#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties, to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Article 2. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and for the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10 A.M. and are not to close before 6 P.M. At 8 P.M. action will be taken on the following articles in the warrant:

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for same.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for radio equipment for the fire department.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the poor and \$3,000 for assistance to the aged, and \$1,000 for aid to soldiers and their families.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for maintenance of highways and bridges and for other necessary expenses of the Town.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Collector of Taxes on a percentage basis at the rate of 3/4 of 1% of the money actually collected.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$15,000 if needed.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the Town Library.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for care of the clock on the Church.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to purchase aerial photographs of the Town.

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$936.94 for the construction of Class V highways, the State to contribute \$6,246.26.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the tarring of Class V highways, under the direction of the Selectmen.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day and patriotic purposes.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$250 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in this Region.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$100 for the care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and and appropriate the sum of \$125 for the maintenance and replacement of power equipment used in the Town Cemeteries.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the care of the Town Dump.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to gravel Class V Roads.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to pay for the rental on two hydrants.

- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for damages and legal expenses including dog damage.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for civil defense.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for interest on temporary loans.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the Memorial Plot in front of the Town Hall.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for recreational equipment for the youth of the Town.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to install an electric light on New Boston Road, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to pay for the same.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1800 for installation of two oilburning furnaces in the Town Hall.
- Article 29. To see if the Town will adopt the following By-Law for highway and fire protection purposes:

No person shall build any dwelling in this Town at a distance of more than fifty feet from a public highway, without first submitting to the Board of Selectmen a lot plan showing the width and layout of the roadways across the lot and the proposed location of water lines. The selectmen, or an agent appointed by them, shall, within thirty (30) days, inspect the site and in writing approve the layout or advise

the builder what changes, if any, would be necessary to provide minimum width, grade, and layout of roadways if eventually to be accepted by the Town for maintenance, and whether the layout provides adequate access for fire protection purposes. The selectmen's approval shall not constitute an acceptance of such road as public highways, nor shall disapproval prevent construction, but approval or disapproval shall be considered when such streets are presented for acceptance by the Town.

- Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Palomino Lane for a distance of 275 feet beyond its present accepted length.
- Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Public Street for a distance of 400 feet beyond its present accepted length.
- Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that section of the present Horace Greeley Highway beginning at the point where it is joined by the northeasterly end of the new state highway relocation and running southwesterly about twelve hundred (1200) feet to a point opposite a water hole established by the Town for fire protection, such discontinuance to become effective upon reclassification of said section by the New Hampshire Commissioner of Public Works and Highways from a Class I to a Class V or Class VI highway.
- Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the road leading from the New Boston Road near the buildings formerly owned and occupied by Alonzo Holbrook, in a westerly direction to the Old Bedford Road.
- Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept Constance Street beginning at Worthley Road leading in a southerly direction for a distance of 1020 feet.

Article 35 (1) To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to maintain the present right of way that leads to and along the shore of Stebbins Pond (2) and in the event there is legal difficulties about the ownership of said right of way, that the town vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to make a new road to reach the east shore of said Pond.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept Lawes Ave., beginning at Donald St. extending in a southerly direction to Dery St.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept Dery St. beginning at Lawes Ave. and extending in an easterly direction for a distance of 225 ft.

Article 38 To see if the Town will vote to accept Gendron St. beginning at Dery St. and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 300 ft.

Article 39. To see what action the Town will take regarding the playing of beano under the provisions of Chapter 71-A of the revised Laws as inserted in Chapter 292 of the Laws of 1949.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and of other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call, "I don't care", he is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called, "I don't know any better"; and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountain streams clear, your cooperation is needed by:

- 1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
- 2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.
- 3. Never burn in dry, windy weather.

- 4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.
- 5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe ashes are out before discarding.

#### Gentlemen:-

As our first year's experience with Civil Defense against atomic warfare comes to a close, it becomes more and more apparent that the future offers us no alternative to the assuming and maintaining of a posture of preparedness.

Help has been and will continue to be given both by the State and Federal Governments but the problems involved are peculiarly local and will not be the same for any two cities or towns.

Here in Bedford, we have tried to lay the groundwork of an organization that would not be too expensive to support over a period of years, either in money or in individual effort, yet effective when put to the test. That groundwork is not now complete nor will it be for some time to come. The intangibles are many and few of the easy answers helpful. We are working in a new field wherein the temptation toward indulging in superficial activity is strong but will lead us little toward the reaping of the crop we want.

Our first step involved a detailed study of the threats we face locally, next the type of organization needed to meet them and third what training and equipment were musts.

Now, we have an organization of over one hundred of our townspeople enrolled in seven units:—Administrative; Fire Fighting; Health and Sanitation; Medical, Nursing and First Aid; Refugee; Warning and Communications; Auxiliary Police. A school for Fire Fighters has been held under the leadership of Ralph M. Wiggin, Jr., and one is now being held for Auxiliary Policemen under the leadership of Charles L. Pulford. A First Aid Station will be placed in the Town Hall as soon as the equipment is complete and

tentative plans for the Administrative, Refugee, and Warning and Communication Units reduced to writing. Some literature has been distributed; much more is being accumulated for use in case of a worsening of conditions.

It was understood that of the appropriation of five hundred dollars for Civil Defense made at the Town Meeting last year, at least half would not be spent in the absence of an immediately impending emergency. Actually, only ninety four dollars and thirty three cents have been obligated to date. It is quite likely that an excess of caution governed in this spending, the rule being that absolutely nothing would be purchased that we could get along without. Too, a number of items that we had hoped to get on especially favorable terms could not be thus obtained so the buying was postponed. A statement is attached hereto.

An organization for high school and out of school youth, the Bedford Youth Extension Club was formed in the Spring of 1950 under the direction of Miss Arlene Bailey and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Wiggin, Jr., with the assistance and support of the County Club Agents. Extension Service is a function of the University of New Hampshire and it is the sponsoring agent for the greater part of the programs.

The purpose of the organization is to provide opportunities for engaging in recreational, social, and educational activities with the aim of developing mature personalities in order that we may lead better lives as responsible citizens; to help young people learn how to work and play together in groups, committees, or teams, to achieve some goals and experience the satisfactions resulting from doing things by democratic methods; to provide opportunities to discuss topics related to the social and vocational interests of young people and issues of community, state and national interest; and to offer a means of extending service to the community.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Bedford, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March, 1952, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the pay-

ment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

- 9. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75 for Workmen's Compensation for its employees and to instruct the School Board to request the selectmen to include its employees in the Town compensation plan.
- 10. To see if the School District will vote to raise a sum, not exceeding \$1,000 to meet the expenses of the hot lunch program.
- 11. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$200 to bind land for a new school site and instruct a committee composed of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and first selectman, to survey possible sites, take an option on the most desirable available location, and report to the district at a future meeting.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

1951 - 1952

During the past year many important changes have taken place in the local school system. It was deemed a necessity to open our one and only extra room in the Bedford Schools. Making it necessary to add one more teacher to our staff. The staff now consisting of nine teachers.

Your School Board is very much concerned over the rapidly increasing pupil population. Every available classroom is now in use and all indications show that within a very short time another classroom will be needed. Knowing that there is a growing sentiment among the towns people to a central school and seeing many likely spots for such a new school being broken into house lots it was felt that we would not be doing our full duty as School Board members if we did not give you an opportunity to take positive action on the problem before all of the desirable locations are gone.

Accordingly, an article has been inserted in the Warrant authorizing a committee to take an option on a desirable site for a future school building. We ask that you give careful consideration to this article.

The Hot Lunch Program continues to operate but cannot be considered a self supporting program any longer due to a decrease in Federal reimbursement plus increase in prices for food, management and equipment. The present daily charge is twenty-five cents per pupil. The School Board wishes to express its thanks to the local organizations who have contributed toward the lunch program.

Our school bus service has been proven most satisfactory.

One new local bus having been added to the system.

We have strived to make wise decisions with funds appropriated for the repair and general upkeep of our schools.

The past year has been a busy year for the School Board. All members doing their best with but two factors in mind, namely, the municipality and educational system. All regular meetings are scheduled the first Wednesday of each month. Attendance by voters at School Board meetings will aid in providing a school system you want in Bedford. All individual and collective problems could be solved at such meetings. It is only through your cooperation in presenting problems to the Superintendent and School Board that there can be a better understanding between pupils, teachers and the entire board. The schools of Bedford should be utmost in everyone's mind as they mold the future of our town.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

## To the Bedford School Board:

I herewith submit my third Annual Report on the conditions of your schools.

This past year has been very successful as far as the education of your children is concerned. The teachers who remained with us from the preceding year are continuing to show the same fine professional spirit and interest in the youth of Bedford. The two teachers new to our schools are proving to be very capable and make a fine addition to our staff. The morale among the teachers is very high. This is due in a large measure to the whole hearted cooperation they have received from the School Board and parents. Every effort should be made to let them know we feel they are a valued asset to our school system.

Many administrative problems confronting us have been successfully met while others need District action at the Annual School Meeting for a satisfactory solution.

Opening the fourth room at the Stevens Buswell School has made it possible to keep the number of pupils per teacher in the first three grades low enough so that each pupil can receive a maximum of individual attention. This is very important in giving each child a good start in the basic fundamentals of reading and arithmetic.

When I first became your Superintendent three years ago the Board and parents alike were justifiably pleased and proud over the fact that no teacher had more than twenty-five pupils in her room. I feel I should point out that at the present time there are large enrollments in both the fourth and fifth grade rooms and that undoubtedly there will be equally large enrollments in all but grades one, seven, and

eight next year. If the towns people wish to continue to keep the pupil load per teacher under twenty-five, obviously some solution to this problem must be found. If this trend continues it will not be too long before our present facilities will become over-taxed and we will be faced with a housing crisis.

It has been a real disappointment to me not to be able to find a music supervisor this year. I have scoured all towns and cities within a twenty-five mile radius, but have found none qualified who would be willing to work on a part-time basis. I have three prospects for another year, but that doesn't help the present situation any.

In spite of all efforts on the part of our excellent cooks and Mrs. Smend, the Hot Lunch Program is finding it impossible to make ends meet. The effects of inflation, plus the loss of some Federal Aid has brought us to the point where all reserves have been used up. This part of our school program has proved its value, and I sincerely hope that a solution may be found so that we may continue it.

It has been a real pleasure serving the School Board and Parents. I have received nothing but the most whole hearted cooperation from all concerned with the problems of the school and am confident that as long as this fine feeling exists good education for all the children of Bedford will be assured.
