# MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING Lincoln, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 14, 1961.

The Meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A. M.

Before the start of the meeting the following rules were read and it was stated they would be enforced.

- 1. Personalities brought into discussion will not be tolerated or allowed.
- 2. No discussion will be allowed on any article until the article has been acted upon by a motion and seconded.
- 3. Everyone who wishes to speak shall announce if they are speaking for or against the motion. They shall be allowed to speak five (5) minutes on the motion at a time, and nobody will be allowed to speak the second time until everyone who wishes has spoken once.
- 4. No one shall speak over twice on a motion unless otherwise so voted from the floor.
- 5. All motions or amendments shall be presented in writing or stated clearly so that the Clerk may be able to transcribe it and read it back to the body.
- 6. All discussion should be subject matter on the Article being presented. Any person refusing to abide by the above rules will be out of order and if after due warning they refuse to follow the above rules, they shall be put in custody of the Police upon request of the Moderator.

After the reading of each Article, the Chair will recognize the chairman of the Budget Committee for the purpose of making the Budgets recommendation.

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator James Maguire.

The following articles were acted upon:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Motion made by James Mac-Donald and seconded by E. Levasseur that the polls be opened immediately for voting. This was done.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Budget Chairman, R. Russell, made a recommendation that \$7,050.00 be raised to defray Town Charges.

Salaries \$ 4,050.00 Expense 2,900.00 Election Exp. 100.00

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by E. Levasseur. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department. Recommendation by R. Russell that \$5,600.00 be raised for the Police Department.

Motion by G. McGee, seconded by J. MacDonald. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$3,000.00 be raised for the Fire Department.

Motion by E. Levasseur, seconded by R. Thompson.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$2,950.00 be raised for Public Health Department.

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by J. Landry. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$10,000.00 be raised for Town Maintenance, Motion by: G. McGee and seconded by J. MacDonald.

Recommendation by R.Russell that this article be amended to raise the sum of \$29,284.58 which would cover the previous deficit of last year of \$17,426.58 and \$1,858.00 for new equipment plus the \$10,000.00 appropriation for this year.

Motion by G. McGee, seconded by J. MacDonald. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$4,800.00 be raised for Street Lighting.

Motion by E. Levasseur, seconded by J. Landry. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$1,000.00 be raised for the cemeteries.

Motion by E. Levasseur seconded by J. MacDonald.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. How much money will be raised for the Public Library.

Recommendation by R. Russell that the sum of \$1,600.00 be raised for the Public Library.

Motion by E. Levasseur, seconded by J. MacDonald.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. How much money will be raised for the Support of Town Poor.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$5,000.00 be raised for Support of Town Poor.

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by R. Thompson.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assitance.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$1,200.00 be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by J. Landry. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$10,000.00 be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

Motion by J. Landry, seconded by R. Thompson. J. Landry explained that so far the Water Department has used up \$7,000.00.

\$ 2,000.00 on the Goodbout job to finish it.

2,000.00 for general maintenance 3,000.00 for the Loon Pond dam.

L. Woodward asked for an explanation. George McGee explained that pollution of rivers, etc., could run into a lot of money and that a sum of around \$70,000.00 was estimated in order to fix the Loon Pond area, providing for a new dam, etc., and was given by State Engineers when they inspected the area to see what could be done in order to insure a complete supply of water from there to the Town.

R. Bourassa asked about the Town of Lincoln supplying water to the Town of No. Woodstock. He was told that nothing definite had been settled on that situation yet.

E. Houle asked if anything would be done about the water situation for the coming Summer, pertaining to Boyce Brook. He asked if it could be re-dug to make it deeper and hold more water for a larger supply for those on the Highway. G. McGee said they did not recommend it as the watershed is very small. He said that Loon Pond and Boyce Brook should be adequate as this last Summer was an unusually dry Summer and has not happened in years before. E. Clark said that Boyce Brook was originally meant to be used for the highway only but that all the Town of Lincoln was put on it last Summer which drained it so. Loon Pond should be for the Town and Boyce Brook for the Highway people only. He said he thought that a dam should be built at Loon Pond to in-

sure more supply. Mrs. Hogan asked why this could not be done so they would be insured of enough water to keep in business. J. Adzarita asked why it could not be straightened out right away and not left until an emergency came up and then try to solve the problem. R. Russell suggested that a study committee be chosen to act on this problem and then call a special Town Meeting to decide what will be done about it.

J. Landry withdrew his motion for \$10,000.00

A motion was made by George Boyle for \$10,-000.00 and seconded by R. Russell 72 yes—32 nos.

An amendment to the Article was made by E. Clark to make repairs to the Loon Pond dam to commence May first and for the dam repairs there be only \$3,000.00 allotted.

Motion seconded by L. Woodward.

Vote in the affirmative.

Mrs. Hogan made an amendment on the amendment to strike out the \$10,000.00 and to increase the amount to \$18,114.00. The \$8,114.00 to be used for water shortage expenses only. Seconded by N. Bartlett.

Original motion as amended—94 yes — 1 no.

L. Sargent made a motion to recess the Town Meeting and continue after the School Meeting. Seconded by G. McGee.

Meeting recessed at 10:30 A. M. and continued again at 11:30 A. M.

Article 13. How much money will be raised for White Mts. Region Association.

Recommendation by R. Russell that the sum of \$357.95 be raised.

Motion by L. Woodward, seconded by J. Landry.

- Article 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration. Recommendation and motion of \$500.00 be raised by R. Bourassa, seconded by Theriault. Vote in the affirmative.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 and Interest to take up the Water Bonds due July 1, 1961.

Recommendation by R. Russell that \$1,000.00 be raised.

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by A. Asselin. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

Motion by R. Russell and seconded by R. Bourassa.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see how much money will be raised for Civil Defense.

Recommendation by R. Russell to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Civil Defense.

Motion by J. MacDonald, seconded by E. Levasseur.

- Article 18. To see how much money the Town will raise for Parks and Playgrounds.

  Recommendation by R. Russell that the sum of \$3,000.00 be raised for Parks and Playgrounds.

  Motion by J. Landry, seconded by H. Waldo.
- Article 19. To see how much money the Town will raise for the Lincoln-No. Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

Motion by G. McGee. That the Town raise \$400.00 for the Lincoln-No. Woodstock Chamber of Com-

merce and that all signs and advertising devices erected on any street, public way or public highway, or any and all segments of interstate defense highway 93 to be constructed in the future, are hereinafter under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen. Seconded by G. McGee, Jr.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$94.94, the State to contribute \$632.90 for T. R. A.

Recommendation by R. Russell that the sum of \$94.94 be raised.

Motion by G. McGee, seconded by J. Landry. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to approve any proposed local protection projects or water storage programs which might be proposed by the Federal Government or State Agencies now or in the future on the East Branch of the Pemigewasset River.

Motion by H. Waldo, seconded by J. MacDonald. Amendment to Article 21 made by G. McGee and seconded by Roland Bourassa, and to authorize the Selectmen to assign all of the agreements, assignments, contracts entered into between the Town of Lincoln and the United States of America on the so called repair to flood control dike, Lincoln, N. H., administered by the U. S. Corps of Engineers Job # Serial CIVENG-19-016-60-61. Also any ski developments on the East Branch of the Pemigewasset River.

Adopt as recorder: G. McGee, Seconded by R. Bourassa.

Amendment on the amendment on Article 21 made by E. Clark and seconded by B. Clark that,

nothing should be done in this project to flood privately owned property.

Vote taken with — 8 yes — 46 nos, a vote in the negative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00 to construct a new building to house town officers and town equipment.

Motion by W. Canton and seconded by L. Bouchard to pass over Article 22 and rent the Garage from the Company.

Moderator McGuire termed this OUT OF ORDER. A motion by J. Landry and seconded by Mrs. J. Landry for the Town to raise the sum of \$45,000.00 for the construction of a new Town building. A discussion on the above subject took place with L. Woodward explaining that the figures would probably run up into \$90,000.00 by the end of 30 years including interest, etc.

J. Landry withdrew his motion.

A motion on the previous question was made by L. Sargent and seconded by L. Sargent. Vote was yesses—2 nos unanimous. Vote in the negative.

Article 23. To see if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. Interest payable annually, Principal, payable in thirty equal payments starting in 1962.

Motion by Geo. McGee and seconded by B. Russell to pass over this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Franconia Paper Corporation to lease the Lincoln Garage Building for a period not to exceed 10 years at a rental price of an amount not to exceed \$3,000.00 per year. Any earned income shall be applied against the rental price.

Motion by R. Thompson, seconded by E. Smith.

W. Canton read the following explanation from the Franconia Paper Corporation pertaining to the rental of the Garage.

The Franconia Paper Corporation will let their garage to the Town of Lincoln under the following provisions with a (10) ten year lease.

- 1. \$250.00 a month rent with heat and insurance and maintenance included.
- 2. Franconia Paper Corporation agrees to let the building in its entirety to the Town and to pay rent to the Town for any space they may use.
- 3. Any other income which may be derived from rentage of space, or by any other means will go to the Town.

In regard to the renting of the Franconia Paper Corporation Garage to the Town of Lincoln.

The Corporation agrees:

- 1. To repair top floor of garage.
  - (a) This will be done section by section until completed.
- 2. To paint front of building and paint on the building where "Lincoln Garage" is now paint-

ed, a name designating the choice of the people as to what the building shall be called.

- 3. To close up the present big door on the front entrance of the building and install entrance door in its place.
- 4. To install suitable stairs and platform and rails in front of the new front entrance.
- 5. To make necessary repairs to the jail at a cost not exceeding \$100.00.
- 6. To extend light and heating facilities to cover new offices.
- 7. To paint Selectmen's office and Show Room, so-called.
- 8. The Corporation will partition off and build offices as shown.

Namely; "A" for Town Clerk, "B" as Assembly Room for meetings and other uses which may be required for Town Officials.

9. The Corporation will not cut a doorway through at "Y" on plan or build any partition or spend money to house fire equipment on the top floor. This is entirely up to the Selectmen.

The Committee recommends that a committee be appointed to handle the rental of any space in the garage building.

Revenue from rentals in the garage was mainly from Faltin who rents tractor space down stairs during the Winter months amounting to about \$40.00 per month.

George McGee said that it appeared that some of the people were concerned about his being in the Lincoln Garage, that is some of his equipment, but that he wanted it known that he pays the stall rent as required. L. Sargent said he didn't

think the garage should be used for public purposes as far as rental space was concerned. Dr. J. Dooley made an amendment to Article 24, to authorize a commission of 3 to be appointed from the floor to supervise the use and maintenance

of the garage. Seconded by Mrs. J. Dooley.

Vote in the affirmative.

The three people chosen were: W. Canton, L. Woodward, R. Thompson; the above were chosen with the highest number of votes in their favor from a slate of 4.

W. Canton — 71 votes

L. Woodward — 81 votes

E. Clark — 66 votes

R. Thompson — 92 votes

3 votes were blank and one spoiled.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade in the old Payloader, and vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$12,000.00, for the purchase of a new Payloader.

Recommendation made by R. Russell that the Town raise the sum of \$12,000.00 for a new Payloader.

Motion by J. Landry, seconded by E. Levasseur.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 26. To see if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated; and for this purpose to authorize the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. Interest payable

annually, Principal, payable in five equal payments starting in 1962.

A motion on the above Article 26 was made by J. Landry and seconded by G. McGee that the Article be acted upon as read and requested a 2/3 vote.

Yes — 105 nos — none

A vote in the affirmative.

A discussion followed and an amendment to the article was made by E. Clark that the rate of \$10.00 be charged to Town residents and a rate of \$12.00 be charged to non-residents and that 2/3 of the earnings of the Payloader be set up in a fund to be used only for new Town machinery with 1/3 of the earnings be used for operator and fuel, and the earnings of this piece of equipment be available to defray Town costs for 1962. George Hooker made a substitute motion, that they move that the income of the Payloader be set aside to defray the expenses of 1962.

G. McGee was opposed to the rates of the amendment. He said \$6.00 per hour would be a fair price to charge residents of the Town. E. Clark said he had discussed the rates previously with G. McGee wo had agreed that the \$10.00 and \$12.00 rates were feasible. G. McGee said he had thought this over and that the \$6.00 fee per hour to Town residents would be enough to defray the expense of the machine's use. G. Hooker said he thought they should itemize the expenses which would be clearer to all. G. McGee said he did not think we should stipulate a special fund as they would not be able to use it, he didn't think it would be legal. E. Clark withdrew his amendment to Article 26 and stated a new amendment; The rates to be \$6.00 per hour for Town residents of Lincoln at a going

rate and to non-residents and all contractors the rate to be \$12.00 per hour with all outside revenue to be itemized. Seconded by G. McGee. A vote to reconsider Article 26 was taken with all votes in the affirmative. A discussion followed on the amendment and the votes were; 96 yeses and no nos. A vote in the affirmative.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its vote taken whereby they voted to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. The Town to continue operating under a Budget Committee elected by vote with the same duties and powers but not subject to the Municipal Budget Laws.

A motion was made by G. McGee and seconded by E. Levasseur to postpone this article indefinitely.

L. Sargent suggested we have the State men come up and explain this Municipal Budget Act to the Town people so that it may be more clearly understood. Dr. J. Dooley said he thought we should have someone come in and advise us and perhaps the Tax Commission could explain it to us. G. McGee was asked if he could influence someone to come in and explain the Act to the people and he said he would see if he could get Judge Marvin to come up.

A vote in the affirmative.

- Article 28. To see what measures will be taken to provide for a Town Dump.
  - J. Landry asked for an explanation on the dump problem.
  - G. McGee said that the Franconia Paper Corporation sent a letter saying that they would no longer maintain a dump for the Town. It is the responsibility of the Town to take care of the present dump or provide one of their own.

A motion by E. Clark and seconded by G. McGee that the Town authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the U. S. Forestry Service to locate a dump on Federal land.

A discussion followed. G. McGee said the Town would be liable for anything that might happen, such as fires, etc. Dr. Dooley asked about the condition of the dump at present and if it could be covered over and made more sanitary and to absorb odors, smoke, etc.

Motion made by Roger Stewart, seconded by M. Plummer.

A vote in the affirmative.

The Town would have to assume the responsibility and liability of the dump now being used and the Company would not be liable for this dump. A motion was made by George Hooker and seconded by J. Landry that Article 28 be reconsidered. This is pertaining to the Town Dump. The motion to be that we accept the Company offer of the continuing use of the present dump, clean it and to accept the fire responsibility and also include E. Clark's amendment along with this motion. The amendment is as follows: The Town authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the U. S. Forest Service to locate a dump on Federal land.

Motion by J. Landry, seconded by G. McGee.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Nominations were in order for members to replace the retiring Budget Committee. The following nominations were made:

Dr. J. Dooley, nominated by G. Hooker G. Parker, nominated by Jas. MacDonald R. Russell, nominated by E. Levasseur M. Tardif, nominated by E. Clark

Motion made by G. Hooker and seconded by E. Smith that nominations be closed and that the Clerk cast one ballot for the above candidates.

Vote in the affirmative.

James Adzarito made a motion which was seconded by G. McGee, that a committee be appointed consisting of the Board of Selectmen and the Water Commissioners, to study the water problem and that the study group submit a report to include possible solution in not less than six (6) weeks from the town meeting date and if the need is determined for immediate action, a special town meeting be called.

A vote in the affirmative.

M. Clark said he thought it should be entered into the town records for next year that a Capital Reserve Fund be set up for the Pay Loader. J. MacDonald said we could not do this. Ed. Clark suggested then that it be set up as a Sinking Fund. J. MacDonald said this would have to be put through the Budget Committee for their recommendation. Mr. Clark said he would do this.

M. Clark asked who had the authority to place articles in the Town Warrant and J. MacDonald said the Selectmen only could do this at their own discretion.

Motion made by G. McGee and seconded by J. MacDenald to adjourn the Town Meeting. Vote in the affirmative. Time of adjournment 5:30 P. M. The following results were obtained after the votes were officially counted:

#### PUBLIC HEALTH AND SCHOOL NURSING SERVICES LINCOLN-WOODSTOCK AREA Dec. 31, 1960 — Dec. 31, 1961

Total number of home visits made in the Lincoln-Woodstock area were 1250. Of this number 600 were to medical and chronic cases, 39 to pre-natal cases, 25 to new mothers, 20 to pre-schools, 51 to infants and children up to 2 years. Crippled Children's Service 29. Unclassified visits i. e., those not taken under care, Welfare, etc., 318.

Conference with State and County department workers, 25. Nurses workshops and meetings attended, 6.

Adults attending Chest Clinics, 2, Adults having Chest x-rays, 4. This program is carried on through the T. B. Association and State Health Dept. Preschool children to Orthopedic Clinic, 2. Pre-school to Hitchcock Clinic for diagnostic purposes, 1.

School visits to all schools in the area totaled 210. Physical examinations were given to the pupils of grades 2, 4 and 6 of the Lincoln Elementary School by Dr. John Dooley. 89 of the High School pupils were checked by Dr. Clayton Stenberg.

Nurse's examinations were carried out on 312 pupils. This consisting of heights, weights, vision testing and general inspection. The Audiometer used when deemed necessary. Five trips were made to optometrists. Pupils attending Orthopedic Clinic, 2. Pupils to Chest Clinic, 1. Chest x-ray, 1.

The Heve test for the detection of Tuberculosis was done on age groups of six and 13 years, namely

grades one and eight in both Lincoln and No. Woodstock schools. The High School Seniors were also included. Several teachers and the cafeteria personnel took this test. The test was given by Dr. William Prince, Director of Communicable Disease Control, N. H. Department of Health, assisted by State Nurse Loretta Russell and the local nurse.

The services of a Dental Hygienist were obtained through the Bureau of Dental Health. This service consists of teeth cleaning and the application of three treatments of Fluorine, the latter being an agent which helps prevent tooth decay. This was carried out in the first five grades of the No. Woodstock school. The same program is now being set up for the preschool children of both towns.

Instructions on Home Care of the Sick were given to the High School Home Economics class. This class also had instruction on applying the Ace bandage.

The Christmas project was aided substantially by funds from the Salvation Army, the Elks and Emblem Club of Littleton, donations from friends and the high school students. As the result of this kindness, toys, food and clothing were bought and given out.

At this time I would like to thank all who helped on this project and for co-operation during the year.

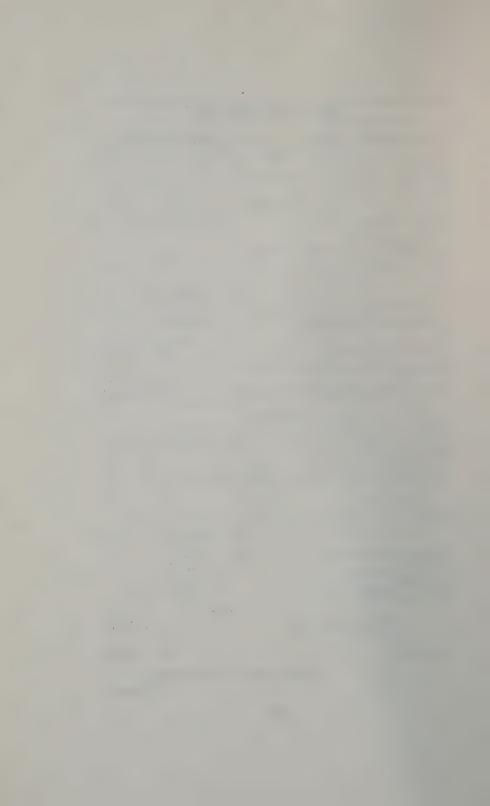

#### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

#### **Financial Statements**

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1960 — December 31, 1961:

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1960 and December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$5,693.54 in 1961.

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,862.55, less a revenue surplus of \$2,-163.78, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,698.77.

#### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1961, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### Statement of Long Term Indebtedness:

(Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1961, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

#### Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpavers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### **General Comments**

#### Current Deficit:

The current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) decreased from \$17,426.58 to \$920.12 in 1961, as shown herewith:

#### Surety Bond of Town Treasurer:

The surety bond of the Town Treasurer should be increased from \$10,000.00 to \$20,000.00 in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportional to the amount of funds in the custody of the Treasurer.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Lincoln qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said District on the thirteenth day of March, 1962, at 10:30 A. M., to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the School District for the ensuing year.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
- 6. To hear the report of the School Building Study Committee, and take any action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to change the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund, established at

the meeting of December 10, 1955, to now read: establishment of a capital reserve fund for new buildings, additions and alterations to the existing school buildings, and for the purchase of new equipment, said funds to be placed in custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds, and reserved for new buildings, additions and alterations to existing school buildings and for the purchase of new equipment in accordance with the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended.

- 8. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to petition the Superior Court for a special meeting for the purpose of school construction and raising money for the same, prior to the next annual school meeting.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to continue the present School Building Study Committee and raise the sum of \$500.00 to be used by this Committee in presenting building plans to be voted on at the next annual school meeting or a special meeting called for that purpose.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to accept the Lincoln Inn property, so called, consisting of 25 acres more or less, and authorize the School Board to complete the transfer.
- 11. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State Agencies.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### LINCOLN SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Your School Committee feels that its major function is to see that the school buildings are well maintained, well staffed, and that adequate equipment is supplied so that the education of your children is at the level you, the school district, demands.

Feeling that a decision must be made in the near future as to the direction in which the school district will move, the maintenance of the high school has been held at a minimum. The gymnasium floor has been painted and the roof over the science laboratory has been patched. Shelves have been built in the upstairs corridor for storage of library material.

The elementary building has been painted on the exterior. The school cafeteria has been completely painted; floors, walls, and ceiling.

Sufficient light for studying was not supplied by the method of lighting existing originally in both buildings. The wiring in the elementary building was not capable of handling additional loads. The top story of this building has been rewired and new light fixtures installed in these rooms.

Murray and Edward Clark donated materials and labor for basketball backboards and soccer goals. This new equipment was set in the playground with the assistance of Mr. Dean. The School Board wishes to thank them for their contribution and civic interest.

The past year has found changes in the high school faculty. The district was fortunate in the return of Miss Joan Lehan as the instructor in mathematics. Miss Lehan was the recipient of a National Defense Educational Act grant, and has been doing advanced study at Boston College. Mr. Floyd Ramsey and Miss Claire Gauthier have proved valuable re-

placements. From the results of national achievement tests, it may be concluded that there is an excellent group of teachers now in the secondary school.

David Burbank, of the present senior class, was one of twenty-three semi-finalists in the state on the National Scholarship Program. The scores obtained on the National Merit Scholarship and College Entrance Tests by the college preparatory students have consistently been above average. The elementary school staff remains the same as in the past and the work there is of high caliber.

During the past year there has been a continued interest in the faculty for advanced study. A large percentage of the teachers have traveled to Plymouth and Littleton to take courses supplied by the University of New Hampshire and Plymouth Teachers College. We now have an extension course given at the high school by the University. A majority of the faculty are enrolled.

The teachers' association spent a year in the study of the science curriculum. With the cooperation of the State Department of Education and other professional educators, a two day workshop was held at the beginning of the school year. A majority of the elementary teachers took a course in the teaching of science at Plymouth. Science equipment was procured under the National Defense Education Act. A new series of science textbooks were adopted in the elementary school. This has led to an enriched science program for your children.

Mr. Shea has introduced a week of camping experience for the seventh and eight graders. This program makes it possible for students to attend the Sargent Camp of the Boston University. This program provides opportunities in democratic living, assuming of responsibilities and in the development of initiative and self-reliance.

The library in the high school, under the direction of Mrs. Edmund DeGrace, is growing in the number of volumes and in the use of these by the students. A system has been instituted for the use of periodicals for research materials. A grant of \$634 from the National Forest will aid in development of this facility.

In keeping with progress, a television set has been purchased for use in the elementary school for educational science programs, half of the cost to be supplied by N. D. E. A.

The physical education program instituted last year is being carried on well. The addition of a trampoline and a vaulting side horse have completed the major equipment requirements. Soccer has been added as a varsity Fall sport. The cross-country team won the Pemi-League championship and placed third in state competition. The baseball team won the championship of the Pemi League. The Ski Team won the big one and came home from competition at Manchester as State Champions.

The School Building Committee have been holding regular meetings during the past year and have cooperated fully with the School Committee. It is felt by your committee that adoption of their recommendations, relative to a six-year comprehensive high school, is a necessity for the Lincoln School District in the near future or elements beyond your control will force your high school to be closed.

The Board would like to state in conclusion that it has enjoyed pleasant relations and full cooperation with your superintendent, Ronald A. Perham, and looks forward to the coming year as another opportunity to serve you for better education in Lincoln.

#### ADJOURNED SCHOOL MEETING

An adjourned school meeting was called to order at 7:30 P. M. in the Lincoln High School on March 28, 1961, to take up the following articles.

Article 6. To hear the report of the School Building Study Committee and take any action relative thereto.

Mr. Russell, as chairman of the Lincoln School Study Committee (now dissolved), presented a copy of the Lincoln School Study Committee report dated March 8, 1961, to the Chairman of the School Board. Motion by Mr. Sargent that the District accept the Lincoln School Study Committee Report as printed; and that the District authorize the School Board to obtain plans and cost estimates as may be required to determine the amount of a bond issue for each of the two proposed solutions as outlined in the report. This information to be obtained with the assistance

of any committee which may hereafter be appointed. Seconded by Mr. Hooker. A discussion followed after which a standing vote was taken. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to petition the Superior Court for a special meeting for the purpose of school construction and raising money for the same, prior to the next Annual School Meeting. Motion by Mr. Hooker that the District authorize the School Board to petition the Superior Court for a Special School Meeting at such time prior to the next annual School Meeting as may be deemed necessary by the Board. This meeting to be called for purposes of raising funds and authorizing bond issues for purposes of school construction, equipment and other purposes pertinent thereto; as well as for the purpose of determining and approving any contractural arrangements which may be necessary between Lincoln and adjacent towns for purposes of school maintenance. Seconded by Mr. Ledger. Discussion followed after which a standing vote was taken. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to set up a Building Committee, to consist of the School Board, one member of the Board of Selectmen and four members at large, to be appointed by the School Board Chairman and the Moderator, and to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used by this committee in presenting building plans to be voted on at the next Annual School Meeting or a Special Meeting called for the purpose. Moved by Mr. Sargent that a Building Committee be appointed as specified in the article and that this committee assist and advise the School Board in determining the information requested under the motion passed under Article 6 and that this com-

mittee be instructed to report to a public hearing and Special Meeting prior to petitioning Superior Court for a Special Meeting and that the sum of \$1,000.00 be raised under this article for the use of this committee for the purposes outlined and any unused portion to be returned to the School Treasurer to be applied against the appropriation. Seconded by Mr. Hooker. A discussion followed. Mr. M. Clark amended the motion to read that one half of the members at large be picked from the floor. Seconded by Mrs. M. Clark. After more discussion Mr. M. Clark rescinded this amendment and a standing vote was taken on the original amendment. Vote in the affirmative.

Under Article 11 the following resolution was entered by Mr. G. McGee. Be it resolved that at any future meeting at which the District may vote to incur indebtedness by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, the voting thereon shall be by ballot and that the period during which such ballots may be cast be established and of a sufficient length of time to permit all persons who care to vote by ballot to do so. A checklist shall be used at said meeting. Seconded by Mr. Waldo. A discussion followed and an amendment was added by Mr. M. Clark that the polls be open from 12 noon to 7 p. m. Seconded by Mr. E. Clark. The vote on the amendment to the resolution was in the negative.

Mr. R. Russell made a motion to adjourn the meeting and it was seconded by Mrs. Plummer. Vote in the affirmative.

## SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 34 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 34, during 1960-1961, received a salary of \$8,250.00 which was made up as follows: \$4,250.00 paid by the State Department of Education from the per capita tax and \$4,000.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,100.00 for travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

#### **Financial Statements**

Comparative Balance Sheets: June 30, 1960 — June 30, 1961:

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1960 and June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the District changed from a Surplus of \$983.60 to a Deficit of \$553.15 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961.

in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue deficit of \$571.62, less a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$43.91, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$527.71.

#### Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1961, is shown in Exhibit F.

#### School Lunch Program Account:

(Exhibit G)

A summarized statement of the School Lunch Program account is contained in Exhibit G. In relation to this account, the following recommendations in regard to procedure are made:

(1.) All receipts should be deposited in the School Lunch Program bank account, and all payments made therefrom by checks.

- (2.) Cash payments will be eliminated thereby.
- (3.) Checks received from the School District for food reimbursements should be deposited in the bank and not endorsed payable to vendors.
- (4.) Checks from the School District should be made out to the "Lincoln School Lunch Account" rather than to an individual.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.
