tamworth School was the organization of the Parent - Teachers Association. This group is a member of the State and National Organizations and is rendering very valuable service to the school. The operation of a limited hot-lunch program by the P. T. A. last year is developing into a full fledged operation during the current year. The conversion of the board room into a kitchen through the cooperative efforts of members is evidence of a highly commendable attitude of interest and support on the part of many citizens. Some federal aid will be received to help defray the cost of the hot lunch.

Improvement in instructional facilities has been made through the gradual replacement of outworn and outmoded text books, the addition of good science texts and an adequate supply of pupils' dictionaries, art materials, and visual aids.

The program of activities supervised by the

teachers, with the music under the direction of Mrs. Hidden makes a valuable contribution to the pupils' social experience and their enjoyment of school life. It is gratifying that so many Tamworth pupils are prepared to participate in the musical program at Kennett High School.

At Kennett High School 47 Tamworth pupils were registered. Twelve seniors were graduated last June, and of these the following are attending college; Arnold Autio, University of New Hampshire; Hugh McClellan, Keene Teachers' College; Beverly Parker, Plymouth Teachers' College; Elizabeth Spicer, Westbrook Junior College. 45 enrolled at Kennett High School this year, 5 of whom are seniors. Currently there are 12 in the 8th grade at Tamworth which indicates that there will be a considerable increase in the number of high school pupils next year.

During the past few months your school board has been cooperating with the school boards of Madison, Ossipee, Effingham and Freedom in the study of the feasibility of the organization and operation of a Cooperative High School. Such a school as is visualized would approximate 300 pupils and 12 teachers, would be so designed and located as to serve these five towns, and provide a diversified program to include such vocational training as might be needed by pupils of this area in grades seven through twelve. Much is involved in this study and at present no comprehensive report can be made. Progress of the committee's study will be made from time to time in the local papers until a complete report can be made to the voters of the district. Tamworth has an interest in this project since the enrollment in the lower grades indicates that in a few years the number of high school pupils may approximate 80, which will nearly double the present cost of transportation and tuition. As

the study has been made thus far it shows that the school would be located in the vicinity of West Ossipee. Authority for the formation of such a cooperative school district is provided by the Cooperative School District Act of 1947. Cost of construction would be apportioned according to the equalized valuation of the respective districts and cost of operation according to the number of pupils attending from the several districts. There is a prospect of federal aid for building construction.

As he closes his third annual report your superintendent feels that during this period Tamworth has made outstanding progress in education. This has been possible because of the intense interest, devoted industry, and cordial support of many public spirited citizens, members of the School Board, teachers, parents, and pupils.
