

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to purchase a fire pump with hose, raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$52.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for road construction; raise and appropriate \$1,012.50 for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote a 3% per annum discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before August 15.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 8. To transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-third in the series.

Public schools at their best accomplish at least two results. They efficiently develop such natural talent as their pupils bring to them so that, whatever a pupil does, it is the best he can do, and they efficiently develop the moral and social side of each pupil so that he is on the road to become a useful citizen. I commend our regular teachers, the teacher of music and the school nurse to your attention as ranking very high in the two capacities above mentioned. They have unusually large schools, which means a wide range of pupil ability and an unusual demand on school management. Their work is difficult but with their experience and training they are bringing about excellent results.

The combining of the first three grades in one building and the fourth, fifth and sixth in another has proved to be a happy and very efficient arrangement. However, there is a serious question whether the schools should be allowed to grow any larger before opening another of our buildings and housing two grades in each. If the schools were so arranged at this time, they would contain thirty, twenty-two and twenty-four pupils respectively. We know that our experienced teachers can handle our large schools and are doing it, but it would not be for the best education of our children to have the schools increase further in the number of pupils.

Since the repairs of last summer, the school buildings have been more comfortable and sanitary than at any time since I have known them. The alterations in windows, doors and heating plants made by the special committee account for the former and the work of an exceedingly efficient and interested janitor, Mr. Lamson Emery, together with your own efforts, account for the latter. Work, which would probably be inexpensive, remains to be done on the grounds of both schools to make them fully usable and safe.

All public schools are confronted this year with an entirely new situation caused by the National Civilian Defense Program. This requires that those in charge of the schools provide for the care and safety of school children during school hours, in case of any emergency which may arise. Plans for this are developing everywhere and in Stratham we shall keep fully informed and carry out the suggestions and directions of school and defense officials.

For many years the American public school has been recognized as one of the most important foundation stones in the beautiful temple of democracy. The wise men who planned and laid this foundation very many years ago realized that universal compulsory education, at public expense, was so necessary and precious an instrument in the creation of a free people that it should have the greatest support and attention of all citizens. Throughout all the years of our nation's life, the American people have sacrificed time, energy and money in order that the American public school might not only live but become increasingly a greater and greater factor ir the training of good, democratic citizens.

Whenever the need for general sacrifice has been greatest our people have made the greatest response. Now, that the world faces the gravest crisis of all, they will not fail in guaranteeing that the present standard of education shall be maintained throughout the war, that schools shall be well taught by trained teachers and that the future citizenry shall be competent to handle the stu-

pendous responsibility of the peace to come. Recent reports from England indicate that wherever the wholesome influence of the schools has been suspended by closure or made less effective by inferior management, juvenile delinquence and other baneful factors contributing to adult crime have developed. The United States is advised not to repeat the mistakes of England.

The thanks of school authorities are due the Stratham Parent-Teacher Association for their unfailing interest in the schools. This organization carries on its work quietly, expecting no praise or compensation. It deserves more than this word of thanks. May it continue to flourish and prosper.

We who are in charge of the immediate daily operation of the schools extend to all parents and school district officers our appreciation of their loyalty and cooperation. We shall try to continue to merit it.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

There were 77 children examined with 48 more or less serious conditions found. Of these, 36 were definitely corrected during the year through the cooperation of parents, family physicians or clinics. The dental clinic was held as usual. The Parent-Teacher Association has given substantial help to this project. For this organization, which has helped in this good work, the reward is to know that the children have been spared much pain and ill health as a result of the attention given. The audiometer which was given to this section of the state by the American Legion and Auxiliary was used in the schools to test the hearing of pupils. 42 children were tested with no defects found. 74 children are vaccinated against small pox and 61 have had the diphtheria antitoxin treatment.

Hot lunches are served in the Ridge school by Miss Crane. In the Stratham Hill school the children may have hot jar lunches brought from home and heated in the school. The hot lunches have helped to bring many underweight children up to normal.

I wish to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Towle, the School Board, teachers, parents and Parent-Teacher Association for their splendid cooperation with my work.
