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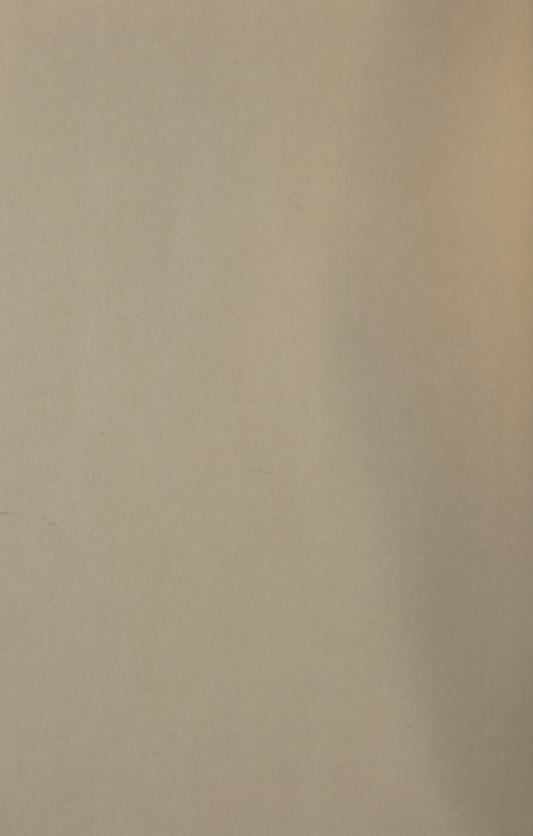

- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (1,750) as matching funds for the purpose of having the Town's land inventoried and a long range forest management plan established. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service has set aside the other 50% of the cost, under practice SP44.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to merge the Town Forest Committee into the Lempster Conservation Commission in order to facilitate financing their Activities. During the first year the seven members would be composed of four members of the Conservation Commission and three members of the Forest Committee with unexpired terms.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to harvest timber on Town land and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) to come exclusively from the revenue of timber sale for the Conservation Commission to carry on its functions.
- ART. 8 To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission Fund and to allow the whole or any part of the money appropriated to the Conservation Commission in any year to be placed into the Conservation Commission Fund and to accumulate from year to year.

- ART. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal and other government or private sources which may become available during the fiscal year, pursuant to RSA 31-95-b.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for liability insurance to cover the police department members.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for strengthening and necessary repairs to the floor of the Miner Memorial Library.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$650) to pay for the dumping of residential seepage at the water treatment plant of a cooperating municipality.
- ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000) for the repair and reconditioning of Town owned public buildings and to establish a capital reserve fund for that purpose.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3500) for the purpose of reconditioning the 1958 International Fire Truck No. 33, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Account.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000) for work on the Town's Comprehensive Master Plan and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Federal Revenue Sharing Account.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as a setoff against the following debt service.

- ART. 17. To see what the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and to take any necessary action thereto.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT February, 1985

The Miner Memorial Library had a progressive year. Approximately one thousand new titles were added to the shelves, including new books from two trips to Dartmouth Bookstore in Hanover, Also, paperbacks, children's, fiction, and non-fiction books were purchased at yardsales and Library sales and many came from donations.

Much work was done on the building last summer. Work on the windows continued every week from June to August by people donating time and energy. The front entry was plastered, painted, and the floor was sanded and varnished. The interior woodwork was painted to match the new blue paint on the windows and the ceiling was painted. New shelves were built on the side walls, giventwo coats of varnish, and books were moved. It was all pulled together for open house on Old Home Day Sunday in August.

The Friends of the Library financed the new shelving, the two new storm windows for the front of the building, and a gift of money for a children's book club.

Recent donations include many books, a large Webster's Dictionary, a portable typewriter, gifts of money, and the many hours of labor by volunteers.

Future work on the building should include floor supports, which will be a major project, requiring skilled workmen.

The Library is a town supported service, open to all residents. Hours are Monday and Wednesday, 3:00 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. Come visit and see what is available.

REPORT OF SULLIVAN COUNTY REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

After experiencing a number of setbacks early in the year which created delays and significant changes from previous plans, the District, together with the Southern Windsor/-Windham Counties Solid Waste Management District and Clark-Kenith, is now approaching a bond sale and subsequent construction of a waste-to-energy facility.

During January, Keene decided not to join the Sullivan County District and a Federal Urban Development Action Grant application was turned down. At a Joint Meeting with the Southern Windsor/Windham Counties District in February the District Committee decided to request a new proposal from Clark-Kenith and a competitive proposal from Vicon Recovery Systems for a smaller facility more closely matching the quantity of waste available from existing District towns.

The decision to request new proposals gave the Districts time to investigate other sites in Claremont that would be more acceptable to the residents of Claremont. The Claremont City Council agreed to support a site located in an area zoned for industry in southwest Claremont, east of the Joy Foundry. Revisions to the environmental impact assessment were subsequently made, with the City splitting the costs of the assessment and other site investigations with the Districts.

Clark-Kenith and Vicon Recovery Systems submitted bid construction costs and operating proposals to the Districts during May. Differences in projected disposal costs were less than two dollars per ton. Clark-Kenith remained the preferred vendor because of their technology and financial strength, and the uncertainties associated with beginning negotiations with Vicon.

On September 19, 1984 the District signed a long-term 20 year waste disposal agreement with Clark-Kenith for the financing, construction and operation of a 200 ton per day facility. An option to purchase 51 acres of land at the new location was also signed during September.

Lazard Freres and Company, investment bankers for Clark-Kenith, are now in the final stages of preparing a 28 million dollar industrial revenue bond sale through the New Hampshire Industrial Development Authority. Prior to closing on the bonds an equity commitment agreement must be signed which will provide for the sale of the facility to a private investor at the end of construction. The sale, together with the expected retirement of certain contingency funds and the bond revenue funds will leave approximately 16 million dollars in outstanding bonds which must be retired during the 20 year operating period.

The present schedule calls for finalizing an agreement with Signal RESCO, the expected equity owner, by March, 1985. Construction will begin immediately thereafter, with operation expected early in 1987.

1984 PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During 1984 the Planning Board approved these sub-divisions of land in Lempster: In February an annexation to Mr. Edson's land at Long Pond, in August a 3-lot subdivision of Atkinson-Davis land on Rt. 10, in October a 3-lot subdivision of Ruth Rowe land on Lempster Street, and in December an annexation to Rudolf Adler land on Dodge Hollow Road.

In March Tom Goldberg replaced Mark Adams on the Board, outpolling both Adams and Jim Grenier in the election by one vote (81 to 80 each) for Adams and Grenier. Ralph Keeler was reelected to his seat on the Board. The town also voted to join the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council in Lebanon and have their assistance for making a Master Plan, to conform to State Law.

In April, the Board set up a Master Plan Committee consisting of the regular board members plus two alternates. Adams was appointed as an alternate, and Lincoln Bedell was appointed as another alternate in June. The Master Plan Committee has chosen Adams and Goldberg as Cochairmen and has been preparing a community information survey to assist them in writing the Master Plan.

The Planning Board meets at the town office on the second Monday of each month and the Master Plan Committee presently meets at the town office on the fourth Monday of each month. Both meetings are at 7:30 p.m. and are open to everyone who wishes to attend them.

· UPPER VALLEY - LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Upper Valley - Lake Sunapee Council is a public, non-profit voluntary association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our 31 communities are in two states and

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget, and developes policies and positions on issues that are important to UV-LSC communities.

The Upper Valley - Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landsca architecture, housing, capital budgeting, historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with sate and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests of our communities.

The Council has continued to expand its staff capabilities over the past year. Staff members include Robert Varney, Executive Director; Vicki Smith, Senior Planner; Lisa Mausolf, Historic Preservation Specialist; Gregg Lantos, Transportation Planner; Tad Redway, Landscape Architect and Planner; Melinda Artman, Community Development Coordinator; John Olmstead, Housing Rehabilitation Specialist; Susan Elder, Economic Development Specialist; Lee Ann Scully, Assistant Planner; Jim Klinger, Draftsman; and Barbara Belloir, Jeanne Riley and Lori Brown, Secretaries. These Staff members have greatly expanded the level and range of expertise available to our communities.

The Council has been busy working on a variety of regional programs during the past year. The following is a brief summary of some of our regional activities:

- Provided administrative and planning services to the Upper Valley Solid Waste District, a bi-state district with 15 member communities:
- Developed regional septage management plans which will become components of the solid waste plans for the Sullivan County, Upper Valley and Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Districts.
- Prepared a regional transportation development plan and participated on regional transportation advisory committees (Lebanon Regional Airport, Advance Transit).
- Continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans.
- . Established the Sullivan County Economic Development Program to retain and expand employment opportunities in Sullivan County.

- . Completed phase one of the Lake Sunapee Management Plan, including survey of all properties around the Lake.
- . Co-sponsored a successful Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, groundwater protection seminar and Municipal Law Lecture Series.
- Provided economic, population, housing and other data to communities, organizations, banks, real estate firms and consultants for use in fiscal studies, market analyses and grant applications.

As requested by communities, the Council prepared applications for state and federal funds, evaluated development proposals, prepared amendments to local zoning, subdivision, site plan review and other local regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other planning assistance.

The UVLSC has provided a number of specific services to the Town of Lempster over the past year. The Planning Board has contracted with the Council to update the Master Plan, and thus far has assisted in the review and production of the community attitudes survey, as well as completing Master Plan chapters on Population and Housing. In addition, the Council has met with the Board of Selectmen in order to explore ways in which the Town can secure Community Development Block Grant funding for housing rehabilitation in the community. An investigation of septage disposal problems in Lempster has been completed and is being addressed in a comprehensive regional plan.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY

1984 has been a good year for the Newport Area Home Health Agency. There has been a consolidation of the increases that took place in the past two years and some continued growth in 1984 in several areas.

The Occupational Therapy service added last year has filled a need when this special service is appropriate. Speech Therapy was added as a service in October 1984.

The Well Child Clinic has expanded as there has been an increase in low income families qualifying for this program. Other clinic activities include dental clinics for pre-school children, adult screening and flu immunization.

The Agency continues to help families with Child Abuse and Neglect problems and is supported by the United Way of Sullivan County. A Child Safety Car Seat Program has over 60 seats out on loan.

Significant changes are taking place in the health service field. Newport Area Home Health Agency is working with the Newport Hospital to determine how area health care providers can best meet the needs of area citizens. Newport Area Home Health Agency will be extending its hours of service in January 1985 and then add more special services that can be provided in the home.

The Agency appreciates the support of the towns and will continue to provide high quality home health care to the area.

SERVICES PROVIDED TO THE CITIZENS OF LEMPSTER IN 1984:

Home Visits - 154; Physical Therapy - 25; Occupational Therapy - 35; Health Promotion 4; Clinic Visits - 25; Home Visits - 11; Participation in Women, Infants and Children Program - 500; Dental Clinic Visits - 48; Adult Screening Clinic visits - 60; Flu Immunization - 38.

The approximate value of above services to the town of Lempster was \$9,000.00 in 1984.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

The first truly organized volunteer fire company, as we know it today, was established in 1736 by Ben Franklin and several other prominent Philadelphians.

In those days, when the fire alarm sounded, the entire town usually turned out. The engine was dragged through the streets, while men appeared with axes, chains, ropes, crowbards, buckets, saws and other tools which might be handy.

A lot has changed since then. Today, over one million Americans serve as volunteers, five times the number of paid firefighters.

The modern volunteer service is, in most cases, a well organized, well-trained, well-equipped highly dedicated group of individuals. As long as there are dedicated men and women in this country, who are willing to help others without pay and, in many cases, without acknowledgment, there will be a volunteer service to fight those fires. They perform a vital public service which would cost more than \$4.5 billion to replace.

In 1984 the Lempster Fire Dept. answered 39 alarms, 22 of these alarms were fire related, including structure fires and forst related. 395 man hours were spent on some form of fire suppression. The remaining 17 calls were for rescue. 127 man hours were spent on some type of medical emergency.

The firefighters on our department spent 490 man hours on all types of training. Some of the training include structural firefighting, water supply, tanker operations, ice rescue, auto extrication and CPR. I think it's important to note that we have ten fire fighters trained in CPR.

In the last few years we have been fortunate enough to acquire some equipment for little or no money at all. We have unfortunately not been able to keep all this needed equipment under cover. However, with help of our crew, Highway Dept., generous townspeople and some hired labor, we were able to erect an addition to our fire house which enables us to put all our vehicles under cover. I wish to express my gratitude to the people who helped to make our building project a success.

970 of work have been spent by the firefighters in Lempster to our fire equipment to keep it in good working condition. Also these hours included work on the addition and general duties.

The one other amount of time that only the officers can appreciate, are the administrative hours which amounted to 720.

The total hours donated, amounts of 2702 or 51.96 hours per week for 1984. It's no wonder that the 14 men and women on the fire department call the station their second home.

I wish to thank the members of the department for supporting me and my efforts throughout the year.

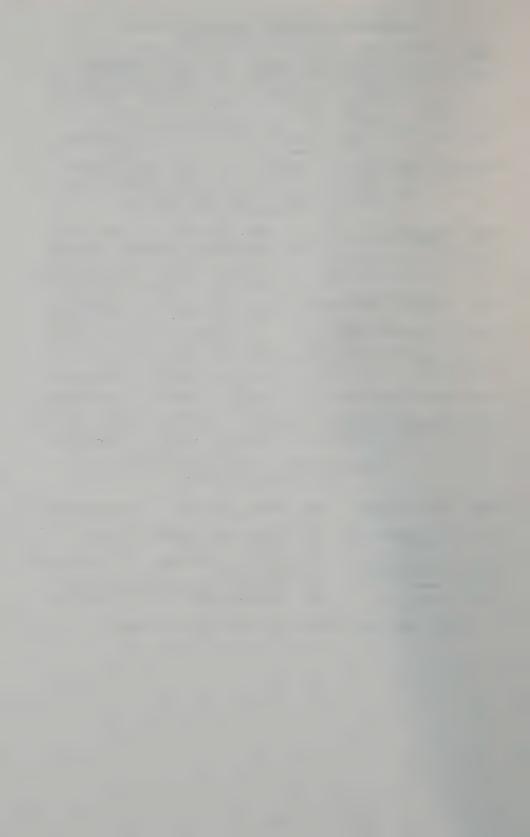
