### ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT'S REPORT

I assumed the position of Administrative Assistant in September which is the beginning of the busiest time of year in local government. With the assistance of all those involved there were many important accomplishments in 1980.

Personnel policies were developed and implemented in January. This will be of benefit to the Town as an employer and the employees in their relationships.

The Selectmen and myself spent many hours in the area of fiscal planning. With a declining taxable base and the increasing costs of providing services this has become a serious concern. Semi-annual tax billing, industrial and commercial development, and review of the kudgetary process began early in October this year to insure that every possible cost saving could be explored, and allow more time for public comment. Instead of one public hearing the Fudget Committee had time to hold two. The costs of all services delivered are but a few of the areas explored.

The Town's insurance coverage was reviewed. It was found the Town did not have any coverage in the area of public officials liability or to insure the Police Department against suits. A policy has been purchased for the purpose. By making improvements in the Community Fuilding in the coming year, our fire insurance coverage should be reduced for this building. Tearing down the Old Town Shed will also reduce insurance coverage necessary.

The Town was awarded a Highway Safety matching grant for the amount of \$3,537.00 for additional police coverage and for a crossing guard. In 1982 their portion will be reduced to 25% for any additional police coverage, including the special police officers, over 1980 coverage.

This year was a successful year in Town government. Special thanks to all those employed by the Town and serving on the Town's Committees.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It has been a busy year for the Board of Selectmen. We feel that many constructive actions have been taken and would like to highlight a few of these we think have been most important.

In the area of training, the Board of Selectmen attended a training session in assessing, receiving certification. This better enables us to better serve the community's interest in assessment matters.

Revenue shortfalls have been a concern of the present Selectmen. We have investigated this area at length and hope in 1981 to institute some of the measures we feel will help alleviate the tax burden. We are hopeful you will support semi-annual tax billings and the creation of an Economic Development Committee as two measures we think are of particular importance.

We have attempted to work closely with the various committees and community organizations, and be supportive of their efforts. A better cooperative atmosphere has resulted.

In the area of keeping municipal services costs down we had an energy audit conducted for the Community Puilding. By investing \$2,000.00 in energy conservation measures this coming year, we can save at least an equal amount in the forth coming year. In the area of contracts we have instituted a policy of annual review.

An area of concern that we will continue to pursue is with current use exemptions. For 1980 there were 140 owners in current use for a total of \$3,491,730.00 in valuation amounting to \$99,863.00 in lost revenue.

Particular emphasis has been given to planning. In areas such as capital acquisition, growth patterns, and projecting further community needs, we found that long term planning has been minimal. We have tried to reverse this.

We wish to give special thanks at this time to all the dedicated municipal employees who have made the past year a productive one.

Our greatest concern has been to work in the best interests of all the residents of Canaan and will continue to be.

### TOWN WARRANT

### State of New Hamphire

Grafton, ss.

Town of Canaan

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canaan, New Hamphire, who are qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified that the annual town meeting of the Town of Canaan, New Hamphire, will tentatively be held at Masscoma Valley Regional High School on Saturday, March 21, 1981 at one o'clock F. M. to act upon the following subjects:

Tolls will be open for voting by ballot for the election of town officers and voting on referendum questions at the Old Meeting House on Tuesday, March 10, 1981 at 10:00 A. M. and will close at 6:00 F. M. unless the town votes to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To vote by nonmartisan ballot for the following town officers:

One selectman to serve for a term of three years.

A town treasurer to serve for a term of one year.

A road agent to serve for a term of one year.

The overseer of public welfare to serve for a term of one year.

A cemetery agent to serve for a term of one year.

One trustee of trust funds to serve for a term of three years.

Two auditors each for a term of one year.

Three members of the planning board for a term of three years.

Three members of the town budget committee for a term of

three years.

One member of the town budget committee for a term of two years.

Two members of the town budget committee for a term of one year.

One library trustee for a term of three years.

And any such other town officers as may be required by law.

- ARTICLE 2. Do you approve of having 2 sessions for the annual town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business?

  This article requires a majority vote by ballot.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, either by public auction or in such manner as the Selectmen may determine.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax revenues as provided under the Municipal Finance Act, RSA Chapter 33.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the premayment of taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept

- ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend gifts of money or reasonal property for the nurmose intended by the donor and in addition to apply, receive and expend any federal or state assistance not anticipated as of the appual Town Feeting, for the nurmoses set forth in the Town budget on the condition that the Selectmen shall account to the voters of the Town for all such additional receipts and expenses
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Belectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Recting, to appoint the Road Agent, such appointment to be effective commencing with the 1982 Annual Town Recting.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 14 as passed at the 1980 Annual Town Neeting, which article raised and appropriated the sum of \$25,000 to rehabilitate the Town Library and Historical Museum. Said article, as amended, would read as follows:
  - "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,960 to rehabilitate the Town Library and Historical Museum and authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary funds under the Municipal Finance Act. RSA Chapter 33. It is intended that such sum be raised by issuance of bonds or notes not to exceed \$30,960 with full mayment to be made in three years, and it is further intended that a reimbursement grant of \$10,320 from the State of Mew Hamphire for historical preservation and the sum of \$2,881.01 from Revenue Sharing Funds shall be used to defray a nortion of the costs of this Article to the Town."
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, \$22,200 for the acquisition of new equipment, and \$2,881.01 for repairs to the Library and Historical Museum, and to authorize the Selectmen further to make pro rata reductions in these amounts if estimated revenue sharing funds are not received.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the new position of Deputy Tax Collector as provided for in RSA 41:38.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will continue the sale of dumn stickers.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to hire a second full time natrolman, to begin duties not before June 1, 1981, the cost of whom shall not exceed \$6,900 in 1981. ( Budget Committee- tie vote. )
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to allow the use of the 1976 Chevrolet vehicle for a police back-up cruiser and other official Town business. (Budget Committee recommends.)
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt semi-annual

- van billi: s order the provisions of RSA 76:15-a and = -15-5.
- AR CL. 15. To see if the Town will vote to create an Economic Appelorment Committee, to be appointed, and whose by-laws must be approved, by the Board of Celectmen.
- ATRICL 11. (by metition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and armropriate the sum of \$500.00 to help support Headrest, Inc., in return for services to be rendered in 1981.
- ARTICLE 17. (by metition) To see if the Town will vote to ampropriate the sum of 3452.00 as its share of the cost of supporting the Dartmouth-Lake Sunance Region Association the only official State of New Hampshire non-profit vacation travel promotion organization for this area.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend a grant from the State of New Ham shire for the amount of \$334.00 for a Crossing-Guard and \$3,334.00 for colice coverage, to defray Town charges for these services. (This article requires a 2/3 majority vote by ballot.)
- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same based on the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 20. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or any other officers and to mass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 21. To transact any other business that may be brought lawfully before this Town Meeting.

#### ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

The addition of the new loader and backhoe enabled us to accomplish a much greater amount of work this summer.

We did shoulder and ditch work in the Village, on the Upper Grafton Road, Potato Road, South Road, Roberts Road and on Packbay Road. We are in hopes of being able to do the rest of the blacktop roads this spring and summer. In addition, we were able to replace and lower a number of culverts, cut brush and grade many of the roads a number of times this past summer.

We replanked three kridges on the Old Lary Road, one over Gulf Brook on South Road, one on the Fernwood Farms Road, and the railroad kridge on the Upper Grafton Road. We were able to seal a portion of the Roberts Road, Potato Road, West Farms Road, Goose Pond Road and Backbay Road, as well as cold patching and shimming a number of town roads.

Our major work was removing a large bank and widening the hill on South Road, rebuilding seven-tenths of a mile of road on Maple Street and adding hardpack to the surface and rebuilding it. Widening and straightening out Jones Hill and Jerusalem Road. This has aided ourselves and motorists a great deal this winter.

Due to state regulations, it was necessary to remove a bridge located by the dam on Goose Pond Road. We replaced the bridge with two large culverts. Cold weather and snow forced us to leave the finishing up until this spring.

#### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND

#### STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Pusiness, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

#### POLICE REPORT

TO PROTECT TO SERVE

The year 1980 has brought new meaning to law enforcement within our community.

Through the efforts of the full-time and part-time police officers there has been a tremendous increase in police service provided. This year there has been 1,309 complaints answered compared to 463 in 1978 and about 450 in 1979. This shows a 286% increase over the past several years.

In June of this year officer Timothy Acerno was hired as the second full-time officer. In October, he graduated from the New Hampshire Police Academy and received his certification as a police officer. His service to the department and the community has been noted and appreciated by many.

In August the Police Department took delivery of the new police cruiser. The new car was put in service and the old cruiser received reconditioning. Foth vehicles were painted a similar paint scheme so they could be easily identified and have a high visibility impact while on patrol. The second car also assures that while one car may be out of town on police kusiness the other cruiser is available to respond to emergency calls.

I encourage the participation of the public in contacting the Police Department when they see a crime committed or anything suspicious so that we can make our community a safer place to live.

I wish to thank the citizens of Canaan and the Board of Selectmen who have supported me and my men in this past year. I will do my best to see that law enforcement in Canaan will continue to be effective and professional in every aspect.

# REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION - 1980

The Canaan Conservation Commission held twelve public meetings during 1980. We reviewed three dredge and fill wetland permits, recommending two be allowed and one denied.

The Planning Board normally spends the majority of its meeting time regulating subdivisions but this year there were fewer subdivisions brought before the Board than in 1979.

# REPORT OF OLD MEETING HOUSE COMMITTEE - 1980

During the first part of 1980 the Old Meeting House Committee carefully reviewed and regised the project plan for the restoration of the Old Meeting House on Canaan Street. The review was needed before starting the interior renovation because we had to make decisions on some problems thus far unsettled and to establish a starting point and sequence for the work. In these deliberations we consulted with a professional architect.

The revised plan was filed with the Board of Selectmen in June. It remains the same in principle and objectives as the original plan reported in 1975. The conclusion of most immediate importance is that interior restoration should be limited to the original main building for the next two or three years. Revisions to the non-original rear extension and installation of modern service facilities will be deferred until larger funds are raised.

The first step in interior restoration was completed in the fall of 1980. This was the reconstruction of the main upper ceiling, in plaster, finished appropriately for the period of the building.

We acknowledge a great debt and deep gratitude to Elsie for her leadership, enthusiasm, and hard work. We look forward to the day when the Old Meeting House will stand restored as a permanent memorial to her.

William Geoghegan, Chm. Dale Barney Wylie Mitchell Earl North Pamela Webster In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Due to inflated Nursing Home expenses with somewhat reduced revenues and rapidly increasing costs of welfare reimbursements to the State, our kudget year ended very close to the line, with a \$3,620 surplus. Because of the Delegation's decision to use a two-year surplus in one budget year to allow citizens a reduced county tax in FY 1980, the 1981 fiscal year budget resulted in a heavier tax factor making up that decrease as well as offsetting reduced revenues and allowing for standard budget increases.

As with towns, the county welfare assistance programs are increasing and becoming more involved, especially with the current energy crunch and rapidly inflating economy. We also foresee a possible decrease in Federal and State contributions to social service programs which could have considerable impact on local hudgets.

The sewage disposal system has progressed slightly, with planning completed and ready to go out for bid. If all goes well, we may be able to submit a final report next year.

The Commissioners worked closely with the Nursing Home Employee Council to set up a wage/benefit package more compatible to the State program for Glencliff employees. The Commissioners hope to work out a job description/wage scale plan for courthouse employees in the near future.

Grafton County is gradually converting from a bookkeeping machine system to a computerized system for all county accounts. Payroll was converted effective January 1, 1980, and vendor payment and receipt programs were recently added. Patient accounts and purchase order programs will be added later. The system is too new for comprehensive comments, but we anticipate constructive changes in the overall accounting and reporting system.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday (except holidays) at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioner's Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m., which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.

# MASCOMA HOME HEALTH SERVICES - 1980

Mascoma Home Health Services, formerly known as Mascoma Area Health Council, this year starts its thirteenth year of service to the Mascoma Valley.

The services are funded in part by the towns served. This guarantees home health services, visiting nurse, physical and occupational therapists, and a home health aide. Participation for well child and dental clinics, blood pressure screenings, and disease prevention programs is included.

The agency is a certified agency under the Medicare program. All towns it contracts with can have at least one representative on the Board of Directors.

Anyone can request services. A nurse or therapist will make an evaluation visit to determine if services can be helpful. Further visits will be made under physicians orders.

The agency serves all ages and economic groups, with a goal of preventing or shortening institutionalization, promoting rehabilitation, and return to independence.

Some examples of services are treatments, dressings, injections, family training care of a patient, evaluation and care of the chronically, terminally, and acutely ill. Some of the most common conditions are cardiac, respiratory, and neurological diseases, cancer, stroke, diabetes, and orthopedic problems.

The services of a pediatric nurse practitioner are available to young families. A newborn visit is made by the nurse if desired.

The office and clinic space is located on Prospect Street in Enfield. The phone number is 632-7234. Phone calls or visits concerning our services are always welcome.

# HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION - 1980

The Commission, during the calendar year of 1980, held four formal meetings. The many minor decisions on applications and other business was conducted by the chairman through telepone conversations and by individual checks by the members to obtain concurrence. Although now proven highly efficient, a review is being undertaken to assure full public participation and review of significant Commission actions to promote better understanding of its work.

During this year a total of eleven applications were approved and one, granted in 1971, was reconfirmed. No major construction plans were presented.

The Town plans for repair and restoration of the Library building with town and federal financing have been closely followed, and we regret that it has not yet been practical to initiate the badly needed basic repairs to arrest deterioration.

A trip to a state sponsored regional conference in Durham was undertaken, but the interesting agenda did not apply directly to Canaan interests.

An inquiry from the Lake Sunapee Council regarding area interest in Historic District matters was answered, but the scope indicated had only a vague concern with our local responsibilities. A meeting is scheduled in Hanover on February 3, 1981.

The District regulations were reprinted in 1980 with the inclusion of a detailed description of the boundaries and reference to a District map. This map was prepared from Town property maps and is designed to accommodate future revisions reflecting changes in ownership or property boundaries.

During 1980 outgoing Chairman Dave Webster was replaced by Wylie Mitchell. Georgia Tilton was appointed to succeed Bill Taussig whose unfortunate death deprived the Commission of a dedicated member. The Commission is looking forward in 1981 to serve Canaan vigorously in carrying out its assigned duties.

#### OPPORTUNITY CENTER

The Opportunity Center is a private, non-profit multi-service organization that was established in 1973 to provide community services to the residents of Mascoma Valley. Some of the Center's services and programs are available to the residents of the greater southern Grafton County area.

The Opportunity Center is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors which meets on the second Monday of each month. The offices are located on 4 Church Street, Canaan, and are open Monday through Friday, 8:30 A. M. to 5:00 P. M.

The Center offers the following services to Canaan residents:

Thrift Store offers recycled clothing and household articles at low cost. Donations are made to disaster victims. The Store houses the Emergency Food Pantry, which is stocked with canned goods donated by individuals and churches.

Shakoma Family Day Care Network is a system of licensed family day care homes offering child care to working parents.

Southern Grafton County Weatherization Program makes \$560 worth of materials available to income eligible households in order to make their homes more weathertight and energy efficient. Trained crews will install the materials if necessary.

Southern Grafton County Housing Assistance Program offers financial and budget counseling; help in finding financial for purchasing, renting, and repairing homes; packaging of Farmer's Home Loans and grants; and developing other housing resources in the area.

<u>Solar Self-Help Project</u> is assisting 45 homeowners in Canaan, Grafton and Enfield to weatherize and solarize their homes. The Center is supplying the training, technical assistance, and materials. The homeowners will do the actual work themselves.

<u>Community Gardening Project</u> has established a garden site on Potato Road. Future plans include developing a community greenhouse.

Home Energy Assistance Program provides federal fuel assistance funds to income eligible families and individuals.

<u>Crisis Assistance</u> is available for a variety of problems and needs, from legal troubles to consumer complaints.

<u>Parent Plus</u> is a parent support group run by volunteers. Parent Plus currently sponsors a play group and is developing other projects.

Energy Advocacy Project is developing a citizens group to discuss and act on energy issues and problems. Presently, the focus is on fuel-related winter emergencies.

The meeting opened at 10:00 A. M. at the Mascoma Regional High School, West Canaan. The Town Warrant and School Warrant was read by moderator Walter W. King. A motion was made by Inez M. Cushman and seconded by Edward Lary that the polls be opened for the purpose of electing Town and School officers and voting on referendum questions, and the business meeting adjourn until 7:00 P. M.. Articles 4 through 26 to be acted upon at that time.

The ballot clerks were John Q. Adams and George B. Aldrich. Walter Williams acted as gatekeeper. The acting Deputy Town Clerk for the day was Deborah G. Jordan. The checklist supervisors were Martha Pusey and Stacia Ballou and Deborah G. Jordan.

The business meeting was called to order at seven (7:00) P.M. The moderator asked for a show of hands on non voters and instructed the visitors they could not vote on any of the articles.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax revenues as provided under the Municipal Finance Act, RSA Chapter 33.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed by public auction or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the tax collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:522.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the tax collector to accept prepayments as provided by RSA 80:1-a.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend gifts of money or personal property for the purposes intended by the donor and in addition, to apply, receive and expend any federal or state assistance for the purposes set forth in the town budget not anticipated as of

the annual town meeting on the condition that the Selectmen shall account to the voters for all such additional receipts and expenses.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9. To raise such sums as may be necessary to defray
Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same kased on the budget submitted
by the Budget Committee.

A motion was made and seconded to table Article 9 until after Article 24 had been acted on. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10. (Ey petition) To see if the Town will vote to designate the following network of roads, including Gould Road from Goose Pond Road to the intersection of Upper Gates Road; Hinkson Road from the Turnpike Road to the intersection of Upper Gates Road; Upper Gates Road from the intersection of Gould Road and Hinkson to it's present dead end; and the Beech Cobble Road from the Upper Gates Road to its intersection with the Turnpike Road: as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 and 253:18 for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Canaan and, further, that the Selectmen of said Town of Canaan shall, regarding such roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to help Headrest, Inc., the 24 hour, year round crisis intervention, information and referral and emergency housing center in return for services to be rendered in 1980.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Article 11. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent town meeting, to appoint the road agent, commencing with the 1981 Annual Town Meeting.

Voted in the negative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light by the Crystal Lake Frook bridge on the Black-Water Road, to pay such amounts as may be necessary for the operation thereof and to authorize the Selectmen to take all necessary action to effect the purpose of this article.

Voted in the negative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to rehabilitate the Town Library and Historical Museum and authorize the Selectmen to borrow under the Municipal Budget Act RSA 33. It is intended that such sum be raised by issuance of bonds or notes not to exceed \$25,000 with full payment to be made in three years and further that a \$10,000 Historic Preservation Matching Grant he used to defray the cost to the Town. (This article requires a 2/3 majority vote by ballot.)

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by show of hands.

A motion was made and seconded to amend Article 14, to have all work go out for bid.

Voted in the affirmative by a show of hands.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to rescind action taken at a previous town meeting providing for the election of permanent police officers and commencing with the 1981 Annual Town Meeting and thereafter that permanent police officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen as provided in RSA 105:1.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by standing vote.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will raide and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to enlarge the Canaan Town Beach Recreation Area.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with a paving contractor for the paving of the sidewalks of Canaan Village for a sum not to exceed \$3,000.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$452 as its share of the cost of supporting the Dartmount-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

The official State of New Hampshire non-profit travel and tourism promotion association for this area.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300 for the purchase of a new police cruiser and further to release \$3,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund for said purchase to be carried out by the Selectmen as agents of the Town.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new loader backhoe and authorize the Selectmen to borrow under the Municipal Finance Act RSA 33. It is intended that such sum will be raised by the issuance of notes or bonds not to exceed \$50,000 with full payment to be made in four years. (This article requires a 2/3 majority vote by ballot.)

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by standing vote.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 to be placed in Capital Reserve Funds for the purchase of new Town equipment.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Article 21 was amended so that \$5,000 of the \$12,000 to be raised would be placed in the Capital Reserve Fire Truck Fund.

Voted as amended in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

Loader/Backhoe..........10,000.00
Town Hall & Other Fldgs......908.12
Town Library & Historical Museum5,000.00

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to purchase land owned by Walter and Catherine Pates located on the southerly side of Parker Street for the sum of \$1,200 and further to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver on behalf of the Town such documents as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the purpose of this vote.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt this article.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9. To raise such sums as may be necessary to defray
Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same based on the budget submitted
by the Fudget Committee.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

Article 9 was amended to increase the Fire Department rudget by a sum of \$6,900 for the purpose of purchasing communication equipment and to increase the appropriation to the F.A.S.T. Squad to \$4,000, and increase the cemetery budget by \$1,590.

The above amendments were adopted. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

A motion to reimburse Jon Putnam for Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage was defeated.

ARTICLE 25. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or any other officers and to pass any vote relating thereof.

Glenn Tucker, Selectman, presented the following resolution:

PROPOSED DRAFT OF RESOLUTION FOR CANAAN TOWN MEETING:

Ee it resolved that the Town of Canaan support the plan for public transportation open to all who pay the fare, proposed by the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc.

Be it further resolved that such transportation does not need hydraulic lifts or ramps in order to serve the handicapped.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the resolution.

Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

Glenn Tucker made the motion to keep the same names for the weighers of hay and straw, measures of wood and bark, fence viewers and surveyors of lumber be the same as appointed in 1979.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this town meeting.

A person to the right of the moderator made the following suggestion:

"I would like to see if we could open the polls for the voters who have not voted, directly after the close of the meeting."

The moderator asked how many had not voted. He said that if there were no objections that the polls would be opened briefly after the close of the meeting.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

The business meeting adjourned at 11:20 P. M.

The ballots were counted.
