



#### (TOWN WARRANT)

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 9th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other necessary town orficers.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 4. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as Back Keene Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,561.00, or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$330.77.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a new bridge on Prospect Street.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairing Town Hall.

- Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use town hall one Friday night each month without pay.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the seletmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

It is my belief that children must first be taught to appreciate and love good music—both in hearing and singing it— and then the study of theory may be undertaken as a means of greater participation. The program of rhythmic drill and simple dance steps started in the first grade and continued through the six grades, is a source of great pleasure to the pupils and has a very strong relationship to the appreciation of music and to theoretical time study.

The chief aim in the first grade is the elimination of nonsingers of which there are usually from 50 per cent to 75 per cent, and sometimes more, at the opening of school in September. In Troy this is accomplished to a remarkable degree. In Grades II and III theoretical study is begun with great satisfaction to the pupils who find themselves able to read their own very easy songs. In Grades IV-VI the several branches of music study have a very definite and concentrated outline for great accomplishment. Two-part singing, by means of rounds is started in Grade IV and continued in Grade V in two-part songs. The early American Folk Dances are taught in Grade V and in both IV and V the study of composers and instruments of the orchestra is important. sixth grade should be a period of very strong and enthusiastic preparation for Junior High School, with an outline for more advanced study in all branches named.

One of the most interesting of problems is presented in Junior High School and continued in High School—that of the changing boy voice. In September each boy has an individual voice test that he and his teachers may know the condition and placement of his voice and what to do about it. Every boy is free to have additional voice tests whenever it

seems wise. It is most gratifying, through this proceedure coupled with vigilance and patience in chorus practices, to see many boys gaining confidence in their ability to contribute to the chorus.

Our work in Troy High School is confined to Assembly singing and Glee Club work. Last May, for the second time, joint concerts were presented by the combined Glee Clubs of Jaffrey and Troy High Schools, the same program being given in each town. The combined groups numbered 75 voices. In the Troy concert, the First and Second Grade Rhythm Band played two selections and the entire sixth grade sang two three-part songs. Troy had no participants in the 1936 All-State High School Music Festival held in Hanover, but Miss Reba Pierce was selected to represent Troy in attendance at the two-day Festival with the Music Supervisor.

In June the school participated in an outing which included a trip to Norumbega Park and a motion picture show in Boston.

#### GRADUATION

On June 12, 1936, Troy High School held its second graduation as a four-year school, graduating a class of eleven. Of these Mary Stanford is studying at Burdette Business College in Boston, Herbert Mason is at Worcester Trade School, and Taimi Koski is taking a post-graduate course at Troy High School. The remainder of the class have already taken their places in the working world.

On Sunday June 7, the members of the graduating class attended a baccalaureate service at the Congregational Church. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Earl Hair.
