#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Waterville Valley in the County of Grafton and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School in said Waterville Valley on Tuesday, March 8, 1977, polls to be open for voting on Articles one and two at nine o'clock in the morning and to close promptly at two o'clock in the afternoon with action on the balance of the articles to be taken commencing at two o'clock in the afternoon for the following purposes:

- Article 1: To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 2: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees or officers chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 3: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Town Officers' salaries during the ensuing year.
- Article 4: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Town Office expenses during the ensuing year.
- Article 5: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Police-Fire-Town Office building maintenance during the ensuing year.
- Article 6: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Property Reappraisal and Surveying.
- Article 7: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of the Town Library during the ensuing year.
- Article 8: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Town Employees Medical and Health Insurance during the ensuing year.
  - Article 9: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to ap-

propriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Police Department during the ensuing year.

- Article 10: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Fire Department during the ensuing year.
- Article 11: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Water Department during the ensuing year.
- Article 12: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Sewer Department during the ensuing year.
- Article 13: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Solid Waste Disposal Department during the ensuing year.
- Article 14: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of operating the Highway Department during the ensuing year.
- Article 15: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of installation and maintenance of Street lights during the ensuing year.
- Article 16: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of providing Cemetery maintenance during the ensuing year.
- Article 17: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of insect control during the ensuing year.
- Article 18: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Town Insurance during the ensuing year.
- Article 19: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Legal Services during the ensuing year.
- Article 20: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Planning and Zoning during the ensuing year.

- \*Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of one thousand dollars to help support the Campton-Thornton-Waterville Valley Chamber of Commerce.
- Article 22: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for donations to Advertising, Resort, and Regional Associations, during the ensuing year.
- Article 23: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for donations to Hospitals and Health organizations during the ensuing year.
- Article 24: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for the Waterville Valley Conservation Commission during the ensuing year.
- \* Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty dollars if a like sum is raised by the Towns of Campton and Thornton for a joint three town fireworks display to be held on a rotating basis each year.

The 1977 display to be held overlooking the Campton Pond, the 1978 display in Thornton, and the 1979 display in Waterville Valley.

- Furthermore, the Selectmen are requested to appoint one citizen to serve along with two individuals from the other two towns, on a tritown fireworks commission to oversee the actual display.
- Article 26: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to defray the cost of Trail Clearing and other Recreational purposes.
- Article 27: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise to subsidize the Waterville Valley Post Office during the ensuing year.
- Article 28: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for the the payment of the debt service of the Town for the ensuing year.
- Article 29: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for the purchase of Capital Equipment during the ensuing year, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act, or otherwise.
- Article 30: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for Capital Construction Projects during the en-

suing year, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise.

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expense during the ensuing year, in an amount not to exceed one percent (1%) of the amount appropriated for Town purposes during the year 1976, all in accordance with RSA 31:4.

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for, accept, and expend such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the purposes embraced in this warrant, and pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, and expend for the purposes voted in this warrant any interest earned on proceeds of any serial bonds or notes in connection with such projects.

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as an offset against the amount appropriated under Article 9 to defray the cost of the Police Department.

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the receipt of taxes to pay Town obligations.

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell and/or convey or otherwise dispose of any real property acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

Article 37: To transact such other business as may legally come before the Meeting.

The case load and request for Police service showed a general increase over 1975.

Last year also saw an increase in department training, especially firearms, which was under the direction of Officer Brian Parris.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

1976 continued to be a busy year for the Fire Department. Fire Prevention played an important role in the activities of the department as did training and the rescue squad. This last Fall saw a highly successful fire extinguisher workshop being held at the Fire Station with forty members of the general public in attendance.

It is difficult to believe that ten years have passed since the first of the present fire apparatus and equipment was purchased.

With that in mind, it is time to look to the future as far as equipment replacement planning is concerned. in that way, an orderly plan may be developed to replace equipment that will be showing increasing signs of wear over the next few years.

#### REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

In 1976 a portion of Lower Greeley Hill road was redone. This included adding subsurface drainage and a new gravel base from the Corcoran drive to the junction of Upper and Lower Greeley Hill. This section was paved and the remaining section of Lower Greeley Hill to Merrill Hunt's drive had a new coat of oil added.

Other minor improvements, such as grassing different roadside areas, were accomplished. The roadside showed a marked improvement last summer, thanks to the efforts of the Beautification Committee, the town employees, and the Waterville Company.

The 1975-76 snow removal contract was awarded to the Waterville Co., Inc.

There are no major road projects planned for this year. The budget reflects routine summer and winter maintenance with an anticipated increase in the number of roads the town is responsible for.

#### REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Municipal Services Department moved a step closer to becoming a full service department with the addition of providing solid waste collection for the community.

Using existing municipal service personnel, we have been able to provide the town with more flexible service than in the past with the result that only a handful of complaints have been received since the town took over this important operation.

The Water and Sewer departments both show an increase in water consumed and it is a credit to the municipal service employees that they have successfully shouldered the additional workload.

### REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe. No open fires can be authorized between 9 am and 5 pm unless it is raining.

The State Forest Fire Service trains local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

# CONSERVATION COMMISSION Report for Year 1976

In 1976 the Conservation Commission continued its efforts to raise the \$18,000 (plus interest on notes) needed to purchase from C.B. Lund a half-acre of land adjoining the Osceola Library property. A total of \$12,156 was received in contributions from individuals. A "Tasting Supper" run by Commission member Grace Bean and Sue Hern, Entertainment Chairman for the WVAIA, on July 4 at the Finish Line, netted \$768.43 for this cause. The Supper was attended by about 350 people, and approximately 85 people helped one way or another with preparations, donations of food, serving, etc. During Labor Day weekend an Auction, organized chiefly by Fred and Mary Jane Rust, brought the Commission \$2000 closer to its goal. This affair was highlighted by the presence of professional auctioneer Joe Finn, who donated his services to the cause. The \$800 appropriated at Town Meeting, added to \$200 withdrawn from the Conservation Commission's modest savings account, contributed another \$1000 to the Park Purchase Fund. At the end of the year approximately \$1300 remained to be raised. The Commission hopes to accomplish this goal in 1977, so that the transaction may be completed by December, when final payment is due Mr. Lund.

With funds provided by the WVAIA and the Property Owners' Association, the Commission, mainly in the person of Fred Rust, supervised the purchase and planting of shrubs and groundcover at the Cemetery, with a special planting arrangement at its entrance. Maintenance of the Cemetery property was done on a more regular basis this year. Its general appearance was improved as a result of these two factors. A plaque made by Jane Cantlin and bearing a poem written by Midge Salinger is ready to be placed in the Cemetery in the spring. An identifying sign will be installed at the entrance.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1976-1977

Enrollment at the Waterville Valley Elementary School continued to decrease this year, with an opening enrollment of 16 students, kindergarten through eighth grade, with only third grade vacant. The teaching staff also decreased to two full time teachers and one half-time teacher.

This past year a three-year rotating curriculum was completed to accommodate students who might spend three years in one classroom. A coordinated program is being followed through all the grades with supplementary material and instruction to accommodate special needs. Also, specialists were available for music, physical education, and speech therapy.

This past year the library began to take usable form with assistance from parents. Guilded by Dale Gould with the help of the School Board, cataloguing of the reference material reached the point where students could locate information using the card catalogue.

Individualized programs for all students were prepared, based in part on comprehensive diagnostic testing that was done in the fall. Areas of emphasis in each student's program were based on areas recorded as weak, both by national norms and classroom performance evaluation.

Seventh and eighth graders again participated in the Plymouth Junior High Sccool sports program with parents providing transportation into Plymouth.

The faculty would like to express their thanks to the School Board, parents, and the community at large for their support this past year. With such strong support, we have had a productive and rewarding year.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Waterville Valley Elementary School is deeply concerned today with the individual differences among its pupils. All children have many basic needs in common, as well as many differences. Among these fundamental common needs are the need for a balanced day of rest, play and work; a nutritious and varied diet; a feeling of being needed and loved; and a need to gain the basic learnings which all citizens in a democracy must have.

The community's expectations of the school and the child's basic needs are entirely compatible. Children in Kindergarten through Grade 8 need a warm friendly atmosphere for growing. The school and teachers help to furnish this atmosphere; to serve as extensions of their homes. The Waterville Valley School meets these basic needs as well as introducing children to their cultural heritage and the ways of democracy.

Children's basic needs can be grouped into the following categories: self-development, interpersonal and intergroup relations, understanding of the world of people and things, control of the communicating arts and skills, and moral and spiritual values. At this time I would like to comment on one of these needs: self-development. At Waterville the school stresses the need for a child to maintain a sense of personal worth as an individual and to feel that he is developing and growing. To do this, he must have security. His living must offer him a reasonable balance between success and failure. His school, as well as his home, helps him learn how to take success, how to face up to failure, and how to overcome difficulties.

Our pupils are provided opportunities for learning under guidance, the wise direction and control of his own activities and actions, increasing his social responsibility gradually from the Kindergarten year through Grade 8. We all encourage daily activities which involve opportunities for self-expression, for physical growth and health, safety, and for meeting problems with stability.

# EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1975-1976

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$20,000 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1975-1976 was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$17,500 was prorated among the school districts comprising the Supervisory Union. Allowance for \$1,000 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of the Assistant Superintendent during 1975-1976 was made up as follows: \$2,350 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$14,650 was prorated as stated above. Allowance for \$1,500 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

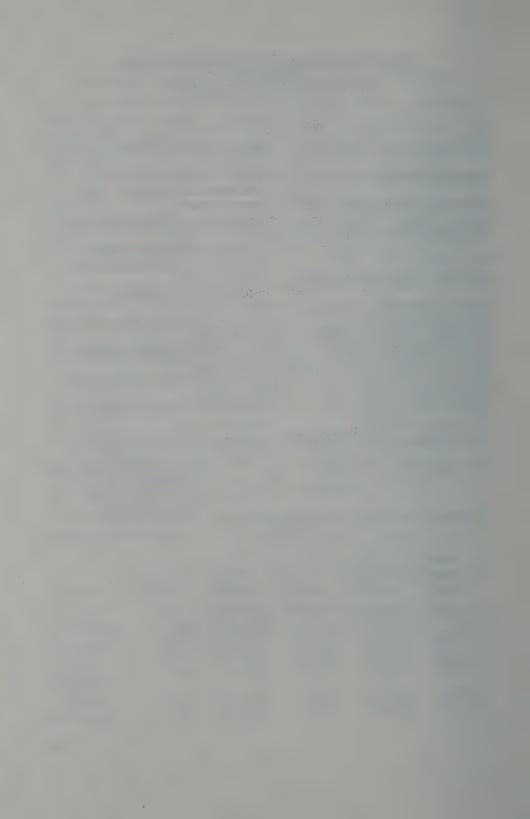
