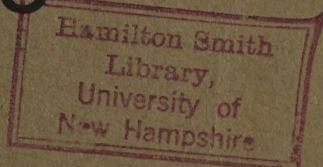

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$172.75, this sum to be applied with an allotment by the state of \$691.01, for improvements on Class V Roads.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the purpose of decorating tree on Pollard Park with lights in observance of Christmas.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 to be expended for the observance of Memorial Day.

6. To see what action the Town will take regarding the following Trust Funds:

- Eva Curtis Hill Fund .....\$100.
- William J. Burns Fund ..... 100.
- James A. Smith Fund ..... 50.

The interest of same to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Plaistow and North Parish Cemeteries.



7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to pay a discount of 3% on all taxes paid on or before the fifteenth day of July, 2% on all taxes paid on or before the fifteenth day of August, and 1% on all taxes paid on or before the fifteenth day of September until otherwise authorized by vote of Town.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, upon the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars, the same to be raised by the sale of Town's Bonds for the purpose of refinancing the Town's indebtedness, in the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

It is with pleasure that I present my annual report as Superintendent of Schools. Included in this report is the school organization for 1935-1936 and reports by the Music Supervisor and the School Nurse.

There has been one change in the teaching staff since my last report. Miss Isabelle Nelson resigned her position as teacher of the 4th grade. Miss Catherine Sullivan was appointed to fill the vacancy.

There were 229 pupils enrolled last year, which was 13 less than during the previous year. Twenty-nine pupils graduated from the eighth grade and twenty-four of these entered high school. The total school attendance averaged 94.29% of the membership. The average for the state was 94.66%. The Sons of the American Revolution Medal was awarded to Earle Granger.

There are 56 pupils in High Schools at present and 5 of these are in Grade 12 and expected to graduate in June. The estimated attendance for next year is 70, or a number about the same as we had before the drop caused by the depression.

Last summer the interior of the Westville School was repainted. This work greatly improved the lighting affect and the appearance of the room.

Clubs can be used to good advantage in school. A beginning has been made in this direction. A Sewing Club and a Handwork Club were organized for the girls of the four upper grades and were directed by Miss Cushing and Miss Edna Smith. Under the leadership of Miss Carroll a Stamp Club and a Nature Club were formed. More recently a Sewing Club was established for the girls in grades 3 and 4. Westville has

an enthusiastic Harmonica Club. Mention has been made of these activities not only because of their educational values but because they encourage worthwhile use of leisure time outside of school.

The local Parent Teachers' Association is of great help to the schools. The following are some of the things the association provided last year and this year to date: Sponsored Dental Clinic and Dancing Class; furnished clothing and glasses for needy children; paid for milk and cocoa for those that could not pay. Since last September, 10 children have been given a half pint of milk a day by the association. The local Red Cross has assisted the schools by furnishing money for first aid supplies, glasses and clothing. Contributions of money for clothing were also received from the Afternoon Sewing Club and The Kant Miss It Club. We greatly appreciate all this assistance to the children.

November 11-15 was observed as National Education Week in our schools. In observance of this week invitations were extended to parents to visit the schools. The response was excellent.

Last Spring a new method of teaching penmanship was introduced. Letter form, slant, and arm movement are about the same as in the former method. The feature of the new plan is that instruction becomes individual instead of group. The practice work is designed to remedy more effectively the defects in the penmanship of the individual. After a word, sentence, or paragraph has been copied from the model, it is analyzed by the teacher for defects. Then each child works to improve his writing by overcoming the difficulty. There are awards in the form of badges for those children that reach the standards set up for each grade.

Good teachers are the first requirements for effective work in education, but, regardless of the experience and standards of the teaching staff, close and efficient supervision is required to secure satisfactory results. In supervision, the chief function is to further the child's learning and growth. More recent thinking in the field of education has been directed toward the betterment of conditions which affect learning. Visiting and conferring with teachers is important; but this is not all. The selection of subject matter, supplies and equipment, the scientific study of teaching problems, the development and maintenance of professional spirit and morale are very essential.

The policy of the School Board in liberally supplying equipment, supplies and text books is commendable. The materials of instruction are thus kept up to date.

There is good progress in the work of all our schools. The fundamentals are being adequately stressed. To aid in directing instruction in the fundamentals standardized tests are given each year. Thus we are able to determine the standing of each class and individual as compared with others in the same grade elsewhere. These tests have another valuable function—to determine the points of weakness in each pupils' preparation, and thus to guide the teachers in providing drill where most needed. Many progressive tendencies prevail. The pupils are developing responsibility, co-operation, service and other character traits through school room activities. Individual differences are cared for. Creative experiences in art, dramatics, music, English expression and other fields are fostered.

Much space might be taken here in stating the progress the schools are making. An occasional visit of an hour or more and a conference with the teacher at the end of the day will be far more satisfactory to parents and to others who are interested than to read about school activities. Plaistow children are at work at least 175 days in the year, and both Teachers and Superintendent are only too glad for the townspeople to get better acquainted first hand with the things they are doing.

In conclusion, I wish again to express my appreciation to the teachers and pupils, to the School Board and to the parents and patrons of our schools for the loyalty and co-operation which has contributed so much to the childrens' progress.
