To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Andover Elementary School gymnasium in said Andover on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at 7:00 of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to require organizations using the Elementary School Gym for fund-raising purposes to reimburse the Town for the janitor-watchman and police services provided by the Town.
3. To see if the Town will ratify the Capital Outlay purchase of a plow wing bought by the Town January 26, 1976 in the amount of \$2,233.00.
4. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town-Sponsored Red Cross Swim Program for Children as part of Recreational Activities at an annual cost not to exceed \$500.00.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to choose and appoint a committee to serve the Town from its appointment through December 31, 1979 (approximately 2½ years) to plan and carry out the 1979 Bicentennial Activities and Celebration of the Town of Andover.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Class V Road the newly-built dead end road in the so-called Jones-Monahan Horseshoe Pond subdivision pending receipt by the Town of legal notification of the change of right-of-way to Dorothy MacCrae and Parker Stone and their heirs from the owners of the subdivision and legal notification from the N. H. Highway Department that an unconditional driveway entrance or road entrance permit allowing the junction of said road with N. H. Rte. 11 is completed.
7. To see if the Town will vote to swap with J. Dale McLeod the Town-owned land which is the site of the current open burning dump for a piece of land of commensurate size or value adjacent to the Stanley Kilburn lot fronting on the N. H. Rte. 11.
8. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town to expend Capital Reserve Funds set aside for Dump in proportional amounts in the years 1977, 1978 and 1979 to defray the costs of trash disposal incurred by the Town during that time.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town to expend up to \$3,800 of the Capital Reserve Fund set aside for Dump to defray the costs of poisoning and covering the present Dump upon its closing on July 1, 1977.

10. To see if the Town will vote to enter into an Animal Control Agreement with the New Hampshire Humane Society at the annual cost of \$200.00.

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the People's National Bank of Laconia to redeem their property, formerly the Doreen Roberts property, after payment of all delinquent taxes, fees, interest, costs incurred by Town for repairs, replacement, insurance and other expenses during the period the property has been held by the Town with said redemption to take place within 30 days of this vote.

12. To see if the voters will designate Taunton Hill Road (also known as Old College Road) from the entrance of said road at N. H. Rte. 11 up to the residence of Norman J. Alstead at the top of Old College Road; and the road perpendicular to said road also known as Taunton Hill Road, from the corner at the residence of Richard Clarenbach down to Tilton Brook, as a scenic road as provided by law under RSA 253:17. (by petition)

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to implement a voucher system requiring all Town departments to receive authorization from the Selectmen to make any purchase of equipment or material in excess of \$100. (requested by Budget Committee and Selectmen)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1977 appropriation said funds to be placed in a special conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

15. To see if the Town will vote to allow any surplus funds remaining in the Tax Map Capital Reserve Fund after completion of contractual payments to Robert Bristol & Associates for the mapping to be spent toward the purchase of a microfilm reader to be used in conjunction with the new Tax Map System.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow any Anti Recession Title II funds received for the last quarter of 1977 to be spent for public safety services.

17. To see if the Town will vote to continue the operations of the already-existing Town Bicentennial Committee in order to properly prepare for the Town of Andover Bicentennial in 1979 (by petition).

18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Only one week after Town Meeting, Selectman Alan Doherty resigned and was replaced by Roger Henderson who worked with the Board until the end of June when he resigned and was replaced by Ellis L. Barnes, Jr.

In August our Road Agent, J. Dale McLeod, resigned. He was replaced by former Road Agent, John Jurta, Jr. At this time the T.R.A. work had not been started, nor had the project using the Duncan Funds. The latter funds had been allotted to the Chase Hill Road job and the T.R.A. money had been signed up in the early spring for the upper end of this same area.

Underground drains and new culverts together with a new asphalt surface makes for a great improvement.

The T.R.A. funds were used to widen, ditch and install new culverts on the seven-tenths of a mile from Newton's corner to the top of the hill at Ralph Chafee's.

In early summer some eleven thousand dollars was used to put on a hot top asphalt surface on Maple Street as far as the bridge at the foot of Grave's hill.

It was voted at the last Town Meeting that a report on the Keniston Bridge be brought in at the next meeting. In May the Selectmen met with Mr. Avery and went over the situation requesting prices. The State has furnished us with two sets. One, for a Six Ton Loan Limit; the Town's share would be \$30,000. The second, a Ten Ton Load Limit; the Town's share \$60,000. In either case, the work could not start until a year from next July. We recommend that a new Capitol Reserve Fund for this project be set up and that we put in \$5,000 this year.

It was voted to accept the No. 9 Shed, so-called, together with a small parcel of land. The Town now has a deed to this property as of December 6. The building should be reroofed and it is recommended that \$7,500 be made available for roofing and other repairs needed to make this into a Highway Shed.

The work at Town Hall was not completed this year, after we found that the money must be conserved as we were having an overrun in several other departments. We are recommending that the ceiling in the three offices be lowered and a good insulating job be done, so as to conserve heat. Also, a new set of stairs to the cellar is a must.

We hope to have the grounds fixed up early in the Spring.

On the first of November the Town received a Tax Collector's Deed to the Roberts property. An article will be in the warrant to get permission to sell the property. We recommend that it be sold at not less than the assessed value which is \$12,000. The Roberts lawyer has asked if the

Town will release it if the Roberts family pay the back taxes and costs. A second article will be in the warrant to this effect.

The Town Dump must be closed July 1, 1977. It was learned early in December that J. Dale McLeod has purchased the Bennett property, after conversing with Mr. McLeod about his operating a landfill for the Town. Mr. McLeod and two of the Selectmen went to Concord and saw the Air Pollution Commission. They agreed to come to Town the following Friday to make the deep borings test. We have not heard from them yet.

Highland Lake Dam

Late in the summer it was discovered that we were in trouble at the Dam. The Water Resources Board was contacted. They made an inspection and notified us to lower the water level as the dam was in a dangerous condition and might collapse any time. We then set out to find funds to make the repairs. Everywhere we went it was the same answer—no funds for that project. We got plans from the Water Resources Board. Also, we have the necessary permits to do the work.

While our Representative has a bill before the Legislature, we feel that it is important enough to bring it to a vote at Town Meeting and raise funds. If they are not needed, so much the better.

If the Town finances the project, we could borrow on five year notes and it would be about one dollar per thousand on the tax rate.

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 1:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Andover Elementary School in said Andover on Tuesday, the 2nd day of March, next at 1:00 of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will accept responsibility for the maintenance, safety and repair of the bridge across Hame Shop Brook at Bradley Lake which serves to join the Town road at that point.
3. To see if the Town will accept without cost the building known as No. 9 Shed together with the triangular lot of land of which it is a part.
4. To see if the Town will vote to join the Lakes Region Planning Commission as provided by RSA Chapter 36. (By petition)
5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$836.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Lakes Region Planning Commission. (Requested)
6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$195.00 as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. (Requested)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,776 for Patriotic Purposes in order to fund various Town activities and programs for celebration of the American Revolution Bicentennial and further to qualify for a Federal matching grant of \$1,000 from the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration.
8. To see if the Town will vote to become a Bicentennial Community as provided by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and further to require that the Selectmen appoint a chairperson and members of a Town Bicentennial Committee.
9. To see if the Town will vote to establish the position of Tree Warden with duties as prescribed by RSA Chapter 253 and further to require the Selectmen to nominate a person for appointment to said position and further to require that said Tree Warden report back to the 1977 Town Meeting with any appropriate findings and recommendations regarding shade trees along public highways and streets within the Town.

10. To see if the Town will vote to require the Town Clerk and the Selectmen to include in each year's Annual Report a copy of the preceding year's Warrant and an accurate record of all actions and votes taken at the preceding Town Meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to reinstate its membership in the New Hampshire Municipal Association and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, the minimum annual dues, for full membership in the Association. (Requested by Budget Committee)

12. To see if the Town will vote to enter into an animal control agreement with the New Hampshire Humane Society at an annual cost of \$150.00.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$361.00 for the continuation of services to the low income people of Andover through the Franklin Areat Center of the Community Action Program Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

14. Are you in favor of the adoption of the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, certain areas of the Town of Andover are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers and lakes, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized Flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests the Board of Selectmen with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

a. Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in de-

lineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

b. Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

c. Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify flood plain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

d. Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

15. Are you in favor of the adoption of the Floodplain Management Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen?

16. To see if the Town will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a. The adoption of this Article permits the Planning Board to review plans for non-residential development.

17. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

18. To see if the Town will vote to give the Old Railroad lot in East Andover at Highland Lake to the East Andover Fire Precinct, provided that the Precinct will maintain the lot.

19. To see if the Town will require that all appointments, except those otherwise specified by law, shall be for a term of one year.

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for replacement of road signs.
21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to see the S. Kilburn lot on Route 11 opposite the State Highway Shed.
22. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the section of road beginning opposite Currier Road and running easterly onto Boston Hill to the land owned by Moore, from Class IV, Gates and Bars, to Class V.
23. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the following roads to Class IV, closed subject to gates and bars:
 - a. The so-called "Lane" from the Girney Putney buildings over the top of Boston Hill to the Boston Hill Road opposite the dwelling of Everett Pineo.
 - b. The so-called Hall Road from the Stetson residences easterly to the East Beech Hill Road at the schoolhouse corner.
 - c. The Tucker Mountain Road from a point 430 beyond the side road to the Richard Pieters summer home north westerly to the Hill Town Line.
 - d. The so-called Sucker Brook Road from the summer residence of Richard Battles to the junction with the Tucker Mountain Road near the Weir Bridge, so called.
 - e. That portion of the original Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike (long since abandoned) from the residence of Harold Keyser to the Salisbury Town Line.
 - f. The steep section of the Hoyt Road from the residence of Jeanne Talley at the top of Great Hill, so-called, easterly to the Franklin City Line.
 - g. The section of the old Route 11 Highway leading from the Hoyt Road along the Sucker Brook to the new Route 11 just east of the railroad overpass.
 - h. From the steel bridge at the junction of Morey Hill Road and Kearsarge Mountain Road south along Kearsarge Mountain Road to the Wilmot Town Line.
24. To see if the Town will establish a Recreation Commission to be elected from the floor.
25. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$500.00 for use in Town recreation.
26. To see if the Town will vote to change the method of selecting auditors.

27. To see what action the Town will take concerning repair or replacement of the Keniston Bridge.

28. To see if the Town will vote to spend the Revenue Sharing Funds available to the Town during 1976, estimate \$15,000 in the following manner:

Library	\$4,000
Police	5,000
Town Poor	2,000
Visiting Nurse	1,000
Old Age Assistance	3,000

29. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a 4-wheel drive pickup truck with plow (estimated cost—\$6,100).

30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as presented by the Budget Committee.

31. To see if the Town will vote to remove the dead elm tree on Beech Hill Road by the property of John Rivers Estate (estimated cost \$400). (By request)

32. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the budget.

33. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE

ARTICLE I

This ordinance is established pursuant to the Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 156, as amended.

ARTICLE II

No new structure nor substantial improvement to any existing structure shall be constructed in a location which has a flood hazard according to the Flood Hazard Boundary Map for the Town of Andover prepared by the Federal Insurance Administration without first obtaining a permit therefore from the Board of Selectmen or its designee.

ARTICLE III

The Board of Selectmen, or its designee, shall review all applications for a permit for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether the proposed building site will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement, including prefabricated and mobile homes, must:

1. Meet the requirements and specifications as promulgated from time to time by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development;
2. Be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure;
3. Use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and
4. Use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

ARTICLE IV

The Board of Selectmen or its designee shall review subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments within the flood hazard area to assure that:

1. All such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage;
2. All utilities and facilities such as sewer, water supply, gas and electrical systems are located and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage; and
3. Adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards.

ARTICLE V

The Board of Selectmen or its designee shall require new or replacement water supply systems and sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Report of District Fire Chief and Town Forest Fire Warden

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

ANDOVER RESCUE SQUAD

Andover Rescue suffered a great loss on August 18th, when Virginia Knowlton Hutchinson died suddenly at her Andover home. "Ginny" was one of the squad's most dedicated members, ready to help anyone in trouble at any time day or night. Many times calls for help in her section of town found "Ginny" already at the home with her emergency kit before the ambulance arrived.

When unable to realize her ambition to become a registered nurse, Virginia chose occupational therapy as a substitute and had been employed as a therapist at the Merrimack County Home for several years. She was only 39 at the time of her death, and is greatly missed by her husband, her family and the whole community.

ANDOVER RESCUE SQUAD

Your rescue squad had its busiest season ever in 1976. Ten trips were made to Franklin Regional Hospital, carrying 11 patients; 49 trips to New London Hospital, carrying 50 patients; and five trips to Mary Hitchcock Hospital at Hanover with five patients.

The squad handled ten highway related accidents with 11 victims, answered 51 calls for home accidents or illness with 52 patients; and moved three patients from one location to another. In addition it answered six fire alarms, took part in an area drill at Wilmot, stood by at Andover Horse Center's meet in August, and answered five other calls needing no transportation. Six calls originated on the the Proctor Academy athletic field; eight were stand-by runs for the New London Hospital ambulance at New London or Danbury.

The New London ambulance is ready to serve Andover if our own is out of town on service.

Regretably, ambulance insurance appears to be falling into the same category as other forms of medical insurance: coverages which no insurance companies really want. Rate computers are unable to recognize any difference between Andover Rescue's small operation and a busy city ambulance on 24-hour active service. Thanks to our insurer the initial \$980 premium on the ambulance policy was reduced to \$533 without decreasing the protection.

Towns people and summer residents alike have been generous with their financial support throughout the year, and we take this opportunity to express our deep appreciation for their help.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

During 1976, four new trust funds for perpetual care were established on lots at Proctor Cemetery. Proceeds from the sale of these lots was added to the Proctor Cemetery Operating Fund (unrestricted). Whole lots in the Proctor Cemetery are currently priced at \$75 each.

The monies in the Lawrence Street Bridge Capital Reserve Fund were all expended in 1975.

Only a small balance of \$5072.18 remains in the Tax Map Capital Reserve Fund. A large sum was expended in 1976 to meet contractual agreements with Robert S. Bristol Associates who are preparing the map system. It is expected that the map will be completed in the late spring of 1977.

Capital of \$2000 was added to the Dump Capital Reserve Fund in 1976. Total balance of principal and interest as of December 31, 1976 is \$11,757.43.

Capital of \$1000 was added to the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund in 1976. Total balance of principal and interest as of December 31, 1976 is \$11,063.77.

Because no candidates chose to run for election in March of 1976, Sands Robart was appointed to a three year term as Trustee of Trust Funds. Kimball Elkins was appointed to replace resigned trustee Gracia Harris Snyder whose term would have expired March 1977.

Not included in the following detailed report are two shares of Boston and Maine Railroad common stock, of doubtful value, from which no income has been received or is anticipated.

ANDOVER FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE

REPORT OF THE ANDOVER BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

At the 1976 Annual Town Meeting the voters of our town approved two Warrant Articles concerning celebration of our Nation's Bicentennial. They voted to have our town become a Bicentennial Community as provided by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and further to require that the Selectmen appoint a Town Bicentennial Committee. This vote authorized the Town Bicentennial Committee to prepare an application to the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration for Federal designation of Andover as a National Bicentennial Community participating with communities throughout the country in the observance and celebration of the American Revolution Bicentennial.

The Town Meeting also voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 for Patriotic Purposes in order to fund two town projects for observance of the Bicentennial and also to qualify for a Federal matching grant of \$1000 from the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. The two town projects proposed by the Bicentennial Committee were the publication of a reprint of Andover's first Town History, published by Jacob B. Moore in 1822, and secondly a beautification project for the grounds around the Town Office and Library. This vote of approval authorized the Bicentennial Committee to prepare the application for Federal matching funds and to carry out the two Bicentennial projects. On the day after Town Meeting this application for a Federal matching grant was delivered to the New Hampshire American Bicentennial Commission in Concord.

On March 18, 1976, Andover was officially notified that it had been designated as a National Bicentennial Community. Then on May 11 our Bicentennial Committee received notice that Andover's application for the \$1000 Federal matching grant had also been approved.

As a result of the efforts of the Bicentennial Committee the Town of Andover officially became a Bicentennial Community at a formal dedication ceremony on Flag Day, Saturday, June 12. Various Federal, State and local officials as well as over 100 citizens of our town attended the presentation ceremony which was held in the school yard at the Andover School. Selectman Samuel Currier, on behalf of the our town, received the official Bicentennial Community Certificate, the Bicentennial flag and an American flag which had been flown over our Nation's Capital.

The reprint of Andover's first published Town History was formally presented to the public at the Bicentennial ceremony. Copies of the history were given to the various Federal and State officials as a token of our Town's gratitude. Immediately after the ceremony, copies of the 1822 Town History were made available and offered for sale to the public. Committee member Ralph Chaffee deserves much credit for completing this Bicentennial project.

Another Bicentennial ceremony was held on July 4th, 1976 at Andover's celebration of Independence Day. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon, precisely 200 years after the signing of our Nation's Declaration of Independence, our Town and its people celebrated this historic event by singing the National Anthem, having a public reading of the Declaration of Independence, and by participating in the national bell ringing ceremony.

Later in the summer the Committee initiated the other town project which was the beautification of the grounds at the Town Office and Library. This project is well on its way to completion, with the plan approved by the Selectmen, all materials purchased and approximately one half of the project completed. However, because of a late start, insufficient volunteer help, and the early coming of cold weather and frost the project was delayed until next Spring when the Committee will undertake this project again and hopefully will have it completed in short order. The end result we hope will be a vast improvement to this important area of our Town.

Looking ahead, we should be thinking about our Town's Bicentennial in 1979. Our Committee generally feels that we should begin now in our efforts to plan and prepare for a celebration of our own Town Bicentennial which will do justice to our community and its proud heritage. This Committee will ask our Town Meeting what action it wishes to take in preparation for Andover's Bicentennial in 1979.

It has been a great pleasure to serve our Town during this Bicentennial Year.

ANDOVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Annual Report — 1976

Throughout the entire year of 1976 the major effort of the Commission has been devoted to the perplexing and distressing problem of solid waste disposal for the town of Andover. It was possible to postpone adopting a solution to this problem because permission to burn rubbish at the town dump was extended until July 1, 1977. Further extensions of this permission are not to be expected, so it is urgent that some new plan be adopted in the near future.

Early in the year it became known that about 50 acres of land near the present dump could be purchased by the town. Preliminary tests indicate that this land would be suitable for a landfill operation. The land would have been desirable town property even if not so used, but the price was high.

The Commission has discussed and examined in detail three plans for the disposal of Andover's solid waste after June 30, 1977:

- 1) Purchase land and operate our own landfill;
- 2) Contract with the city of Franklin to send our rubbish to the Franklin landfill, as recommended by this Commission in 1975.
- 3) Contract with the Lakes Region Disposal Company to send our rubbish to the landfill they operate in the town of Danbury. The Commission presented these plans to the townspeople at a public hearing at the Andover elementary school on June 24, 1976. Fact sheets summarizing the advantages and disadvantages, and the estimated costs of each plan were prepared by this Commission in cooperation with the Selectmen and the town Road Agent, and distributed in advance of the hearing. The people who attended the hearing voted by a large majority in favor of handling Andover's solid waste within the limits of the town, even if this made it necessary for the town to purchase land.

Your Commission regards this vote as an important indication of the desires of the people of Andover, but not as a binding decision. The attendance at the hearing was not large, and the cost figures available at the time were estimates only, and were incomplete. For these reasons it is by no means unthinkable that the coming Town Meeting might overturn the vote at the hearing. Consequently the Commission has deemed it wise to continue to give consideration to all three options, and to present alternative plans to the Town Meeting for decision by the townspeople.

In furtherance of our deliberations on the solid waste problem, Mrs. Cotton and Mrs. Snyder went to Boscawen to inspect the town-operated landfill there, and Mrs. Snyder and Mrs. Graves attended a meeting in

Danbury of representatives of several towns with officials of the Lakes Region Disposal Company to discuss costs of participation in the landfill in Danbury. Officials of the Lakes Region Disposal Company were present at our September meeting to discuss further the terms on which the town of Andover could use their landfill.

In June Mr. Robart and Mrs. Snyder made a trip to Massachusetts to talk with the owner of the property near the town dump of which the town is considering the purchase. This property has since been purchased by a resident of Andover but may still be available, under private operation, for disposal of Andover's solid wastes.

The playground ball field use came into its own during the past year. It was used extensively by the school physical education classes for such activities as soccer, football, field hockey and softball; it was used by the Little League for its ball games and by a town softball team.

In the early spring a ball field was constructed including a pitching mound, bases and a pitching rubber were purchased and benches were provided and set up behind protective wire screening for the safety of the children.

A great deal of credit should go to Ellie and Howard George and their helpers, for keeping us solvent through their 4th of July activities.

ANNUAL LIBRARY REPORT

1976

The major concern of the Trustees during the year has been the financial situation of the William Adams Bachelder Library. Prior to 1972 the income from the Bachelder Trust Fund was more than large enough to support the operation of the library, but with inflation the expenses have been increasing rapidly, while the income from the Trust, owing to the falling stock market, has actually declined. The deficit for the years 1972 to 1976 was made up by drawing on interest accumulated during the years of prosperity, but this source will soon be exhausted. The trustees must find means to increase the income of the library, or make a drastic reduction in its expenditures. For the year 1977 we have decided in favor of the latter alternative. With the cooperation of the librarian we have drawn up a budget that provides for expenditures equal only to the expected income. Severe economies will be necessary, especially in the funds available for buying books. At this juncture we urge—indeed we beg—all friends of the Bachelder Library who are able to do so to make contributions of money for the purchase of books, so that the flow of new books into the library will not virtually cease in 1977.

We are not, at this point, looking beyond 1977. The renovations of the past two years have put the Bachelor Library in good condition, so we do not anticipate a need for major repairs in the near future. Even so, if inflation continues at the rate of the past year or two, it may soon become impossible to operate the library without some financial support from the town.

The Mollie Bachelder Room in the Bachelder Library was used seventy times in 1976 for meetings of various local groups. Among the principal users were the Rescue Squad, the Service Club, the Creative Arts Association, the Bicentennial Committee and the Church.

The usual statistics, the financial statement for 1976, and the proposed budget for 1977 of the Andover Public Library, and the budget adopted by the Trustees for the William Bachelder Library are appended.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

1976 saw the Andover School District resolve its most pressing need—that of tuitioning of students in grades 9-12. At the Annual School District Meeting which had been recessed to March 9, 1976, after hearing the report of the AREA Study Committee which had been established at a special district meeting on Oct. 28, 1975, the District voted 141 to 65 to endorse the committee's report and instructed the Andover School Board to enter into a long-term tuition agreement with the Merrimack Valley School District.

The tuition agreement, which has been approved by the Merrimack Valley School District at a special district meeting on October 27, 1976, has been signed by the school boards of Andover and Merrimack Valley. Under the terms of the contract, Andover students will begin attending Merrimack Valley High School in September, 1978, beginning with grade 9. A table of dates for the complete phase in to Merrimack Valley High School, as well as the phase out of students from Franklin High School, is presented below:

- 1977-78 Third year of contract with Franklin.
Grades 9-10-11-12 from Andover to attend Franklin.
Transportation to Franklin from Andover.
- 1978-79 First year of contract with Merrimack Valley.
*Grade 9 to Merrimack Valley.
Grades 10-11-12 to Merrimack Valley or Franklin.
Transportation to both Merrimack Valley and Franklin.
- 1979-80 Second year of contract with Merrimack Valley.
Grades 9 and 10 to Merrimack Valley.
Grades 11 and 12 to Merrimack Valley or Franklin.
Transportation to Merrimack Valley only.
- 1980-81 Third year of contract with Merrimack Valley.
Grades 9-10-11 to Merrimack Valley.
Grade 12 to Merrimack Valley or Franklin.
Transportation to Merrimack Valley only.
- 1981-82 All students to Merrimack Valley.

*This represents the existing 7th grade class. Ninth graders wishing to attend Franklin may request the Andover School Board for con-

sideration. If granted, the district will pay up to the tuition costs at Merrimack Valley and transportation must be provided by the parents.

It is anticipated that this long-term tuition agreement between the Andover School District and the Merrimack Valley School District will be an educationally pleasant and rewarding one for all Andover students in grades 9-12.

An innovative program initiated at the Andover Elementary School this year has been the Artists in Our Schools. This program, which has placed three artists—a potter, a sculptor and a poet—in our school for several days a week has been enthusiastically received by staff and students alike. As a federally funded program, the services of all three artists have cost the district only the money which was budgeted for an art teacher one day a week.

Reading continues to be the School Board's number one priority, with mathematics being added as a second priority goal this year. The school is continuing the Right-to-Read Program this year, with staff members in grades 5-8 attending a day long workshop on "Reading in the Content Areas" at Merrimack Valley High School in October. All teachers are working on the goal of this national program—to have every child learn to read up to his or her level of ability.

The Learning Disability Program with Proctor Academy is continuing this year. A learning disability teacher, with assistance of the Clinic at Proctor Academy, is assisting teachers at our school in setting up programs for about 16 students who were tested last spring and found to need assistance with learning problems. In addition, two children are attending a special education program outside the district and one child is receiving tutoring at home.

The school program is being constantly evaluated to improve the basic curriculum, and to better meet the needs of all children. The staff has set an objective to improve the handwriting of children in all grades. This program involves setting high standards for writing by all children. Through a concentrated effort by all teachers a more legible and pleasing form of handwriting is expected.

The school library has continued to expand its services and materials. During the 1975-76 school year the total circulation was 10,365 and 284 new books were added to the collection. The library program provides the students with an exposure to the various aspects involved in the proper use of books and materials for the expansion of knowledge and imagination and encourages the development of life time reading habits.

Thirty-three pupils are enrolled in the second grade this year. This exceeds the standards of the State of New Hampshire on class size by eight

students. To assist the teacher in meeting the needs of these children a teaching intern has been working with the teacher. The Intern Program is a new program for education majors at the University of New Hampshire. Students majoring in education must attend college for five years, the fifth year consisting of an internship in a school for the entire school year, as well as taking additional course work during the summer. A district involved with this program has a financial commitment of \$3000 per intern. The program has been very successful this year and the Board has budgeted to continue it next year, rather than divide the class and hire an additional teacher.

A substantial amount of painting has been completed this year, which has greatly enhanced the general appearance of the school. This was due to the federally funded program called The Senior Community Service Employment Program. Under this program, persons 55 years of age and older can be placed in part time work in public schools at no cost to the district. As a result, John Seymour was rehired and has been performing tasks that the regular custodian would ordinarily not have time to do. John's experience and familiarity with the facility has been put to good use and the program is working well.

Other projects completed are as follows:

1. Added hot-top area to playground
2. Replaced window shades in one classroom
3. Replaced several cafeteria tables
4. Outdated lighting was replaced with fluorescent fixtures in the social studies and library rooms, giving not only better but more economical lighting.

In summary, we can say that on-going programs of care and maintenance of building and grounds protect the district's investment while at the same time providing a pleasant atmosphere in which the teaching-learning process can take place.

of \$32,944, less a revenue deficit of \$3,473, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$29,471 for fiscal 1975. As disclosed in Exhibit 13, a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$16,541, less a revenue deficit of \$13, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$16,528 for fiscal 1976.
