#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualifed to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the new Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Chase Bridge so-called, and the approaches thereto, from the main road at Cocketts store to the junction with the new highway near the DeGrace residence.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will close at 4 P. M.

Six children had dental corrections through the kindness of the Salvation Army. 36 children of the 7th and 8th grades were skin tested by the Grafton County Tuberculosis nurse. Only one needed a chest x-ray, which proved negative. One deaf child was taken to three hearing specialists for examination and a hearing aid was loaned by the N. H. Hearing Society of Manchester. Several children had examinations and glasses through the Sight Conservation of Public Welfare. Two children attended the Speech Clinic held at Plymouth on March 7 and 8. A Hot Lunch Program was carried on in several of the Schools which greatly improved the nutrition problem.

In the Fall of 1950 a Fluorine Clinic was conducted at Plymouth. Children from the first through the sixth grades had four treatments. The difficult problem of transportation for Campton was very ably handled by the committee in charge and much credit is due them for its success.

I wish to extend my thanks to the School Board, Superintendent Rollins, Teachers, Parents, and Pupils who are helping with the Health Program.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### To The Campton School Board:

My eighth annual report to you and the people of Campton will discuss those items of school operation that are considered most important, with a minimum of statistical information.

The school year began with only one change in our teaching staff. Mrs. Ynes DeFilippi, who last year took elementary training at Plymouth Teachers College, succeeded Mrs. Virginia Sargeant at Blair School. Campton has been fortunate, through the past few years, to escape frequent replacement of teachers which has plagued many school systems all over the country. The extent of our fortune can be fully appreciated only when uninterrupted service is no longer enjoyed.

A policy of financial recognition of professional improvement by teachers and an upward revision of our salary scale have been wise steps by this town. While we have not gone as far as we should, it is gratifying to record progress in the right direction. The 1951-52 budget should permit a continuation of the policy that has been proved sound.

Growing interest in their schools and a willingness of parents to cooperate with them in the interest of children are pleasant things to record. One evidence of this sharing of responsibility is the fact that four of our six buildings now have audio-visual teaching helps that were lacking one year ago. An increasing tendency among parents to discuss school problems with the teachers in the effort to work out a fair and advantageous solution is a healthy sign. Good will is highly prized and a continuation solicited.

It is hoped that our new budget may provide for the construction of simple playground equipment for every school. Such things as swings and teeter-boards can be built locally at much lower cost than to buy the commercial products. It would be fine if the expense of material could be assumed by the district and the responsibility for construction shared by parents whose children would benefit. This evidence of interest would mean a lot both to the teachers and to the pupils. Every opportunity for us to work together is just so much more assurance of continued good relations.

Over the years, our transportation requirements have fluctuated considerably. Requests for special transportation privileges must always be considered from the point of view of the town as a whole, and decisions must be made with due regard for both personal need and financial obligations involved. As a general principle, it seems unwise to make commitments in one area that cannot be extended to all others in the town. It likewise seems reasonable to recognize that conditions of highway travel are now radically different from those existing when the law governing school transportation was enacted. A more liberal transportation policy can become effective only at the discretion of those who vote funds for that purpose.

My recommendations for the 1951-52 budget will attempt to meet the need for new and better wall maps for the schools, an allowance for the purchase of audiovisual teaching aids, and more extensive supplementary reading material. Gradual and systematic extensions will eventually benefit every school without excessive cost in any one year. Every building should have good reference material and a library table to which children may go for real reading enjoyment.

Progress in Campton schools is the result of loyal and effective work by the teachers, the interest and cooperation of parents, and the unfailing help of school board members. My sincere thanks go to them all.
