TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chatham in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town House in Chatham on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at 6:30 of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will allow a 2% discount on all property taxes paid within 30 days of mailing tax bill.
 - 4. To see if the Town will raise \$100.00 for civil defense.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$8,250.00 for solid waste disposal (use of Fryeburg dump).
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$295.43 for membership dues to the North County Council, Inc.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Town's share of the expenses of the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council.
- 8. a. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,060.20 as our share of Fryeburg Rescue.
- b. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$650.00 payable to the Fryeburg Rescue so that the Fryeburg Rescue may invest this money in an interest bearing account, these funds are solely to be used toward the purchase of a new rescue vehicle.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority.
- $10.\,$ To see if the Town will raise and appropriate S314.00 to assist Carroll County Mental Health Services.
 - 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$600.00 for the support of

the Children and Youth Project of the Mount Washington Valley.

- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$218.00 for the support of the Family Health Center.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$289.44 for the Visiting Nurse Service of Northern Carroll County, Inc.
- 14. a. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the support of the Community Action Outreach Program.
- b. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the support of the Big Brother/Big Sister Organization administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 in support of the Lovell Youth Recreation Program.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the operating expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross.
- 18. a. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$2,118.00 for the Saco Valley Fire Association.
- b. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 payable to the Saco Valley Fire Association so that the Saco Valley Fire Association may invest this money in an interest bearing account, these funds to be used solely toward the purchase of a replacement fire truck.
- 19. a. To see if the Town will adopt the following according to RSA 41:1: "shall we adopt the provisions of the State Fire Code in its entirety and with any future amendments, amendments adopted only after vote at the annual town meeting by an article in the warrant calling for such action?"
- b. To see if the Town will adopt the following: "shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 154:5 which authorizes any town or city to appoint a fire chief?"
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer any such real estate acquired by the Town as a result of a tax deed as provided in RSA 80:80. Such transfer to be by Public Auction, sealed bids or in a manner that justice may require.
- 21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$3000.00 to create an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19 in which both the

principal and the interest may be expended for Municipal Solid Waste Disposal.

- 22. To see what action the Town will take on budget submittal of the budget committee.
 - 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Dear Community Members,

This year, Fryeburg Rescue, which started with a small handful of volunteers, celebrated it's twentieth anniversary. We honored our nine twenty year members in February. We have grown throughout the years and now have a membership of 51 regular members and ten Junior Rescue Members.

We had a total of 338 runs this year, which have included mountain and water rescues, motor vehicle accidents, and fire stand-bys. The runs break down as follows: Fryeburg-192, North Fryeburg-27, Brownfield-54, Chatham-8, Stow-4, Lovell-36, E. Conway-12, and Conway-1.

Both Rescue and Junior Rescue members have been actively involved in fund raisers, and as always, many hours have been spent upgrading our training and updating our equipment. We now have six members trained at the EMT-1 level and one trained at the paramedic level. We are in the process of seeking a permit to serve at the paramedic level.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those communities, community members and businesses who have supported us throughout the year, and look forward to serving you for many years to come.

ROAD AGENT

Annual Report 1991

I would like to start with an apology for last year's report. As some of you know, last year at this time I was away at the New Hampshire Police Academy receiving my full-time police officer certification and it was a very busy time for me.

Now it's back to Road Agent as usual. As you all know, this is a part-time position, only working when things need to be done. There is always more work to do than time or money allows.

This year has been true of that. Last winter there was not a lot of snow, but snow and ice control continued with the help of others and by the end of the winter we had used 144 yds. of sand with salt.

Spring came and so did the mud, but the front runner rake worked great to help dry the road surface out. Also in the spring I fixed up a school bus turn around near the end of Little Chatham Road.

Now summer arrived and early summer was very dry and the dust was plentiful. I put out some calcium chloride in an effort to control the dust. I also did some roadside mowing, cut brush, installed new culverts and put up 200 yds, of sand with salt for the coming winter. The end of summer brought on lots of rain and wind, and upkeep was difficult at best.

Then into fall and in with the grader from L. A. Drew to shape up the roads before winter.

The first snow fell in December and so started the snow and ice control. December was very nice with some snowstorms and what looked like the start of a snowy winter, but as we know, that changed to rain and ice that has become very difficult to control and has used a lot of sand and salt.

Looking to the future, there should be a regraveling program for a section of the road each year. The Town will also have a bridge to replace in the next 5 years; the one on Butter Hill Road.

Some people are not happy with the way I do things sometimes. Remember, this is a small town with a small budget. I've heard talk of change, a full-time Road Agent. Well, this is fine, but remember it takes money and equipment to do something like that, at least 5 times the budget that we have today.

I do seek to be re-elected this year. Thank you for your support.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

North Country Council is the Regional Planning Commission for 51 towns in northern New Hampshire. It was established almost 20 years ago by the legislature to respond to communities' needs for local and regional planning and development programs. As a membership organization, the Council is supported by local community dues which are used to match state and federal funding sources.

Assistance available to member towns includes municipal planning, regional planning, transportation planning, business and industrial planning/development, landscape architecture, solid waste planning, resource management, GIS mapping and public education. The Council provides this professional assistance to Planning Boards, Boards of Selectmen, Zoning Boards of Adjustment, Conservation Commissions, Solid Waste Districts, Local Development Corporations, Non-Profit Community Organizations, Chambers of Commerce, Educational Institutions and Social Service Organizations and Agencies in our member towns.

Throughout 1991 North Country Council continued it's commitment to local and regional planning assistance. The year also saw the Council rededicate it's economic development program to address the worsening North Country economy, it's solid waste program to aggressively reduce the volume of solid waste generated in the region, and it's land use program to address the problems confronting the Northern Forest.

In the ensuing year the Council will continue it's present course and work program with an intense commitment to local technical assistance, development of local leadership and ability, and the provision of membership services to support community and regional needs.

Persons interested in regional issues as discussed in this report are urged to contact their selectmen for appointment as Council representatives or committee members.

SACO VALLEY FIRE ASSOCIATION Annual Report 1991

During 1991 the Saco Valley Fire Dept., which serves Chatham, North Fryeburg, and Stow responded to 18 calls. This is down a little from last year and breaks down per town as follows: Chatham-5, North Fryeburg-10, and Stow-3.

At present we have approximately 25 active members. This year has seen 4 members become certified as Firefighter I, which took many hours of dedication on both week nights and weekends. Throughout the year me also conducted many inservice hours of training at the station.

As with all volunteer organizations, we always have a need for the dedicated person willing to serve the community and keep the volunteer fire dept. strong.

The challenge to the fire service in the 90's and beyond...

Firefighting has become very complex today and in order to deal with the future needs, we need the support of the community. The need to upgrade our equipment and personnel. To plan for the future and the path the department will travel. The need to adopt fire codes.

A giant step has been taken with the purchase of a new mini-punper that should be delivered in March of 92.

We are committed to the needs of the communities. Through education, readiness, and community recreation.

The skating rink has been a very big hit with everyone. To all the people that have volunteered many hours of work in making the rink a big success, I thank them.

I would like to thank the unpaid professional volunteer firefighters and everyone in the community for their support.

Remember, the key to fire safety is education, prevention, and early detection. Please use smoke detectors.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

1991 was a very dry and busy year for the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service as well as local fire departments due to our increase in the number of fires. Our three major causes of fires in 1991 were non-permit, children, and smoking materials. 450 wildland fires in New Hampshire burned approximately 150 acres for an average fire size of one-third acre.

Primarily, the local fire department is responsible for extinguishing these fires. Keeping the average fire size this small is a tribute to early detection by citizens, our fire tower lookout system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments.

In every municipality, there is a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens that are responsible for directing suppression action on wildland fires, working with other fire department members under the direction of the N. H. Forest Fire Service to make sure that all fire department members are properly trained and equipped for suppressing wildland fires. Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Wardens receive specialized training each year, presented by the N. H. Forest Fire Service, to keep their skill level and knowledge of forest fire laws up to date.

The local Warden and selected Deputy Wardens are also responsible for issuing burning permits for any open burning that is to be done in their community. In New Hampshire, any open burning, except when the ground is completely covered with snow, requires a written fire permit prior to lighting the fire. Before doing any open burning, it is recommended that you contact your local fire department to see if a permit is required and to save your community the cost of sending fire equipment on a false alarm. Any person violating the permit law (RSA 224:27) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Please help your local Warden and fire department by requesting a fire permit before kindling a fire, be understanding is they tell you it is not a safe day to burn, and help keep New Hampshire green! Thank you for being fire safe.

THE CHATHAM HISTORICAL SOCIETY

A phenomenal growth in membership of the Society has taken place this past year. Starting with a membership of twelve in February, 1989, the Society has grown to 90.

This past year, 1991, saw work on the Chatham Museum moving ahead. The wiring in the building was reviewed by Ned Bryant who said that most of it was not safe. He recommended that new wiring and lighting be installed. This work

was completed by late fall.

All the walls have been painted as well as having partitions put in. There is a new ceiling painted white, which with the walls and new lighting provides a bright area for work groups and meetings. Cabinets and files have been purchased. Items that the Society sells are safely stored and protected. The Society sells t-shirts, sweat shirts, and coffee mugs-all with the Society logo. Two historical pamphlets written about growing up in South Chatham in the early years were donated to the Society with the privilege of having them reproduced for sale. A third pamphlet telling about the girls camp on Kimball Pond is being worked on during this winter by Ken Wood.

Money for the work on the Museum has been raised by the participation of the Society at the Flea Market during this summer at the Fryeburg Fairgrounds. It is hoped that this coming summer, the Society members will be at the historical table at the Flea Market with items for sale. A continuing source of funds is needed so as to equip the Museum as well as carrying on other projects of the

Society.

The quarterly publication, The Chatham Times, has increased it's distribution. It is believed that through the newsletter and the monthly programs membership has increased. Members of the Society and the library receive the newsletter as part of their membership dues.

The Society was host to the Pequawket Historical League at their August meeting. Representatives from the Chatham Society attend these League

meetings which are held to exchange ideas of the various societies.

With so many of our members living out of state as well as others heading south for the winter months, we have only a small pool of workers to draw upon. Volunteers are badly needed not only for officers of the Society, but also to take over some of the projects now underway and those we'd like to establish for the future. It may be when we do have the Museum room ready to be used, we will get volunteers to come on Wednesday afternoons and lend a hand to the various projects being worked upon.

Society meetings are held monthly, each third Tuesday, at the Town House at 7:00 p.m. with the exception of December. Dues are still only \$6.00 a year and membership is open to all. The Museum is a huge project and help is needed. The Musuem will be serving the Town of Chatham for many years. We hope that Chatham residents will be able to donate an hour or so to the Museum as the Museum is being established for the future. We hope you will get involved.

MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

1991 Town Report

Established in November, 1990, the Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council (EC) is a non-profit community development corporation. As a public-private partnership, the EC works to improve the economic vitality of the region. A twenty-five member Board of Directors governs the Economic Council with twelve towns in the region having the right to appoint one Selectperson as a Director and the remaining fourteen decided by the membership. The Council has seven committees, as well, being responsible for completing specific work activities. During 1991 the Council's accomplishments include:

Job Retention. In cooperation with the U.S. Small Business Administration, the EC established a no-cost business counseling program. Retired executives formed the SCORE program and have assisted several local businesses. Through the Business Visitation Program, Council members are contacting local manufacturers in order to identify issues such as financing, job training, exporting and governmental affairs. By resolving issues such as these, local manufacturers should find the business climate conducive for expansion and job creation. Twenty-five area manufacturers participated in a Business Appreciation Day in September.

Financing. The EC has sponsored several workshops and seminars on business and financial planning which were attended by over 500 business people. In December, the EC sponsored an information meeting with the New Hampshire Director of the Small Business Administration on the agency's new financial programs. Council representatives have worked with the Congressional Delegation on these changes. Because of the lack of credit for worthy business ventures, the Council is documenting the need for increased credit through a Revolving Loan Fund.

<u>Economic Marketing</u>. In cooperation with the State, and through participation at trade shows, the EC is marketing the Valley and Western Maine to prospective companies. Work is progressing on a revitalization plan for Mill Street in Conway.

Transportation. Through meetings with the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and the New Hampshire Department of Transportation, the EC assisted in securing \$6.3 million as an initial "down payment" on the Route 16 highway improvements. Additional funds are available to study the extension of the Spaulding Turnpike to Conway. The Council has established an Airport Task Force to encourage improvements to the Fryeburg Airport and to establish an industrial park at the airport site. U. S. Representatives Snow (ME) and Zeliff (NH) co-chair the Task Force.

<u>Communications</u>. Over 150 participants attended the Economic Summit in January, which highlighted area problems and opportunities. The Council has met with members of the Congressional Delegation and key state officials to work on Valley problems. The EC has informed the public of it's activities through regular contact with the media.

In 1992, the Economic Council will focus on the following:

- 1. Creation of a Revolving Loan Fund
- 2. Job retention efforts
- 3. Economic marketing
- 4. Airport/Industrial Task Force
- 5. Technical assistance: Business Counseling/Workshops
- 6. Revitalization of Mill Street
- 7. Regional Mapping

The Council's Board of Directors is pleased with the progress and appreciates the support that the local government and the community at large have provided.

1991 CHATHAM SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING Tuesday, March 12, 1991 - 8:00 p.m.

Moderator opened the meeting and read through the warrant.

Article 1 - Frank Eastman nominated and seconded for Moderator. Yes hand vote. Sworn in.

Article 2 - Donna Hennessy nominated and seconded for School Clerk. Yes hand vote. Sworn in.

Article 3 - Anne Henriksen nominated and seconded for School Board Member. Gail Calomb nominated and seconded for School Board Member. Gail Calomb won 21 to 20, by paper ballot. Recounted twice more. Anne was asked if she wanted a recount. She replied, "At some point." Moderator explained they were counted three times already. She said alright.

Article 4 - Louise McKenzie was nominated and seconded for Treasurer. Yes by hand vote.

Article 5 - Paula Foster was nominated and seconded for Auditor. Yes by hand vote.

Article 6 - Motioned and seconded that we accept and authorize the Chatham School Board to apply for, accept, and expend in the name of the School District, such gifts, advances, grants in aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may be available or forthcoming from any source during the fiscal year, in accord with and upon such terms as are found in RSA 198:20-b. Voted Yes by hand vote.

Article 7 - Discussion on the 4-year contract with the Academy in Fryeburg. Mel Cherry read the clause about the Tuition. Discussion. Asked why the contract wasn't signed last year. The Academy had given the Board their assurances that our kids could always be there, while the Contract was waiting to be signed. It would not roll over for another 4 years when expired. Asked if a child could still have the chance to go to Kennett. Mel said it would depend on the individual, and we would have to approach the Trustees. He also said the Contract was reviewed by the SAU legal board. Discussion on payment to outside schools, the enrollment period, and when tuition has to be paid. Asked and discussed the tuition differences between Fryeburg and Kennett. Motion and seconded we accept. Voted yes by hand vote.

Article 8 - Asked about the private tuition cost of \$12,000. Discussion on special education and Capitol Reserve. Asked why there is an item fee for legal fees. An explanation of the SAU #9 share of \$5,959 and what Chatham gets from it. Discussed the amounts of the Capitol Reserve funds and the interest they've been building. Discussion on revenues coming in. Talked about the fiscal year of the school year, and how board thought the town would be better off with a surplus, to pay some of the next year's early bills. Motioned and seconded to raise \$277,884 for the School Budget. Voted yes by hand vote.

Article 9 - Motioned and seconded that we adjourn. Voted yes. Clerk swore in officers.
