THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (Tentative)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hali in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums and amounts of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges in anticipation, of Taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000) for Maintenance Highways and Bridges: Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) to be allotted to Summer Maintenance, Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) for Winter Maintenance.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,400) for the purpose of oiling black top roads?
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$175) for General Highway expenses.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept, raise, and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Fourteen Dollars and twenty-two Cents (\$914.22) for Town Rural Aid. (TRA).

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for permanent improvement.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for the purpose of making a payment on the Grader Note.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$190) for the Sanbornton Fire Department. To be used for Equipment and materials.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700) for the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to investigate and purchase a piece of land suitable for a Town Dump, and authorize the opening of same. The 1952 appropriation of \$600 is available for said purpose without further appropriation.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) for Old Home Day. By request.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) for Memorial Day. By request.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150) for Band Concerts. By request other than by Band Members.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) and make same available for the Library Trustee.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) for the Laconia Hospital. By request.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) for the Franklin Hospital. By request.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars for the eradication of White Pine Blister under the supervision of the State Forester. By request of State.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-One Dollars (\$151), on one-hundredth of one percent of the town's valuation, for the Lakes Region Association. By request.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Given under our hands and seal, this twenty-first day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-three.



UNSOLICITED COMMENT ON THE EFFORTS OF THE SMELT PATROL



It might be of interest to know that when the revaluation was being taken on the Winnisquam Shore property last summer, many of the property owners were in camp and with two exceptions, they were very pleased with the effort the Town made to have the Patrol; particularly were they pleased that after the season closed, the men of the patrol came into the area and cleaned up the empty bottles, etc., around the camps. One man who owns property on the lake front wrote March 19, 1952 that

"Regardless of how some of the townspeople feel, we believe the Smelt Patrol should continue under the Selectmen's supervision."

A second letter received Jan. 12, 1953 is as follows:

"I feel I should give further expression of the appreciation I feel as well of others I have spoken to concerning the Smelter Patrol."

"It is indeed gratifying to know that though a taxpayer but not a voter our friends and neighbors are interested in

looking after our interests.

"There is no need to relate the hazard at times the personal contact with the so-called 'sportsmen'. The splendid work done by Mr. Harper, Mr. Brooks and others of the patrol, who under circumstances, considering the length of the territory and small number of men available, is one of the most commendable acts of the town.

"I hope it will be continued and this year right up to the last night. We had a very difficult week when the Patrol was

taken off the last week."

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

With the money made available to us we have purchased much needed tools for fighting forest fires. Cement, insulation, a door, and heating equipment for the fire house have also been purchased and we are reserving enough money to heat the building for the remainder of the Winter.

We can report that through the generosity of the firemen in giving of their time and materials, we have been able to install a cement foundation, apply siding to two outer walls, put in an insulated ceiling, install an overhead door, and insulate two inner walls.

Aside from time consumed in drills the firemen have contributed over 660 man hours plus the use of trucks, tractors, and other equipment.

We have responded to all calls received during the past year amounting to six local calls and one out of town call.

We are asking the Voters for a small appropriation to enable us to finish our fire house, buy some small pieces of equipment and purchase oil to heat the building next Winter.

REPORT OF THE SANBORNTON PUBLIC LIBRARY

For the Year Ending December 31, 1952

Again we wish to express our appreciation to Mrs. Nathan T. Morse, Jr., for her very efficient work as librarian. The library is open on Wednesday afternoon from one to five o'clock, and the librarian is always willing to make special arrangements for those who find it impossible to visit the library at this time.

During the year 1952 the library has ioaned 3,348 books. Of these 239 were fiction, 227 non-fiction, 2,731 children and youth, and 151 magazines. We note that the number of books loaned to children is almost double that of the previous year, a very healthy sign. On the library shelves are many excellent books for adult reading, and this group would find it most valuable to them to take advantage of this service.

We are grateful for all the gifts of books and magazines which have been received. The largest gift, and one most appreciated by the young people, was from Mrs. Frederick G. Long, more than forty children's books from her library.

On Wednesday afternoons during the months of July and August, a story hour was conducted for the children, with Mrs. Morse, Mrs. Coombs and Mrs. Bodwell as readers.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sanbornton School District:

I herewith submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Another year has passed since my last report to you. Many changes have occurred during this period. Many adjustments have had to be made. Events have occurred that affect each and everyone of us. One thing which is becoming more and more apparent on the nationwide scene is the increasing number of school children and the need for additional monies to carry on their education. The public schools of America have been called the "one source of hope for the preservation of Democracy." Yet we are spending less each year of the national income to see that the source is

maintained. National figures show that schools are receiving less and less of the dollar than they have received in the past.

You in Sanbornton have provided generously for your pupils during the past two years. The greater portion of your tax dollar, has gone to support your school. This is in line with the action that other communities of your size have taken in New Hampshire. In larger communities where the cost of items such as police, garbage collection, public works, etc., are a factor we find a smaller percentage of the tax dollar going for schools. You may look with a great deal of pride to your school and feel a sense of pride for providing for them. The school is serving your community well and your children are being taught effectively and efficiently.

The Sanbornton Central school opened in September with the same staff as last year, namely: Mrs. S. Katherine French, Principal and teacher of grades 5 and 6; Mrs. Eugenia S. Carroll, grades 7 and 8; Mrs. Annette Larson, grades 3 and 4; and Mrs. Anne P. Abbott grades 1 and 2. It was with extreme regret that the Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Anne P. Abbott in November. Mrs. Abbott had given faithful and excellent service to the children in the Primary room. It is a difficult loss to the teaching profession to lose people of Mrs. Abbott's caliber. We were most fortunate, however, in being able to find an excellent replacement. Mrs. Beatrice B. Pelletier, a teacher with many years of service in the Tilton-Northfield schools was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by Mrs. Abbott's resignation. Mrs. Estelle C. Watts continues as the Music Supervisor and Miss Marion C. Moynihan is again serving you as your school nurse.

The School Lunch program has been an important part in the Central School. It has provided excellent meals for the children and has given the school the opportunity to teach proper attitudes at the table. Mrs. Lucinda Patterson, who has given the district excellent service, opened the year and continued to give to the children her usual high standard of school lunch meals. It was with regret that we accepted her resignation as the school lunch director. Here again, however, we were most fortunate in finding a replacement. Mrs. Esther A. Reynolds, with experience in a lunch

program in Brookline, New Hampshire, was appointed to fill the vacancy and has continued to give us excellent meals.

During the year it was a joy to see the reformation take place at the rear of the school building. The money which you so generously provided at the last annual meeting has been wisely, judiciously, and most effectively spent. The results are bound to be much more convincing when the area becomes grassed over. The reality of a playground worthy of the school is closer at hand because of your most generous support. I am sure that the future will, with the help of all of us, bring this area to its intended use.

The budget this year will reflect more than anything else the increasing cost of high schools for the district. Tuition fees have increased and the number of pupils who attend high school is growing. The increase in the enrollment of the Sanbornton Central School has necessitated the increase in transportation costs. The number of pupils from the Bay and Winnisquam area is growing hence the need for an additional vehicle. We have tried to hold the line in the other categories of the budget and in doing so we will be providing the minimum for our children.

I would like to call your attention to the need for considerable thought in the direction of the Cooperative High School for this area. Enrollments are increasing in the high schools and it is entirely possible that the day will come when Laconia, Tilton, and Franklin may say they can no longer take your children as tuition paying pupils. Should this occur Sanbornton would be in the position of not having a school to which her children could go to high school. Your Board, with your consent, appointed a committee to look into the feasibility of this plan. I hope that they will have a solution which the community will accept and foster. It seems the only way in which a district can be assured of a place to which their children may go for secondary school education.

We have made progress during the past year. The school is in a position to give the pupils a well rounded program and excellent preparation for high school. You can be proud of the accomplishments of your pupils. You can look with pride at your plant and feel that you have played an important part in making your school what it is today.

In closing this report I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, Parent-Teacher Association and the many citizens of Sanbornton who have been so helpful in the work of the school. Without your help these things would not have been possible. I hope that we may continue to work for the education of the children in this same friendly spirit for many years to come.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Good health is essential to effective living and is an important goal of education. The responsibility for the health of the child rests primarily with the parents or guardians who have the obligation of providing adequate medical and dental care as well as home conditions conducive to good health. This is an obligation which gradually becomes the child's as he matures. The family physician and dentist serve as the health advisers to the family and cooperate with the school and health department in providing the necessary services. The school assumes the obligation of working with the parents and others to provide conditions and educational services conducive to good health.

I am happy to report that such concerted effort and mutual cooperation for the betterment of the health of the pupils of the Sanbornton School has characterized our health program during the past year.

Any health program, particularly a school health program, must place major emphasis on the early diagnosis and prevention of incipient illness. This results, not only in more effective theraphy, but, also may be the chief factor in the detecting of conditions which are unfavorable to the vigorous growth and development of the child. It is in this respect that physical examinations, made periodically, play such an important role in the health program of the school. In keeping with this, physical inspections of forty-five pupils

were made by the school nurse. All of the children were weighed twice during the year. In addition, through the efforts of the Sanbornton Parent-Teacher Association, a complete physical examination was given to sixty-three pupils by Doctor Everett Orbeton of Laconia, New Hampshire.

During the past few years more precise instruments have been devised for the detection of impairments in vision and audition. The importance of these is reflected in the effect that poor eyesight and defective hearing have, not only on the academic, but also on the personal and social adjustment of the school child. In order to detect and institute remedial corrections in the areas of sight and hearing all of the pupils, 108 in number, were checked with the Massachusetts Vision Test and the Maico Pureton Audiometer. In several cases retests were given.

Tuberculosis, once the scource of communicable diseases in the United States still remains a threat even though now under better control. This has in no small part been due to the better precautions and more scientific methods of detection. Significant here has been the Tuberculin Patch Test, a skin test for diagnosis. During February a Tuberculin Patch Test clinic was held. Seventy-one children were tested. It is gratifying to report that all of the children showed a negative reaction to the test.

Diphtheria remains a constant threat to the school child and precautionary measures are always in order. In keeping with this, Toxoid clinics were held during April and May. Seventeen children attended both clinics.

Diagnosis is of value only when there is follow up in therapy. Cooperation between the home and the school is essential here. During the year twenty children went to their dentist. Three children secured glasses. The nurse made arrangements for two children to attend the orthopedic clinic in Laconia, New Hampshire. Further evidence of school and home cooperation in the health program was marked by conferences held with parents, teachers and children throughout the year.

Nutrition plays an equally important part in the health of the school child. The child who is malnourished or even hungry cannot be expected to do his best work in school. At the same time malnutrition is fertile ground for possible disease. Hot lunches introduced into the school have done much to remedy this condition. During the year ninety-three children took advantage of the hot lunches served in the Sanbornton Central School.

I wish to take this occasion to express my sincere gratitude to the Sanbornton Parent-Teacher Association, the Tilton American Red Cross Chapter which provided the sum of twenty-five dollars for the hot lunches during the month of February, the Sanbornton School Board, the teachers, parents and pupils for their wholehearted cooperation during the past year.

Due to the high character and public spirit of the members of the Executive Board and to the tremendous zeal and enthusiasm of every member of the organization, Sanbornton can be justly proud of the accomplishments of the Association in the past three years.

To single out any particular project as outstanding is difficult because they have all been large in scope and sound in filling a need of the pupils. To list a few should be of Community interest: the purchase of a 16mm sound picture projector; dishes for the cafeteria; radio and record player

combination; baseball and basketball equipment; indoor games for pupils in rainy weather; trips for the graduating classes; prizes for scholastic ability; weighing and measuring scales for the First Aid Room; swings and teeter boards in the playground; and a slide-film strip projector for use in the classrooms.

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

MUST secure the required permit from your local forest fire warden before burning.

MUST use necessary precautions while burning or smoking in or near woodlands.




