

#### TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Francestown, in said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Francestown on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1 thru 4, will be by official ballot, and the polls shall be open for balloting on said date at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before 7:00 o'clock in the evening.

#### Article 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. (By Official Ballot)

#### Article 2.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for Francestown Zoning Ordinance?
(By Official Ballot)

This amendment would change the definition of "building" to read as follows: A construction in excess of 25 square feet for the shelter of persons, animals or property.

(The Planning Board voted unanimously in favor of this proposal.)

#### Article 3.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?
(By Official Ballot)

This amendment would: a) subject swimming pools, athletic courts and other sizeable structures to setback regulations: b) clarify setback regulations regarding non-conforming buildings: and c) provide for certain exceptions to the setback regulations.

(The Planning Board voted unanimously in favor of this proposal.)

#### Article 4.

Are you in favor of the amendment of the Francestown Flood Hazard Building Code as proposed by the Planning Board? (By Official Ballot)

This amendment would add a definition of, and regulations for, recreational vehicles located in designated floodplain areas.

(The Planning Board voted unanimously in favor of this proposal.)

Pursuant to RSA 39:2a and the vote of the Annual Town Meeting in 1979, you are hereby notified the second session of the annual meeting of the Town of Francestown will be held at the Town Hall on Saturday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, at which time the town will act on the following subjects.

#### Article 5.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.

Article 6. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote by to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a 7 person committee to study sites in Francestown that would meet the long range recreational needs of our growing population; said committee to prepare a warrant article for the 1995 town meeting proposing the acquisition of the best site; said committee to be made up of one member each from recreation, FIHS, conservation commission, PTO, planning board, plus two others; all of which actions shall postpone until 1995 the expenditure of funds voted at the 1993 town meeting for the development of FIHS land; or take any other action relating thereto.

#### Article 7.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a long-term lease with the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society of their entire property (Tax Map 5 Lot 86) and to assume the cost of maintenance of the facilities thereon, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### Article 8.

Shall the Town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes?

#### Article 9.

Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept, and expend, without further action by the town meeting, any and all grants or other funds available for town purposes that may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State, private agency or individual sources which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting.

Article 10. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, any and all grants or other funds that may now or hereafter be forthcoming from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a yote of the municipal meeting.

#### Article 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the municipality for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting.

#### Article 12.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80. This authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the Town Meeting.

#### Article 13.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19. This authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting.

#### Article 14.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Public Assistance Administrator to use uncommitted funds remaining in the approved budget at his/her discretion to assist town residents, not presently receiving Town assistance, who have financial need during the holidays season, or take any other action relating thereto

Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee do not recommend this article.

#### Article 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$71,500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Accounts, to be allocated as follows:

Future Replacement of Fire Trucks \$20,000.00 Future Replacement of Fire Dept. Radios 500.00 Future Replacement or Purchase of Hwy. Equip. 20,000.00 Future Replacement of Police Cruiser 6,000.00
Future Reappraisal of Real Estate 5,000.00
Recreation Lands 10,000.00
Bixby Mill Pond Dam 10,000.00

or take any other action relating thereto.

The majority of the Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 16.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of "Town Building Improvements/Acquisition" and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in this fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 17.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of "Town Road Improvements" and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in this fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriated the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) to pay a portion of the negotiated settlement of pending litigation brought by KDK Corp.

relating to the Bennington Waste Disposal site, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to pay for its share of the overrun of the Bennington Landfill Closure, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to pave the area around the upper level of the Transfer Station, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) to fund a hazardous material disposal day, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee do not recommend

this appropriation.

#### Article 22.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Thirteen Hundred Eighty Nine Dollars (\$1,389.00) of unexpended prior appropriations carried forward and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred Eleven Dollars (\$1,111.00) the totals not to exceed Twenty Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to be placed in the Conservation Fund, authorized by RSA 36-A:5, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty One Thousand Dollars (\$51,000.00) to repair the Bixby Mill Dam, and authorize the withdrawal of Twenty Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$20,500.00) and accrued interest, from the Capital Reserve Fund (Bixby Mill Pond Dam), the balance to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto; and if the foregoing is approved, vote to close the subject capital reserve account, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee do not recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$47,500.00) to fund the rebuilding and paving of Dodge Hill Road beginning at the intersection of South New Boston Road proceeding northerly to the base of the hill, the project to be constructed as recommended and described in the report of the Road Improvement Sub-Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this appropriation.

#### Article 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Six Thousand Dollars (\$26,000.00) for the purchase of two (2) new "Stainless Steel Sand and Salt Spreaders," such sum to be raised and appropriated by the withdrawal from the Capital Reserve Fund "Replacement or Purchase of Highway Equipment," or take any other action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee recommend this

appropriation.

Article 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for the purchase of a government surplus 1 ton pick-up truck as a replacement, should one become available, such sum to be raised and appropriated by the withdrawal from the Capital Reserve Fund "Replacement or Purchase of Highway Equipment", or take any other action relating thereto.

The majority of the Selectmen and Budget & Advisory Committee

recommend this appropriation.

Article 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to upgrade the parking area on the west side of Poor Farm Road across from the Town Hall Annex, or take any other action relating thereto. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and majority of Budget & Advisory Committee do not recommend this appropriation.

Article 28.

To see if the Town will vote to ratify the following organization procedure of the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department pursuant to House Bill 224: to wit that the position of Fire Chief be elected by the membership of the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department as required by its bylaws, and further that the said members be empowered to elect all fire fighters, rescue, and diving personnel within said department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 29.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT - 1993

The past year has been an eventful one for our town. The Town did not borrow any money this past year in anticipation of taxes. This is a first to the best of our knowledge. The Bennington Landfill has been closed and we are awaiting word of final certification from the State. The Reid Road reconstruction project was completed, a new highway 1-ton truck was purchased, a new police cruiser at a cost of \$19,734, \$2,266 less than the amount approved by the Town Meeting, due to the efforts of the Police Chief and the Selectmen. The fuel storage containment building at the Highway Garage is now in place.

The Selectmen sold at public auction various parcels of land deeded to the Town for unpaid real estate taxes and returned them to the tax rolls. The Town took possession of the Crotched Mountain Ski Area in 1993. The Selectmen attempted to sell the area at public auction, by sealed bid, and finally by contacting directly those parties who had expressed serious interest. While not under sales agreement at this time, the Selectmen feel that the Town's interest is now adequately protected from claims of lienholders and the effect of pending litigation before the New Hampshire Supreme Court. The Selectmen's on-going discussions with certain investor groups continue.

We wish to thank the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society for their donation of the lighting fixture over the front door of the Town Hall, the members of the Oak Hill Grange for their generous gift towards the purchase of the new flags and holders for the Town Hall, and the members of the Old Meeting House of Francestown for the landscaping and maintenance of the Town Common around the Meeting House.

The enhanced 911 emergency system project is well along in the process and should be ready to implement when the state goes on line in 1995. Our thanks to the Highway Safety Committee.

The Selectmen also reviewed the property assessments across the Town and made adjustments to more accurately reflect current market values. The results of this effort were gratifying. The Department of Revenue Administration has determined that the equalization percentage for the town is 103% versus 125% last year, and the important coefficient of dispersion factor is now 10.71 versus 19.26. Continued study of market trends is planned in 1994.

And finally, we sadly note the loss of two long-time public servants, Dottie Miller, a pillar of Town government; and Norm Stewart, who served 25 years as Fire Chief and many years as Police Chief.

Your Town government is only as good as the people who are willing to commit the time and energy to get involved. Please volunteer.

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1993, and have issued our report thereon dated January 11, 1994.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1993, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

The management of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures in the following categories:

#### ACCOUNTING APPLICATIONS

Budget
Cash and investments
Revenue and receivables
Expenditures for goods and services
and accounts payable
Payroll and related liabilities
Debt and debt service expenditures

For all of the internal control structure categories listed above, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we have reported to the management of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire in a separate letter dated January 11, 1994.

This report is intended for the information of management and the Board of Selectmen. However, this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited.

#### ROAD AGENT REPORT - 1993

Another year has passed and it was a record winter, over 100 inches of snow fell, but even with this unexpected happening other than equipment maintenance, we were able to hold most of the budget in a reasonable total ending figure.

Projects done were; construction of a fuel container building, a bridge on Cross Road AND reconstruction of Reid Road. Graveling in total, Avery Road and King Hill Road. Partial graveling, Russell Station Road, 2nd NH Turnpike North and Candlewood Hill Road. Funds were used for ditching and culvert replacements. Some more areas were covered with quartz material.

Brush cutting and mowing continued to be done on the town roads, major brush projects were two miles 2nd NH Turnpike North, Perley Road, Reid Road, and a start on Dodge Hill Road.

Some of the dirt roads took a rough beating and loss of road surface materials caused by snow storm plowing and the roads not being frozen. Keeping these areas in a state of reasonable maintainability with the added traffic will cost more money as time goes on. For this reason the CIP project on Dodge Hill will be tarred. We have raised the CIP Funds back almost to the original \$50,000.

Equipment wise we purchased a new one ton truck with plow and wing, it is working out fine. This year I am asking to replace the two sanders that are over twelve years old and possibly the 3/4 ton four wheel pickup.

The new year has started out with a bang, lots of snow and ice, equipment has been holding up quite well considering record cold spells. I am looking forward to serving as your Road Agent for my seventh year. I again wish to thank the local community, the road crew, including Dana Robinson who has since left and the Selectmen for their continual support.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT - 1993

I would like to start by thanking the towns people who voted the extra money to purchase a new 4 wheel drive cruiser at last years Town Meeting.

We had planned to purchase a car to replace the old 4 wheel drive Blazer because of the high cost of a new 4 wheel drive. The bid had come in at approximately \$22,000.00. When the Town Meeting voted to give the Department the \$22,000.00 needed I had to go back out to bid. Jim Knight, at Wyman's Chevrolet, found that the state bid list included a 4 wheel drive Blazer. We purchased the new Blazer at state bid cost and the new cruiser cost a total of \$19,734.00. The old cruiser was sold for \$5,500.00 so we had a total outlay of \$14,234.00 and with the weather we have had this winter I'm very happy to have the 4 wheel drive.

I have asked for a budget of \$45,225.00 this year up from \$43,000.00 we had last year. \$1,00.00 of this is to pay for the shared cost of a prosecutor for the serious District Court cases. This service may be provided by the Hillsborough County Attorney's Office at a reduced cost but if not, we may need the \$1,000.00.

The proposed budget is broken down into a number of line items. I have tried to be as realistic as I can with each line item. As in the past few years I have not spend the total budget and hope I will be able to do the same this year. proposed budget is set up so I should not go over. I think it is better to have a little higher budget and give money back than go over. I think the past performance of the Police Department shows that if it is not needed we do not spend it because it is there.

The new computerized Dispatch Center is on line and it shows that our calls are up about 5%. Summons and arrests are about the same, domestic calls are down.

The Department has information on alarms if anyone is interested. We think that alarms are a good idea in a rural setting. If we can help, please call.

We also have a program for the school this year to take a photo and finger prints of the children for the parents to keep. We hope they will never be needed, but we feel that it is important to take precautions. Anyone with pre-school children that would like to have them done can contact Sergeant Thibeault and he will set up an appointment for you.

## FRANCESTOWN SOLID WASTE & TRANSFER STATION REPORT

1993 was a data collection year, with cooperation between town offices, Waste Management and Anheuser-Busch Recycling Corp. The post-consumer use of recycled materials is weak and stronger incentives are needed to encourage manufacturers to re-tool so collectors can be paid for a value added product. Presently virgin materials are relatively inexpensive thus recycled products are not yet profitable or 'break-even'. The agricultural world has broken ground on many items for farm use, such as plastic lumber, fence posts, insulators, etc. to avoid rot and animal chewing. Now we need the rest of the world to catch on.

A few improvements are planned for the Transfer Station during 1994. The compactor will be lowered 18-20 inches to allow for easier waste disposal. The top deck and recycling bin areas will be paved. This will make it easier to clean the area and meet State sanitary regulations. The compost revetment area will be cleaned up and hard-packed so the scrap metal piles will not become contaminated with soil. We will receive a higher price per ton for cleaner materials. Crushed gravel will be placed on the road leading around the burn pile to lessen mud and scrap debris. A new entrance sign and product signs are presently being installed.

The big issue for 1994 is the disposal of household hazardous waste. Francestown last participated in a collection day in 1991 in conjunction with seven other communities at a cost of \$1,200 or \$1/town resident. A separate article on the Town Warrant addresses this necessary expenditure. We need to have these products safely disposed of to protect our earth and the future for our children's children.

The following chart shows how many pounds of materials were taken out of the waste stream by being recycled. For 1993, a total of \$ 2,909.39 was paid into the town's General Fund through the sale of recycled products.

Waste disposal will continue to be costly. This year we shipped approx. 360 tons of municipal solid waste (compacted wet garbage). It is known that more can be extracted from the waste stream and it is imperative that everyone recycle all products possible, including newspapers and corrugated cardboard. Although most residents, as a rule, recycle, some do not. Before we are forced to use clear plastic trash bags to monitor recycling, get wise and follow the three R's - REPAIR, REUSE and RECYCLE!

## 1993 Public Assistance Administrator's Report

General inquiries were up this year as more and more people, especially the elderly on fixed budgets, are feeling financially stressed. In most cases, assets are such that many residents do not meet the strict financial guidelines to receive assistance from the Town. But, in many cases, these people do qualify for Fuel Assistance and Food Stamps, which are federally funded programs. As is the norm, applicants are referred to federal and state agencies to apply for these and other forms of aid. As part of receiving assistance from the town, all applicants must apply to all outside services. The primary function of this office has been in facilitating applicants in accessing outside sources of assistance, if at all possible.

It has been consistent for years that the caseload is comprised of needs for short-term assistance. We have been fortunate in that long-term medical and housing needs have not become the Town's responsibility. Expenditures have been for rental subsidies, utility payments, fuel assistance, and food purchases.

If, at any time during the year, you would like to make donations to others in town, please contact me in advance. This office cannot accommodate the donation of used clothing and furniture but sometimes I do know of individuals needing specific items. To participate in holiday giving, please do a little *pre-planning*. Every year, the day or two before a major holiday calls are received from generous people wanting me to accept their items. Unless an emergency arises, offers to donate a few days before a major holiday can't be adequately addressed as often deliveries have already been made.

Overall, individual donations were down in 1993. This seemed to be the same pattern as felt by many fund-raising organizations this year. On the local level, we did receive a two Thanksgiving baskets prepared by the Masonic Lodge. As the Selectmen again had vetoed the use of available town funds for discretionary spending, two town groups opened their purses and addressed this need. Permission was sought to spend town monies for the purchase for food gift certificates for town residents who are not receiving town assistance but financially are burdened. An article on the Warrant seeks permission to do so in the future. The Francestown Improvement & Historical Society (\$500) and the Masonic Lodge (\$200) generously gave. We are grateful for their support.

Town Girl Scouts (Juniors #557 and Seniors #1367) prepared gift breads, chocolates and ornaments and Seniors Sarah O'Donnell and Krista Berry again accompanied me before Christmas to visit with several senior citizens around town. For the 8th year the Rotary Club of Peterborough conducted OPERATION SANTA for several Francestown families. From Thanksgiving on, at the Francestown Village Store there was the OPERATION SANTA poster asking town residents to pick a card to fulfill a necessary need. Participation from Francestown was again weaker than anticipated. Better cooperation is asked for next year for this worthwhile program. On the brighter side, a few giving folk had me deliver 'SECRET SANTA' gifts to special families/children. For the 3rd year the REALTORS of Sullivan Properties collected donations to enable many townspeople to receive personal care items that cannot be purchased with food stamps. This program accepts donations of cash and products to put together large packages of 'essentials' (soap, shampoo, toilet tissue, cleaning and

laundry supplies, etc.) to distribute to Francestown and New Boston households. Warm thanks to the communicants of the Epiphany Monastery in New Boston for their sharing.

Anyone needing assistance should call me directly (588-2519) to apply for services. Note that all matters are confidential and are not part of the public record. Please call if you have any questions about eligibility requirements for various assistance programs. It is felt that many more community members qualify for food stamps and fuel assistance programs, but people fail to apply for programs that may truly benefit them.

As the NH Municipal Assoc. has updated the guidelines for town assistance, our town guidelines do need updating for financial allotments. A questionnaire will be distributed in the near future to determine Francestown costs. Please fill it out and return it so accurate and timely data is available to determine amounts for housing, food and utility expenses. Anyone who wants to volunteer to help in this necessary task can call me.

## BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT - 1993

The New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and the Francestown Zoning Ordinance gives the Board of Adjustment the power to grant "Special Exceptions" under and "Variances" from the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. The Board is also given the jurisdiction to hear appeals from "Administrative Decisions" involving the interpretation of the Zoning Ordinance. Copies of the Zoning Ordinance, forms for applications and information on filing fees and other charges are available at the Town Offices.

At the start of 1993 the Board consisted of Guy A. Swenson, Jr., Chairman, Herbert Fincher, Vice-Chairman, Richard S. Mikula, Clerk, Richard Kiczek and Nathan Sanderson. Alternates were Gemma Dreher, Dean L. Mottard and Charles Onasch. Mr. Sanderson was forced to resign from the Board in February due to ill health and the Board was saddened by his subsequent death. His common sense and fairness will be missed. The vacancy caused by Mr. Sanderson's resignation was filled by Mr. Onasch. Mary Frances Carey was appointed an alternate. Elizabeth Lee James resigned as recording secretary in August.

An application for a variance was the only matter brought before the Board in 1993. The requested variance was granted.

Regular meetings of the Board of Adjustment are scheduled for the second Thursday of each month. Lack of business resulted in the cancellation of most of the meetings scheduled for 1993. All meetings are open to the public.

### FRANCESTOWN PLANNING BOARD - 1993

During the past year the Board approved one four lot subdivision, three annexations and two consolidations. This activity resulted in one more lot than existed at the beginning of the year. An amended site plan approval was also granted to Tory Pines.

Other activities included preparation of the 1994-1999 Capital Improvement Program - details of which can be found elsewhere in the Town Report - and scenic road hearings for Poor Farm Road, Red House Road and Old County Road South.

As usual, considerable time was spent reviewing various zoning issues. Of the four proposals under consideration, one - the creation of an Historic District - was found to be premature. While the proposal was tabled indefinitely, the Board will continue to monitor the need, and desire, for an Historic District on an on-going basis.

The other three proposals are being submitted to voters as Warrant Articles 2, 3 and 4 on Tuesday, March 8th. The purpose and impact of these proposals are discussed at length in our recent voter information newsletter, If you did not receive a copy - or would like additional information - please contact us.

We would like to thank those of you who have supported the Town by attending our meetings and to give special recognition to members of the Historic District Commission and the Road Improvement Sub-committee for their on-going assistance.

## FRANCESTOWN'S SIX YEAR (1994-1999) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The Town's Capital Improvement Program (CIP), which was updated in January of 1994, serves three basic functions:

- 1. First and foremost, the CIP is a valuable planning tool which should help the Town to anticipate, coordinate and manage its capital expenditures.
- 2. The CIP will provide part of the basis for developing an impact fee system which will require a developer, under certain circumstances, to offset some of the increase cost to the Town caused by his project.
- 3. The CIP will be essential for the development of any growth management ordinances if, in the future, the Town should determine growth management to be necessary.

The CIP for the year 1994 a) reinstates full funding for the basic capital reserve programs, b) provides for completion of the Mill Pond dam, and c) begins to anticipate several new projects not previously addressed by the Town. It is recommended that two new capital reserves, one to fund necessary improvements to town buildings and the other to help accumulate monies for major road projects in the future, be initiated this year. (Two other reserves are recommended for subsequent years: in 1995 a fund for the acquisition of the Red School or of alternative town office space; and in 1997, a fund for the planned expansion of the highway department's garage.)

The other major change in the plan involves a shift in priorities for road projects: Due to an apparent change in traffic patterns and a proposal to make the side access lane to Main Street one-way, work on Oak Hill Road has been postponed indefinitely. Instead, in 1995-6, a major upgrade to Todd Road is planned. To determine the extent of the work required, voters will be asked to help decide whether the road should be designated as one-way or two-way.

Specifics of the 1994 CIP as recommended by the Planning Board are listed in Column 2 of Exhibit 1 on the next page. Also included in Exhibit 1 are the warrants as actually proposed by the departments. Footnotes indicate whether the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend approval of a particular warrant article.

The CIP is prepared - and this summary is provided - to assist you in your decision making. If you would like a copy of the complete plan or have any questions about the plan and how it is prepared, please contact the Planning Board.

# FRANCESTOWN PLANNING BOARD SUB-COMMITTEE REPORT OF ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The Road Improvement Program Sub-Committee was established in May of 1989 by the Planning Board to help develop a long term road improvement program for inclusion in the Capital Improvement Program.

#### PURPOSE:

- To recommend an appropriate sum of money to be spent each year to improve the roads of Francestown.
- To recommend a 6 year plan of roads to be improved, listing roads and work to be done on each.
- To make recommendations to improve the operations of the Highway Department.

#### FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. The original objective of an annual estimated expenditure of \$50,000 has been at a reduced level for the past few years due to economic conditions. This year it is recommended that we return to the original goal.
- 2. In the past, half of the funding for the Capital Improvement projects was reflected in the Highway Department Budget and half was raised by warrant article. It is recommended that, beginning in 1994, the full cost of all road improvement projects be raised by warrant article(s) stating the location and scope of each project.
- 3. It is also recommended that a new Capital Reserve for road improvements be established. The eventual and inevitable expense of reconstructing existing paved roads due to their age, to their condition and to the impact of increasing traffic, should be included in the Town's financial plans.

An appropriation of at least \$5,000 is recommended for this year to initiate the new reserve fund.

#### RECOMMENDED PLAN

(Subject to Annual Review and Update)

#### Year

Reconstruction of Dodge Hill Road from the intersection with South New Boston Road and proceeding for approximately 7/10 of a mile to the existing paved section at the base of the hill leading up to the McKone residence. Project specifications are a 22 foot wide road way (ditch line to ditch line) with an 18 foot wide paved surface and 2 foot wide gravel shoulders.

## The work consists of:

- a) tree cutting: the removal of an estimated 60 trees of 5 inch diameter or greater will be required to obtain the minimum width. In addition several hundred feet along the Van Cleave property line will require extensive removal of small pine trees and brush. This is not a scenic road; no public hearing is legally required in regard to the tree cutting.
- b) excavation and stump removal along sides of existing roadway in order to obtain required width. No stone wall removal necessary.
- c) drainage improvements require: extension, or replacement, of existing 36 inch culvert; extension of head walls at existing 30 inch culvert at foot of paved hill, and; two new 12 inch culverts may be needed.
- d) installation of adequate guard rail at both 30 inch and 36 inch culverts.
- e) place a minimum 12 inch gravel surface 22 feet wide the entire length of the project; a minimum of 4 inch depth of crushed gravel to be applied to course of gravel surface.
- f) pave entire length of project with pug mill mix 18 feet wide.
- g) clean up, mulch and seed all disturbed areas.

\$47,500

Reconstruction (ditching, drainage and paving) of Todd Road and the entrance onto Todd Road from Poor Farm Road. May require some taking of land and moving of stone walls (Phase 1).

\$50,000

Reconstruction (ditching, drainage and paving) of Todd Road (Phase 2).

\$50,000

1997 Reconstruction (ditching, drainage and resurfacing) of Mountain Road. Also widening if traffic warrants (Phase 1).

\$50,000

Reconstruction (graveling, drainage, ditching and resurfacing) of Mountain Road (Phase 2).

Reconstruction (graveling, drainage, ditching and resurfacing) of Pleasant Pond Road (Phase 1). \$50,000

# REPORT OF THE HISTORIAN - 1993

The population of Francestown is 1208. There are 896 person registered to vote: Republican 373, Democratic 203, Libertarian 2, Undeclared 318

There were 36 building permits issued; 7 for residences, 20 for porches/additions, and 9 for barn/garage/storage.

Officers of the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society are; Acting President-Gordon Sherman

lst Vice-President- Katherine Eby 2nd Vice-President-Lillian Harrigan Secretary-B.J. Carbee Treasurer-Pat Place Member at Large-Carol Russell, Alison Whittemore Curator-Judy Danforth.

Francestown held its 76th Annual Labor Day Celebration. theme of the parade this year was, "That was Then, This is Now".

The Society established an acquisition fund for future purchases and has also set moneys aside toward a building fund to house the historical collection. FIHS made donations toward the 1st and 2nd phases of the playground, and for Christmas baskets for those in need. The Society refurbished the town Christmas tree and decorated town buildings with holiday wreaths.

Officers of The Old Meeting House are; President-Derald Radtke Vice-President-Bill Swan Treasurer-Alan Thulander Secretary-Stacy Borden Membership-Richard Leandrie Restoration/General-Wayne McLeod Publicity-Jan Hagan Fund-Raising-Bill Swan Scheduling-Mit Boyle

There were 242 members in 1993, including 35 lifetime members. In January, an endowment fund was established which the group hopes will grow enough so that earnings will support ongoing

costs of operating and maintaining the building.

OMH renovations in 1993 included painting of the lower half of the front of the building, installation of the new outside floodlights and landscaping. In addition, an architectural engineering study was completed to determine further work

needed to update the building.

OMH sponsored many events including; Tom Rush with opening by "Men Without Hair", Robert Olson-Magician, Lady Eve and the Paul Broadnax Trio, a Christmas Concert with Candy Wharton and "The Meeting House Minstrels", and the Immoveable Feast "Francestown Frontier Days".

Art exhibits included; Architectural Drawings by MacStay, "Main Irene Dupont photographs Street and Francestown".

Other events held at OMH included; 11 weddings, a memorial

service, a joint service with the Community Church and the Unitarians, annual Labor Day Vespers, a recital by Candy Wharton's pupils, annual Monadnock Music Concert, and many school programs, including the Red School graduation. Also, many meetings were held at OMH.

The Community Church of Francestown has 80 active and 28 inactive members. Rev. Keta Jones served as minister of the Church activities included the 4th Annual Festival, CROP WALK, monthly senior luncheons, vacation bible school in August, MOM toddler playgroup and the Ladies Guild. The Food Pantry was an ongoing project, helping out the local families in need and the church participated in the annual Turkey Donation to the New Horizon Soup Kitchen Thanksgiving. The church held a car wash to aid Rachel Lunan in the costs of her trip to Russia. She was nominated by her school to participate in the overseas trip. Church members were proud to have the first church entry in

the Labor Day Parade.

Oak Hill Grange has 45 members, including 8 Gold Sheaf members. Heather Kiblin was the Grange Master. Members presented the Community Citizen Award to Herman and Dorothy Miller. The Grange purchased a new U.S. flag for the town. They continue to sponsor the 4-H Club and provide Brownies and Girl Scouts a place to meet and receive awards.

The Francestown Red School included Kindergarten through 4th grade this year. Enrollment for the year ending June 1993 was 110 students. A new addition was built which houses the 3rd grade.

Francestown Community Pre-School continued to operate serving 25 families from 5 area towns. Towns served included; Francestown, Deering, Bennington, Greenfield and New Boston. Students participated in the annual HOP-A-THON with benefits going to St. Jude Hospital.

The Community Theatre had an active year with their 25 members. The spring production included 2 One Act Plays, "The Twelve Pound Look" and "The Old Lady Shows Her Medals". group entered a state competition in June, performing "The Old Lady Shows Her Medals" and came home with Best Actor Award for Mark Holding and Best Organization-Best All-Around for their production. In November the group performed "The Night Is My Enemy".

The Cub Scout group renewed their charter for Francestown in October. Brownies, Junior Girl Scouts, Cadettes and Seniors were involved in many community projects including Christmas Baskets and a May Day Tea for senior residents, managing the refreshment table for the November theater production and a Town Forest project.

The Francestown Volunteer Fire Department meets with 5 members of the Explorers Post interested in firefighting and emergency

medicine.

In February, Francestown completed procedures to take the deed to the ski area for failure to pay back taxes. Selectmen hoped to sell this Francestown property at an auction on August 26th but no one showed up to make a bid.

In mid-summer, the Maitre Jacq' Restaurant closed permanently. In October, the first case of rabies (a raccoon) was reported in town.

To the best of my knowledge, residents who served in the Armed Forces were; Navy-Scott Place, Marines-James R. Amburg, USAF-Richard Kiczek, National Guard-Tim Ainsworth

Francestown felt the loss of several of its residents in 1993.

January 5, 1993- Donald Pettee was a retired businessman, a lifetime resident of the Town and very active in community activities.

January 25, 1993- Bobbi Jo Paige, a 6th grade high honor student at Great Brook School in Antrim was active in 4-H and enjoyed music, camping and horses.

March 5, 1993- Jeanne Gagne had worked for J.F. McElwaine Shoe Company.

May 25, 1993- Frances Pettee had enjoyed retirement in Francestown the past 24 years and was involved with the Community Church, treasurer of Women's Guild of the church and past president of the Francestown/Greenfield Hospital Auxiliary.

June 15, 1993- John Tempone served with the U.S. Navy during WWII, was a lifetime member of the VFW and a member of the Hillsborough Chapter of the American Legion.

July 2, 1993- Carolyn Standish, a longtime resident of Francestown worked as a dietitian and restaurant manager during WWll and volunteered for the Royal Canadian Air Force during the war.

July 8, 1993- Dorothy L. Miller, a longtime resident served as Tax Collector and Deputy Town Clerk for 15 years. She enjoyed many activities including bowling, tennis and golf and was an enthusiastic supporter of all the town ball games.

July 19, 1993- Nathan Sanderson III a decorated U.S. Navy Veteran served in WWII. He had lived in town for 27 years and with his family, founded Kingsbury Hill Riding School. He had served as a member of the Francestown Planning Board and Board of Adjustment.

All will be greatly missed by the community.
