STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the tenth of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 4. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as \_\_\_\_\_ and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$302.60.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for a new bridge on Mill street and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of snow removal equipment.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Article 20. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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## REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

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To Mr. F. T. Johnson, Superintendent of Schools:

Our schools are organized on the so-called 6-2-4 basis which makes the elementary, Junior and Senior High schools a complete unit in themselves. In the elementary grades the activities are supervised by the teachers of the several grades and some very fine projects have been completed this year. The Junior High has its own activities period, its own Glee Club and its own Civics Club.

In the Senior High School each class at the beginning of the year chooses one of the faculty as its class advisor and this teacher works with the class throughout the year. Because of the fact that all the teachers had all their periods taken up with teaching this year, at the suggestion of the State Department we inaugurated a system that is known as the "floating period." By using this system it is possible to incorporate an extra period into our schedule and thus create an "activities" period. This period is used for the meetings of the several organizations within the school, for rehearsals and class meetings. The object of having these clubs is two-fold. First, it teaches the individual co-operation, ability to get along with his fellows, and, secondly, subject matter that he would not ordinarily obtain from his courses in school. The clubs consist of such organizations as: the Glee Club, Dramatic

Club, Civics Club, Camera Club, etc. In addition to this each class is organized with the customary officers for the purpose of practice in parliamentary procedure.

Our athletic activities are limited to basketball and baseball. It is not feasible to attempt football in a school of our size because of a number of reasons. One reason is the cost of equipment and another the lack of proper material. However, in basketball we have been more or less successful. Last year for the first time we organized a girls' team and while, through inexperience, they did not have a very successful season yet this year they have won a majority of their games while the boys have broken about even which I consider very good when the fact that we have no gymnasium facilities is taken into consideration. This year a league was organized including the schools in the southwestern part of the state which are of approximately the same size, that is, schools of less than one hundred enrollment.

Our baseball is necessarily limited because of the cost and also because of lack of accessible practice grounds. With a comparatively small outlay of money and labor grounds could be prepared near the school which would permit of intra-mural games such as soccer, soft-ball, volley ball, and outdoor basket-ball which would materially aid us in laying out a more complete athletic program with the addition of mass games. Our athletics have to be self-supporting and all money spent for such activities is raised by the pupils themselves.

Other activities in which we have taken part include the state competition which was held in Keene last year. Troy High School was represented by a spelling team and won fourth place in a field of twenty-seven schools. One-act plays were written by the pupils of the English classes and submitted in competition with other schools of the state. As usual, last spring the school presented a three-act play which was well produced and very successful. The Glee Clubs of Troy, Jaffrey and Fitzwilliam held a concert in which the combined clubs took part. This year we have inaugurated a prize-speaking contest which we hope will

become a yearly feature. Weekly programs have been presented by the various groups during the assembly periods with especial attention being given to such holidays as Armistice Day, Christmas, Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, and the exercises at the Town Hall on Memorial Day.

In closing I wish to thank both parents and students for the splendid spirit of co-operation which has been shown and wish that a greater number of parents and friends would avail themselves of the opportunity of visiting classes in both the High and Elementary schools.
