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

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

 1A. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town wishes to vote to purchase a new truck for the Highway Department, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town wishes to vote to purchase two new snow plows for the Highway Department, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$691.30 (six hundred ninety-one dollars and thirty cents) for our 1956 share of the T.R.A. Nubanusit Road.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the maintenance of the bathing beach, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 8. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regards to replacing the two exterior doors to the Town Hall. The Church Society to pay one half of the total cost. Raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 9. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regards to replacing the ventilating fan for the Town Hall. Raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

- 10. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to replacing the present heating system in the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to turn over the Hancock High School building and grounds to the Hancock School District for Educational purposes, as soon as said property is legally deeded to the Town by the Hancock Educational Association or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to extablish a contingency fund and raise and appropriate \$200.00 (two hundred dollars) for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to run a water line to the Wilder development off Norway Hill when building begins, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 (one hundred and fifty dollars) for the re-grading and re-seeding of the lawn in front of the Town Hall or take any other action relating thereto.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to put a gate on Hillside Cemetery or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) to build cemetery fence or take any action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) for the purpose of resurfacing (with gravel) the road beginning at the residence of Herricks and extending to the Mulhall Farm so called.
- 18. To see what action the Town will vote in regard to the road leading by the new Harrington place, in repairing of road, and tar the same.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) for the fire hose reserve fund or take any other action relating thereto.
- 19A. To see if the town will vote to install two way mobile radio units in the fire trucks and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 (six hundred dollars) for same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Week or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day or take any other action relating thereto.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to establish a zoning committee of three members whose duty shall be to study the present situation in the town and recommend an appropriate zoning program, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes paid within thirty (30) days after date of bill or take any other action relating thereto.
 - 24. To vote to see if beano shall be legalized in Hancock.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator select a committee to investigate the possibilities of having the Course of the brooks leading into Norway Pond changed, or take any action relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) to repair the walls and ceilings in the rear room of the Library or take any other action relating thereto.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 (one thousand three hundred dollars) to replace the present heating plant in the Library or take any other action relating thereto.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or take any action relating thereto.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the Town or take any action relating thereto.
- 30. To hear reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen or take any action relating thereto.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

HANCOCK IN 1955

Visitors to our Town during the summer or early fall may well have wondered at the periodic detonations and shakes coming from the foothills of Skatutakee. High up in an area familiar to deer hunters but little known by many citizens there were great goings-on.

Two power shovels, a couple of bulldozers, plus compressors and drills were only part of the equipment hewing a trench for the pipeline to Juggernaut Pond. On one occasion at the really deep cut through faulted granite — the place near the Pond which caused all the trouble — a scintillometer checked radio activity. We needed water, but the Town wouldn't want to overlook a little workable uranium to help pay for the \$60,000 project.

In 1907 we first laid on town water from a dammed up section of Davis brook. In November 1955 the vast source of Juggernaut was tapped by Ellerton Edwards, Antrim contractor and the purest of water fed into the original line. Shortages of water, condition of water and pressure short of serving most of Norway Hill became past history.

Charlie Gleason, Donald Stearns and Everett Adams, the Water Commissioners; Tom Kierstead, Ernest Adams and Bessie Bradley, the Selectmen plus others shared the headaches of our major construction project. Bessie, by the way, is our first lady selectman. Her father, Wm. D. Fogg, appropriately enough, was a prime mover in connection with the original water system.

A charming lady Selectman, that's only one of the things that have changed in a hundred years. It's enriching to glance back and see what we used to look like.

Just a hundred years ago Trace & Company of Claremont published a volume entitled "New Hampshire As It Is" which (on page 232-3) has a couple of paragraphs on Hancock. At that time our population was 1012 and our valuation \$628,790, there were 1112 sheep, 1390 cows and 245 horses grazing on our hillsides. We were described: "It is emphatically one of those good old farming towns where anyone would be proud to point out the home of his ancestors."

In another sentence: "The Town bears little impress of change of opinions or customs." But today, a hundred years later, we have changed quite a bit. For the record we now have a population 612, our valuation \$1,192,494, there are 185 sheep, 140 cows, 20 horses and let's add about 550 autos on which Clerk Dan Devens collects toward Town expenditures over \$3,000.

While amounts raised on property have nearly doubled since 1855, it is the interest and dividend tax, non-existent in the good old days, which pays more than a third of Town expenses. In 1955 this "special Hancock industry" paid in a record \$20,141. Without this — and most towns get very little — our tax rate would soar. We have reason to welcome those who come to settle with us enriching our lives in many ways. And those acquiring property get in return an efficient fire department, alert Selectmen, active organizations to meet every taste, a famous church and pastor, interesting neighbors, mouth watering scenery and a lot of other things, as they say in connection with auction sales, too numerous to mention.

But we might mention a new club which fills one more need—namely the Stamp Club with our expert philatelist (and new Check List supervisor) Frank Hutchison to advise. And for the second time in its history Hancock is represented in the State Senate. And on Old Home Day—which is an outstanding event all by itself—this year we had our Washington Senator, Norris Cotton as principal speaker and to open the parade, Governor Lane Dwinell in person. Which puts us on some sort of a political map—perhaps because we have an inclination to vote reliably Republican.

Nationally 1955 could be identified as the year of the Davy Crockett fad. It was also the year of hurricanes Connie and Diane. Neither the hurricanes nor the fad figured particularly in Hancock's way of life. To further identify this year for those who read this many years hence, it was the year President Eisenhower had a heart attack and the year of the greatest prosperity our Country has known to date. Perhaps this well being shows itself just a little in our Christmas lighting which seems to improve each year — perhaps because we have Bill Sheriff as an expert in this field living right on our main street. Mrs. Harry Sheldon's home was definitely impressive from across the valley.

Our Post Office received a Christmas gift. It was a new sign, the joint work of Ralph and Priscilla Rokes (she held the board while Ralph used the saw); Freddy and Virginia Gleason did the painting. We all did the admiring.

F. R. Hutchinson and Herman Schlicting were elected, by a

voice vote, as auditors for the ensuing school year.

Moved: That a committee of three (with alternates if desirable) be chosen — one a member of the P.T.A., a second a member of the School Board, and a third a member of the Educational Association (at least one to be a mother) — these three to talk with the Parent Teacher Associations and School Boards of neighboring towns to learn whether they would send their students to a good high school in Hancock.

A letter written by a high school pupil supporting the idea of

reopening the high school was read by Elijah West. A voice vote on this motion was in the negative.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

The Hancock Elementary School started its school year in September with two new teachers on its full-time staff. They are Miss Patricia Therrien who replaces Mrs. Elizabeth M. Weston as teacher of grades one and two, and Mrs. Edna D. Howard who replaces Miss Virginia A. Walsh as teacher of grades 3, 4 and 5. Mrs. Mavis W. Rutledge continues as principal and teacher of grades 6, 7 and 8. Mr. George W. Breakwell is music supervisor this year and Mr. Donald G. Bostrom continues as art supervisor. Miss Gladys E. Newhall is in her second year as school nurse.

The school lunch program was discontinued as of June 1955 due to the resignation of Mrs. Paula Wirz. The children for the most part have been carrying cold lunches and milk has been provided. In addition a Special Milk Program has been started this year. Extra milk is made available to the children at recess time for four cents a bottle. This is done through the efforts of the State Hot Lunch Program to encourage children to drink milk.

A Defense Stamp Program is in operation at the school which allows children to purchase Defense Stamps regularly to encourage the habit of saving.

Under the guidance of Mrs. Rutledge an Audubon Club has been organized with twenty members. In this activity the children not only learn about the wild life of their state but about such worthwhile things as conservation.

Regular visits have been made to the library this year to encourage the children in using this fine facility.

Mrs. Howard's class has done extremely well in their work with Flut-O-Phones.

Social activities for the children have included joint assembly programs in the lower grades, a costume parade on Main Street at Halloween time, Halloween parties in the afternoon for the lower grades and in the evening for the upper grades.

At Christmas time the whole school under the direction of Mr. Breakwell sang carols on the steps of the town hall. Mrs. Rutledge's class sang carols to shut-ins during Christmas week.

A new report card has been sent out this year for grades one and two. Further study is being made for revisions in the other grades.

Members of the sixth grade again participated in the school camping program at Sargent Camp where the children carried on classroom activities in the natural setting offered by the camp.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

The exterior walls of the school have been ventilated by raising the clapboards and a prime coat of paint has been put on preparatory to a finished coat to be applied when warm weather returns.

The supply room in the school basement has been enlarged in order to make room for supplies and book storage.

Ten new pupils' desks and chairs and new teachers' desks and chairs have been provided in all three classrooms.

Volley ball equipment has been provided for the school playground.

B. Helping Teacher's Report

The Helping Teacher's role of counsellor, specialist and consultant to the professional staff, school boards and parents and to the community at large has one major objective and that is the improvement of the educational growth and development

of the children in our schools. In trying to analyze what growth and development has occurred during a year one must look back to see what has been done in order to measure its relationship to the outcomes. Often the outcomes are not easy to see at a given time but are occurring all of the time and not all at **one** time.

What are some of the things your helping teacher has been doing this year with the preceding objectives in

mind?

Over three hundred visits have been made to classrooms in the supervisory union for the purposes of supervision, observation and help.

Innumerable conferences have been held with principals,

supervisors and nurses.

There have been some 30 cases of children requiring special

help because of retardation or reading difficulties.

Many conferences have been held with groups of teachers for the purposes of studying and improving the curriculum notably in the areas of English, Social Studies, Language, Arts and Arithmetic.

A seminar on reading was arranged for elementary teachers, parents and school board members at which Anna Gillingham of New York and Dr. Helen Murphy of Boston presided. At this seminar teachers had an opportunity to discuss freely current problems in reading instruction.

Interviews of six children under the required entrance age

were arranged and conducted in September.

Over fifty conferences were held with parents regarding problems or special help for their children.

Talks were delivered to different P. T. A.'s by your Helping

Teacher.

Last year's new teacher's handbook was revised and brought

up to date.

A monthly bulletin was published for all teachers and principals during the year. It included suggestions for the improvement of instruction and contained inspirational items as well as lists of new texts and materials available to all teachers.

Worked with special committees of the Supervisory Union Board in providing statistical and other information concerning

retardation and remedial reading.

Interviewed and corresponded with over thirty-five candidates for the twenty vacancies in the various schools of the supervisory union this year.

Worked with teachers who had special problems in the class-

room.

Worked with teachers in helping to determine those children who have reading difficulties and worked out ways of helping these children.

Administered tests to children having reading difficulties.

Arranged for special help for children who needed it outside the classroom.

Participated in local and state teachers meetings as a speaker and consultant.

Attended school board meetings.

Reviewed new textbook material and made recommendations for changes where it was felt an improvement could be made.

Attended summer school for professional improvement, taking courses in elementary and high school supervision.

What are some of the things which have been happening . . .

As a result of teacher conferences a unified social studies program was worked out for grades 1-12 in our schools.

Individual techniques of teaching reading in order to help all children have been introduced and are being actively used in some of our schools.

An outline for the English program was worked out for grades 7-12 in one of the high schools.

Two teacher study and survey groups were organized and will be working during the current school year: one in the area of language arts (reading, spelling, writing) and arithmetic, the other in the area of reporting to parents.

A pilot program in the teaching of geometry was introduced into our high schools.

An experimental program to improve the teaching of spelling was introduced into one of the elementary schools.

In arithmetic tests administered by the University of New Hampshire pupils in our upper elementary grades scored higher that the state and national averages.

What are some of the things observed . . .

In spite of the many criticisms which have been leveled at public schools throughout the country this year on the score of reading instruction and curriculum our schools have continued to grow and to look for ways of improving. Not only have we been working in the areas of reading and curriculum but we are at present continuing our study of all areas of the curriculum.

Our school facilities have greatly improved and this is a great aid to instruction. This makes for a great difference in teacher and pupil morale.

The two committees appointed by the Supervisory Union Board to study the needs of Remedial Reading Instruction and help for retarded children as recommended by the Helping Teacher did a splendid job and it is hoped that the people of the various communities will back the school boards when they ask for money in their individual budgets to take care of these two

great needs in our schools.

This has been a very rewarding year for the Helping Teacher. The wonderful cooperation of the Superintendent, Principals, Teachers, Schoolboard Members, Parents and citizens of the various communities have made it possible to do the job of "helping" with dispatch and meaning.
