TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in Town affairs. You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in Bath on Tuesday, March 14, 1967 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, an Auditor, a Highway Agent and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of Highways and bridges, for the support of the poor, for the support of the Library, for old age assistance, for the protection of the public, and all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for the construction of Class 5 roads and to raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$843.98 and the State will contribute \$5,626.51 for the same.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall the provisions of the laws relative to the playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to dispose with the delivery of the inventory blanks until April 1.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Tax Collector's deed.

Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to place two street lights on the Monroe Road between the Lackie farm and the intersection of the Lake Gardner road; and to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollers to pay for the same.

Article. 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$604.00 to support The White Mountain Community Services, Inc., a mental health facility.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. To see what disposition the Town will take in regard to additional space in the Bath Village cemetery or the purchasing land for a new cemetery near the Village of Bath; and to raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The resources of the library have been increased substantially because of the generosity of interested persons; twenty-seven families and individuals have given books and encyclopedias, two have given magazine subscriptions, and fourteen have given hundreds of current magazines. All these help greatly to satisfy the ever increasing number of requests for material for term papers and reports, as well as for special interests and hobbies. We have added the World Book Encyclopedia to our reference shelves. We have borrowed 1659 books from the Bookmobile and the Littleton Extension Library, and dozens of non-fiction titles from the State Library.

Mrs. Reed conducted a Story Hour for pre-schoolers through Grade II as she has for the previous two summers. Thirty children were in attendance, and at the closing session, a party, prizes were given for perfect attendance to sixteen boys and girls. In observance of National Library Week a short history of the library was taped by the trustees and the librarian for the Littleton Broadcasting Station through the courtesy of Raymond Burton.

Trustee and Library meetings held out of town have been well attended. All North Country District Council meetings have had a delegate from the local library to participate in the lawmaking and in other vital decisions.

Lack of space has become an acute problem. For the past several years additional shelves have been built, but now there is almost no wall space left. In the immediate future the library will have outgrown its present quarters.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER TOWN OF BATH, N.H.

For Year Ending December 31, 1966

Home visits were made in homes for follow up of cases, but not as often as I would like. This gap in nursing service could be closed by requesting for Home Health Services from a local accredited agency such as the Lisbon Nursing Association. With the advent of Medicare your citizens who are insured under this program would be able to obtain this service.

This year for the first time a Diabetic detection program was held in this town for search of the hidden or unknown diabetic. The purpose is to get him or her under proper diet and treatment.

The infants and preschool children of Bath were included in the Well Child conferences held in Woodsville and Lisbon. They were given a physical examination by the physician and immunization against whooping cough, tetanus, diphtheria, smallpox, polio, and for the first time in this area Measles vaccine was also given to the children 1 to 6 years of age.

School children in grades 1, 4, 8 and 12 received booster shots of diphtheria and tetanus vaccine if the parents signed the request form.

My sincere thanks for the cooperation received.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimise risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 15th day of March, 1967, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. - 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or here-after be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Your superintendent's report this year will be a short discussion of local vs state control education in New Hampshire and how it affects our area.

Many taxpayers in New Hampshire feel the local citizenry has complete control over the education of its local youngsters. Nothing could be farther from the actual truth.

In New Hampshire, the State Board of Education has control over education as it pertains to teacher certification, school curriculum, school building aid, state foundation aid and several other areas. But, to be as brief as possible, let me discuss the major areas.

Your superintendent of schools cannot recommend for employment to your school board a teacher who has not first been certified by the New Hampshire Department of Education.

In the area of curriculum each school in the state, elementary or secondary, must comply with a set of minimum standards as defined by our state consultants. Furthermore, we also have a group in the United States who would like a national curriculum.

Before any school district may construct a school building in New Hampshire it must submit detailed specifications to the state department before approval for state building aid will be allocated.

If a school district complies with the aforementioned requirements it can then be considered for state foundation aid (state aid as we know it). This aid is ascertained on a need basis and the general philosophy is to attempt to equalize educational opportunities throughout the state by giving poorer school districts additional funds which they otherwise would not be able to secure without undue hardship on the local property taxpayer. In the Granite State, the Department of Education has not attempted to foist its philosophy on local school districts but has tried to improve educational opportunities through mutual determination of local policy. A good example could be the reorganization of school districts. Presently, the department has tried to provide guidance and leadership in developing regional districts but the day is drawing closer where we will be told how, where and when we will regionalize, or state foundation aid will not be forthcoming.

The point is very clear, either we solve our problems locally or we will lose what little local control we have left and, in addition, lose state help. If you are thinking of "going it alone" please refer to the revenue section of your local budget and check the totals under Sweepstakes, Building Aid, Needy District Aid and Foundation Aid.

May I take this opportunity to thank the school board, teachers and taxpayers of Bath, for their support during the past year.

One pupil was examined at the Orthopedic Clinic in Hanover Sept. 13, 1965, Oct. 23, 1965, Jan. 28, 1966.

The Heaf tbc tests were done in grades 1, 4 and 8. There were 19 pupils tested and two adults. There was one positive reaction. A follow-up chest X-ray was negative.

The Crest Company provided materials for a special Dental Health Education Program. Dr. Jamback visited the school February 15, 1966 and special tooth brushing kits were given to the 3rd grade pupils. Dr. Jamback talked about good Dental Health care, and proper tooth brushing was demonstrated.

Tetanus and Diphtheria Boosters were offered to pupils in grades 1, 4 and 8. Fourteen pupils and one adult were given the Boosters. This is an annual program sponsored by the Department of Health. Vaccine is furnished by the State and the Boosters were given by Dr. Eastman at the school.

All routine vision and hearing tests were completed. All pupils are given a vision test each year. Grades 1, 4 and 8 and all new pupils are given hearing tests. Referrals are made when necessary. The following clinics are available throughout the state for follow-up treatment of special defects:

- 1. Sight Conservation Program Department of Health
- 2. The Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic
- 3. The Orthopedic Clinic
- 4. White Mountain Community Services Inc.—psychological testing and counseling.

Parents may request the services of these clinics through their family physician.

The one area in the school health that seems to be most neglected is the area of dental examination and treatment. Out of 34 pupils referred for dental care, 18 were not seen by a dentist.

Several meetings were attended during the year. It is always helpful to meet with others for new ideas and programs. The conference meetings at the White Mountain Community Services Inc. Center at Littleton were especially helpful. About once a month the school nurses in this area met with the doctors and social workers and discussed special problems and possible solutions.

I want to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Savoy, the teachers and all others for their continued interest and support of the School Health Program.
