**TENTATIVE TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, in the County of Carroll qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday the 14th day of March at Ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. \$9,000. is approved by the finance committee.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$7300. approved by your committee.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanding roads. \$800 is approved.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing & building bridges. \$1200. approved.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$150.00 approved.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. The sum recommended and approved to be raised as a whole is \$400. Approved.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for painting Town Library. Approved.

8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the



selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200. for repair of road equipment, road maintenance and general highway. Approved.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000. for Tarvia. Approved.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for Tamworth Fire Dept. Approved.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Firemen's Insurance in compliance with the Public Laws of New Hampshire, Section 4, Chapter 146, Paragraph 16. Approved.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairs on the road from Washington Hill to Madison Tamworth Town Lines. Approved.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to continue the road from Raymond Berry's Place towards White Lake. Approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real-estate acquired by the town through tax collector's Deeds.

18. To see if the town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$300. to be divided equally, between the Laconia Hospital, North Conway Hospital and Huggins Hospital. Approved.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$823.61 for Town Road Aid and the State will contribute the sum of \$3,294.45. Approved.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for White Pine Blister Rust Control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Dept. Approved.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 in observance of Old Home Week. Approved.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350. to aid The Red Cross Water Safety Program in transporting the children to White Lake State Park for swimming instructions. Approved.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to continue the road from Dr. Prince to Margaret Steele. Approved.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for the Tamworth Outing Club for promoting and advertising winter business. Approved by Finance Committee.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. to be divided equally among the three road agents for cutting bushes on the road side. Approved.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the upkeep and care of shrubs and plants around the Town Buildings. Approved.

27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen (or moderator) to appoint a Zoning Commission of five (seven or any number) members, with duties as set forth in Chapter 51, Sections 50 - 71, **Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942**, as amended by Chapters 110 and 278, **Laws of New Hampshire, 1949**,



to study and recommend to the next town meeting (or special town meeting) the boundaries for zoning districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced therein. Such commission to make a preliminary report of its recommendations and hold public hearings thereon. The report and recommendations of the Zoning Commission shall be published in full in the warrant calling for the town meeting at which action on the proposed zoning ordinance will be taken.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Approved.

29. To Choose a Selectman for three years, To choose a Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Highway Agents, Auditors, and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

30. To see if the town will vote to keep the polls open until six of the clock in the afternoon.

31. To transact any other business that may come legally before said meeting.

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## REPORT OF THE TOWN OF TAMWORTH FIRE DEPARTMENT

By a vote of the Town, at Town Meeting, 1949, a Town Fire Department was inaugurated, as a result of the following article in the warrant:— Article 12. “To see if the Town will elect five Firewards and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500 for the establishment and maintenance of a Town Fire Department; as provided for in Chapter 175 of the revised Laws of the New Hampshire.”

Five Fire Wards — the equivalent of Commissioners — were elected as follows:—

Tamworth	Dexter Remick
South Tamworth	John Nutter (resigned, P. Eastman appointed)
Chocorua	John Fortier
Wonalancet	Richard Moulton
At Large	Francis Cleveland

By vote of the above, Francis Cleveland was appointed Chief Fire Ward, and Charles Remick Chief

of the Town Fire Department. Chocorua, South Tamworth, and the former Wonalancet Precinct, voted to turn over their equipment to the Town, and elected the following as Captains of the Fire Companies: Chocorua, Ernest Ross; South Tamworth, Raymond Larabee; Wonalancet, R. W. Read.

The value of equipment, now in possession of the Town, is estimated as follows:—

From Wonalancet:

## FOREST FIRES — OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply

with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise money to paint the main school building at Tamworth.
5. To tranact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

6. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
7. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
8. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
9. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

Teachers in the Tamworth School during 1948-49 were: — Principal Edwin A. Blackey, grades 7 and 8; Mrs. Elizabeth Sutherland grades 5 and 6; Miss Margaret King, grades 3 and 4; Mrs. Lois Boothby and Mrs. Dorothy Remick grades 1 and 2. The same staff is in force during the current year. Tamworth is fortunate in having such competent teachers. The high quality of their work and their devotion to the welfare of the pupils in their care deserve high commendation.

The work of the Tamworth Parent-Teachers Association in sponsoring the operation of the hot lunch program is a fine contribution to the health and general welfare of the pupils. This program has been extended considerably this year and is scheduled to continue to April 21. Some financial aid from the Federal Department of Agriculture and the receipt of a considerable quantity of surplus foods (for cost of transportation) are definite helps in meeting the cost of this project. The charge to the pupil of five cents is certainly most reasonable.

More and more we are becoming conscious of a need for a change in emphasis in education. We do not minimize the value of the Three R's but we realize better the importance of other phases of the child's development. Concern with the child's health (both mental and physical), with personality development, with training in citizenship, and the ability to get along with others, are fundamental to the well balanced individual. The ability to weigh issues in the light of

facts and thus to reach sound conclusions is essential to the citizens of a democracy. These phases of development fall largely on the school, and are frequently best promoted through the activities of the school. Your teachers by encouraging such activities as clubs, plays, athletics, etc., and the musical program as directed by Mrs. Hidden, are contributing important experiences to Tamworth boys and girls.

At Kennett High School 44 Tamworth pupils were enrolled. Of these five were graduated. During the current year 43 are enrolled at Kennett, 10 of whom are seniors. The present eighth grade has an enrollment of 14 members.

Mrs. Margaret Philbrick is to be commended for her interest in, and excellent care of members of the school. Purchase by the Supervisory Union of a Massachusetts Vision Test Kit, and a Maico Puretone Audiometer will enable the school nurse to provide much more accurate testing of sight and hearing.

Miss Margaret King and Mrs. Elizabeth Sutherland attended a 14-week extension course in remedial reading held at Conway during the current year.

The continued cooperation of the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens is warmly appreciated.

## TAMWORTH SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Through the fine initiative of the Tamworth Parent-Teachers Association and the splendid cooperation of its members, parents, boys and girls, and organizations, type B, hot lunches were served for a fifteen-week period. An average of 95 lunches per day were served at a cost of 5 cents per child. Federal reimbursement of 4 cents per lunch per day helped to defray the cost as well as the receipt of a variety of surplus foods. Many parents and citizens made and continue to make contributions which help greatly.

The School Board room located in the basement of the school was converted into a very satisfactory kitchen through the effort of many citizens, by the remodeling of the room, installing of a fine gas range, and the providing of a sink, also hot and cold water. Meals were and continue to be prepared here and sent to each room where they are served to the pupils by the room teacher.

Throughout the year Fund Raising Campaigns were carried on under the sponsorship of the P. T. A. group and by the support of the public much money was realized. Due to the combined effort last year enough money was earned to provide for the purchase of enough plates, bowls, spoons, and forks, as well as much necessary kitchen equipment.

Volunteer labor is depended upon to assist in the washing of the dishes. Excellent co-operation has been received in the performance of this task.

During the current year the number of meals served to date average about 120 a day. At the pres-

ent time every child that remains during the noon hour partakes of the lunch.

In closing, I should like to express my sincere thanks to the P. T. A. for their willingness to sponsor this program, to the parents, to the boys and girls' organizations, and other citizens who have helped to make this much needed worthwhile program a success.
