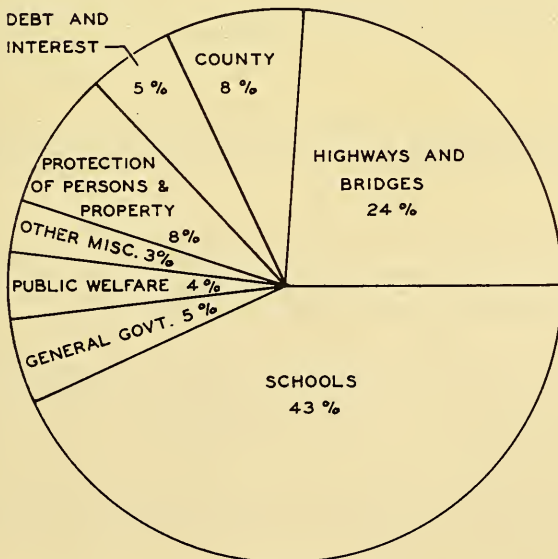

1952 Town Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Goffstown Village on Tuesday, the Eleventh Day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Polls for voting to open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and close at six o'clock in the afternoon.

1. To choose all Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Goffstown Public Library.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and improvement in our cemeteries.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred (\$2500.00) Dollars, to lay out a new Cemetery across the highway from Westlawn Cemetery on land now owned by the Town.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars for the suppression of the White Pine Blister Rust.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow at times such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement and maintenance of Barnard playground, Pinardville Playground, and care of Commons.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by Town through the Tax Collector's Deed or by gift.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five Roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Forty-seven and 08/100 (\$1,247.08), the State to contribute Eight Thousand Three Hundred thirteen and 84/100 (\$8,313.84) Dollars.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have the shade trees on our streets or highways pruned or sprayed as are found diseased, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to close the Village Precinct Area to all Hunting and to cause notice to be posted in proper places. Inserted by petition.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars to fence and complete the Pinardville Playground. Inserted by petition.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars for the installation of a new heating plant at the Pinardville Fire Station.

16. To see if the Town will vote to install five (5) lights on the New Boston Road between the residence of Fred Cook and John Salo. Inserted by petition.

17. To see if the Town will vote to install Street Lights at the following locations: One on Laurier Street, One at the corner of Mast Road and McGuigan Road, One at the corner of Maplewood and Glenridge Avenue, Five lights on Orchard Street, One on Shirley Hill Road opposite the College cow barn, One near Heald Street and One opposite the Lynch house. These are inserted by petition.

18. To see if the Town will vote to install a hydrant at the corner of Maplewood and Glenridge Avenue. Inserted by petition.

19. To see if the Town will vote to complete Laurel Street. Inserted by petition.
20. To see if the Town will vote to repair and oil Elmwood Avenue between Rockland and Laurel Avenues. Inserted by petition.
21. To see if the Town will vote to accept and lay out Warren Avenue from Heald Street to land of Rudolph Blouin. Inserted by petition.
22. To see if the Town will vote to install catch basins and surface drains on Rosemont Street, Rockland Avenue, and Mast Road. Inserted by petition.
23. To see if the Town will vote to accept by gift a piece of land from Azarias Charest, Joseph Plourde, and Francis Desrochers and lay out and extend Fairview Street to the residence of Azarias Charest. Inserted by petition.
24. To see if the Town will vote to accept, lay out, and maintain Park Avenue and Jolly Seven Road from the Lynchville Park Road to a point at the end of land of Alfred Morin, a distance of about six hundred (600) feet and raise and appropriate money for the same. Inserted by petition.
25. To see if the Town will vote to resurface with asphalt Lynchville Park Road from the Mast Road to a point of land of the Boston and Maine Railroad, a distance of about One Thousand sixty-five (1,065) feet and raise and appropriate money for same. Inserted by petition.
26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred (\$800.00) Dollars to gravel and improve the Moose Club Park Roads. Inserted by petition.
27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to have the rubbish in the Pinardville section collected weekly. Inserted by petition.
28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen upon petition to them by ten legal voters, to install Street lights when and where in their judgment lights are required.
29. To see if the Town will vote to procure a piece of land from the B. & M. R. R. and to extend Depot Street to the residence of Harold Makarias, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of highways and bridges and all other necessary Town expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount for Memorial Day.

31. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors and Committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

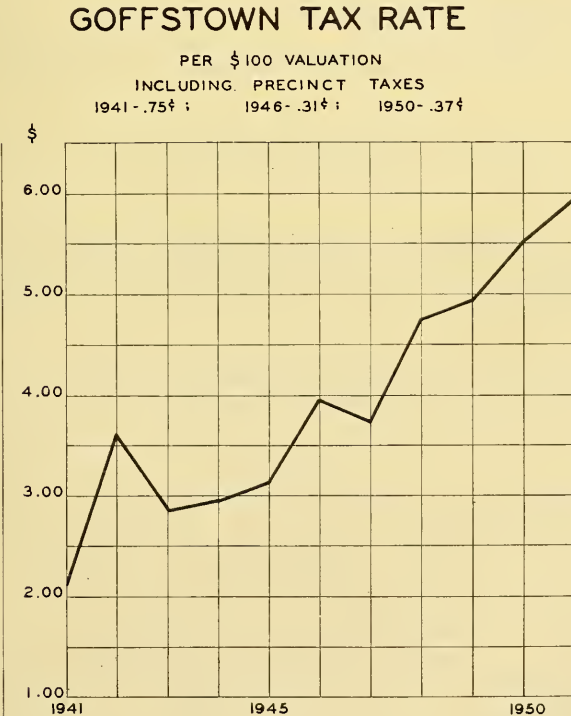
32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Goffstown, N. H. — March 13, 1951

Article One of the Warrant read and Check List posted.

Gordon it was voted that Polls now be opened for voting, that the balance of the Warrant be read and article two to thirty-five (2 to 35) be acted upon at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, that the polls close at 6:00 o'clock and that our next Annual Town meeting be opened at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon.

Resolutions on Retirement of Justice

Alfred W. Poore

Whereas, on December 15, 1950 the Hon. Alfred W. Poore retired from 35 years as Justice of the Goffstown Municipal Court and from 28 years service as town Moderator and Whereas this long tenure of public service has been distinguished, not only by the many years, but also by sincere, humane and fair dealing toward all with whom he has come in contact, be it Resolved that we, the citizens of the Town of Goffstown, N.H., express our most sincere admiration and respect for this devoted and faithful service and be it further Resolved that the Clerk transmit a copy of these Resolutions to Alfred W. Poore duly signed for the Town by its Selectmen.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to Raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for the Public Library.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for maintenance and improvement in our Cemeteries.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to dismiss this article regarding White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 5. Voted that the Selectmen be empowered to borrow at times as needed such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by Town through the Tax Collector's Deed or by gifts.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum of One Thousand Dollars for the improvement and maintenance of Barnard Playground and care of the Commons.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to dismiss this article regarding flooding the skating rink on Church Street.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to accept State Aid for the improvement of Class Five Roads and to Raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred sixty-four and 75/100 (\$1,264.75) Dollars, the State to contribute Five Thousand Fifty-nine and 01/100 (\$5,059.01) Dollars.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to have the shade trees on our Streets or highways pruned or sprayed as are found diseased and raise and appropriate Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for the same.

ARTICLES 12-13. Voted to combine Articles 12 and 13 and raise and appropriate money to maintain Hydrants at the corner of Shirley Hill Road and Bedford Road and at Mountain Road from the Precinct line to and including the residence of Avery Veino.

ARTICLES 14-22-23. Voted to accept Articles 14-22 and 23 regarding installing catch basins, laying out and surfacing Streets and leave to the discretion of the Selectmen.

ARTICLES 15-16-17-18-19-20-21. Voted to combine Articles 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 and accept same and leave to the discretion of the Selectmen as to installing Street Lights.

ARTICLE 24. Voted to dismiss this article regarding gift of land for right of way.

ARTICLE 25. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for the purchase of land and equipment for a playground in Pinardville and leave it to the discretion of the Selectmen combining same with the Playground Commissioners.

ARTICLE 26. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred forty-five and 45/100 (\$17,845.45) Dollars for the Maintenance of Fire Department.

ARTICLE 27. Voted to accept recommendation of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars to purchase a Fire Truck for the District of Pinardville.

ARTICLE 28. Voted to raise and appropriate Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to number the houses and Lots on Streets in congested areas of the Pinardville District.

ARTICLE 29. Regarding a Water System for Grasmere was voted by Ballot as follows:

ARTICLE 30. Voted to postpone action indefinitely on Zoning Ordinance proposed by Town Planning Board.

ARTICLE 31. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars to purchase a right of way for the extension of Moose Club Park Road over the land known as the L. T. Barnard property and to lay out and accept said road.

ARTICLE 32. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred (\$700.00) Dollars to paint the Town Hall at Grasmere.

ARTICLE 33. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Forty-five Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-four (\$145,684.00) Dollars Plus County Tax for the support of the poor Construction and maintenance of Highways and Bridges and all other necessary Town expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 34. Voted to accept the Town Report as printed and reports of all various Committees as published.

ARTICLE 35. A Vote of Thanks given to the Moderator, Gardner Lamson for the efficient manner in conducting the Town Meeting.

A. Kenneth Hambleton was appointed a Member of the Town Report Committee by the Moderator.

Voted the Moderator appoint a Committee of Three (3) to investigate the advisability of bringing Town Histories up to date and bring in recommendation to the next Town Meeting.

Appointed as follows:

Carl B. Pattee, Alfred W. Poore and Elizabeth Holt.

Selectmen's Report

To the Citizens of the Town of Goffstown:

Every citizen of Goffstown should have a full realization that they are no longer living in a small town. With each passing year the problems of government become more complex and more costly. Our continual growth necessitates expansion on the part of every town department. New houses in most cases require new streets or improvement of old; sewerage, water and street lighting are regarded as necessities. Growing pains extend even farther, adding to the problems of the assessors, tax collector and clerical help. Rural areas are demanding many of the services that for years have been furnished only to the more populated areas. Our rapid growth and inflated economy make it impossible for us to meet in full the ever increasing demands on every department.

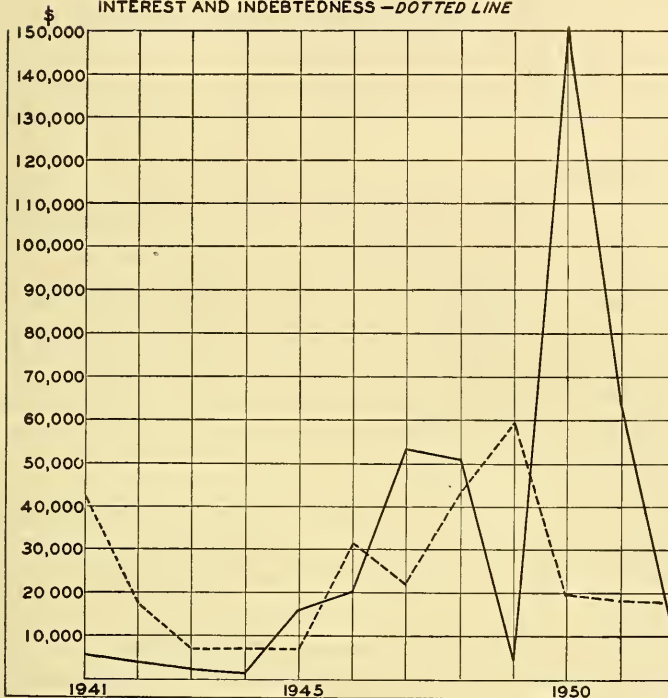
In spite of these uncontrollable factors, your town government has been able to keep within its budget for the past year. Every effort is being made toward economy and still furnish the services necessary, always keeping in mind the ultimate cost to the tax payers.

During the year most of the work for which appropriations were made at the last town meeting has been accomplished. The largest single project was extensions of the Goffstown village sewer system. The following streets now have this service as a result of last summer's work; Second Ave., a portion of South Mast Street extending easterly from the entrance to the playground, including Shirley Station, East Union and extension of Church Street. Each of these areas presented unforeseen problems which made it necessary to depart somewhat from our original plans. All extensions were in compliance with our long range planning which will necessitate a disposal plant in the near future. The entire needs of the village can not be realized until a plant is installed.

All houses and lots in the thickly settled areas of Pinardville have been numbered. Gerald Hyde and Byron Bartlett did an excellent job and as a result the town now has a com-

plete map and directory of this section of town. This information will prove of outstanding value to the selectmen, tax collector and police, as well as other department heads.

Horace Shirley, our road agent, has continued in his work with excellent results. A number of new roads were laid out and many others were given either tarvia or gravel. State aid was used in the improvement of several sections of class five roads.

New street lights and hydrants were installed in various locations in compliance with the vote at town meeting.

All of the town-owned shade trees were sprayed and many others at private expense.

A right of way for the extension of Moose Club Park Road was purchased from Mrs. Verna Barnard.

In cooperation with the school department the Grasmere town hall and school were given a fresh coat of paint. The work of painting the Grasmere bridge, which was started last fall, was also completed in an excellent manner.

In order that healthful conditions be maintained at the village dump, it was deemed advisable to have the area fenced and regular hours posted. This plan has been most successful.

It is a certainty that Goffstown will continue to grow, and we as citizens would do well to consider some of the steps that must be taken in the not too distant future.

Disposal of sewage in the village area is a problem which, to the best of our knowledge, is close at hand. It can only be solved by a disposal plant—an extremely expensive undertaking. Our water commissioners have for some time been working with the problem of a new source of water storage on the north side of the river.

There are but a few lots left in the Grasmere and Goffstown cemeteries. Work must begin immediately in the village to develop the land across the street from the present cemetery.

With the help of state and Federal aid, plans are being made for the rebuilding of High Street. Three years will be necessary in order to accumulate the estimated funds needed for this project. Plans would also include surface drains and sewerage for this area.

The Pinardville area is badly in need of much new road construction, surface drains, as well as extensions of the present sewer system.

New building construction should also be considered in our plans for the future. They include new schools, completion of the town hall, and a new fire house.

If we are to successfully meet the problems of the future, foresight, wise planning and cooperation will be required on the part of every citizen. Goffstown is no longer a small town, but a rapidly growing community, and its citizens must grow with it if progress is to be fully realized.

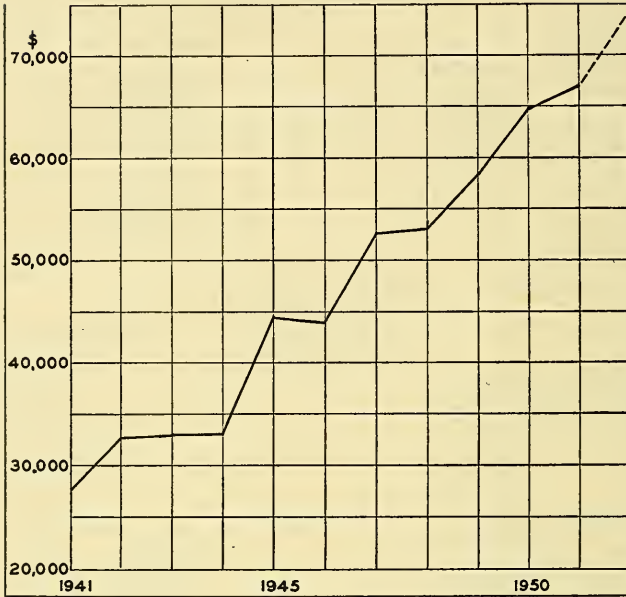

Report of Barnard Playground

Trustees

The committee's efforts during 1951 centered about the operation of a summer program for children at the Barnard Playground. This program was under leadership of Robert W. Chase of Springfield College, Massachusetts. Through arrangement with the Red Cross, Mr. Chase's services were made available to the Water Safety Council for assistance in swimming instruction at the mountain base, giving continuity of leadership in playground and swimming classes for children of the town, and proved very satisfactory.

Besides regular playground activities, special events included a pet show, bicycle rodeo, trip to Braves Field, Boston, joint program and competitive games with the Manchester Y. M. C. A. boys' department, and intra-town competition was started on a league basis with youngsters of the Pinardville area, in which a great deal of interest was shown.

Repairs and maintenance included: loam fill on the baseball diamond infield; new section of wire fence on the tennis courts; new basketball backboards and hoops; repair and painting of the equipment room; new net for the clay court; miscellaneous small playground equipment.

It is the feeling of the committee that items for consideration during the coming year should include: wire guards over all lights to discourage breakage from vandalism; clay topping for tennis court; repair of bridge over pond dam which is hazardous for children crossing; repair and painting of grandstand structure; strengthening of the equipment room to discourage breaking and entering.

A supervised playground program is again planned for 1952.

Funds available within the committee's budget were sufficient, in addition, to cover care and maintenance of the Shirley and village commons as well as to begin a cooperative effort with the Garden Club in planting and improving the appearance of the memorial common.

While funds for specific improvements under consideration by the committee would be desirable, it is our feeling that in view of present circumstances the committee can con-

tinue to carry out its responsibilities within its current budget and ought not to ask for any increased appropriation.

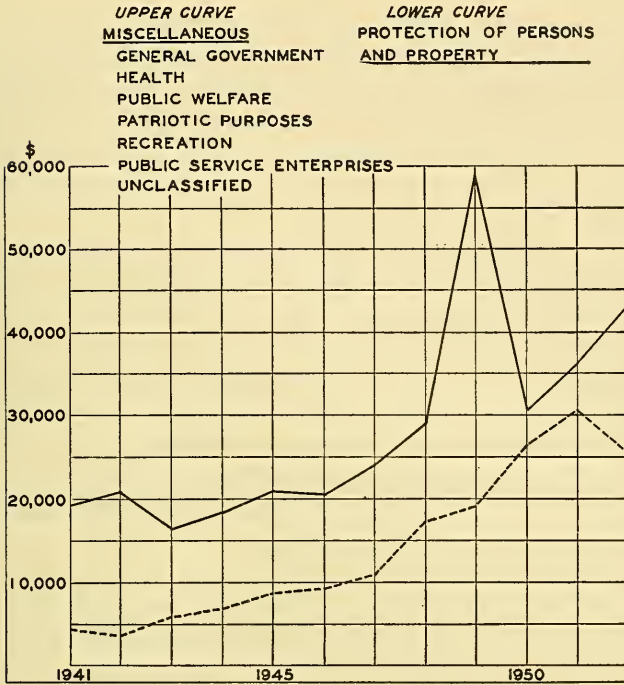

Report of Forest Fire Warden

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call, "I don't care", he is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called, "I don't know any better", and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountains streams clear, your cooperation is needed by:

1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.
3. Never burn in dry, windy weather.
4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.
5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe ashes are out before discarding.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

Annual Report of the School Board

A very serious situation relative to additional classroom space confronts the school district. Because of this, the School Board feels that the important features of the problems, and some possible solutions, should be incorporated in the annual town report.

Many of us remember the report of the building committee submitted to the adjourned school district meeting held on October 6, 1951. Their findings, relative to the need for additional classroom space to house future grades and classes, were based on the 1950 census figures. Members of the School Board have recently made a study of the 1951 census figures. These merely confirm what was already known. The children are here; they have been counted. The school they will attend is known, and it is definite that available classroom space will not provide for the groups entering the schools in the immediate future. In fact at the present time we should have two additional rooms to relieve the crowded conditions at the village.

In considering this problem, we of the Board feel that a long range point of view has merit in the way of good economy and educational practice. In general, we look forward to the following developments:

THE GRASMERE SCHOOL

1. Until the fall of 1955, Grades 1-6 can continue as at present.
2. From 1955 on, Grade 6 must be housed at Bartlett or the Village.

BARTLETT SCHOOL

1. Until the fall of 1955, Grades 1 through 8 can continue as now operated.
2. From 1955 on, all grades 7 and 8 from Bartlett and Grasmere must be housed at the Village.

THE VILLAGE

1. Beginning in 1955, all grades 7 and 8 of the town must be housed in the village.
2. By 1960, the present Village plant will house only Grades 7-12.

3. All Grades 1-6 will be housed either in the White Building and a new 6-room unit, or in a new 12-room unit.

An independent study of the additional room needs for each school has been made, but for the sake of brevity in this report, they are combined in the following table:

Note: Census figures are not available after 1957, and for that reason the same number of elementary rooms are carried for the period 1958-59 and 1959-60.

The number of rooms in the above table has been arrived at by taking the children now living in the town, arranging them in their grades for the different years and providing a room for each grade or a combination of grades.

It should be noted that no provision has been made for any unforeseen growth in the community, such as has taken place over the past few years.

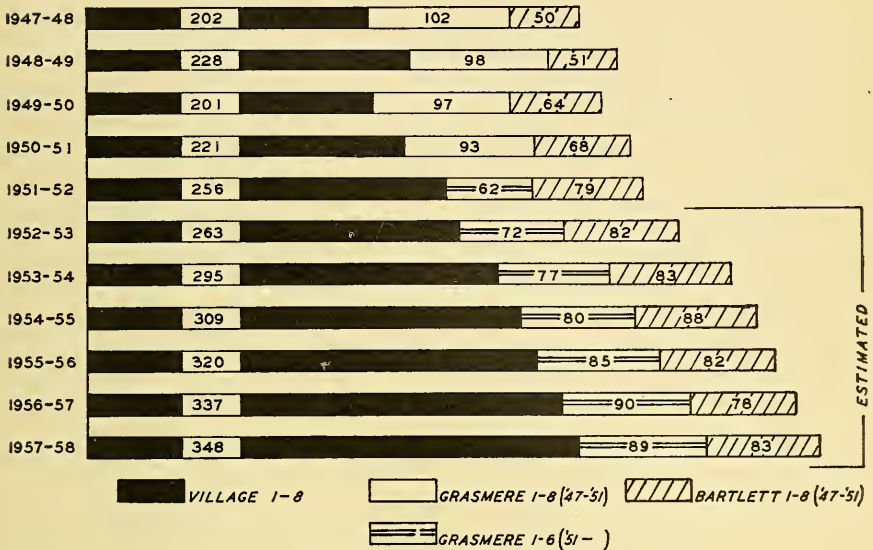
With a picture of our needs in mind, we come to the problem of the best and most economical plan to provide this space. A sub-committee of the School Board has spent considerable time studying this problem. It was finally decided that the voters should be given an opportunity to consider three possible solutions. Two of the plans include the use of the White Building, the other does not.

All three plans were set up to be financed over a period of twenty-eight years in order to get comparative costs.

PLAN A

1. Temporary use of the White Building for 8 years.
2. Construction of Unit No. 1 in 1954—six classrooms.
3. Additional Units as needed in 1960—probably six classrooms.
4. Abandonment of White Building upon completion of item No. 3.

PLAN B

1. No further use of the White Building.
2. Construction of Unit No. 1 in 1952—eight classrooms with two left unfinished for future development, and additional rooms as needed.

PLAN C

1. Reconditioning of White Building in 1952 for long time use.

2. Construction of a new six-room unit in 1954 or 1955.

Tables showing the estimated construction and operational costs have been carefully prepared by the School Board. A summary of these costs indicate that—

1. Capital Outlay is least expensive under Plan C, followed by Plan B and Plan A in increasing order.
2. Operational Costs particular or incident to each plan, shows Plan B to be the least expensive, followed by Plan A and Plan C.
3. If we combine the Capital Outlay and Operational Costs, we find Plan B and C equal, and Plan A the more ex-

pensive, the latter plan increasing the tax rate some 30c per \$1,000 per year over either of the other two plans.

In light of the above facts, the school board is of the opinion that new construction is the most economical from a long range point of view. This is brought about by the savings in operational costs in a single unit over that of two units. The board also recognizes the educational advantages derived from a single unit compared to that of two separate units.

The school board is definitely opposed to making temporary repairs to the White Building as proposed by the citizens committee of 1951 since such proposed repairs only partially meet the recommendations of the State Board of Education and the State Fire Marshall as reported to the School Board in January, 1951.

Under date of January 9, 1951 the State Fire Marshall stated that "the following recommendations are hereby given for your consideration:

1. *Automatic Sprinklers*: The installation of automatic sprinklers will be the most satisfactory method of compensating for construction deficiencies of this building.
2. *Fire and Smoke Proof Stairway*: (Enclosure of cinder blocks or equal and steel stairs.) This building has only one stairway from the basement to the third floor. Should fire occur in the basement or first floor it would trap all children occupying the second floor. Smoke and gases kill more persons than actual fire. Children can enter this (recommended) type of stairway from either of the two floors and basement and be protected while vacating the building.
3. *Heating Plant*: The heating plant should be segregated from the rest of the building. It should be enclosed by fire-proof materials such as cinder blocks or equal with a concrete slab above and only one entrance to the enclosure and this through a door to the outside.
4. *Wiring*: A large part of the existing wiring is of the so-called "knob and tube" type with a mixing of BX cable and Romex. Most of this wiring has been in for years and should be replaced. Any one of the before-mentioned types are all right, but these types where

they are mixed in a circuit can provoke a lot of trouble and this trouble can be the cause of a fire. Therefore, all of the old and mixed wiring should be pulled out and replaced with new wiring not smaller than No. 12.

5. *Fire Stops*: This building is of so-called "balloon" type construction meaning that practically all partitions are open from the basement to attic. Fire stops should be placed between the studding in the partitions at each floor or ceiling level.
6. *Ventilation, Pipe and Air Ducts*: There are numerous ducts of this type throughout the building and these should be blocked off to gain the same results as fire stopping in the partitions. It is such flues as these that spread fire unnoticed throughout a building only to break out all over the building at the same time.
7. *Chimney*: The existing chimney is cracked from the top of same down to approximately the second floor. Therefore it should be repaired before it becomes any worse.

Resumc: The one and only stairway which is in the center of the building is narrow and in very poor condition; the treads are badly worn which could cause tripping; there is a handrail on one side only, and in case of emergency, some children would have nothing to grab onto in case of tripping.

These stairs are not continuous from one floor to another due to obstructions in the stairway, namely children using these stairs have to detour around rooms and closets and if this stairway became full of smoke, the children could become confused in their exit or become trapped in some of the corners. All closets or spaces under any stairs should be abolished.

There should be a self-closing door at the bottom of the basement stairs. If the basement is to be used by the children for indoor recess or cafeteria, another exit to the outside should be provided.

The third floor should be sealed off with only a small door or scuttle securely locked at all times.

Existing fire escapes are not in the right location. They are too close to the center stairway, and children in the west up-stairs room would be cut off from their use should smoke

or fire fill the center stairway. These fire escapes should be removed from their present location and installed on the ends of the east and west wings of the building.

If this building is to be put back into use, the children should have some of the fire protection which the children attending school in the adjacent building now enjoy."

The State Board of Education in its letter of January 15, 1951 stated that "in order to meet the requirements of a standard school as required in New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 135, Section 24, the following changes should be made:

1. The present heating plant should be replaced since it is now obsolete and in a condition which cannot be repaired.
2. The natural lighting should be corrected to provide a ratio of glass to floor area of 1-5. This will probably mean a bank of new sash in the longest wall of each classroom without any windows in the front of the room.
3. Adequate artificial lighting to provide a minimum of 35 foot candles of light on the pupils' desks. This may be of either the incandescent or fluorescent type.
4. A complete renovation of the central stairwell to provide safe corridor and exit facilities. The present fire escape from the main central corridor cannot be considered a satisfactory emergency exit since any fire originating in the central vestibule would block both means of exit at the same time.
5. The classroom walls and ceilings are in poor condition. They should be completely renovated by either patching and painting or renewed.
6. It would appear that the present toilets were in such condition that they would need to be replaced. The number of fixtures for the building is satisfactory except that lavatories and drinking fountains would need to be supplied for the building."

It is the opinion of the School Board that the above recommendations can not be carried out for the \$25,000 or \$30,000 proposed at the adjourned meeting of October 1951.

Report Of School Superintendent

To the Citizens of Goffstown:

I hereby submit my annual report as superintendent of the schools of Goffstown.

School Year 1951-52

Teaching Staff: The current school year opened with no changes in our elementary school personnel over that of the prior school year. One additional teacher was secured for the new 7th and 8th grade unit installed at the Bartlett School, to which were transported the corresponding group from the Grasmere area. Mr. Douglas L. Robertson, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was employed as teacher.

The high school staff saw four changes. Mrs. Phyllis Plumpton and Mrs. Alberta Wood withdrew from the teaching field. Miss Virginia Schroeder returned to college to continue her graduate study, and Mr. Paul Nutter accepted a position in the public schools of Barre, Vermont. These four teachers were replaced by Mrs. Ruth Cross in Commerce, Miss Carolyn Wyman in Home Economics, Mrs. Elsie Bowler in English, and Mr. Richard Dunbar in Manual Arts. Mrs. Cross and Miss Wyman came to us with experience in other New Hampshire High Schools. Mrs. Bowler and Mr. Dunbar were both graduated in 1951 from Keene Teachers College.

An additional teacher was also added to the high school staff. Finding it necessary to separate the mathematics and science load previously carried (for the most part) by Mr. Knowles, Mr. Donald Thompson, a graduate of Wayne University and with graduate credit at other institutions, was employed as instructor in the science field.

As of December 30, Miss Edith Walker retired as our school nurse. Miss Walker began her duties in 1924, and her 27 years of service have been years of loyal and conscientious effort for the health and welfare of "her boys and girls." The School Boards of Goffstown, Dunbarton, New Boston, and Weare selected Mrs. Beatrice Bockus of South Weare to replace Miss Walker. Mrs. Bockus comes to us well prepared and well recommended for the work of a school nurse.

One other change in our teaching staff occurred early in

February when Mrs. Dorothy Killackey, teacher of the sixth grade at the village, asked to be released from her contract. Mr. Luther McLeod, a recent graduate of Keene Teachers College, replaced Mrs. Killackey.

Enrollment: Our enrollment figures for the current year closely approximate the anticipated enrollment as reported to you a year ago. Our present total of 564 pupils in all grades and all schools is some 13.7% above our average daily membership of 1950-51.

As intimated above, due to the crowded condition at the Grasmere School, the School Board decided to set up a 7th and 8th grade room at Bartlett, and provide transportation from Grasmere for pupils in those grades. This arrangement permitted two grades per room at Grasmere, and a reduction from four grades per room at Bartlett to a maximum of three. It is obvious that with fewer grades per unit, the teachers are able to give more effective instruction.

The village enrollment in Grades 1-6 continued to present a problem. With 47 pupils in Grade 1, and no space available in which to set up another unit, it was necessary to secure assistance for the first grade teacher. We were very fortunate in being able to have the services of Mrs. Ethel Vittum, a former teacher in our system, to assume some of the instructional load.

School Year 1952-53

The report of your School Board which will be found elsewhere in your town report adequately covers our housing needs in the years immediately before us. In brief, we are at the present time in need of additional space to adequately handle our present school population in the village. We have need this present school year for several more rooms,—the high school is conducting classes in areas which are not conducive to good teaching, the sixth grade is at present in a small room adjacent to the auditorium, and, as mentioned above, the first grade should be sub-divided.

Next fall's enrollments at the village indicate that we must have space available for a second section of grade 1, a second section of grade 2, and other quarters for grade 6, since the present room is not large enough to care for any existing grade next fall.

For more detailed information on our housing problem,

may I refer you to (1) the report of your school board in this annual report, (2) the report of the superintendent and school board made in last year's report, and (3) the several graphs contained on these pages,—all of which should be carefully studied by every citizen of our town.

The 1952 Warrant

The warrant to be presented for your consideration at the annual meeting calls for an additional high school teacher to meet the increased number of pupils expected next fall, and two additional teachers in the village elementary school to carry the subdivisions of grades 1 and 2. (It is also not improbable that we may need to further sub-divide the combination grades at Grasmere and Bartlett Schools.)

You will also note that the budget of the School Board contains under "equipment" an item for auditorium bleachers. During the past three years we have rented bleachers, but the board has been informed that such an arrangement will not be possible another year. We will, therefore, need to provide a local solution of the problem.

Conclusion

The schools of the nation are facing trying and difficult years. They are faced not only with the problem of inflation and its effect upon the school budget, but the schools are also confronted with increasing numbers of pupils and the need for additional qualified elementary teachers. It is estimated that in New Hampshire alone, there will be 3200 more pupils in our schools next fall than are now enrolled. With but 100 potential teachers to be graduated from our teachers colleges next June, and a normal of 150-200 needed to replace teachers leaving the teaching service in the state, it can be seen that there will not be sufficient teachers available to properly staff our schools.

I sincerely feel that we have been very fortunate in our teaching staff. Their sincere efforts on behalf of their pupils should not go unnoticed nor unappreciated by the communities in which they work.

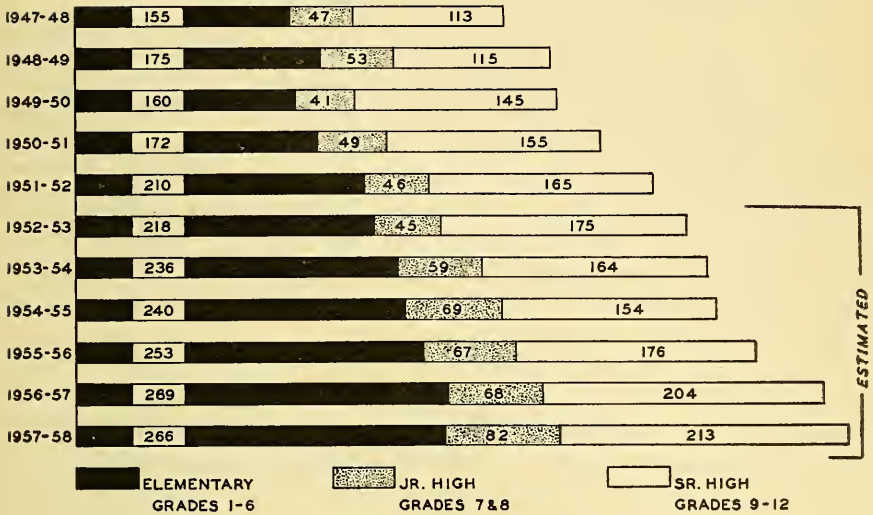
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School in said district on the 15th day of March, 1952, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose two members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose one member of the School Board for the ensuing year.
5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
8. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
10. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip a new elementary school, to secure the services of an architect, and to purchase any land which may be necessary to locate such building.

11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new elementary school building and for the purchase of any land which may be necessary to locate such building, and for the services of an architect, such sum to be raised through the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute and all amendments thereto including Chapter 5 of the New Hampshire Sessions Laws of 1951, and to authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such serial bonds or notes and to determine the time and place of payment thereof.

12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper, and advisable in connection with the action taken on Articles 10 and 11.

13. To see if the district will vote to repair, renovate, and equip the White School Building, so called, in Goffstown Village, according to the specifications submitted to the adjourned school meeting of October 6th, 1951 by the commit-

tee chosen at the last annual school district meeting and to take such action, relating thereto, as may be necessary for the completion and accomplishment of said project.

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000 for the purpose of repairing, renovating and equipping the White Building in Goffstown Village and authorize said district, acting under Chapter 5 of the Public Acts and Joint Resolutions of the Legislature of 1951, to borrow the sum to be used for the purposes above mentioned by the issuance of its serial bonds or notes in accordance with Chapter 72 of Revised Laws of New Hampshire as amended.

15. To see if the district will vote to authorize a committee, to be chosen by the District, to proceed with the repair, renovation and equipment of said White Building and in the name of the district to purchase the required materials and equipment and enter into all agreements and contracts necessary or incidental to the accomplishment of said project.

16. To see if the district will vote to appropriate such income as received during the school year 1951-52, but not anticipated at the last annual meeting, for the purpose of paying unanticipated operating expenses occurring during the present school year, such appropriation not to exceed \$2,500.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Record of Annual School Meeting

Held at the High School Auditorium, March 17, 1951

Meeting called to order by the Moderator, William F. Parker at 2:05 o'clock in the afternoon.

The call for the meeting was read by the Moderator. It was then voted that as the Warrant had been printed in the Town Reports that we dispense with the reading of the balance of the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1—William F. Parker was nominated for the office of Moderator, voted on and declared elected by the Clerk and he took the oath of office.

ARTICLE 2—Carl B. Pattee was nominated for the office of Clerk, voted on and was declared elected by the Moderator and he took the oath of office.

ARTICLE 3—It was voted that Article 15 of the Warrant be considered at this time in place of Article 3. Voted we act favorably.

Mr. Prugh spoke regarding the election of School Board members from the different districts and suggested we follow this same procedure, namely, two from Pinardville, two from the Village and two from the outside.

Motion: That we first elect one Board member for a three year term, next that we elect another Board member for a three year term, next we elect a Board member for a two year term, and lastly, we elect a Board member for a one year term.

Motion carried.

Armand Florand was nominated for a three year term and Albert Lamothe was nominated for a three year term. Albert Lamothe declined the nomination. Ballot was taken and Armand Florand receiving a majority of the ballots was declared elected to a three year term by the Moderator.

For the second member for a three year term Mrs. Andrew Hardin was nominated and Mr. Gerard DeGrace was nominated.

Ballot was taken and Mrs. Harden receiving the majority of Ballots cast was declared elected to a three year term by the Moderator.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Lamothe for his services as a member of the School Board.

Mr. Clifton Dustin was nominated for a two year term, voted on and declared elected by the Moderator.

Mr. Guy Chapman and Mr. Harold Moller were nominated for the one year term. Ballot was taken and Guy Chapman having received a majority of the ballots cast was declared elected for a one year term by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 4—Marjorie Corning was nominated for the office of Treasurer, voted on and declared elected by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 5—Voted that the salaries of the School Board members and various officers remain the same.

ARTICLE 6—Voted to accept the reports of the various officers as printed in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 7—Voted that the Town Auditors serve as auditors for the School District.

ARTICLE 8—Motion: That the school district raise and appropriate \$124,396.22 as called for in the School Boards budget and to authorize the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board exclusive of state aid and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the School District Clerk certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

The following amendments were proposed, voted on, and accepted to the above motion:

\$180.00 salaries of the new Board members
\$200.00 for a fire door at Grasmere School
\$2000.00 increase in salary for Teachers.

With these amendments the amount of the Budget is corrected to read \$126,776.22.

The vote was in the affirmative and was so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 9—Moved that the District raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for general expenses of the School year, 1950 and 51, the sum of \$5,560.00 to be made available to the School District prior to July 1st, 1951 as the School Board may direct. Motion was carried.

ARTICLE 10—Motion made to dismiss the article.

Remarks by Mr. Bailey and Mr. Nickerson regarding the article, also by Mr. Hambleton. Motion was withdrawn and a motion made to indefinitely postpone the article. Motion not carried.

Motion made that the District raise and appropriate for the school year 1950-1951 the sum of \$4,660.00, such sum to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1951, as the School Board may direct; such funds to provide increases in teachers salaries for the school year 1950-51 to the amount of \$200.00 for each full time teacher and 10% for each part time teacher and for payment of retirement assessments necessitated by such increase.

Motion carried.

ARTICLE 11—Moved that the District elect and authorize a committee of six to study the school building needs of the district, and report its findings to this meeting adjourned to 2 P.M. on the first Saturday in October (October 6th, 1951). Said committee to consist of the following, Alfred W. Poore Sr., Chairman, David Prugh, Clifton Dustin, Romeo LaRochelle, George Swamburg and Guy Chapman.

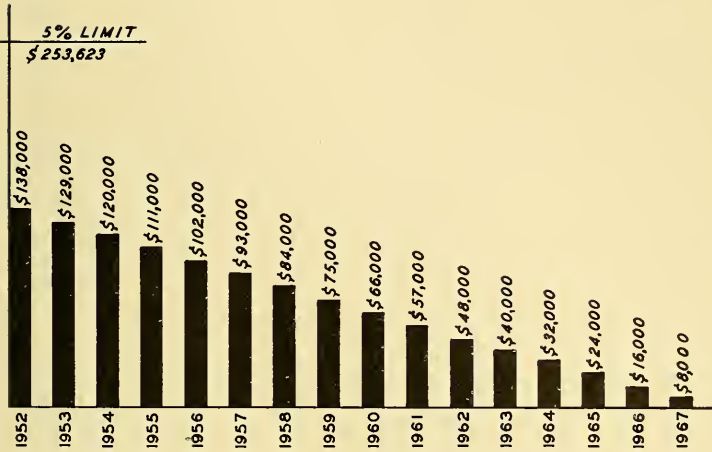
