The Josiah Eastman home located in Glen on Rte. 302 later became Fred Hanscom's store and the property was in the Hanscom family for an estimated 75 years.

In 1945 the property was purchased by Ervin Grant. Shortly after that, Ervin married Margaret and together they operated the landmark store until 1965 when they built the present Grant's Store a bit further up the hill. Conway Supply rented the property from 1967-1969 when they, too, moved up the hill. Later the building was rented to the Rodericks who opened a restaurant called the Red Parka Pub, named after the red jackets that ski patrollers wore in those days. They operated the restaurant until 1972 when it was purchased by Alvar and Lois Nelson and Duane and Jean Mark. The Red Parka Pub is still owned by the Mark family today and flourishes as one of Bartlett's leading businesses.

1992 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the tenth day of March 1992 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1 through 25 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XI Setbacks - Section H to provide for exemption of certain structures such as decks from setback requirements? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XII Non-conforming Uses, Lots and Structures, Section C to clarify procedure and extend the period of discontinuance to 10 years? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XIII Permitted Uses, Section C to allow car dealerships with its accompanying definition added to Article XIX Definitions? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XIII Permitted Uses, Section C to allow private schools? (Planning Board favors).

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XIII Permitted Uses, Section C to allow state regulated day care facilities? (Planning Board favors).

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XV Off-street Loading & Parking - Section G to satisfy parking requirements with on-street parking? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting ARTICLE XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, j and adding to Article XV Off-street Loading & parking - Section G to satisfy parking requirements through the use of public parking lots? (Planning Board favors).

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting all of Article XVI Signs, Section B except for 4 and 10 and replacing them with new Sections 1) to provide for up to 4 signs totalling 60 square feet with no one sign more than 48 square feet; 2) to provide for height limitation on signs; 3) to provide for the use of window advertising; and no replacement for 5? (Planning Boards favors)

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVI Signs, B-10 to clarify the size and number of signs for multiple business enterprises? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 11. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting Article XVI Signs, Section G and changing Article XVI Signs, A-2 to provide for a building and use permit for any sign? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVI Signs, Section A-7 to provide for the flying of up to 3 flags of state or national origin, and/or one (1) open flag? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 13. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 12 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVI Signs, Section A-10 by deleting the last sentence regarding off-premise signs? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 14. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 13 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting Article XVI Signs, Section F and adding to Article XVI Signs - Section 13 to provide for taxing signs where applicable? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 15. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 14 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting Article XVI Signs, Section C-5 and replacing it with a new Section C-5 with new wording to provide for signs for additional businesses on the same lot in the TID? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 16. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 15 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: deleting Article XVI Signs, Section E-3 (relettered Section E- Exemptions to become Section H) and replacing it as Section E Temporary Activity Signs which provides for signs for short duration special events? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 17. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 16 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding new Article XVI Signs - Section F to provide for Grand opening/Promotional Activity signs? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 18. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 17 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding new Article XVI Signs - Section G to provide for off-site open house real estate signs? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 19. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 18 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding new Article XVI Signs-Section H Exemptions (formerly E) to outline exempt signs and to provide for 2 square foot internally lit open/closed, vacancy/no vacancy signs? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 20. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 19 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, b to provide for 20% deviation from setback requirements in ALL districts? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 21. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 20 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D. Special Exceptions 1, e to provide for private schools in the TRDA and TRDB? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 22. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 21 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett

Zoning Ordinance as follows: changing Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, f to provide for state regulated day care facilities in the TRDA and TRDB? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 23. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 22 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, n to allow for guard-houses with its accompanying definition added to Article XIX Definitions? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 24. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 23 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, o to allow for owner-occupied/manager-occupied kennels in all districts with its accompanying definition added to Article XIX Definitions? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 25. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 24 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: adding to Article XVIII Board of Adjustment, Section D Special Exceptions 1, p to allow for firewood processing for sale businesses in all districts with its accompanying definition added to Article XIX Definitions? (Planning Board favors)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000.00 to complete a townwide revaluation of all taxable property as ordered by the State of New Hampshire and authorize the issuance of not more than \$150,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of NHRSA) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen reluctantly favor.

ARTICLE 27. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefore, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Highway Capital Reserve Fund created in 1978. Said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal to be transferred to the town general fund (approx. \$21,000). Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for road improvements and reconstruction and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$60,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of NHRSA) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purchase of a four-wheel drive highway truck with spreader body and plow and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$60,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of NHRSA) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 to pay for the closure of the Garland landfill and to authorize the transfer of \$80,000.00 from the Dump Capital Reserve Fund to offset said expenses. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,900.00 for the purchase of a Ford police cruiser. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to construct a handicapped access and make other repairs to the Town Hall. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. This article was inserted at the request of the MWV Economic Council. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to fund a feasibility study undertaken to determine if there is a need for an alternative domestic wastewater treatment process and to evaluate the follow-

ing septic alternatives available for the area of town known as Bartlett Village:

- a. Continued use of on-site subsurface disposal systems
- b. Group subsurface disposal systems
- c. Collection and pumping to the domestic wastewater treatment facility proposed at Attitash

The study would also evaluate town-wide the needs for septage disposal, specifically the following alternatives:

- a. Continue the existing method
- b. Disposal to a facility specifically designed for septage treatment (town-owned)
- c. Discharge to a local domestic wastewater treatment facility proposed at Attitash

Preliminary layout designs, costs, and environmental impacts for each of the alternatives will be developed.

The scope of the proposed study is to be pre-approved by Farmers' Home Administration and other funding agencies to avoid questions of project eligibility in the future.

To authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend any grants, gifts, or other sources of money available for this study as well as to borrow for up to five years any money required to undertake this study.

The firm of Dufresne-Henry Inc., So. Portland, ME is to be retained to undertake the study at a cost not to exceed \$41,200.00. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas Caughey and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as its share to participate in the Hazardous Waste Collection Day along with the Town of Conway. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint an ad-hoc committee comprised of not less than three (3) nor more than five (5) registered voters from the Town of Bartlett, preferably with recognized experience in fire fighting, building codes, and personnel training concepts, to review and report on the requirement for a full time fire chief for the Town of Bartlett. The committee will be appointed within seven days of passage of this article. The committee will present a report with finding(s) and recommendation(s) as to the requirement for a full time fire chief position for the Town of Bartlett to the Board of Selectmen at a public hearing no later than sixty (60) days after being appointed. An extension of thirty (30) days may be granted by the moderator should conditions require. Notice of the public hearing will be in accordance with the notification requirements contained in the existing RSAs. The Board of Selectmen must

provide a written response to the recommendation(s) within sixty (60) days from receipt of the report. The town office will provide administrative support as required from in-house resources. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gregory Bartlett, David Phaneuf and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135,000.00 for payment of the design, engineering, and construction of the Razor Brook Bridge on Stanton Farm Rd. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,499.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Eldridge and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.05 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie T. Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,350.00 for the Children and Youth Project of the Mt. Washington Valley. Agreeable to a petition signed by Andrea Mains and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Big Brother Big Sister Organization administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others. Selectmen favor \$800 for CAOP/oppose \$200 for BBBSO.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Eliason and others. Selectmen oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$406.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Forrest L. Simmons and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$994.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Nealley favors/Chandler and Patch oppose.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,145.00 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 years) said sum being equal to \$0.50 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie T. Kroger and others. Nealley favors/Chandler and Patch oppose.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,268.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose - use of public funds should require salary disclosure.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to abandon a portion of the road as deeded by Bartlett Recreational Development Corporation to the Town of Bartlett as recorded in Book 367 Page 336 and dated March 18, 1963; beginning on the west line of Alpine Village, Section A, Attitash Investment Trust and running westerly and northerly terminating at the south side of Route 302 at the northwesterly corner of the cemetery of the Roman Catholic Church and authorize the Selectmen to deed said road to Attitash Lift Corporation, the title holder of the source of this road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas Caughey and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the town road known as the development road of Attitash Investment Trust, Section B, as deeded by Robert E. Bowers, Trustee of Attitash Investment Trust, to the Town of Bartlett recorded in Book 411 Page 518 dated February 27, 1967 and authorize the Selectmen to deed said road to Attitash Lift Corporation, the title holders of the source of this road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas Caughey and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to revoke the Planning Board's power to adopt site plan review regulations under NH RSA 674:43. Said power was granted to the Planning Board on November 4, 1986 in Article IV Section P of the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert L. Jones and others. Chandler and Patch favor/Nealley opposes.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the Bartlett Honor Roll. Agreeable to a petition signed by Clarence H. George and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed to North Ledge Road. This roadway is 66 feet in width and 1500 feet in length. All construction and surfacing shall be completed to current Town of Bartlett standards prior to final acceptance by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed to Ellis Wood Drive and an extension of Ellis Ridge Road. These roadways are 66 feet in width and total 1800 feet in length. All construction and surfacing shall be completed to current Town of Bartlett standards prior to final acceptance by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 56. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1991 saw many positive events in Bartlett and while the phrase "Greatest Little Town on Earth" was used during the Bicentennial year, the Selectmen feel its application still holds true.

The Transfer Station and recycling effort have worked very well and despite not having any figures or track record to go on, the solid waste budget came in under what Selectmen felt was a tight budget figure. Recycling has helped tremendously and while compliance is improving we urge everyone to help out - it saves you tax dollars! Hazardous waste disposal is always a problem and the Selectmen have placed an article on the warrant to see if the Town wishes to once again hold a hazardous waste day in conjunction with the Town of Conway. Previous attempts have resulted in a miniscule number of participants, so if the article is passed we hope many more citizens take advantage of the program which would take place in the Fall.

The Town-owned Glen Cemetery has taken on a new look with many improvements and the program is scheduled to continue. The volunteers have done an excellent job with fundraising, thereby keeping the budget and tax impact to the town at a reasonable level. The Selectmen would like to thank Lynn Roberts and his committee for their dedication to the Glen Cemetery and to the other cemetery associations for their continued efforts in keeping up the cemetery properties.

Pat Roberts has taken the job of Road Agent and he and his crew have done a commendable job of maintaining the town roads for safe travel despite a couple of floods and stretches of nasty winter weather. We have started a program of re-building our worst sections of road and within certain budget constraints will continue this program for the next several years.

Along with the slowdown in the economy comes a trend of higher criminal activity but the diligence of Chief Snow and his officers has not only kept the crime rate at a minimum but resulted in a high arrest and conviction rate of those responsible for crime in Bartlett.

Fortunately, the Fire Department has had a reasonably quiet year and Chief Labbe has spent considerable time training the volunteer firemen at regularly scheduled and well attended training sessions. We pray the firemen won't need to use their skills but if they are needed, Bartlett is fortunate to have so many well trained and dedicated volunteers.

The Ambulance Service has once again provided a first rate service to the Town and their volunteers under the leadership of Sue Gaudette and James Clemons, Jr. are constantly training and keeping up to date on all the latest in emergency medicine. With a careful eye to the budget and increased fee collections, the Ambulance Service this year will only cost the taxpayers of Bartlett \$800.00!

This year the Town will make the last payment on the fire truck bond, reducing our long term debt to zero. This is an enviable position and very few towns in the state are able to be in this position. During these years of no increased property valuation in town, certain capital expenses may need to be done utilizing long-term borrowing in order to keep the tax rate stable. Also, we will be making the last payment on the first school building bond so there will be an approximate reduction of \$175,000. Hopefully these two reductions will help keep the tax rate stable during these tough economic times.

Since the town assesses property as of April 1st of each year but cannot send out tax bills until late fall after the State sets the tax rate, we always need to borrow money to carry us through the year. The notes are called Tax Anticipation Notes (TAN.s) and are usually paid off throughout November and December as the tax money comes in. Unfortunately, due to the economy, tax collection has been slower than ever not only here in Bartlett but other towns as well. For the first time in history, or at least recent memory, the Town did not pay off our last TAN of 1991 and we were forced to rewrite the note. In addition, we have had to borrow against the present year earlier than ever. The only bright spot is that the interest rates on these notes is lower now than it has been in recent years. As of the January writing of this report, the Town has owed \$217,621.70 in property taxes from years prior to 1991 and \$804,300.03 for the past year (1991). The economy is being very hard on a number of people but unfortunately the Town has no place to turn for the majority of its revenue other than the property taxpayer. The Tax Collector can and will accept partial payments on tax bills at any time throughout the year, even before they are sent out, and this type of budgeting may be easier on people to pay a little at a time throughout the year. Auto registrations, another chief revenue source, is also off as a direct result of the economy.

Realizing that the 1991 interest charges for our TAN's would be higher than budgeted, the Selectmen invoked a spending freeze on all departments in November in hopes to bring the total budget in close to projections. Through the cooperation of the departments, the budget survived with an overage of approximately \$19,000,

which is the figure by which the interest on TAN's exceeded our estimate. Since the Selectmen must prepare a budget in January for the next 11 months we were pleased to come as close as \$19,000 out of a \$953,000 total budget. So many things that can affect the budget may happen during the year; heavy snow or ice storms, overtime, breakdowns, fires, welfare, etc. We always can use a little luck to help get us through.

Responding to some comments at last year's Town Meeting, the Selectmen have included a new addition to this year's Town Report. Immediately following the budget that we vote on at Town Meeting is a breakdown of the larger town departments outlining in detail the various components that make up the total budget of each department. We hope this information is useful and gives people a clearer understanding of the Town Budget.

The Selectmen meet on Friday mornings from 9AM - 11AM and while it is helpful to call (356-2950) ahead for an appointment to allow adequate time to attend to your concerns, walk-ins are always welcome. If anyone has difficulty making a regular Selectmen's meeting, please call Town Hall or any of the Selectmen and arrangements can be made to meet at another time.

The Selectmen would like to thank all town employees, volunteer boards, and the citizens of Bartlett for their help and cooperation during 1991. With everyone's dedication and assistance, Bartlett's next two hundred years will be as great as its first two hundred!

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY 1991 ANNUAL REPORT

1991 was a busy year in the Bartlett Public Library. Circulation increased by 57% to an all time high of 11,440. Both adult and juvenile usage increased, with the largest increase in the area of children's books. More and more parents are borrowing books to read to their children. The excellent reading programs on television have helped to increase awareness of the importance of sharing good books with children and the literature-based reading programs in our school have fostered an increased appreciation for reading. More than fifty children participated in the statewide summer reading program, "Some Enchanted Reading." The children read more than 500 books. Summer school students participated in this program. An end-of-the-summer ice cream party sponsored by Friendly's Restaurant was held at the conclusion of the program.

Seven hundred, thirty-six books were added to the book collection this year. One hundred, seventy-three of these books were gift books. Many more gift books will be cataloged shortly. The library appreciates receiving used books. Books that are not put into circulation will be sold at a summer book sale. (Please, for the protection of our collection, do not bring in any books that have a musty odor.)

An unexpected gift of \$500 was received recently by the library from a part-time resident to acknowledge the gift of joy the mountains have given her. She indicated she would like the fund to be used to help in the services of children. Special series children's books will be purchased with this kind gift.

The library participates in a video cooperative with several other Carroll County libraries, circulating collections of videos between the libraries every two months. The library also has a small collection of videos it owns outright. We received a gift of the complete series of the Civil War videos by Ken Burns from Margaret Grant, in memory of Ervin Grant - a most welcome addition to our collection! Videos may be borrowed for up to three days.

The library is a member of NHAIS, the statewide automated information system. This system provides access to a book collection of more than a million books by including the libraries' book collections on regional data bases. At the present time, this system has four regional data bases accessible through an 800 telephone number and modem. The library locates and receives books quickly approximately 80% of the time. The State Library also has a

reference answering service available by an 800 telephone number. This service is a great help answering reference questions that cannot be answered with our collection.

Mrs. Garland attended the monthly meetings of the New Hampshire Advisory Council as a delegate representing rural and school libraries, three Area Forum I meetings, the annual New Hampshire Library Conference, and workshops on the usage of electronic mail for book searches.

Many residents have inquired about Saturday library hours. Surveying 30 New Hampshire libraries serving towns with populations ranging from 1900 to 3000, we found that only five were not open on Saturdays. Historically in a poor economy patrons' needs and library usage increases. The Trustees hope to meet the needs of the patrons by expanding the hours of the library. We will be adding four hours on Saturday to the library's present schedule. When this is instituted, a notice will be posted and placed in the local papers.

Looking forward to 1992, the Bartlett Public Library stands ready to serve its public through its book and audio-visual collections, reference services, library programming and its participation in the New Hampshire Automated Information System. This past year, we have been working on the purchase of a computer system for the library. Mrs. Garland has had assistance in this search from the State Library at Twin Mountain and will be attending another workshop. This purchase is to be made in stages. It helps us to access and manage our own collection and to access more resources throughout the state.

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POLICE REPORT 1991

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many businesses and people of Bartlett that have contributed to the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program. Without their support the children of the Bartlett School would not be able to reap the many benefits of this very worthwhile program. Officer David Roode has given many hours of his own time and a great deal of effort to make this a viable program. This year the Department applied for and received grant monies from the Attorney General's Office to help offset the wages of police personnel involved in D.A.R.E. It is the Department's hope that this program will continue to be of benefit to a very valuable resource, our children.

The 1991 activity of the Department reflects a reduction in the total case load. This reduction, in part, is a reflection of the economic times that we are going through. The Department is spending more time handling domestic violence, juvenile cases and crimes that require more investigative time than ever before. Because of this you will note that the motor vehicle activity has decreased, even though the traffic count has increased during the past year.

In March of 1991 the Department received a matching federal grant to purchase a cruiser mounted video camera. This camera provides a record of not only the violator but the officer as well. It has proved itself a very valuable tool in the prosecution of traffic offenses by reducing the time spent in court and establishing the grounds for probable cause. Additionally it provides a way for the officer to see how he interacted with the violator.

I wish to thank the elected officials, department heads and townspeople for their support and input.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

This year the department responded to 95 calls, an increase of 5 calls over last year.

The fire prevention programs are moving along quite well, with several programs taking place each year and more are already scheduled for 1992.

My inspections of public buildings is an ongoing process with many code violations still being found. Most owners/tenants make great efforts in correcting these violations, as time and finances allow. Inspection of wood stoves, chimneys, and fireplaces are on an increase also. Home safety inspections are available to all of you. This inspection would not be to find violations within your homes, but only to make suggestions to make for a fire safe home.

Manpower is a continuous problem within the department, especially in the village during the day. We need more volunteers, no experience is required and we would train you. Please consider this.

Our thanks to the residents and town officials for their continued support. A special thank you to the Police Department and the Ambulance Service for their assistance, they help make our job easier.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

1991 was a very dry and busy year for the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service as well as local fire departments due to our increase in the number of fires. Our three major causes of fires in 1991 were non-permit, children and smoking materials. 450 wildland fires in New Hampshire burned approximately 150 acres for an average fire size of one-third acre.

Primarily, the local fire department is responsible for extinguishing these fires. Keeping the average fire size this small is a tribute to early detection by citizens, our fire tower lookout system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments.

In every municipality, there is a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens that are responsible for directing suppression action on wildland fires, working with other fire department members under the direction of the N.H. Forest Fire Service to make sure that all fire department members are properly trained and equipped for suppressing wildland fires. Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Wardens receive specialized training each year, presented by the N.H. Forest Fire Service, to keep their skill level and knowledge of forest fire laws up to date.

The local Warden and selected Deputy Wardens are also responsible for issuing burning permits for any open burning that is to be done in their community. In New Hampshire, any open burning, except when the ground is completely covered with snow, requires a written fire permit prior to lighting the fire. Before doing any open burning, it is recommended that you contact your local fire department to see if a permit is required and to save your community the cost of sending fire equipment on a false alarm. Any person violating the permit law (RSA 224:27) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Please help your local Warden and fire department by requesting a fire permit before kindling a fire, be understanding if they tell you it is not a safe day to burn and help keep New Hampshire green! Thank you for being fire safe.

REPORT OF THE BARTLETT ATHLETIC RECREATION ASSOCIATION

This has been a year of change within the Association. We wish to thank Peter Fresco our former President for his efforts on behalf of recreation for the children in Bartlett. Also we wish to thank former officers of the Association, Gene Chandler, Joe Rivers, and Mikell Perry. Our present officers are Leslie Mallett, President, Bill Fabrizio, Vice President, Chuck Hamlin, Secretary/Treasurer, and Jim Langdon, Member at Large. Our mission is to sponsor athletic and recreational activities in the Town of Bartlett. We also manage the financial activities necessary to maintain the Ballpark up in the village and this year added to our maintenance, the town swimming hole at big rock on River Street. Primarily this consists of mowing and trash removal.

This year, as in the past, we sponsored league fees and umpires for junior baseball programs as well as supplies necessary to maintain the ballfield. A change in our philosophy was to ask parents to participate in the support of our summer recreation program. We received a tuition for the six week program that included our Red Cross swimming program. This enabled that program to stay intact without asking for the extra \$2,000.00 appropriation that you have seen in past warrant articles. The parents felt that the program is invaluable to their needs and happily supported this program well. We also strove to ask for community donations for supplying the staples for our July 4 barbeque. I am pleased and wish to thank the businesses that donated everything from napkins and cups to cases of soda and enabled us to earn over \$500.00 on that afternoon. We were also fortunate to have Paul Lodi ask us to sell programs at the Equine Festival. This netted us \$1,319.00. This is, I am told, a one time opportunity as it is customary to rotate this function in order to benefit many organizations such as ours. Thank you, Mr. Lodi, for letting us participate.

We started some site improvement in the fall when Allen Eastman did some excavating work at the Ballfield. A culvert was put in, some gravel on the drive, the extra clay removed for better storage, and the drainage ditch resloped and filled in. Hopefully this will allow us to get on the field earlier in the spring to continue our site improvements.

Two new clinics were started this summer with big success. We offered a six week tennis clinic taught by Justin Chandler and Jay Murphy. Approximately a dozen youngsters participated. Also

offered was a one week golf camp followed by a summer of weekly lessons at Wentworth Golf course and taught by Bob McGraw. Between the camp and weekly lessons we had 18 to 24 participants. We ended the season with an evening family golf tournament. Both of these clinics will be offered again next summer.

Many thanks to Richard Nealley, Babe Hayes, Gary Parrott, and Rick Greenwood for their work on the ice skating rink this year. If Mother Nature would cooperate more fully we have worked out a good system of icemaking that will allow us to look toward sponsoring a junior hockey league in the coming year.

Many thanks to the Town of Bartlett for continuing to support recreation for our youth and we welcome any group young or older that wishes to start a specific activity to contact one of us.

1991 MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

Moderator Paine opened the meeting at 7:00 PM. Paine asked Selectman Hodgkins to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Paine recognized Selectmen Chandler and Patch to give a special recognition plaque to Selectman Hodgkins for his 12 years of dedicated service as a Selectman of the Town of Bartlett. A standing ovation was given.

Moderator Paine then read the warrant as follows:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the twelfth day of March 1991 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 25, 1991 at the post offices in Glen and Bartlett, at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School, the places of meeting, all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Signed, Frederick T. Hodgkins, Gene G. Chandler, Richard F. Patch, Sr., Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and vote on any ballot items including Zoning Ordinance amendments. Moderator Paine stated that the ballots had not been counted yet and the results of this Article would be read later in the meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275,000.00 for the purchase of land and the billboards thereon located on Rte. 16/302 owned by Intervale Crossing Associates Inc. and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$275,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of NHRSA) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor - The revenues from the billboard rentals will offset the costs of paying the debt until the note is paid, at which time the billboards will be removed. There should be no net cost to the town for this procedure. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read.

Moderator Paine then explained the procedure that since this is a bond issue over \$100,000 that a secret ballot and 2/3 majority vote would be necessary for this article to pass. Selectman Chandler spoke to the article explaining that the price of the land was now \$260,000, leases on the signs would offset the costs of the bond payments over ten years and that the owner had approached the Selectmen and the Selectmen felt that the town should have a chance to vote on it. Discussion ensued re: what if signs don't rent, should the town be in the sign business, status of State buying up billboards, general questions. Selectman Chandler asked for a voice vote. Moderator Paine asked for a voice vote before considering opening the polls. Vote = Moderator Paine determined that it would fail therefore the polls were not opened and the article was considered defeated.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article with the budget of \$953,615. Selectman Chandler explained the budget. Discussion ensued re: whether police total expenditure included benefits, road repairs scheduled, benefit plans reviewed, no salary increases, and general questions. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED (\$953,615).

ARTICLE 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Selectman Patch spoke to this article with regard to the acceptance of gifts and that a Bartlett Honor Roll Committee was being formed to restore the Honor Roll; the Committee is looking for donations and volunteers. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$123,000.00 for anticipated costs of closing the Garland

Ridge landfill and equipment costs for the new transfer station and to authorize the removal of said sum from the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to add at the end "and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a recycling ordinance pursuant to NH RSA 149-M." Selectman Chandler spoke to the article explaining that the amendment was necessary in order to obtain grant money for the recycling program; that the town was trying to get the old landfill closed under the rules in effect at the time we got the permit rather than the current stricter, more expensive ones. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment. Vote = PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund created in 1978. Said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal to be transferred to the town general fund (approximately \$20,000). Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Selectman Chandler spoke to the article and the following articles 9 and 10 stating that Capital Reserve Funds must be for specific purposes now, not general ones as when these funds were created; that when times were good the taxpayers were asked to support these funds and now that times are not so good it is time to support the taxpayers. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Building Capital Reserve Fund created in 1981. Said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal to be transferred to the town general fund (approximately \$18,000). Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for town road construction projects. Approximately \$38,000 of this will come from the proceeds of the discontinuance of the Bridge and Building Capital Reserve Funds (Art. 8 and 9). Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of \$7,000.00 for a new sweeper broom and \$12,625 for two highway sanders for a total of \$19,625 and to authorize the removal of said sum from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund for said purposes. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to add \$11,000 for a grader. Selectman Chandler spoke to the article explaining that the current broom just needed replacing, that the two sanders were already purchased because they died and were obviously necessary to replace, and that the Forest Service was having an auction of a grader in good condition

which we also need badly. Question was raised as to whether \$11,000 was enough since the last grader which wasn't as good went for \$16,000. The motion and second for \$11,000 was withdrawn. Motion was made and seconded to add \$16,000 for a grader. Vote was taken on the amendment. Vote = PASSED (+\$16,000). Vote was taken on the article as amended. Vote = PASSED (\$35,625 total with \$19,625 removed from Highway Cap. Res.).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to enter into an agreement with Life Line Ambulance Service, Inc. of Glen, New Hampshire for ambulance services within the Town of Bartlett, consolidating the resources of the Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Service of Glen, New Hampshire with those of Life Line Ambulance Service Inc. of Glen, New Hampshire, pursuant with RSA Ch. 53-A. The purpose is to significantly reduce the operational expenses to the Town and increase the available services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Douglas P. Darrah, Jr. and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to pass over the article. Vote = PASSED OVER.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,499.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Eldridge and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. David Eldridge spoke to the article. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.35 per person in the Town of Bartlett. This represents a 25% reduction in last year's per capita request. Based on 1989 figures from the Office of State Planning, the current census in Bartlett is 1,723. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400.00 for the Children and Youth Project of the Mt. Washington Valley. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor \$1,700. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 (eight hundred) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 (two hundred) for the support of the Big Brother Big Sister Organization administered also by the

Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Catherine Hayes and others. Selectmen favor \$800 for CAP, oppose \$200 for Big Brother/Big Sister. Motion was made and seconded to accept the \$800.00 portion of the article only. Gail Paine spoke to the Community Action Outreach Program only. Vote = PASSED \$800.00 only. Motion was made and seconded to defeat the \$200.00 portion of the article. Vote = DEFEATED \$200.00. Motion was made and seconded to reconsider the \$200.00 for the Big Brother/Big Sister program. Judy Gordon spoke to the article. Vote = DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ted Wroblewski and others. Selectmen oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$1,000. David Cruz, a non-voter, was allowed to give information. Much discussion ensued re: appropriateness of article. Vote on amendment (\$1,000) = FAILED. Vote on article = FAILED.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$451.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Donald Sisson and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Moderator allowed Cindy Whitney, a non-voter, to give information. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$955.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Hodgkins favors; Chandler/Patch oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vicki Varrichione spoke to the article. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$861.50 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 years) said sum being equal to \$0.50 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Hodgkins favors; Chandler/Patch oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,180.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health

Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Hodgkins favors; Chandler/Patch oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vicki Varrichione spoke to the article. Discussion re: salaries of employees of this organization not being disclosed to taxpayers. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to add that the article would be approved pending submission of salary figures to the Selectmen. Vote = FAILED. Vote was taken on the article as read. Vote = FAILED.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute a deed to Saco Valley Incorporated transferring a small parcel of land at the Transfer Station site and a right-of-way to same in exchange for establishing an agreed upon boundary line and certain gravel rights to the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Selectman Chandler spoke to the article explaining that it was to clarify some discrepancies found at the transfer station land and that the towns actually benefit from the arrangement. Vote = PASSED.

Moderator Paine recognized ballot counter George Howard to read the results of Article 1 which were as follows:

ARTICLE 23. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Paine pointed out that any business transacted under this article was non-binding and advisory only.

Moderator Paine recognized Lynn Roberts. Mr. Roberts asked how to go about getting a recount. Moderator Paine instructed him in the procedure.

Moderator Paine recognized Lynn Roberts. Mr. Roberts stated that the ballots should be counted in the same location as they are cast and questioned the procedure in getting them from Town Hall (where they are cast) to the School (where they are counted) and that the polling place should be barrier-free. Moderator Paine indicated that he and the ballots were transported via town police cruiser. Mr. Roberts made a motion, which was seconded by Leslie Mallett that the polling place be barrier-free and voting and Town Meeting should take place at the School. Some discussion ensued. Vote = PASSED (however, Moderator Paine once again pointed out that these votes are non-binding).

Bill Duggan pointed out that the front doors to the Town Hall should really be replaced as a lot of heat is escaping through them and thus a waste of tax dollars.

Lynn Roberts made a motion, seconded by John E. "Buster" Parker, Jr., that all jobs for which the Town is hiring be advertised. Some discussion ensued. Vote was taken. Standing vote was necessary - YES = 67 / NO = 69 - FAILED.

Motion was made by Selectman Hodgkins to adjourn, seconded by Selectman Patch. Vote = ADJOURNED AT 9:35 PM.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The changing economy and the increased pressure from the business community have raised a number of planning and zoning issues. In response, the Planning Board has proposed a number of changes to the zoning ordinance which reflect the issues and concerns brought before it by the business community, the village district committee, and its citizens.

The effort on behalf of the community to participate and become a part of the planning process has been critical. The questions raised, the concepts presented and the commitment of those involved demonstrates a breadth of support that is critical to developing a long range solution to the challenges we face in the future.

To better understand and prepare for the challenges ahead, the board must play an active role in identifying and resolving issues of commercial expansion, traffic impact, utilities and infrastructure. It is only with a clear understanding of options and solutions that we can preserve the quality and character of a rural New Hampshire community.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of up to \$100.00+ board reimbursement.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation + fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.

ZONING ORDINANCE: covers setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, signs, etc. Copies available at Town Hall.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs the excavation of gravel pits.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems. \$50 review fee.

Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.

TRANSFER STATION RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Transfer Station is located on Rte. 16 just north of the Bartlett/Jackson town line and 1/4 mile south of the Jackson covered bridge.

Dump stickers are mandatory. They can be obtained at the Selectmen's Office at the Town Hall Mon.-Thurs. between 8 AM - 12 noon and they are free! Stickers are to be displayed on the front windshield, passenger side, upper corner on the inside. Questions regarding the Transfer Station should be directed to the Selectmen's Office at 356-2950.

Hours of operation: Friday thru Tuesday 12 Noon - 6 PM
Closed Wednesday & Thursday
Closed Christmas Day

Articles which are accepted (other than household refuse) and placed in designated areas (not in the compactor):

Brush up to 5" in diameter

Tires (\$2.00 per tire fee)

Mattresses - 2 per household then \$5.00 per mattress

Batteries (all including flashlight)

Furniture

Appliances with condensers/compressors removed

Clean Wood (separated from treated or painted wood)

Christmas Trees

PROHIBITED: No commercial dumping of construction debris
No dumping of hazardous materials/waste, oil-based paint, gas tanks, pesticides, explosives, etc.
No stumps, boulders, dirt
No car bodies or parts thereof

RECYCLING

All items brought for recycling must come clean and ready to put into separate bins. The following items will be recycled on a **MANDATORY BASIS** as of June 1, 1991:

Aluminum Cans - rinsed

Newspapers - bundled or in brown paper shopping bags

Amber Glass - capless & rinsed

Green Glass - capless & rinsed

Clear Glass - capless & rinsed

As of June 1, 1991, the separation of these items has become mandatory. Your cooperation in our recycling efforts is appreciated and will save the town tax dollars.
