REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The approximate yield on investments for 1984 was 10.6%, based on an initial principal and accumulated dividends of \$148,267.07 and income of \$15,730.30. This yield of 10.6% compares with 9.9% for 1983, and 10.4% for 1982. In addition a \$60.00 gain was received from Duke Power Co.

Perpetual care funds were established in the names of Gertrude Keisala and Herbert Warren, Lemert and Virginia H. Clark, Philip E. and Mary Lou Averill, William Carlyle Rich, and Joseph H. and Mary Ellen Gilbert.

This year a new trust fund was established for the Timberlane Regional School District. Goodwill Council #4 of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics donated \$700.00 to provide a Citizenship and Patriotism award at the Pollard School Annual Memorial Day Program.

A contribution of \$25.00 was received from Shirley K. Butzien to be added to the New Fire Truck Capital Reserve Account.

Town Meeting voted additions to the Capital Reserve Accounts for the Colby Memorial Library, the New Fire Truck, the Recreation Commission, and the Revaluation of the Town.



Warrant

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Danville Fire Association Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the twelfth (12th) day of March, next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By ballot)
- 2. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the ensuing year. (By ballot)
- 3. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Replace ARTICLE II, Definitions, Paragraph A. RIGHT-OF-WAY, to read: "A. STREET Means and includes all Class I through Class V highways, and designated land on either side of same."; and replace the wording "right-of-way" with "street" within the text of the ordinance EXCEPT in ARTICLE V, Paragraph A.3. (By ballot)
- 4. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows? Add to ARTICLE II, <u>Definitions</u>, "L. MOBILE HOME/MANUFACTURED HOUSING Means any structure, transportable in one or more sections, which, in the traveling mode, is eight (8) body feet or more in width and forty (40) body feet or more in length, or when errected on site, is 320 square feet or more, and which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation when connected to required utilities, which include plumbing, heating and electrical heating systems contained therein." (By ballot)
- 5. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Add to ARTICLE II, Definitions, "M. MOBILE HOME

PARK/MANUFACTURED HOUSING PARK Means any parcel of land under single or common ownership or control which contains, or is designed, laid out or adapted to accommodate two or more manufactured houses. Nothing herein shall be construed to apply to premises used solely for storage or display of manufactured housing." (By ballot)

- 6. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows? Remove from ARTICLE III, Zoning Districts and Boundaries, Paragraph "E. CAMPS AND SUMMER DWELLINGS"; and remove from ARTICLE IV, Permitted Uses and Restrictions, Paragraph "E. CAMPS AND SUMMER DWELLINGS ZONE". (By ballot)
- 7. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows? Replace ARTICLE VI, Lot and Yard Requirements, Paragraph D., to read: "D. Landowner(s) of a lot of record fronting on a Class VI highway, which otherwise meets the minimum lot size and frontage requirements, may obtain a permit for a single residential building only by the following procedure.
 - 1. The applicant must apply to the Selectmen for the building permit.
 - 2. The Selectmen must request that the Planning Board review and comment on the application.
 - 3. The Selectmen must then either grant or deny the issuance of the building permit for the erection of the residence on said Class VI highway.
 - 4. The applicant shall agree that the Town neither assumes responsibility for the maintenance of said Class VI highway nor liability for any damages resulting from the use thereof.
 - 5. The applicant shall agree to waive any rights to Town services or School District transportation services including, but not limited to, road service, plowing, rubbish collection and school bus service except at the nearest Town road or State highway.
 - 6. Prior to the issuance of the building permit, the applicant shall produce evidence that notice of the limits of the Town's responsibility and liability have been recorded in the County Registry of Deeds.
 - 7. Whenever a building permit for a single residential dwelling on a Class VI highway is denied, the

applicant may pursue the appellate remedies outlined in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 674:41, II as amended." (By ballot)

- 8. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows? Add to ARTICLE VI, Lot and Yard Requirements, "E. FRONTAGE EXCEPTION FOR LARGER LOTS Not withstanding the above provision, a lot of record in existence at the time of the passage of this article, said lot consisting of five (5) acres or more in size with frontage on a Class I through V highway of two hundred fifty feet (250') to four hundred feet (400'), may be subdivided into not more than two lots, if granted a special exception by the Board of Adjustment, provided that the Board finds that the following conditions have been met:
 - 1. One of the two lots which will result from the subdivision will have not less than two hundred feet (200') frontage on a Class I through Class V highway.
 - 2. The lot with less than two hundred feet (200') frontage, hereafter referred to as the back lot, shall be such that any axis through the center of the proposed building site will be at least two hundred fifty feet (250') long between the boundaries of the lot.
 - 3. The front lot shall contain at least two (2) acres; the back lot, at least three (3) acres."
 (By ballot)
- 9. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Amendment to the Danville Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows? Replace ARTICLE VIII, Regulation of Growth, Paragraph A., to read: "A. In order to protect the health, welfare and safety of the Town of Danville, the Town has adopted an interim growth management regulation in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 674:23. For a period of one (1) year from the date of adoption, the limit of building permits for individual housing units will be limited to four (4) percent of the total number of housing units existing in the Town at the end of the year 1984." (By ballot)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.) to construct and equip a Municipal Complex, by means of serial notes over a five-year (5-year) period, and to apply toward the cost of the project all grants and interest received, or take any action relative thereto.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Fifty Eight Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$58,750.) to meet the first principal and interest payment on the borrowing authorized under Article 10.
- 12. To see how much of the Parsonage Fund the Town will vote to spend for the ensuing year.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property by public auction.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to reconvey title to tax deeded property to the former owners only upon repayment of taxes, costs, interest and other expenses incurred.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to natural disasters from the Federal Government Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in Washington.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against the budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amount indicated herewith or take any other action hereon: \$8,000.00 for Sanitation; \$1,000.00 for Police; and \$1,000.00 for Fire.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future fire truck purchases.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the existing Colby Memorial Library Capital Reserve Fund, and to be paid to the Trustees of Trust Funds by April 1. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the development of future recreation facilities. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a new Police Cruiser.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Twenty-three Thousand Dollars (\$23,000.) to be added to the Re-evaluation Capital Reserve Fund.
- 24. To see if the Town will appropriate Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.) from the Re-evaluation Capital Reserve Fund for a complete re-evaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration during 1985 or as soon thereafter as is possible.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association for the Town of Danville and raise and appropriate One Thousand and Seven Hundred Dollars (\$1,700.) to pay for same.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with Community Action of Rockingham County for the Town of Danville to raise and appropriate Four Hundred and Twelve Dollars (\$412.) to pay for same.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Plaistow Family Mediation Program and to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.) to pay for same.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Newmarket Regional Health Center and to raise and appropriate Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$650.) to pay for same.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Center for Life Management and to raise and appropriate Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750.) to pay for same.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Rockingham Regional Planning Commission and to raise and appropriate One Thousand and Twenty-Eight Dollars (\$1,028.) to pay for annual dues.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with Rockingham Regional Planning Commission for preparation of a Master Plan and to raise and appropriate Sixty Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.) to pay for same.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$550.00) for the future development of the Colby Memorial Library; with

- \$350.00 for the survey and septic system design and \$200.00 for Library Construction Consultants. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for the purpose of painting the exterior trim, the interior, and the metal book drop box at the Colby Memorial Library.

 34. Are you in favor of giving the Planning Board authority to review, and approve or disapprove site plans for multi-family dwelling units, which are defined as any structures containing more than two (2) dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site?
- 35. To see if the Town of Danville will vote to accept as a Town Road the road known as Meadow Lark Lane off of Long Pond Road, which has been certified by the Town Engineer as acceptable. (By petition)
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to adopt RSA 80:52-a, Prepayment of Taxes. This statute allows the Tax Collector, after April 1 and prior to signing the current year's warrant, to accept prepayment of taxes (either in full based on the previous years' taxes or to make a partial payment).
- 37. To see if the town will vote to change the nine (9) members-at-large positions on the Budget Committee from appointed to elected positions, pursuant to R.S.A. 32:2 and 32:3; with the nine (9) members-at-large to be elected by ballot at the 1986 Town Meeting; three for one-year terms; three for two-year terms, and three for three-year terms, and each year thereafter three shall be elected for three-year terms. (By petition)
- 38. To see if the Selectmen will appoint a totally new committee to look into the present and future building needs for the Town; to direct the committee to work closely with all Town departments and to report to the townspeople by the end of July 1985. These recommendations are to be presented to the Townspeople in a series of public meetings (for input and information) and to prepare a financial proposal with the Selectmen and the Budget Committee to be presented to the 1986 Town Meeting. (By petition)
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of Police Chief from a one-year term to a three-year term, effective 1986.
- 40. To Raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

41. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The second session of the Business Meeting will be held at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 16, 1985, at the Fire Association Hall.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND FOREST RANGE REPORT

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000. fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000. fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

PLANNING BOARD

1984 continued the trend of the past several years with an ever increasing load of subdivision business and new regulation work.

We are now operating under the recodified Land

Subdivision Regulations which dictate a more formalized procedure consisting of three stages. We accepted ten formal subdivision applications during 1984 and approved all of them. In addition, we conducted many preliminary consultations and referred several of these to the Board of Adjustment.

At the outset of the year, we held public hearings on the recodified Land Subdivision Regulations and put them into effect in April. In September, we decided to propose an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance on Excavation for the November election. We held hearings on this amendment during September and October and it was approved by the Town in November.

During 1984, we developed a citizen survey which will be conducted during January 1985 to provide a basis for a revised Master Plan. We also developed six warrant articles for amendments to the Zoning Ordinance which will be placed before the voters at the March Town Meeting.

During 1984, we have continued our membership in the Rockingham Planning Commission. The professional consultation which they have supplied has been invaluable, not only on the long-term projects but also on the questions that arise in the day-to-day subdivision work. We are convinced that this is an extremely cost-effective way to get this help in comparison with reliance solely on legal counsel. Moreover, it is clear that we will have to rely increasingly on professional help of this type in the face of the pressures created by the rapid growth in our area and the legislative and judicial activity relative to land use regulation.

Exeter Area V.N.A. continues to feel that——Home care is being looked at to provide a higher level of care to people with a degree of illness previously considered treatable only in a hospital.

Funding for the Association comes from Medicare, Medicaid, patient fees, donations and member town appropriations raised through approved local taxes. The member Towns make up the governing Board of Directors with people appointed by the Town Selectmen.

This non-profit community agency continues to provide health care to individuals and families in their homes and in clinics. The well-child clinic, the blood pressure clinic, and the Flu clinic continue along with the recently added foot-care clinic for senior citizens. The four sites for the foot clinics are: Raymond Senior Citizen Center, the Elderly Housing Unit in Exeter, Dr. Dibble's Office in Kingston, and Packer Meadows Elderly Housing in Newton. Please check local papers for times and places of all clinics.

There is now an answering service in effect taking calls twenty-four hours a day at 772-2981.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

This is my first year as your Police Chief, and it has been a challenging and rewarding one.

The Department has undergone many changes this year. We purchased the first town-owned radar unit for the cruiser; changed the uniforms to the more acceptable dark blue; and started a positive program at the Elementary School where we give talks, show safety films, and provide informational programs. During the spring, the Department co-sponsored Danville's first Bike-A-Thon, which raised over \$1800.00 for the Elementary School to purchase electronic equipment for the students. During 1984 the L.E.A.D. (Law Enforcement Association of Danville) Program was re-activated. L.E.A.D. sponsored several youth dances and a firearms familiarity program. A patrol schedule was initiated this year; the Department has had an officer on duty approximately twenty-five (25) hours per week. We plan to increase this duty time to fifty (50) hours per week in 1985. We have continued the Vacation Watch Program, and, to allow the citizens of Danville to know what is happening in their town, we have supplied the local newspapers with police information.

All Police Officers in the Town have now been certified by the N.H. Police Standards and Training Council. In addition, all are certified with the police baton and all but one officer is certified with the service revolver. Many of the officers have also received specialized training in radar, breathalyzer operation, and juvenile law. The following Department appointments were made during the year: Brad Greeley, Firearms Officer; Paul Fuller, Maintenance Officer; Maureen Greeley, Animal Control Officer; Wade Parsons, Evidence Officer; and, having completed a four-week training program on juvenile law, Liz Wunderlich, Juvenile Officer.

With all these positive changes and many more anticipated in the near future, including the establishment of an Explorer Program for the youth, we have but one problem--SPACE. The Police Depart-

ment sincerely hopes the Public-Safety Complex is approved this year, with construction beginning as soon as possible.

The year 1984 has been one of learning, growth and change for my Officers and myself. I believe we have made good progress. We appreciate the foresight and cooperation the Board of Selectmen and townspeople have shown us throughout the year. I am proud of my Officers and what we have accomplished; we are all looking forward to another productive and successful year.

Most importantly, on behalf of the entire Department, I wish to thank each and everyone of you for the exceptional support shown during last fall's disaster.


The Fire Department, to meet the growing number of requests for services, must keep pace with a continual program of expansion in training, equipment and facilities.
