

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

GRAFTON S. S.

TOWN OF ENFIELD

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Enfield Elementary School in said Town of Enfield on the Fourth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will open at ten A.M. and will not be closed before eight-thirty P.M. Articles in Warrant will be taken up beginning at six P.M.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot to serve for five years; one member of Board of Adjustment, to serve for three years; one Selectman, one Library Trustee, one Town Clerk, one Treasurer, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Fire Ward, two members of Recreation Commission, to serve for two years; one Selectman, one Auditor, to serve for one year; one Highway Agent, and one Overseer of Public Welfare.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, the sums so borrowed to be repaid before the end of the fiscal year in which the debt was incurred.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or lease any or all parcels of real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed for non-payment of taxes, or any or all parcels not in public use; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver, in the name of the Town suitable deeds or leases of such real estate, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may decide.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote that if the purpose or objects, hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year 1975 may have been made, have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year, the funds so appropriated or unexpended on the unfinished portion of such object, shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the purpose or object of its conception,

until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents of the Town shall have the opportunity or occasion for fulfilling or completion of the purpose or objects for which said appropriation was created.

The specially designated purposes are as follows: That net earnings of Town equipment derived from highway appropriations, also Police Cruiser, Civil Defense appropriations, Municipal Building Fund, Sidewalk Construction Fund, Tax Mapping Fund, Ambulance Fund, Bi-Centennial Committee, Whitney Hall Renovation, Huse Park, Historical Records Vault, Conservation Fund, and the Municipal Water Department.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand one Hundred seven dollars (\$1,107.00) for Town Road Aid, and to receive the sum of Seven Thousand three hundred seventy-seven dollars and nineteen cents (\$7,377.19) from the State.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive in the name of the Town such gifts, advances, grants-in-aid, Federal Revenue Sharing Funds or other funds for any Town purposes as may be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other Federal, State or local agency or person.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to transfer to a Conservation Fund at the end of each fiscal year the unexpended balance of funds appropriated to the Enfield Conservation Commission for said year.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will recommend to the Mascoma Valley Regional School District that the School District adopt the provisions for absentee ballot for the election of school district officers.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Overseer of Public Welfare beginning at the 1976 annual Town Meeting, to serve for a period of one year.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against Budget Appropriations in the amounts indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make Pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in the capital reserve fund for the acquisition of a tax map for the town.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in the capital reserve fund for the acquisition of an ambulance for the town.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town of Enfield agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town of Enfield will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Enfield Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town of Enfield will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector and fix his compensation, pursuant to N.H. RSA 156.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town of Enfield will vote to approve the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, certain areas of Enfield are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers and lakes, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood (and/or mudslide) hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter el, 36, 156, 156A,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby:

- 1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
- 2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
- (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

- (c) Co-operate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and co-operate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- 4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.
- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Code as proposed by the Enfield Planning Board under the provisions of RSA 156, a copy of said Code being attached to this warrant.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town of Enfield will vote to approve the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, the Town of Enfield has adopted and is enforcing the Enfield Building Code, Land Use and Conservation Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations, and

WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Building Code prohibits any person or persons, firm or corporation from constructing, reconstructing, or establishing any preconstructed building or edifice, including mobile homes, except those mobile homes moving into licensed mobile home parks, on any plot of land in the Town of Enfield without first obtaining a written

building permit from the Building Inspector, and

WHEREAS, the Building Inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction in the flood hazard area when application is made to him for a building permit,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Town Meeting of Enfield, N.H., as follows:

- 1. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to assure that (i) all proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
- 2. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to require new or replacement water supply systems and or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the system into flood waters, and require onsite waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding, pursuant to N.H. RSA 36:21.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund all monies in the Sewer Study Fund and authorize the Selectmen to expend the same in conducting a Phase One Facilities Planning Study for a sewage disposal system and to authorize the Selectmen to execute the necessary contracts to complete the study.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the City of Lebanon in regard to conducting a Phase One Facilities Planning study for a sewage disposal system.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote:

- A. to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the City of Lebanon to accept Enfield's solid waste for disposal and to further instruct the Selectmen to contract for the collection and transportation of solid waste to Lebanon, N.H.
- B. To raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) to cover the cost of Section A above and
- C. To authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund all of the "Town Dump Fund" for use in bating preparing and closing the existing Enfield Town Dump.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Municipal Building Fund Capital Reserve Account, and appropriate said monies for the following purposes:
- 1. To hire appropriate consulting services for the preparation of preliminary drawings, specifications and cost estimates of not less than two nor more than three feasible alternatives for the resolution of the space needs of town government.
- 2. To hire other consultants (surveyors, cost consultants, engineers, etc.) as may be required to assist in the work.
- 3. To purchase options, temporary easements or other interim action to protect the town's interests in the proposals developed above.
- 4. To pay other incidental costs related to said study and for the presentation of final proposals to the town at public hearings, and at a SPECIAL town meeting to be held not later than October 1, 1975 for action on said proposals.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) to cover the cost of constructing a town Historical records storage facility, any unexpended balance to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the Renovation of Whitney Hall, Insulation, storm windows and painting; or act thereon.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire an administrative assistant who shall act as an assistant to the Selectmen and to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for said purpose.

ARTICLE 26. Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty-eight Dollars and forty-three cents (\$5,768.43) to purchase service credit for Francis LaBounty under the New Hampshire Policemen's Retirement system for the period from July 1, 1959 to March 1, 1967".

ARTICLE 27. Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters: "To see if the Town will vote to maintain a portion of the West Canaan Road from Lockehaven Road in a northerly direction past the house of Stuart Blain a distance of approximately 1100 feet to a point northerly of the driveway leading to the house now owned by Rebecca Pleasant on a year-round basis".

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$22,900.00), (Eleven Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$11,450) reimbursed from the Development Grant) to cover the cost of building two tennis courts and one multi-purpose court at Huse Park, as part of the expansion of the recreational facilities; and to authorize the Selectmen to submit applications for an outdoor Recreation Financial Assistance Program Grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund for the park development project.

ARTICLE 29, To see if the Town of Enfield will vote to have the Selectmen appoint the Highway Agent annually beginning at the 1976 Annual Town Meeting, instead of being elected at Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote as follows:

- A. To instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of not less than five (5) members, to be known as the Bi-Centennial Committee, to serve in preparing for Enfield's participation in the National 1976 Bi-Centennial Celebration.
- B. To instruct the Selectmen to release from Capital Reserve Fund the balance in the Bi-Centennial Fund for this committee's use.
- ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget and raise and appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, or act thereon.
- ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town of Enfield will vote to approve the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, that there continues to exist within the state a serious shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations at rents which elderly and low income persons can afford, and that such persons are forced to occupy sub-standard dwelling accommodations; and

WHEREAS, the General Court of the State of New Hampshire has enacted Chapter 204-Aof the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated establishing the New Hampshire Housing Commission; and

WHEREAS, Section 9 of that Act provides that in a municipality where there is no local housing authority operating, the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the governing body of a municipality; and

WHEREAS, said Section 9 provides that consent of the governing body must be given for each project; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, is authorized to enter into annual contributions contracts with public housing agencies pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Town Meeting of the Town of Enfield, Grafton County, State of New Hamp-shire as follows:

That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Enfield, Grafton County, State of New Hampshire.

That said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof; (a) existing standard housing; (b) rehabilitated housing; (c) newly constructed housing; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed fifty dwelling units.

ARTICLE 33. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or any other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

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REPORT OF THE ENFIELD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the year the Enfield Conservation Commission held open meetings the first Tuesday of each month in the Town Hall. Bylaws were adopted and Olivene Cummings was elected co-chairman with Robert Hewitt, Kaye Mirski was elected secretary. Ken Wheeler and Everett Poitras were welcomed as new members of the Commission. The Commission has met with the planning board, Zoning Board of Adjustment and Selectmen on several occassions to co-ordinate the responsibilities of the Shaker Mountain Conservation District and the Class VI Roads ordinance. With the help of the town clerk and town historian the Commission was able to discover and verify twelve Class VI Rds and to post them with Conservation signs. Members of the Commission attended the Conservation Workshop on November 16, 1974 and displayed maps of the Shaker Mountain Conservation District and the ClassVI Rds.

In addition, the Conservation Commission has checked out and processed applications for dredge and fill and has initiated plans to co-ordinate use of the Class VI Rds with the Recreation Commission.

The \$750 Ford Foundation Grant, plus \$250 of the Conservation Commission's money and \$250 of the Planning Board's money was matched by the United States Soil Conservation Service for soil survey of a portion of the town.

MUNICIPAL BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Enfield Building Committee was formed in October 1974 to analyze the 'Municipal Building Study for the Town of Enfield, New Hampshire", prepared in the spring of 1974 by the Upper Valley, Lake Sunapee Council and to make recommendations to the Town of Enfield for action on said study. The Municipal Building Study was prompted by the dispersed, inconvenient and increasingly busy interrelationship of the various town offices. At present only the Selectmen have office space in a public building. The Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Treasurer work in their homes. The police have no office space at all and there is no suitably safe storage area for town historical records. As a result of recent library expansion, there are now no available meeting rooms for the various town boards and committees. Despite library expansion, library space is still basically inadequate. While it is true that occasional meetings do take place on the second floor and in the basement of Whitney Hall, the spaces themselves, in their present condition are not particularly suitable, or accessible. Nor are they accessible for the kinds of town services that require frequent and even daily public contact. Whitney Hall has not received the extensive care, maintenance, or updating of mechanical and electrical systems that would have, over the years, permitted the offices of the town to easily expand into the space available.

The Study prepared by the Upper Valley, Lake Sunapee Council estimated that the Town required 2,100 square feet of space for town offices; 3,200 square feet for the library and 200 square feet for Historical Record storage. The total area required, including public space, mechanical rooms, maintenance, etc., to conduct the above activities was estimated at 6,450 square feet. UVLSC presented four options available to the Town.

1. Construct a new building to contain Town Offices, Library and Post Office (the latter was meant as rental space) cost \$385,000.

- 2. Construct a new building to contain Town Offices and Library--cost \$282,000.
- 3. Construct a new building for Town Offices only. Convert 6,121 square feet of Whitney Hall to Library space--cost \$258,000--\$274,000.
- l. Renovate Whitney Hall for Library and Town Offices cost \$223,000--\$238,600.

In addition the UVLSC proposed seven sites, public and private for a new facility. No determination could be made with respect to the availability of private sites for purchase however, since the UVLSC was not in a position to secure options on the sites in question. The Enfield Building Committee has attempted to review, as thoroughly as possible each option and each site proposed by the UVLSC report. Given the state of the economy, the potential expenses facing the Town with respect to school expansion, sanitary landfill, and sewer and water systems, the committee felt that it ought to search for a practical interim solution, one that would meet current needs as well as provide for future growth, and be affordable to the community. The options which the committee felt would require the least expenditure of funds and yet meet our current requirements seem to be the following:

- A. 1. Partially renovate basement of Whitney Hall for Board and committee rooms (1,200 square feet).
 - 2. Purchase land and dwelling for site of future Municipal Building, renovate existing dwelling for interim Town Offices. Estimated project cost-\$90,000.
- B. Renovate first floor of Whitney Hall for Library, (1,400sf). Renovate basement for Town Offices (2,700sf), construct parking area at rear. Estimated project cost-\$93,000.

- C. Construct new building for Town Offices only (3,000sf). Estimated project cost-\$166,000.
- D. Construct new building for Town Offices (2,000sf). Renovate basement of Whitney Hall for Town Conference and Meeting Rooms. Estimated project cost--\$167,000.

The four options briefly outlined above would gather existing municipal offices in one location, provide for fire-proof storage of town records, and through consolidation, provide for a more efficient Town Government. Options A, B and D include partial renovation of Whitney Hall. Ideally, perhaps, Whitney Hall should be given extensive attention, completely winterized, painted inside and out and made as functional and attractive as it was in the early part of this century. Due to the present economic situation however, the Building Committee felt that the best recommendation would be to simply make a start in the right direction.

The committee wishes to point out that none of the above alternatives include any work on the second floor assembly area of Whitney Hall. The idea was advanced that at least a minimum amount of work might be done in this area. The committee believes that with an expenditure of approximately \$28,000 the second floor assembly area can be rehabilitated to look aesthetically pleasing, and a rear stairway can be constructed that will be useable and fire safe.

Assembly Hall rehabilitation \$12,000 \$16,000 \$28,000

For a number of years the Town has set aside funds for the construction of a New Municipal Facility. If this year's allocation is approved, the amount on hand will be \$45,000, plus interest. The Building Committee would like to take its work one step further and, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, be given the authority to hire an architect to prepare design drawings, specifications,

and cost estimates to either renovate Whitney Hall or construct a new facility as outlined above. We would like to have the opportunity to make formal presentations, at subsequent public hearings, of realistic options open to the community and ask that the Town express its approval or disapproval at a special Town Meeting to be held later in the year. Therefore, we would like to ask the Town to proceed as above and request that the sum of \$10,000 be allocated from the Municipal Building Capital Reserve Account for the purposes outlined and for legal work, surveying, and the purchase of options on property that might be used for easements or for future building. Once the proposals are completed, the Town will have the opportunity to make a well informed choice on available options.

REPORT OF THE ENFIELD PLANNING BOARD 1974

As a result of action by the March, 1974 Town Meeting, membership of the Planning Board was increased from 5 to 7 members. Charles Cummings. Dimitri Gerakaris and Francine Lozeau were appointed to the Board. Michael Alafat, Jr. resigned as of May 1 and was replaced by Derek VanWyk. Dimitri Gerakaris resigned as of October 16 and was replaced by Raymond Aldrich. Twenty-one meetings and two public hearings were held by the Board in the 12-month period January-December 1974. Following authorization voted by the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1974, the major project of the Planning Board was the preparation and adoption on 15 October 1974 of subdivision regulations for the Town of Enfield. The very helpful technical assistance of the Upper Valley/ Lake Sunapee Council in this effort is gratefully acknowledged. In order to broaden the base of citizen participation in Planning Board activities, sub-committees have been established for continuing review of the subdivision regulations. The chairman of each subcommittee is a member of the Planning Board, with the balance of the membership composed of non-Board members. The two sub-committees activated in 1974 are the Sub-Committee on Streets and Drainage and the Sub-Committee on Soil Test and On-Site Sewage Disposal. Preparatory to updating the Master Plan for the Town of Enfield, and also to assist in evaluating subdivision proposals from the standpoint of suitability for building purposes, the Planning Board, in cooperation with the Enfield Conservation Commission, negotiated a contract with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service to carry out soil surveys of 5000 acres of land in Enfield. This survey was begun in the fall of 1974 and is scheduled for completion in the spring of 1975. When this is done, a total of 11,000 acres, or approximately forty percent of the total area of Enfield, will have been completed. Additional areas will then be selected for survey as part of a contin-

uing program.

Phase I of the street sign program was completed with the purchase and installation of 15 street signs. An additional 11 signs have been ordered and will be installed in 1975.

Nine trees were planted to replace shade trees that had been removed because of disease.

In December the Planning Board took the first steps necessary if the Town of Enfield is to qualify under the National Flood Insurance Program. A committee consisting of one Board member as chairman and two non-Board members was formed to identify, and prepare a preliminary map of, flood hazard areas and to draft proposed regulations for building in such areas.

In addition to routine administration of the subdivision regulations, the Planning Board's program for 1975 includes continuation of the soil survey program, continuing review of and possible amendment of the subdivision regulations, keeping informed on and attending hearings on proposed N.H. State Land Use legislation, further work on preparing materials needed to qualify Enfield under the National Flood Insurance Program for presentation to the March 1975 Annual Town Meeting, and the updating of the Master Plan.

REPORT OF THE UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL 1974

It has been extremely beneficial for the Town of Enfield to belong to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council this past year. The Council has undergone a period of rapid growth and we now operate in a truly regional sense and in friendly cooperation with twenty-one other towns. While each town has its own pressing problems, it does not exist in a vacuum. Many of its neighbors face some of these same problems, or a neighbor's solutions may cause it problems. Many problems are by their very nature regional, and economical or otherwise satisfactory solutions can be obtained only by a regional approach. This is where a regional planning program can help, working with and for local communities to seek solutions to these common problems. That is the continuing mission of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. This year has seen a major staff turnover in the Council. but we shall be able to complete most of our work program plans on schedule. Enfield has participated in the Solid Waste Management Study which has resulted in negotiations with the City of Lebanon to use their land-fill facilities upon the mandated closing of the Enfield dump in July 1975. Other activities included workshops in Lebanon and Newport on subdivision and tax mapping which were attended by your representatives; invaluable assistance to Enfield town officials in preparing the subdivision regulations; handling our Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Grant; coordination of the Enfield-Lebanon Waste Water Disposal Project to clean up Mascoma Lake and River; and assistance in interpretation of the National Flood Insurance Program requirements and preparation of materials to present at Town Meeting in March, 1975. We wish particularly to note that the joint Enfield-Lebanon Waste Water Disposal study committee was ably chaired by Walter Furlow who gave so unselfishly and unstintingly of his time and effort to improve every aspect of this town. His intelligent handling of our problems, keen insight, analytical ability and leader-

ship will be sorely missed by the Council and by the Town of Enfield. One of the last projects Mr. Furlow worked on was the Staff Personnel Manual Committee and we consider it fitting to use his words, quoted from the Manual prepared by this Committee, which so aptly describe the Council's work: "The Council is a voluntary association of communities located in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Region. It is concerned. primarily, with the development of comprehensive plans for beneficial and balanced economic, environmental and social growth in the region. It functions, also, as a research, resources and informational agency and, when indicated, acts to obtain Federal, State and other approvals, grants-in-aid, loans and similar assistance, for individual member Towns and for the Region."

"The Council is directed by a Board consisting of two Directors appointed by each member community. It is the basic responsibility of these directors to develop and promote the regional needs of the communities they represent and to interpret and implement regional policies and projects at the community level."

Your representatives have taken a very active part in the affairs of the Council. Mrs. Schmanska serves as Secretary and member of the Executive Committee and as Chairman of the Budget and Work Program Committee. Dr. Charles Cummings was appointed to serve as a Director, succeeding Mr. Furlow, and will also serve on the Budget and Work Program Committee. Although many problems in addition to the ones on which we are currently working will face the Town of Enfield in the future, we firmly believe that 1974 has been a year of solid achievement and that the Council will be a strong force in effecting solutions in 1975. Enfield is fortunate in being one of the original members of this organization.

REPORT OF ENFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR 197L

The calendar tells us another year is past and we pause to review our accomplishments, and plan even greater achievements.

The circulation's growth is evident. In 1974 our total output was 11,372, this included books, magazines and records. There are also 30 or more new borrowers over last year. There are a number of reasons for this: new readers, new books in every division, more student cooperation and a greater interest in many fields. There have been over 400 new books purchased, a gift of three large shipments were received from Amity Junior High School in Orange, Conn. covering all areas of study, and last but not least many beautiful non-fiction editions. A silent reading race was continued among the younger group with gift certificates to the two outstanding readers. We worked with the Town Recreation Committee in their various fields of endeavor. The study table is a popular place to work on school assignments, and if we lack any materials, the State Library and Inter-Library loans have augmented ours.

The Book Mobile has called twice, allowing us to choose selections in all fields for all ages, whatever needed. We have been happy to send many of our duplicate books to the Dorchester, N. H. Library. This is a small unit, trying to grow, but working with a limited budget. We were in that position once.

A few shut-ins and Senior Citizens have been served with books as a public service.

In the Fall it was decided to add the G.A.R. room, now commonly called the Legion room, to the library. An archway similar to the one in the front of our rooms was cut by volunteer labor. Then wall bookshelves were built and a new dream became a reality. The first room on the front was changed to accommodate the younger people. This includes picture books, easy reading stories, low tables with small chairs (which they seem to love) their own children's records. One part or corner of the main room holds the intermediate books, both fiction and non-fiction. The opposite side of the room, parallel to the corridor

holds all kinds of materials-encyclopedias, magazines, records, etc. for Junior and Senior High pupils. The new room is entirely devoted to adult reading. Here are found the newest fiction, older standard fiction, new and older non-fiction in all subjects, mysteries, westerns, large print books, biographies, bookmobile additions and paper backs. There are chairs convenient for anyone who wishes to stay awhile to browse or read.

We were happy this year to augment our budget by \$100.00 from the State Library as a reward for our compliance with all their recommendations.

Here I'd like to thank all those men, young Legionnaires, friends of the Library, members of the Trustees who have worked so hard to help organize our new look.

This is only a meager summary of what has been keeping us busy. Now we hope you'll come in and see for yourself what changes have been made and what we may be able to do to help you, or just to look.

We welcome any comments or criticisms.

REPORT TO TOWNS

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Varden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

MASCOMA AREA HEALTH COUNCIL Summary of Services for Town Reports January 1, 1974 to December 31, 1974

The Council, established at the Town Meetings in 1969. will start its seventh year of service this year to Canaan, Enfield, Grafton and Orange. Serving a population of 5,200 the Council's two nurses (each working half time) provide nursing service in the home and a complete health promotion and disease prevention

program.

The free monthly Well Child Conferences are now serving a fluctuating clientele of between 185 and 200 children (preschoolers). Under this program, which is supported in part by the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health, N. H. Division of Public Health, each child regularly receives a full physical examination, all necessary immunizations, and tests for vision and hearing. Parents are seen with the children. problems are discussed, and if necessary the child is referred for further treatment. The Council's nurses make follow up visits when needed. For any child who will not see a private physician the Council provides the full physical exam necessary for entrance to kindergarten or first grade, together with tests for vision and hearing. It is also under contract to supervise the health of the children in the Headstart program.

Nutritionists are available at each clinic, and are also available to adults needing help on dietary matters. A representative of Planned Parenthood is also available for counselling when needed. Preventive dentistry is taught to both parent and child. In 1973 and 1974 the Council, in cooperation with local physicians and The American Cancer Society, offered to area women a free testing program for cancer. 91 area women were tested at these clinics, and the need shown for further medical treatment was so great that the Council hopes to make these clinics avail-

able semi-annually.

In May of 1974 the Council, in cooperation with the

State Department of Health and the Council on Aging, offered a free Health Screening Clinic, at which 150 local adults were offered testing for diabetes, glaucoma, blood pressure, oral cancer, and vision and hearing. In addition, height and weight were checked and information and advice offered on many subjects of interest. Testing and advice on foot problems was given, and testing for various functional neurological defects. It is hoped that such clinics can be offered annually. It is interesting to note that in this one clinic the Council benefitted from the donated services of 10 doctors, 1 Medex, 20 nurses and 40 lay volunteers.

The Council derives its support from the four Towns served, each of which contributes annually on the basis of its population, and on fees, Medicare and Medicaid where applicable. While we must of necessity set a charge for services other than the free pre school clinics and other free clinic services, the services of the Council are available to everyone, regardless of ability to pay that charge. Our nurses at present are Mrs. Gertrude Clark, R.N. of Grafton and Mrs. Toni Sadowsky of West Lebanon. During the year 1974 they have made almost 1,500 visits to area residents for nursing service, health promotion, counselling or support.

The Council is governed by a volunteer board of directors elected from the four Towns, and its medical policies and practices are supervised by a Medical Advisory Board consisting of area physicians and nurses.

The Council maintains its office in the Health Room at Mascoma Valley Regional High School, with its own telephone (632-7234). It is heavily dependent on, and most grateful to, the Methodist Churches of Canaan and Enfield and the School, which provide space for its clinics and meetings, and to the school for its office space there. A pamphlet describing the Council and its work and service is available on request. Its monthly meetings (first Monday evenings at the School) are open to the public, and visitors and volunteers are welcomed.

REPORT OF THE ENETELD RECREATION COMMISSION

With the end of 1974, the beginning of our Recreational Center at Huse Park is now visible. With the help of volunteer labor, the storage building with outside pavilion has been built, and the baseball field graded. In the spring toilets will be installed in the building and a leach field constructed; also the kiddie playground will be finished. All of the above will be paid for out of our initial \$8,000 request (\$4,000 of which will be reimbursed from Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds). Equipment to completely outfit the kiddie playground has been purchased and paid for in the last two years.

Our summer program was again ably administered by Ms. Betsy Christy, assisted by Mrs. Donna Largent and a part-time helper. We also had the services of two Neighborhood Youth Corpworkers and some input from the Mascoma Outreach Program in the form of counselling the Youth Corpworkers. Our director met several times with the child psychologist from Outreach to discuss problem areas. There was an all-time high registration of 155 children in the morning program and 165 in the afternoon swimming program.

For the first time the Commission employed a life guard at Shakoma Beach. The life guard also assisted Ms. Christy in teaching swimming during the afternoon program. This summer we hope to build a small life guard tower, the need for which became very evident last summer. We also installed a pay telephone at the beach which was of great assistance to the life guard for quick contact of the police or if

need be, an ambulance.

During late winter 1974 registration for our ski program was initiated and 50 children enrolled and purchased memberships for the Storrs Hill Ski Area. The week after Christmas we provided bus transportation to Lebanon so that the children could participate in the "Ski Week" held at Storrs Hill. During Christmas vacation we hired Thomas McGonis to open the elementary school gymnasium every day to enable children to use this facility. In December we also held our Annual Christmas Party which was attended by over 300 children who enjoyed cartoons, a magician and candy canes distributed by Santa.

We look forward to completing the Huse Park Development in 1975 and sincerely appreciate the support given to us by the taxpayers of Enfield. To complete the Development, we plan to build two tennis courts and one multi-purpose court. The townspeople should reflect on the article in the Warrant which provides funding for these courts. Considering the present state of the economy, people might feel that we should build just one tennis court and the multi-purpose court this year; or possibly only the multi-purpose court and postpone the building of the tennis courts until next year. Either of the above options would be for a lesser amount than that proposed in the Warrant article. During Town Meeting when this article is considered, we would like to have a full discussion on the pros and cons of all the alternatives. It was the feeling of the Budget Committee and the Selectmen to present this article in its full amount and have the voters make the final decision. Finally, the Commission deeply regrets that Arthur Demers will be leaving us. He alone is responsible for the tremendous success of our winter ski program; he also helped to plan and erect the storage building and pavilion at Huse Park. He will be sorely missed!

- C. Penalty. The penalty for violation of this ordinance shall not exceed \$100 for each offense and/or lot. Each week's continuing violation of this ordinance after notice of violation has been given shall be deemed to be an additional offense.
- D. Separability. Each and every provision of this ordinance shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision. If any provision or section thereof is deemed invalid the remaining sections or provisions of this ordinance shall stand.


