#### CIVIC PRIDE FUND COMMITTEE

Just a few short months ago while the exterior of the Town Hall was in the process of being covered with vinyl siding, a big question was uppermost in our minds. What in the world would be done with those "four ghastly holes" in the steeple! We could well imagine they would continue being the home of hundreds and hundreds of pigeons.

An idea was born. Why not cover those "four ghastly holes" with Town and State seals! In our minds we pictured the results - and it looked pretty nice. This is when the "Civic Pride Fund" began. We knew we needed the financial help of friends and neighbors - there was no way we could do it alone. We were told the seals would cost at least \$1,100. One morning, at everone's favorite meeting place, the Post Office, we began telling friends of our idea. In no time at all, \$500 had been pledged; the actual first cash donation was from a lovely lady in South Berwick.

On September 16, we started a Savings Account at the Granite State Bank. By November 19th, we had built our account to \$1,460.41. On November 22, we paid to Blouin, Inc. the sum of \$1,120. in full payment of four seals.

Our next problem was how to get the seals up there, and in place. A couple of volunteer came forward, and up went the seals in no time at all. We thank Paul Hanson and Louis Trundy for a job well done. A couple of real nice guys.

Our Memorial Plaque has been ordered and, a March 1st delivery date has been assured. \$100 was given as a down payment, on a total cost of \$342. The Civic Pride Fund will then have a balance of \$114.73. We'll keep on looking for and accepting donations for future projects to help beautify the Town Hall area. Perhaps for landscaping, or adding a spot light to the steeple.

We thank those who so generously gave and helped us to do something we can all be proud of. It has added much to the exterior look of our Town Hall.

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## SELECTMEN'S PROGRESS REPORT

Again, it's time to report to you the activities of the Board of Selectmen for the year 1976. It's been a good year...and one that has seen many changes and improvements. New systems are being introduced which will mean better understanding and communication between Selectmen and Departments, and Selectmen and Committees.

Beginning January 1st, 1977, the Board of Selectmen adopted a new book-keeping and check writing system. This system reduces the time needed for bookkeeping, and provides better information for decision making.

We are now in the process of setting policies for Highway, Fire and Police Departments. As far as we can see there are no such policies on record. Since 1974, Minutes of all Selectmen's Meetings are recorded and are available at the Town Office for anyone to check.

The Board now meets in session bi-weekly, thereby giving us the off-week for much needed office and administrative work. Correspondence has to be read, answered and filed, reports filled out, complaints heard, requests discussed, and on and on and on. Town government is getting more and more complicated, and with each new State and Federal program, it becomes even more complicated.

The School Offset is still in the talking stage. Through research in Concord we now know that doing away with this system is something that has to be agreed on between the Dover City Council and the Rollinsford Board of Selectmen. Hopefully, by next year, we will report progress toward bringing the offset back into the Rollinsford School District.

This year has seen a change in auditing system. We have hired Martin Hegarty, Certified Auditor, and our books will be audited by June of the following year.

Another change was in Town Counsel. The Board felt that the Town was not getting the service it should have been getting for the money involved. We have now hired Daniel Newman, Attorney, who resides in Berwick, Maine, with law offices in Dover. Mr. Newman will be with us Town Meeting night for everyone to meet.

Because of lack of sufficient water storage, the Town Hall would not qualify for reduced insurance premiums if a sprinkler system were installed. For this reason, and due to lack of funds, the Building Committee recommended that the Selectmen eliminate the sprinkler system from the interior renovation. As an alternative to the sprinkler system, the Selectmen would like to install a smoke detector system for a cost of approximately \$1,375. This smoke detector would be connected to a fire bell placed on the exterior of the Town Hall. Part of the cost of the smoke detector will be offset by slightly lower insurance premiums. The Selectmen at this time, express deep appreciation to the members of the Building Committee who helped to study and plan the Town Hall Renovation. Members of the committee included John Burke, Bob Soucy, Joe Lauze, Al Poirier, Al England, Ed Glovinski, Charles Bolian, Ken England, Paul Hanson and Edmund Jansen.

The Highway Department, with the help of TRA funds, did much to improve Foundry Street, from the corner of Silver Street to the American Legion building. Work included a new drainage system to keep water off the road, and road resurfacing. Proposals to improve the drainage on General John Sullivan and Sligo Road will receive priority in 1977.

#### THE NEED FOR ADDITIONAL TOWN SERVICES VS NEW TAXES

What do we want, what do we need, and what can we afford?? Some say we need more police protection, others say more fire protection, others say more street lights, others say better recreation programs, others say fix up the roads and build a few sidewalks, others say more sewer lines, others say extend the water lines and install a new water tank, others say it's time for property reassessment, and the State says we must stop open dump burning by July, 1977. Clearly, we can't afford to provide all these things at once. We are the first to admit that all these requests are valid, but we must establish priorities and try to get the best mileage possible from our tax dollars. The Selectmen will continue to seek ways of reducing costs without reducing quality of services.

The Board wishes to thank all who have contributed their time and knowledge in the interest of the Town this past year. We extend our sincere appreciation to all Town Departments, Boards, Commissions and Committees.

You are hereby notified that the polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Rollinsford Town Hall, on Tuesday, March 8, 1977, to bring in your ballots for the Town Officers to be elected in Article I, and to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School at 7:30 p.m. on the same day to act upon the budget and other articles in the Warrant, as follows:

#### ARTICLE I

To bring in your ballots for:

One (1) Selectmen and Overseer of the Poor for three (3) years. Town Clerk for one (1) year.

Chief of the Fire Department for one (1) year.

# TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD POLICE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1976

The following is a summary and general report of the Police Department's activities for 1976. The year was certainly a very busy one, with a record number of calls for assistance being answered. There were 66 reported accidents investigated; dog complaints soared to 81; a total of 30 thefts were reported; 25 serious cases of vandalism; along with many minor cases. The department is working on seven unsolved burglaries committed in 1976. There were several persons arrested for drug related charges, down from previous year. Arrests for major crimes were up from the previous year. Assaults and D.W.I. were prevalent in 1976.

The Police Department logged just under 70,000 miles of cruiser patrol for the year. A record number of homes were checked for vacationers. Over 10,000 man hours were worked by the Department with considerable free time being given to the Town. All together over 1,300 incident reports were made by the Officers plus another 300 calls for information and non-incident calls were processed. The Department got into budget trouble early because of several special officers quitting their posts for one reason or another and the Town having to use regular Officers to fill in and work the extra time usually worked by the special officers. This drained the budget considerably because of not being able to find responsible personnel to fill the yearncies.

The old Plymouth Cruiser cost us quite a sum in repairs as we did not get our new cruiser until the middle of April. There was not enough money budgeted for the maintenance and operation of the new cruiser and the budget fell further behind. Also, the Town had to pick up the full expense of the third full time officer, as his Federal Grant ran out in July. The cost of everything in the line of Police equipment went sky high as did everythink else. All in All, it was a rough year, budget wise, but was beyond anyone's control.

The Department is at this time, down to four men - three regulars and one special. This is due to the resignation of Richard Blake, who went full time with South Berwick Police Department and we are short handed again at this time.

The Department worked well with the other Town Departments and would like to thank the Highway and Fire Departments for their cooperation during the year, 1976. Also, I would like to personally thank the Selectmen, Budget Committee and the Citizenry for their patience and understanding.

I would also like to thank my men for their loyalty and devotion during the past year. They all worked very hard and long to make Rollinsfor a better place to line in. Officers for the past year include: Chief Albert England (5 years), Sgt. Edward Libby ( $2\frac{1}{2}$  years), Thomas Jaffarian (1 year -- resigned), Robert DeVine (Special 6 months, Regular 2 months); Special Officers, Richard Donavan (7 months) Richard Blake (several years -- resigned), and resigned Special Officers, Gary Bisson and Robert Morgan.

# TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1976

#### ACTIVITIES REPORT

The year 1976 is of the past, and your Fire Department hit an all time high in fire calls. Not only has the Department been busy answering emergency calls, they have spent an average of 400 hours training in various fields of fire service. This training was made possible through a new appropriation in the 1976 Budget. Training has become a very intricate part of the every day way of life of a fireman.

In August, 1976, the Department was inspected by the Insurance Service Organization, formally known as Fire Underwriters. They were very pleased to learn that the Department was participating in an extensive training program. Their complete report will be forwarded to the Selectmen later on this year.

Some of the officers enrolled in courses on various phases of "fire governed tactics" along with courses on "Sprinkler Systems.) Other officers enrolled in furnace characteristics. Some of the men attended classes offered by the State in ladders, protective breathing, ventilating, L. P. Gas, cardiac pulmonary arrest and arson.

Your Department also has two E. M. T. (Emergency Medical Technicians). This training is very valuable to the firemen as well as the rest of our community.

Not only has the Department been busy with training, they purchased a van from United Parcel Service, which has replaced the 1964 pick-up truck. This van required many hours labor before it could be put into service. We are very happy with the end result, as it has proven to be a very active time sayer at the scene of an emergency.

The Department also raised \$1,600.00 through various functions, to purchase a Deluge Gun which adds a very modern piece of fire fighting equipment.

One cannot express the required equipment, man power, and hours that it takes to combat the nation's number one killer "FIRE". But, you can rest assured, your 23 man Fire Department has set the goal of trying to be fully prepared, both man-wise and equipment-wise, in case any of you should have the misfortune to call (742-2779) to report a "FIRE"!!!!!

#### FIRE REPORT

We responded to a total of 112 fire calls during the past year. As one can see, this averages out to a call almost every three days as compared to approximately 45 total calls per year when I first became Fire Chief in 1971. A breakdown of the various types of fires follows:

The Board welcomed new members Shirley Curtis, Armand Laliberte, and Joseph Lauze, who were appointed by the Selectmen to fill the vacancies.

#### STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The commission's program fall into four major categories: (1) review of applications and permits, (2) regional program, (3) local assistance projects, and (4) information and education.

One of the requirements of receiving federal grants is that the commission evaluates proposals for projects within the Strafford Region which involve federal funds. Proposals for waste treatment systems mandated by EPA are an example. Review of the Local Public Works applications is another.

The Commission works with its member towns to solve common problems through mutual cooperation. The various regional progams undertaken by the commission provide valuable information and guidelines for making decisions on both the local and regional level.

#### Programs of Assistance to Rollinsford during 1976:

The completion of a regional solid waste management study as a basis for solving the problem of solid waste disposal through mutual cooperation of the member towns.

Provide planning board with a base map and zoning overlay for their use.

At the request of selectmen, provided town with an initial groundwater analysis, and two land use maps, for the years 1967 and 1974.

Aided selectmen in consideration of modified agricultural zone.

#### ROLLINSFORD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1976

The bulk of the year's work by your Conservation Commission was devoted to implementing some of the suggestions made in a Semester Project by a Forest Resources team from U.N.H.

The Town's tract contains a total of 195.5 acrea, of which about 115 acres is forested now. The Commission, with the help of County Forester, Don Black, and Professional Forester, Bill Lane, and a lot of hard work over several years, will make this beautiful town land into a multiuse park.

The Commission is solidly organized and willing to get the work done. The best help the Commission could wish for, is for Townspeople who want to put up fire-wood, to ask where and which trees to cull out. There are many of these, but there are also many fine, sound hardwood trees that should be preserved for all of us to enjoy. Cutting such trees for personal use only ruins the beauty of the forest for the rest of the Townspeople.

Initial improvement of mature stands by very selective harvesting, will yield about \$1,200.00 for the Town. The use of these funds is being discussed currently to determine which conservation practice is the most practical.

#### ROLLINSFORD SEWER DISTRICT

The Sewer District has been operating routinely and almost without incident during the past year and great credit must go to the superintendent, Lester (Barney) Eldridge for his skill, knowledge and dedication. He has been a tower of strength. He has taken, and apssed, and been certified in, several courses in sewage treatment plant operations. These have been on his own time and in addition to those required by the EPA.

Collections, for the most part, have been excellent. A very small minority have been delinquent and have forced the Commission to resort to the Small Claims Court for payment of sewer charges.

The investigation of Sewer and Pollution Control was made during the year 1975 and a report was given to the Commission on December 24, 1975. It is available to those who wish to read and study it. The conclusions are, financially, frightening.

Among the conclusions are:

Page 1. paragraph 1 - "Sewering the Phase I area will meet the immediate, pressing needs of most developed portions of the district,

Appendix B, Rehabilitation (this is made in considerable detail, too much to include in this summary) at a cost of \$110,000. (Table 2, Appendix B)"

Page 5, paragraph 8 - "The present low population, combined with high costs inherent in sewering the Phase II area, dictates that no sewers be constructed in the area until a significant number of dwelling units are either built or imminently planned......et seq.\*

The commission is in favor of rehabilitation and studies are presently being made to determine costs and get quotations from reliable contractors. Little or no Federal or State aid will be available to such a project and the above figure of \$110,000 is, obviously, outdated.

For those who wish to read the report of our engineers, we particularly urge study of pages 39 et seq.

Even if rehabilitation takes place, we are very hopeful that the present low rates will continue. A study of rates of surrounding towns will show how fortunate Rollinsford sewer users are that the plant was constructed at a time when rates could be reasonable. Sewage Treatment is expensive, and, presumably, necessary. Federal aid may be necessay, but it too is expensive and in many cases we would be far better off to 'go it alone'.

<sup>\*</sup> The cost, estimated, of an expanded sewer system, \$1,154,700. (Table 7). The Federal share would be \$568,600, the State share \$151,600 and the District's share paid for by taxes, users rates, and/or assessment, \$434,500 (Table 10).

To the Residents of the District:

The proposed 1977 School Budget shows a gross budget increase of \$20,816.92 or 3.77%. When outside revenues are applied to the net budget increase, the amount to be raised by local taxes is \$11,316.92 or 2.62%.

Included in the budget is a special request for maintenance in the amount of \$11,829.83 for health and safety improvements. Without the special request, the Board's proposed operating budget could show a net decrease over the previous year.

This is the second year that the Board has prepared "Special Request" items for building improvements. These "Special Requests" are being made at a time when favorable outside revenues permit maintenance improvements without a dramatic increase in the school budget. The improvements can have savings effects in the future as we protect our investment in the Rollinsford Grade School building.

Aside from the special request item of \$11,829.83, the major increase in the proposed budget will be found in salaries (\$12,395), A.R.E.A. school tuition (\$7,594), transportation (\$2,870) and fixed charges for retirement and F.I.C.A. (\$2,902). An increase of \$7,000 for school lunch is offset by a federal reimbursement and has no effect on local taxpayer costs.

Smaller increases of note will be found in the moderator's salary (\$30), audit (\$400), Strafford Learning Center (\$174), custodial supplies (\$590), electricity (\$800) and Supervisory Union (\$536).

Major budget decreases will be found in the special request item listed under Maintenance of Plant (\$9,762) and Debt Service (\$3,411).

Salary increases for personnel approximate 6.5 per cent over current salaries. Salary increases beyond 6.5% are recommended in the custodial and school lunch accounts to correct deficient pay rates in these areas.

The Board continues to seek a balance in its budget recommendations by making school improvements while being conscious of the tax burden shared by the people of the district. The Board asks your support in its efforts.

## Principal's Report

Rollinsford Grade School February 3, 1977

TO: The Superintendent of Schools
The Rollinsford School Board
The Citizens of Rollinsford, New Hampshire

## RESPONSIBILITY OF THE SCHOOL

The following is an extract from the manual published by the State of New Hampshire Department of Education entitled, "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary School Approval."

The New Hampshire Elementary School should:

- have clearly stated purposes that represent its commitment to children, to knowledge, and to society;
- . have a responsibility beyond the teaching of the "basic skills";
- reflect a concern for self-concept and personality development of children;
- provide opportunities for children to practice and to learn the skills of effective group living as a part of their learning experiences;
- . demonstrate its respect for the individual;
- . foster creativity in children;
- recognize and must make provisions for meeting the individual differences among children;
- relate the learning experiences of children to their world and to reality as they know it;
- provide opportunities for children to share in planning and organizing their classroom activities;
- view evaluation as a continuing activity, that is, an integral part of learning rather than an aftermath;
- be responsive to children's needs that arise from conditions peculiar to the home, the community and the neighborhood;
- . be free to develop the specifics of its instructional progress;
- use the time of children and staff in ways that are consistent with the purposes of its instructional program;
- be of reasonable size and must maintain classroom units that foster optimum learning opportunities;
- purposely place each child in a setting that best promotes his learning;
- be attentive to the problems created by transitions from grade to grade, and school to school;
- . effectively utilize the strengths of its staff;
- extend beyond the four walls of the classroom and beyond the physical limits of the school building;
- . have superior leadership;
- . have a competent staff;
- . assume a leadership role in the community.

### COMMENTS REGARDING ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

The new Commissioner of Education in the State of New Hampshire, Dr. Robert L. Brunelle, has clearly indicated that the theme of his administration will be "Back to Basics." Most of us recognize the need for the teaching essentials - reading, writing, speaking, and computational skills. Perhaps we also are sensitive to the development of other standards for the educated person. Such standards might include an appreciation and under-

standing of the ways in which we gain knowledge, an acquaintance with mathematical and experimental methods of inquiry, and the knowledge of other cultures and the historical forces which have shaped the present and will shape the future.

Although most of us recognize the need for these essentials and standarrds, let us not lose sight of motivational factors which directly influence these learnings and acquisitions. One such motivational factor is how and what the child thinks about himself. The way the child learns to think about himself will affect everything he does in school or out of school. It will set the pattern for his behavior throughout life. Every day the experiences the child has in school adds to his self-picture. Are we helping him build success, interest, and vitality, or are we teaching him frustration, boredom, and defeat?

One of the most important things considered by the elementary school teacher is level of instruction. At the Grade School we monitor the child's progress in skill areas such as computation and reading and provide instruction for the child at a level which most adequately fits his needs. We attempt to make assigned work challenging but not always so difficult that the child acquires a defeated attitude. A sense of accomplishment generated by completed work along with positive comments by teacher and parents does a great deal toward the building of the child's confidence and self-picture.

We want the children of Rollinsford to acquire the essentials of basic skills and also have a good attitude toward school and of themselves. We believe we are putting forth a worthwhile effort toward that end.

## FACULTY & STAFF

The teaching staff for 1976-77 has remained ten classroom positions and one physical education position. Mrs. Linda Lash was granted a leave of absence for the year. Her position as second-grade teacher was filled by Mrs. Jackie Pulkkinen. Mrs. Barbara Lawton, Miss Elaine Lauterborn, and Miss Lesley Myers have continued part-time as Music Supervisor, Guidance Counselor, and Speech Therapist, respectively.

Mrs. Joanne Daigle, R.N., has worked in a dual-position as Library Aide and Nurse. The staff was saddened by the passing of Mr. Chellis Carville on January 1. Mr. Carville taught private musical instrument lessons at the Grade school for a number of years. His position was filled by Miss Velna Roy. Mrs. Chris Reishus has continued as tutor in the federally-funded Title I Reading Program. Mr. David Holmes has worked as Assistant Custodian replacing Mr. Gary Caron.

At the administrative level, Mr. Leonard Robbins left his high school principalship to replace Dr. John Gawrys as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

ARTICLE 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

A motion was made by Edmund Jansen, Jr. to follow salaries as outlined in the budget, seconded by Kenneth Shorey. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers, chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion made by Edmund Jansen, Jr. to accept Article 7 as read, seconded by Richard Bradbury. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 8. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

A motion was made by Edmund Jansen, Jr. to have the State Tax Commission, Division of Auditing, audit the school books within six months following

June 30, 1976 and if they cannot meet this deadline to empower the School Board to have the books audited by a private auditor, seconded by Mr. McCann. Douglas Rollins amended the motion by empowering the School Board to have a private auditor audit the school district books forthwith, seconded by Corydon Curtis. Motion and amendment carried.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof.

A motion was made by Corydon Curtis to accept the article as read, seconded by Mr. McCann. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

A motion was made by Edmund Jansen, Jr. to accept the budget as presented, seconded by Mr. McCann. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

After much discussion concerning the fact that the school budget in general and the teachers' salaries are negotiated well in advance of the annual meeting the feeling was that the annual meeting should be held in advance of such negotiations. Mr. Labrecque pointed out that New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 197:1 provides that the meeting must be held between March 1st and April 20th. A motion was made by Mrs. Rollins to have the Superintendent of Schools speak, seconded by Mr. Eldridge. John Powers advised that prior to March 15th the School Board can renegotiate and suggested that the annual meeting be held sometime before that date. TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD, QUALIFIED TO VOTE AT TOWN AFFAIRS:

The Moderator, Ovid R. Viel, called the meeting to order at  $7:50\,$  p.m. He then proceeded to read the warrant as was approved by the New Hampshire Superior Court.

ARTICLE I. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for the purpose of renovation of the existing Town Hall, said amount to be financed by a ten year note.

Robert McGurren moved to accept the article as read, seconded by Joseph R. Lauze.

After discussion, a vote by ballot was taken. There were 120 votes cast, 95 votes in favor and 25 votes against.

The article was passed.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Sixty-two Thousand Dollars (\$62,000) for the purpose of purchasing a new pumper-tanker fire truck to be financed by a ten year note.

Arthur Osbon moved to accept the Article as read, seconded by Richard Wasson.

At this time, Ronald Brown, Chief of the Fire Department, was asked to explain the need for this type of equipment. He amended the article to \$50,000., stating that if \$10,000 was used from the Town Equipment Fund, we would only have to finance the remaining \$40,000. Arthur Osbon seconded the motion to amend.

A vote was taken on the amendment - passed unanimously.

A vote by ballot was taken on the article as amended. There were 121 ballots cast - 65 in favor and 56 against the article. The article was defeated as a 2/3 majority was necessary.

Helen Rollins moved that the Town reconsider the vote on a new ballot, seconded by Richard Wasson. A vote was taken and passed.

Helen Rollins moved that The Town appropriate \$50,100 for the purchase of a new pumper-tanker, seconded by George Leuchs.

After more discussion, there were 99 ballots cast - 60 in favor, 19 against. The article was defeated.

The meeting afjourned at 10:05 p.m.

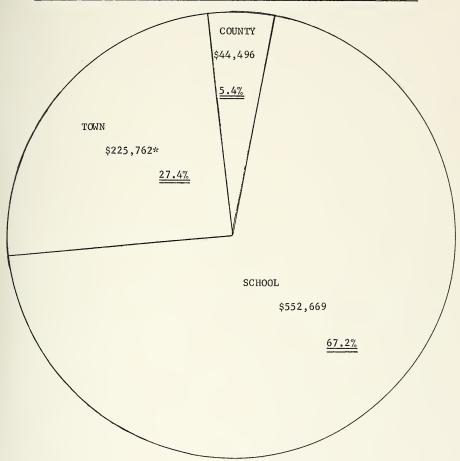

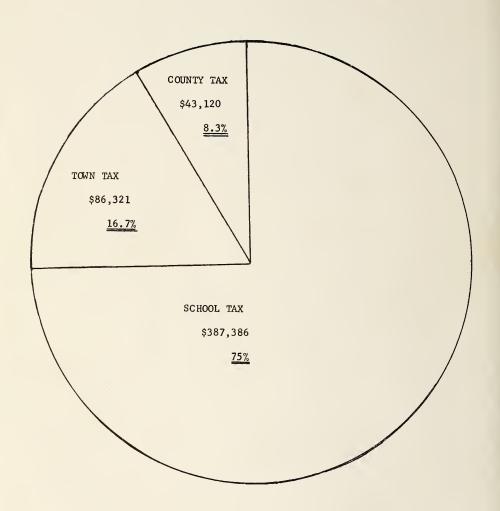
