

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Fown Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Campton Cemetery, also clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

9. "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171 A, relative to playing games of Beano, be adopted in this city or town." (According to State Law this article will appear on the printed ballot.)

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, as provided by Chapter 223, Laws of 1947, to purchase the Eldred Berry property and to administer it under the provisions of the above law, and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Six children attended the Dental Clinic at Plymouth and had treatment paid for by the Red Cross. Seventeen children reported having had Fluorine treatments.

The Salvation Army and Red Cross helped with clothes for several families when needed.

Hot lunches served in five schools helped the general nutrition greatly and was much appreciated.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Campton School Board:

My seventh annual report of Superintendent of Campton schools is herewith submitted. It has been purposely made brief and presents only those items for discussion that seem to be of greatest immediate interest and importance.

Campton is one of two school districts in this supervisory union to lose its entire state aid allotment as a result of legislative economy. This has thrown a heavier load on local taxpayers which will continue until such time as the state aid program is revived. The situation in which we now find ourselves presents some real danger. The danger is that public desire to curtail expenditures may easily be carried to a point where children have to pay the bill through restricted educational advantages. If the school budget seems large it is the result of necessity rather than preference of any school officials.

Beginning in September, 1949, a start was made to give some financial recognition to professional improvement by teachers. However, Campton salaries are far below the state average as well as below the starting salaries of inexperienced teachers just out of College. This should be corrected as rapidly as it can be done if we are to retain our teachers or procure replacements when necessary.

Our teaching force is the same as last year with one exception. Miss Myrtle Dodge was unable to return to Blair School last September and requested leave of absence for the year in the hope that her health may be restored. Mrs. Virginia C. Sargeant has acceptably taught in Blair School this year.

Because of the territorial size of Campton there will always be the possibility of transportation obligations that will vary from year to year. Up to the present time there has been general adherence to the statutory two-mile transportation limit established in 1919. How long this may continue depends upon the will of the school district and whatever development is experienced in the increase of highway hazards.

From time to time suggestions and requests for services are received that more often than not have to be refused. As long as our children are housed in six widely separated schools it will be impossible to give them all the services they might enjoy in a single large school. Water and toilet facilities, school hot lunches, and recreation are among those things which natural conditions limit severely. At some future period Campton may be able to have a modern, centralized school, but, in the meantime, we must be prepared to accept the limitations we are powerless to remove.

More reference books, new and enlarged map equipment, and progressive replacement of old school furniture are among the things we should acquire as rapidly as financial means permit. Since nearly all school children are unable to enjoy library privileges, we ought to put as much at their disposal in school as we possibly can.

The statistical tables that follow have been reduced in number to include only such information as may be essential for public record.

This calendar provides for opening all schools on Wednesday after Labor Day and closing all schools on Thursday, December 21. The fall term of 16 weeks contains 72 school days in addition to one day out for Plymouth Fair; two days for Teachers' Convention; and two days at Thanksgiving.

Since the two Convention days may be counted as a part of the school year, the calendar contains a possible 182 days. If more than two days should be lost because of bad weather, the required minimum of 180 days could be met either by Saturday sessions or by keeping school as long as necessary after June 15.
