TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Ossipee qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall of the Ossipee Group Y. M. C. A. Inc., in said Town on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the ensuing year the following sums for the following purposes:

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$164.00 to the Lakes Region Association, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Lakes Region.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2463.00 to be expended on the Bear Camp Road, in order to obtain from the State the sum of \$4926.00 in State Aid money.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for repairs to the Old Conway Road running from the Effingham road to the outlet of Ossipee Lake.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to purchase new equipment.

- ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be added to the present capital reserve fund.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Blister Rust Control.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the plowing of driveways and leave the same to private enterprise.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used to improve the hill at the old Church at Leighton's Corner, on the road leading to Fogg's Ridge.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the extension of the Hodgdon Shore Road at Ossipee Lake.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used on the road from Hodgdon Mill Road to the bathing beach.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to print a list of the real estate valuations for the Town of Ossipee for the year 1948.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell all property coming to the Town through tax deeds; This power to continue until revoked by a subsequent town meeting.
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to request the Proprietors of the Boston & Maine Railroad

to erect and maintain gates across the highway at the Clark's Crossing, so-called, on the road from Granite to Ossipee; the Lakewood Crossing, so-called, on the highway from Center Ossipee to West Ossipee; and the West Ossipee Crossing, so-called on the highway from West Ossipee to Freedom.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell to Wm. Lord Co. whatever interest the town may hold in certain land on both sides of the White Mountain Highway which was given to the Town by Wm. M. Lord.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to continue tarring the road from Center Ossipee toward Tuftonboro Corner, from the Beech River Bridge. (Inserted on petition.)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200.00 to be used to purchase three portable fire pumps to be placed with, one the West Ossipee Fire Department, one the Center Ossipee Fire Department, and the Ossipee Fire Department, for forest fires. (Inserted on petition.)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint one highway agent on and after the annual town meeting to be holden on the second Tuesday of March, 1949, and that the vote upon this article be taken by secret ballot. (Inserted on petition.)

ARTICLE 21. To choose a Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Highway Agents, Tax Collector, Auditors, Library Trustee, Cemetery Trustee, and all other officers and agents required by law for the ensuing year. The Polls to remain open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to alter the hours during which the polls shall remain open.

ARTICLE 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies, and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

Outbreak of scarlet fever necessitated daily throat inspection during March and April. All absentees and known contacts were visited at their homes. cooperation with Doctors prevented further spread of the disease.

Since dental clinics have had to be discontinued for several reasons, and a number of pupils needing dental care, parents are urged to help correct this as far as possible.

Services of an orthopedic specialist for children of all ages is now available at Huggins Hospital. one interested in this type of correction should contact his Doctor or the Nurse.

A home nursing class was started at the high school in November for a thirty hour course. classes a week of one hour each have been held.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Ossipee:

The school year ending June 30, 1947 was historic in New Hampshire education. During this year twelve Lay-Professional Councils of thirty-six members each on a state wide basis, were formed for the purpose of studying New Hampshire schools and advising on their program. These 432 members and hundreds of guests studied the purposes and curriculum of elementary, secondary, adult, higher, and vocational education in the state; policies on cooperation among school districts; financial policies; and the responsibility of local, state and federal agencies for the welfare of the educational system of our state. The conclusions of the twelve committees were coordinated in a single report and published by the State Board of Education. This report is an outstanding contribution to the field of education and should be read by every citizen.

One of the most important outcomes of this work was the stimulus to greater cooperation between citizens, parents and members of the profession. Our schools would benefit greatly by similar projects on a local scale. This is being done in two districts through recently formed Parent - Teacher Associations.

Of primary importance was an act by the 1947 Legislature whereby state aid was increased to \$2,000,000.00. Most of our towns benefitted materially by this, with a consequent relief of real estate taxation.

But the problems of our schools never cease. A marked increase in school population in most towns, increases in cost in all deprtments, and the scarcity of qualified teachers raise important questions that demand the serious consideration of every citizen. In

your schools today are your future selectmen, representatives, school board members, doctors, lawyers, teachers, and merchants. They must be adequately trained to discharge the responsibilities on the local, state and national level that you now bear.

Teachers in the Ossipee schools during 1946-1947 were as follows:

High School: — Headmaster Phil A. Bennett, Mrs. Ruby Pearson, Miss Margaret Hintlian. Miss Hintlian succeeded Mr. John Randall Jr. who resigned in November.

Elementary school: — Mrs. Edna Kennard, grades 7 & 8; Mrs. Lillian Godfrey, grades 5 & 6; Mrs. Leda Knapp, grades 3 & 4; Mrs. Alice Loud, grades 1 & 2; Mrs. Martha McDuffee at Ossipee Corner.

At the beginning of the current year we had a complete change in the high school staff. headmaster is Mr. Philip C. Putnam, Winchester, Mass. Mr. Putnam has the degree of Master of Education from the Harvard Graduate School of Education: Mr. Paul O'Neil, Hudson, N. H. who is a graduate of Fitchburg Teachers' College and has had a half-year of graduate study at Boston University; Miss Enes Bazzocchi, graduate of Keene Teachers' College and whose home is in Portsmouth. In the fifth and sixth grade room is Mrs. Mabel Stevens, Eaton, N. H. who formerly taught in Portland, Maine schools. Ossipee Corner school is Miss Jessiell Boothby, of Parsonville, Maine, and a recent graduate of Gorham Teachers' College.

Following the recommendations of the Advisory Committee a new room was finished on the second floor of the Center Ossipee school building for grades 7 & 8. Grades one and two were separated with grade one remaining in the original room with Mrs. Alice Loud,

and grade two now occupies the room formerly occupied by grades 7 & 8, with Mrs. Lillian Godfrey as teacher. Grade one this year has an enrollment of 24, and grade two 23. The grades now have adequate room and good equipment. A new heating plant was installed in this building.

Enrollment for the current year in the high school increased from 64 of last year to 83. This group fills the high school room. There is only one class room available for high school classes which means that during most periods of the day classes have to be held in the main room with a large study group present. This greatly handicaps the teacher, the class, and those attempting to study with class activities going on in the front of the room. The further increase in high school enrollment which is evident from the population study presented below, will necessitate the provision of additional room for the high school, and another teacher.

Construction of new high school facilities seem imperative. The high cost of construction makes it necessary that all possibilities be thoroughly explored, and that once construction is undertaken the resulting facilities will be adequate for a long period of years. Ideally a Junior-Senior High School consisting of grades seven through twelve should be housed separately from the elementary grades. Estimates of the cost of such a building range from \$175,000 to \$200,000.

An alternative plan consists of a wing added to the present building which would permit use of the present 7th & 8th grade facilities and provide a shop and a home economics laboratory, made by dividing the present gymnasium.

A combined gymnasium and auditorium with a good stage, adequate playing surface, shower rooms, and office would provide better facilities for health and recreation for the school — and could serve as a center for community activities — would occupy the ground floor.

The first floor could contain three classrooms, one of which should be a laboratory. The present high school room would serve as a home room for two high school classes. One end of this room can be separated by a partition to provide a headmaster's office.

With this added room the present laboratory would be available for an elementary room to relieve the crowded conditions that will exist in the intermediate grade rooms. The present office will serve as a much needed nurse's room. This is estimated to cost between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

Such additional facilities as may be provided should be of such nature as to include grades seven and eight in order that they shall receive the benefit of vocational subjects and the high school physical education and recreational programs. This would mean reorganization of the school system on the 6-6 plan. The high school would consist of grades 7 through 12 with anticipated enrollment of about 140 pupils within the next three years. Recent national studies of school population trends indicate that there will be an increase in enrollment in elementary schools up to the year 1956, with the peak reached in high school enrollment in 1960. Action on this housing problem at the earliest time possible is urgent.

The cordial cooperation of members of the School Board, teachers, parents, citizens, and pupils makes my work in Ossipee a pleasure.
