SELECTMEN'S REPORT

With the departure of Jim Somerville in late 1999, year 2000 found the Town without a Town Manager. Fortunately for us, our Public Works Director, Paul DegliAngeli, accepted the responsibility of serving as Interim Town Manager. Paul fulfilled that role until July. The Board of Selectmen would like to take this opportunity to express its gratitude for his service to the Town. Paul did not just keep the ship afloat, he moved it forward.

This last year also found the Town with a number of key new employees including the Town Planner, Code Enforcement Officer, Building Inspector, and our Executive Secretary. And finally, in July, our new Town Manager, Earl Sires joined the staff. In our opinion, Earl has been a true asset to the Town and the community.

Highlights of 2000 include:

• Completion of the Whitaker Woods Meeting House

This facility will serve as a warming hut for winter sports and as an administrative facility for summer programs.

- Completion of the Whitaker Lane Bridge
- Drainage Analysis and installation of catch basins on Town roads around Conway Lake

These basins will protect Town roads from erosion and minimize the inflow of sediments to the lake.

Continued zoning enforcement

The Town has vigorously pursued zoning enforcement with the aim of achieving compliance with sign and site plan codes. The Town has also begun enforcing the Shoreline and Wetlands Protection ordinances with the aim of protecting Town water quality.

Kept to the schedule of regular property revaluations

This ensures that all properties are assessed fairly and are at market value. In this way, the property tax burden is distributed equitably. It also avoids sharp increases in taxes that can occur if revaluations are not conducted periodically.

• Rt. 16 Underground Utilities Relocation

The Town has worked with the community and utility companies to conduct a conceptual design and cost analysis for placing all utility lines underground when Rt. 16 is widened south of Barnes Road. The Board is pursuing federal and state funding to fund the project. This will improve the views at the gateway to North Conway.

• Intervale Scenic Vista

The Board strongly opposed the construction of a multi-story visitor's center at the vista. Consequently, the State and a community group are working to design a more appropriate facility.

• Rt. 16 Bypass and North-South Local Road

The Board continues to work with the Citizen's Design Review Committee and the State Department of Transportation to ensure that the design of these roads reflects the concerns of local residents.

Negotiated the non-precinct fire service agreement

This cooperative agreement between the Town, the Conway Village Fire District, and the North Conway Water Precinct provides fire protection to non-precinct areas of the Town.

 Contributed over \$700,000 in budget savings and excess revenue towards reducing taxes.

In addition, the Public Works Department provided the Town with their usual high level of service. Our maintenance and construction projects proceeded on schedule and the roads were kept clear and open during the winter months. As always, the Board is proud of their efforts.

In closing, the Board would like to acknowledge and thank, Town Staff, the members of the various boards and committees as well as members of the community that have dedicated their time and efforts during the past year.

TOWN OF CONWAY TOWN MANAGER REPORT

Since this past July, it has been my pleasure to serve as your Town Manager. I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and staff for all of their help in orienting me to the issues and challenges that face the Town of Conway. I would also like to thank those community members that have provided advice and counsel. In addition, Paul DegliAngeli should be commended for his service as Interim Town Manager. Paul kept the organization running smoothly which made the task of assuming the role of manager much easier for me.

For Town government this was truly a year of transition. We have two new Selectmen, and the Town Manager, Town Planner, Building Inspector, Zoning Code Enforcement Officer, and Executive Secretary are all new as well. In spite of this, a great deal was accomplished. While the individual departmental reports detail these accomplishments, I would like to recognize the success of several departments.

This was the first year that the Town has had a full time General Assistance Officer. As BillieJo Parker's report details, the investment in additional staff time has paid off. She has developed a more extensive and effective program that emphasizes the repayment of "loaned" Town assistance. Subsequently, she has provided a higher level of service to the community, recouped almost \$8,000, and finished the year 14% under budget. What more can you ask?

Our Recreation programs have expanded and we have taken on the maintenance of additional fields and facilities. The innovative use of community television within our recreation program has set an example for other departments in the region. Innovation and expansion will continue into the coming year as we further develop Town wide programs.

In 2000, stronger emphasis was placed on zoning code enforcement. With change comes debate and often times negative reactions. One criticism we heard was that the Town was requiring some individuals to comply while not enforcing the code with others. As Sandy Stowell details in her report, almost 93% of the 298 enforcement cases were resolved; most through prompt cooperative compliance. A relatively minor number of cases, however, resulted in more drawn out enforcement and legal action. Consequently, while most individuals willingly complied, we are still working with others to achieve compliance. This may have lead some to believe that we are not enforcing consistently. This coming year we will be providing a number of educational seminars to help owners understand code issues.

Finally, and much to our Finance Department's credit, the Town finished the year substantially under budget. In addition, revenues have exceeded our projections. Consequently, the Town will use over \$700,000 to reduce taxes in the coming year.

2001 Goals

The Board of Selectmen has identified a number of important issues that have been formalized as goals for the Town Manager. These will form much of the work plan for the coming year. Some of these include:

- Conduct a facilities analysis to address future needs of Town Offices.
- Conduct review of existing facilities to determine maintenance needs.
- If approved by the voters, coordinate Master Plan preparation
- Review and update Town personnel and purchasing policies
- Review employee compensation plan
- · Continue to develop and expand recreational programs
- Review 911 System and establish a schedule for completion
- Continue zoning code enforcement program
- · Develop a useful and informative Web Page
- Keep Board of Selectmen advised on electrical deregulation

I will be providing quarterly progress reports to the board. These will be available to the public.

2001 Budget Overview

The following narrative discusses the operating budget that was proposed by the Selectmen. This budget was subsequently amended at the First Session. The Board of Selectmen proposed a 2001 operating budget that totaled \$7,167,521. This represents an increase of 4.8% over the 2000 adopted budget. This percentage increase is somewhat less than the 7.1% average year-to-year increase over the last five years.

The proposed budget reflects policies established by the Board of Selectmen. These include a number of special projects and increased levels of service in several areas. In the Planning and Zoning Department, the Board has endorsed the preparation of a Master Plan. While a warrant article will be proposed to fund much of this work, staff time and operating resources will be required. In addition, there will be continued emphasis on code enforcement. In Parks and Recreation, the Town has assumed responsibility for additional facilities during the last year (Schouler Park) and the coming year will see the completion and further improvement of Whitaker Field. In the Public Works Department, the Capital Improvements Plan calls for increased expenditures for construction and maintenance projects.

The Board of Selectmen has stressed efficiency and cost effective operations as the means to offset these additional program responsibilities. In turn, impact to the Tax Rate will be minimized. A number of the program goals will be

achieved through the re-allocation of existing resources and modest increases in staffing. These will be further explained in the Departmental Budget Summaries.

In addition to increased responsibilities, the preparation of the budget was challenged by a number of factors. These include rising energy costs and most significantly, rising health care costs. In general, departmental increases reflect rising employee costs and as of yet, modest inflationary increases. No new full time employees have been added. Rather, the past emphasis on retaining and attracting quality staff through equitable compensation has continued.

The proposed budget represents the minimum amount needed to accomplish the tasks before the Town in 2001. There are no contingency amounts included nor are there "padded areas" serving as informal contingency lines.

Departmental Budget Summaries

Executive

The Executive Budget increases by approximately 13% due largely to increased employee costs. A Secretary position is increased from .5 FTE to 1 FTE. This position primarily supports tasks in the Planning, Public Works and Building Inspection Departments. This will enable the existing Project Administrator to provide the necessary resources to assist with site plan, subdivision and other administrative reviews in the Planning Department. This assistance will, in turn, enable the Planning Director to dedicate more time to the Master Plan Project, ordinance revision, and creating a more efficient review process.

Other increases in this budget reflect minor increases in operating expenses and the Computer line item.

Election and Registration

A decrease in the number of elections (barring any special elections) from four to just one has resulted in a decrease in election expenses of 9%. Purging of the checklist will also occur during the year.

Financial Administration

The finance budget increase of 2.75% is a result of minor increases in staff costs.

Assessor

An increase of 7.2% in this budget is due to staff costs and minor increases in the cost of contracted services.

Legal Expenses

The 2000 budget contained \$50,000 for legal expenses. This amount is consistent with actual costs for 1999. The continued emphasis on code enforcement requires an equivalent amount for 2001.

Employee Benefits

The proposed increase of 1.6% is a deceptive figure. Actual health care costs

will rise by almost 34% from \$132,704 to \$178,135. This is based on a projected 30% increase in health care insurance premium at mid-year as well as changes in employee status and plan coverages. These increases are offset by an earned benefit payment made in 2000 that will not reoccur in future years.

Planning and Zoning

An increase of 15% is proposed for the Planning and Zoning Budget. This is primarily a result of the increased emphasis on code enforcement. An increase in staffing for this function from .4 FTE to .6 FTE is proposed. Operating line items are increased minimally to address normal inflationary cost increases.

As is discussed under the Executive Budget, additional staff resources will be allocated to support the preparation of the master plan and other tasks such as code revisions. Funding for the master Plan is proposed under a warrant article.

The Equipment line in the Executive Budget also carries \$3,800 in computer equipment required by these tasks.

Government Buildings

This budget increased by less than 1%. While energy costs are projected to increase substantially, supplies on hand will minimize the need for purchases during 2001.

Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

Insurance

There is no change in this budget because our premiums do not change for 2001.

Police Department

The Police Department Budget increases by 11% or \$171,779. Much of this increase (\$50,000) is due to an increase in the commercial duty line. This increase is based on projected construction activity associated with the North-South Local road and is reimbursed by contractors to the Town. Other increases are largely in the staff lines associated with increased employee costs. The budget proposes a decrease in non-union employee contributions to health care from 25% to 20%. No new employees have been included in the budget.

Ambulance

This budget does not increase and includes the actual cost of contracted services.

Fire and Rescue

This budget increases by 7.5% based on an increase in the actual cost of contracted services to non-precinct areas of the Town.

Code Enforcement

This budget decreases by 26%. It will include only the salary for the Building Inspector. In 2000, a part time assistant was included in the operating budget. This position has been deleted and the savings applied in support of the increased hours under Planning and Zoning for the Zoning Code Enforcement Officer. The Executive Budget includes additional expenses for this department under Reference Books (\$1,200) and Seminars and Professional Development (\$1,100). These expenses are associated with maintaining current copies of the relevant codes as well as required professional development.

Highway

An increase of 4.5% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This increase is largely a result of higher material amounts associated with capital projects programmed for this year in the Capital Improvements Plan. Minor increases in operating costs are included as are increased employee costs associated with the established compensation plan.

Solid Waste

The Solid Waste budget will increase by less than 1%. Minor increases in employee costs and operating costs are offset by a reduction in leachate disposal costs.

Health

This budget decreases by approximately 12% due to a reduction in projected kennel fees.

Welfare

This budget carries operating expenses associated with the provision of economic assistance to both residents and non-residents. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget does not increase and is based on projected experience for 2000.

Parks and Recreation

The Parks and Recreation Department will increase by 5.5% as a result of increases in operating costs associated with both maintenance of facilities and programs. During the last year, the Town has assumed responsibility for the maintenance of Schouler Park. In 2001, the Town will be responsible for maintaining Whitaker Field. A seasonal employee has been added to maintain fields within the Town for a total of \$3,360.

Library

The recommended budget projects an increase of 3.5% in the operating budget that is due to increases in compensation and operating increases (particularly in the repairs and renovation line).

Patriotic Purposes

No change in this budget is proposed.

Conservation Commission

The Conservation Commission budget is reduced by just less than 2%.

Debt Principal

This budget decreases by just under 2% reflecting actual changes in principal payments for a variety of projects.

Debt Interest

Actual changes in interest payment amounts reduce this budget by just under 9%.

Interest on TANS

This budget is unchanged and is based on projected actual costs for interest payments on Tax Anticipation Notes.

Capital Reserve Funds

An increase of 4.25% is due to a \$30,000 increase in contributions to infrastructure projects programmed into the Capital Improvements Plan.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) to install a WATER TREATMENT SYSTEM FOR THE PUBLIC WATER SUPPLY OPERATED BY THE TOWN OF CONWAY. This system supplies water to Town Hall and several local residents. Treatment is required by the State Department of Environmental Services due to elevated levels of lead and copper. In addition, the Town anticipates the need for future treatment of MtBE. The project will include the construction of a small treatment house at the Town Public Works Building and the subsequent installation of treatment equipment. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-0).

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to be used to STABILIZE AND PROTECT THE WESTERN RIVER BANK ALONG THE TOWN PARK KNOWN AS HUSSEY FIELD north of the First River Bridge on the Saco River. The Hussey family donated this park to the Town. Stabilization improvements will include placement of cobbles and planting of trees. Bank stabilization is needed to protect the field from continued erosion. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-0).

ARTICLE 14: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000) to contract for outside technical expertise to work with and assist the community and Town staff in the preparation of a MASTER PLAN. The contractor will gather information from the citizens of the Town at large, using various means, including open discussion meetings, to prepare components of a Master Plan for the purpose of establishing responsible managed growth to protect the long term economic health and the natural environment of the community. Town staff will use the information provided by the consultant in the completion of the Master Plan. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA

32:7,VI, and will not lapse until the completion of the Master Plan projects is completed or in 3 years whichever is less. Any unexpended funds shall be carried over to subsequent years to be used to offset the costs of the plan. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-0).

ARTICLE 15: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) for the purpose of HIRING A STAFF PERSON TO REVIEW SUBDIVISION AND SITE PLAN REVIEWS. This staff position would be under the supervision of the Director of Planning. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dick O'Brien and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-3-0 with 2 in favor of Article and 3 opposed to Article). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (0-9-0).

ARTICLE 16: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to establish a CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE DIGITAL COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT and to raise and appropriate Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) for 2001. No expenditures are planned for 2001. The capital reserve fund will be used to accumulate funds to pay for the planned conversion of police communications equipment to digital format. This conversion is planned for the near future and it is estimated that it will cost \$171,000. The selectmen are authorized to withdraw and disburse money from this capital reserve fund as necessary to accomplish the purposes of the planned conversion to digital format. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Porter and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-2-1). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-8-0).

ARTICLE 17: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) for the purpose of REPLACING THE WINDOWS AT TOWN HALL WITH NEW ENERGY EFFICIENT WINDOWS AND TO ADD AIR CONDITIONING TO THE FIRST FLOOR of Town Hall. Agreeable to a petition signed by Catherine A. Woodall and others. Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-2-1). Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (0-10-0).

ARTICLE 18: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Melinda A. Puglisi and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 19: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to the NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Glenna Tibbetts and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 20: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Four Hundred

and Forty Dollars (\$10,440) for the VISITING NURSE & HOSPICE CARE SERVICES OF NORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 21: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Two Dollars (\$29,682) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francine Lampidis and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 22: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph L. Costello and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 23: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be awarded to the VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC., Main Street, North Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Eugene R. Hussey and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 24: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the support of THE MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND VISITOR'S BUREAU for assistance in operating its services to tourists and other visitors. Agreeable to a petition signed by John W. Jones and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-1-1).

ARTICLE 25: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for the support of the EASTERN SLOPE AIRPORT AUTHORITY. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lisa M. Webster and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 26: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Five Dollars (\$3,765.00) for the support of the FAMILY SUP-PORT PROGRAM OF THE CENTER OF HOPE, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Judy Gardner and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-2-1).

<u>ARTICLE 27:</u> (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred

Dollars (\$6,800) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 28: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Four Hundred and Ninety Five Dollars (\$6,495) to help defray the costs of Service Delivery of the MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. The Town Finance Office was minimally impacted this year by the year 2000 and related computer issues. Although the systems in place are sufficient for its present needs the announcement of Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34 will necessitate additional hardware and software to implement these changes in the future. Statement 34 establishes new requirements for annual financial reports of state and local governments. Governments with total annual revenues of \$10 million or more will apply the Statement beginning with fiscal years ending after June 15, 2003. Governments with total annual revenues below \$10 million will apply the Statement beginning with fiscal years ending after June 15, 2004.

The Town's financial condition remained positive this year under the guidance of the Board of Selectmen and of the Finance Director's office. Tax anticipation borrowing was held to a minimum resulting in only \$1,368 of interest expense incurred during the year. Increased interest rates late in the year on investments also assisted in limiting the amount that was borrowed. Long-term bond/debt payments for the year were \$753,189 and will be reduced by \$30,772 next year without new additions.

The General Fund cash balance has increased to \$5,353,654 at December 31, 2000, similar to the balance at the end of 1998. Mainly this is the result of prompt payment of real estate taxes. Unexpended from the budget appropriations this year is \$175,000. This added to excess of estimated revenues of \$531,000 will be used to reduce taxes in 2001 and leave the Unreserved Fund Balance at \$1,500,000.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1999 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Conway has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway as of December 31, 1999, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

The Unaudited Supplementary Information on page 24 is not a required part of the basic financial statements, but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and do not express an opinion on it. In addition, we do not provide assurance that the Town of Conway is or will become year 2000 compliant, the Town of Conway's year 2000 remediation efforts will be successful in whole or in part, or that parties with which the Town of Conway does business are or will become year 2000 compliant.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general

purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of The Town of Conway for the year ended December 31, 1999, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to applicable individuals during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

Thousand Seventy Four Dollars (\$1,571,074) for the purpose of CONSTRUCTING AN ADDITION TO THE CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY, TO INCLUDE IMPROVEMENTS TO THE EXISTING STRUCTURE; and to authorize the Selectmen to raise through borrowing up to One Million One Hundred Seventy Eight Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,178,250) under the Municipal Finance Act, with the Selectmen authorized to arrange all terms and conditions of such borrowing and its repayment, to be acted on by separate ballot of the Town; with the balance of Three Hundred Ninety Two Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-four Dollars (\$392,824) to be raised through grants, gifts and other fundraising activities of the Conway Public Library Trustees and Friends of the Conway Public Library. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (4-3-3).

ARTICLE 9: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant Article for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Seven Million Two Hundred and Four Thousand Three Hundred Twenty One Dollars (\$7,204,321) as amended at the first session. Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Six Million Eight Hundred Forty Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Two Dollars (\$6,840,872) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). The Budget Committee by vote of 7-5-0 recommends a total operating budget of Seven Million One Hundred Sixty Four Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$7,164,523).

ARTICLE 10: (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost of items of a one-year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2001 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, having an estimated contract cost for 2001 of Five Hundred Eighty-Seven Thousand One Hundred and Eighty Six Dollars (\$587,186) which is included in Warrant Article #9 (Operating Budget). An amount of Sixteen Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1,650) is required to be raised and appropriated by this Article to fund the increase of insurance waiver payments under the flexible benefits plan for union employees. Staff levels have not been increased over the prior year. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-0-1).

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

In the year 2000, the appreciation in real estate prices that, for some time, had traveled hand in hand with the economic boom further south, finally made its presence known in the Valley. In the course of our periodic sales analysis, the assessing department began seeing measurable appreciation in the sale prices of Conway's residential properties. Although it started out slowly, by summer, the town was in a bona fide sellers' market.

Although we had been adjusting values where warranted every year since 1994, last year it became evident that we would have to make sweeping adjustments to the residential sector if we were going to keep our assessments to a market value standard, i.e. close to their sale prices.

As early as 1998 it appeared that condominiums, chalets, lakefront and vacation style properties were leading the way, indicating a strong demand in the second home market. By the end of 1999, traditional housing stock was also on the increase, a trend that seems to have continued.

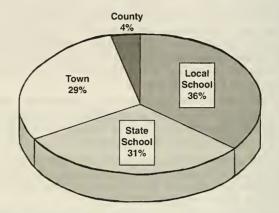
The Assessing Department spent the summer reviewing neighborhoods, making adjustments, and testing the new values against sales as they occurred. We announced through the local press, that the new values were available for review by property owners. They remained on display for several weeks while we finalized the valuations and submitted them to the Department of Revenue to receive a tax rate. As a result of our efforts in keeping assessments close to market value, tax rates, for the most part, remained stable even though there had been increases in both the school and town budgets.

Some property owners saw significant tax increases as a result of higher assessed values. While we understand and regret sudden large increases, our primary goal is to keep assessments close to recent sale prices. In this way, fairness is maintained because everyone is paying based on the same standard, i.e. what they could get for their property.

The most often asked question about last year's assessment adjustments was why we chose to place almost all of the increases on the land values. The primary reason is that similar houses in different parts of town will often sell for different amounts due to location. Neighborhoods will rise and fall at different rates because of location. On our tax bills, there is no line for location. In order to reflect this difference in demand and value between neighborhoods, we adjust land values. That is not to say that one section of dirt is more or less valuable than another. But, there is a difference in demand between locations at any given time, and that difference is most appropriately reflected on the tax bill in the land portion.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

Veteran Service Exemption: RSA 72:28-36

Amount = \$100 Regular Veteran, \$1,400 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption: RSA 72:43-h

Must be resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1 of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly, if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.

Net income of \$14,000 or, if married, \$21,000.

Have assets of \$50,000 or less, excluding the value of residence.

Amount of exemption:

65 to 75 years of age, \$25,000 75 to 80 years of age, \$40,000 80 years or older, \$50,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

Physically Handicapped: RSA 72:37-a

"Physically handicapped person" means a person who by reason of physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him to propel himself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

Blind Exemption: RSA 72:37

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department.

Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his or her residential real estate equalized.

Now truly into the new millennium, we look back at a successful year 2000 here at Town Hall. All new staff that took their positions in late 1999 and early 2000 have settled in nicely, while the existing staff held things together throughout the changes and are finally seeing things smooth out!

In the building inspection area, there were 407 building permits issued in 2000, this number reflecting 43 new homes with the balance of permits being maintenance, demolition, and commercial. This amounts to an estimated evaluation of the completed work to over \$ 17.5 million dollars. The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits were in excess of \$ 46,500.00

As in the past, commercial permits, plan reviews and commercial inspections take up most of my time. Code enforcement issues also take a sizable bite out of my time leaving residential permits, misc. inspections and investigations balancing out my weeks.

It has been and remains my goal to maintain a good working relationship, with both the local contractors and the public as well as to assist them in the production of quality and safe construction within the Town of Conway and to meet all necessary codes.

The staff here at Town Hall along with all the other agencies affiliated with the town make this position an enjoyable one to hold, therefore I look forward to serving as building inspector for many years to come! Thanks for the opportunity to serve you.

I look forward to the coming year when we will be providing ordinance seminars, which can greatly assist in a prevention mode, rather than a reactive mode. I hope to see an excellent turnout from this community.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 2000

The year 2000 was a successful year for the General Assistance Department. We spent \$30,988.23 of the projected \$36,000 budget and served 403 households that were composed of 766 people. Overall, we spent \$10,756.20 less than last year. I'm PROUD to announce that \$7,921.03 was reimbursed by General Assistance Recipients leaving us with net expenditures of just \$23,067.20.

The statewide housing crisis tremendously affected our budget. Conway officials recognize the need for affordable housing and are considering alternatives to create more housing options. It is my hope that more housing will help to relieve the financial burden associated with high housing costs. Housing assistance comprised 55% of total expenditures whereas utility and fuel assistance combined only consumed 21%. Medical expenses accounted for 10% and the rest was spent on food and miscellaneous emergency needs.

The statistics above show that the decision to make the Welfare Officer position full time was wise and cost effective. The extra 10-20 hours per week gave me the opportunity to improve the food pantry, create more useful forms and procedures, attend training seminars and meetings, build positive rapport within the community and focus on long term resolutions to financial hardships that face many people in this valley. I have also taken the time to explain to each client the purpose of this program by pointing out that all assistance received from the Town is in the form of a loan and NOT a grant. I am still working to hold people accountable for promissory notes they signed and I expect next year's reimbursements to reflect these efforts. My goal is to increase reimbursements so our net expenses will continue to drop. More people will be served at less expense to taxpayers if we increase affordable housing and continue to work together to develop social capital within our community.

This year we provided 5,422 meals to 167 families. These families were composed of 384 people of whom 143 were children and 27 were senior citizens. The food pantry now offers a wide array of essential non-food products that has greatly reduced the amount of money we spend in this category per year. We pay an annual dues of \$200.00 to the Community Food Pantry Coop and this year we received over \$1,090.07 in goods. Thank you David and Bennie for your hard work in making this a success for us. I would also like to thank all private contributors as well as Our lady of the Mountains for addressing specific requests when making donations and for their overall support of those in need. In addition, Sut Marshall generously donated freezer space to us so we can store frozen items that are distributed at various times throughout the year. Finally, a special thanks to Pine Tree School students and faculty for choosing us to receive their food drive donations, to Walmart and Ames for their continued support, and to Memorial Hospital and Starting Point for their donations of essential non-food products.

Finally, I would like to extend sincere appreciation to surrounding towns for their cooperation in working with mutual clients, specifically the towns of Madison, Eaton, Bartlett, Albany and Fryeburg. Ned Jordan (Homeless Outreach Specialist for Tri-County Cap), local motels and landlords also deserve recognition as they have been extremely helpful by sharing the cost and responsibility of housing our growing population of homeless individuals and families. I would also like to extend a special thank you to all of the agencies and programs that share the time and expense of helping families support themselves. I could not begin to name you all and I never could have done it without you! I look forward to working with all of you in the upcoming years to continue to improve and maintain our network of social services.

PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The last year of the millennium was a time for learning, team building and focus. I am encouraged by the progress we have made at Town Hall. My sense is that we have enhanced the development review process, instituted a client-based approach to growth management and breathed new life into planning for the future.

This department has prepared all the amendments the Planning Board could handle (and more) to improve the growth management process, most notably eliminating the defunct "staff review". Several other items were also addressed to improve the site plan and subdivision regulations. Still they are in a sorry state and there is much more to do. By clarifying policy and enhancing the regulations, we have renewed a good working arrangement between staff and applicants. We have also made progress improving the working relationship with staff and elected boards.

By far the most important thing that has been accomplished this past year was to initiate the master planning process. This department prepared a strategy and schedule that has been endorsed by both the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen. This department has already prepared a draft of the first background report, the land use inventory. The warrant article to fund consultant support for the master plan is critical to the timely success of this enterprise. Without it, the process will be protracted and may even founder. I look to the voters to demonstrate their support and help us make it happen.

My hope is that 2001 will afford progress with the master planning process, a change in the Planning Board's preoccupation with minutia during site plan review to expedient reviews, planning for the future and establishing appropriate policies and procedures to get us there. This department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

Earl has been doing a great job and I'm sure I speak for the entire staff in saying we are fortunate to have him on board. Other changes in personnel include the departure of Dave Chase. Dave was the Highway Forman and retired after thirty years of service with the Town. Dave will be missed by all of us and we wish him the best in his retirement. He is succeeded by Henry Wiley who has twenty plus years with the Town. We are all looking forward to working with Henry and would like to congratulate him on his promotion. Finally, I'd like to welcome our new Public Works employees Steve Larson, Bruce Munroe and Jim Shackford.

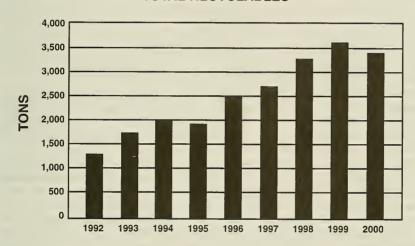
The construction season started with The West Main Street project which was a cooperative effort of the Town and the Conway Village Precinct. This project was part of the Infrastructure Capital Reserve plan which is now in its fourth season. The work included a complete reconstruction of the sidewalks, curbing, drainage and the roadway. The Whitaker Lane bridge was replaced this year. The bridge was closed in 1998 when it was damaged by flood waters. The project qualified for 80% funding by the State's Bridge Aid program making it the third bridge since 1994 to be funded by this program. The first phase of the Whitaker master plan was implemented this year with the construction of the Meeting House and associated parking lot. The article on this years warrant will fund the construction of a ball field at the Whitaker Site with irrigation, lighting, back stop and fencing. Also on this years warrant is an article to repair the river embankment along the Town's land known as Hussey's Field. This field is on the west side of the Saco River directly opposite the First River Public Park. The funds are for the purchase of materials, the labor is to be provided by the Army National Guard.

Once again trash has proven to be a reliable economic indicator. This year waste increased 12% over last year making this the fifth consecutive year that trash has increased. More material means more revenue. This year's revenue is up \$25K over last year while the budget request is up only \$4K. The revenue accounts for 65% of the annual operating budget. The news it not all good however. This was the first year since 1995 that the amount of recycling did not increase and actually decreased. Not only did the total amount decrease but as a percentage of the waste stream the news is even worse since trash volumes are up.

Well that sums up the year in Public Works. Hope to see you at Town Meeting and please don't hesitate to contact me at any time.

RECREATION DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 2000

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building in Center Conway. The Conway Community Building includes a gymnasium, game room, computer lab, kitchen, library/study room and art room. The facility also features a playground and multi-purpose fields for softball, baseball, flag football, soccer, field hockey and basketball court.

The Town of Conway offers many other outdoor parks and recreation areas for community uses: Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Nasby King Field, Hussey Park, Conway Skating Rink and the newly constructed Whitaker Meeting House. These sites provide recreational activities such as nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating canoeing, tennis, basketball, playgrounds and multi-purpose fields.

The Recreation Department is responsible for all the sports programs for elementary age students with the exception of Cal Ripken baseball. Boys and girls ages 5-13 participate in T-Ball, girls softball, flag football, soccer, field hockey, bowling, basketball, floor hockey, fun & games, summer playground along with numerous trips and special events.

The Teen Center had an extremely busy year servicing over 300 teens per month at the Center. Expansion and renovation of the Conway Community Building allowed us the flexibility to offer many different services to teens. Creating a computer lab and a kitchen has allowed us to open after school and extend our hours through the evening. Teens can get homework support, food and stay for an evening at the Teen Center. All funding for the Teen Center comes directly from grants acquired from Project Succeed, NH Bureau of Substance Abuse Services, Plus Time of NH and community groups and private business. Our main objective is to provide a safe and healthy environment for the teenagers of our community.

This year as in the past, our adult programs continue to expand and participation among senior citizens is at an all time high. The most popular activities are the adult trips which include: Magic of Christmas Concert, New England Flower Show, Disney Skating Show, Willowbrook Community, NH Museum, Tall Ships, Casco Bay Cruise, Clam Bake at Boothbay Harbor, Sea Shore Trolley Museum, Grease on Ice, Portland Open Market and Champions on Ice. A new addition to our adult programming was the Buddy Wellness Exercise Program. Adults and Senior Citizens were very active in volunteering in various recreation programs. This is a special group of adults who have given something back to the Conway Recreation Department.

The Friends of Conway Recreation Department had a busy year fundraising on behalf of the Conway Recreation Department. This group consists of volunteers who raise money to further the effort of the Conway Recreation Department for items that are not covered in the budget. The Friends were involved in the Fourth of July Celebration, World's Largest Mini-Golf

Tournament and Carroll County Recreation Department's Basketball Tournament. The Recreation Department is fortunate to have hard working parents and citizens that care about the quality of recreation their children receive.

All programs provided by the Conway Recreation Department are supported by volunteer efforts. In 2000 more than 100 people volunteered to coach one of our sports teams, chaperone dances and supervise activities. In addition to our volunteers many civic groups and local businesses made donations throughout the year in order to improve our recreational service. REPORT OF THE POLICE COMMISSION FOR THE YEAR 2000

In the year of our Lord, 2000, your Conway Police Department has had two of your police officers, Sergeant Leon Shackley and Detective Richard Roderick retire after 20 years of service to the Town of Conway. Also in February, Lieutenant David G. Bennett will retire after some 33 years of service to Conway. With these three men, a lot of the history of the Conway Police Department goes with them.

It says a lot about your police department to have officers stay in the department long enough to be able to retire. We, as a Department, have had some turnover, but on a whole, we have been quite stable.

This past year, we have been able to add Jill Enos, our second female police officer, to the staff. She, at this time, has finished her training at the New Hampshire Police Academy and is performing her duties in the Department.

After almost 9 years, Commissioner James Yeager relocated to Bridgeton, Maine and therefore had to resign from the Commission. Paul Whetton was appointed to fill the remaining time in Jim's term. There were several applicants for the position, but your Commission felt that Paul, having previously been on the Commission and a former Selectman, was the best choice.

The formation of the School Resource Officer program on a full week's program with both the High School and the Elementary Schools is a major step in the Community Policing Program. You will notice that your Police Department is more of a Proactive Department rather than a Reactive Department. You the public are an important part of your Police Department. This is one of the contributing factors in making the Conway Police Department one of the strongest police departments in the State of New Hampshire.

Not too long in the future, communication equipment will be becoming digital. Your Police Commission is planning for the day it arrives. We are also working on other ideas that will be beneficial to this entire community. We welcome your continued support.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE 2000

The faces at the Conway Police Department are changing brought on by the retirements of Sergeant Leon E. Shackley, Detective Richard L. Roderick and in February of this year, Lieutenant David G. Bennett all of whom had over 20 years of service to the Town of Conway and we wish them all the best in their retirement.

As a result of these retirements, Jeffery L. Dicey was promoted to Lieutenant, Nathan J. Boothby to Sergeant, George B. Walker to Corporal and Edward K. Wagner, Jr. was re-assigned to the Detective Division. Officer Christopher A. Kevlin was appointed as the School Resource Officer after a Federal Grant for \$125,000.00 for three years was awarded to the Town of Conway and accepted by the Board of Selectmen and the School Board. Officer Kevlin is at Kennett High School five days a week and also visits the elementary school.

The Department suffered the loss of Detective Gary Anderson who went to work for the Portland Fire Department for better work hours and benefits. Other members that left the Department over the last year are Officer Ted L. Colby, for personal reasons, and Dispatcher Thomas P. Park who went to work for the Portland Police Department.

Conway Police Department utilized Bike Patrol in Conway Village as well as North Conway Village and helped curb activity in problem areas of the Town. The continued use of the Police Radar Trailer that was purchased with a federal grant helped to reduce speed in problem areas and allowed Officers to perform other duties while the trailer promoted public awareness.

The Commercial Duty line item this year exceeded all expectations, the Town raised \$40,000.00 for the Redstone Road Project and the expenditure was over \$79,000.00 in that category all of which is returned to the general fund. This year the projected amount for the North-South Local Road is estimated at \$90,000.00 and this will also be returned to the general fund.

We look forward to another year of continued support for the Conway Police Department and its members.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT, 2000

During 2000 AD 36,622 visitors to the Conway Public Library checked out 68,430 items, ranging from adult and children fiction and non-fiction to videos, audio books and music CD's. The library registered 643 new borrowers. In addition 7,758 reference questions were answered during the year.

The library continued to offer free Internet access to the public. Training is available for the use of the Internet as a research tool; this year 9,361 used the Internet (up 29% from 1999). The library offered reference databases on CD-ROM. The service grew this year with access to electronic databases through the NH State Library's NHLink.

Programs included poetry and writing contests, lectures by authors, Brendon Dubois, Duke Southard, Dan Brown and Cynthia Huntington and New Hampshire Humanities discussion series. Once a month a group of avid readers have gathered for a book discussion. Interest has continued to grow in this new endeavor.

The popular story times for children continued with attendance reaching 1,453. A story time for infants has been added to the schedule. Throughout the summer, 196 children read 5,934 books in the "Reading Cats and Dogs" program where six story sessions featured live pet guests. The Little Red Wagon, Children's Book Week Story Festival, Spanish for Children, and the Dr. Seuss Birthday Celebration were some of the children's programs offered in 2000. In all there were 105 children's and 96 adult programs.

The Henney History Room welcomed 476 researchers, while several hundred more took advantage of the Henney Room's on-line services. Historical material is added as space allows. In an effort to maximize space, *The MountainEar* and *The Conway Daily Sun* are being microfilmed. A dedicated group of volunteers is working on an updated inventory of Conway cemeteries.

The Conway Public Library volunteers contributed 561 hours of service, shelving and covering books, mending materials, facilitating interlibrary loans, and sending overdue notices. Barbara Hoyt has year after year maintained the library's attractive flower gardens.

The family of Richard G. Packer donated Mr. Packer's art book collection of more than one hundred hooks. Richard G. Brown, retired from Philips Exeter Academy, donated math books that he authored and funds for the purchase of match books to expand the children's and adult collections.

On October 24th, the Friends of the Library and the Trustees held a reception for Margaret Marschner to celebrate the library director's thirty years of service. Among those conveying congratulations and appreciation in a room filled to capacity was Chet Lucy, a trustee when Margaret was hired. Represented too were the Conway Selectmen, who presented a proclamation, the Conway Chamber of Commerce, the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce,

the Historical Society, the library staff, the Friends of the Library and the Trustees. That evening, the Conway Historical Society presented the Henry Seymour Conway Salver Award to the library "in recognition of excellence in the field of historic preservation."

Resigning in September because of a move to Eaton, Linda Sorensen was replaced by William Marvel. As a trustee Linda made valuable contributions on the building committeee and to the weekly column "Library Connections."

The Friends of the Conway Public Library were busy with fund raising activities, sponsoring the annual Cake Auction and Summer Book Sale, and a Christmas harp recital. Another Friends' event was a lecture by historian, Bill Copley on the Concord Coach, followed by a tour of the Marshall wagon collection. A Centennial Committee has been created to plan a celebration for the library's Centennial Anniversary in June, 2001.

This year the budget committee and selectmen are supporting the library's expansion which in 2000 missed the 60% by a mere nine votes. The cost of the much needed expansion and renovation is now \$1.571 million, 25% of which will be raised by the trustees, lowering the bond request to \$1.178 million.

The Friends and Trustees thank the Fundraising Chairs, Tom Deans and Betty Newton for all their hard work in their effort to reach the 25% fundraising goal. Ralph Wiggin has generously created a sign measuring the donations as they are received.

The Library is also thankful to have Linda Fox-Phillips as public relations spokesperson. Her well-received Bookends program on Channel 3, connecting with many local community organizations, and a successful fund drive letter campaign have raised awareness of the library's importance to the town's cultural life.

To meet the growing needs of our town, the library needs repairs and it needs more space. Please support your library by voting Yes on Article 8 on March 13th.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2000

The Board of Adjustment has had a rather interesting year. We welcomed our new Town Planner for a full year and a new Town Manager. Both have supported the Board and been helpful in granting our needs. We have a full board, but our list of alternates is still not complete, so any citizen who has an interest in the enforcement of zoning is encouraged to contact the selectmen to express that interest. The Board heard 25 cases this year, 11 were requests for Special Exceptions, 7 were requests for Appeal from Administrative Decision, 3 were requests for Variances, 3 were Motions for Rehearing and 1 was a request for an Equitable Waiver. Of the requests for Special Exception 7 were granted, 1 was denied and 3 were withdrawn. Of the appeals from Administrative Decision, 3 were granted, 3 were denied and 1 was withdrawn. Of the requests for variances, all were denied. All of the motions for rehearing were denied. The Equitable Waiver was granted.

Most important is that any person who has an interest in any Appeal that is brought to the Board be at the public hearing to express their view. The Board acts on the information that is brought forth at the hearings and if information that anyone considers pertinent is not presented at the time, we do not have an opportunity to use that information in our decisions.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 2000

The Commission meets monthly to attend to the routine business of overseeing the many public lands in the Town that we are entrusted with.

Now that we have forest management plans for most of the town owned wooded lands, we are able to schedule trail work and timber cuts that pay for themselves while improving the land, enhancing the recreational potential, and creating a better wildlife habitat.

For many years, the Conway Conservation Commission has had a fine working relationship with the NH Forestry Department and the Nature Conservancy. Combined, these three entities are preserving over 5,000 contiguous acres of woodland and wetlands from the Redstone Quarry to Hurricane Mountain. The Conway Common Lands (900+ acres), the Puddin Pond area (300+ acres), the NH State Forest (600 acres), and the Nature Conservancy's Green Hills together create a wonderful asset to our town. Our three entities working together over the last two years have been able to mitigate much of the disastrous ice storm damage of December 1998. The State has created a much needed parking area at the Black Cap trailhead and given us much needed access to town lands. The Conservancy for years has maintained our trails which connect with theirs. All together, this creates for the Town of Conway a wonderful, pristine backland recreation area to complement the White Mountain National Forest to our west.

This past spring, the Conway Public Works Department completed a picnic area in Shedd Woods located across from the Memorial Hospital on Rt. 16. This is a scenic overlook of the Saco River Valley, The Moats, White Horse, and Cathedral Ledges.

Illegal use of motorized vehicles in conservation lands continues to be a problem. The Commission is taking steps to point out to residents and visitors alike that Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods, and the Puddin Pond areas are NOT OPEN TO ANY MOTORIZED TRAFFIC other than authorized maintenance and police vehicles. Town ordinances authorize fines to \$1,000.00 per violation.

ATV's, snowmobiles, and motorized bikes should be used on any of the many trails and areas open to off road motorized traffic. Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods, and the Puddin Pond are maintained for use by hikers, runners, skiers, snowshoers and mountain bikers.

The Commission reviews wetland permit applications and is represented on the Bypass Highway Design Review Committee.

We welcome any suggestions that may help us better serve the Town of Conway.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information, visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department <u>BEFORE</u> using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing ANY outside burning.

As your Councilor, I am always looking for people to serve on a multitude of Boards and Commissions in your State government.
- The Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal Transportation (five Executive Councilors and the Commissioner of Transportation) will be holding hearings around the State on citizen and regional planning commission recommendations for improving our highway system throughout New Hampshire. If you have suggestions on a needed improvement, please send them to your regional planning commission or to my office soon so they may be given consideration.
- The Regional Health Planning District Councils continue to meet and consider major changes in the health maintenance system for citizens both at the local and state levels. Anyone wishing to serve on your region's District Health Council should contact my office or Lori Real, Director of Planning Research at NH Health and Human Services Department, Tel. 271-4235.

- As one of your elected officials, I would urge your town and region to be in constant contact with our New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to let them know of your ideas, concerns and desires. I am interested in promoting projects to send to Senators Smith and Gregg and Congressmen Sununu and Bass. They are effective in their committee assignments and should always have a list from back home in New Hampshire to advance in our nation's Capitol.
- I recommend use of the NH Webster System. It is the official state locator for your New Hampshire State Government at http://www.state.state.nh.us. A complete directory of phone numbers and addresses of all state agencies is listed for your convenience. Utilize your local Town/City Library to access the Webster System which is administered and maintained by the New Hampshire State Library.
- My office has available a handy 800 toll-free phone card of organizations for rural areas.
- Always know my office is at your service. Contact me anytime!

NON PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

American Red Cross

The Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross is proud to serve the Mount Washington Valley. The American Red Cross is not a government agency and all Red Cross disaster assistance is free thanks to the generosity of people like you. Ninety-two cents of every dollar donated to the American Red Cross is spent on programs and services that help people in times of emergencies as well as to prepare for emergencies. "The Mission of the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross is to improve the quality of human life; to enhance self-reliance and concern for others; and to help people avoid, prepare for, and cope with emergencies." The MWV Chapter depends on the community for its support.

The MWV Red Cross is proud to provide the following services to the community; Armed Forces Emergency Services, Blood Services, Disaster Services, Health, Safety & Community Services and International Services.

Carroll County Mental Health Service

Carroll County Mental Health Service is a private nonprofit agency providing high quality, accessible mental health services to the residents of our county. The outpatient and emergency services are funded by a combination of client fees, grants, fund raising and town appropriations.

Persons who use our services are treated for conditions such as depression, anxiety, post traumatic stress disorder, physical or sexual abuse, schizophrenia, drug and alcohol abuse and problems relating to relationships and social conditions.

This year 483 residents of the Town of Conway received services from our agency.

We provide a range of services including counseling, psychiatric treatment and medications, vocational services, case management, 24-hour emergency services, specialized children's services, educational groups, residential services, and school, home and community-based treatment.

Carroll County Mental Health Service has contracts or reimbursement arrangements with most types of health insurance. Clients without insurance are assigned a fee based on family income. Our fee scale slides as low as \$10 per session; we provide services for community residents in need that are far below the cost of providing such services. Receiving funds from the towns in our county is one of the ways that we offset these costs. Our goal is to be able to provide services before problems escalate into crises, which are more damaging to the individual, family and community, and are much more expensive.

Our approach to treatment is strengths-based, which means that we encourage our clients to be as self-reliant as possible. We attempt to work with clients so their ability to continue to function in the community is paramount while safety is maintained.

When the community mental health centers were established in 1965, the goal was to provide accessible services to prevent unnecessary psychiatric hospitalizations. CCMHS is observing its thirty-sixth year of working hard to meet that goal.

Children Unlimited, Inc.

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child(ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child(ren) with special needs is a priority.

The program is staffed by professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early child-hood educators and parent support providers. Program services include: developmental screening and/or evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments and interagency collaboration.

Conway Village Area Chamber of Commerce

As you know, the Chamber takes a very active role in enhancing the image and promoting positive economic growth in the Town of Conway and surrounding areas. The cornerstone of our organization is, and always will be, our information booth and our new web site. While the booth is set up to benefit the many local businesses that are Chamber members, a great deal of information and services we provide are not always directly related to those member businesses. The most frequently asked questions are: Where is Mt. Washington? Where can we hike, bike, swim, ski, skate, etc.? Where are the rest rooms? Where is the town Hall or District Court? Where can we shop, eat or sleep? We answer all these questions, provide maps of the area and the opportunity to use portable restrooms from April through December. Our information booth is the first stop for many visitors as they enter The Mt. Washington Valley Region. Many of these travelers are visiting for the first time. The information booth provides a valuable service for the whole Town of Conway and not just the Village.

Over the last year, our organization has not only been a tourist related entity, but has matured to a greater community resource. It is our intention to continue this community focus in an effort to ensure that Conway remain a wonderful place to live and work. An example of this would be our work with the Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council to obtain federal funding for the proposed Technology Park. We also have been, and will continue to work with, the town and the precinct to revitalize the Main St. in Conway Village, beginning with the Park Project which began two years ago.

As you all know, we organize, and plan to continue to organize, the Conway Village Festival promoting Civic Pride Day, and the Conway Tree Lighting and Parade. We expanded the Village Festival last year to showcase non-profit organizations. We gave them space to provide information on their organization and/or sell food and wares as a fund raising effort. We also recognize a business citizen of the year, based on overall contribution to the community, at our annual dinner every October.

The Conway Village Area Chamber of Commerce serves not only its member businesses, but the entire Town of Conway, through its community and tourism efforts. We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for all of your support, past and present, and as we continue to grow.

The Eastern Slope Regional Airport

The Eastern Slope Regional Airport is very unique given the fact that it is supported and governed by many towns located in two different states. The Town of Fryeburg, located in the State of Maine, would find it very difficult, if not impossible, to fund a year round municipal airport without an annual contribution from the Town of Conway who benefits most. The Town of Conway, in the State of New Hampshire, would not have access to an airport 20 minutes away if it were not for the Town of Fryeburg taking the responsibility of keeping it open. At this age and time, a true spirit of cooperation runs this airport.

The Board of Directors are comprised of one town appointed citizen from Albany, Bartlett, Jackson, Madison, Eaton, Denmark, Lovell, Brownfield, and Bridgton. There are two town-appointed citizens from the towns of Fryeburg and Conway and both towns are represented on the Executive Board. There is one seat held by a representative of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. The Board meets once a month on the first Tuesday at 7:30 PM at the terminal building at the airport. The meetings are open to the public.

Many local businesses use the airport for access to the Valley. Many locals and tourists fly in and out for recreational pleasure. It is also utilized by governmental agencies such as the FBI and military. It is used for fire, rescue and medical emergencies. Small industry have used this airport for many years and it is a must to attract more small industry in the future. It is used hundreds of times a year for many reasons.

Small municipal airports are not money makers no matter how necessary to our economy and safety. The airport is up to 60% self sufficient. Without all the towns who benefit from this facility joining together to support it annually ... it would be impossible to operate.

Family Support Program The Center of Hope, Inc.

The Family Support Program of The Center of Hope, Inc. serves families who have a family member with a developmental disability living with them, or a family receiving Early Supports & Services in Carroll County. We assist families in accessing the supports that meet their individual needs. Some of those services may be:

- · Information & Referral
- · Respite Care & Funding
- · Crisis Intervention
- · Modification to family's home or vehicle
- · Support Services counseling, parents group
- Assistance in accessing support for the personal needs of the individual with a disability
- · Financial Assistance
- · Assistance with accessing other programs
- Camperships
- · Assistance with Medical/Dental needs
- · Education & training for families to help them develop skills
- · Advocacy legal, education
- · Assistance with special education services
- · Personal futures' planning
- Respitality
- Legislative updates & information
- Any other support needed by the family

We are funded by Medicaid and community contributions and are of no cost to the family. Last year we served 30 families in Conway. The number of families who receive our services continues to increase dramatically. We work collaboratively with many other community service agencies in an effort to better meet the needs of people we serve and avoid duplication of service.

Without the financial support of the Town of Conway, we would not be able to continue the quality and quantity of work we do in helping families maintain their quality of life or their ability to be contributing members of their community.

Gibson Center

For those of you not familiar with the Gibson Center's formal mission statement, here it is: Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their

communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

This is what we have been doing since 1979. We don't do it alone. We do it with dedicated volunteers, staff and board members. We do it by enjoying the kind of partnership we had with Conway in our Community Development Block Grant that helped renovate our facility.

For 2001 we are seeking level funding from Conway, although we do estimate an increase in services. We thank you for your continued support of the Gibson Center. Without it, many lives would be less full, and the financial burden would be substantial.

North Conway Community Center

The North Conway Community Center experienced a year of change in 2000. Kim Perkins retired after 41 years as Executive Director of the Community Center. The Board of Directors has started a scholarship to honor his many years of dedication to the Center. Carol A. Chalmers was hired in April to replace Kim. The Center is also staffed by Assistant Director Roger Grucel. The Community Center is located in the center of North Conway and provides recreation and leisure activities for youth and adults.

The Community Center is run by a volunteer board who raises half the operating budget for the Center through fundraisers, grants and the Annual Appeal. The Community Center runs a wide variety of recreational youth programs and has added many new programs this year. The Center also has developed partnerships with many groups in the community to sponsor events.

This year the small pool on the Harvey Dow Gibson Playground was replaced with a sprayground for the enjoyment of our community. The inside of the Community Center has received a fresh coat of paint. Goals for 2001 are to upgrade the playground equipment and to continue program improvements.

The Center owes a debt of gratitude to Charles Sprague and Viola Schmalz who have been tremendous financial supporters of the Community Center.

In closing, I would like to thank the Board of Directors, Rog, and the army of volunteers who help with coaching and fundraising throughout the year without who the Center would not be possible.

The North Conway Day Care Center

The North Conway Day Care Center has been operating since 1972, the first state licensed group child care center in the area.

The Center provides care for children ages 2-12 for working parents, averaging 75-100 children. Our program includes full time child care, a morning preschool, half day programs for kindergarten students, and before and after school programs.

A full time program is available for school age children during the summer and school vacations.

Well balanced nutritional morning and afternoon snacks and lunches are prepared according to U.S.D.A. standards and are serviced by a full time cook.

The center has an agreement with the N.H. Department of Health & Human Services to provide child care assistance for those families who are eligible according to their family income. This enables the families to have affordable child care and stay in the workforce.

All of our staff meet state licensing requirements or are in the process of being certified.

We continue to work with other community resources to help meet the needs of our families to avoid duplication of service.

Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council

The Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council marked its 10th anniversary in 2000! With a firm foundation of accomplishments, the Council is embarking on its most ambitious project to date, the Mt. Washington Valley Technology Village. The Village represents the Council's major initiative to stimulate high technology business growth and diversity in the Valley. The overriding goal of the Village is to create high skilled, good paying jobs for our residents - thus lifting the standard of living for all. With the Council's unparalleled commitment to this most worthwhile endeavor, your support is more crucial than ever. 2001 will be a pivotal year for the Council and the communities they represent as we plan the project, build community support and secure the necessary funding to make the Technology Village a reality.

In addition to the Technology Village, the Council will remain the "Business Resource Center" for the Valley. We will continue to provide programs and services that support our existing businesses and encourage their long-term viability. The Revolving Loan Fund will continue to finance new and expanding businesses! Eggs and Issues and Bits, Bytes and Business will also continue to provide topical information for the business community and the general public! Starting Point Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence (formerly Carroll County Against Domestic & Sexual Violence) is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups, resources and referrals and community education programs. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

Conway residents benefit both from Starting Point's direct services and ongoing educational programs. In 1999, 137 Conway residents received Starting Point services. Conway residents were provided with 132 bednights of emergency shelter. Starting Point provided court advocacy to 41 Conway residents. In addition, all Conway students attending Kennett High School participate in Starting Point's three hour program, Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know as part of the school's required health curriculum. Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary, our 8-week elementary school program on creating a positive school environment is offered at Pinetree and Conway Elementary Schools.

With only three full-time staff members and a limited budget, the vast portion of Starting Point's Services were provided by approximately 30 trained volunteers. These volunteers donate approximately 16,000 hours of service to our community each year. The financial support contributed by towns to our agency is used for educational programs and direct services to Starting Point clients. Money received through town funding and our own fundraising efforts enable Starting Point to qualify for State and Federal grants which comprise 85% of our budget. Without the assistance of towns such as Conway, Starting Point would not qualify for the funds that keep us in operation.

Tri-County Community Action

To the SELECTMEN and RESIDENTS of the Town of CONWAY:

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit Community Center for Family Services and Referrals that was established in 1984, operating from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee, New Hampshire. We have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 3,231 of Conway's citizens, processing 898 fuel applications, 117 being elderly and 128 disabled, and linked 2,088 with other Community Action Programs.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$638,079.22 ON CONWAY CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 1999 AND JUNE 30, 2000

Community Contact is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, EFSP, McKinney, and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food is distributed to the 11 food pantries and 4 Dinner Bells throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. Our staff has the trust of the entire county. We are able to successfully partner with individual families and assist them one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than 14,927 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff, and residents, as well as other social service agencies, and our clients.

Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County

Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, a Medicare Certified and state home health licensed agency, provides comprehensive home health care and hospice services. Services include case management, skilled nursing, speech, occupational and physical therapies, IV therapy and other high tech services, home health aides, social worker, support groups, health screenings and flu shot clinics, hospice volunteers and bereavement services. Services are available 24 hours per day, seven days a week to individuals of all ages who meet medical need criteria. When a person's required home care services are covered by private insurance, we are reimbursed for our services by those payers. Medicare and Medicaid are also reimbursed but do not cover the full cost of providing home care services. We also offer a sliding fee scale to those who are underinsured or uninsured. Town funding helps us to provide services to people who do not have any other payment source, are uninsured or underinsured, and helps us provide our high level of care to everyone we serve.

The agency served a total of 482 clients during 2000. 60% or 287 clients were served in the town of Conway of which 132 were underinsured or uninsured. Total 2000 home visits for the agency including the Hospice program = 8,055; in the town of Conway = 4,857 visits; 60% of all clients and 60% of all home visits.

The total cost for these services provided to Conway residents is \$320,594; Conway town funding contributes \$10,440 (3% of the cost) to these sliding fee, Medicaid and Medicare visits; the agency contributes \$310,154 or 97% of the cost. On a per capita basis, Conway residents contribute \$1.22 per year to have access to these essential services. (Office of State Planning 1999 Population estimate for Town of Conway = 8,542).

Conway town funding support is essential for Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care to continue to provide access to quality home care and hospice services for the frail, elderly and disabled as well as for all residents in the town.

White Mountain Community Health Center

White Mt. Community Health Center (WMCHC) represents the merger of Family Health Centre with Children's Health Center. This consolidation, which became effective on January 1, 2001 will integrate and centralize, under one roof, the services of both organizations. Located in the former White Mt. Woolens/Dr. Ramunno Building next to Hill's RV, WMCHC will serve the health care needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Conway, the other towns of Northern Carroll County and Fryeburg. Family Planning and Prenatal services for Southern Carroll County will continue to be based out of Wolfeboro.

In addition to the continued child health, family planning and prenatal services, WMCHC will become a primary care provider in July with the addition of a family practice physician to the staff. This designation will allow the organization to provide a full range of primary and preventive health care services for men, women and children of all ages on an income-based sliding fee scale. No one will be refused care for financial reasons.

Since patient revenues cover only 40% of the WMCHC's cost of providing services, the Center must depend on fundraising, state grants, private foundation support and support from towns to cover the balance. The 2001 Town of Conway request from WMCHC of \$30,765 represents a slight .026% increase over the combined 2000 request of Family Health Centre and Children's Health Center of \$29,963.

Indisputable evidence makes a clear link between poor access to primary and preventive care and poor health outcomes. Your support of White Mt. Community Health Center's request assures that Conway families have affordable access to health care.
