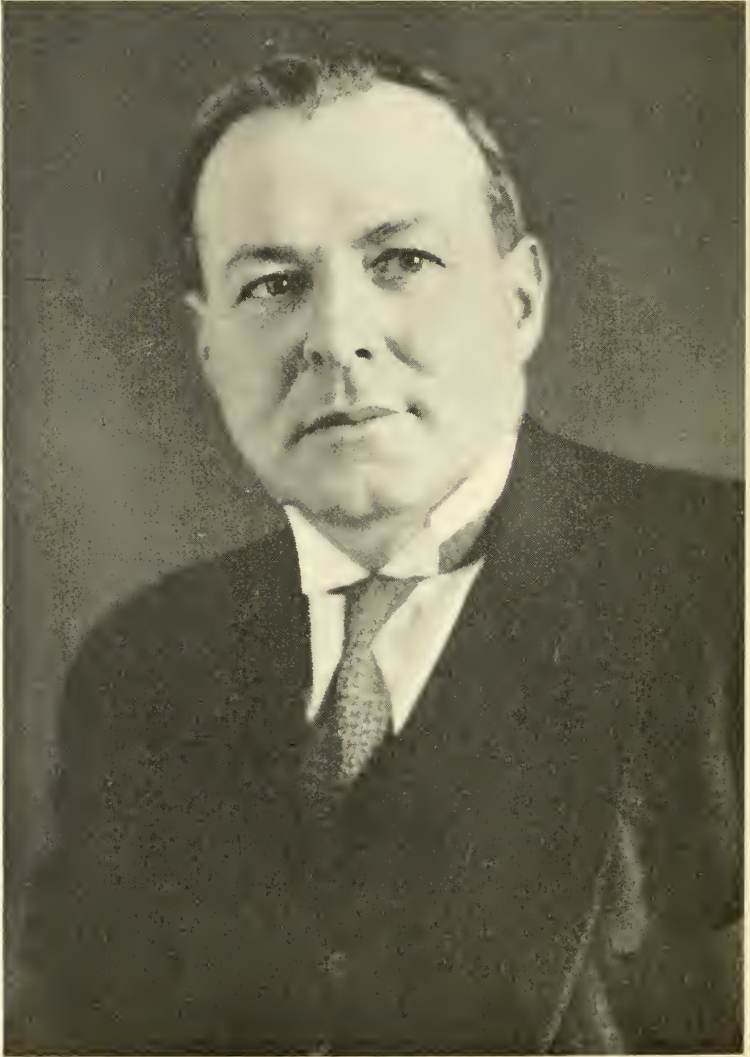

Mayor Lagace's Inaugural

Members of the City Council—My Friends:

The ceremony we are attending tonight is truly significant since it unfolds the noble method of democracy, entrusting in the hands of its public servants, the interests, the peace and happiness of the people.

These are sacred trusts and the oath we have solemnly taken must be a constant reminder that during the municipal year of 1934, the good people of Franklin expect and must be assured, that their officers fulfill to the best ability, their respective duties with the intent purpose of serving wholeheartedly and efficiently the interests of our community.

This pledge, I have taken as your Mayor and with your help and the help of God, I intend to fulfill it.

No matter how small a community may be, it is necessary that its public affairs be administered and safeguarded with all the prudence and wisdom possible.

A City Treasury is only an exchange counter. It earns no money, it spends the money of the people. This means that every dollar paid comes from the tax payer. In these times of particular stress, it would be folly to place the whole burden on the few. The people in this city must work their way back to prosperity, but they must be helped in that task by lessening their load.

Last year, it was found to be impossible to reduce the tax rate, but we believe that it would be a very appreciated service if it could be reduced during the present year.

Let us try to reduce our tax rate where the people can afford to pay their taxes, so that the city can avoid taking tax titles. One of the main items of expenditures during the past many months has been the increasing assistance given to many families as a result of unemployment, but conditions are now more reassuring, but there should be no extravagance on the part of those who are still unassured of a stable salary. No family should go hungry in Franklin, but there should be wisdom and supervision in the distribution of help. Franklin has no place for those who will not help to help themselves.

Many new problems will undoubtedly present themselves during the coming months. They should be handled expeditiously and harmoniously. Every department should function efficiently, but with the strictest economy, for this is no time for extravagance. Every sound improvement should be welcomed in order that the tax payers receive the maximum return for their investment. We should always have in our minds, the fundamental principles that we must spend less than we receive! Pay day comes some day, sure as fate!

The proper functioning of the various departments of a city government depends entirely on its officers who must be competent. Where the public's good is at stake, there should be no room for patronage or favoritism. Public office is a public trust—not a hereditary, private or family possession.

In selecting these public servants, the Mayor and Councilmen must appoint only those who are able to give the city and its people the best disinterested service. With all the citizens of our fair city, I trust that such will be the wholesome attitude of the present city government.

Our rural and city schools require a very large expenditure. This seems necessary in order to comply with the needs of modern education. However, here again, there can be some happy combination and supervision whereby the city can save without impairing the value of our system. The parents should not forget to co-operate with the teachers in order that their children benefit to the utmost. Home atmosphere and training are indispensable to intellectual achievement.

We are proud of our little city. We are happy to live within its fold. All should co-operate to make it a clean, wholesome and happy community. Those few considerations should suffice to assure the citizens of this city, that we, their servants, are determined to remain worthy of their confidence. The City of Franklin must keep its standard high and we sincerely dedicate ourselves to this noble task.

N. B.—No special appropriations were made to cover Bridges, Snow and Garbage Removal. The total cost for these was \$5,897.38 and that accounts in part for the overdraft in the Highway Department. 2 salvage covers, uniforms for 7 men, saws, wrenches, jacks, chains, bars, and other equipment to handle all kinds of emergency calls.

1600 feet 2½ inch hose, 23 long handle shovels, 5 grapples, 6 portable brush fire tanks with pumps, 6 2½-gallon extinguishers

There are four 2½-gallon extinguishers at City Hall and one at the Franklin Passenger Station to be used by any person in the vicinity of these places for fire purposes.

Recommendations

We recommend the purchase of 500 feet of 2½ inch hose, 100 feet of one inch air hose, paint the American Lafrance Truck if possible, 150 feet of 1 inch chemical hose to replace chemical hose on Reo truck which is 13 years old, and becoming leaky, one 1½x1½ inch nozzle and one 1½x2½ inch adapter.

Report of the City Marshal

To the City Council of the City of Franklin:

The police department has been materially improved during the past year. Two new riot guns, two gas billies and a quantity of gas shells have been purchased. The four regular men have been equipped with 38 calibre police positive Colt revolvers, Sam Brown belts and new handcuffs.

Since April 11th an extra officer has been added to the regular force going on duty at 1 p. m. and off at 11 p. m. During the past year the police department has recovered and returned to owners, lost and stolen property valued at \$1,391.32. There have been one hundred and thirty-six automobile accidents reported and investigated in 1934. There have been 342 lodgers accommodated at the local station in the past year.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

Report of Librarian

To the Trustees of the Franklin Public Library:

In the death of ex-Chief Justice Frank Nesmith Parsons, the Library has lost a valuable friend. He was appointed a trustee in 1905, to succeed the Hon. Isaac N. Blodgett, and did much to establish the policy of the early days of the Library. He resigned in 1922, but never lost interest, leaving \$2,000 in his will for the general purposes of the institution, and the promise of a set of New Hampshire State Papers.

This, the third year of a decreased library appropriation, has reduced the supply of popular reading to a tattered remnant. For several years, prior to 1930, the Library spent between \$1,500 and \$1,600 a year for reading, and this was hardly enough for the large circulation. According to authorities in the administration of public libraries, the annual appropriation of towns for the support of their library should be \$1.00 per capita, which would mean \$6,576 for Franklin. Another way of reckoning is .003 cents on the taxed valuation. The State of New Hampshire allows this sum for the support of the University at Durham. If the city of Franklin allowed .001 on each tax dollar, the sum would be \$6,519. As it is the annual appropriation of \$3,800 is not even .0005 cents per year.

There have been unusual repairs on the building and plumbing this year, and had it not been for the ERA which paid for one assistant during the winter months, the library would have been poor indeed.

Few people think of the number of kinds of books that are necessary for a town the size of Franklin. First there are newspapers and magazines for the Readings Rooms. Dictionaries, encyclopaedias, atlases, yearbooks, annual biographies, directories, handbooks of statistics have to be kept up-to-date to be of any use to the public. Books on economics and the social sciences are called for in increasing numbers; useful and fine arts, music and drama, travel and history are required,—it is difficult and expensive to keep up with the main stream of reading.

Libraries have suffered all through the country through the short-sighted policy of classifying them as "luxuries" and "non-essentials", and the money thus saved has been thrown into the

welfare maelstrom. Libraries are essential to welfare, otherwise our Franklin Library for the past year would not show a circulation of over 77,000.

The man who writes a book is a laborer who robs no other man of a job, and the manufacture of that book employs many hands, from the wood-chopper to the final shipping clerk. In the opinion of the Librarian, if every town would appropriate an extra thousand for the purchase of books, it would do more to relieve the depression in this country than any other one thing.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Franklin:

The past year has seen the completion of repairs on the high school building that were begun in December 1933, and the completion of the four-room addition to the Parker Hancock building.

This now permits the first six grades to be housed in the Hancock building and the entire high school building to be utilized for high school work.

The mechanic arts work is now done in the basement of the Hancock building, thus obviating the necessity of high school pupils using so much time going to classes from the high school to junior high. We now have one of the best mechanic arts work shops in New Hampshire.

These improvements and resulting advantages are fully appreciated by all affected by them.

The total enrollment has increased this year, the largest gain being in the junior high school as was the case the year before. A most surprising increase in enrollment is noticed in the ninth grade of the junior high school; the average enrollment in this grade is from 85 to 90; this year it is 134. The large increase has presented several problems not easily solved; where to seat them, how to schedule them without an extra teacher, how to provide for their extra-curricula needs, etc. The problems have been solved though necessitating too large classes for best efficiency in teaching. Probably 110, possibly more of the 134 in ninth grade will go to the high school building next September.

The present senior class numbers 68; if these 68 graduate and 110 enter next fall, it means an increase of 42, an extra room full; there is sufficient room for them but it will necessitate an additional teacher.

Increasing stress is being put on the need of more time being given in the schools to the sciences, sociology, and economics, to meet the educational demands of the present social and economic situation. Headmaster Barrett recommends that sociology and economics each be given a full year instead of one-half year as now. I endorse this recommendation.

While the total enrollment in the high school increases but slightly from year to year, the Commercial and Science curricula are presenting increasingly large enrollments each year. The number taking Science has increased in the last five years as follows: Physics 102%, Chemistry 110%, Biology 38%, while the Commercial increase has practically doubled. With the present number taking these courses the equipment in neither is adequate for efficient work. Biology needs \$600 worth of equipment now; the Commercial room needs \$250 worth.

Judging from the past three years the increase from the incoming class next September in the number taking the Sciences, especially Biology, will not only need still more equipment than mentioned above, but an additional teacher. At present it is necessary for three different teachers to have classes in Biology. This is not conducive to best efficiency. The number taking

Biology next year will undoubtedly require one teacher's full time. The commercial department likewise will need additional teaching help perhaps only for part time.

In the Junior High School, with the same proportionate increase in numbers as this year, there will be needed additional teaching help in the Domestic Arts work for part time at least, as it is unfair to teachers and pupils to have as this year, 56 in a beginners' class in sewing and expect much individual attention or progress. These are matters requiring your consideration in making out this year's budget.

Health

The Federal Government is continuing to furnish milk and cod liver oil for the school children. Two hundred ninety-seven bottles of milk are distributed each day and four hundred thirty-seven children are taking cod liver oil.

Measles and whooping cough have been quite prevalent during the Fall term. The school nurse has been untiring in her efforts to check the spread of these diseases by daily inspection of the pupils, home visits, etc. One hundred sixty-one home visits have been made by the nurse in the interest of the children and her visits have been much appreciated.

The usual examination of children has been very thoroughly conducted and 148 defects corrected; seven families have been provided with clothing; 28 children operated upon for bad tonsils; and glasses procured for seven. The nurse has been very active and decidedly busy.

The expense incurred for operations, glasses, teeth, etc., has been met by contributions from parents, available funds from outside sources, and cooperation of physicians, dentists and oculists.

Adult School

Seven teachers have been provided for the Adult School continued from last year.

One hundred eighty-seven have been enrolled and good interest shown.

Nursery School

A new project sponsored by the government and approved by the local School Board is a Nursery School started December 17th in the Nesmith building with twenty-six children enrolled.

This school has two teachers and a nurse-dietitian.

It is a pleasant, healthful, happy place.

School District Meeting

At the annual School District meeting, December 29th, Charles E. Douphinett received a unanimous reelection and entered upon his third term as a School Board member.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Sanger Scholarship

Resolved by the Board of Education of Franklin:

Whereas, Warren F. Daniell has by his written communication addressed to the Board of Education, expressed his intention of establishing a free scholarship for graduates of the Franklin High School in Simmons College in honor of his mother, and to be known as the "Sanger Scholarship", and agreeing to pay annually a sum sufficient to pay the costs of tuition for one student for four years in any of the courses described in the catalogue of the College, and

Whereas, a student to be awarded this scholarship must comply with the following regulations: First, she must have completed four years' satisfactory work at the Franklin High School; second, her parents must reside in Franklin; third, the student's parents must be unable without undue deprivation to pay the tuition themselves.

Be it resolved: That the Board of Education of the City of Franklin fully appreciate the spirit that prompted Mr. Daniell to establish this scholarship for the benefit of the young women of said city, thereby creating an additional incentive for higher educational advantages: and

Be it further Resolved: That said Board of Education willingly accepts said trust: and

Be it further Resolved: That a permanent Committee on Scholarship shall be established to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the Headmaster of the High School of said city, and

Be it further Resolved: That this resolution shall be printed annually in the school report of said Board.

In June, 1921, I placed with Dartmouth College at Hanover, N. H., a fund of \$2,500.00—the income from which I wished to be used to assist under certain conditions students at that institution who were residents of this city.

It was found incompatible with the methods of disposing of the funds at Dartmouth College, to handle this fund under the con-

ditions which I wished to impose—and for that reason I have transferred this sum from Dartmouth College to the City of Franklin.

I am attaching herewith the securities representing the fund together with a statement of the methods I wish followed in disposing of the income from the fund.

Franklin Student Aid Fund

Established by Walter F. Duffy, June, 1921.

A sum of \$2,500.00 is entrusted to the City of Franklin, N. H., the income from which is to be used to assist worthy boys and girls, residents of this city, to secure a collegiate education or its equivalent.

The recipients of the income from this fund are to be selected by a board of three consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Education, Superintendent of Schools and Principal of the High School of the City of Franklin, N. H.

The income from this fund is to be disposed of under the following fixed conditions:—

I. Scholarship

A student must attain such satisfactory standing in studies as to make it apparent to the authorities of the institution of learning where he attends, that it is advisable that the student pursue his studies and that he is on this account worthy of financial aid.

II. Financial Needs

It is to be required that the students who receive benefit from this fund shall be obliged, through lack of family financial resources, to earn at least a substantial part of the money necessary to meet the expenses of their attendance upon their studies.

III. General Restrictions

It is to be understood that in allotting the proceeds of the fund, preference is to be given to students at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H., who are residents of the City of Franklin, N. H. If no such students apply for the benefits of this fund, then the income can be used to assist any boys or girls who are residents of the City of Franklin, N. H., and who are pursuing a course of studies in any institution of learning giving a collegiate education

or its equivalent, provided that the first two conditions covering the disposition of the benefits of this fund are fulfilled.

It is also to be understood that the income from this fund may be divided between two or more students, and that any students who receive financial aid from the institutions of learning where they attend are not thereby prevented from receiving aid from this fund.

If no students fulfilling the above requirements apply for the benefit of this fund the proceeds may be used as they accrue each year as seems best to the three persons mentioned above for the general educational good of the citizens of Franklin, N. H.

Daniell Scholarship

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

A resolution relating to the "Daniell Scholarship".

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Franklin, as follows:

Whereas, Jere R. Daniell of New London, Connecticut, on the second day of April 1914, by his written communication of that date, addressed to the Mayor and Council of the City of Franklin, expressed his intention of establishing a free scholarship for graduates of the Franklin High School to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, in memory of his father, the late Warren F. Daniell, and to be known as the "Daniell Scholarship", and together with his letter of the 16th of May, 1914, in which he agreed to give the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars each and every year, hereafter, beginning September 1st, 1914, to cover the cost of tuition for one student for four years in any one of the courses described in the catalogue of the Institute, and,

That a student to be awarded this scholarship, in whole or in part, must comply with the following named conditions:

First. He must have completed four years' satisfactory work at the Franklin High School.

Second. His parents or parent must reside in Franklin, and be unable without undue deprivation, to pay the tuition required themselves.

Third. He must show during his four years' work at the High School, marked ability in some one of the several subjects covered by the Institute courses.

In case several candidates present themselves in any one year, the scholarship will be awarded by competition in the entrance examinations for the Institute. The candidate entering with highest standing to receive the award.

A holder of the scholarship will be expected to maintain the same standard of work at the Institute as that required of holders of regular Institute Scholarships and the scholarship will be withdrawn in case the work is unsatisfactory.

The right is reserved to divide the amount of the scholarship among several applicants should such action seem desirable.

Be it Resolved, That the City of Franklin fully appreciates the spirit that prompted Mr. Daniell to establish this scholarship for the benefit of the young men of said city, thereby creating an additional incentive for higher educational advantages in those who through misfortune or adversity would otherwise be prevented from obtaining the same; and

Be it further Resolved, That said City willingly accepts said trust, and does hereby direct that the annual payment of the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars shall be made to the City Treasurer, who shall pay the annual tuition of said student or students upon the presentation of the bill for same by the Bureau of the Institute, and,

Be it further Resolved, That a Permanent Committee on Scholarship shall be established to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the Principal of the High School of said City of Franklin, and

Be it further Resolved, That this resolution shall annually be printed in the reports of said city.

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four (4) per cent. per annum payable semi-annually and be sold to the United States of America at not less than par and accrued interest in accordance with said Agreement, and shall be in said form as approved by the United States and prepared under the supervision of said First National Bank.

Resolved Further, that the provisions of resolutions passed by the City Council November 27, 1933 and February 26, 1934 relating to the Agreement between the United States and the City of Franklin for a loan and grant for an addition to the Parker Hancock School Building, P. W. A. ORDINANCE

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-four.

An ordinance relating to the use of fire resisting roof covering.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Franklin, as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation, shall cover or recover the roof of any building within the fire zone of the City of Franklin unless fire resisting roof covering is used for that purpose.

Section 2. Exceptions. Roofs may be repaired or recovered with material similar to original covering, provided such repairs do not exceed 25% of the area of same.

Section 3. Fire Zones may be designated by the Chief of the Fire Department with the approval of the Fire Committee.

Section 4. Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
