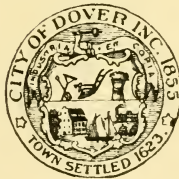

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF

HON. ALVAH T. RAMSDELL

(Delivered January 5, 1921.)

MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

Obedient to the command of the charter of the City of Dover, on this first Wednesday of January, 1921, we meet in convention for the purpose of inaugurating a city government for the ensuing year.

By vote of our fellow-citizens, it has been given us in charge to administer the public affairs of our city for the coming year. Deeply do we appreciate the honor conferred and accept its attending responsibility.

Some of us have had experience in the management of these affairs; others enter upon the performance of their duties for the first time; but all of us, I am sure, are animated with the desire to do our best in the management of those interests which are our deepest concern.

It has been a custom of long standing to write inaugurals, giving at length the history of the several departments of the city for the year that has just been brought to a close. I feel it unnecessary, at this time, to follow that custom too closely. The city report, containing a detail of the several departments, will furnish any and every information that may be desired.

I shall, therefore, only take up for observation and suggestion, such departments as in my opinion call for special mention.

Because I do not make it a point to enlarge upon some of the city departments, it is not to be inferred that I do not recognize their importance and appreciate their most excellent work.

I place our city departments, both in officers and the character of their work, in a class as high as that of any city in the country. They are second to none. At committee meetings, where the matter of determining the necessary appropriations for the year are being considered, we will have the necessary information for our guidance.

We will now turn to some of the several departments and make a few suggestions and observations:—

FINANCIAL SUMMARY.

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From this balance, however, there is due the State of New Hampshire the sum of two dollars per capita upon all polls assessed for the year, aggregating \$6,424.00.

One of the results of the world war, with its consequent shortage of labor and inflation of values, is strikingly evidenced in the increased financial demands of the various departments into which the interests of the city are divided.

The increase in county and state taxes, together with the added financial demands for educational purposes under the new state law, was \$75,000.00 more in 1920 than the amount raised for the same purposes ten years ago, an increase representing forty-three per cent of the total appropriations raised by taxation in 1910.

During the past year, however, the values of certain properties, such as stocks in trade, etc., participated in the upward trend and were assessed accordingly. The value of this class of property has already experienced a downward tendency, and will show a constantly decreasing total with the passing of the days, a condition which must inevitably affect the revenues of the city for the coming year.

SCHOOLS.

If I were to place one department of the city before another in importance, it would be the School department. The importance of education cannot be over estimated. I am glad to say that we have the best evidence that our citizens have, for many years, held the same opinion. We have a school system second to none. Like all good things it is growing, and its demands also are growing. And let me say that its demands are not out of proportion to its other growth.

In the last year it has been necessary to increase the salaries of the grade teachers. The lowest is now \$700 and the highest \$1,000. This has brought happiness, comfort, and better work in the department. The whole west side of the basement of the City building has been, by the action of the City Councils, set apart for the purpose of mechanic arts and manual training in connection with the high school course. This act of the Councils is appreciated by teachers, scholars, and parents alike.

There is ample justification for the work done at the Lower Neck and Back River school-houses in the interest of sanitary and health conditions. Also the additional heat placed in the Hale school is meeting all expectations and shows the wisdom of the Councils.

My recommendation at this time is to grant a sufficient appropriation to this department to insure its maintenance at its present high standard.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

Our water system has been established for more than thirty years. We created, for its establishment, a very large debt. At the rate we are now paying that debt, in six or seven years it will have been retired. I believe the time has come when reasonable extensions of the system should be made so that ultimately all of our citizens will be able to enjoy the benefits of its privileges. Such extensions cannot be made from the present income of the Department without reducing the amount of annual payments on the water debt.

I have examined the rates of many of the cities about us having a public owned system such as ours. I find that all, without exception, make a larger allowance to their department for hydrant service than does the city of Dover. Some of them provide as high as \$45 per hydrant. Ours at the present time is but \$13.33 for hydrants alone.

I recommend, in order that there may be ample funds available for proper extensions of the water system from the income of that department, that the city provide for a hydrant service at \$25 per hydrant. And I suggest that early attention, by the Councils, should be given this subject so that such provisions as they see fit to make can be considered in making the annual appropriations.

STREETS.

The city of Dover, as a township, is about twelve miles long and three miles wide. There are about fifty-five miles of country road and about fifty miles of streets. Dover also has nearly one hundred miles of sidewalk. Annually these roads, streets, and walks need extensive repairs. And the repairs are, from year to year, each year and every year, made more expensive by the use of modern machinery. The auto-truck and automobile are the product of scientific development, of which we are proud, but they are death to the streets and roads. This fact we must recognize, and in the best way possible, must provide for the necessities they create.

There are in Dover seven wooden bridges, six iron bridges, four large culverts, and one hundred seventy-four culverts and drains of various sizes, scattered through the seventeen outside districts of the city. They must be kept safe for the public travel or the city will be liable to indictment for such damage as may be done to the traveling public.

The legislature of New Hampshire passed a law placing the street department of our city in the hands of a Commissioner with sole power over men and means, and the execution of the law. It is not for us to determine the wisdom of the law, but it is our duty to provide means for its proper execution.

I, therefore, recommend that a suitable appropriation

be made for the necessary annual repairs to streets, sewers, drains, culverts, sidewalks and country roads, without restrictions or reservations.

Thus you will comply with the provisions of the law, and then you can make such other special appropriations for new constructions as you deem wise and in the best interest of the city.

I recommend that all special appropriations for special construction be placed in the hands of the Commissioner of Streets, as the law intends and provides, and that a vote of instruction be passed in regard to its expenditure.

Before passing from this subject let me say that I have been over nearly every mile of the streets and roads of the city during the year just closed. Without a personal investigation no one can appreciate the conditions existing and demands constantly arising in our street department. We must be prepared to see the expenses of this department continually grow larger. No one is at fault for the same. The only way to stop it is to forbid auto-trucks and automobiles from traveling upon our streets and highways. No one wants that. We all believe in, and wish to assist, the development of progress. But, whatever we do for relief must be guided by economy.

I wish to remind the Councils that our valuation for taxation is not increasing in proportion to the increase in our expenditures.

Our rate of taxation, therefore, is on the increase. And I need not repeat to you what is common knowledge, that a high rate of taxation is no inducement to strangers to come among us to share our burdens and benefits. No unusual appropriation for unusual development of the city should be made this year. We are in no condition, financially, to contract new obligations. When conditions brought on by the war have been adjusted, it will be ample time to explore new fields for municipal development.

In conclusion, I wish to observe that good results can only be accomplished by that harmony among us that, I know, each and all of us most earnestly desire.

I am looking forward to a profitable year as I am now able to look back over a most pleasant one. I wish to contribute to the solution of your official duties, as I hope to have you contribute to the accomplishment of mine. Let us then approach our work in this spirit and nothing will be wanting in its performance.

HIS HONOR, THE MAYOR, AND GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

We have the honor to submit the following report of the business of the Dover Police Commission for the year 1920.

During the year the term of Walter Delaney expired and he was succeeded by James H. McKeon, who was appointed by Governor Bartlett and his Council for the term ending September 1, 1923. Upon the qualification of Mr. McKeon the Commission organized as follows: Chairman, Fred N. Beckwith; Clerk, Albert H. Winn; James H. McKeon.

At a meeting in June, the pay of the officers was increased as follows: City Marshal, \$1,900; Assistant Marshal, \$1,700; Captain, \$1,550; Patrolmen, \$4.50 per day; to become effective July 1, 1920. The Commission considered that owing to the high cost of living the officers needed this increase to enable them to live comfortably. It has been able to pay this out of the regular appropriation and the earnings of the Department by the practice of strict economy.

At the September Term 1919 of the Superior Court, an action in assumpsit for Twelve Hundred Dollars, was entered by Peter J. McShane against the City; this action is for services of a man who drove the Buick patrol wagon during the time it was used by the police department and I expect to dispose of the case at the February Term 1921.

With the exception of this one action there are no actions now pending either for or against the City.

During the year I have answered all communications submitted to me by the various departments of the City, and I take this opportunity to thank the Councils for their uniform kindness to me during my term as Solicitor for the City.

THE WENTWORTH HOSPITAL

ANNUAL REPORT

OF

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

We have the honor to submit herewith the fifteenth annual report of the board of trustees of the Wentworth Hospital, for the year ending December 31, 1920.

The opportunities offered in practically every line of industrial endeavor have been so attractive during the past year, that it has been extremely difficult to maintain a corps of assistants in the various departments of the hospital competent to cope with the demands incident to an increase of nearly thirty-four percent. in the registered admissions. That this demand has been satisfactorily met, even with a reduced force, demonstrates the efficiency, enthusiasm, and self-sacrifice with which all those connected with the institution have performed their respective tasks, a devotion to duty which the members of the board of trustees desire to publicly recognize in this report.

This shortage of labor assumed such an acute stage in the early summer, however, that the advisability of temporarily closing the hospital to all phases of work except cases of the utmost urgency was formally considered, but the timely release from employment in other fields provided the relief which enabled the hospital to continue to function without modification in the range of its activities or impairment in the quality of its service.

SERVICE.

The number of patients admitted to the hospital during the past year was 950, exceeding the admissions for 1918—the high record for the preceding years—by one hundred ninety-one. Of the 950 persons admitted, 701 were residents of Dover. The number of days of free service rendered during the year was 1640, the smallest number for any given calendar period since 1907.

The benevolent work of the hospital, however, can hardly be gauged by the number of free days' service recorded. The mission of the hospital is philanthropical, rather than commercial; its doors open to the call of necessity more readily than to the appeal of profit.

Emphasizing this contention we might state that the average daily cost for the treatment of patients during the past year was \$3.48, while the average daily receipts per patient were only \$1.80. This basis of cost is determined by dividing the sum actually expended for hospital maintenance, as shown in the report of the treasurer. (eliminating trust fund accounting and with no allowance for depreciation,) by the number of days' service actually rendered.

Carrying out these deductions to their logical end, we find that the financial concessions granted those receiving hospital ministrations during the past year, reached the surprising total of substantially \$8,500.00.

STATISTICAL

The number of days of free and partially free service rendered, and the number of days' service for which established rates were received, during the fourteen years the hospital has been in operation, are presented in the following table:

To the student of hospital statistics it might prove interesting to know that the relation of cost in the various subdivisions into which the hospital charges are grouped, to the total cost of maintenance, shows but little variation from year to year, an indication that the increase in the demands of labor has found a parallel in the enhanced value of all kinds of commercial products. The percentage which each of these subdivisions bears to the aggregate disbursements each year for the past five years is presented in the following table, together with the addition, for purposes of comparison, of similar computations for the year 1910.

X-RAY MACHINE.

At a special meeting held May 19th, the general equipment of the hospital was augmented by the purchase of a much-needed X-Ray machine, consisting of a cabinet, transformer, Coolidge tube and special shell, foot switch, tube stand, combination intensifying screen and cassette, and in fact every necessary auxiliary for effective service.

Through the co-operation of Dr. H. O. Chesley this machine was secured for \$720.00, a discount of \$320.00 from the April 1 list price. The machine is fully guaranteed by the manufacturers, the General X-Ray Co., of Boston, Mass., and has been found very serviceable in the surgical department of the institution.

In order to take advantage of the opportunity presented, it was voted to apply the legacy of \$500.00 left unconditionally by the late Dr. A. J. Young, toward its purchase, the balance of the purchase price being taken from the general fund.

SCHEDULE OF RATES.

The new schedule of rates, embodying a slight advance over the pre-war schedule, under advisement at the time of filing our last annual report, was formally adopted at

the regular February meeting of the board of trustees. For general information these rates are incorporated herein in their entirety:

Non-Resident Patients.

Patients living outside the limits of the City of Dover will be charged fifty cents per day over local rates.

Non-resident patients requiring the services of a graduate nurse will be charged the usual price for such service, including the nurse's board at the Hospital.

Non-resident patients occupying ward beds will be charged \$10.00 extra for major surgical operations, and \$5.00 for minor operations; if occupying private rooms the charge will be increased to \$15.00 for major operations, and \$7.50 for minor operations.

All examinations extra.

None of the foregoing rates to include the services of a special nurse.

All nurses, whether attending local or non-resident patients, to be engaged by the Superintendent.

THE NURSES' HOME.

On February 6, 1919, Mr. E. W. Rollins filed an auto-graph communication with the city councils, expressing

his readiness to donate the sum of \$25,000.00 to the board of trustees of the Wentworth hospital for the purpose of erecting a nurses' home as a memorial to the late Mrs. Gladys A. Rollins.

Immediately subsequent to the official acceptance of the generous offer Mr. Rollins deposited securities with the city treasurer which, at the close of the year, represented a cash value of \$36,017.45.

On January 4, 1920, Mr. Rollins filed his intention of increasing his donation to \$55,000.00, and subsequently intimated that the memorial fund would be further increased to \$70,000.00,—a truly magnificent testimonial of enduring affection, a splendid monument to the memory of a noble woman.

At a special meeting of the board of trustees held April 17, 1920, proposals for the construction of the home, agreeably to plans and specifications prepared by J. Edward Richardson, architect, and approved by Mr. Rollins, were received, ranging from \$71,898.00 to \$100,778.00, exclusive of plumbing and wiring.

These bids, received at the very height of industrial and commercial inflation, were rather staggering, and, following a conference by wire with the donor, were formally rejected. The gradual decline in prices of building materials and the steadily increasing flexibility in industrial circles, suggests the possibility of resuming structural activities during the coming season.

MEMORIAL.

The personnel of the board of trustees experienced a marked change during the past year. In addition to the changes automatically occurring in the ex-officio membership, three of the five elective members were removed by death.

In order that the succession in office may be clearly defined, the changes above mentioned are presented below in chronological sequence.

On January 7, 1920, Hon. Alvah T. Ramsdell, mayor of the city of Dover, and Mr. Dana L. Clark, president of the common council, succeeded Hon. Fred C. Smalley and Mr. Harold C. Getchell, respectively, as ex-officio members of the board.

On the eighth day of January, Col. Daniel Hall, dean of the board, and largely instrumental in securing the bequest which made the erection of the hospital possible passed to his reward, aged 87 years, 10 months and 11 days. In the death of Col. Hall the city suffered an irreparable loss, and his associates on the board of trustees a faithful co-worker, wise councillor and cherished friend. He was succeeded in office by Mr. Ashton Rollins.

A few weeks subsequent to the death of Col. Hall, the board of trustees was again called upon to mourn the loss of one of its members.—Mr. Thomas E. Varney,—who died March 8th, following a brief illness, aged 61 years, 1 month and 6 days. Mr. Varney was confirmed as a member of the board of trustees April 6, 1916, and during his official connection with the hospital, was an earnest and conscientious worker in its interests, seeking always to promote the scope and usefulness of the institution with which he was officially connected. Mr. John F. Minnick was unanimously confirmed as a mem-

ber of the board of trustees to succeed Mr. Varney, on the first day of April following.

On the thirty-first day of October, as the falling leaf gave evidence of waning life in field and forest, Mr. Frank B. Williams closed a long and useful sojourn on earth, and entered into eternal rest. Mr. Williams was a life-long resident of Dover, in which city he was born August 22, 1850. He was confirmed as a member of the board of trustees March 2, 1905, and served continuously in that capacity until his death. As a member of the first board of trustees, his wide experience along structural lines, and intimate knowledge of business minutia, rendered his services particularly valuable to his colleagues, and contributed largely to the successful inauguration and subsequent conduct of an institution which has come to be recognized as an indispensable adjunct to our municipal life. Mr. Williams was succeeded on the board of trustees by Mr. Cyrus L. Jenness.

DONATION.

The board of trustees desire to gratefully acknowledge the receipt of a check for \$1,500.00 from E. S. Boyer, Esq., executor of the will of the late Amos D. Lougee of Somersworth, N. H., which sum was placed on deposit in the Strafford Savings Bank on July 1st. This sum is given in trust, the income thereof to be used for the relief of indigent patients at the discretion of the board of trustees.

The following nurses have graduated from the Training School in the year 1920: Miss Helen Goggin, Miss Alice Carlson, Miss Gertrude Constine, Miss Louise McKeil. Miss Annie Boise, whose name was inadvertently omitted last year, graduated in October, 1919.

The year 1920 has been our busiest and hardest hospital year. We have admitted 250 more patients than last year and have been most seriously handicapped in our work. The number of pupil nurses was much less than our needs and the nursing force had to be increased by graduate nurses. It was practically impossible to secure domestic help until within the last three months since which time there are plenty of applicants. It was necessary a greater part of the year to pay workers by the hour—a costly method—but the only way in which we could get workers. Salaries and wages were increased to meet the steadily increasing cost of living and as our appropriation was not increased the problem of making both ends meet was difficult. It was necessary to send out our laundry for some months and this item of expense was large. There was no diminution in price of commodities and in many things an increase. It seemed impossible to replenish in many directions. Practically all hospitals are facing a deficit larger than any heretofore. The call for beds is insistent because it costs so much to care for the sick at home and because of the scarcity of nurses.

Seven hundred and one Dover people have been cared for and many of these would have had no nursing care at home. The shortage of nurses still persists and is a

great problem in hospital life. The salaries of the nurses have increased in proportion to the demand for their services and this condition will persist.

The Training School will have in 1921 fourteen nurses which number we hope to increase later. It will be necessary for some time yet to employ graduates for the responsible work.

We need more room for X-Ray work, a children's ward and to supply the demand for inexpensive private rooms. The general office of the hospital is also too small for the work done. Space for all of our needs will be available when the Gladys Rollins Memorial Home is completed.

The generosity of the Hospital Club through its fruit fund has given a great deal of pleasure to a large number of patients. The grand piano loaned by the Lothrop piano store to the Training School has given a great deal of enjoyment to a group of young women whose working hours are spent in service to the sick. We feel deeply grateful to Messrs. Lothrop.

A large amount of mending and making of new material was done by various groups of women and the help it was to us can hardly be estimated. We have a tremendous amount of repair work to do and it takes many hours' labor. The following organizations are deserving our grateful thanks:

A committee from the Hospital Club with Miss Margaret Frost as chairman has made surgical dressings an afternoon a week all the year. Our thanks are especially due Miss Frost, Mrs. Stacy Hanson, Miss Ruth Gray and Miss Annie Folsom for devoted and faithful service.

The hospital seems yearly to fill a larger place in the community. Its growth has been slow and steady.

I wish to express to the Board of Trustees my thanks for the numerous helps over hard places. We have had many of them during this hospital year.

PINE HILL CEMETERY

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

Conforming to the generally accepted policy of other branches of our municipal service, work in the cemetery department has been confined, during the past year, to general maintenance, and the advancement, as opportunity permitted, of projects previously inaugurated.

During the year there have been one hundred fifty-one interments. These interments are presented below in chronological arrangement. Twenty-five new monuments have been added, and the foundations for sixty-nine headstones have been laid.

The grounds have been kept in good order, the avenues and walks gravelled where necessary, and the usual floral decorations maintained.

The number of lots placed under perpetual care is gradually growing, and the work incident to such care is correspondingly increasing. This phase of the work is self-sustaining, although it magnifies the pay rolls and might, from a superficial inspection of the expenditures, lead to the impression that the outlay for labor was larger than the achievements would seem to warrant. The number of lots under perpetual care has grown from less than two score at the time the department was placed under the control of a permanent board, to over seven hundred at the close of 1920.

During the past season such time as could be spared from the performance of routine duties, has been applied

to grading the rear of the Chapel lot, and the lowering of lots on avenue D, in which work very satisfactory progress was made.

DEBT.

The debt is \$110,000.00, borrowed on two notes. These notes call for the payment of \$20,000.00 on the principal per year for the years 1921 and 1922, then \$15,000.00 per year for four years, leaving \$10,000.00 to be paid in the year 1927, when the debt will be liquidated.

The debt in 1891 amounted to \$355,000.00, the interest at $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ being \$15,087.50. The interest charge on our present debt is \$3,850.00.

EXTENSIONS.

Some extensions have been made to our mains during the year, twenty-one houses having been connected and supplied with water. Three of these are on the Knox Marsh road, three on Niles street and the rest in the Pacific Mills housing area, where the houses are built in reasonably close formation.

Within the above mentioned area the sewers were laid the streets and sidewalks graded, and the gutters cemented at the expense of the Pacific Mills Co. Following a great deal of agitation for more houses, this is the only housing proposition to find practical realization.

PUMPING STATIONS.

The pond and main pumping stations are well equipped and in good working condition.

PLANT.

With the exception of a few mains and hydrants that are causing some trouble, (which we hope to remedy in the near future) the plant is in good condition.

We have petitions for several extensions of our mains, the two principal ones being on the Back River road and at "Page's Corner."

METERED WATER RATES.

Due to the increased cost of all material and labor required during the year, it became expedient to readjust the two lower rates for metered water, (effective Oct. 1. 1920), by increasing the minimum rate from fifteen to nineteen cents per hundred cubic feet, also the intermediate rate from nineteen to twenty-one cents per hundred cubic feet. The maximum rate of twenty-three cents per hundred cubic feet has not been disturbed and it is expected that with normal conditions again prevailing, no increase in this rate will be necessary.

SUPPLY.

On December 31, 1920, the height of the water in Wil-land's pond registered fifty-one inches above zero, which is twenty-three inches higher than a year ago. In 1913 it was two and one-half inches below and in 1914, two and three-quarters inches above. The abundant supply we now have is very gratifying.

The State Board of Health reports the water to be in good condition.

A detailed statement of the work done this year, the changes and improvements made, the receipts, expenditures, and the amount of uncollected rates, may be found in the Superintendent's report, which is annexed to and made a part of this report.

DOVER WATER WORKS

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS:—

GENTLEMEN:—Pursuant to custom and in accord with Sec. 8, Chapter 19, of the City Ordinance, I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent for the year 1920.

The year has been a busy one for the department, partly on account of the opening of new streets under the Pacific Mills housing project and the extension of our system of piping some 1,600 feet to provide such houses with water.

On account of the increase of three hundred per cent. in the cost of material and of one hundred per cent. in cost of labor, our construction account shows a corresponding enlargement.

There is a constant call for extension of the service. Some of these calls come from sections of the city already developed. If the city is to continue its industrial and commercial growth some of these petitions must be granted. The water department is unable to meet the cost of these extensions and continue to pay the sum of \$10,000.00 annually towards the reduction of the water debt.

The fixed annual income for all water used for flushing sewers, for drinking fountains, and for fire purposes, is only \$3,000.00. Notwithstanding the increase in cost of furnishing water, this amount has experienced no increase, and is far below what other cities set apart for

similar purposes. The city of Portsmouth appropriates \$40.00 per hydrant per annum; Somersworth, \$35.00; ours is but \$13.33.

Of the 235,083,000 gallons of water consumed in 1920 fifty-six per cent. of it did not pass through meters. For this large amount of unmetered water we received but seventeen per cent. of our revenue, although eighty-five per cent. of our services are provided with adequate measuring devices. There can be but a small waste of water through ground leaks, as our average daily consumption is less than fifty gallons per inhabitant, giving Dover a rank among the very lowest of the cities of the country.

Taking these facts into consideration it is fair to presume that drinking fountains, flushing sewers and fighting fires caused the consumption of the larger part of water from which the department receives such inadequate revenue.

The two pumping outfits at the high pressure station are in excellent condition, needing but minor repairs. The motor driven DeLaval centrifugal pump at the Willand pond station has proved a good investment, the pumping expenses for the past twelve months being nearly \$600.00 less than for the year 1919. A kerosene engine has been installed for use in case of failure of the electric power. The old 500 gallon Lawrence pump is badly worn, has very low efficiency, with high cost of operation and it would be in the interest of economy to replace it with an up to date DeLaval pump of same size and type as the one in Well No. one. The cost of such a pump would be about \$350.00.

The filtration plant is in good condition, but No. 1 bed must be refilled the coming year; this will necessitate the hauling of sand from the bank. The wooden fence around both the receiving basin and reservoir is in very bad condition and should be replaced with steel.

The water in Willand pond is 53½ inches above the

zero mark of 1909, two inches higher at the close of the years than at any similar period since the guage was established, and $25\frac{1}{2}$ inches higher than Dec. 31, 1919. The service of a diver was procured during the past season and the intake pipe extended into the pond. There was an increase of 33,188,000 gallons in the amount of water pumped and a corresponding showing in the receipts for water sold.

Our cast iron distribution piping is in excellent condition after thirty-three years' use. Judging from the appearance of sections that have been cut out in making changes, the inside of these pipes seem in as good condition as when laid.

All hydrants are tested each year and flushed with water. During cold weather they are inspected as often as every ten days.

The wrought iron cement lined service pipe system in several sections of the city has been relaid, the cement lining of the pipes in all cases being as good as when laid. The iron on the outside, however, is quite badly corroded from the action of the soil. All service pipes laid during the last fifteen years have received two coats of a preservative paint, which will add years to the life of the system.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE DOVER PUBLIC LIBRARY:

Gentlemen: The report of the librarian showing the work of the library for the year 1920 is herewith presented.

The number of books purchased is less than in former years because the steadily advancing cost of books seriously diminishes the purchasing power of the book appropriation, but the number of accessions this year is larger than last, because of the number of gifts. Most of these came from the American Library Association. It will be remembered that in the early days of the war,

the American Library Association, with funds collected from all over the country, purchased books needed by the soldiers to keep up their studies along scientific and technical and economic lines. At the close of the war many of these books, used but not worn out, were returned and distributed to libraries that had contributed to their purchase. The books received by this library in this way, nearly 100 in number, greatly increased the value of our material on these subjects, as most of them were standard works, somewhat expensive, which would have been beyond our means today. A gift to the Historical Room of unusual value came from Mr. Albert H. Hall of Boston, a descendant of Dover ancestry. It is a photographic copy of the Dover Combination of 1640. This is the earliest document extant giving names of the first settlers here. It is preserved in the Public Record Office in London and is a copy made in 1682 by Edward Cranfield of the original paper, all trace of which is lost. It is a combination for government and states that "Wee whose names are underwritten being inhabitants upon the River Pascataquak have voluntarily agreed to combine ourselves into a body politique." Forty-two signatures follow, the whole forming not only a valuable record of names in our history, but an interesting study of independent self government in colonial times. Mr. Hall had two copies of this document made, one for his own possession and one for preservation in this library.

THE YEAR'S CIRCULATION.

The circulation shows a slight increase for the year, both in the main library and children's room. From the main room have been issued 54,868 volumes, and from the children's room 15,535, making in all 70,403. The percentage of fiction holds about the same as for several years, 52% in the main room, 13% in the children's room, a total of 65% : showing that while many persons use the library for recreation, 35% of all the borrowers come to

it for business purposes, information and reading on thoughtful subjects. The department of circulation from the main room is in charge of Miss Jenkins who brings to her work a natural aptitude for dealing with people, together with a strong desire that the resources of the library shall be known and used by all classes in the community. With this object in view, exhibits of books on subjects of current interest have been kept out in the Delivery Room, the one just now being the Pilgrim Ter-Centenary. When the Chamber of Commerce opened, books were furnished to members of different committees on housing, lighting, playgrounds, recreation and municipal finance. Twice lists have been asked for and furnished on the subject of the pollution of water by sewage and dye stuff. Notices of the library and its resources and history have been left at the Chamber of Commerce for distribution to strangers in the city; and innumerable messages have been sent over the telephone, and personal mention has been made to people of books in which they might be especially interested.

CHILDREN'S ROOM.

No room in the building makes a stronger appeal to the interest of the public than the Children's Room, to which this year there were 13,222 visitors and from which 15,535 books were sent out. The work done in this room consists not only of the giving out of books and repairing and cleaning them, and of preserving order in the room, but also of guiding children's tastes in reading, selecting books suitable for purchase, assisting grade teachers in their selections for school use, helping parents to choose books, keeping up picture exhibits, story hours and bulletin board material. This is Miss Parker's work and it is carried on with enthusiasm and good judgment.

REFERENCE USE.

The unrecorded use of the library forms a very im-

portant part of its value to the community and while the number of visitors to the Reading Room is kept, no account is made of the use of the books in the Reference library or of the time covered in looking up material on the wide range of questions brought here. This service demands intelligence of high order, an intimate knowledge of books, and infinite patience, qualities possessed in marked degree by Miss Devin who superintends the work here. The visitors to the room have numbered 11,476; help has been given to High School pupils, to committees making out club programs, exhibits of pictures have been kept up, written replies have been sent to persons in distant states, who have written requesting information to be found in the Historical Room and much assistance has been given to club workers and debate students. Not many additions have been made this year to this department but increasing use has been made of government publications, 2380 of which have been received and shelved. Many of these publications contain the latest possible information along lines like education, agriculture, health and economics. The room has been open 43 Sundays, being closed through July and August. The number of visitors was 601, an average of 14 each Sunday.

THE CATALOGUING.

To the proper cataloguing of new books, all the assistants contribute their share, but the work as a whole is superintended by Miss Morrill, who also looks out for the work of filing and binding periodicals, work demanding skilful oversight and accuracy. For the writing of cards a new typewriter is now needed. The life of a typewriter in offices and schools, where the machine has steady use, is reckoned to be from three to five years. Our last one was bought eight years ago and has been in constant service. That it has lasted so long speaks well

for the care taken of it, but it should now be given second place and a new one added for good grades of work.

THE LAW LIBRARY.

A part of the library comparatively little known is the law department, composed for the most part of books acquired from the estate of Frank Hobbs a well known lawyer of this city who died in 1891. The collection is shelved partly in the Trustees' Room and partly in the room adjoining. During this last summer the books have been reclassified and more carefully catalogued than had been possible when they were received. None of these books are modern, but some are still standard authorities, and a number are interesting from their age and character. Two bear the name of Richard Waldron as owner; *The County Justice*, bearing the imprint of London 1690, and *The office and authority of sheriffs*, London, 1682. Two large volumes, *Reports of Sir Creswell Levinz*, are printed in curious old English letters, and were published in 1702. There are the *Blue laws of Connecticut*, and a copy of *Acts and laws of His Majesty's Province of New Hampshire in New England*, to which is prefixed the *Commissions of President John Cutts, Esq.*, and *His Excellency John Wentworth, Esq.* The names of former owners are interesting; in addition to Richard Waldron, are Asa Freeman, W. Sawyer, Jeremiah Smith, William Hale, Francis King Atkinson, and Coke's reports are labeled, Theodore Atkinson, from the library of his grandfather. This collection numbers about 340 volumes, of which the most important and valuable now is the set of *New Hampshire Reports*. kept locked in the Science Room. This set was listed in catalogues some years ago at \$750 and is now almost impossible to obtain at any price. It is the part of the law department which has the most use though a few borrowers ask each year for some of the other volumes. Sometimes a tribute to its value comes back to the library

that would gladden the heart of the donor. Some years ago a young man of this city, working his way through college, began a systematic study here, during his vacations. Year after year he spent all his spare time in diligent work alone with these books. When he finally passed his bar examinations, he came into the library to say that he had been successful and added, "I never could have done it if it hadn't been for this library."

SOLDIERS' PICTURES.

The principal addition to the equipment this year has been the installment in the Trustees' Room of the case for the soldiers' pictures. In this case are now arranged 190 photographs, an interesting but by no means complete collection of pictures of Dover men who served in the world war. The complete record of names, 540 in number, is kept in the librarian's room, and is, as far as is known, the only record of the kind in the city. These pictures have always excited great interest and it is a credit to the library to have preserved them in fitting form.

NEED OF MORE SHELVING.

When this building was completed, 15 years ago, so much money had to be used for the actual needs of walls and permanent furnishings that it was decided that the shelving, which could be increased at any time, should be limited to the needs of about five years, and that future growth should be provided for when it was needed. By dint of crowding the space the library has made the shelving do for fifteen years, but the time has come when the shelves seem really overflowing. New shelves will undoubtedly be a matter of large expense at present prices, but it should be taken into account that provision for this need will have to be met before long, in order to take proper care of the valuable possessions now stored under this roof.

The librarian desires to express to the Trustees her appreciation of their counsel and their many evidences of personal friendship. She never draws an annual report to its close without a renewed sense of the dignity of library work and its wide possibilities for service among all classes of people, and she earnestly desires that it may never fail in ministry to old and young, rich and poor, sick and well, native born and foreign born, who make up the community that we all call home.

There has been 14,778 square feet of granolithic sidewalk put down during the year, at a total cost of \$3,737.22, apart from the cost of curbstone, and some sidewalks had no curbstones. The cost per square yard varied, but averaged \$2.28. There were 978 feet of new 6 inch x 18 inch curbstone bought and set, and 120 feet of old curbstone reset. Work maintaining the existing sidewalks was done on Sixth st., East Concord st., Kirkland st., Silver st., Waldron st., Prospect st., Washington st., Chestnut st., and First st. The cost of the new curbstone was \$850.37, and the total amount expended on sidewalks during the year was \$6,249.66. The Department has many names now on file of people who desired granolithic sidewalks during the year 1920, and the Street Commissioner hopes to be able to give all who

put in a request in time, a granolithic sidewalk during the coming year.

The total amount expended on the account of bridges during the year was \$1,226.62, of that amount \$1,113.74 was used in replanking Lower Washington St. bridges. We have six iron bridges in the city, Lower Washington St., Watson bridge at Waldron's falls, Whitcher's falls bridge, Central Ave. bridge, Washington street bridge, and the bridge at Sawyer's. All the above bridges should be thoroughly scraped and painted. The bridge at Fresh Creek requires a new concrete abutment, and quite an extensive fill to widen the approach on the west end of the bridge, this in addition to reinforcing

with new flooring timbers and new rails. A close estimate for the above work at Fresh Creek bridge is two thousand dollars.

There has been expended on sewers during the year \$2,639.30, as follows: Third street \$151.43, Sixth and Grove streets \$47.65, First and Chestnut streets \$57.63. Payne street for new sewer \$1,826.09, Locust street for new sewer \$246.29, and odd sewer work and supplies \$310.21. Both Payne and Locust streets are yet to be resurfaced, the ground not being sufficiently settled in 1920 to do this.

The City Engineer has made a detailed estimate amounting to \$11,619.96 as the sum necessary to relieve the flood conditions in the vicinity of the junction of Sixth and Grove streets. The damage by heavy rains to the people in this section is considerable, and follows every heavy rainfall. It is hoped that the solution offered by the City Engineer can be applied early the coming year.

The heavy snow storms from Jan. 17th to March 27, 1920, cost between those two dates \$7,741.95 for Dover as a whole, the outside districts costing \$3,749.74 and the city proper \$3,992.21. There was also expended in the outside districts \$2,998.85 for work other than for clearing the highways of snow.

The Commissioner cannot close this report better than by quoting from one of the best authorities in the country in the matter of highways,

“We have got to stop demanding the greatest possible stretch of roadway for each dollar expended and insist upon less mileage with the best of sub-grades obtainable. When roads carry loads without breaking up, real highway transportation will begin.”

MILK.

Accompanied by State authorities inspections have been made of barns, utensils and wagons used in connection with the production and sale of milk, and such recommendations made as the circumstances in the case seemed to require.

The enforcement of cleanliness in the care of barns, cattle, and utensils, as well as the application of the same principle to all who handle the product, is fundamentally necessary in order to secure desired results.

Samples of milk have been forwarded to the State laboratory at frequent intervals during the year, and with but two exceptions these samples show a very good quality.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the year field surveys have been made of Wil-land pond as well as of other sources of supply in which work the superintendent of the local water supply has generally participated.

Samples of water have been submitted to the State chemist and invariably the reports have been satisfactory.

SANITARY INSPECTION.

The work of inspecting houses, stores, schools, factories, etc., is an important part of the duties of the department. Suggestions for the further safeguarding of public health interest were offered where found necessary.

During the year various food products were found unfit for use and all such products were immediately destroyed at the incinerator.

ASHES AND REFUSE MATERIALS.

The collection of refuse materials during the year has been largely in excess of that of any previous year of which there is any record. The collection of ashes during the months of January and February established a

new high record and notwithstanding the severe weather regular collections were made until the blizzard on the sixth day of March temporarily suspended traffic.

During the year additional territory has been included in the collection area, and under present conditions the services of an extra man during the mid-winter months would materially strengthen the efficiency of this branch of the service.

CLINICS.

Convenient quarters in the Union block on Washington street are at present maintained by the Board of Health for clinical purposes. At these rooms the United States Public Health Service, (a branch of the United States Government National Program), the Public Health Service and the New Hampshire State Board of Health, opened, in January, a joint clinic for venereal diseases. The function of these bodies is to give proper examination, advice and treatment to patients afflicted with disorders of this class. These services are rendered at cost to those able to pay, or free to those who are not financially able to employ a physician.

Every person afflicted with venereal disease is a potential carrier of such disease, and a corresponding menace to the community.

A few of the patients applying for treatment were placed under quarantine as a precautionary measure. It was found necessary to enforce the restrictions imposed under quarantine regulations in some instances by legal measures, the violators in each case being sentenced to the Strafford County detention hospital.

The local chapter of the American Red Cross very generously furnished a nurse to assist the physician in charge of the clinic, also a social worker to follow up the cases and visit patients at their homes.

In the month of March after the customary period of

case-finding and survey work, which was conducted under the immediate supervision of Annie R. Provost, R. N., a tuberculosis clinic was opened at the local health headquarters by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association. Fourteen clinics have been held, and 268 patients examined. Of the cases examined 122 were advanced, and 146 were comparatively new. Over 100 persons have come under treatment who might easily have passed into the advanced stage but for the case-finding and clinical work of the association.

More than 750 visits have been made in the homes, either in case-finding or follow-up work.

This work is not restricted to Dover, although most of the cases examined were from this city. The records show 213 Dover cases for examination, twenty-eight from Somersworth, six from Rochester, thirteen from Rollinsford, two from Milton, two from Middleton, and four from outside the county, including Portsmouth, N. H. and Eliot and South Berwick, Me.

Corresponding work is going on in eight of the counties of the State.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES.

No disease has been placed on the notifiable list arbitrarily or by chance, but for some definite and well defined reason. It therefore behooves every physician to promptly report every case coming under this heading that the proper authorities may have early notice of the presence of such disease, not only in order that restrictive measures may be taken to protect public interests, but that the material welfare of the patient may be assured.

Care should be taken in reporting cases of this kind that the name of the physician making the positive diagnosis be given, together with the particular address of

the patient and the name of the person or persons under whose care the patient has been placed.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

I submit herewith my annual report together with the reports of the Headmaster of the high school, the School Nurse, and the Truant Officer. . . The customary tables programs, and vital statistics are included also.

TEACHERS.

Eighteen new teachers were elected during the summer vacation. Eleven of these were in the high school and three were among the teachers of special subjects, domestic science, manual training, and drawing. It is regrettable that so many changes should occur in one year. The desire on the part of the teachers to change to new positions seemed to be country-wide. Dover had a smaller percentage of change than some other cities in the state and many country towns lost all their teachers.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

The work of the elementary school teachers has been of its usual high order. Nothing less than this is likely to happen in a school system where the teaching is done by women who have natural ability, who have made teaching their life work, and who have had long, careful training and experience in the profession.

We have bought many new books during the year, but practically all of these have been supplementary reading books. There has been no adoption of basal texts in any subject for many years. There should be adoptions as early as possible in arithmetic and geography. The

arithmetics we are now using are out of print and new copies cannot be obtained. Our geographies are worn out and the time seems opportune for a change of books in this subject as almost all of the publishing houses are bringing out new editions because of the political and geographical changes brought about in Europe by the war.

The "B" subjects of our schools, namely thrift, gardens, patriotism, and health organizations, have become a permanent part of our school work.

Our teachers' association is now in its second year, and is doing excellent work along the several lines stated in its constitution. These are:

- (1) To promote the educational interests of the community.
- (2) To bring about closer relations between school board and teachers.
- (3) To safeguard the health and physical welfare of children and teachers.
- (4) To improve school buildings and their surroundings.
- (5) To make a thorough study of the state Programs of Studies for high and elementary schools. The Regulations of the State Board of Education, and the New Educational Law.
- (6) To co-operate with every other group of citizens for the promotion of education.

These objects and plans have been carried out by conference at the regular and special meetings of the three sections of the association. The only social feature of the year was a reception tendered the new teachers by the other teachers, and this was an occasion which will be remembered with pleasure by all who attended. I suggest that the objects enumerated above under (2) could best be accomplished by an unofficial gathering of teachers and committee once or twice a year for the purpose of discussing school matters.

COMMITTEE RULES REVISED.

The Committee Rules were thoroughly revised during the summer. Many obscure points were cleared up and all the changes made by vote of your board since 1911 were included in the revision.

EVENING SCHOOLS.

Our evening schools continue to be well patronized by our non-English people and by those desiring special instruction. We have five schools at present: two in the Sherman school, one in the Neighborhood House, one in the Pacific Mill, and one in the rooms of the School Committee at the City Building.

SUBURBAN SCHOOLS.

Commendable progress and improvement have been made in these schools during recent years. At the Lower Neck and Back River schools the out-buildings have been connected with the schoolhouses by cutting doors in the rear of the schoolrooms and building a covered walk between. The Committee on Schoolhouse Repairs have done a fine piece of work in both of these buildings, which are now more comfortable and healthful. The teachers' discipline and control have been strengthened materially by these improvements. There has been a noticeable improvement too in the school management and general morale of these schools. The rooms are clean and attractive, the children are alert and interested in their work, the teachers have won the respect and esteem of the parents by their faithful work. Music has been added to the program of these schools, and now they have the benefit of regular weekly instruction from the music teacher.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The high school has lost annually from its teaching force very few teachers until this year when the school opened the fall term with almost an entirely new corps of

teachers. Inevitably, the school at the opening suffered in some respects from this. It was a difficult matter for the Headmaster to organize and unify the work of so many new teachers, and, that Mr. Wallace has been able to do this within so short a period of time is a high testimonial of his ability as an organizer and administrator. His authority as disciplinary head of the school is thoroughly effective, and the records of his office are carefully and systematically kept. The teachers have worked hard to maintain the high standard of the school. They have succeeded in doing so.

The attendance record for the past year was 97 percent. The average for the state for the same period was 93 percent. The tardiness record was 1.4 percent compared with 1.6 percent for the state. The Work Reports show that the standards set by the State Department were exceeded in the following subjects: French, Latin Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, English History, U. S. History, Commercial Law Geography, and Mechanic Arts. There was a failure to meet the state standards in the following courses: English III grade IX, English IV grade X, English V grade XI.

The arrangements for preparing and serving lunch to the pupils are not altogether satisfactory, but are probably as good as the basement rooms will permit.

Our high school does not show up very strong in the number of girl graduates who annually decide to go on to normal school and become teachers. At the present time teachers' salaries compare more favorably than ever before with salaries in other lines of work and we may expect that hereafter more of these girls will choose teaching as their vocation. To recruit an adequate teaching force for the state at least 25% of our girl graduates should do so annually.

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL WELFARE.

The work of the school nurse has been well done and

I desire to call particular attention to her report. We have been singularly free from epidemics and the percentage of attendance has been high in spite of the unusually severe cold and stormy weather of last winter.

Very creditable work has been done along the line of physical training. The high school has had successful teams in basketball, baseball, and foot ball. They used Lothrop Memorial Hall for their indoor games, Central Park for baseball, and Towle Field for foot ball. Much healthy school spirit was aroused by these sports and I am sure that the boys who competed in them were greatly benefited thereby.

A grammar school baseball league was organized last spring among the boys of the public schools and our two parochial schools, St. Mary's and St. Charles'. This special athletic work calls for the highest commendation on the part of the teachers who supported it and carried it through successfully, and particularly on the part of Mr. Chester R. Hall who conceived the plan and contributed his time and services so generously. The boys from St. Mary's carried off final honors by winning the championship. The whole boy population of the city gained in health and good sportsmanship.

Recreational drills, songs, marches, and various exercises have been given in all the schools with a view to giving relief from long periods of sitting, to encourage proper breathing, induce better circulation, and renew mental and bodily vigor. Health talks by the school nurse and teachers have encouraged better health habits. We have distributed a great deal of the health literature of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company which has helped the cause of good health among the school children of the city, both public and parochial.

This is a brief survey of the health work (exclusive of the work of the school nurse) which is carried on at present as a part of educational program. It is a good beginning and shows the possibilities which lie immedi-

ately ahead of us along this line of education. The outstanding deficiencies of our present program of physical training would include the lack of the following:

- (1) Playground apparatus.
- (2) Organized plays and games at recess time.
- (3) Inter-class contests for the high school, inter-school contests for the grades, including field athletics, as well as baseball, basketball, and football, with leagues and teams for the girls as well.
- (4) Gym work for boys and girls.
- (5) Instruction in swimming and skating.
- (6) An annual spring field meet.
- (7) A paid Director of Physical Education who would give his entire time to the work.

Given a director of physical training, a large measure of the above program could be carried through successfully at once. To be sure, we have not in any of our schools a swimming pool, a bath, or a gymnasium; but the lack of these things could be made up in part by the use of various private halls. Our apparatus and other equipment could be made largely by the pupils themselves, and need not cost much in any one year. To my mind this is the one phase of education which has been neglected in our public school system. We appropriate no money for this and hire nobody to look after it. It is a vital question which must soon have attention. Physical training, as well as book learning, ought to be made a part of our public school education.

The conduct and administration of the schools has not been hampered in any way during the year but on the contrary, most cordial, intelligent, and painstaking support has been given by you as members of the School Committee despite your business and personal obligations; special appropriations, when needed, have been granted by the Mayor and City Councils; parents have borne patiently many necessary transfers of their

children to schools located at long distances from their homes: citizens generally have contributed materially to the cause of good school by their good will and sympathetic public opinion.

SIR:

I submit herewith my third annual report as Headmaster of the High School.

The attendance, during the fall term, is one of the largest in the history of the school. At this rate of increase, in a short time the present building will not furnish seating capacity for pupils below High School grade.

Parents should show greater interest in the education-

al welfare of their children. They should realize that the training of the past generation is no longer adequate to meet new conditions which have arisen as the result of a broader vision of the world and its needs.

New courses of study have been outlined, and introduced into our curricula, which are in keeping with the demands of the present. The increase in attendance in many of the high schools of the state and nation proves that the young people are anxious to better their condition in life.

In September a larger number of boys than usual enrolled in the Mechanic Arts department, with a view of entering some useful employment at the completion of their course in the High School.

The Federal Government, through the State Department at Concord, is granting financial assistance, under stringent requirements, to cities and towns which have adopted the Smith-Hughes program.

Those in Dover responsible for the education of the boys of High School age readily agreed to comply with the Government's plan that the young men who do not wish to obtain a classical or scientific training may pursue a program of studies which will fit them for some useful employment at the end of their secondary course of study.

Through the efforts of the school committee and other interested citizens additional space in the basement of the city building has been voted by the City Council for the accomplishment of this vocational work. Since the adoption of the new program, the entire time of two men has been required in this department to carry on the work. Under the efficient management of Mr. Dustin excellent results have been obtained.

In the case of the City Grammar Schools, it appears that only seventy-five percent. have, for various reasons, entered the High School. In one of the preceding tables, it has been shown that there are one hundred and seventeen pupils in the freshman class; seventy-eight of this number came from the city schools. The balance of the total number came from the surrounding towns, and from those families who have recently moved to Dover. The loss even of twenty pupils out of ninety, under existing conditions in our schools, is too large a percentage. Possibly through visitations to parents by teachers and interested citizens, the pupils who would naturally leave school at this period might be induced and encouraged to continue their education in some department of the High School. Such training as they would receive from further attendance would greatly increase their earning capacity, and tend to make better citizens of them.

The table below will give data relative to those pupils

who left High School, other than graduates, from June 1920, to September, 1920.

It is regrettable that this curriculum does not appeal to the young women. At the opening of school in September, the girls were urged to talk with their parents about the advantages of the Domestic Arts Course, but evidently they did not approve of it. The school is well equipped for this work. Teachers have been employed who are especially well prepared to give instruction in this department. Those interested in the educational needs of the community should give greater encouragement to this program. Excursions have been planned and made by the teacher and pupils as follows:

MECHANIC ARTS.

The Mechanic Arts program has been broadened and enriched since the last annual report, so that at present the course calls for $12\frac{1}{2}$ clock hours of shop work, and 6 clock hours of related subjects per week. The school week under the Smith-Hughes requirements must be approximately 26 hours in length.

COURSES OF STUDY.

There are six courses of study in the High School, so arranged that they give a reasonable range of choice to pupils who wish to prepare themselves for greater usefulness in the world. These courses have been approved by the State Department of Public Instruction at Concord.

At present the graduates of the Classical, Scientific and General departments, who receive 85 percent. in each subject, are entitled, on a certificate signed by the Headmaster, to enter certain Technical Schools and Colleges, and all of the Institutions connected with the New England College Entrance Certificate Board. In accordance with the law of the State all graduates may enter New Hampshire College.

CHOICE OF COURSES.

Parents and guardians should consult the program of

studies that their children may make a wise choice in the course to be pursued in the High School. Changes must necessarily be made from year to year that students may meet College and Technical School requirements.

HOME STUDY.

Every two weeks, notice of failure to meet requirements has been sent to parents and guardians. Lessons are assigned with the expectation that pupils will give reasonable time to the preparation of the daily work. Unless they do this, they cannot expect promotion in June. Good scholarship is the result of conscientious work.

Pupils who spend their afternoons in earning money are in no condition, at night, to prepare their lessons for the next day. Unless it is absolutely necessary to do this on school days, it would be to the advantage of both parents and pupils that greater attention be given to study. Pupils should devote, on the average, one hour's time, at least, to the preparation of each lesson for the following day.

PROMOTION.

Pupils will not be promoted if deficient in more than one subject, nor will they receive a certificate which will admit them to colleges on the New England Board, unless they attain a rank of 85 percent, in each subject. The demands upon the pupils are greater than ever before, and it is imperative that those students who enter the high school with the idea of preparing for college, technical school, or other institutions of learning, should do their best work from day to day with as little absence as possible. Pupils who have the best record of attendance usually exhibit the best evidence of progress.

A new system of marking, called the sliding scale, has been introduced. This means that a pupil must attain an average of 70 percent, in all subjects, with no mark below 60 percent., for promotion or graduation. Pupils who do not meet promotion requirements may take

studies for which they are prepared, in advance of their accredited class.

ABSENCES.

Absence from recitation will lower a pupil's standing, unless it is due to sickness, or to some other cause which may seem reasonable to the Headmaster. If the absence was unavoidable, the recitations or examinations must be made up with the teacher. Teachers will be present at the High School building one afternoon each week to assist students in this make-up work. Pupils must meet their appointments; otherwise, no credit will be given. The following is a requirement of the School Committee on attendance of pupils:

"In each case of tardiness or absence of pupils, teachers will require the pupil to present a written reason therefor, signed by the parent or guardian."

EXAMINATIONS.

At present four tests, occupying one recitation period each, and two formal examinations of two hours each, at the middle and end of the year, are required of all students. Pupils are forced to take a broader view of their work when they are obliged to study for a written review which covers a period of one-half year in any subject. Fragmentary tests are of little value as compared with real examinations. Many Colleges of high standing are unwilling to receive students who have not had practice in this kind of work. Since all colleges give formal written lessons for promotion, there is great need of such training and practice in secondary schools. In most of these institutions the result of the examinations is an important factor in the yearly rank. Since nearly one-half of the graduates, completing their High School work, enter colleges and universities, it is advisable that students give greater consideration to the requirements of such institutions.

TUITION PUPILS.

In the year 1918-1919, forty-seven were enrolled in the High School; in 1919-1920, thirty-eight attended; this year forty-five entered, a slight increase over last year.

The location, curricula, and character of work in the school should be a special inducement to parents of adjacent towns, which do not support a High School, to send their children in still larger numbers.

DRAWING.

At present a very small percentage of the student body, in the Academic department, takes this work. Possibly it is due to the fact that no one is required to pursue the subject. However pupils who choose either the Scientific or Domestic Arts Curriculum should, at least, take Mechanical Drawing as it will be of inestimable value in their High School and College work.

ATHLETIC.

The students have shown much interest, during the past year, in football, basketball, baseball, and hockey. In most cases, since they understand that they must attain a certain rank in their studies in order to participate in such activities, athletic contests have not tended to injure scholarship, but on the contrary have served to stimulate the boys and girls to do even better work.

The pupils of any well regulated High School with a full program need some form of physical exercise, and although the majority of them are not represented on the various teams, yet, through an interest in the contests, they are anxious to attend the games. In this way all or nearly all members of the school have an opportunity to share in good healthful exercise. Those, engaged in the education of the young, claim that diversion is necessary that good results may be attained.

Parents and citizens should give this feature of our educational system greater consideration that money may

be provided for the various forms of athletics which, under proper management, tend to contribute so much to the health of pupils in the School.

PRIZES.

For several years it has been customary to present a trophy in June to that class in the High School which excelled in scholarship. The trophy this year was won by the class of 1920.

The Perkins Gold Medal for excellence in oratory was awarded Ursula Verona Dondero, 1921; the second prize was won by Helen Rita Hughes, 1921.

A prize has been presented annually in June to that member of the graduating class who prepared and submitted to a committee the best original essay on "The Principles of the American Revolution." The medal for the school year, ending in 1920, was awarded to Una Constance Whittier.

TEACHERS.

At the close of the school year in June the entire teaching force, with the exception of the head of the Mechanic Arts Department, decided to withdraw, in most cases, to accept more remunerative positions in larger cities. However, the Superintendent was able to secure new teachers, with less experience, but who have, under the circumstances, filled their respective positions with good success.

The personnel of the teaching force is an important factor in any department of the Public School System.

Since this is true, a salary should be paid which will retain in service only those teachers who, by training and experience, show special aptitude in their individual departments to carry on their particular line of work. Unless teachers are interested in the welfare of young people, they cannot expect to get good results in their work. No one should enter the teaching profession who is unwilling to sacrifice self for the physical, moral, and intellectual development of the students with whom they come in contact.

The teachers should feel that their time belongs to the student body. This does not relieve the parents and other interested citizens. There should be co-operation on the part of pupil, teacher, and parents, that the best results may be obtained.

DEFICIENCIES.

Deficiencies, at the end of the year in June, may be made up by comprehensive examinations, before the opening of school in September.

The Headmaster with his corps of assistants will meet such students at the High School building on Saturday, 8.30 A. M. before the opening of the fall term to prepare and give examinations to those students who are anxious to receive promotion.

On the same date the Headmaster will be in his office to meet parents and others who may wish to consult him as to courses of study best adapted to the tastes and needs of their children.

It is very difficult after the opening of the school to change from one curriculum to another; consequently, parents should have a definite idea of the subjects which will best prepare their sons and daughters for work after graduation.

In conclusion I wish to thank you for your hearty and

loyal support in my work, the parents and other citizens for their cooperation, the School Committee for its sound counsel, and the teachers who have assisted me in the instruction and discipline of the school.

Tuberculosis, under supervision ten, of whom seven are negative, two incipient, one latent. Children who are more than 10% below normal weight, and who show any indication of tuberculosis, are referred to the Tuberculosis clinic, for examination, and kept under supervision until their condition warrants dismissal.

There is a great need of a Dental clinic. Dental defects cause more ill health than any other one thing, and the teeth should be cared for, from infancy through life.

We held an Orthopedic clinic at the Wentworth Hospital April 28, 1920. Twenty patients were examined by Dr. Ezra Jones, Orthopedic Surgeon of Manchester, N. H. Dr. Jones was assisted by Elizabeth Murphy, R. N., Supervisor of Health for the State Board of Education. Fifteen of the twenty have had more or less follow-up treatment. The remaining five are still under supervision, and will have treatment later.

It would be true economy to have special classes for the backward and deficient children who repeat year after year. The approximate cost for each child this year was \$70.59. The non-English speaking children are making good progress, and are being advanced as fast as possible.

The Classical curriculum fits for an academic course at college and for normal schools. It should be chosen by those who wish to be lawyers physicians, clergymen, teachers, and the like.

The Scientific curriculum fits for a scientific course at college. It should be taken by boys who wish to become civil, mechanical, and electrical engineers or to do other similar work.

The Commerce curriculum fits for their work clerks, cashiers, bookkeepers, and stenographers. It is the curriculum for those who wish to engage in any form of mercantile or clerical work.

The Mechanic arts curriculum trains artisans. It is for those boys who are to do skilled mechanical work. Under this head come plumbing, steam fitting, drafting, and mechanical and electrical work.

The Domestic arts curriculum trains for the work of the home and for normal schools. It is for the election of girls who wish to become nurses, dressmakers, milliners, and teachers, and for those who desire a thorough knowledge of the activities of the home.

The Modern language curriculum offers a larger choice of subjects than do the other curricula and is open to pupils whose aim is a high school education, rather than a training for any particular object.

Pupils admitted to the high school, with the approval of their parents, must elect one of the above curricula and take for graduation all the subjects therein. Changes from one curriculum to another may be made only by making up all branches included in the chosen curriculum. The work of any curriculum may be completed in four or more years and extra studies may be taken only with the principal's consent, approved by the superintendent.

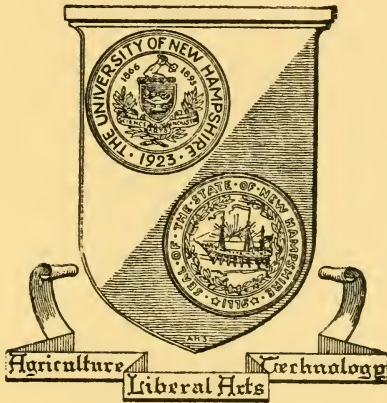
