TOWN WARRANT

1956

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy a truck for the Town or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges or take any action thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$385.44 the State will contribute \$2,569.62 for the Class V Construction, reconstruction or betterment Aid.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase Metal Culverts, or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase Calcium Chloride, or take any action relating thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to give the selectmen the right to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for Old Home Day.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$85.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for repairs in the cement walls and a broken window frame in the basement of the library; also for grading of the bank behind the library so that water from rain and snow will run around the building instead of under the building and through the basement.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the cemetery.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Civil Defense.

16. To see if the Town will vote to continue to pay on a note which was borrowed from the Trust Fund or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for fire trails and water holes.

18. To see what can be done for the care and maintenance of the Town dump and raise and appropriate money if needed for same.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to pay for the work carried out during the summer for Pine Blister Rust control as recommended by the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.

20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for paint and repair of the Town Hall, and dispose of the safes therein.

21. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Boy Scouts of Nelson to use the Town Hall as a meeting place, without charge.

22. To see if the Town will vote to allow the local Scout Troop to repair and construct an equipment closet in the old wood storage room of the Town Hall. Such closet to be used by Scouts and Town Officers. All expenses to be defrayed by the Scout Troops.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Town fire equipment.

24. To see if the Town will vote to institute zoning laws in the town of Nelson.

25. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE TOWN OF NELSON

March 8, 1955

The Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator at Nelson in the forenoon and the following articles were acted upon.

The Town Officers were elected and duly sworn into office by the Moderator.

The amount of \$6,731.76 was raised to defray town charges.

Article 3 was passed over as there was no need for a truck at the present time.

Under article 4 the amount of \$7,500 was raised for repair of highways and bridges. \$500 for repair of grader, \$3,000 for winter maintenance and \$4,000 for Summer Maintenance.

Article 5 was accepted as read and the selectmen were empowered to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6, pertaining to an air compressor was passed over, and voted out.

Article 7, the amount of \$126.00 was raised to purchase a new road rake.

The amount of \$100.00 was raised under article 8 for the support of Old Home Day.

For Memorial Day the amount of \$55.00 was raised under article 9.

Article 10, the town voted to raise the amount of \$385.52 to go with the State support for T. R. A.

Article 11. The amount of \$78.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 12 was passed over with the vote of 28 to 25 and later in the meeting with the vote of the people it was reopened under article 29 and the amount of \$150.00 was raised for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 13. The library did not request any money so this article was passed over.

Article 14 was passed over (Pine Blister Control).

Article 15 pertaining to the Town Dump. Raised \$50.00. A motion made and seconded that use of facilities be continued for purposes of dumping rubbish only, to exclude garbage or any organic matter. Infraction of law prosecuted by proper town authorities and dumping take place only behind sign. (Mrs. Ellicott offered to make signs.)

Article 16. The selectmen were empowered to act on the acquisition of the heaters in the Munsonville School and to install them in the town hall should it become feasible to do so.

Article 17. The amount of \$200.00 was raised for repair of loader.

Article 18. \$150.00 was raised for the Cemetery and the article was accepted as read.

Article 19. Fire trails and waterholes. Passed over article.

Article 20. Selectmen be requested to investigate liability Insurance and procure such insurance in the best interest of the town as they may deem feasible. Town appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to be used by Selectmen for the purpose of procuring Forest Fire Insurance for Forest Fire employees. This sum to be used by the Selectmen in conjunction with the procurement in addition thereto of adequate comprehensive Insurance coverage for the town. The additional cost of which shall be taken out of General Fund at their discretion.

Article 21. Civil Defense—passed over.

Article 22. Accepted as read. Money to pay back Trust Funds.

Article 23. Raised \$300.00 for the purchase of Metal Culverts.

Article 24. Amount of \$200.00 raised for Calcium Chloride.

Article 25. \$175.00 raised to purchase a sander from the State.

Article 26. The amount of \$300.00 was raised to purchase fire hose for the town fire equipment.

Article 27. The article pertaining to zoning laws was passed over.

Article 28. It was voted to accept this article and to gravel the driveway leading from the State Highway to the sheds behind the Nelson Village Church and to remove any necessary Stones.

Article 29. Other Business. Motion. Road Agent be directed to bring in a statement of all essential road repairs contemplated, the costs thereof and the estimated costs of the maintenance of the equipment with a reasonable breakdown of the figures and support thereof. First to be submitted to the caucus for purposes of preparing the warrant and then submitted to voters at Annual Town Meeting.

Motion. That the Fire Chief and Deputy prepare a statement estimating the costs to the town of maintaining proper fire equipment and facilities to be presented.

Mr. Jack Sherrard was given the floor and allowed five minutes speaking time.

The meeting was adjourned by a vote of the people.

9. To see whether the district will authorize the School Board to pay existing construction obligations with funds designated for payments on principal and interest in the 1955-1956 Appropriation and in the event this surplus is insufficient, to raise and appropriate the balance, the total sum not to exceed \$2,583.17.

10. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to equip the enlarged Munsonville School.

11. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to complete the Munsonville School.

12. To see whether the district will vote to elect a Building Committee to work with the School Board for the ensuing year, the number of members to be determined by district vote.

13. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p. m. by the moderator, Francis W. P. Tolman, who then read the School warrant.

Article 5. Motion by Rodger Tolman: Moved that this article be passed over as the contents are taken care of in a future article. Carried.

Article 6. Motion by Rodger Tolman: Moved that this article be passed over as these reports are included in the town report.

Article 7. Norman M. L. Bergh was elected Auditor for the coming year by one ballot cast by the clerk. Mr. Bergh was sworn in by the moderator.

There were no other elections necessary at this time.

Article 8. A discussion followed the reading of this article concerning the wording of same. After learning from our superintendent, Dr. Charles Bowlby, that this is a necessary form used in accordance with state rules, the chair ruled that this article should stand as read unless the meeting was in disagreement.

Motion by Rodger Tolman: Moved that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,802.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

The above motion had been previously reviewed by the State Tax Commissioner, Hilton C. Buley, and found to meet the requirements of local school districts in securing the necessary appropriations of school district funds at the annual meeting.

Motion by Florence Tolman: Moved that the town express appreciation for the extensive work done by the school board during the past year. The motion carried.

Article 9. Motion: Moved that a written ballot be used for this article. The motion carried.

The votes cast were as follows:

The article carried "to construct and equip a classroom and activities room addition on the Munsonville school."

Article 10. A discussion followed the reading of this article concerning the expenditure of money needed by the school district. Motion: Moved that this article be passed over and taken up before the end of the meeting. The motion was carried.

Article 11. Motion by Rodger Tolman: Moved to delete the clause in this article that reads, "or if necessary to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 (Three hundred dollars) for the purchase of land," and to accept the land offered for school construction purposes. The motion was carried.

Article 12. Motion by Sheldon Barker: Moved that the article be accepted as read. Carried.

A discussion followed concerning the size of the building committee, after which the following motion was made and carried:

School property is used in all communities by local non-school groups but only under board regulations established for the protection of the property and school funds.

Such policy includes all or part of the following rules:

1. The use of the school facilities by school groups takes precedence over use by any other groups.

2. Application for use of the school facilities should be made to the chairman of the school board by the responsible officer of the requesting group.

3. The responsible officer of a group granted the use of the school facilities must sign the following agreement:

a. Accept financial responsibility for all damage or loss.

b. Pay for any necessary expense of cleaning caused by use of facilities.

c. Pay a fee covering cost of heat and light used.

4. Use of kitchen facilities only upon special request and agreement.

5. A janitor, school board member or a teacher to be on duty during use of the school facilities.

a. In case any of the above are not available the board may accept the officer of the requesting group as responsible for the property."

Motion: Moved that the recommendations of the school board be adopted. The motion carried.

Article 17. Motion: Moved that this meeting be adjourned until Saturday, March 19th, 1955 at the Nelson Town Hall.

This motion followed a discussion and was made to give the building committee and school board time to work out the necessary plans and related information.

The meeting adjourned at 10:35 P. M.

MINUTES OF THE ADJOURNED MEETING
Held in the Nelson Town Hall, March 19th, 1955

The motion was seconded after which a discussion followed concerning the possibilities of school aid. Mr. Iselin requested a written ballot which was granted.

Motion by William McIntyre: Moved that the report of the building committee be heard at this time. The motion carried.

The report was given by Newton F. Tolman, chairman of said committee, who informed the meeting that about one hundred typewritten pages of information had been assembled.

Mr. Tolman read from the report and spoke on the subjects: of: existing and possible water supplies; building plans not submitted at this time as voters should have their voice in the matter; employing a local contractor and an architect, the latter by the hour; authority the committee can use pertaining to the construction but not in matters of money; decisions made by the town's counsel and state school commissioner concerning the previous employment of an architect; appreciation to the school board and other citizens for their help; and related information.

Motion by Raymond Huber: Moved that we consider Article 10. The motion carried.

Article 10. Amendments by Newton F. Tolman:

1. That the sum of \$19,000 be substituted for the sum of \$30,000. Adopted by voice vote.

2. That the elected School Building Committee shall have an authority equal to the authority of the school board in determining all matters pertaining to new building and renovating, excepting the duties of the school board as set forth by law. And that all questions as may arise pertaining to new building and renovating, excepting those which are the duties of the school board as set forth by law, shall be decided by a majority of the combined school board and building committee.

Adopted by voice vote.

3. That the building committee and the school board together select an architect willing to do the minimum of work required by them, and select a local contractor in their opinion best qualified for the job.

Adopted by voice vote.

The chair explained that printed ballots would be used as the bonding company preferred this method.

Motion by Robert Robinson: Moved that the officials fill in \$19,000 on the ballots.

The motion was carried by voice vote.

Motion: Moved that Article 10, as amended, be adopted as follows:

Moved that the school district raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$19,000 (nineteen thousand dollars) for the purpose of constructing and equipping a classroom and auxiliary facilities to the Munsonville school, and to authorize the school board to borrow on the credit of the district therefor; by issuance of serial notes or bonds, and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which such notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale, and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 72, as amended by Chapter 55, laws of 1949, and Chapter 5, laws of 1951, as amended by Ch. 9 laws of 1953 or future amendments thereto. That the elected School Building Committee shall have an authority equal to the authority of the school board in determining all matters pertaining to the new building and renovating, excepting the duties of the school board as set forth by law. And that all questions at may arise pertaining to new building and renovating, excepting those which are the duties of the school board as set forth by law, shall be decided by a majority of the combined school board and building committee. That the building committee and the school board together select an architect willing to do the minimum of work required by them, and select a local contractor in their opinion best qualified for the job.

After an explanation that the money might be needed immediately by the building committee and school board, be-

fore bonded money would be available, the motion was not carried.

Robert Robinson: Moved that the article be adopted as read. The motion carried.

Revert to Article 17. Motion by Robert Robinson: Moved to see whether the School District of Nelson will vote to pay Mr. Norman P. Randlett for architectural services rendered to the District.

The motion carried.

Motion by Robert Robinson: Moved that the School District of Nelson authorize the building committee and school board, sitting in joint session to pay Mr. Norman P. Randlett, a sum of money, not in excess of \$250.00, in recognition of services rendered.

The motion carried.

Motion by Robert Robinson: Moved that the Nelson School District adopt as a policy for the District, namely, that all original records, contracts, correspondence and any data pertaining to the operation and business of the schools are to be kept on file in this District by the School Board.

A written vote was requested and granted.

There should be every advantage to the pupils of Nelson, now that there are two teachers to help and serve them, with responsibility for only four grades each instead of the full eight grades for one teacher. Today, it is difficult to obtain teachers trained or experienced in teaching more than one grade, and it was fortunate that our last years student teacher, Mr. Whitman, was available to take charge of the four upper grades.

There will be many problems to solve in the future: getting our hot lunch program functioning properly; playground space away from the road; audience space made available for special programs.

I want to thank the Packersfield Club for their wonderful gift of a permanent curtain for our stage, also for making our Halloween and Christmas parties a success. Another thank you for the fish aquariums and the donation of the fish for the same.

I wish to acknowledge the fine support given me by the School Board, parents and citizens in administering a successful program.
