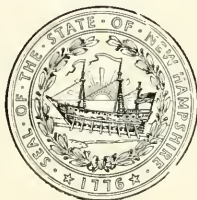

## WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the 12th day of March,\* next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expense of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.

\*Business meeting for Appropriations only will be called for seven-thirty o'clock in the evening.



4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450. for the District Nurse.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Concord Hospital.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Franklin Hospital.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for playground equipment at Rolfe Park.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Penacook Youth Center.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500. for a Sander for the Highway Department.

10. To see if the Town will vote to replace the furnace in the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for same.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to have the State Tax Commission reappraise the land and property in Town and to raise and appropriate money for same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell or convey by deed, property taken by Town in default of redemption from Tax Sales.

13. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another.

14. To authorize the Selectmen to join with the mayor of the City of Concord in applying to the United States of America through the Housing and Home Financing Administrator for an advance of funds under the provisions of Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, in an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), to finance engineering studies, surveys and preliminary designs to determine the needs of Boscawen and Concord for a joint sewage treatment plant located in Ward I of Concord together with the necessary intercepting sewers, such loan to be interest free and be repaid if and when construction of such project is undertaken; and, in the event of favorable action upon such application, to commit the town to make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds, if any, as may be required to fully defray the cost of such engineering studies, surveys and designs; and to authorize the Selectmen to furnish such information and take such other action as may be necessary to qualify the Town for such joint loan, and to enter into a loan agreement with the United State of America in the form required.

15. To see if the Town will vote to participate in the Urban Planning Assistance Program, in order to carry out a comprehensive planning survey with the assistance of professional planning consultants, establishing the basic data necessary to the logical and orderly development and utilization of the land areas of the Town of Boscawen, and, for this purpose, to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3500.00 (Thirty-five hundred dollars) as the town's share of the cost of such Planning Survey.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3900.00 for a fire truck chassis and necessary equipment to replace the 1938 G. M.C.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## BOSCAWEN PUBLIC LIBRARY

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One might ask, "What are the purposes of a library?" One object is to furnish information and instruction. Another is to furnish inspiration and ideals for our boys and girls, our men and women and to furnish entertainment, amusement and companionship.

By an act of the New Hampshire Legislature of 1891, the State Library Commission was authorized to give to each town, one hundred dollars' worth of books as the nucleus of a library, provided they voted to raise a certain amount each year, based on the town's valuation.

At the annual Town Meeting of March 8, 1982, it was voted to adopt the so-called Library Act and twenty-five dollars was raised and appropriated for that purpose.

Immediately following, Doctor Eli E. Graves, George L. Pillsbury and Edgerton Raymond were elected to serve as trustees.

109 books were sent to us by the state and cupboards were made for them in the Town Hall.

In 1893, the library was opened in the Town Hall. Frank Durgin, Lottie Wilson, George L. Pillsbury and Eliza Bent served as librarians.

After many years we reached the limit of capacity for storing books in the Town Hall and a new library building was greatly needed.

When the need of a library with a vault for the town records was mentioned to Benjamin A. Kimball and Frank L. Gerrish, both born in Boscawen, their support was at once given. A committee of five, John

Kimball, Benjamin A. Kimball, Frank L. Gerrish, Augustine R. Ayers and Henry A. Kimball was formed and called the five associates to make plans and secure a plot for the new building.

Frank L. Gerrish generously offered to give to the committee the land upon which our beautiful building now stands.

Guy Lowell, architect of Boston, Mass., was asked to make the drawings, and the construction work was done by the Hutchinson Building Company of Concord, N. H.

On August 20, 1913, the building being completed, fully equipped and ready for use was dedicated.

The dedication exercises were held in the parsonage grove and were simple but impressive.

The building was a gift to the town of Boscawen, New Hampshire for its library and records by John A. Kimball, the heirs of Enoch Gerrish and Benjamin A. Kimball. The Hon. Benjamin A. Kimball in behalf of the donors made the presentation. Dr. Eli E. Graves, chairman of the board of Library Trustees, (who was authorized by a vote of the town August 12, and the trustees of the Library Trustee's Association to accept) in behalf of the town accepted the deed of land upon which the building now stands and extended a most hearty thanks for the generous gift of the beautiful new library building.

The invocation was given by the Rev. Francis H. Rowley, D.D., and speeches were made by Hon. Edward N. Pearson, chairman; Rev. Arthur Little, D.D., Hon. George H. Moses, Rev. Adolf A. Berle, D.D., Hon. Gilman H. Tucker and Mr. Charles I. Webster.

Hon. George H. Moses attended and in the absence of Hon. William E. Chandler, who was ill, paid tribute

to the memory of John A. Kimball who had recently passed away.

The dedication of the Boscawen Public Library was a wonderful occasion and will long be remembered.

Mrs. Eliza Bent continued her good work as librarian at the new building.

She served faithfully as librarian twenty-four years. Many years later as the number of books increased and more active service was needed, Mrs. Marjorie Emery was chosen to carry on the work.

In 1928, an especial honor was conferred on Mrs. Emery from the New Hampshire State Library Association for conducting the most efficient library. It was through her efforts that a branch library was started. The books were placed in a store or dwelling until a permanent place was found for them in the Torrent Hose house. Mrs. Emma Flanders was assistant librarian at that time.

Mrs. Emery gave twenty-four years of service to the welfare of the work of the library.

On August 20, 1963 our Boscawen Public Library will be fifty years old, and through the years has given our community wonderful service. We are planning and looking forward to celebrating the "Golden Anniversary" of our magnificent building this year.

The main library is used for meetings of many groups, interested in town affairs. It is the office of the Selectmen and the Municipal Court sessions are held there. Regular meetings have been held by the Library trustees.

Last April, during National Book Week, some of the trustees, the librarians, and special guests from town attended and enjoyed the James Michener dinner, held at the Highway Hotel, Concord, N. H.



Book Week was observed at the main and branch libraries with displays of new books.

Miss Maria Morrison, Library Trustee, attended the New Hampshire Library Trustees' Association meeting last fall.

Through the kindness of friends, collections of books have been taken to the Merrimack County Home and Norris Nursing Home. During the year we have had Bookmobile service from the State Library every two months with a large collection of outstanding books.

Many new books have been purchased this year.

The annual sum of fifty dollars was received from the Thornton Fund for the purchase of children's books at the branch.

The Boscawen Congregational church enrolled in the Adventures in Reading Contest.

At Christmas both the main and branch libraries were decorated for the holiday season.

The Library Trustees gratefully acknowledge the gifts of books received from the following people: Mrs. Harry Sanderson, Mrs. Rourlse, Mrs. Richard H. Cole, Mrs. J. Ralph Graham, Mrs. Phyllis Randlett and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest O. Cummings.

We also express our sincere thanks to Mrs. Lucy Dadmun for her gift of four historical books to the main library. A bequest of five hundred dollars was given to the town from the late Mary K. Colby, as a trust fund for the benefit of the main library.

The pointing up of the bricks and other necessary repairs have been made and completed at the main library.

A new stove has been purchased and installed at the branch and necessary repairs are being made on the old chairs.

Student research and reading has increased markedly in 1962. The trend shows a steady rise in circulation of both classical works and reference books.

This in-library use of reference material is more than gratifying and as readers find the varieties of material and helps available this is expected to continue.

Because of the increase in dividends of the trust funds, we have been able to cut our budget.

## PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

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Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 5 fires.

We burned 10 acres.

## WATER COMMISSIONERS REPORT

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During the 1962 season, we replaced nearly two thousand feet of water mains as follows: Elm Street, some over 1,000 feet, and if we had not run into a long stretch of ledge, we probably could have finished that street as far as Commissioner Grant's property. High Street, on Route 4, a little over 700 feet. This completes this street to a point nearly 200 feet north of Goodhue Road. An additional hydrant was placed north of Goodhue corner, thus providing added fire protection of that area. We also laid about 200 feet through the property of Clyde G. Fairbanks, which at present gives a much needed increase in the water supply to the N. H. Bituminous Company. This line will be extended, when possible, so that a hydrant can be installed near their plant.

During the present year, it is one plan to replace the main on the D. W. Highway, a distance of over 1500 feet to the corner at Goodhue Road and to install a new main going west on Goodhue Road another 1500 feet or more. This will avoid future freeze ups on this road, which have been quite extensive in the last few years. If possible, we would like to finish Elm Street in 1963 also.

Looking into the future, we can look forward to needed repairs to the dam at Walker Pond outlet and the installation of meters for all water users.

**SCHOOL WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

---

*To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Boscawen, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Main Street School in said district on the 23rd day of March 1963, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with

other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to cooperate with other Boards from surrounding communities in studying possible cooperative school plans and appoint such additional committee members as seem necessary when the need arises.

10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to use any gifts, special State Aid or special Federal Aid received, for the general improvement of the school system.

11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to sell the white wood-frame building located on the school grounds to the rear of the Main Street School and permit the proceeds of such sale to be added to School District funds.

12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to add the Gulf School Fund, \$542.96, the Water Street Fund, \$444.91, the Building Committee Fund, \$1,001.81 to School District funds for the purpose of reducing the school assessment in the amount of \$1,989.68.

13. To see what action the district will take relative to authorizing the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with neighboring communities as provided in RSA 194-21A, for the education of its high school pupils.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

---

*To the Superintendent of Schools:*

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as school nurse of Boscawen School District.

There are fifty-two children in the first grade, divided into two rooms. Many of these children who registered last spring had vision and hearing tests at that time. Those who registered in September or have since transferred have had vision tests, physical exams, and T. B. Patch tests.

Physical examinations have also been completed on pupils in grade 4 and 7. As always, any defects are reported to the parents and any necessary follow-up is done by the nurse.

116 T.B. Patch tests were applied to pupils in grades 4 and 7, as well as first graders. Any positive reactors are reported and parents are urged to see their family doctor or to report to the T.B. clinic for chest X-rays. The testing is made possible to the school children through the sale of Christmas seals.

Vision tests are completed in all eight grades. Failure to pass this screen testing was reported to parents. Whenever parents are unable to bring a child to a doctor for further examination, arrangements can be made through me to provide this service and to buy glasses when necessary.

Hearing tests are done in grades 1, 4 and 7, all new pupils, and all children with known or suspected hearing defects. Last spring 122 hearing tests were done. Here again, defects are reported and children are referred to the family doctor or an ear specialist. Infrequently, hearing aids are recommended and quite



often speech therapy is indicated. In many cases the child is allowed to sit in a front row seat and this is the only treatment needed. Hard of hearing pupils are also reported to the state department of education and the more severe cases are provided with special education.

Speech therapy lessons are still being held on a weekly basis at the Child Guidance Clinic in Concord. This is a free service available to anyone (through application) and is provided by the Easter Seal Fund and the Zonta Club.

At the completion of the school year last year, 21 children were provided with complete dental care and were transported to and from the dentist by the school nurse. This year, those 21 children will have their teeth cleaned and additional work will be done as needed. We will add a few new students, depending on their ability to have dental care and also depending on the amount of money allocated from the Thornton Fund.

Routine visits are made to the classrooms daily and first-aid given whenever needed. I am always available for emergency calls to any school at any time during the day. I make home visits to see pupils who are absent for any length of time as well as to report defects. I also make home calls whenever requested to confer with parents.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE

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Everyone is aware of the need for preparedness, whether it is in the realm of fire service, police service or in Civil Defense, which is a combination of all services. We have ended a year of great anxieties which only tends to point up to us the real values of our local organization.

Your local organization, in the past year, has added to its supply of critical materials; it has added one more unit to its communication network; it purchased for the fire departments, 4 Scott Air Packs, breathing equipment which will enable them to do a better job of protecting life and property; and at the time of the Cuban crises the staff met twice in emergency session to re-evaluate our emergency plans. In addition, the communication service has held weekly drills, once in conjunction with the auxiliary police. The auxiliary police unit met at various times in training sessions and participated in the State Civil Defense Pistol Match for the second year. We are happy to report that the Pistol Match this year will be held in Boscawen.

Your director participated in several Area 6 Directors meetings for the purpose of planning mutual aid in emergency.

It is imperative that the people realize that Civil Defense cannot do everything for them during emergency. While it is true that we have a good organization, excellent equipment and emergency plans which we know will help, it is also certain that some things must be done by the individual alone. We therefore suggest that the following steps be considered by you.

1. Join some branch of the local organization. We need you!
2. Build a Fall-out Shelter or convert your cellar to give it the proper protection factor.
3. Take more interest in the local Civil Defense. Ask questions! In this way we can develop better plans.
4. If an emergency develops, cooperate with your local government. Follow all directions carefully.

In conclusion, I would like to express my thanks to all the members of the organization for their help and cooperation during the past year and may I express for the organization, our deep sadness in the loss of a most dedicated member, Vernon Silver. We extend our deepest sympathy to Mrs. Silver.
