

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year and to vote to see if beano shall be legalized in Hancock.

No recommendation necessary.

1.A To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to advise the Commissioners of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways that the Town wishes to have Route 202 by-pass the village of Hancock. Affirmative vote is for a bypass. Negative vote is against a by-pass.

No recommendation.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Recommend approval of the budget as printed.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.

Recommend that \$100.00 be raised and appropriated.

4. To see if the town wishes to purchase an all wheel drive one ton pick-up truck complete with snow plow for the highway department, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action and that a limit of \$3000.00 be raised and appropriated.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred ninety-one dollars and one cent (\$691.01) for our 1957 share of the T.R.A. Nubanusit Road or take any action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the maintenance of the bathing beach, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend \$600.00 be raised and appropriated.

7. To see if the Town will vote to run a water line from the last hydrant on Depot Street to a point opposite the residence of Gilbert Smith, if and when building begins, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

No recommendation.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the fire hose reserve fund or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to build a wall and lay out driveways in Hillside Cemetery or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Week or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend \$400.00 be raised and appropriated.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend \$100.00 be raised and appropriated.

12. To see if the Town will vote to set up a reserve fund for purchase of town equipment, raise and appropriate or transfer from use of equipment receipts for same or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend further study.

13. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to restoring to the Town through its Board of Selectmen, the full responsibility for and the jurisdiction over the Town History Committee. Thereby relieving the Hancock Historical Society of any further responsibility, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town History Committee to publish the 1889-1959 section of the Town History in 1959 or 1960, raise and appropriate money toward the cost of this publication or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action and that \$500.00 be raised and appropriated.

15. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the repairs in the Town Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend that \$150.00 be raised and appropriated.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to have the State Tax Commission re-assess the Town, raise and appropriate money for same or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend unfavorable action.

17. To see if the town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statues Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

Recommend favorable action.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the 1957 expenses of the Planning Board or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend that \$75.00 be raised and appropriated.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to complete the purchase of land around Juggernaut Reservoir or take any action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action and that a limit of \$400.00 be raised and appropriated.

20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes paid within thirty days after date of bill or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

21. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with 5% discount on water rentals which has been allowed in the past, or take any action relating thereto.

No recommendation.

22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a rotary mower for use in the cemetery, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action and that \$80.00 be raised and appropriated.

23. To see if the Town will vote to establish and maintain, through the Road Agent, boxes of sand and salt mix at points of need for motorists' use or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend no action.

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Trustees to spend thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300.00) already appropriated for a library heating plant for other purposes other than that of the original appropriation, or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept a triangular piece of land 64' x 86' x $81\frac{1}{2}$ ' owned by Lloyd Briggs, adjoining the cemetery on the west side of Stoddard Road. This land to be added to the original cemetery. Part of it to be reserved for Lloyd Briggs lot, the rest to be divided and sold as individual lots, or take any other action relating thereto.

No recommendation.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the Town or take any other action relating thereto.

Recommend favorable action.

28. To hear reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen or take any other action relating thereto.

No recommendation necessary.

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

No recommendation necessary.

Your Town Dump

Use it freely

Care for it

Your town dump has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place where you can dispose of the large amounts of dangerous, inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around your household and local stores, brush, etc., cut on your property. The town dump has become a valuable and indispensable asset in modern community life.

The most successful town dumps are supervised, regular days provided for their use and inflammable material consistently burned. The town dump which receives no attention, where waste material is scattered about without supervision of any description, soon becomes a community menace and a liability rather than an asset.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your town dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you, personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises.

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden, the law requires it. The warden won't refuse you if conditions are safe.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty.

Use your dump freely. Help keep it safe.

HANCOCK 1956

In summer quite a few visitors set up their easels at one or another spot on our main street, more look at their light meters and adjust their cameras for a shot at one of the last remaining "typical New England towns." Mostly we don't pay much attention to them for this has been going on for years.

But in 1956 we had reason for taking another look at main street ourselves. The reason being the 202 controversy which was not resolved, merely discussed. In case a hundred years from now 202 is not readily identifiable let us say that it is the North-South highway and let us say further that the question of straightening it up or rerouting it caused concern to Charlie Gleason's garage, to Otis Wilder's service station, to Phil Engstrom's tool shop, to Joe Quinn's stand ,to Balfour's import shop not to speak of many others who live on the residential section.

What's going to happen? That is for another year. The Men's Club, which by the way, came into existence in February, presided over by Earl Hamilton, had a meeting where various proposals were studied with representatives from the State Highway Department. Many citizens were there aquiver with desire to preserve our beautiful village and at the same time support progress necessary in a fast moving age.

How things change and how Hancock keeps up with the times is suggested by the eight Volkswagon acquired by such citizens as Bill and Ruth Sheriff, Bud and Dodo Daniels, Mavis Rutledge, Pat Holsaert, George and Harriet Hampson, Betty Gunther, Tiny and Joan Rollins and Peter and Mary Garland. This was the year when the miniature German cars first disturbed, in a very minute way, the mighty American auto industry.

Another change this year—the Meeting House and Town Hall were equipped with a new heating plant burning oil. This replaced the wood burning furnaces which go back beyond the memory of anyone now living. This change was one of the items voted at the regular Town Meeting in March which also elected, in addition to Town officers, Delegates to the Republican National Convention in San Francisco choosing those backing the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket. In November 418 of the 484 on the Check List turned out to vote and they gave Eisenhower 358 votes to 61 for his Democratic rival. Still a Republican town.

While Town Meeting Day was relatively mild suggesting that winter was nearly over a few days later came a series of snow storms long to be remembered. It really did pile up and was in no hurry about going away. As for the ice in Norway Pond it didn't go out until May 5th. Benny Quast, consulting the late Harry Sheldon's note book, reported that the ice averages to go out April 12, the latest date previously recorded was May 2, 1840.

Even those who in 1956 celebrated 50th wedding anniversaries—Robert and Anna Homan, Fred and Violet Wilder and Earl and Cora Otis—had to admit it was a good old fashioned winter in a good old fashioned way. So would Marg Perry, who was feted by her neighbors on her eightieth birthday.

Nothing was strange about the summer. Old Home Day came and went with accustomed splendor. It was even written up this year by the New York TIMES as a feature and contained the line, "Everything will be simple and homely and honest..." The article went on to say: "Hancock is worth a visit no matter what day of the year you may be near it. For here is not a reproduction of a restored New England village but the real surviving thing, one of the loveliest of them all, still living and breathing naturally...."

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK

Annual Meeting Hancock School District

March 10, 1956

At 1 p. m. the polls were opened by the Moderator, Robert English, for the purpose of voting on the first four articles—the election of district officers. Preceding the voting, the warrant was read by the Moderator.

Mrs. Alice M. Brown and Mrs. Bessie Hanson assisted as ballot clerks.

At 8.00 p.m. the Moderator declared the polls closed and he proceeded to again read the warrant to those assembled to vote on the remaining articles.

Article 5. It was moved by the School Board that the salaries of the District Officers be as follows.

School Board Chairman	\$50.00
Each Other Member	30.00
Treasurer	20.00
Clerk	15.00
Moderator	1.00 per hour
Auditors	1.00 per hour each
Ballot Clerks	1.00 per hour each

This motion was passed without discussion.

Article 6. A motion by the School Board that the reports be accepted as printed, and placed on file with the Clerk, passed unanimously.

Article 7. Mr. F. R. Hutchison declined to serve as auditor for the coming year. Mr. Herman Schlicting and Mr. Arthur Tremblay were elected.

Article 8. The following motion was made by the School Board:

Moved: That the School District raise and appropriate \$33,678.00 and to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board exclusive of State Aid, and upon the determination of the amount of State Aid to be received by the School District during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from State Aid and with the School District Clerk, certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the Town for School purposes.

After some discussion Mr. Dillon offered an amendment to increase the total budget to \$39,000.00, to include \$3,000 for the salary of an additional teacher, \$250 for increased transportation, and \$2,065 for building improvements.

More discussion followed, then Mr. Christopher Adams suggested that if Mr. Dillon would withdraw his amendment, Mr. Adams would increase the requested appropriation to include the items in Mr. Dillon's amendment.

The amendment was withdrawn and a motion to change the amount of \$33,678.00 to \$38,378.00, which amount includes \$3,500 for an additional teacher, \$1,000 for repairs, and \$200 for transportation, passed.

Article 9. Motion presented by School Board: Moved: That the School Board be authorized to accept the transfer of the land and buildings, and other assets of the Hancock Educational Association, in the event such transfer is authorized by the Superior Court of the State of New Hampshire.

After a short discussion, this was voted in the affirmative.

At 9:30 p. m. a motion to adjourn passed, was rescinded, and a vote passed to recess the meeting to permit the counting of ballots.

At 10:20 p. m. the meeting reconvened and the Moderator announced the following results:

For Moderator: Robert English with 114 votes out of 132.

For Clerk: Adella C. Eva with 169 votes out of 171.

For Treasurer: Errol Simonds with 101 votes out of 127.

For Member of School Board for three years: C. Stuart Bradley with 115 votes out of 170.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

B. PROGRAM AND METHODS

In September school started with an enrollment of 59 children. There were 8 children in grade one, 8 children in grade two, 8 children in grade three, 9 children in grade four, 10 children in grade five, 4 children in grade six, 6 children in grade seven, and 6 children in grade eight.

Some new textbooks have been added including the new science book for grade five "Exploring Science" and "The English Workshop" series in grades seven and eight.

A safety patrol was activated this year and in connection with this a special program was conducted in conjunction with state safety officials to give recognition to the patrol.

Regular visits to the town library were conducted under the supervision of the teaching staff in order to develop the habit of using the library and to acquaint the children with the use of the library.

An Audubon group in grades seven and eight did some work with the group at the Crotched Mountain Hospital.

A planned program of educational films did much to enrich the curriculum at all levels.

Planned social activities for the boys and girls included a Halloween parade and party for the whole school and special activities for the junior high school children under the supervision of Mrs. Rutledge. The Christmas program was a highlight of the year and was a demonstration of the careful planning and work which the teachers, children and cooperating parents put into the program.

In the area of music, rhythm band instruments were provided for the children in the lower grades, and Mr. Bartlett has been working with the children to help develop rhythm through the use of the instruments. He also has organized a chorus group in grades five, six, seven, and eight. Two pianos were donated to the school this year, providing an instrument in each room.

Mr. Miller has done much to develop the art program in the

school. A demonstration of this was the exhibition of art work in the school during National Education Week.

A new tape recorder was purchased for the school which is a great aid to instruction.

Due to the reorganization of the Elementary School and the addition of another classroom, Mrs. Elizabeth Weston was added to the staff as teacher of Grades three and four. Mr. Gerald Miller replaces Mr. Donald G. Bostrom as Art Supervisor, and Mr. Neil S. Bartlett replaces Mr. George W. Breakwell as Music Supervisor.

A new system of reporting to parents was adopted in November. The new report card forms explain in more detail the progress of the children.

B. HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

A DAY WITH THE HELPING TEACHER

BY ROBERT L. FILBIN

Monday morning starts bright and early for the Helping Teacher as it does for any teacher. At breakfast his head is full of things that are to be accomplished or worked on during the week.

Between eight and nine o'clock he is at his desk in the Supervisory Union Office to see what correspondence and telephone messages are to be answered. There are letters concerning an appointment for a child at Winant House which must be confirmed, another requesting copies of report cards shows that other people are interested in improving their marking system; here's one asking for a rating of a teacher who was employed in his school system the previous year. Here's a note from a teacher in one of the outlying towns requesting that the Helping Teacher bring supplementary materials for pupils in her class when he visits her school the next day.

The office secretary has noted calls from the school nurse who wishes to discuss a problem in health education-another from a teacher at a neighboring private school looking for information on the handwriting system used in the supervisory union schools and one from a parent requesting a conference regarding her child who is having problems with his reading. When these have been dispatched with there is a nine o'clock appointment at the local high school with the principal and two shop teachers to discuss requisitions for supplies and the course of study for the shop classes. This lasts until 10:15 when the Helping Teacher is scheduled to visit a fifth grade class to observe a reading group at the request of the classroom teacher to listen to two particular children read. The teacher has been puzzled as to what to do about these children who had not been developing as she had hoped they would and she would like his advice as to what to do about them. At eleven he drops into the classroom of a new teacher to see how she is making out with her teaching and classroom management. He observes the teacher, takes time to make some comment and suggestions and then it is time for lunch. Today he will eat with the high school principal and the math teacher who wants to talk about a special project she would like to start. After lunch he is scheduled to visit an elementary school in an adjoining town for general observation. Here he visits, talks with the principal, the teachers, the boys and girls-observing the work that is being done and answering questions which the teachers have. He is scheduled to meet with these teachers at the close of school, but time out at three o'clock to have a cup of coffee in the teachers' room and to talk informally about the day's work. They have been working on an evaluation of their school curriculum under his supervision. This is the second meeting and three teachers present reports on their teaching activities. These are followed by group discussion and evaluation and suggestions for the next meeting.

By this time it is four forty-five—time to check in at the office to sign correspondence, look at the afternoon mail and have a chat with the Superintendent about the day's observations. The day ends at five o'clock or sometimes after—no—there's a special school board meeting this evening. That may end at nine or perhaps eleven.

The days are varied but for the main part are made up of events as described above.

The Helping Teacher reads and studies to keep abreast of current trends. He participates in community activities and takes the opportunity to meet and talk with the parents and citizens of the community. He works with representatives of the press to help acquaint the public with the good things that are going on in the schools he serves.

In addition to making contributions to the literature, preparing bulletins and other publications for use in the schools, he makes evaluative studies and conducts experimental projects in the schools with the improvement of instructional practices in mind.

Constantly the Helping Teacher is moving among teachers and principals. He is aware of the problems which face teachers and he must be prepared to help them find solutions to these problems. That is his job. Births Registered in the Town of Hancock, N. H., for the Year Ending December 31, 1956
