TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and for the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10 A. M. and are not to close before 6 P.M. At 8 P.M. action will be taken on the following articles in the warrant:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Collector of Taxes on a percentage basis at the rate of $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1% of the money actually collected.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 to be used to increase the Selectmen's salaries, the Chairman to receive \$350 additional per year, each of the other two Selectmen to receive \$225 additional each year.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for same.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500 for the support of the poor and \$3,000 for assistance to the aged, and \$1,000 for aid to soldiers and their families.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 for maintenance of highways and bridges and for other necessary expenses of the Town.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$15,000 if needed.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the Town Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for care of the clock on the Church.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$937.09 for the construction of Class V highways, the State to contribute \$6,247.24.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the tarring of Class V highways, under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day and patriotic purposes.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$252 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the national advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$100.00 for the care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the maintenance and replacement of power equipment used in the Town Cemeteries.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the care of the Town Dump.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to gravel Class V Roads.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a capital reserve fund of \$1,000 per year for the purpose of purchasing a new grader for the Highway Department in accordance with chapter 160 of the New Hampshire Sessions Laws of 1943, as amended.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$705 to be used to increase the insurance an additional \$25,000 on the Town Hall.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for damages and legal expenses including dog damage.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for civil defense.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for interest on temporary loans.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the Memorial Plot in front of Town Hall.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for recreational equipment for the youth of the Town.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to install an electric light at the corner of Daniel Webster Highway and Hull Road and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.00 to pay for the same.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Hersey Street for a distance of 450 feet from Plummer Road.

Article 26A. To see what action the Town will take regarding the playing of beano under the provisions of Chapter 71-A of the revised Laws as inserted in Chapter 292 of the Laws of 1949.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from the Estate of John C. Schaller, the interest to be expended for the care of the John C. Schaller lot in the Bedford Center Cemetery.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and of other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

1950-1951

Possibly the most significant development this year has been the inauguration of a shuttle system by which pupils are transported from one school to another with the objective of eliminating, so far as practicable, multi-grade class rooms. At the beginning of the school year with the large increase in enrollment it became increasingly apparent that the problem presented by having as many as four grades in one room was acute.

The solution was to charter a Public Service Company bus which has gone from district to district picking up and dropping off pupils at the appropriate school buildings with the result that all of the first and second grade children now attend the Stevens Buswell School in three rooms, all of the second and third grades the Donald Street School in two rooms and the upper four grades the Peter Woodbury School in three rooms. This permitted the elimination of the ninth teacher which had been authorized at the last District Meeting and thus made available funds to defray the additional transportation costs.

This plan has apparently met with almost universal approval by the parents, teachers and pupils. The Board earnestly hopes that the plan can be continued because it is convinced that the result is a higher standard of education and better supervision and discipline. The Board does not believe that the system should be abandoned because increased enrollments next year may call for an additional teacher.

The hot lunch program continues to operate successfully due largely to the skillful management of the ladies who have it in charge. Owing to a decrease in the amount of federal reimbursement it became necessary on January 1st, to increase the daily charge from twenty to twenty-two cents. This was done because the Board decided that the previous standard of the meals should be maintained. From the beginning of the school year until the present time an approximate average of 175 lunches have been served daily. The kitchen equipment although not wholly adequate is about as good as can be secured unless the District is willing to go to the expense of purchasig commercial restaurant equipment.

The Board is appreciative of the wholehearted cooperation it has received from Superintendent Hastings and from each and everyone of the teachers, all of whom we hope will return.

Of immediate concern to parents and prospective parents of children in the Bedford Schools should be the problem of future development. Since 1945 the enrollment has increased from 145 pupils to 216 (excluding a large number of children who attend parochial schools) and a substantial further increase is anticipated next fall. The time will come and in the not far distant future when it will be necessary either to build substantial additions to existing structures or to establish a consolidated central school. Plans should be laid well in advance because in either instance heavy expense will be involved.

Although at the last District Meeting an article in the warrant providing for a modest amount for such a survey was defeated, the School Board without expense to the District has independently undertaken such a survey which it hopes to have in the hands of the voters by the Annual Meeting if possible. This survey will not be as thorough as it would have been had the Board been able to secure outside expert advice but through the efforts of the Superintendent and volunteers the Board believes that this study, elementary though it may be, will point out the serious nature of the problem with which the District is soon to be faced. This is a subject to which the Board urges each member of the District to devote serious thought.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Bedford School Board:

I herewith submit my second annual report on the condition of your schools.

The outstanding development this past year has been the reassignment of pupils to the three schools so that all have the advantage of being in rooms with no more than two grades per teacher and the majority with a single grade per teacher. They also gain in many ways by being with children of approximately the same age.

The transportation schedule seems to have worked out very satisfactorily with no particular hardship added to any bus pupil. Parents, teachers and pupils alike seem very much pleased with the new plan and the result should be graduates from your schools better prepared in all phases of education.

The purchase of the new 16 mm sound projector should prove to be a means of providing educational experiences that could be provided in no other way. This type of educational aid is being used more and more every year in our public schools.

The time seems to be fast approaching when more serious thought should be given to meeting a housing problem that is creeping in upon the district. The district is very fortunate in havng as its residents many people having had wide experience in school construction. Having talked with several of them, I know they are intensely interested in helping in any way they can to solve this problem of ours in the very near future. I should like to recommend that a committee made up of these laymen be appointed to work with the Board on this matter. The effects of the present crisis in world affairs on the schools will be felt in shortages of certain supplies and possibly text books. The costs of these items will undoubtedly increase.

The biggest single effect can be expected in the form of a shortage of elementary teachers more critical than we have yet seen. Every school district should carefully consider the part that salaries play in keeping and obtaining able teachers.

The fine cooperation of the school board, teachers, and parents has made this year an enjoyable one. It is only through such cooperation that our schools can continue to improve.
