TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town and School District Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the Collector.
- 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$25,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from Taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Report.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.
- 8. To see what sum of money not to exceed \$14,000.00 the town will vote to raise and appropriate by the issuance and sale of serial notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, to be added to the sum in the capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a fire truck from American La-France Co. in accordance with the specifications as issued by purchasing committee; and that the Selectmen be authorized to determine the interest rate, denomination and form of said notes or bonds, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, and the terms of sale; and further to authorize the Selectmen to sign and affix the seal of the Town to said notes or bonds and the treasurer to countersign the same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application under the provisions of P.L. 560, 83rd Congress, for aid from the Federal Government to defray the cost of final plans and specifications to be prepared by Green Engineering Affiliates, Inc. for a sewerage system, including lateral and interceptor sewers, pumping station and force main and treatment facilities.
- 10. To see if the Town of Newfields will vote to appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to buy Visiting Nurse

Services for the inhabitants of Newfields from the Medicare certified Exeter Visiting Nurse Association and send one representative to serve on the Board of the Exeter Visiting Nurse Association.

- 11. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed changes in the Building Ordinances, the Zoning and Land Use Ordinances.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to closing the following roads subject to gates or bars: Old Lee Road and Hall's Mill Road.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

(Business Meeting to be held at 8:00 p.m.)

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 1968 has passed and checking our records shows a total of twenty calls for assistance from the Fire Department. In spite of the increase of calls over 1967, property loss has been kept to a minimum.

We were called out of town three times by Mutual Aid, once to assist the Town of Stratham and twice at Newmarket.

Our Department responded to the following calls: One oil heater fire, four grass fires, five railroad fires (grass, brush and ties), one rescue and one fire at Kingston (Warren Mfg.), three false alarms and one to rescue cat from tree.

I wish to thank all members of the Fire Department and all others who assisted in helping to keep our fire losses down.

The Selectmen appointed me as Chairman of the Committee of seven members to consider Cost, Type and Specifications needed to meet State Underwriter Approval in conjunction with article (12) in regard to purchase of fire equipment; findings to be reported on or before January 1, 1969.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Committee for the fine cooperation and assistance they gave me in completing this task.

Again I want to thank everybody and with your help we can make 1969 the best.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. At little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass; result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the backyard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own backyard is permitted on notification of the warden.
 - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish in the open by householders between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
 - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

With reluctance we wished Superintendent of Schools Mr. Raymond Hoyt a quiet and happy retirement. Dr. Edward Adamo, our newly elected Superintendent, has given us individual attention, valued council vital to our needs for a better and modern educational program. Our principal, Mr. Donald Hackett, has spent unlimited hours building curricula needs as well as stressing individual attention for better classroom achievement.

The annual School District meeting was held at the Town Hall on March 13, 1968. District Officers elected were: Mr. Lindsey Brigham, Moderator; Mrs. Mary Hallinan, Clerk; Mrs. Barbara Hallinan, Treasurer; and Mr. Robert Simpson, member of School Board for three years.

The Board elected Mrs. Glendora Lawrence as Chairman and Mr. Robert Simpson as Secretary.

Improvements to the school plant were limited because of lack of funds. Necessary, however, was the painting of the two lavatories and the outside school building. A coat of tar was essential to make travel possible during the mud season and to help the housekeeping problem.

The Robert Lawrence Memorial Library is open on Tuesdays and each grade is given designated time for book selections. Ninety-three dollars was available through donations and a trust fund to secure more books designed for grade levels and interest of pupils. The P.T.A. subscribes to two Book Clubs which add 24 current volumes. Mrs. William Knipstein is our volunteer librarian. She is assisted by Mrs. Barbara Tebo and Mrs. Ruth Glenn. Their devotion has been invaluable in the school system. A normal turnover is estimated at 160 volumes per week. We now have 1,500 registered books on the shelves. We wish to thank those who donated books, especially the sixth grade class of 1968 who gave the money for "The Story of a Real Boy" by H. Shute.

The Theater-By-The-Sea, in a T R Y project presented "Gamma Gerta's Needle," an old English comedy, at the town hall. It was the highlight of the winter session. We shared this experience with Mrs. Webster's class and the Rockingham School.

The P.T.A. voted last spring to give the School Board \$125.00 for playground equipment. It was decided to buy one see-saw at \$67.40 and one ladder and bars at \$72.40. Shipping and additional expenses were paid by the Board. Because of circumstances beyond our control these items have not been installed — let's hope for an early spring !

We wish to thank the P.T.A. for their educational programs, and a means of getting parents and teachers working together. We are appreciative of their soup and milk programs.

Smoking and disorder on the school buses have been a problem of long standing. We have adopted the policy of discipline as set down by the Exeter Board. Notices were sent home to the parents of all junior and senior high school students. A notice was printed in *The Exeter News-Letter* and a copy is presently posted in the Post Office. We have been assured of the full cooperation from the transportation company.

Budget and the up-dating of policy added six extra two day meetings (after midnight) to our scheduled sessions. The new and revised policy material should be in printed form before the school year ends. The growing problem in the number of tuition pupils and the tuition rates has made us increasingly aware of our responsibility to you as taxpayers. We appreciate suggestions from parents and citizens at all times — it is your school.

We wish to thank Mr. Hackett and his staff for giving a vast amount of their time and efforts to make our educational system a better one.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is a privilege for me to present this first annual message as Superintendent. Certainly, appreciation is due to my predecessor, Mr. Raymond Hoyt, who served the schools of Union#16 for twenty years. Finding the schools fully staffed, instructional materials on hand, and the complex business of the several districts in good order, was of great benefit to me and to the schools.

The new school year began with a Union-wide faculty meeting of the professional staff at the Exeter AREA Junior High School on Tuesday, September 3, 1968. On the following day the schools opened for instruction.

The Newfields School opened this year with 122 pupils, an increase of five pupils from the beginning of school a year ago. This represents a 4.3% increase. There are presently 39 Newfields pupils in the AREA Junior High School and 62 in the AREA High School.

My personal observations of Newfields has been thus far very limited. There have been the usual problems with buses, missing scholar supplies, and the typical learning difficulties which confront us every year. Even before school opened we were faced with the problem of over-enrollment in the fourth and fifth grades. The budget would not permit us to employ another full-time teacher. However, by means of cancelling other planned expenditures and by diverting limited uncommitted funds, we were able to employ Mrs. Carol Graves on a half-time basis. Under Mr. Hackett's leadership, a room was provided by moving the library to another location and the school was put in good order for the year ahead. The "freeze" on spending has been a hardship on the staff. Our employment of the new half-time teacher and the added costs of new tuition students required us to curtail expenditures. The staff has responded with understanding and ingenuity to work through their material problems.

The teaching staff has had several changes in the past year. Mr. Donald Hackett replaced Mrs. Lena Mead as sixth grade teacher and Mr. Leonard McMaster as Principal. Mrs. Catherine Verville replaced Mrs. Donna Batchelder as third grade teacher. Mr. David Michaud replaced Mr. Leonard McMaster as fourth grade teacher. The present staff and their grade assignments are listed below:

Mr. Hackett reports on the progress of the school as follows:

Newfields Elementary School has been fortunate in the relative stability in the size of its student body. Our enrollment is currently 120 students. Generally, it may be stated that the student body has adjusted favorably to the large staff turnover which the school experienced.

The instructional program has been enhanced by the addition of a half-time teacher for the morning sessions of the fifth grade. This has enabled the school to treat the intermediate grades as three distinct units, rather than the two of past years. The advantages are obvious in the lessened class loads and the ability to give more individualized instruction.

Although the school has been fortunate in its remedial reading program, it still has an inadequate instructional program for the slow learner. The prospect of losing the school's one concrete program in this area may pose problems in the coming year.

Severe shortages of funds have been felt in limited scholar supplies and instructional materials and equipment. Although impeded by this shortage, I must commend the staff for its continuing high morale in meeting these deficiencies.

As Principal, I must recognize with sincere thanks the Newfields PTA. Its continuing efforts are reflected in their support of the milk and soup programs; in their assistance with the large school Safety Patrol; in the securing of two more pieces of playground equipment; in helping to clean the school; and in its help in the instructional program. The PTA provided half the cost for teaching periodicals for each child. In addition, it has provided funds to more properly equip a first grade.

The close relationship inspired by the School Board with the school staff and the Principal has served to enhance the effectiveness of the total school effort.

Finally, I must recognize the thanks merited by the many pupils who have exerted leadership in the ongoing efforts in the care and maintenance of the school. Most especially, the dedicated staff deserves recognition and thanks. Together, our efforts hold promise of even greater growth in the coming year.

> MR. DONALD HACKETT, Principal.

It has been a pleasure to work closely with Mr. Fred King, Teacher Consultant, in his vital work as teacher adviser and curriculum developer. Mr. King's comments on his work speak for themselves:

A great deal of careful planning must take place if the elementary school is to accomplish its assigned responsibility for education.

Various study groups this year have been formed to look at curriculum areas. A committee at present is taking a look at our science program. We have a general committee consisting of one member from each grade level. This person in turn works with all the teachers of that grade level in the Union. Programs and ideas are exchanged. The eventual goal will be to come up with the latest in science education for students in Grades One to Twelve.

We had another committee this past fall to study our testing program. The state is currently sponsoring state testing at Grades 2-4-6 and 8. We decided to adjust our programs to go along with the state program. Grades will be testing each fall with achievement and intelligence tests.

We have a Union Committee currently working on our report cards and reporting symbols. Report cards have been the traditional vehicle for reporting academic progress to parents. Some new report cards are attempting to report a more comprehensive analysis of total growth. The committee will hopefully have a revised ranking procedure ready for the 1969-70 school year.

The Federal Grants continue to occupy a large portion of my time. At present Exeter, Newfields, and Stratham are studying a new Title I proposal. Realizing the importance of a child's first experience in school, a committee is studying a transition type program for the immature six year old. The committee feels it is a more sensible approach to spend time and energy on preventing problems rather than on remedying them.

Our Title II funds continue to place books and materials into our libraries. I regret to say, however, that we received only half as much money this year due to a Federal cut. I do feel this Federal grant has provided much needed resource material to aid children's natural curiosity to go beyond the textbook.

The second broad area is that of instructional improvement. This focuses on the degree to which children are actually learning to read, work with numbers, etc. The committee work mentioned above affects this area. The teacher consultant works with the staff members both individually and as groups. I am aware that school programs and teachers' efforts range over a continuum from traditional to modern, and from conservative to progressive. The main concern is that all children are challenged to use their full potential. It has been a pleasure to have served this community for the past seven years in these two vital areas of curriculum development and instructional improvement. I hope to continue to show leadership in future educational projects.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The present and future health of the nation depends in part on the understanding of individual and community health problems by the general public and on intelligent health behavior. This is the goal toward which health education is directed.

Through education only, can we expect returns from our efforts to establish good understanding and practices of health, hygiene, and safety among our young people. We therefore plan to make available interesting speakers, new films, filmstrips, publications and other aids to enrich the health education curriculum — ideally for use in connection with special class units at a time when material will be most meaningful to the students.

As of all special services it is often asked, "Just what is included in this program — do the results balance off favorably with the expense involved? Are we paying too much — or too little?" It is my belief that many are not really aware of just what their school health services encompass and strive to accomplish, and for this reason less philosophy and more facts are projected in my report this year.

Listed below are some of the routine health measures carried out under the supervision of your school nurse during the year:

- Maintaining up to date school health records on every child.
- Heights and weights.
- Vision screening, necessary referrals and followup.
- Hearing, screening, necessary referrals and follow-up.

- Evaluation of physical examination findings and follow-up according to recommendations of the school physician.
- Immunizations of children where advisable by school physician (with parent permission).
- Tuberculin testing on children of Grades 1 and 7, and members of the Staff.
- Dental hygiene program including application of topical fluoride.
- Free summer dental program for pre-school children in cooperation with the Division of Dental Public Health.
- Referrals to special services when indicated.
- Lazy-eye clinics and developmental screening on children 4 to $5\frac{1}{2}$ years (a program to be carried out during the week following the closing of school in June. We hope all parents of children in this age bracket will watch for notices of this important date).
- First aid and related services carried out in the office when the nurse is on duty never fail to present the usual program interruption.
- Elementary counseling where there is no such provision in the school plan must be offered in many instances by the school nurse.
- Home visits, while held to a necessary minimum, are, nevertheless, an important and time consuming responsibility under school health services.
- Communication between Principal, teachers, special education personnel, psychological services, school and private physicians, school nurse and parents are of considerable value in promoting an effective team approach. With all personnel working together, mindful of the other's role and in cooperation with the parents, progress can be faster and surer.

Again, these are but several of the many ways in which your school health service endeavors to make profitable use of all too limited time. Here I would like to mention that the State recommendation provides for a school nurse pupil load of from 350 to 750 and fewer where travelling from school to school or town to town is involved. This school nurse is carrying a pupil load of nearly 1,000 pupils enrolled in six schools located in five towns geographically spaced from seven to 21 miles apart. These towns are served upon a percentage basis according to school enrollment and each school is visited at least once a week — oftener upon request for special conference by an administrator, teacher or parent.

Parents are welcome and encouraged to visit the health office for conference when there is a health related interest which you may wish to discuss.

Its own role well earned, Volunteer services are increasingly in demand throughout our schools and of inestimable value. I cannot say how very grateful I am for the many hours contributed by the generous and conscientious volunteers in my schools during the past year. Their help and willingness to serve for other-than-pay reward is commendable and they are, indeed, a real part of the school team.

May I express my sincere appreciation of the support of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal Donald Hackett, members of the Staff, and to our school pediatrician, Dr. John Tuthill, whose interest and help has contributed greatly in making this a successful and pleasant working year.
