

WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten A.M., to act upon the following subjects.

Article 1. To cast your ballots for the election of all officers required to be elected to serve the Town of Temple for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To cast your ballots for the election of such officers as may be required, by law, to serve the Contoocook Valley School District for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To cast your ballots on the zoning law ordinance proposed by the Temple Planning Board.

THE POLLS SHALL OPEN AT TEN A.M. AND SHALL CLOSE NOT EARLIER THAN SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

You are further notified to meet at the Municipal Building in said Temple, on Friday, the eleventh day of March next, ast eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Charges and other necessary maintenance and operating expenditures.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive and to expend, if necessary, gifts and Federal or State Aid or grants in the name of the Town, including LCIP (Land Conservation Investment Program) money for the purposes of acquiring conservation land. (By petition).

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for the purpose of repairing and painting the Town Hall cupola. **Article 7.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,100.00 for the purpose of preparing and painting the exterior of the new Municipal Building.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purose of reimbursing Paul Jordan for the money advanced by him for the Municipal Building.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be used to install central heat in the Town Hall.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a truck to replace the old sander truck.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new Caterpillar loader, replacing the 1973 Caterpillar loader that we have at the present time. The money to be raised in the following manner: The present loader will be sold on the open market with the proceeds of said sale being used as a down payment on the new loader. The balance to be raised with the issuance of a long term note not to exceed a period of 6 years.

Article 12. To see if the Town wishes to consider alternatives to the Wilton Recycling Center before we re-negociate our contract which expires January 31, 1989.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000.00 for the purpose of re-appraising all real estate in the Town of Temple. With the money being raised as follows:

- 1. The Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw and expend, for this purpose only, all monies in the capital reserve fund with was established to re-valuate all real estate in the Town of Temple.
- 2. The balance needed, if any, shall be raised and appropriated in the fiscal year 1988. The total sum being raised will not exceed \$22,000.00.

Article 14. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. (By petition)

Article 15. The Board of Trustees of the Mansfield Public Library sees a long range need for major expansion. We ask that the Selectmen be directed to appoint a committee to make a long range study of the community's needs in light of growth projections. The committee should include representation from the following: Library Board of Trustees, Librarian, Planning Board, Library Users, School system, and Tax Payers of the Town of Temple.

No funding is requested

State Library System realizes that the process for a major expansion usually takes $5\ {\rm to}\ 10\ {\rm years}.$ (By petition)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, pursuant to and under the limitations of Chapter 33:7-8 N.H.R.S.A.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Taxes

Our tax rate reflected a substantial increase due to the School and County rates, even though the Town rate decreased. Try as we may the Town cannot hold the line alone forever. We were over assessed by the County \$8,400.00. This will be credited to us on next year's taxes; without interest! This Board feels we should be compensated in some manner for the County's mistake. Finally, every \$21,241.00 we as a Town spend will add \$1.00 on the tax rate. Please keep this in mind as we vote on March 11th.

Highway Department

The Highway Department started the year with snow and more snow. The spring started with snow and floods; this took the toll on the budget and equipmente. Our sander truck is a 1977 and our loader is a 1973. Both should be replaced in the near future.

Municipal Building

The year began with our new Municipal Building being fully occupied, which gave much needed space to our many Boards, Committees, and Departments.

Planning Board

With development knocking on our door from all sides, our Planning Board needs our support and **constructive criticism** to guide our town into the next decade with sensible growth and planning. Why not try to attend at least one meeting this year?

COMMUNICATION CENTER REPORT 1987

Dear Selectpersons:

For the past several years there has been constant talk from different towns about changing dispatch centers. In the beginning the Fire Association was interested in their own communications center. This went by the wayside. There was talk about Greenville starting its own center. A year or so later there was talk of a Greenville-New Ipswich center. I now read in the newspapers that Brookline and Lyndeborough are going to Milford in April, if approved at Town Meeting.

With all these rumors going around it has become very difficult to find and keep dispatchers since they don't feel they can plan on full time employment if everyone decide to make a change.

A point in time has come that I feel it would be better for the towns served to get together and form their own dispatch center and run it as a municipal entity. I am now serving notice as per our contract dated February 19, 1978 and signed by the Selectmen from Greenville, Lyndeborough, Mason and Temple, that effective May 31, 1988 at 12 midnight, I will cease to operate Base 500 as a communications and answering service.

I will be willing to sit down with the Selectmen from the towns served and negotiate the sale of the equipment which I own so that the towns could continue to operate from the same location. I am also willing to rent or lease the space that Base 500 now occupies, as well as sublease the antenna site.

In this way the towns could continue to operate with minimal changes. You may feel free to contact me at anytime regarding this matter.

Mr. Quilty began by explaining his future plans for Base 500, such as the upgrading of equipment and expanding the services of the dispatch center in the areas of smoke alarms and other Town operations. He does not plan to involve services which are not town oriented such as taxi services, etc.

In order for any potential purchase he needs a committment from as many towns as possible.

Breakdown of the Town as follows is based on per capita figures from O.S.P. Since new figures will not be released until around April, 1986 figures must be used.

If all four of the above towns were to join, the per capita figure is \$17.56. If Brookline and Lyndboro decide to stay with Base 500 the figure drops to \$12.24.

All Towns must figure for 7 months for 1988 budgets coupled with Mr. Draper's figure from Jan. 1st to May 31st when he ceases operations.

All representatives present felt (except for one) that at present the plan presented by Mr. Quilty would be best economically for all of us since nothing changes except the ownership and Mr. Quilty's request for at least a five year committement by each town. Richard Hall suggested that a clause be added to allow towns or Mr. Quilty to withdraw from the contract after proper notification (6 months suggested but subject to review by all parties).

Each representative is to report to his Board of Selectmen since New Ipswich was the only Town present with a majority. This subject will be presented at the New Ipswich Selectmen's meeting on February 8th for a recorded vote.

9:30 Discussion with Mr. Quilty ended. Mr. Quilty will present the contract for review in approximately 2 weeks.

HOME HEALTH CARE AND COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC. Annual Report

In 1987, Home Health Care and Community Services continued to provide home care and community services to the residents of Temple. These services have been supported to the greatest extent possible by Medicare, Medicaid, other insurances, grants, and patient fees. Services that could not be covered by other funding has been supported by your town.

The following information represents a projection of Home Health Care and Community Services' activities in your community for 1987. The projection is based on actual services provided from January through September 1987, and an estimate of useage during October, November and December.

In addition to the above listed activities, regularly scheduled blood pressure clinics, child health clinics, telephone and office consultations were made available to your residents throughout the year. Town funding, in part, supported these additional services.

Financial Report

The actual cost of services provided in 1987 with all funding sources is projected to be \$4,733.00.

The total cost of services provided for a partial fee, or at no charge to residents in 1987 is projected to be \$1,500.00.

We recommend an appropriation of \$1,500.00 if you wish to continue home care services at the current level. Thank you for your consideration.

MONADNOCK FAMILY SERVICES

Overview/View Information Sheet for the Town of Temple

Monadnock Family Service provides a full range of treatment for individuals who need counseling or are experiencing a mental disorder. There are no restrictions based on diagnosis, age or income. The Peterborough District Office is open five days and two nights every week, and we provide 24 hour emergency services 7 days a week. As a part of the coverage, Monadnock Family Services staff also provide crisis services to Monadnock Community Hospital emergency room and to patients admitted to the medical units upon physician request.

It is our goal to maintain quality services to residents of our catchment area, and to provide for the identified counseling needs of the community.

Last year the Peterborough District Office served over 857 individuals with more than 14,018 visits for direct treatment. Also available through our agency are psychiatric, case management, housing and day treatment services. This figure is reflective of open cases and does not contain those individuals who may have been seen as adjunt member of treatment (i.e., family members, school personnel, legal or other sources of referral).

This past year, for the town of Temple we provided 218 visits for direct treatment. Of the 14 open cases, 6 were male and 8 were female.

2 of these individuals were certified as chronically or severely mentally ill, as per New Hampshire Department of Mental Health guidelines. The average fee for service, paid by the client, was (less than) .82¢ per hour.

Primary referral sources were as follows: self-referred, physicians, schools and clergy, in that order.

The dollar amount requested, based on population figures is \$1,080.00. MFS senior day care program provided over 3,300 hours of services to elderly residents and their families; many of those in the program have Alzheimer's Disease or related illnesses due to aging.

THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1987

We were saddened by the death of our long time member Clarence Daniels and miss his valuable assistance.

Two new members were appointed to the board this year; Deborah Williams and Timothy Fiske (who represents the Planning Board).

There was considerable activity checking into permits, town lines, etc., in conjunction with a development this year.

We have also been working on a set of wetland guidelines for the town of Temple this year and we will continue with this project in 1988.

The Commission meets at the library on the first Monday of each month at 4 PM.

We welcome suggestions for projects relating to matters of conservation of our built and natural environment. Anyone with concerns should contact one of our members listed below.

Please come and bring the following: (1) tools, (2) friends, relatives or conscripts of any kind, (3) a good appetite (we will feed you well at high noon), (4) if you prefer to work in the kitchen just show up with an apron, spoon and spatula. ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In 1987, the Temple Zoning Board of Adjustment held 19 meetings. Five applications for variances or exceptions from the Zoning Ordinance were filed and resulted in six public hearings. ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Having been associated with Temple's tax assessment functions since 1978, when I was a State Appraiser, I feel qualified to speak for a complete Revaluation.

Over a ten year period, I have seen a large increase in Temple's property values. Because the 1978 property assessments have remained constant, the overall ratio of assessments to selling prices has dropped to about thirty percent. This means that the average property in Temple is assessed at thirty percent of its fair market value. However, because of differing rates of increases in values in different areas of Temple, about one-third of properties should pay the same, one-thired should pay less, and one-third should pay more taxes.

The State of New Hampshire cannot commit itself to a tax revaluation of Temple until at least 1992. Their present costs exceed \$50.00 per parcel, or \$30,000 for the entire job. Naturally, costs will increase in 1992, meaning that the town must raise additional monies to offset the increase per parcel, plus an increase in the number of parcels, due to natural growth. A private firm hired by the town must sign a contract, plus post a performance bond for the amount of the job costs, which will ultimately be borne by the town. Also, the private firm must be monitored by the Department of Revenue Administration. These extra costs, incurred by the firm, will ultimately be passed on to the town.

Presently, there is enough funding to support an in-house tax revaluation for 1988. It has been ten years since the last town wide revaluation, and my opinion is that the job needs to be done, new property record cards are needed and Temple has the physical facilities to support a small work crew. I recommend therefore that Temple performs an in-house revaluation in 1988.

ROAD AGENTS REPORT

Winter Maintenance

The winter maintenance for 1987 was, to say the least, quite different. In the month of January, we were involved in constant snow removal from beginning to end. However, for the remaining winter months there were just many small storms. It is necessary to sand and salt the roads just as much after the small storms as the large storms. All of this put our sand and salt costs quite high but kept our plowing costs down.

The most significant cost which ran way over what was projected was the repair costs. There were several problems which arose in trying to keep the sander and sander truck in running order. It finally came to the point of not being worth it to fix the truck anymore. For this reason, we will be asking for the money at Town Meeting, to replace the old truck with a newer used truck.

Summer Maintenance

We were kept quite busy at the start of summer with repairing damages caused by the floods. We received \$10,273.00 from the federal government and \$1,900.00 from the state government specifically to help with the wash out repairs. We also received a performance bond that had been put down by the contractors, to cover the repairs on Twillingate Road.

Our new constructin consisted of widening a couple of sharp narrow curves on Hill Road and putting some underground drainage on Fish Road. We also widened part of Colburn Road on Flynn's Hill, paved and sealed Flynn's Hill, and paved another 2/10 mile of Colburn Road.

Our regular maintenance consisted of cutting brush along Webster Road and part of Converse Road. We then shimmed and sealed Webster Road and the tar section of Converse Road. We spread approximately 2000 yards of gravel, cleaned all ditches, and routinely graded the dirt roads. 2000 yards of gravel may sound like a large amount but it doesn't go very far.

For 1988 we plan on shimming and sealing East Road and the paved section of Colburn Road. We will also be cutting the brush and cleaning the ditches along these roads. We plan on paving approximately another 1/2 mile of dirt road again this year. Where this is done will depend upon what sub-divisions come in before the planning board.

In 1987 ten (10) applications for subdivisions were filed with the Planning Board. Of these, all ten (10) were approved, creating nineteen (19) new building lots.

The Planning Board spent a lot of time working on a Capital Improvements Plan, aimed at analyzing the needs of the town for major physical improvements such as buildings, roads and equipment. We then drafted a Growth Management Ordinance which will appear on the ballot on March 8th as an amendment to the Temple Zoning Ordinance. All of this was done with the help and professional assistance from the Southwest Regional Planning Commission.

Copies of the proposed Master Plan Addendum, Capital Improvements Plan, and Growth Management Ordinances are available at the Mansfield Public Library and the offices of the Town Clerk and Board of Selectmen.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND

STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603)271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

The Temple Volunteer Fire Department responded to a total of 26 calls in 1987. The breakdown is as follows:

There were also 58 building inspections conducted.

We now have 20 firefighters and 8 are NH certified. Our shortage of volunteers for day coverage persists. Temple was assisted 4 times by

mutual aide from other towns this year.

328 man-hours were spent in training in 1987. 56 of these hours were formal training classes conducted at recognized fire schools, Three of our volunteers tested and received their heavy commercial drivers license.

During this year, more emphasis was placed on equipment maintenance. In addition to the 312 hours of scheduled maintenance, countless hours were spent restoring the condition of the equipment and trucks. As a result, the town will save money on replacement costs.

Fire preventin activities were increased. We distributed brochures, visited the schools, and gave a presentation on fire extinguishers. Increased fire-awareness may have helped reduce the number of calls we received this year.

Some of our other major activities were:

Changed the radios and pagers frequency from 33.9 to 33.74 Installed a base station radio and antenna.

Finished off the interior of the fire station.

Built a meeting/training room.

Moved the portable water tank to tanker 471 and installed air packs in the rescue van to improve our structure fire attack timing.

Finished installation of the 100 gal. water tank on the forestry truck.

In an effort to save the town money, the Temple Volunteer Fire Department conducted 4 fundraisers this year and installed vending machines in the municipal building, We also received numerous donations and we are very grateful to everyone for supporting us.

SOUHEGAN VALLEY AMBULANCE SERVICE, INC. Annual Report to Towns - 1987

The Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service, Inc., continues to provide efficient professional quality service to the communities of Greenville, Mason, New Ipswich, and Temple. This service is possible only through the dedication of our well-trained Driver/Attendants, all of whom are volunteers. Most of these volunteers are now Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians-Ambulance. Many have also undergone advanced training to become EMT-Intermediates, for example, EOA (Esophagela Obdurator Airway). We are presently looking into more advanced training so some of our Attendants may administer IV's. Our attendants are usually on all night acal about seven (7) times a month. There presently exists a need for volunteers who are abale to answer calls during the daytime. Any resident of the four (4) town area interested in joining the Service anre encouraged to contact any attendant or member of the Board of Directors.

The Service is presently looking into replacing the older ambulance's chassis, cab and engine coupled with having the ambulance module refurbished in the near future. This ambulance unit is over ten (10) years old.

The Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service continues to operate at no expense to the individual requiring emergency ambulance service. The projected annual per capita cost for 1988 for the four (4) towns is \$4.11, which is a small increase from last year. This is proportionate to the increased number of calls that is anticipated due to population growth in

the area.

For some years now, Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service has had difficulty maintaining an adequate number of volunteers who are available to cover ambulance calls during the daytime hours on weekdays. The Board of Directors has tried various approaches to solicit and train ambulance attendants to relieve this situation. This year we foresee even more difficulty in doing this. We have also relied on the availability of mutual aid from services in surrounding communities, but they are also having difficulty providing daytime coverage. Because of this we cannot state that we will be able to provide prompt care for all emergency calls.

Because of the shortage of daytime volunteer manpower we have already experienced some delays in response times, particularly when we have need to have another service respond into the area, or when one of our volunteers has needed to respond from an unusual distance.

In order to provide the high quality care that people have come to expect from this service we feel that the time may have come to have two full time paid attendants on duty during the daytime. We will continue to provide weekend and nightime coverage with volunteers as we have in the past.

We feel that this matter should be put before the voters of the district so that they will be aware of this situation, and will have an opportunity to decide how they want to resolve it. We can provide the service, but at a cost, or the voters can chose to accept that emergency medical care may at times be delayed.
