### **Good Evening:**

Tuesday, September 11th will undoubtedly be recorded as one of the saddest days in American History. Most of us here tonight have never experienced such a catastrophic loss of life and property at any one time in our lives. Your show of support in these trying times is most gratifying. You are to be congratulated for taking time tonight to join together on this somber occasion, as we extend our heartfelt sympathy to the people of New York City, Washington, DC, and all families who lost loved ones during this tragic series of events. We are also gathered here tonight in support of the many dedicated Americans engaged in the rescue and recovery operations.

I encourage each and every one of you to take a few moments this evening, and every day hereafter, to be thankful for family and friends who we sometimes take for granted. Life is indeed a precious commodity that can be taken from us at any time with little or no warning. Thousands of Americans left home on Tuesday morning unaware that they would never return. What made these events particularly unnerving was the national media coverage that took us live to the scenes as the loss of life and destruction of property occurred in wide screen color before our very eyes.

As we move through the weeks ahead, I hope everyone will contribute to the ongoing rescue and relief missions in whatever capacity they can. When the Red Cross asks for blood, please consider donating. If your local church or civic group is seeking donations, please contribute to the best of your ability.

Life as we knew it just a few short days ago will never be the same. As Americans, we must continue to stand tall, remain proud, and support our elected leaders as we work to return a sense of normalcy to our daily lives. We have always worked hard to be a peaceful nation, but we must respond to this great national tragedy. I sincerely hope our response will be measured, appropriate, and directed at only those responsible. Although this horrendous act of terrorism targeted a large cross section of our civilian as well as military population, to react without careful consideration and compassion would leave us no better than those who so violently attacked our great nation.

As a retired USAF Master Sergeant and Viet Nam veteran, I fully understand the cost of freedom, and the need to protect our country. Today I'm finding it extremely difficult to express my feelings during this time of national mourning. I can only hope that we as Americans will continue to come together for the common good of all citizens regardless of their national origin.

As you leave this service tonight, please continue to be thankful for the little things in life that can make a day great. May America forever be the land of the free, and the home of the brave!

### **SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL REPORT 2001**

It is with a great deal of pride we report to you, the citizens and taxpayers of the Town of Conway, that your community finances are carefully monitored and responsibly expended. Town Staff under the direction of Manager Earl Sires has completed another year of exemplary service. Many of our decisions are based on input from Staff, and we always find the information provided to be factual and well researched. A great deal of our success was a direct result of supporting and responsibly compensating our dedicated personnel.

### Highlights of 2001 include the following:

<u>Taxes</u> – Taxes continue to challenge us at every turn. We are committed to providing the best service possible at the most reasonably affordable cost.

<u>Enforcement</u> – During the past year enforcement was again a high visibility item. Not always our favorite task, we continued our tradition of trying to work things out, rather than moving every issue into the Courts where there are no <u>real</u> winners.

*Work Place | Senior Housing* – The past years progress on the housing situation as it currently exists was disappointing. Our positive support for affordable housing did not result in either project materializing due to funding considerations outside of our control.

<u>Library</u> – Another disappointment in <u>2001</u> was the ongoing debate with regard to SB2 Towns, and Warrant Article voting. Let's hope common sense prevails and the issue is resolved as soon as possible to allow the expansion to begin. We applaud the hard work and fund raising activities the Library Trustees have undertaken.

 $\underline{\it Employment}$  – An exciting opportunity currently exists to create a new facility to grow Small Business, and provide an educational environment where area residents can upgrade their employment skills  $\underline{\it to}$  increase their personal income. The Mount Washington Valley Economic Council needs your support to make this dream a reality. Much has been done; much remains to be accomplished as we move ahead with this ambitious project.

We could not possibly prosper or grow without the support of all the folks who serve you in a variety of capacities both compensated and uncompensated (volunteer). We are but one of several boards and commissions, which have worked extremely hard to make Conway a better community where both young and old can live and enjoy the many amenities offered. We will continue to be challenged with maintaining the Tax Rate, and providing the services the majority of our citizens want and need. I'm confident that as we all move forward in the cooperative spirit that we have come to enjoy, Conway will indeed be the Number One Small Town in the State of New Hampshire.

### **TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT**

Within the Town Report, each Department Head provides a summary of the accomplishments of his or her department during the year. I encourage you to review these departmental reports. I believe you will be impressed with the work that the Town staff has done during the year. This success is due in large part to the fact that the staff is held accountable for their progress or lack of progress during the year. Achievement is rewarded and lack of progress requires improvement. Accountability is established through a formal system of goal setting, reporting, and evaluation. All employees must demonstrate suitable progress on the goals set for them by their supervisor. This is true of entry-level employees, administrative staff, department heads, and the Town Manager as well.

Which brings me to an important question. How is the Town Manager evaluated and how does the community know if he or she is doing a good job? The Town Manager is hired by the Board of Selectmen under an employment contract and can be released by the Board of Selectmen. The Town Manager has certain responsibilities that are specified in State law and in a formal job description established by the Board. The job description fully outlines the Manager's responsibilities. Further, each year, the Board of Selectmen establishes a series of specific goals that the Town Manager is expected to achieve during the year. These goals include completing Town approved projects, various studies and projects as well as keeping the board briefed on specific issues of concern.

Currently, the Board of Selectmen evaluates the Manager's performance on an annual basis. The Town Manager is required to submit quarterly reports to the Selectmen. This creates ongoing and regular communication between the Board and the Manager.

In evaluating the Manager, the Board expects the Manager to fulfill the duties under state law, the Town job description and to accomplish the goals the Board has established. After an evaluation meeting with the Manager, the Board completes and votes on a written evaluation. In this way, the Manager knows if he/she is on course and the Selectmen can be satisfied knowing that progress is being made. If not, then corrective action can be taken by the Board.

The Quarterly Town Manager Reports are available at Town Hall and are posted on the Town Web page <a href="www.conwaynh.org">www.conwaynh.org</a>. The Town Manager's job description and state laws defining the role of the Town Manager are also posted on the web page.

In closing, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen for their support and leadership during the year. I would also like to thank all of our employees for their hard work and dedication to serving the community.

### Narrative: 2002 Recommended Operating Budget

### **Budget Overview**

This narrative provides an overview of the proposed budget and a summary of each departmental budget.

The Board of Selectmen, with a vote of four in favor and one opposed, adopted the proposed 2002 Operating Budget of \$7,640,778. It represents an increase of 6% over the previous year which is slightly less than the average increases for the last six years. Current projections indicate that this budget will require the tax rate to be set at approximately \$5.75. This compares favorably with the 2001 rate of \$5.70 and continues the six year trend of an essentially level Town tax rate (see Tables 1 and 2).

In March of 2001, the Board of Selectmen established goals for the year. This budget requests the funding required to meet those goals which included a review of employee compensation, a review of Town facility needs, continued support for on-going road improvement plans, and support for recreational programs and activities.

In the past, the Board of Selectmen has stressed efficiency and cost effective operations as the means to offset increasing Town responsibilities. While the Town has been successful in creating a more efficient and productive organization, increases in responsibilities that have impacted several departments can no longer be addressed in this manner. Consequently, this budget includes additional resources in both equipment and personnel to enable the Town to meet these demands.

As per State law, the Budget Committee reviewed the budget. The Budget Committee recommended a budget of \$7,182,233, which represents a 6% decrease in the budget as was recommended by the Selectmen.

The Board of Selectmen believes that the increases in staff and resources contained in this budget are consistent with and in fact, fulfill the wishes of the voters. Significant components of the budget include:

### Parks and Recreation Programs and Responsibilities

Over the past several years the voters have approved \$240,000 for the construction of new recreational facilities at Whitaker Woods. In addition, the voters have approved investments in tennis courts at Davis Park, the conversion of the old Pine Tree School into the Conway Recreation Center, improvements to Hussey Field, and the continued operation of the Conway Teen Center.

Based on continued voter support for recreational programs and projects, the Selectmen are recommending a Parks and Recreation Department Budget that includes funding needed to maintain current recreational programs and to support cooperation with other recreation providers in the community such as the North Conway Community Center. The budget specifically includes funding to support the continued operation of the Teen Center, a critically important youth program. The Teen Center provides a safe environment for middle school aged children and offers a variety of programs including recreational activities, leadership development, and community service projects. In 2002, the Teen Center will continue to be largely supported by grant funding.

Again, based on past voter support, the Parks and Recreation budget includes increased funding for the care and maintenance of new recreational facilities such as Whitaker Field and the Whitaker Meeting House. In addition, the Town has recently become responsible for maintaining Schouler Park and other recreational areas. The Board believes that the community wants safe and well maintained recreational facilities. Consequently, a new full time employee will be required to undertake these added responsibilities and to ensure that town parks are properly maintained. In addition, internal reorganization has transferred some responsibilities and expenses from Public Works to the Parks and Recreation Department. The additional costs to the Parks and Recreation Department are offset by decreases in the Public Works budget.

### **Public Works Projects and Equipment**

Within the Highway Department, there are increases related to the voter approved Capital Improvements Program. This is an ongoing program to repair and reconstruct Town roads. This year's project list (see Table 3) generates increased costs associated with the number of projects and the amount of materials required.

It is critical to note that during the last ten years <u>no</u> new employees have been added to the Public Works Department. On the other hand, added responsibilities have been assumed by the department. These include numerous subdivision roads, roadside mowing, and in the coming budget year, the North South Local Road will become a Town responsibility. Consequently, a new employee will be required toward the end of the year to handle these added duties. The Capital Reserve Fund must also be increased to fund lease payments on a plow truck required by the completion of the North South Local Road and other service demands.

Finally, the Solid Waste Department must fund the replacement of a compactor at the landfill. This equipment is used to compact and efficiently manage the placement of refuse into the landfill, thus maximizing the life of the landfill.

### **Employee Compensation**

The Board of Selectmen believes that it is critical that the Town be able to continue to retain and attract a productive and high quality staff. To this end, in 2001, the Board of Selectmen tasked the Town Manager with conducting a compensation study.

This study compared Town employee compensation with data from other New Hampshire towns and was consistent with methods that have been used by the Town over the past several years. The study included both salaries and benefits.

With respect to wages, the study determined that: 1) compared to other towns in New Hampshire, our Town employee salaries were slightly less than average 2) when compared to private sector wages for like positions, Town salaries were also somewhat lower than average. Nevertheless, the Board has chosen not to make changes in the Town salary plan.

It was found that Town employee benefits were similar to other communities, with one major exception: All Towns provide a significantly higher level of medical insurance coverage than that provided to our employees.

As a result, the Board of Selectmen is recommending an increase in the Town contribution to employee health insurance. Even with this increase, the level of coverage offered to Town employees will still rank near the bottom when compared to other towns. It will, however, be consistent with the level of coverage offered to other governmental employees within the Town of Conway. The cost of this increase including non-union and union employees will be approximately \$30,000.

As with many other organizations, the Town has experienced dramatic increases in health care costs over the last two years. The increase for 2002 will be 27.5%. This will have a significant impact on the budget and is more fully explained under the Employee Benefits budget line.

### **Budget Process**

The proposed budget was developed in conjunction with the Town Manager and staff. The Board of Selectmen firmly believes that the 7.6 million dollar budget that we have recommended meets the needs of the Town and reflects the true cost of efficiently and effectively providing the services and programs that the community desires.

### **Budget Summary**

### Executive

The Executive Budget increases by 10.6% due largely to increased employee costs. These are primarily due to the merit program. Minor increases are also found in the cost of tax lien line, New Hampshire Municipal Association dues, North Country Council and the cost to produce the Town Report.

### **Election and Registration**

The proposed budget increases by just 2% and reflects the need to fund three elections.

### **Financial Administration**

The finance budget increase of 5.7% is a result of increases in staff costs and a minor increase in the cost of the annual audit.

### Assessor

This budget increases by approximately 4%. This is largely due to increased staff costs. The amount budgeted for mapping decreases by \$1,000.

### **Legal Expenses**

The amount budgeted for legal expenses is unchanged from last year. The budgeted amount of \$50,000 reflects actual experience for 2001 and anticipates a continued emphasis on code enforcement.

### **Employee Benefits**

The proposed increase of approximately 22% is a result of two factors. First, the premium amount for health insurance increases by 27.5% effective January 1, 2002. Secondly, based on the results of the Compensation Study conducted this year, an increase in the employer share of the premium is included. In the past, the Town funded an amount based on 75% of the Point of Service premium. This budget proposes an increase to 80%.

Increases in premium amounts for administrative departments, the Highway Department and the Service Garage are included in this line. It should be noted however, that because union employees negotiate their compensation through the collective bargaining process any increases in their compensation must be approved by separate article at Town Meeting. Consequently, this budget does not include any change in the employer contribution to health insurance for union employees.

### Planning and Zoning

An increase of just 1.5% is a result of the fact that merit increases for the two employees in this department are offset by other reductions. These include a decrease in funding for an intern to assist with the Master Plan.

### **Government Buildings**

This budget increases by 8.6%. Much of this is due to relatively minor but consistent increases in operating items such as utilities, office equipment, and required water system testing. Increases have been made in both the Police Station and Town Hall Repair and Maintenance lines to cover deferred maintenance items. In addition, a new building, the Whitaker Meeting House, has been added to the inventory with new maintenance costs of \$2,400.

### Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

### Insurance

This budget increases slightly due to a minor increase in vehicle insurance.

### Police Department

The Police Department Budget increases by 3.8% or \$67,101. This increase is due exclusively to increases in labor costs. These include \$42,000 in merit pay increases and an increase of over \$15,000 in union medical insurance. In addition, the commercial duty line increases by \$10,000. This is due to the increased level of demand for these services caused by planned State road construction. These funds are reimbursed to the Town. All other components of the Police Budget show no significant increase and no new employees have been included in the proposed budget.

### **Ambulances**

This budget does not increase and includes the actual cost of contracted services.

### Fire and Rescue

This budget increases by 2.5% based on an increase in the actual cost of contracted services to non-precinct areas of the Town.

### Inspections

This budget increases by 8% due to potential salary increases for the Building Inspector. These increases are awarded if the employee achieves additional professional certifications thereby increasing departmental effectiveness.

### Highway

An increase of 4.6% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This increase is largely a result of increased asphalt quantities needed for capital projects programmed for this year in the Capital Improvements Plan. In addition, the cost of highway salt has increased significantly. Minor increases in operating costs are included as are increased employee costs associated with the established compensation plan.

### Solid Waste

The Solid Waste budget will increase by 5.3%. Increases in wages and operating costs are offset by a reduction in leachate disposal costs.

### Health

This budget does not change.

### Welfare

This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget does not increase and is based on projected experience for 2002.

### Parks and Recreation

An increase of 40% is proposed for the Parks and Recreation Department. This increase reflects the Board of Selectmen's policy to continue to support recreational programs and facilities. The increases are largely due to the addition of staff. These include one full time Parks Attendant and a number of seasonal and part-time employees. These are more fully described in the Recreation Budget Detail.

In general, the increases can be attributed to the following:

Programs – The Recreation Department intends to offer a broad range
of programs at the Whitaker Woods site. These include winter activities such as cross country skiing as well as a variety of summer youth
programs and activities. The latter will be conducted jointly with the
North Conway Community Center. Athletic leagues and programs are
planned throughout the spring, summer, and fall.

- Teen Center This critically important youth program was started several years ago with significant financial support from federal grant programs. This year the program will be funded through an expected \$21,000 in grant funding combined with taxpayer support.
- Facilities Maintenance During the recent past, the Town has assumed
  additional responsibilities and new facilities have been constructed.
  Foremost among these are Whitaker Meeting House and Whitaker
  Field. Caring for these facilities and fields requires the addition of a
  new position. The Recreation Attendant will be responsible for maintaining and preparing fields and recreational facilities during the summer. In the winter this position will oversee activities at Whitaker
  Woods and will be responsible for maintenance tasks associated with
  other activities such as the skating rink.

It should be noted that approximately \$15,000 of the increased employee costs within this department reflects the transfer of an existing position from Public Works to the Parks and Recreation Department. In the past, field maintenance was the responsibility of the Public Works Department. For efficiency, these responsibilities have been transferred to Parks and Recreation. Consequently these costs are carried in this budget rather than in the Public Works Department Budget.

### Library

The recommended budget increases by less that 1%. Increases in employee compensation and equipment maintenance are offset by a decrease in the amount budgeted to fund costs associated with the library expansion project. The equipment maintenance line increases to fund additional computer support.

### **Patriotic Purposes**

No change in this budget is proposed.

### **Conservation Commission**

The Conservation Commission has requested a budget increase of 8% to fund a variety of conservation projects within the Town.

### **Debt Principal**

This budget increases by just over 2% reflecting actual changes in principal payments for a variety of projects.

### **Debt Interest**

Actual changes in interest payment amounts reduce this budget by 9.6%.

### Interest on TANS

This budget is unchanged and is based on projected costs of interest payments on Tax Anticipation Notes.

### Capital Reserve Funds

The Capital Reserve budget increases by just under 10%. This is due to the following:

- o Capital Reserve Highway Equipment This line increases by \$25,000 to fund the lease of a plow truck. A new truck is necessary because the Town will assume maintenance of the North/South Local Road in 2002.
- o Capital Reserve Solid Waste Equipment This line increases by \$35,000 to fund the lease of a compactor at the landfill. This equipment was acquired in 2001 to replace existing equipment that was lost in a fire.
- Capital Reserve Infrastructure This line increases by \$13,000 to fund projects that are scheduled for the year under the Capital Improvements Plan.

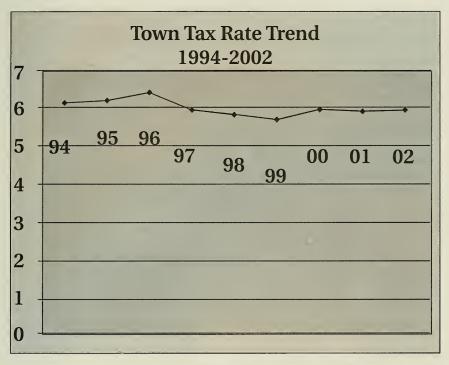

ARTICLE 4: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-14 (Floodplain Conservation District) by referencing the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) and Flood Insurance Study (FIS), coordinating zone references to the new maps, and by adding the following to Section B: "In cases where the floodplain boundary is disputed, a plan prepared and certified by a surveyor licensed by the State of New Hampshire, that clearly represents the floodplain boundary may supercede the boundary represented on the FHAM." Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 5: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-17 (Setbacks) by stating that wetland setbacks in all districts shall be in accordance with Article 147-11.1 (Shoreline Protection District) and 147-13 (Wetland Conservation District), and by replacing Section E of Article 147-17 with a new section which addresses zero lot line subdivisions within planned unit developments and similar cluster developments. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 6: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-17.1 (Frontage Requirements), by adding the following sentence to Section A: "To qualify as

frontage the lot must have access rights to the subject highway or road." Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 7: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Section B (1) (g) of Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-19 (Signs), to clarify that a permit is not required for a window sign which is affixed to the interior of a window and does not cover more than 50% of the window. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 8: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-31 (Wetland and Watershed Protection District Boundaries), by redefining portions of the Wetland and Watershed Protection District, striking Sections B and C, and adding a new Section B which allows any question as to the accuracy of the Wetlands Composite Map to be resolved with a plan certified by a wetland or soil scientist licensed by the State of New Hampshire. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 9: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Building Construction Ordinance Chapter 88 of the Town Ordinance which rewrites much of the Ordinance to conform with the current practices and procedures of the Town and explicitly excepts single and duplex residential family dwellings from the applicability of the Town adopted BOCA National Building Code and deletes the Conway Building Construction, Non-Residential and Multi-Family Ordinance Chapter 89 of the Town Ordinance which is now substantively incorporated into said Chapter 88. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 10: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-11 by creating a new Special Exception for Business Development Parks in the Residential/Agricultural District of the Town Zoning Ordinance. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-1).

ARTICLE 11: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 10 as petitioned by Bradford Morrill and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-26 (Highway Commercial District) by adding a definition for a proposed new "Center Conway Area" in the Highway Commercial District. Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board (0-6-0).

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant Article for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Seven Million Six Hundred Forty Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars (\$7,640,778). Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Seven Million Three Hundred Sixty Four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventeen Dollars (\$7,364,717) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). The Budget Committee by vote of 7-6-1 recommends a total operating budget of Seven

Million One Hundred Eighty Two Thousand Three Hundred Thirty One Dollars (\$7,182,331).

ARTICLE 13: (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost of items of a one-year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CAL-ENDAR YEAR 2002 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for an increase in benefits of Eight Thousand Two Hundred and Thirteen Dollars (\$8,213.00) to fund an increase in the town contribution to the employee health insurance premium. And further, to raise and appropriate Eight Thousand Two Hundred and Thirteen Dollars (\$8,213.00) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. One new plow driver position has been added in the 2002 operating budget. This is the first increase in staffing in ten years and is needed to meet increased demands for service such as the North South Local Road. Note: The amount appropriated by this article is in addition to the total estimated contract cost for 2002 of Six Hundred Forty Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$647,780) which is included in Warrant Article # 12 (Operating Budget). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-9-2).

ARTICLE 14: (Separate) To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in the MULTI-YEAR (2002-2004) COLLECTIVE BARGAIN-ING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Three Hundred and Sixteen Dollars (\$12,316) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Note: The amount appropriated by this article is in addition to the total estimated contract cost for 2002 of Nine Hundred Fifty One Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Six Dollars (\$951,526) which is included in Warrant Article #12 (Operating Budget). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-8-1).

ARTICLE 15: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Three Thousand Dollars (\$33,000) to fund a FULL TIME TRAFFIC CONTROL OFFICER IN THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-12-1).

ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) to be used to partially fund the construction of projects per the WHITAKER PROPERTIES MASTER PLAN (the "plan"). This money, together with unexpended plan funds appropriated at the last annual Town Meeting will be used for, but not limited to the construction of dugouts and the purchase of bleachers and portable outfield fencing. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the plan is completed or in five years,

whichever first occurs. Any unexpended funds shall be carried over to the year 2003 to be used to offset the cost of the fourth year of the plan. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-3-2).

ARTICLE 17: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Ninety Three Thousand Dollars (\$93,000) for the purpose of making IMPROVEMENTS TO TOWN HALL. Said improvements shall include but not be limited to the replacement of fuel lines and heating system boiler, the installation of a fire protection system, the replacement of existing windows with energy efficient windows, the installation of a central heating and air conditioning system on the first floor, and other minor renovations that will improve public and employee safety. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the improvements are completed, or in two years, whichever first occurs. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-5-1).

ARTICLE 18: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Twenty One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$21,500) for the purpose of IMPROVEMENTS TO PUBLIC WORKS FACILITIES. These upgrades shall include but not be limited to replacing the Public Works Vehicle Garage furnaces, upgrading the Service Department underground fuel tanks and replacing the Service Department Heating Tank. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the improvements are completed, or in two years, whichever first occurs. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-3).

ARTICLE 19: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$43,500) to purchase DIGITAL COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-2-0).

ARTICLE 20: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand One Hundred and Two Dollars (\$14,102) for a FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT LOCAL BLOCK GRANT. Of the total amount, Fourteen Hundred Ten Dollars and Twenty Cents (\$1,410.20) shall be raised by taxes as the Town's grant match and the balance of Twelve Thousand Six Hundred and Ninety One Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$12,691.80) shall be received as revenue for the grant. The funds shall be used to purchase cameras and other equipment for the police department. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-1-1).

ARTICLE 21: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-5-0). Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (0-11-1).

ARTICLE 24: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Two Dollars (\$29,682) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-1).

ARTICLE 25: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-1).

ARTICLE 26: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) for the VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-2).

ARTICLE 27: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the support of THE MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND VISITOR'S BUREAU for assistance in operating its services to tourists and other visitors. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-1).

ARTICLE 28: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for the support of the EASTERN SLOPE AIRPORT AUTHORITY. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-1).

ARTICLE 29: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Five Dollars (\$3,765.00) for the FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM OF THE CENTER OF HOPE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-6-1).

ARTICLE 30: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$6,800) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-1).

ARTICLE 31: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$6,950) to help defray the costs of Service Delivery of the MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen

(5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-2).

ARTICLE 32: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$2,600) in support of STARTING POINT providing crisis services to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-3-3).

ARTICLE 33: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the CONWAY VILLAGE AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. The allocated funds will be spent to help operate and maintain the Conway Village Area Chamber Information Booth. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-6-2).

ARTICLE 34: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to assist the MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY ENRICHMENT PROGRAM D.B.A. THE AFTER SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM to continue provide programming at an affordable rate. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-3-I). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-10-1).

ARTICLE 35: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town of Conway will raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Thirty One Dollars (\$11,431) to assist CARROLL COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (6-6-1).

ARTICLE 36: (Special – not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-2-3).

ARTICLE 47: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the authorization given to the Board of Selectmen on March 25, 1995, to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other government unit or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year. Submitted by petition.

ARTICLE 48: To see if the Town is in favor of delaying the widening to five lanes from Burger King to Barnes Road designated as 5A of the Bypass Plans until after the full bypass has been completed and only then if traffic analysis proves it's necessary and to instruct the Board of Selectmen of Conway New Hampshire to forward these results to the New Hampshire Department of

Transportation, Army Corps of Engineers, the Federal Highways Administration, and the Environmental Protection Agency, and to Senator Smith, Senator Gregg, and Congressmen Sununu. Submitted by petition.

ARTICLE 49: To see if the Town will vote to apply the funds currently held in a Capital Reserve Fund earmarked for a Community Swim Facility to the cost of the Whitaker Properties Master Plan Article which will appear on the 2002 Town Warrant. Any balance left in the Capital Reserve Fund is to be returned to the Town as revenue to reduce the property tax rate. In the event the Whitaker Properties Master Plan Article is not approved by the voters, then the entire amount now held in the Capital Reserve Fund earmarked for a Community Swim Facility is to be returned to the Town as revenue to reduce the property tax rate. Submitted by petition.

**ARTICLE 50:** To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Town's financial condition remained stable throughout the year and it was unnecessary to borrow in anticipation of tax collections. Declining market rates, as a result of the reduction in the Prime Rate as set by the Federal Reserve Bank, have limited the investment income that the town has been able to receive this year, which in the past has produced revenue for the town. The General Fund balance remains at a healthy level as suggested by the State of New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration and offers assurances to the Selectmen and the townspeople. The selectmen will seek to shift a reasonable amount of the fund balance to the 2002 budget to offset the impact of real estate taxes.

The flow of tax revenues to the state has decelerated primarily because the economy suffered a severe shock since September, even though signs of weakness were apparent before then. Long term economic, technological and political developments are also partially responsible and will continue to constrain state revenue growth. Demand for state roads and bridges, prisons, higher education and environmental protection has intensified. Now that the federal government is occupied with combating terrorism, the state may have to shoulder more responsibility for these local governmental functions.

Changes to the state's property tax system has caused considerable uncertainty to local governments. With the state relying heavily on alcoholic beverages, tobacco products and motor vehicle fuel taxes for selective revenues and as Americans continue to cut back on these types of expenditures, the state will seek to generate alternative revenue sources to increase reliance on other selective taxes.

As we have seen this year with the budget committee meetings, the property tax remains the backbone of our local revenue system, forces eroding its long term ability to generate sufficient revenues continue to worry local officials.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 2000 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Conway has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway as of December 31, 2000, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated February 28, 2001 on our consideration of the Town of Conway's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway. The accompanying Single Audit related schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and are not a required part of the general purpose financial

statements. All such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

We have audited the financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 2000, and have issued our report thereon which was qualified as indicated therein dated February 28, 2001. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

## Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Town of Conway's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants; noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

# Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Town of Conway's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

### ASSESSOR'S REPORT

One advantage of being in the "North Country", at least from an Assessing standpoint is that we are sometimes fortunate to be able to see trends coming our way and plan accordingly.

For the past five years I have been tracking an explosive appreciation trend in real estate values, as it made its way north from Boston. At times it felt like I was standing on the beach watching a tidal wave approach in slow motion. When the wave finally hit us, real property values jumped about 20%.

At the same time, there were signs that the energy behind the wave was beginning to falter. The stock market declined significantly, layoffs, and unemployment increased around the country, and the events of September 11th wreaked havoc in the travel industry.

For these reasons, I viewed the appreciation as a possible "bubble" that may or may not last. Accordingly, a decision was made not to adjust assessed values in 2001. There was a possibility that, if we were to increase assessments some 20%, we might be faced with having to lower them again the following year if the bubble burst. I was looking to avoid assessment "whiplash" and spare the taxpayers the experience of seeing their assessments pop up one year and jerk back the next. This decision has yet to prove out, as the valley economy has remained strong since September 11.

If we haven't been busy adjusting assessments then, what have we been doing? Well, as a result of the various school funding lawsuits and statewide property tax lawsuits, assessing practices around the state have come under scrutiny. Some community's (not Conway) assessment methods have been found lacking.

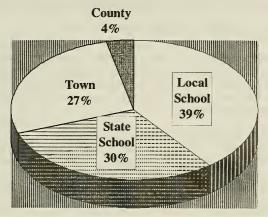
As a result, several laws have passed establishing new assessing requirements for all cities and towns. From now on, New Hampshire communities must meet certain minimum assessment standards and show that it is assessing at market value. A schedule has been issued that places every town on a five-year cycle. Conway's first year of certification is to be in 2004.

Since last spring, and for the next two years, our efforts will be focused on insuring that Conway can meet these new standards. There are bound to be some added expenses involved but we hope to minimize them by conducting a data quality study that will help us determine where to target our resources. This study will be ongoing and will mean increased inspection requests by assessing staff. We are asking your cooperation. By making a concerted effort now, we can avoid a costly state mandated revaluation.

Finally, I am proud to report that I was appointed by Governor Shaheen to a charter seat on the state's Assessing Standards Board. This board is tasked by the legislature to develop statewide standards for assessing property. I am the only assessor from the North Country and I hold the seat representing all towns in New Hampshire with populations over 5,000 people. I feel fortunate to be able to represent Conway's interests in this important undertaking.

### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

### Veteran Service Exemption: RSA 72:28-36

Amount = \$100 Regular Veteran, \$1,400 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

### Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption: RSA 72:43-h

Must be resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1 of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly, if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.

Net income of \$14,000 or, if married, \$21,000.

Have assets of \$50,000 or less, excluding the value of residence.

Amount of exemption:

65 to 75 years of age, 75 to 80 years of age, 80 years or older, \$50,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

### Physically Handicapped: RSA 72:37-a

"Physically handicapped person" means a person who by reason of physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him to propel himself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

### **Blind Exemption: RSA 72:37**

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department.

Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his or her residential real estate equalized.

### BUILDING INSPECTOR/ CODE ENFORCEMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2001

Within the year 2001, a trend for residential construction continued to grow. From 1996 to 1998 the average number of new single-family dwellings constructed within the Town of Conway came in at twenty three (23) per year, while from 1999 and 2000 the average was forty one (41) per year. Now at the close of 2001 the total for this year is sixty five (65). This is an increase of 182% based on the average of 1996 through 1998.

With residential construction on the increase, the commercial permits have started to dwindle in numbers as well as the size of the projects. Hopefully spring will bring renewed prosperity in this commercial construction area.

In the building inspection department, there were 461 building permits issued in 2001. This number reflects both residential and commercial permits. This amounts to an estimated evaluation of the completed work to over \$15.6 million dollars. The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits were in excess of \$23,000.00. These figures are down significantly from last year's totals of \$17.5 million completed work in 2000 and \$46,500.00 received in fees for the permits issued in 2000. This demonstrates the impact of the reduction in commercial permits.

I have enjoyed the position of Building Inspector for the Town of Conway and look to my position as working for the people of the Town, enforcing the ordinances adopted by you the people and helping in any way I can to assist all to meet the requirements that pertain to each individual situation.

We look back at a year that will never be forgotten; a year that ended with sorrow and reward, a year that made the nation take a hard look at how things were and how they should be, a year that brought this nation closer.

I thank you for the opportunity to serve in the capacity I have for the past two years and acknowledge that I have enjoyed the contacts and the challenges I have encountered.

Hopefully we can improve the interest level.

The majority of initial contacts this year were resolved with no further action. Only a few have resulted in requiring legal proceedings. I have been pleased with the support of our residents, staff, local and state agencies. It makes my job a real pleasure.

### GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 2001

The General Assistance Department has survived another year of emergency situations without overspending the proposed and allocated budget of \$36,000. In fact, we spent \$2,511.12 less than last year, leaving us with total expenditures of \$28,477.11. (Not bad compared to \$50,237.63 spent in 1998!)

Housing expenditures continue to inflate as the statewide housing crisis worsens. We are seeing more homelessness in the valley, yet as the statistics grow, fewer solutions are available. This year, 73% of total expenditures were used to prevent eviction and/or alleviate homelessness whereas last year only 55% of total expenditures were allocated for housing purposes. These figures show that the lack of affordable housing is expensive and deserves serious consideration.

It should be noted that heat expenses went down by approximately 51% and utility expenses went down by 25%. We served nearly twice as much food and essential non-food products and received \$1,550.00 in cash donations for the food pantry. Product donations were abundant and make all the difference in our expenditures. A special thank you to each and every one of you. I cannot name you all individually, but wish to express our gratitude.

### PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The first year of the new millennium was encouraging and productive. The voters of Conway provided funding for a consultant to assist the Planning Board with preparing a revised master plan. The Town has contracted RKG Associates, Inc. and the planning process has commenced with most of the work to be completed in the next year.

We continued enhancing the Town's growth management functions by clarifying and amending the development control ordinances. Some of the issues that have been, or are being addressed include:

- Chapter 88 and 89 regarding: conflicts with other ordinances, building permits, and BOCA building codes.
- Chapter 123 (Site Plan Regulations) regarding: storage trailers, street trees, bonding (adopted), and public notices (adopted).
- Chapter 131 (Subdivision Regulations) regarding: definitions (adopted), application submissions (adopted), public notices (adopted), and lighting standards.
- Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) regarding: definitions, service stations in the village commercial district, the Floodplain Conservation District, setbacks in planned unit developments, signage, and the Wetland and Watershed Protection District.

Although there is still much to do, the system is showing a substantial improvement over what I found when I arrived in December of 1999. The Planning Board and staff are now functioning as a team with support from the Board of Selectmen.

2002 will be a very important year for the future of this community. You and I both have a lot to do. With RGK assisting with the Master Plan, I will be able to dedicate more time to preparing revisions to the subdivision and site plan regulations, as well as a review of our application and permit fee schedule. Still, I will be very busy with my involvement in the master planning process and preparation of its recreation component.

You too have a lot to do. Your task is to get involved in the planning process. Public participation and input is extremely important to the success of this enterprise. ### PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR/TOWN ENGINEER ANNUAL REPORT 2001

Last year I began this report with the following paragraph:

I can't help but wonder how many people read this annual review. So, if you feel inclined to satisfy my curiosity, please send me an E-mail, carrier pigeon or what have you.

Well the total number of responses to the above paragraph from last year's annual report was three (3), two phone calls, one response in person and no carrier pigeons. Be that as it may, I am pleased to present the following report.

At the end of the year the selectmen proposed changes to the Town's solid waste rules. Of the changes the most significant deals with the way the solid waste budget is funded. Currently all the expenses are funded through taxes. The selectmen's proposal moves funding to a user fee and away from the property value based taxation. The solid waste portion of the budget accounts for twenty percent of the municipal budget or 1.42 million dollars. This breaks down as follows: debt = .53 million, operating = .5 million and capital reserve = .39 million. So the operating and capital reserve portions total .89 million. The income from solid waste was .39 million this past year or just enough to cover the capital reserve expenses. The selectmen's proposed changes will generate an additional .5 million dollars which will cover the cost of the operating portion of the solid waste budget. The debt service portion will remain in the taxes.

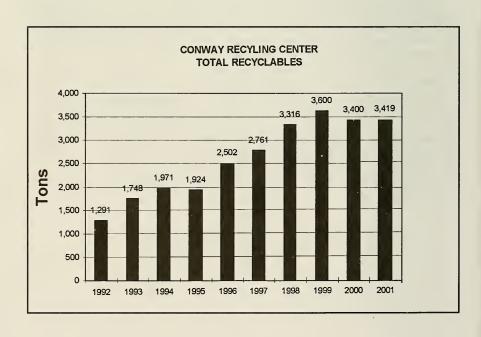
Trash placed in the landfill increased 5% this year to 10,500 tons (see graph on opposite page). Unfortunately the recycling did not increase resulting in a decrease in the recycling percentage. The amount of material recycled this year was twenty five percent of our waste stream. This number is misleading because commercial haulers market their recyclables direct but bring us the trash. If we look at just the waste that is dropped off by residents, the recyclables account for 28 percent. This is still off the target of 40 percent.

The following is a list of projects completed by the Public Works Department this year. The reconstruction of Odell Hill Road, River Road and half of Stark Road. The remainder of Stark is scheduled for this coming summer. The new ball field at Whitaker Woods, which included lighting and irrigation. The stabilization of the river embankment at Hussey Field. The installation of a water treatment facility for the Town system in Center Conway.

I hope to see you at this year's Town Meeting. Thank you for the opportunity to provide this report.

### RECREATION DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 2001

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building in Center Conway. The Conway Community Building includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, computer lab, library/study room and an art room. The facility also features a multi-purpose field used for softball, baseball, flag football, soccer, field hockey and a basketball court.

The Town of Conway offers many other outdoor parks and recreation areas for community uses. Our newest park and facility The Whitaker Homesite offers a new multi-purpose ball field with lights as well as a building used for seasonal programs and as a Nordic center. Other Town parks such as Conway Lake Beach, Davis Park, Hussey Park, Schouler Park, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Park and Conway Skating Rink offer activities like tennis, swimming lessons, biking, hiking, canoeing, basketball, skating, playgrounds and multi-purpose fields.

The Recreation Department is responsible for all the sports programs for elementary age students with the exception of Cal Ripken baseball. Boys and girls ages 5-13 participate in T-Ball, softball, summer playground, swim lessons, field hockey, flag football, bowling, soccer, intramural basketball, fun & games, Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween Party, turkey trot race and many special trips.

The Teen Center is approaching its five year anniversary and with that comes many challenges ahead. Funding has come from Project Succeed, Plus Time of NH, New Hampshire Bureau of Substance Abuse Services and local businesses. With some funding coming to an end in 2002, we are continuing to apply and explore new ways to provide teen programs at a minimal cost to the taxpayer. In 2001 we serviced over 250 different teens ages 12-14. Our goal is to provide a safe and healthy environment with many diverse options for teens to choose from.

The Friends of Conway Recreation Department, a volunteer non-profit organization, held many fundraisers and provided scholarships in 2001. Over the past four years the Friends of Conway Recreation Inc. has donated more than \$13,000 towards sports equipment, scholarships and the Teen Center. This organization is committed to assisting the Conway Recreation Department in its effort to provide the best quality recreation for the children of Conway.

Finally, the Conway Recreation Department would like to extend a thank you to all the volunteers throughout the year that make our programs a success. Over 65 adults coached in our youth sports program dedicating at least two days per week for more than nine weeks. Another 35 adults volunteered for some of the many special functions that are not sports related throughout the year in addition to the 65 volunteer coaches. Flag Football, girls & boys basketball, soccer and softball saw participation at its all time high.

The Conway Recreation Department would also like to thank every business, civic group and citizen who donated service, money and time to our programs.

I have enjoyed serving the citizens of Conway as your Recreation Director and look forward to seeing you in one of our many programs in 2002.

### 2001 REPORT OF THE POLICE COMMISSION

The year of 2001 is a year that there was a major change in your Police Department. That major change was the retirement of David G. Bennett after thirty-six years of service to the Town of Conway. He is greatly missed around the Department and he took a wealth of tradition with him.

In his place, your Commission chose to promote from within and appointed Detective Sergeant Jeffery L. Dicey as the new Lieutenant. Lieutenant Dicey is proving to be very capable in his new position.

The tragedy of September 11th affected the total Law Enforcement and Fire/Rescue community with how to handle possible terrorist problems. Your Department has stepped up to the plate and increased training in policies and procedures to handle anything that might come along.

Your Police Commission has presented a special article to create a position of a Traffic Control Supervisor to help your Department do an even better job with traffic control. In the past, we have not been able to devote the amount of time necessary to hire adequate personnel to do Traffic Control. We feel that it requires a person who can focus on the task and be able to visit schools and solicit more people. Not to bore you with statistics, but the traffic counter on the Strip is the third busiest in the State.

This Traffic Control Supervisor will be a sworn Police Officer in order to have him/her be able to fill in shifts when not busy and during the off-season. Another duty may be for this person to work with Town and State Engineers to establish a Traffic Flow Program through the use of signs. These signs would aid through traffic to alternative routes, alleviating some of the congestion on the Strip. There are several other duties in the job description that will allow more daily matters to be accomplished.

Your Department also has a physical fitness program in place for all of the personnel in the Department. This goes along with what the NH Police Standards and Training Council is implementing.

For another year, you can be proud of your Police Department as it is looked upon as one of the top Police Departments in the state of New Hampshire.

In February of 2001, Lieutenant David G. Bennett retired after thirty-six years of service to the Town of Conway. Mr. Bennett served in many capacities during his tenure with the Conway Police Department but is best known for his many years as Lieutenant. Mr. Bennett, as he now prefers to be known, is greatly missed and took a part of the Conway Police Department with him when he left. We wish him the absolute best in his retirement.

On September 11, 2001, the world experienced a tragic event that affected every individual and even more so for those of us connected to Law Enforcement and Fire/Rescue services. Another affront in the wake of this tragedy has generated an increase in security in Conway as to how the community is to handle suspected anthrax cases, as well as increased training to Officers on the policies and procedures for handling these. Our thoughts and prayers remain with everyone who has been affected by these horrific events.

On September 22, 2001, the Department hosted a very successful Open House focusing on safety issues. The Police Department was open for the public to come in and see the station itself as well as meet the employees. Also set up in and around the station were professionals representing the Town of Conway, Memorial Hospital, NH Fish and Game, Starting Point, Wh. Mtn. Health Center, NH State Police, Conway Recreational Center, Carroll County Victim/Witness Advocate, Conway Public Library and North Conway Ambulance all with information and product giveaways. Redstone Fire addressed home safety issues, Center Conway Fire showed fire extinguishers, NC Fire/Rescue displayed techniques used with the Jaws of Life, Conway Village Fire/Rescue had their new ladder truck on display and East Conway Fire showed equipment specific to forest fires. The Police Department had displays and information available on the Dive Team, Bike Patrol Team, Project Good Morning, NH Police Cadet Academy, D.A.R.E., Firearms Safety, 9-1-1 and Animal Control. Two child safety specific areas were greatly received and they were the Identification Cards and the Safety Seat Check Point. Adding the final touches were donations from Shop N Save, McDonalds and Ben and Jerry's Ice Cream. A wonderful effort by all involved made it the success it was.

Our Patrol Division has been down two positions, which we have been diligently attempting to fill. We found ourselves subject to a small pool of applicants, which is a problem that affected many businesses during 2001. Our goal is to be back to full staff by early 2002.

This year, a Special Article for the completion of the digital/analog radio change over has been presented. Thus far, with Federal and State grants, approximately \$53,958.00 (55%) will have been expended. This project should be completed this year.

I am very proud to be leading a staff of individuals dedicated to serving the Town of Conway.

### CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT, 2001

This past year, an especially exciting year for Library Trustees and patrons, the Conway Public Library celebrated its 100 year anniversary. In those 100 years the Library has played an integral role in lives of Conway citizens.

In March of last year, the Conway voters supported the passage of a bond for the renovation and expansion of the Conway Public Library. Because of a question on the wording of the article, a special election was held in September, which resulted in 73% of the voters supporting the library expansion article. Shortly after that special meeting, it was announced that the Conway Library project would be delayed pending the outcome of a Federal Court case.

The Trustees and the Building Committee have continued to work on the exciting plans for the renovation and expansion project. Our hope is that the Federal case will be settled this spring and that we will soon be moving forward with the project. All Conway citizens will be extremely proud of the final product.

The need for the expansion project was clearly evident as all statistical indicators continued to increase. During the past year, 41,181 people visited the library, an increase of over 12% from the year before. There were 69,275 items checked out which included adult and children fiction and non-fiction, videos, audio books and music CDs. There was an increase of close to 14% in reference questions; the Internet usage was up over 21% from last year.

Although space is very limited, the library continued to sponsor a variety of programs. Last year there were 84 adult programs, 121 storytimes, and 11 special programs for children. The children's summer reading program "Octopi Your Mind-Read" had 208 participants reading 5086 books!

Thanks to the hard work of the Friends of the Library and library staff, the Centennial Celebration was a resounding success. On a lovely Saturday in early June more than 500 people attended a party on the library lawn. The Boy Scouts helped serve hot dogs and cake, as a myriad of activities took place for all ages. Later that week, attendees at the more formal celebration at the Red Jacket Motor Inn heard Mr. Charles Stanhope, Assistant to the Chief of Staff at the Library of Congress, speak about the many roles of libraries. The Selectmen wrote a proclamation making the week of June 9th, Conway Library Week, in recognition of the 100 year anniversary. In September, the Trustees were honorary grand marshals of the Mud Bowl Parade in recognition of the centennial.

Along with all the support the Friends of the Library gave the library in the past year, there was a core group of 15 volunteers who helped on a regular basis. This year they contributed more than 811 hours, up from last year's 561. Thanks to Barbara Hoyt the library's flower gardens continue to look great

The Henney History Room is a resource that is utilized by many citizens. In 2001, David Emerson, the History Room Librarian, helped 648 researchers. Thanks to the dedication of volunteers, the Conway cemetery inventory continues. Twenty-nine cemeteries have been completed and uploaded to the Internet. Henney Room volunteer Marilyn Oberg is working on a genealogy of early Conway settlers to five generations.

"Libraries are works in progress, never static, never idle;" and that is certainly true of the Conway Public Library. We are hoping to embark soon on a new and exciting chapter in the story of the Conway Public Library when we break

ground on the addition. The fundraising committee co-chaired by Tom Deans and Betty Newton assisted by Linda Fox-Phillips, has provided great leadership in our fundraising efforts. We are grateful for all gifts, small or large, that have put us in a position to meet our fundraising goals for the expansion and renovation project.

A library card entitles a person to an almost unlimited wealth of informational resources, and countless books for reading pleasure. With online services, CD-ROMS, and the Internet, not to mention videos, recordings, and audio books, libraries obviously are more than just books. The heart of the Conway Public Library has been and will continue to be the outstanding staff. Margaret Marchsner and her dedicated staff are always there to meet the need of the patrons. As the library has helped Conway citizens prepare for the intellectual pursuits of the 20th century, it will also provide the wide spectrum of Library services required for the 21st century.

### BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2001

2001 has seen some changes for the Board of Adjustment. Most notably was the change in the criteria in reviewing a request for a Variance. Due to a ruling by the Supreme Court of New Hampshire there has been a change in the way that hardship is considered for the granting of a Variance. After the ruling by the court, hardship may now take into consideration changes in the surrounding area of a property rather than basing our decision solely on the property under consideration. With this change in the criteria nearly half of the cases that we heard were Variances. The Board heard 15 applications: 7 for Variances, 4 Special Exceptions, 2 appeals from Administrative Decision and 2 Motions for Rehearing. Of the 7 applications for Variance 2 were withdrawn, 3 were granted and 2 were denied. Of the applications for Special Exceptions all 4 were granted. Of the 2 appeals from Administrative Decision, both were denied. Both motions for rehearing were also denied.

The Board also revised our administrative rules. The major change in our procedure, which affects applicants, is our having a monthly meeting time instead of meeting when an application was requested. It was hoped that this would make it easier to obtain a full Board to hear applications that come before us.

The Board also urges the citizens of the Town to become involved in the Master planning process. Although we as a Board are not directly involved with the process we will be administering any ordinances dealing with Zoning that arise from the new Master Plan.

### CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 2001

New trails, a new forest management plan and new members highlight the past year of the Conway Conservation Commission (CCC).

The Commission scheduled monthly meetings and made field trips to work sites on the Conservation Lands.

The Commission is required to review and act upon applications for wetland permits before submission to the State of New Hampshire, Department of Environmental Services.

Revenue from management plan timber harvests is used to support the activities of the CCC including the maintenance and improvement of conservation lands as well as adding to the Land Acquisition Account.

In a cooperative effort with the White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (WMC-NEMBA), a hiking and biking trail now named the Red Tail Trail was constructed largely on the Town's Common Lands. The building of this new and scenic trail was a major undertaking by the WMC volunteers and is an excellent addition to the recreation component of the CCC's management activity on the Common Lands. The trail essentially parallels Hurricane Mountain Road from the water tower to an intersection with the existing trail that runs from the Black Cap Trail to Mt. Cranmore.

Another new trail, although much shorter, was built in Shedd Woods, connecting the picnic/viewing area with the river. The WMC constructed this trail in early fall.

Trail maintenance was performed in Whitaker Woods and the Whitaker Homesite. The work done there is largely to prevent damage from erosion and to improve the cross-country skiing grooming capability. Cross-country skiing is a major use of both properties and is the site of the Eastern Slope Ski Club's Junior Ski Program. The Mount Washington Valley Ski Touring Association grooms our trails there and are incorporated in the Associations' trail network. Kennett High's ski team is a regular user of the trails.

The Commission made formal notice to both the Board of Selectmen and the Citizen's Design Review Committee its opposition to the extension of the North/South Road through Whitaker Woods.

At the Walker's Pond Conservation Area, deteriorated "Bog Bridges" were replaced and a section of trail was relocated. Additions to trail markings will be done in 2002.

Using money acquired from the NH Department of Transportation that recognized their need to build a retention pond for the North/South Road, the CCC developed a Forest Management Plan for the 252-acre Pudding Pond Conservation Area.

As at our other conservation areas, we will manage the property there to maintain a healthy forest, generate income through the sustainable production of forest products, maintain, create and improve wildlife habitat, maintain recreational trails, protect the aesthetics of the property, protect water resources and provide educational opportunities for all users.

Off road vehicles continue to cause damage to trails on Conservation Lands. All Town Conservation Lands are posted to prohibit motorized vehicles. Trail

and other entrances are blocked with boulders to prohibit access.

The Board of Selectmen appointed Rob Adair as a member and Rick Else as an alternate. They join Connie Briggs, Chuck Broomhall, Candy Armstrong (Alternate), Al Hatch (Treasurer), Dan Lucy (Vice-Chair) David Weathers (Selectmen's Representative) and Paul Pinkham (Chair).

The Conservation Commission is ably supported by the efforts of Holly Meserve.

We look forward to continuing to implement Forest Management Plans that include selective cutting, timber stand improvement, wild life habitat management and recreational trail development. Completion of the Conservation Land publication and contributing to the development of the Master Plan will be pursued.

The Saco River riverbank was stabilized at the Town's Hussey Field on River Road. The banking was rebuilt and the West side replanted with three species of climate appropriate trees. The East side will be planted with Willow poles to complete the riparian buffer. The buffer is intended to anchor the river bank, reduce soil erosion and better protect the field and First Bridge from flood damage.



### COMMUNITY FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for any open burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. Open burning is a privilege, NOT a right. Help us to protect you and our forest resource! Build small brush piles that can be quickly burned and extinguished.

New Hampshire experienced over 940 wildland fires in 2001. Most of the fires were human caused. Due to dry conditions fires spread quickly impacting more than 20 structures. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around the house and make sure that the house number is correct and visible. Only You Can Prevent Wildland Fires. # Family Support Program The Center of Hope, Inc.

The Family Support Program of The Center of Hope, Inc. serves families who have a family member with a developmental disability living with them, or a family receiving Early Supports & Services in Carroll County. Without the financial support of the town, we would not be able to continue the quality and quantity of work we do in helping families maintain their quality of life or their ability to be contributing members of their community.

## Gibson Center

For those of you not familiar with the Gibson Center's formal mission statement, here it is: Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

Specifically, this means serving over 47,000 meals in our congregate locations and through Meals on Wheels. Between July and November of 2001, our vans

have logged 24,000 miles. In that same period of time, we have had almost 500 participants in our social and educational programs. This work does not happen without help. Each year we rely on tremendous assistance from friends and members of the Gibson Center and from our community. This assistance is both financial and good old sweat equity. Volunteers at the Gibson Center contribute 10,000 hours a year, and that does not include a lot of unpaid staff time.

This year, thanks to Charlie Sprague and the Ham and Pequawket Foundations, two new playground structures were added to the Harvey Dow Gibson Playground. This playground equipment was designed to be "family friendly" and is a nice addition to the existing Sprayground. The Center also enlarged the basketball court to a full court. The Center would like to thank Gary Chandler, Joe Smith, Artie Hill and the North Conway Water Precinct for all their assistance. Goals for 2002 are continued playground improvements and to fix up the summer house.

In closing I would like to thank the Board of Directors, Rog, and army of volunteers who help with coaching and fundraising throughout the year without whom the Center would not be possible.

# The North Conway Day Care Center

The North Conway Day Care Center has been operating since 1972, the first state licensed group child care center in the area.

The Center provides care for children ages 2-12 for working parents, averaging 75-100 children. Our program includes full time child care, a morning preschool, half day programs for kindergarten students, and before and after school programs.

A full time program is available for school age children during the summer and school vacations.

Well balanced nutritional morning and afternoon snacks and lunches are prepared according to U.S.D.A. standards and are serviced by a full time cook.

The center has an agreement with the N.H. Department of Health & Human Services to provide child care assistance for those families who are eligible according to their family income. This enables the families to have affordable child care and stay in the workforce.

All of our staff meet state licensing requirements or are in the process of being certified.

We continue to work with other community resources to help meet the needs of our families to avoid duplication of service.

# Starting Point Services for Victims of Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups, resources and referrals and community education programs. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

Conway residents benefit both from Starting Point's direct services and ongoing educational programs. In 2000, 163 Conway residents received Starting Point services. Conway residents were provided with 129 bednights of emergency shelter. Starting Point provided court advocacy to 48 Conway residents. In addition, all Conway students attending Kennett High School participate in Starting Point's three hour program, *Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know as part of the school's required health curriculum. Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary*, our 8-week elementary school program on creating a positive school environment is offered at Pinetree, John Fuller and Conway Elementary Schools.

With only three full-time staff members and a limited budget, the vast portion of Starting Point's services were provided by approximately 30 trained volunteers. These volunteers donate approximately 16,000 hours of service to our community each year. The financial support contributed by towns to our agency is used for educational programs and direct services to Starting Point clients. Money received through town funding and our own fundraising efforts enable Starting Point to qualify for State and Federal grants which comprise 85% of our budget. Without the assistance of towns such as Conway, Starting Point would not qualify for the funds that keep us in operation.

# **Tri-County Community Action**

To the SELECTMEN and RESIDENTS of the Town of Conway:

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit Community Center for Family Services and Referrals that was established in 1984, operating from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee, New Hampshire. We have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 3,571 of Conway's residents, processing 486 fuel applications, 121 being elderly, 1,065 receiving fuel benefits and linked 1,899 with other Community Action Programs.

# TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$416,910.69 ON CONWAY CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 2000 AND JUNE 30, 2001

Community Contact is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, EFSP, McKinney, and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food is distributed to the 10 food pantries and 3 dinner bells, a group home and a nursing home throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. Our staff has the trust of the entire county. We are able to successfully partner with individual families and assist them one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than 16,716 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff, and residents, as well as other social service agencies, and our clients.

# Vaughan Community Service, Inc.

2001 was a transition year for Vaughan Community Service, Inc. Liz George-Hussey retired in May, 2001 after serving as Administrator for 17 1/2 years. Notable in her career with Vaughan Services was establishing and training Hospice volunteers, supporting the Jen's Friends Cancer Foundation, coordinating the Bereavement, AIDS, and Diabetes Support groups, working to establish a Co-operative Food Pantry for Northern Carroll County, volunteering for Habitat for Humanity and the Community Shelter Action Committee, and always being available to help persons in times of personal crisis. Liz always had a smile and kind words for everyone she met.

In June 2001, The Vaughan Board of Directors, appointed Sara M. Bechtold, M.Ed. to lead the agency. Ms. Bechtold's experience as a School Guidance Counselor and Social Worker for the State of NH has prepared her for working with the No. Conway Daycare and Pre-school, and our social service programs which include:

The Food Pantry - receives donations from individuals, the Coop Food Pantry, the Boy Scouts, Key Club, and area churches. Food for over 120 meals is given out each month to families in Conway. At Thanksgiving, 19 baskets were prepared with donations to the Vaughan Food Pantry and the White Mtn. Board of Realtors donated food for 22 baskets. 150 dinners were served or delivered by volunteers at the 31st Annual Vaughan Thanksgiving Dinner. At Christmas, 9 families received baskets with a ham or turkey dinner. Donated gifts and turkeys were given to CCMH for area families.

Our Clothing Depot receives donations of clothing and small household goods. Special requests for items are filled several times per month by referral from area service agencies. The Depot is the only source of 'free' items north of Ossipee, NH.

A main focus of work at Vaughan is providing information about area Resources and Referral to appropriate services. Since July, 2001, persons have been assisted in the following areas: those needing medical and or psychological treatment; assistance securing temporary or long-term housing; job and career counseling and referral; individual grief counseling along with support from the Bereavement Educational Group; and counseling with families facing legal and financial problems.

A total of \$3,232 was raised at the 4th of July food booth, the Bean Supper on August 10th, and the Golden Goose Days ticket sales. Fundraising for the year ending 9/31/01 was up from the previous year by \$1,600. In December, 2001, Maureen O. Garrette was elected by the Vaughan Board to replace Cheryl Furtado and Karen Cole was elected to the 7 member Vaughan Advisory Board.

# White Mountain Community Health Center

White Mt. Community Health Center is a private, not-for-profit community health organization located in Conway. White Mountain Community Health Center opened it's doors on February 12, 2001 in the former White Mountain Woolens Building next to Hill's RV. WMCHC serves the health care needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Conway and the other towns of Northern Carroll County and Fryeburg. The Center provides family planning, prenatal and child health services in addition to quality and comprehensive health care for men, women and children of all ages on an income-based sliding fee scale. No one is refused care for financial reasons. The Center provides a broad "holistic" approach to healthcare, one that addresses not only the primary and preventive health care needs but also the social, emotional and community needs of the individual and/or family.

Since patient revenues cover only 40% of the WMCHC's cost of providing services, the Center must depend on fundraising, state grants, private foundation support and support from towns to cover the balance. The 2002 Town of Conway request from WMCHC of \$35,565 represents a 16% increase from the 2001 request of \$30,765. All town requests continue to be formulated on the following: \$20 per client for Family Planning Services, \$45 per child enrolled in Child Health and \$15 per client enrolled in the Pre-Natal Program. Conway's increase represents the growth, in the past year, in the number of residents served.

Indisputable evidence makes a clear link between poor access to primary and preventive care and poor health outcomes. Your support of White Mountain Community Health Center's request assures that Conway families have affordable access to health care.
