Hampton Falls Town Meeting, March 4, 1975, was called to order by Moderator, Richard Bohm, at 10:00 a.m. The salute to the flag was given by those assembled. The warrant was read by the Moderator and the ballot boxes opened and inspected by those present. The polls were declared open by the moderator at 10:17. Donald Janvrin moved to adjourn the business meeting to Saturday, March 8 at 7:00 p.m. The motion was seconded by Frank Ferreira. Motion carried. Donald Janvrin moved that the polls close at 8:00 p.m. on March 4. Seconded by Frank Ferreira. Passed.

The polls were declared closed at 8:00 p.m. by the Moderator. It was determined that 477 votes had been cast with the following results:

Donald Janvrin motioned that the meeting be adjourned to March 8 at 7:00 p.m. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

The adjourned meeting of the Hampton Falls 1975 Town Meeting was opened by the Moderator, Richard O. Bohm, at 7:00 p.m.

The Moderator ruled that:

- 1. Once an article taken up in the budget or in the warrant is finished, no further action may be taken on it with the exception of one reconsideration in case of error or misunderstanding.
- 2. There will be a limit of 2 amendments to any article or any motion or part of a specific article.
- 3. Any lengthy motion shall be submitted to the Moderator in writing.
- 4. The Chair will recognize first, a sponsor of any article or item in the warrant.

Article 2 - Budget

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for Town Officer's Salaries. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,900 for Town Officer's Expenses. Passed.

Jerome Healey moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for Election and Registration Expenses. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 for Town Hall and Other Town Buildings. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200 for Insurance. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$200 for planning and zoning. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for Damages & Legal Expense. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Jerome Healey moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Care of the Clock. Donald Janvrin seconded the motion. Passed.

William Marston moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the Health Department. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$75 for Vital Statistics. Brian Hammond seconded the motion. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Ambulance. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Daniel DeWitt moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the Town Dump. Frank Ferreira seconded the motion. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,634.83 for Highways-State Subsidy. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000 for Town Maintenance - Summer and Winter. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

William Marston moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$850 for Street Lighting. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate \$10,000 for General Expenses of Highway Department — Seal Coat. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Marie Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,760 for Libraries. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Town Poor. Brian Hammond Seconded the motion. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$2,000 for Old Age. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$175 for Patriotic Purposes. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed

Jerome Healey moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for Parks. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

William Marston moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for Cemeteries. Seconded by John Carroll. Passed.

At this point Moderator Richard Bohm appointed George Vigneau as Moderator protem.

Richard Bohm moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,303 for the Seacoast Visiting Nurse Association. Seconded by George Merrill. Passed.

Mr. Bohm then took over once again as Moderator.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$871.20 for Advertising and Southeastern Regional Planning Association. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,100 for Principal and Long Term Notes and Bonds. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,460 for Interest — Long Term Notes and Bonds. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Interest on Temporary Loans. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Articles 3 through 6 were voted upon by ballot. Article 7 - Two sessions for Annual Town Meeting

Donald Janvrin moved that the town adopt the following question: Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual Town Meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officials elected by official ballot and other action to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the Selectmen, for transaction of other business? Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Article 8 - Towle Farm Road Bridge

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,866.00 for Hampton Falls share with joint application from Hampton for the reconstruction of bridge no. (Hampton No.) 096/108 on Towle Farm Road (total cost of reconstruction if \$138,000.) Seconded by Richard Swain. Passed.

Article 9 - Revenue Sharing Fund

Donald Janvrin moved that the town vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

Article 10 - Contract with Rockingham County Sheriff's Department

Jerome Healey moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,300 for Police services, whereby the town will sign a contract with the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department to provide a deputy on a fulltime basis and supporting services, as required, for a period of one year at a cost of \$13,300 plus \$2,000 for miscellaneous police expenses such as gas, oil, and local police support, and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency for partial funding of the Deputy Sheriff and related police equipment. Seconded by George Merrill. Passed.

Article 11 - Withdrawal of funds

Jerome Healey moved that the town vote to authorize the withdrawal of funds from the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency for use as set-offs against the appropriation for the police budget. Amount is \$12,-700.00. Seconded by George Merrill. Passed.

Article 12 - Town Forest

Goerge Merrill moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to continue the Capital

Reserve Fund for the acquisition of a Town Forest. Seconded by Mark Kelley. Passed.

Article 13 - Volunteer Fire Department

William Kenney moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,296 in payments for services to the town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Seconded by Robert Woodes. Passed.

Article 14 - Town Road Aid

Donald Janvrin moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$356.70 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$2,377.97. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed

Article 15 - Painting the Library Exterior

Gordon Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 to paint the outside of the Library. Seconded by Mark Kelley. Passed.

Article 16 - Hampton Youth Association

Frank Ferreira moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the Hampton Youth Association. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Article 17 - Bicentennial Celebration

Brian Hammond moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the Bicentennial Celebration to be held in 1976; also authorize the moderator to appoint a six member steering committee to work with the selectmen in the planning and conducting of the festivities.

Article 18 - Seacoast Regional Office of Child and Family Services.

Barbara Carlson moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the Seacoast Regional Office of Child and Family Services of New Hampshire, a private charitable organization. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Article 19 - N.H. Seacoast Regional Development Association

Donald Janvrin moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 to help support the N.H. Seacoast Regional Development Association. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Did not pass.

Article 20 - Hampton Falls Conservation Commission

Robert Dutton moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to cover the annual expenses incurred by the Hampton Falls Conservation Commission, including the annual dues of \$35.00 in the N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions, which in previous years has been paid directly by the Selectmen. Seconded by Mark Kelley. Passed.

Article 21 - Youth Conservation Camp

Robert Dutton moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210 to pay the fees for two Hampton Falls youths to attend the Youth Conservation Camp to be conducted in June, 1975 under the supervision of the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests. Seconded by Mark Kelley. Passed.

Article 22 - Town Cemeteries

Donald Janvrin moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to enlarge town owned cemeteries. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Article 23 - Seacoast Counseling Center

Brian Hammond moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Seacoast Counseling Center. Seconded by Donald Janvin. Passed.

Article 24 - Hampton Area Crisis Home Program

Barbara Kinsman moved that the town vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$50 to be donated to the Hampton Area Crisis Home Program. Seconded by Sally Cox. Passed.

Article 25 - Town Dump

Daniel DeWitt moved that the town vote to prohibit the dumping of stumps at the town dump. Seconded by Frank Ferreira. Passed.

Article 26 - Resolution

Frank Ferreira moved that we pass over Article 26 as it was voted upon last year. Seconded by Daniel DeWitt. Passed

Article 27 - National Flood Insurance Program

Donald Janvrin moved that the article be passed as read. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Passed.

Article 28 - Borrow money in anticipation of taxes

Brian Hammond moved that the town vote to give

the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Passed.

Article 29 - Other business

Frank Ferreira proposed the following resolutions:

- 1. Be it resolved that when this meeting is adjourned it be dissolved in the memory of Alphonse J. Lemire, long-time resident and dedicated worker for the town.
- 2. Many who serve positions in town government often receive little, including thanks, for their service. The town takes this opportunity to thank George Avins for 20 years of faithful service as a supervisor of the checklist.
- 3. The Town of Hampton Falls, in Town Meeting, assembled extends very best wishes to assistant librarian, Martha Batchelder, on this, her birthday.

Resolutions seconded by Daniel DeWitt. Passed.

Cynthia Trumbull nominated Dick and Bonnie Cote as Hog Reevers for the ensuing year. Seconded by Robert Davies. Donald Janvrin ruled that the nominations be closed. The Cotes were given the oath of their office by the Town Clerk.

Donald Janvrin moved that the meeting be dissolved. Seconded by Brian Hammond. Meeting dissolved at 9:37 upon approval of voters present.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the Second day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year

ensuing.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make ap-

propriations of the same.

- WARRANT ARTICLE: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident sixtyfive years of age up to seventy-five, a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years of age up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or with his spouse with whom he has been living for at at least five years as man and wife: said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of thirty-five thousand dollars?" WARRANT ARTICLE: "Shall we provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).
- 5. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town of Hampton Falls will vote to create, establish and maintain a Town Mosquito Control District, under provisions of RSA 437-A of New Hampshire State Laws. The boun-

dary of the district shall be the boundaries of the Town. The goal is to eliminate breeding sites for mosquitoes. Joint efforts with neighboring towns will be encouraged. Any Town Mosquito Control District Funds will be part of the proposed budget to the governing body of the Town of Hampton Falls.

- 6. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3 Agricultural-Residence ("A District") to read:
- 1. Single dwellings (deleting the present sentence which reads "One additional dwelling may be constructed and occupied as long as the owner of the property occupies one of the two units." This will be taken up in the following #13 conversion.)

13. Conversion:

A single family dwelling existing as of 1 January 1976 may be converted into two dwelling units subject to the following:

- a) the owner of the structure occupies one unit
- b) at least 650 square feet of interior floor space is available for each unit
- c) off street parking is available for four automobiles
- d) no additions to the overall exterior dimensions shall be made
- e) no accessory buildings shall be used for dwelling space

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

7. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to add to Article III, Section 4, the following sub-title:

Supplementary Regulations for All Districts

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 8. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the town will vote to add to the Building Regulations, Section VI Structual Requirements, the Following:
 - (13)a. "No subdivision of land will be approved where it creates a lot that will not meet the minimum standards imposed by the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and the requirements listed below unless connected to a municipal sewer system.

1. Test pits and percolation tests shall not be performed during the period from July 15th to

September 15.

2. Sufficient test pits shall be dug to insure than an area of 20,000 contiguous square feet is present on the proposed lot with a natural soil depth of six feet to bedrock. This area shall not be used for buildings, wells, or other permanent structures but reserved for septic effluent disposal. If such an area is not present, the lot will be disapproved.

3. Any soil with a seasonal high water table at the natural ground surface or within two feet of the natural ground surface shall not be used for the dis-

posal of septic tank effluent.*

4. The bottom of the tile in a proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching pit shall be a minimum of 6 feet above any seasonal high water table.*

5. Any soil with a percolation rate of over 30 minutes per inch shall not be used for the disposal of

septic tank effluent.

6. Any land area having a natural slope of 15% or greater shall not be altered or used for the disposal of septic tank effluent.*

* Fill may be added to meet the standards imposed by 3, 4, and 6 above but may not be added to correct for any other

above listed conditions.

All subsurface sewage disposal systems must be designed and constructed in accordance with the most recent edition of the manual on "Septic Tank System of Sewage Disposal" as published by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

9. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to add to the Building Regulations, Section VI Structural Requirements, the following:

(13)b. The observance and approval of all tests and constructions herein named shall be performed at the convenience of the Town Planning Board or its agent.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

10. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to add the following to Article X Definitions of the Zoning Ordinance so that it will now read:

Private. Personal use of property by owners of record. When admission fees are charged, the use ceases to be private.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 11. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to change Ariticle III, Section 4, B Yard Requirements of the Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:
 - B. Yard Requirements
 - 1. In Agricultural-Residence District ("A District"), each structure shall be set back at least 50 feet from all lot lines, or at such distance as shall conform to the front lot line of existing buildings on adjacent property. Lots of record 40,000 square feet or less are exempt from this requirement and each structure thereon shall be set back at least 25 feet from all lot lines.
 - 2. In Business District ("B District") each structure shall be set back at least 25 feet from all lot lines.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 12. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to change Article III, Section 4 D Accessory Uses 3. of the Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:
 - D. Accessory Uses
 - 3. Any accessory use in Agriculture-Residence District ("A District") housed in a separate building shall be set back at least 50 feet from all lot lines and not exceed 25 feet in height. Lots of record 40,000 square feet or less are exempt from this requirement and each structure thereon shall be set back at least 25 feet from all lot lines.
 - 4. Any accessory use in Business District ("B District") housed in a separate building shall be set back at least 25 feet from all lot lines and shall not exceed 25 feet in height.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

13. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Hampton Falls Pipeline Code pertaining to oil, gas, and petroleum, as proposed by the Planning Board.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

 - 14. Schools for not more than 10 pupils per session (Recommended by the Planning Board)
- 15. WARRANT ARTICLE: To see if the Town will vote to amend Article III, Section 3 Agricultural-Residence District ("A District"), A Permitted use, No. 2 to read:
 - 2. Public buildings, public school, public park or public recreation area

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

16. WARRANT ARTICLE: On petition of Kenneth S. Pelton and 21 registered voters of the Town:

To see if the Town will vote to ammend Article II, Section 2 Zoning Map to read: The Business District on the Zoning Map is declared to be 300 feet in depth from both sides of Route No. 1. Lots of record exceeding 300 feet in depth may be used for business to a limit of 500 feet in depth.

(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to create a special committee to be known as the "Town Office Site Investigation Committee", consisting of three persons appointed by the Moderator, and report back to the Moderator and Selectmen within nine months from date.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Three Hundred Forty Two (\$17,342.00) Dollars for Police Services, whereby the Town will sign a contract with the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department to provide a Deputy on a full-time basis, and supporting services as required, for a period of one year at a cost of Fourteen Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Two (\$14,842.00) Dollars plus Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for miscellaneous police expenses such as gas, oil, and local police support, and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency for partial funding of the Deputy Sheriff and related police equipment.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1975

Early in the year the townspeople were saddened by the death of the Executive Secretary of our Commission. Jack Chesterman who had worked so energetically toward the establishment of a Town Forest for the future use of the townspeople will be greatly missed. A number of donations were received in his memory and have been placed in the Town Forest Capital Reserve Fund. This was a fitting response and will assist in making this goal a reality.

The annual Town cleanup was conducted in April. In June the Commission partially sponsored a girl at the Spruce Pond Conservation Camp. In October, commission members met with representatives of State of N.H. Recreational Services to be updated on current procedures relative to land acquisition procedures and availability of matching funds. In December, we voted to oppose the granting of Public Service Co. of N.H. Variance request to store construction equipment and excavated tunnel material on land in Hampton Falls off Brimmer Lane.

After the collapse of negotiations for the Town Forest land outlined in last year's report we have turned our efforts to other areas in the town. At present, substantial progress is being made toward acquisition of a 110 acre parcel containing a small stream and beaver dam.

Our financial situation continues to be quite favorable due to availability of matching funds through the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation; a recent extension of the Ford Foundation Grant matching funds now totaling \$1,523.99; and the continued support of the townspeople to the Town Forest Capital Reserve Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SOUTHEASTERN NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

As in the past years, the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission has provided advice and assistance to the Town Planning Board on matters related to the town zoning ordinances. Currently numerous legal and engineering considerations are involved with any new development and the Commission staff is available to provide such assistance to the Planning Board.

This past year the Commission has joined with two other Commissions to form the Strafford - Rockingham Regional Planning Council. This move was ordered by the State. We do not like this arrangement, but to date the operations of our Commission have not been changed. Therefore we look forward to the same assistance as we have received in the past.

With the myriad of development proposed in the Seacoast Region, membership in this Commission has enabled us to keep abreast of these matters and allowed us to investigate the effects on Hampton Falls. We feel that our time and the Town's money has been well spent.

During our fiscal year July 1, 1975 through June 30, 1975, 222 calls were made in Hampton Falls. Of this number 118 were made free of charge or at a reduced fee. It is the policy of the agency to scale fees or provide services on a no-charge basis to those patients unable to pay. In addition to Skilled Nursing Care, the services of our Physical Therapist were utilized by several Hampton Falls residents.

At present, 14 children from Hampton Falls are being followed at our Well Child Clinic. They are seen on a regular schedule for physical examinations, immunizations, counseling, blood tests, developmental testing, vision and hearing screening, urine tests and lead screening. In addition to the above, we now hold two Dental Clinics each year for children between the ages of 3 and 6 who are enrolled in the Well Child Clinic. Dental Hygienists employed by the state clean the children's teeth, apply topical fluoride and X-Ray those who may need further dental treatment. These children are then referred to a local dentist for treatment at no cost to the families.

The agency continues to work with the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center with the Aftercare Program and also with the state-sponsored T.B. and Crippled Children's program.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampton Falls:

I submit, herewith, my annual report for the Hampton Falls School District.

In my report for 1974 I expressed the hope that we would return to a more normal economic situation. Such has not been the case. Inflation creates probliems in purchasing for the District and also in reimbursing District employees who are faced with increased living costs. It may well be that normalcy is a continued spiraling of costs.

In an effort to maintain and to increase staff effectiveness an instrument for evaluating classroom teachers has been developed by Mr. Sanborn and other supervisory union administrators. As of this writing this is in the hands of all school board and certificated staff members for their reaction. It is my intention to present a plan to the combined school boards of Supervisory Union #21 before the end of the present school year to be effective as policy in September of 1976.

The Supervisory Union Staff Development Plan has been accepted by the State Department of Education and is in the process of being implemented. The concept has been developed at the State level with the intent of improving instruction locally by giving the local school superintendent more authority in the periodic recertification of staff members. We still have a long way to go to make the Plan functional.

Changes in state special education laws have necessitated that the Assistant Superintendent spend almost all of his time in that area. The major responsibility has now been returned to the districts and as of December of this year Dr. Anderson will be involved in what he was hired for — curriculum analysis and development.

The completion of the addition to the Lincoln Akerman Schools has enabled your School Board to house all students enrolled in grades one through eight in one

facility. The new plant is a fine addition and hopefully will answer your elementary school enrollment needs for many years to come.

Ever since I was in high school in the late 40's I have heard that the public schools of America have failed us. It went from the capabilities of recruits and inductees in World War II to Sputnik and now to the economy. The answer in these past twenty-five years has been "return to the R's" and more "discipline."

It is my experience that we have never left the "three R's" and actually our youngsters are doing better in reading, writing and arithmetic than ever before. They are doing this with better trained classroom teachers and better materials while at the same time facing increasing pupil population requiring expanded curriculum offerings to meet new needs.

Discipline has changed as society has changed. The schools have had to cope with more permissiveness at home, different laws and court rulings, less stringent requirements to get into college. Values are rapidly changing in our society as a whole and in our families in particular. Many of the conflicts manifested by our children through their actions at school and at home are the result of these value changes. Together, parents and teachers may help each other understand these changes in order to allow progress to go on intelligently. This can only happen if there is a continuing dialogue between them.

On the next page are enrollment figures for all schools in Supervisory Union #21 as of December 31,1975 and numbers of certificated and non-certificated staff members in the Union.

The task of formally educating your children is shared by you, the Hampton Falls School Board members, the staff at your school, and personnel at the Supervisory Union #21 office. I thank all for their efforts and assure you the job is being well done.

HAMPTON FALLS SCHOOL DISTRICT SUMMARY FACT SHEET ADDITION TO THE LINCOLN AKERMAN SCHOOL

Residents of the Hampton Falls School District met at a special school district meeting on December 14, 1973, and voted to construct an addition to the school and to raise \$402,797.00 for that purpose.

Architects: Irving Hersey Associates

General Contractor: Adrien A. Labrie, Incorporated

The addition consists of three classrooms, a library, a multi-purpose room (gym/cafeteria) a kitchen, locker rooms and rest rooms. Some remodeling of the original building was accomplished to provide an office for the principal and to increase storage space.

The bond issue in the amount of \$400,000.00 sold to the low bidder, the Shawmut National Bank of Boston at 6% on a 10-year term.

State Building Aid will pay the School District 30% of the annual principal payment or \$12,000.00 each year for the term of the bond issue, or a total of \$120,000.00.

The total construction costs under the General Contract were \$401,864.00 and the total area of new construction was 13,840 square feet, resulting in a cost per square foot of \$29.03
