To the inhabitants of the Town of Alstead in County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Municiapl Building in said Alstead on Tuesday, the 10th. day of March, next at 1:00 p.m. Polls will be open until 7:30 p.m. The business meeting to be holden at 7:30 p.m to act on the following:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officer for the Ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36,000.00 for Town Officers salaries and expenses and elections and registrations.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a computer for the town.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey any real estate acquired by tax sales by auction, sealed bid or private sale or in any other manner as justice may require. Furthermore, to authorize the Selectmen to employ agents and attorneys in furtherance of any such sale.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$140,000.00 for highway and bridges and oiling of town roads and general maintenance.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for a communications system for the highway department.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if necessary.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,693.00 for Town Planning.
- Article ll. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for operation of the Police Department.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,000.00 for the expenses of the Dog Officer.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185.00 for Memorial Day observance.

- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the support of the Shedd-Porter Library.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,667.00 for payment on the long term note for the highway truck and Griffin Hill Bridge repairs.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,170.40 for support of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,377.00 for support of the Home Health Care and Community Services.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$13,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

Appropriation Highway Maintenance Amount \$13,000.00

- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Forest Fire Protection.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to be used to equip the forestry vehicle received from the Division of Forest and Lands.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,900.00 for fire protection, equipment and maintenance of the Alstead Fire Department.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a communications system for civil defense personnel use.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112,000.00 for the constuction of a town garage. Furthermore, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$81,846.00 plus accumulated interest from the capital reserve established for the town garage and also authorize the Selectmen to apply \$30,000.00 for the construction from the current surplus as provided by RSA 35:5.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the printing of the assessment books which are mailed with the tax bills annually.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$105,700.00 to purchase a service ready piece of fire apparatus as recommended in the fire truck committee report. Furthermore, to arrange payment for this vehicle in the following manner:

(a) Authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$10,000.00 plus accumulated interest from the capital reserve fund for heavy equipment.

(b) Authorize the Selectmen to take \$10,000.00 from the current surplus as provided by RSA 35:5.

(c) Raise \$15,700.00 from taxes this year and the balance to be financed by a long term note.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Alstead unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot. (By petition)

Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Alstead Alstead, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Alstead, New Hampshire and the combining fund financial statements of the Town as of and for the year ended December 31, 1986, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Alstead, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1986, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year. Also, in our opinion, the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of each of the funds of the Town of Alstead, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1986, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Alstead, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose, combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements of each of the respective funds taken as a whole.

Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1986, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

#### E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are, therefore, reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. The reserve for encumbrances at December 31 consists of the following:

#### F. Cash and Investments

At year end, the carrying amount and bank balance of the Town's deposits was \$673,478. Of this balance, \$256,369 was covered by federal depository insurance and \$417,109 was uninsured.

State Statutes authorize the Town to invest excess funds in the custody of the Treasurer in obligations of the United States Government in savings bank deposits of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in certificates of deposits of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in national banks located within this state or the state of Massachusetts. These financial statements report investments in certificates of deposit and savings bank deposits under the caption cash and equivalents.

#### December 31, 1986

Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1986 was \$11,055 and expenditures amounted to \$2,951.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

#### J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has transactions between funds to provide services. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statments reflect such transactions as transfers.

Eleanor left the Selectmen's office for several months. Walter Smith (Smitty) was a very capable replacement. We thank him for serving for that short time,

After 30 years of service our treasurer, Howard Goss with his assistant, Jo has decided to let someone else have the job. We thank him for his excellent "tour-of-duty".

In 1986 we were pleased to present the Boston Cane to our oldest resident, Alice Bragg.

The conservation commission was re-activated in 1986. We thank those who were willing to serve on this potentially important facet of our town government.

We are submitting a proposal for the purchase of a computer. We believe the time has come to have one in the town office. It would benefit us in many ways; especially in the area of tax bills. We then could consider twice a year tax billing.

The band stand (once completed) is a nice addition to the green and we thank all who contributed in material and man-power.

The land fill operation is becoming very costly and we continue to explore with the other towns the best method to pursue on this issue.

We plan to finish the erection of a fence on the roadway leading to the boat landing for safety reasons.

### Highway Report

Due to the numerous snow storms mixed with freezing rain of the 1985-86 winter and the two floods in July and August; it seems like the "worst" year since I have been in office. A big help in getting through all this, along with the part time help, was the hiring of a full time employee last January besides myself. Wayne Ring is the first full time helper I have ever had. In the fall of 1985 I worked nine weeks alone, other than some help from the Clark brothers.

About \$25,000 worth of hot-top, bought from Frank Whitcomb, was applied with our grader, on the Rhoades District, the upper end of the Mine and a portion of Pleasant Street that washed out from the flood.

My plans of sealing or oiling these sections and some others, never happened, due to so much flood related work. Also, the \$25,000 raised for improvements on the Hill Road, never got spent for the same reason, but this money is to be carried over to 1987.

Some brush was cut and chipped on the Hill Road, Pine Grove Cemetery and Pleasant Street. Clifford Clark hand mowed some corners.

On July 29 and August 7 we were hit by heavy rains that washed out many roads and destroyed numerous stone culverts and plugged many steel ones.

The first "flood" hit mostly in East Alstead. This left Pine Cliff, Prentice Hill, Old Settlers, Newell Pond, Abilds, Corbin and the North Road, just above the fire bouse, less than one lane wide. This was the only way out for people of that section, and was the second place to get filled in a couple of days. Everyone managed to make it through, to my knowledge and avoided the 23 foot hole that had been one side of the road.

The second flood closed the Vilas Rock Road, along with Murphy Hill, Forrestall, Griffin Hill and did some damage to Pleasant Street and the Vilas Mansion or Sebastian road.

Many people were "trapped" for a few days and had to walk or borrow someones car that was on the "outside". Some were inconvienced and had to drive the long way around and Grive over rough and tough sections until early December. We quit gravelling the Corbin road on December 18 in a snowstorm.

Hardly anyone complained and many people did some work on their own roads with whatever equipment they had, usually just a hand shovel. Some put up homemade barricades and warned others of deep washouts. I appreciate all of this. This all happened in about two hours with a barn fire, just about in the middle of all the damages.

We are receiving Federal aid funds for damages and I have much work to be completed by next August. We will receive some money to replace the Pine Cliff bridge by the Lake Warren dam.

Many culverts were replaced, mostly due to flood damages, but some were needed before and there are many more needed.

Additional or replacement of culverts were on the following roads: Vilas Rock, Griffin Hill, Ben Rogers, Log Cabin, Olds Settlers, Newell Pond, Corbins, Macris, Forestall, Murphy Hill and Prentice Hill. These ranged in diameter from 12" to 48". Although most roads were "rough" all summer, more time was put on the grader than usual. I am sume glad the town owns one. It is hard to believe we have had it nine years this May.

You might have noticed in the past few years, almost always, the town truck drivers are alone. I use to send two men plowing and sanding. I have plowed wibhout a wing man most of the last ten years.

I believe the state highway has the policy of two men in the cab for safety reasons and possibly insurance also. With more and more traffic and emergencies, truck break downs and changing of plans, some form of communication between us would save time and money in many cases. This would also cost, but from talking to other towns, with radios of some sort, they all agree they are a great help. Radios would possibly quicken our response time in emergencies when we are needed. The power company would like greatly to be able to reach us during high wind periods and heavy snow storms to let us be aware of downed and dangerous lines and to find out if certain roads are passable at these times. if a driver is in trouble he could let someone know, instead of having to walk back to the shop or waking up someone sleeping to ask for help. Not all the trucks would be equipped, but the ones that are out in the winter months. along with a base station for the new town garage.

Thanks again to everyone that has assisted in anyway during the past year.

### ALSTEAD POLICE REPORT

Times have changed, and policing in a small community has changed also. Changes in societal attitudes within the past two decades have resulted in changes in law enforcement. Some of the "old ways" of dealing with the criminal element in society and the enforcement of law and order are no longer acceptable. In the "old days" we used to do police work 80% of our time and paper work 20%. Now we do paper work 80% of the time and police work 20%. All too often, an arrested person will be released before the paperwork is finished!

Being a rural part time police officer may seem to be a picnic to many -- but it isn't. We have some of the same problems as full time city police departments, but on a smaller scale. When you put on a police uniform, badge and gunbelt, you have to "shift mental gears" and leave personal problems and other concerns behind and pay total attention to the call you have been requested to respond to. A police officer must be professional and must be fully trained in law enforcement proceedures, as well as firearms training. There is no room for error in this world of law suits.

#### ALSTEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Last fall the Alstead Highway Dept. excavated around the rear side of the Maybelle Still Memorial Bldg. and installed a apron and drainage ditch which we all hope will stop the water problem.

We wish to thank the many people who donated gifts reflecting the heritage of our area. On display thru the 1987 season is pillows made by the 4th grade class of Mrs. Checchi. Each pillow shows a historic building in Alstead. This will count as one of our towns projects in celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution. Alstead was approved as a Bicententennial Community and may use the official logo.

In October a T.V. crew from N.H. Educational Channel interviewed the curator and showed the exhibits on the west side of the downstairs room. From there they coved a number of other buildings in former Papermill Village East Alstead and Alstead Center. Many folks saw the coverage on T.V.

...Conduct researches into Alstead's local land

& water areas.

...Seek to coordinate their activities with those of other related town organization and people who are organized for similar purposes of conservation, in particular, The Alstead Planning Board.

... Protect local resources and water sheds.

... Keep an index of all open spaces and natural, aesthetic areas, with the goal of assuring their proper utilization.

... Receive gifts of money and land for the Town of Alstead, subject to approval of the Selectmen.

...Investigate all applications for dredge and fill permits.

...Conduct public awareness programs in matters of conservation.

We have already made significant progress:

1. In the Spring of 1987, we will formally announce and publicize our first land gift; an historic and beautiful landmark that has a spectacular view of the Green Mts. It will be used as a Town picnic area.

2. Our public awareness program, Trust For New Hampshire Lands, attracted over 130 people to the Twon Hall to hear, see and learn about a major land conservation plan

for New Hampshire.

3. We plan to work with the Boy Scouts on an elm restoration program for Alstead during 1987.

4. We are currently reviewing two fill and dredge permits within our town, several more will be upcoming.

5. We are assisting the Planning Board in updating the town master plan, a necessary and vital step towards assuring Alstead an orderly and proper growth.

All in all, we are off to an enthusiastic and productive start. The Alstead Conservation Commission has arrived and plans to be active well into the foreseeable future as a focal point for environmental concerns.

# REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR ALSTEAD CIVIL DEFENSE

My Fellow Alstead Citizens:

The past year was filled with events which demonstrate our vulnerability to disasters, both natural and man made, and the need to better prepare for such emergencies.

Sudden summer storms devastated many sections in town. Fortunately, Federal and State assistance was obtained to repair roads and bridges. Local and State officials, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and Governor Sununu and his staff worked long hours assessing damages and obtaining emergency funding. Regretfully, no such funds were available for damages to private property.

The frequency in which hazardous materials are being transported and handled in Alstead, and the lack of training and equipment, demonstrated by a recent minor incident, prompts me to place high on the list of priorities a training program for all emergency response agencies so they may better control future Haz-Mat emergencies.

Your Civil Defense Director has attended seminars and tele-conferences, and completed other courses, all dealing with Emergency Management. Similar on-going education is planned for the coming year.

Once again it is pleasing to report that the past year has shown an increase in circulation of over 1,400 books, with 91 new borrowers registered.

The summer reading program was held with 92 children, preschool through grade 5, participating. A party sponsored by the Friends of the Library was held and certificates and book bags were presented to the 82 children who completed the program. Story hours were held during the summer.

Under the direction of Mrs. Linda Campbell and with the cooperation of other Friends of the Library, teachers and parents, students from the Sarah Porter school and grades 3, 4 and 5 from Alstead Primary school were driven or walked to the library for their bimonthly and triweekly visits.

Several exhibits were held during the year with students and organizations participating. Such exhibits are welcomed. Four cassette players with headphones and a large number of books and accompanying cassettes were purchased. These have provided much enjoyment for the children.

The Little Red Wagon from the University of N. H. was sponsored by the Friendsof the Library and funded by the Alstead business men. Also, the Arts Council provided an evening of entertainment for the children. Both programs were enthusiasticly received.

We look forward to the use of the downstair room for the children. This was made possible by the kindness of the late Mr. Whitton and Mrs. Whitton who furnished funds for materials and labor, by the late Bud Wilson who constructed beutiful bookcases, tables and benches and by Lee Livingood who painted the finished products with such bright, eye-catching colors!

I wish to thank Mrs. Isabelle Wright, the Friends of the Library and all who have given so generously of time, energy and financial help for the benefit of the library. A special thanks to the Trustees and the Town of Alstead for their continuing support.

### Planning Board

The Alstead Planning Board has been busy this year. Alstead has not been spared the expansion explosion that has hit area towns. In 1984, Alstead had two subdivisions, in 1985, there were seven (7), and in 1986 there were eighteen (18) subdivisions. Thirty-two new lots were created. The largest lot to be subdivided was 100 acres.

The Planning Board has been assisting subdividers in improving the quality of the subdivisions. The preliminary hearing is an important aspect of this planning as the subdivider and the Planning Board can talk informally about the pros and cons of the proposal. Most subdividers have been willing to accommodate Planning Board's recommendations.

The Board is working to develop a capital improvements plan (C.I.P.) as well as updating the town's master plan and subdivision regulations. The capital improvement plan will be a comprehensive plan involving all of the town's departments, i.e. fire, police, roads, recreation, conservation, Vilas Pool, schools and selectmen. When completed, the C.I.P. will show the financial effect of future growth upon the resources of the town.

A number of Alstead residents have voiced concern about the present and future growth rates of Alstead. The Planning Board is developing a plan for future growth in order to avert the emergency procedures that have become necessary in area towns. The board welcomes input from the general population.

The Planning Board is pleased that the Conservation Commission is once again an active town committee. It will be beneficial in assisting the Planning Board in identifying and evaluating the use of the town's natural resources.

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

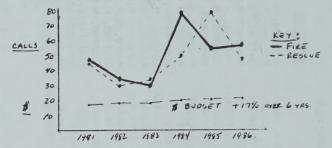

### COVER PHOTO

This house was built in Mill Hollow in 1820 by Ezra Kidder. At the time it was considered by some quite daring to build such a large building with brick as many considered the weight too much for the foundation to withstand for a long period of time. As it still remains in fine condition, it seems they had nothing to worry about. The house was occupied by Ezra and Calista Kidder for many years and five of their twelve children were born there. Ezra Kidder died in 1847 and his wife Calista in 1864. It is assumed that the house stayed in the Kidder family until around 1900.

The property was owned for a short time by a Mr. Josie Howard.

The house was occupied by Mr. Grover Clark and his wife Dora (Wilder) Clark from around 1908 to 1910. The Clark twins (Richard and Clifford) were born in this home in 1909.

Mrs. Margaret Chase became the owner in 1910 and in turn Mary (Chase) Burroughs and her husband Walter assumed ownership in 1936. Mary Burroughs continued ownership until 1980 when she sold the property to Rev. Ralph Miller and his wife Joanna. Mr. & Mrs. Miller have done extensive restoration work in order to keep this fine landmark in top condition to go into the 21st century.

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
