

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chester, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Steven's Memorial Hall, in said Chester on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers hertofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905 and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.73 for class 5 roads, the State to contribute \$2,302.90.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the expenses of the Chester Free Public Library.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lights.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the general expenses of the Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for extermination of Moths and Pruning Trees.

14. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the eradication of Pine Blister Rust as required by the State Forestry Department in keeping with Section 9, Chapter 228 of the Public Laws.

16. To see if the Town will vote to **a**uthorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay into the Town Treasury the sum of \$724.56 or such part thereof equal to

the interest returned to said Trustees by the Trustees of the Wilcomb Townsend Home in January 1948.

17. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to reconstruct the Wilson Brook Bridge and appropriate from the Post War Fund what balance may be left in such Fund if necessary.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$84.36 (1/100 of one percent of the Town's valuation bases on the 1947 assessment) to the Merrimack Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for cutting bushes beside Town roads.

20. To see what the Town wishes to do in regard to carrying a Volunteer Fire Company Blanket Accident Insurance Policy and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same:

21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase Gas service for the Stevens Memorial Hall and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of Stevens Memorial Hall.

23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a tract of land for a Town dump, make rules and regulations governing same and raise and appropriate a sum of money for purchase and maintenance.

24. To see what discount will be allowed on taxes paid on or before August 1, 1948 and take any vote relating thereto.

24A. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of ch. 34 of the Revised Laws relating to the manner of conducting elections, all nominations for town officers to be made by caucuses of the political parties so entitled as provided by Sec. 70 of Ch. 33 of the Revised Laws.

25. To see what the Town wishes to do in regard to a parking area in rear of Stevens Memorial hall and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise and appropriate **a** sum of money therefor.

#### FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water-levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occured during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

- It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and

tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

#### Enrollment

The statistical information available indicates that the trend is for constantly increased enrollments until 1956. The enrollment figures for the past four years indicate that the district will follow the national trend if not exceed it. The net gain is approximately 14% and the gross gain approximately 24%.

The housing problem may become acute if the indicated trend continues and the price structure prevents the construction of a new plant. The statistical data for the past four years indicates that all grades but two have gained since the classes first enrolled.

This table is arranged so that the enrollment of the present is compared with the same group for each of the preceeding years. All grades (1948) except 3 and 7 now have more pupils than were enrolled when they started school. If, besides the anticipated increase in the number of entering pupils, the above trend continues our housing problem will become more acute.

#### Instruction

The district has been exceedingly fortunate to have retained the services of 3 of the 4 teachers of last year. Mrs. Dorothy Sargent returned as teacher of the grammar grades. This meant that all of the teaching positions were filled with competent teachers. I can not stress the fact too strongly that the district has been exceedingly fortunate to have the services of such a competent staff in this period of teacher shortage. The educational progress of the children of the district has been continuing at a normal and satisfactory pace. In addition to the regular teaching staff the enrollment, of the intermediate room was such, both because of its size and nature, that it was deemed advisable to provide a helping teacher. The availability of Mrs. Doris McCully made it possible to provide for a helping teacher of worth. With these teachers instructing the children of the district, parents can rest assured that the best interests of their children will be served.

Supplementary reading materials for the primary grades was provided. This makes it possible for children to bolster reading strengths and to overcome reading weaknesses. A beginning was made in these purchases towards the building of a school library that will develop an attitude on the part of children that reading is an enjoyable experience. Science books were supplied to some of the grades. The development of a science program is more and more a necessity. Our

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civilization is so dependent on scientific development that some understanding of science is a prime requisite today. The language program needs to be revised and the completion of the science program and the language program are the next steps in the curriculum adjustment to the demands of modern living. The expansion of the elementary curriculum presents problems. How may teachers with several grades continue to teach thoroughly and at the same time introduce a greater range of subject matter? Increased efficiency of method with individual attention to weaknesses may be the answer. The integration of subject matter so that the school day is operated in blocks of related subjects rather in separate compartments for each subject may be the correct approach. The revision of the curriculum will bring with it some attempts at the solution of this problem.

#### Physical Plant

A more extensive program of repairs was undertaken during the summer. This was deemed necessary because the schools had been neglected in the hope that the building program would have resulted in a new plant. Unavoidable delays had not permitted the plans to materialize and so to have decently clean and attractive rooms redecoration and cleaning were done. It is hoped that this will not be necessary again in our present plant.

#### Budget

The overall budget shows an increase of \$3,780.50. Debt and interest and expenses incidental to the development of the building program are \$1,675 in excess of similar expenditures for last year. Teachers salaries are increased \$1,400. This is affected by the necessity of employing a helping teacher to alleviate the load of excessive enrollments in the intermediate grade. The rest of the increase is due to an attempt to provide adequately for an increase in the general salary level. High school tuition and transportation account for almost all of the balance.

The estimated income, due in part to a large balance and in part to increased state aid income is increased \$3,888 so that the tax levy is reduced slightly. This is not a condition that can be expected to continue. The appropriation for legal expense was not used and no payment as yet has been made to an architect. These two items account for \$2,000 of the cash balance which naturally will not be available another year. For this reason the cash balance exceeds normal expectations by a considerable sum. It also enables the board to present a budget which is not in accord with the general trend. Generally speaking budgets show increases throughout the state.

The good judgment of the board in disposing of the bond issue in 1947 has been substantiated by recent developments in the investment field. Bonds of similar term now carry an interest rate in excess of 2% which represents a real saving to the district for the bonds of the district were disposed of for less than 2%.

### Conclusion

The progress of the children educationally has been good. That this is true is due to the continued cooperation of all. Pupils, parents and teachers have worked and are working to achieve the finest possible result. The school board has devoted considerable time to the many details of successful school operation. They have given wise counsel and exercised good judgment in their deliberations. It has been pleasant trying to provide for the educational needs of Chester youngsters in such a cooperative group and I sincerely appreciate the opportunity of having a part in the educational program in such a situation.
