RESULTS OF THE 1982 LITTLETON WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the ninth day of March, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three-year term, a Town Treasurer for a one-year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the public library for three-year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a threeyear term, a Moderator for a two-year term, and one Supervisor of the Checklist for six years. (Ballot vote)

The following Town officers were elected:

Selectman - Wayne P. Golden Treasurer - Christine Latulip Park Commissioner - Meg Miles Tilton Moderator - Gerald H. Winn Supervisor of Checklist - Thelma Girard Trustee of Trust Funds - Joseph W. Delisle Library Trustees - Stephen Dignazio, Kathleen Pancoast, and Robert J. Pavlick

Article 2. Are you in favor of repeal of the zoning ordinances as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town? (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3, 39:3-c, and 31:63-c.) (The Planning Board disapproves.) (Ballot vote)

This article was defeated - 918 to 429.

Article 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town as follows?

FSTABLISH SPECIAL EXCEPTION FOR TEMPORARY DWELLING OF RELATIVES, DEPENDENTS OR EMPLOYEES WITHOUT SUBDIVIDING IN RESIDENTIAL AND RURAL ZONES AND WITHOUT ZONING CHANGE IN COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL ZONES:

Amending (Square brackets indicates matter to be deleted, underlined text indicates matter to be added)

1. Table of Use Regulations, page 12, Littleton Zoning Ordinance, a new line reading:

2. ARTICLE XIV, Definitions, page 16 of Littleton Zoning Ordinances a new definition reading:

14.35 Temporary Dwelling of relatives, dependents or employees. Any structure separate or attached, which: meets dwelling habitability standards; is sited in conformance with set-back, space, and other relevant standards in Littleton Zoning Ordinance; is used to temporarily provide rent free housing for relatives, dependents, or employees of the property owner in a situation where subdivision or a zoning change is undesirable is reviewed annually by the Littleton Planning Board to insure compliance with all provisions of the exception; and shall be removed or converted to a permitted use at the end of the approved occupancy or prior to transferral of the property.

(The Planning Board disapproves this amendment.) (Ballot vote)

Article 3 was defeated - 826 to 374

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town as follows:

ESTABLISH MOBILE HOMES AND MANUFACTURED HOUSING IN ZONES RESIDENTIAL 1 AND RESIDENTIAL 11 AS A USE PERMITTED BY RIGHT.

This adjustment amends Line 5 in the Table of Use Regulations, Page 12 of the Littleton Zoning Ordinance to read:

Single Mobile Home (providing it R-1 R-2 C R I meets with all the requirements of X X - X a single family dwelling)

(The Planning Board disapproves this amendment)

Article 4 was defeated - 819 to 423

Article 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

(To change the definition of and the table of use regulations for Automotive Repair Shop.) (Ballot vote)

Article 5 was passed by a vote of 677 to 485.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$475,000 for the purpose of purchasing certain real property located at 60-64 Union Street and known as the "Edson Berry property", so-called, from the owners thereof and for the purpose of constructing a town building thereon for use as a fire station and/or other appropriate town purposes and to authorize the selectmen to raise said \$475,000 by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33.1 et seq. as amended) and to authorize and direct the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest and other terms thereon and take such other actions as may be necessary to acquire said real estate, to construct said town building, and to effect the issuance ,negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds and notes as shall be in the best interests of the town. (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3.)

Article 6. Being a bond issue, a two-thirds majority was needed for passage of this article. A total of 506 votes were cast on the issue making the number of yes votes required for passage 338. The article was defeated 267 to 239. One hour was required for the polls to be open for the voting on this issue.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the balance of the Capital Reserve Fund, including accumulated interest thereon, from the Town of Littleton trust funds and apply said funds toward the cost of purchasing real property and constructing a town building for use as a fire station and/or other appropriate purposes, leaving to the discretion of the Selectmen and trustees of said town trust funds the exact timing of said transfer and to authorize the Selectmen and trustees of the town trust funds to take such actions as may be necessary to effect said transfer and application of funds as shall be in the best interests of the town. (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3)

Article 7. A motion was made by Paul McGoldrick to postpone this article indefinitely - By voice vote- it was postponed.

ARTICLE 8. In the event that the Town fails to vote by a twothirds margin Article 6 of this Warrant, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$33,000 for the purpose of bracing and otherwise repairing the existing apparatus floor, so-called, of the town building which is currently being occupied by the Town Fire Department.

Article 8. An amendment offered by Selectman Richard Hill to take the \$33,000 from the Capital Reserve Fund was defeated on a voice vote. The article was approved by a standing vote of 201 to 118. This is to brace and otherwise repair the existing floor of the town building which is currently being occupied by the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 9 . Are you in favor of the construction of the High Voltage Direct Current Line as proposed by the New England Electric Transmission Corporation within the Town of Littleton? (By petition with RSA 39:3.)

This article was given a strong "no" by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10. The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,399,455.00 for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Fixed Charges, Town Building, Police Department,Fire Department, Whitefield Airport, Civil Defense, Planning Board, Zoning Officer, Board of Adjustment, Hospital, White Mountain Mental Health, North Country Home Health Agency, Senior Wheels, North Country Council, Town Garage, Town Dump, Sewers, Sidewalks, Streets and Highways, Town Road Aid, Highway Subsidy, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, National Holidays, Community Center, and other necessary posted expenses.

ARTICLE 11. This article proposing the town vote to call upon members of the N.H. Congressional delegation to support a freeze on nuclear arms was defeated by a standing vote of 163 to 133. ARTICLE 12. The Town voted to appropriate \$11,000 for the purpose of subsidizing ambulance services provided by Ross Ambulance Service in the Town of Littleton, with an amendment that this be appropriated for only one year and by next year's Town Meeting, the Selectmen have an alternative to present to the Town. Approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 13. Shall the powers and duties of the office of Tax Collector be transferred from said office to that of Town Manager? (Ballot vote)

On ballot. Yes - 642 - No - 645

The meeting was then adjourned, or postponed, at 11 P.M. to next evening at 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 14. The Town voted to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$9,000 for the purpose of purchasing a police cruiser and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 15. The Town voted to appropriate \$38,646 for the purpose of purchasing two trucks for th e Public Works Department and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 16. The Town voted to appropriate \$2,800 for the purpose of purchasing four Scot Air packs for the Town Fire Department and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 17. The Town voted to appropriate \$5,528 for the purpose of purchasing a police base radio and two mobile radios and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$5,200 for the purpose of constructing a foundation and for the purchase of building materials to construct a recycling building at the town dump and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 18 was defeated by a vote of 92 yes to 110 -no.

ARTICLE 19. The Town voted to appropriate \$5,000 for the purpose of conducting a feasibility study concerning the construction of the Bridge Street bridge and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 20. The Town voted to appropriate \$6,825 for the purpose of making repairs and renovations to and purchasing equipment for the town library and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 21. The Town voted to appropriate \$15,900 for the purpose of purchasing a new chain, a vacuum pump, and a unit heater for the town sewage treatment plant and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 22. The Town voted to appropriate \$2300 for the purpose of purchasing a spreader for the Town Highway Department and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 23. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing a push frame for a snowplow and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 24. The Town voted to appropriate \$5,250 for the purpose of purchasing 1,500 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch Angus fire hose for the Town Fire Department and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 25. The Town voted to appropriate \$30,000 for the purpose of paying the principle which will be due on November 1, 1982 on the Town Sewer Bond Note, and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 26. The Town voted to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,379 to be paid to the White Mountains Region Association.

ARTICLE 27. The Town defeated this article, to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000 to be used by the Littleton Outing Club for the purpose of purchasing and installing a ski lift facility on Mt.Eustis.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to repair and replace the Town parking meters and further to authorize the Selectmen to expend such moneys as may be necessary from the parking meter fund for said purposes and for the purpose of maintaining said parking meters.

This article was passed, with an amendment by Rocky Forfido. The Town voted to instruct the Selectmen to come up with a fair and just solution or system to solve the non-turnover of parking spaces problem on Main Street. By parking meters or some other system that will guarantee to the downtown business District a constant and reasonable turnover of parking spaces on Main Street. And to authorize the Selectmen to expend such moneys as may be necessary from the Parking meter fund in order to achieve this goal. Also that the Selectmen have at least two public hearings on this matter before they make their final decision on how to solve this problem, and that the new system be implemented by July 1, 1982.

ARTICLE 29. In the event Article 28 of this Warrant is voted down, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer any and all moneys being held in the parking meter fund to the general fund surplus.

This article was tabled indefinitely, by motion by Dr. Hill.

ARTICLE 30. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the balance of the Christmas lighting fund - \$9593) to a Littleton Beautification and Christmas Fund and further to authorize the Selectmen to expend such funds as they may, in their discretion, deem appropriate for the purpose of beautifying Littleton.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to disapprove of the siting of the proposed 450 KV DC transmission line in the Town of Littleton unless and until it has been shown essential to meet the present and future need for power in New Hampshire and will be so designed, constructed and maintained to avoid any adverse effect on the persons and property of the citizens of this Yown. (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3)

This article was passed over by voice vote.

ARTICLE 32. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed, the sales to be by public auction or by advertised bids, or in such other manner as justice may require as determined by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 33. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow moneys, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1982 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 34. The Town voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 35. The Town voted to transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Paul McGoldrick made a motion to authorize the Selectmen to transfer all unexpended funds assigned to the Littleton Citizens Committee at the 1981 Town Meeting under Article 17 as amended to the Town Building Capitol Reserve Account. The motion was carried by voice vote, subject to the motion being legal.

LITTLETON WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said State qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the eighth day of March, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three-year term, a Town Treasurer for a one-year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the public library for three-year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a three-year term, and one Town Clerk for a three-year term.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) for the purpose of replacing the bridge at Bridge Street and for improvements related thereto, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds as needed and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. The total estimated cost of the project is Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00), 80% of which shall be paid for by the federal government, 10% of which shall be paid for by the State of New Hampshire, and 10% of which shall be paid for by the Town.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of completing preliminary engineering on a proposed access road to South Street.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Forty-two Thousand Dollars (\$242,000.00) for the purpose of making certain improvements to the Littleton Industrial Park and access thereto and to otherwise make the improvements specified in a certain application for a federal grant in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) through the Economic Development Authority, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Forty-two Thousand Dollars (\$242,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Town Constable (words Town Constable denote Police Chief) pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 41:47. The election of such constable to be held at the March 1984 Annual Town Meeting. (By petition in accordance with R.S.A. 39:3.)

ARTICLE 7. The undersigned legal residents of Littleton request the Selectmen to place the following question on the warrant for the 1983 Town Meeting. Shall the citizens of Littleton ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the United States Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. (By petition in accordance with R.S.A. 39:3.)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) for the purpose of subsidizing ambulance services provided by Ross Ambulance Service in the Town of Littleton and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund establish ed under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Fiftysix Dollars (\$2,056.00) for the purpose of purchasing one Radar Unit for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. One Thousand Twenty-eight Dollars (\$1,028.00) of said sum is to be reimbursed to the Town by the N. H. Highway Safety Agency as an approved highway safety project grant.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-nine Dollars (\$1,959.00) for the purpose of purchasing one electronic video camera for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars (\$3,739.00) for the purpose of purchasing window quilts for the Library and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$2,300.00) for the purpose of painting the outside trim

of the Library building and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of planning the Town's 200th birthday celebration to be held in 1984 and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$11,800.00) for the purpose of purchasing certain equipment to be used in conjunction with the equipment of Supervisory Administrative Unit No. 35 in order to update the Town's bookkeeping system, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$3,420.00) for the purpose of repairing 12 airpacks and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty-three Thousand Twenty Dollars (\$23,020.00) for the purpose of improving the entrance to West Elm Street and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of completing Mill Street so as to open it up to through traffic and create additional parking and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of paying the principal which will be due on November 1, 1983 on the Town Sewer Bond Note and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a total sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund, Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) of which would be used for repairs to Town buildings, Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) of which would be used to replace Town vehicles, and Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) of which would be used to reappraise Town property, with interest thereon being paid back to the general fund, said funds to be expended within five (5) years, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund establish ed under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,400.00) for the purpose of the Community Action Outreach Program. (By petition in accordance with R.S.A. 39:3.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the voters of the Town of Littleton will vote to eliminate all parking meters within the Town and in their place establish a two-hour time limit on parking only between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. from Monday through Saturday. excluding holidays. (By petition in accordance with R.S.A. 39:3.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to direct and empower the Selectmen to waive and/or release the right of first refusal upon the Schoff Lumber Mill property and the appurtenances thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of the 1979 Town Meeting (Article 17) requiring a 7-man Fire Department (by request of the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to require individual property owners to construct their own sewage or waste disposal systems in accordance with all Federal and State laws and regulations at their sole expense, thus rescinding all previous votes and policies by the Town; provided, however, that the Town continue to pump and clean said systems as needed.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to R.S.A. 80:52-a, to authorize the prepayment of all property taxes and authorize the collector of taxes to accept payments in prepayment of taxes.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. The sales to be by public auction or by advertised sealed bids, or in such other manner as justice may require as determined by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow moneys, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1983 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-six Dollars (\$3,236.00) for the purpose of purchasing telephone equipment for all Town Departments.

ARTICLE 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Dear Selectmen:

In connection with our examination of the financial statements for the Town of Littleton for the year ended December 31, 1982, we reviewed the system of internal control and accounting procedures of the Town. Our procedures included discussions with various employees responsible for performing accounting functions. We noted several areas where internal controls and accounting procedures could be revised and supplemented in order to better safeguard the Town's resources and for improved operations. We realize that, with a limited size office staff, the most ideal system of internal control or the most desirable accounting system may not be practical; however, it is our opinion that a concerted effort should be made to improve internal control in operating procedures wherever possible. The comments and recommendations we are making attempt to recognize the limitations imposed by the existing number of personnel.

One objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition. Another objective is to provide reasonable assurance as to the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived. This concept also recognizes that the evaluation of cost versus benefits necessarily requires judgements by the Selectmen.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from the misunderstanding of instructions, carelessness, etc. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Further, reliance on any system of internal accounting control may deteriorate with the lack of compliance with the systems procedure.

The following areas are those we believe have material weaknesses in internal accounting control.

February 8, 1983

Revenues

We strongly recommend the Town use semi-annual billings in order to accelerate its cash flow. The Town has been unable to pay off any of its tax anticipation notes until late in the year. If the Town were able to collect tax revenues in July, debt service costs could be greatly reduced. The use of the computer terminal should facilitate the semi-annual billings. The annual savings in interest expense should more than offset the additional costs created to implement the semi-annual billing system.

Parking Meter Fund

The recordkeeping and collection procedures used to control revenue collected from the meters and parking fines are inadequate. No records are kept of total tickets handed out or whether the fines levied are collected. Also, records are not maintaine regarding which tickets are given to individual officers or the meter maid. In addition, when tickets are paid or voided, they are torn up and thrown out, defeating the purpose of the consecutively numbered tickets.

The following measures should be taken:

- 1) One person, preferably not a member of the Police Department, should have custody of all unissued parking tickets.
- Upon issuance of parking tickets to the officers and meter maid, the custodian of the tickets should record which tickets have been issued to which individuals.
- 3) There should be a monthly or quarterly accounting of all unissued tickets.
- 4) Issued tickets should be kept and filed in numerical order. Tickets paid or voided should be marked as such.
- 5) Preferably meter collections should be made by someone outside of the Police Department and deposited directly in the bank by that person.
- 6) Fines paid should be deposited separately from the meter _ollections. The fines paid should be reconciled with the tickets issued.

Revenue Sharing

The Selectmen should determine that revenue sharing funds are being spent within the time limit requirements of the Federal Office of Revenue Sharing. Records should be prepared to show how much revenue sharing funds are available for each year and wha must be appropriated in order that the Town comply with Revenue Sharing guidelines.

Conclusion

Our purpose in making these recommendations is not one of presenting a critical analysis of the Town, but rather to assist management in planning and providing contued operations. The Town has reached a point in time where State revenues are diminishing. In order to meet the challenge of operating the Town at its current level, the Town must use each dollar of revenue as efficiently as possible. Now is the time to review operations to determine the effectiveness and economy of the various departments of the Town. We will be pleased to help in this process.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The financial statements of the Littleton Water and Light Department for the year ended December 31, 1982 have not been included in the accompanying financial report. However, another firm of auditors has been engaged to audit that department's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 1982.

The Town of Littleton has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the omission of a statement of general fixed assets, and the omission of the statements of the Littleton Water and Light Department as discussed in the preceding paragraphs, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Littleton at December 31, 1982, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

The accompanying supplemental information is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1982

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Town of Littleton conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental units, except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of Accounting - The accrual basis of accounting is followed by the Trust and Agency Funds. The General Fund and Special Revenue Funds utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available and expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

<u>General Fixed Assets</u> - As is the usual practice in the State of New Hampshire, fixed assets are not capitalized in the accounting records when acquired. Funds used to acquire general fixed assets and/or make the debt service payments on borrowings in connection therewith are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made. Generally accepted accounting principles require that general fixed assets be capitalized and accounted for in a separate fixed assets group of accounts.

<u>Continued Appropriations</u> - Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end are carried forward as continued appropriations to the new year in which they supplement the appropriations of that year. At the year end, the continued appropriations are reported as a component of the fund balances and are detailed as follows:

Investments - Investments in marketable securities are carried at cost.

<u>Taxes Collected for Others</u> - The Town collects taxes for Littleton School District and Grafton County which are remitted to them as required by law. These funds are accounted for in the general fund.

<u>Inter-Fund Transactions</u> - During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Retirement System - Members of the Police Department and Fire Department are automatically members of the New Hampshire Retirement System. Membership is voluntary to members of the Highway Department and Town Offices. Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by law and dependent upon age when

contribution begins. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan. In addition, the Town is contributing to the Special Legislative Annuity being paid monthly to retired employees in accordance with RSA 100-A. The amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Littleton is not available since all employers contributing to the New Hampshire Retirement System are treated in the aggregate. The Town has no past service cost obligation. The total pension cost to the Town for the year was \$47,776.

<u>Property Taxes</u> - Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatement, discounts and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as "Overlay". All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to overlay.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 12% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax deeded to the lienholder.

NOTE B - PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of selfbalancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1982

NOTE B - PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS (CONTINUED)

<u>Special Revenue Funds</u> - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.

<u>Capital Projects Funds</u> - Transactions related to resources obtained and used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of capital facilities are accounted for in Capital Projects Funds. Such resources are derived principally from proceeds of long term notes or bonds and from federal grants.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust and Agency Funds - Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust or as an agent by the Town for others.

ACCOUNT GROUPS

<u>General Long Term Debt</u> - This account group is used to account for the unmatured principal of the Town's general long term debt. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities.

NOTE D - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The Town is contingently liable in respect of lawsuits and other claims in the ordinary course of its operations. The Town is a defendent in a significant suit arising from claims over a construction contract. The settlement of such contingencies under the budgetary process would require appropriation of revenues yet to be realized and would not materially affect the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1982.

NOTE E - CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND

The Town is in the process of completing the Headworks Sewer Project with E.D.A. funds.

STATEMENT OF TOWN MANAGER

Comment should be noted that Raymond Bushway and Raymond Stevens retired from the Highway Department after several years of faithful service. Good luck to them in their retirement.

In this past year, as your Town Manager, I have worked to make the Town Government more responsive and effective.

Some of my accomplishments have been:

Updating of the Bookkeeping System - now moving forward with a computer in conjunction with Supervisory Union 35. This will give us a more modern, up-to-date operation. This move was really necessary due to the added task of the mandated Sewer User's Fee System.

I have instituted a system of firmer personnel control. Changes were made in the purchasing procedure, in order to cut out needless purchases.

At the dump we got a plan of operation developed, approved, and registered with the State, who really have the control.

I was able to assist the Senior Citizen Program in putting one person to work in this department a few hours a week, at no cost to the Town.

A composting program has been started at the Sewage Treatment Plant and will be brought to its full potential in the Spring. After State approval is obtained, I will be able to give away the composted top soil.

The Town's 1984, 200th Birthday Plans, are well underway with a committee made up of: Linda Hall, Kathryn Wendelowski, Mahala Clark, Kim Antonucci, Robert Tomlinson, Douglas and Brenda Clickenger, and myself. You will hear more about this at Town Meeting.

I set up a safety committee to check all accidents, in order to cut back on our Workmen's Compensation claims.

Every effort has been made to make the Town Building more energy efficient and save some tax dollars. I was able to coordinate with a local property owner and improve a bad corner where several accidents have occurred. I have brought the various departments closer together in a working relationship, thus saving tax dollars.

Since we did not get Phase II of the Community Development Grant, the Town will have to make the effort to open up the thru, back street in the Mill Street Area.

I have continually worked to improve wherever possible for the citizens of Littleton.

In 1983 it is even more important to improve the economy and find new industry for Littleton.

I thank all departments for their cooperation and the citizens of Littleton for the privilege of serving them.

LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS:

This past season there was plenty of snow, so it took lots of time plowing, sanding, salting, and clearing it from our streets, to make room for safe driving. The snow was too deep to cut brush, so this was not done until this past Fall. We did have to haul cover to the dump, as time permitted.

This past Summer we cleaned and repaired catch basins. This is a never-ending project, as we used a lot of sand this past Winter, on our streets, to cut down on salt usage. During the Summer rains it washes a certain amount of dirt into the basins, and this has to be cleaned out also. We put up a stone, retaining wall on Beacon Street, so that we could widen the intersection of Beacon and Highland Avenue, to make it safer for tractor trailers using this road.

Oiling or sealing was done on Brickyard Road, Birchcroft Road, Highland Avenue, the Old Whitefield Road, Bridge Street, Gary's Drive, Fairview Avenue, and West Elm Street.

We did some paving on Gilmanton Hill Road, South Street, Bryant Street, Hadley Street, and the driveway at the elementary school, after we did the excavating and regraveling of this. We also paved on Saranac Street. 4500 yards of Winter sand were hauled into the Town Garage Stockpile.

Our TRA Project this season was the Old Waterford Road. This consisted of cutting brush and trees within the right of way, replaced culverts, and the pavement was broken up and relaid. Some gravel was added to it, regraded, and is ready for oiling this coming season.

SEWERS:

We worked on (18) septic systems this past season, (6) complete systems and (12) repair jobs. In the compact area we installed (180) feet of 8-inch pipe and (1) manhole on High Street for the new school. We also had to replace (80) feet of 8-inch pipe on Pleasant Street and flushed and rodded several lines that have poor grade, preventing good flow.

SIDEWALKS:

Curbings were repaired on Maple, Clay, Jackson, High and Grove Streets. We installed or built new sidewalks at the elementary school and also on School Street for the primary unit.

DUMP:

Cover material was hauled from the Mt. Eustis Pit to the dump. Also, part of the dump was ordered phased out by the State, so material was hauled in for this, some from Mt. Eustis and some of the old sludge from the treatment plant.

LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Littleton Police Department has undergone growing pains over the fiscal year 1982. The development of all our new reporting systems, files and records keeping was utilized over this past year and in some instances minor changes were necessary to make them work properly.

We believe we have at present, a fine group of uniformed and civilian personnel who are dedicated to the overall welfare and protection of all the citizens of Littleton. We believe that future training, already planned for our personnel, can only cause a greater individual effectiveness in their chosen profession of Law Enforcement. Our support personnel (Dispatchers and Clerk Typist) cause the total operation to flow smoothly through the bureaucratic paperwork so necessary in todays modern operations.

During the year 1982 the Littleton Police Department made a total of 535 arrests. These included 324 motor vehicle, 196 criminal and 15 juvenile offenses. Speeders, again lead the arrest list in motor vehicle violations with 95, followed by D.W.I. with 65, and operating without license, failure to stop for mechanical signal and failure to grant right of way, tied for third place with 20. There were a total of 123 breathalyzer tests run by our department. Of these, there were 105 males and 18 females and 31 persons who refused any examination. Included in this number were 66 area residents and 57 nonresidents. The majority of these offenders fell within the 17 to 30 age bracket, the major portion of which fell in the B.A.C. level of .13% to .20%.

There were a total of 219 accidents investigated by the Littleton Police Department, including 212 motor vehicles, 7 motorcycle, 4 bicycles and 4 pedestrians. There were a total of 41 injuries and one fatality. Of the 219 accidents 146 fell in the 2 car category and 67 one car accidents and 6 were three or more category. There were 234 males and 151 females involved in these accidents. The majority of these accidents occurred on Thursday and Saturday, between 10 AM and 2 PM and again between 4 and 5 PM. They occurred on straight dry roads in the 30 MPH speed zones. The average age of the operators fell between 16 and 35 years.

During 1982 there were 196 criminal arrests. Of these, there were 14 assaults, 4 sex offenses, 23 shoplifters, 16 criminal mischief cases, 31 bench warrants and 82 arrests in all other less serious categories.

We instituted a new, more aggressive patrol system in 1982 in the hope of stemming the rise of burglaries which has occurred over the past few years. We can say that the system was successful in that we had an overall reduction in the incidents of burglary of approximately 66 percent with 13 cases in 1982 against 37 in 1981. This same patrol and investigative system was responsible for 24 arrests in narcotics category. These included 18 arrests for possession and 3 for being in the known presence and 3 arrests for sale of narcotics or controlled drugs.

In the larceny - theft categories there was a total of \$49,069.88 worth of cash and merchandise stolen, of this amount \$28,806.38 was recovered.

There was again this year a reduction in juvenile arrests with only 15 against 25 for 1981. Of these, there were 3 arrests for burglary and accomplice to burglary, 2 for theft, 2 for shoplifting, one for sales of drugs, one for being in the known presence of drugs and 6 in the lesser crime categories.

As we have said in the past, the Littleton Police Department is only as effective as the assistance we receive from concerned and involved citizens. We wish to publicly applaud the members of the Littleton Fire-Police Volunteers for their outstanding assistance at our major civic events and numerous fires and accidents to which they responded. We wish also to thank Mr. Courtland Quimby for giving of himself and his time to cover the school crossing at Main and School Streets to help protect our young children during school hours. We wish to thank all those citizens who have shown their concern by forwarding information by phone and mail, informing our department of criminal activity that they have observed. It is this kind of concern and involvement which really puts the criminal element on notice, that the citizens of Littleton believe in law and order and justice fairly administered up and down the scale of society.

We the members of the Littleton Police Department thank you, one and all and wish you health and prosperity throughout 1983.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The department responded to one-hundred forty-nine emergency calls through the year. We also responded to one-hundred twentyeight non-emergency calls. These calls consisted mostly of tanker work.

The Fire Department Apparatus Floor was rebraced this summer and fall. It was a little confusing when the trucks had to be removed from the station while the work was being done on the floor, but happy to report, no problems resulted. The Engines and Aerial were housed under Al's Market. The Tankers were stationed at each end of Town at firemen's homes. New steel beams and columns were added under the floor, along with the old beams, which were taken down and repainted then also put back. The project was completed last fall, and our trucks and equipment are back in place.

We made a trade with the Forestry Department this summer, in as we traded a 500 gallon fiberglass water tank in exchange for the trailer it was on. This trailer will in turn be used to house and transport the four-inch hose. The hose is still on Old Bertha. We also have a reel which will be mounted on the trailer. This should make for a faster layout and a quicker pickup.

Another project coming up will be the changing of the water tank on Tanker 1. The truck chassis is not that old and in very good shape, but it is time to change the tank. The tank, which is coming off, was a used tank when it was put on this truck, and it has caused a few minor problems which had to be repaired. The new tank was donated to the department by Clint Clough, and it is of the same size as the old one, which is 1,275 gallons.

The 1969 Jeep Truck which was purchased two years ago has been completed. It has a 275 gallon water tank, portable pump, hose and forest fire fighting equipment mounted in it. The Jeep Truck replaced the 1952 Willis Jeep which was sold last spring.

In closing, we the Littleton Fire Department would like to extend a fire-safe year to all in 1983.

LITTLETON CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY REPORT

In September Bill Latulip left as director after four productive and occassionally hazardous (LPG tanker rollover, '81 ice jam flood) years of service to the community. The last months of the year I spent acclimating myself to the position and meeting with members of the State Civil Defense Agency and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Program Papers have been filed with FEMA making the town eligible for disaster assistance and re-imbursement should the need arise. An updating of the town's Basic Emergency Management Plan is under way. Emergency Operations Plans for each town department are also being cohered.

On-the-scene-action guidelines for hazardous material accidents have been placed in the police cruisers. The Hazardous Materials Reference Catalogue has been placed at the police dispatch center and in the Littleton Hospital Emergency Department in addition to the one at the fire station.

An ice-jam/flood watch system has been coordinated with the police department, White Mountain Hydroelectric and this agency during high water periods effecting the Ammonoosuc River above the Apthorp dam.

LITTLETON PUBLIC LIBRARY

This year the library developed a new look when the Littleton Garden Club inaugurated a landscaping project. The new plantings around the front emphasize the classic lines of the old building. The welcoming barberry bushes along the walk were donated by the White Mountain Garden Club.

Several film programs were held during the year, but the most popular were "The Blob" and "The Jungle Book". As usual there was a morning film program on Wednesdays for pre-school children.

The highlight of the week for many pre-schoolers continued to be the Thursday morning story hour with Ellen Morrow. This program is so popular, two sessions are held every week.

Dr. Mortimer Fisch of Bethlehem led a fifteen-week discussion of "Twenty-Five Hundred Years of Drama". People from surrounding towns took advantage of this free course.

At the annual Craft Fair during National Library Week, Ruth Colby easily won "Best of Show" with her spectacular quilt, "Geodesy". Ruth has been a frequent winner in the Craft Fair, but she surpassed all her other efforts this year.

A lovely musical evening was enjoyed at the library when the Canaan Concertante performed "A Musical Celebration of English Culture 1300-1700". The program was funded by the New Hampshire Council for the Humanities.

Many books dealing with starting and operating a small business were added to the collection from the "Mind Your Own Business" grant. The grant was awarded to the North Country Library Cooperative by the New Hampshire Library Commission, and the books are housed in the Littleton Public Library. The Savers Bank donated funds for additional materials.

The most exciting program of the year was the Young Writers Conference held during the summer. There were two separate courses for high school and elementary school students. Geri Williams, a professional teacher of writing, was hired to work with students to improve their writing skills. Their stories and poems were read aloud at an evening celebration, and some were published in the "Littleton Courier". This program was sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, the American Legion, the Littleton Arts Project and Norton Pike Company.

Norton Pike also sponsored the annual Summer Reading Program which was enjoyed by over 200 children. Many children spent entire days upstairs in the Children's. Room reading. The room was made bearable on hot, muggy days by two air conditioners which were loaned to the library by Tom and Kathleen Pancoast. Rennie Pennock and Hudson Blough donated their time to install the machines.

It was an exciting year as more programs were offered, and more people took advantage of all the resources the library has available. The Board of Library Trustees has worked hard (often physically -- weeding the newly landscaped area and painting the doors and fence). Members of the library staff have continued providing cheerful service at all times.

LITTLETON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION REPORT

Continued growth and innovative planning marked fiscal year 1982 as one to remember. As the new challenges of health care organization, financing, and delivery unfold we are either active participants in a dynamic process or passive bystanders controlled by others. Public policy is slowly moving towards deregulation with fewer dollars available to spread over increased demands for care. Cost-shifting is gaining turbulence. How we decide priorities at the board, management, medical staff, auxiliary levels determines how effective we will be in discharging our important responsibilities to those we serve. A few highlights deserve mentioning:

- An automated energy management system was installed to conserve energy expenses.
- Special events promoted the hospital and the area while raising needed funds.
- Capital equipment purchases totalled over \$100,000 for laboratory, anesthesia, operating room, coronary care, respiratory therapy, etc., improving technology.
- Increased community education as emphasized in diabetes, cardiac rehabilitation, neurology, nutrition, stress management, respiratory therapy, etc., designed to prevent illness and avoid costly services.
- Mountain rescues and disaster drills focused on skillful treatment by teams of doctors and staff members gaining national attention.
- An improved employee lifestyle and fitness program was launched which will soon be available to community groups.
- The pension and depreciation funds were increased significantly to allow for future demands.
- The hospital self-insured for worker's compensation and health insurance to save costs in benefit programs.
- Market analysis is being performed to ascertain population trends and useage patterns. A framework for corporate reorganization will be established to prevent the confiscation of assets by third party payers.
- The Dietary Department will be modernized and expanded within the next year. Additional inpatient beds will soon be available to meet increased census demands.

We wish to thank the residents of the Littleton area for continued support and interest in developing the hospital and its programs.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This last fiscal year was extremely busy for White Mountain Mental Health Center and T.E.M.P.O.. We are a private, non-profit, organization providing community based mental health and developmental services. Our organization is governed by a board of directors who are elected from the communities we serve. We provide service to twenty-two towns in northern Grafton and southern Coos Counties. Our central office is located in Littleton; however, we have satellite offices in Lincoln, Woodsville and Lancaster. We are accredited by the New Hampshire Division of Mental Health and Developmental Services. I would like to provide you with some brief examples of our services and our level of activity.

The mental health program offers a comprehensive array of psychiatric services. The services include: counseling, case management, alcoholism services, emergency services, evaluations and consultation services. We provided 5268 hours of counseling during this past year (July 1, 1981 to June 30, 1982). The number of referrals recorded was 525. Additionally, we responded to 600 requests for emergency service. This level of activity represents a 5% increase over last year.

The developmental disabilities program (T.E.M.P.O.) has also had a very active year. The services offered at T.E.M.P.O. include: supervised work, educational services, training services and recreational activities. T.E.M.P.O. was open a total of 237 days last year. The average number of clients served per day was 25. The length of our service day is six hours. We take pride in the fact that we paid our clients \$27,063 for the work they performed last year. T.E.M.P.O. operates two vans which transport clients to and from the workshop. Last year, we traveled over 28,000 miles transporting clients.

The mental health center and workshop will be relocating in 1983. We have purchased a building, through a Small Business Administration loan, large enough to house both the mental health center and T.E.M.P.O.. The new facility is located in Littleton. I feel that the move will be beneficial to both programs and clients. It will permit us to share resources and work more effectively on mutual cases.

The goal of our organization is to assure that mental health and developmental services remain available at the local level. We feel that local services are more efficient, effective and humane. The absence of sufficient funding from any individual source makes it necessary for us to request community support. We appreciate your past generosity and ask you to help us continue our work.

FISCAL SUMMARY - FY 1983

This year, the Division of Mental Health and Developmental Services required major changes in our fiscal reporting. Therefore, you will note changes in the names of expense categories. Additionally, we have new guidelines about what line items are to be included in each expense category. My current budget reflects the changes required by the state.

This year's budget has increased by 11%. The increase is due to the following changes: a 4% salary increase, the addition of two new developmental services staff, increased cost of supplies and materials.

North Country Home Health Agency provides care in the home for those who are ill, and also provides public health activities for prevention and intervention of disease.

In-home services include nursing care, physical therapy, speech therapy and Homemaker/Home Health Aide service which enables people to remain independent in their own homes. A hospice program, using trained volunteers, is available for care of the terminally ill at home.

The Family Assistant Program is designed to help parents strengthen child-rearing skills and cope with family-related problems.

Prevention services include all the clinics listed above, visits to newborns and health promotion visits to assess physical problems and home situations. There is no charge for any of the preventive services.

North Country Home Health Agency serves 15 towns from its main office at 60 High St., Littleton, and satellite offices in Lincoln and Woodsville.

Services to Littleton residents are as follows: 1378 nursing visits; 187 physical therapy visits; 38 speech therapy visits; 2049 Home Health Aide hours; 879 Homemaker hours; 87 Health Promotions and 23 newborn visits. Littleton residents may attend any of the above clinics at any location.

LITTLETON PARK COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

In 1982 the Park Commission made few changes to Park Facilities. General repairs and maintenance were performed, and our facilities were put to maximum use by Littleton High School Programs and the general public.

The skating rinks at Apthorp Common and Remich Park were used all Winter. Mt. Eustis Ski Tow was manned by volunteers and the Commission, and with the heavy snows of 1982, the tow was open to the public for a good part of the ski season.

During the Summer our Recreation Program, under Pierre Lafitte, served the public well. In 1982 our Recreation Program offered a structured schedule to children of elementary school age. In this, the pilot year of the Program, Mr. Lafitte felt that it was a success, and plans are being made to continue the Program for 1983.

The Littleton Pool, under the direction of Judy Cornelius, offered swimming instruction in the form of two, four-week classes. Afternoons, Monday through Saturday, the pool was open to the public. Also, adult swimming was offered two nights a week.

In the Fall of 1982 the Commission began to fill in the area behind the little league field and on the corner of Oak Hill Avenue at Remich Park. With this addition to the park, we are hoping to some day add an ice-hockey rink in conjunction with the hockey association. Also, a parking area was added in the process along Park Avenue.

1982 also marked the fifth year that our Littleton Softball League was successfully run. This League, under the direction of Pierre Lafitte, is self-supporting and provides leagues for men and women.

LIFTLETON CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Littleton Conservation Commission, whose members are appointed by the Selectmen, met seven times in 1982 and plans monthly meetings in 1983 with the exception of July and August.

The Commission sponsored Cathlin O'Connor of Littleton for the 1982 Conservation Camp, which is administered by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. The chairman has met with the Town Manaver recarding the Town Dump, and the Commission has been recently charged by the Selectmen to present recommendations for alternate dump sites and alternate means of waste disposal.

By virtue of a written agreement with the Park Commission, the Conservation Commission has assumed responsibility for the maintenance of two town parks, the Dells and the Kilburn Crass.

During the summer of 1982, the Commission employed several members of Littleton High School to do trail work and brush removal at the Dells. This project was performed under the supervision of Richard Millen.

A walking trail has been cleared to the Kilburn Grags. The top of the Grags will be cleared of some trees, which will provide a splendid overlook of the entire town and the mountains beyond.

The Commission continues to process Dredge and Fill permits, and in January 1983 reviewed New England Lelephone Company plans for a line carrier cable from Littleton to St. Johnsbury, Vermont. The Commission does not regard this line, because it follows much of the existing route or will be located in the Route 18 right of way, to be of any major environmental significance, and has so stated to New England Telephone Company.

In January 1983, after meeting with members of the North Country Ridge Ridges, Inc., the Commission voted to permit a snowmobile trail through the Dells in accordance with certain restrictions. This agreement is on file with both the Conservation Commission and the Park Commission.

LITTLETON COMMUNITY CENTER

It is with pleasure that I submit this, my second report, of the Littleton Community Center for the year ending 1982. The Center has been giving service to the Town for 63 years, and every year more functions and people are using the House and Annex, sometimes as many as seven different things are going on at once.

This year there has been five Directors' meetings and other committee meetings, with everyone working very hard trying to keep within our budget and at the same time making necessary repairs and improvements to keep the Center in good repair.

The Property Committee, headed by Everett Poore, have been very active making improvements. An outdoor light was installed at the left rear side of the Annex; walls and ceiling in the main kitchen and entryway were painted; the floors sanded and refinished in the main hall, diningroom, plus all thresholds. Locks and windows were repaired and electrical and plumbing repairs made. A new snow blower was also bought for the Center. The property map, made by Ray T. Gile in 1908, was gone over and it was found to be accurate as it is shown on the deeds of the Community Center.

The Garden Club moved their memorial garden from the Town Hall area to a site at the Center, next to the Post Office.

The Strong Norse Post will be moving the World War I and II monumnet to the front of the lawn, nearer the sidewalk. A new plaque will be added for Littleton men who died in the Korean and Vietnam wars.

The House Committee under the direction of Amy Stillings, have made other improvements in the upstairs front room. A new wall-towall carpet was installed, a new floor lamp and a three-way table lamp were put in the room as finishing touches. Mrs. Merele Grout, a Director, donated 26 green stamp books for these lamps.

The dining room tables were stripped and refinished and now are in excellent condition. Many other things have been done to improve the Center.

The Personal Committee, with Hazel Bronson as Chairman, and the Budget Committee, with Chairman Frances Heald, have been very active through the year meeting with their committees, and through their efforts the Center runs well and stays in the black!

We were all saddened by the death of Mary Heald, who had been a dedicated Director and who had done so much for the Center over the years. She will be greatly missed. Naomi Teft was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mary.

This year the School for Lifelong Learning have been using the

small room off the upstairs hall and have given us a donation of \$125 a month. This has been very helpful in our budget as we did lose the Welfare Department when they moved into their new quarters on the Lisbon Road. The Chamber of Commerce will be giving us a larger donation this year, also some organizations have made donations and it is hoped that more will also make donations. The Farm and Home League have donated a small carpet sweeper that may be used to clean up in the main room or dining room after snacks and workshops. This House and Annex belongs to all of us and we need everyones help and support.

To add a little more beauty to the downstairs, flower arrangements by John Hall of Hall's Country Plants, and Everett Aldrich of The Village Green have adorned the mantles and hall. Thanks also goes to the Littleton Garden Club and White Mountain Grange for the window box plantings and Christmas wreaths.

It is fortunate that we have had bequests left to the Center and we can use the interest on these bequests to help with our finances. These were from Charles and Hattie Bingham, Charles and Katherine Henry, Ray T. Gile, Chester F. Meacham, Mildred Silsby and Helen Bean Eastman.

As we look to the future we know that there are still many things to be done. To improve the basement, the third floor, and the second floor of the Annex, so that they may be used as meeting places, plus our everyday upkeep.

In closing, I want to thank Stella and David Harris for the great work they are doing, to all the Directors and members for all the time they give, the Littleton Highway Department for their plowing and maintaining of the parking areas, to the Police Department for protection, and to all others who have assisted so very much.

The Society is not a club. The public is always welcome at meetings, which, of course are aimed at maintaining the interest, knowledge and preservation of our heritage.

However, memberships (under four categories: Sustaining,\$25,Contributing,\$10, Family,\$5 and Individual,\$3) are necessary to carry on projects of the Society and serve the community. <u>Some</u> group must be ready to receive, protect, display, and have a decent respect for the memorabilia of events and personalities which shape our town.

Of the 245 members in 1982 (30 of them were new ones) only half were local. There were sad losses by death including the first two curators, Ella Nourse Carter and Mary E. Heald.

A Permanent Endowment Fund was set up by the Society at the suggestion of Robert K. Carter of Norwalk, Conn., following the death of his mother. Such a Fund offers an opportunity to pay tribute to those who have been concerned with keeping our particular past alive.

A major goal of the Society's fifteen years has been the initiating and sponsoring of a new town history. Therefore, with that goal in sight, programs of the year were directed toward many examples of research and writing history as well as the more technical and artistic aspects of producing such a book. The annual Founders 'Day picnic was held on historic Mann's Hill at the home of Leon Van Stone and featured a progress report by Editor Jack Colby on the new history, as well as a summary of the Society's achievements, and recognition of the nine past presidents. The Museum in the basement of the Littleton Public Library continues to be open on Wednesday and Friday afternoons and by special appointment under the direction of Curator Lester Goad and other volunteers. We are grateful to the cheerful staff and to the Trustees of the Library for the use of the room. It is extremely valuable as a repository and filing place as well as for learning. Material collected at the Museum has also proved useful in research for the history. Groups from schools are especially welcome for "tours" as are individuals or organizations.

Gifts are received by the Society all during the year and noted in the collection with appreciation to donors. There is urgent need of professional cataloging and arranging.

Constant requests for genealogical and other Littleton data usually find their way to the Society for answers. Mrs. Lakeway has been especially helpful on these matters. Other officers and members have taken responsibility, also, as they have on subjects of research and writing for the history.

We have maintained connections with other historical societies and museums, cooperated with the North Country Historical Foundation and the New Hampshire Constitutional Bicentennial Education Commission.

A goal of the Date Plaque Committee is "signing" all homes and buildings before 1984.

We are grateful to the Community Center where we still use a room on the third floor for storage, and to the media for publishing notices and accounts of meetings.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL REPORT

In 1982 in the Town of Littleton, North Country Council prepared a successful \$500,000 EDA application for Phase II of the industrial park; prepared an application to HUD to complete the Mill Street project; assisted the Planning Board on zoning and subdivision questions; have begun work with various boards to develop good local permit process; worked with Town and state officials to prepare an operating plan for the sanitary landfill; provided information to the Town on CDBG, EDA, and FmHA federal assistance programs; and provided technical assistance to the Planning Board on regulations and subdivision review.

In addition to providing specific assistance to your town, the Council works on activities that benefit several towns and the entire North Country. In <u>economic development</u>, the Council has provided direct local assistance to several communities in their local development programs and has continued to seek approval from the Economic Development Administration for a Revolving Loan Fund to assist small and mediumsized businesses in eight communities. As a member of the Small Business Development Program for Northern New Hampshire, NCC has provided information to prospective businesses on the available training and financial programs. The Economic Development Committee has met on issues such as trends in the wood products industry, the future of the North Country railroad system and small business development and financing.

One of the major efforts for towns is <u>community planning</u>. The Council staff met throughout the year with numerous planning boards, selectmen, and master plan committees to discuss community issues and provide solutions such as zoning, subdivision regulations, site plan review, sign, parking, septic system and mobile home regulations, recreation planning, business and traffic surveys, and more. The Council organized a subdivision workshop in the spring for planning board members, coordinated the Municipal Law Lectures in the fall, and provided information to towns on HUD's Small Cities Community Development Block Grant and Urban Development Action Grant programs. In an effort to maintain essential planning assistance to our towns given the somewhat smaller budget, our Community Planning Committee established a clear policy on membership services. This is described in a brochure we recently mailed to you entitled "North Country Council, Inc: What's In It For Your Town?"

In transportation, the Council's Transportation Committee assisted the NH Department of Public Works and Highways with the Annual Highway Action Plan Meeting. This meeting is usually very productive as it is the major way that the public can participate in identifying and supporting needed highway improvements. NCC is assisting the state, the new rail operator, and rail users in marketing the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line to make the line more economically viable and eventually self-sufficient. In the Mt. Washington Valley, NCC surveyed businesses to determine the potential for utilizing a truck/rail terminal. We are also following the proposed New England rail reorganization and its impact on our region. The Council continues to work with the Whitefield Regional Airport in an on-going effort to secure commuter air service.

The Council is providing planning recommendations and some technical assistance to towns in anticipation of the <u>solid waste</u> district planning scheduled to occur in late 1983 and 1984. We had a voice in amending the state's solid waste law to make it more flexible in local situations. Sharing of ideas and coordination in this field is aided by staff member Fred Moody's position as a director of the NH Resource Recovery Association.

To assist town governments with administrative and financial tasks (e.g., tax billing, accounting, etc.), NCC has acquired a mini-computer with programs to accomplish these functions. At this time, we developed our tax billing services and look forward to offering additional services in the future.

The Council has also conducted historic buildings inventory in a few towns and will be serving as a clearinghouse on historic preservation planning and activities.

The Council closely followed the proceedings for the Quebec Hydro powerline in 1982 and presented our position before the Site Evaluation Committee in March. We recommended construction of the line in Vermont which provided the most economical, direct, and least environmentallydamaging route. As of early 1983, it appears the powerline will follow the Vermont route and will come into NH in Littleton. NCC also testified before the NH House and Senate in support of the Pontook hydroelectric facility in Dummer.

For the last year and a half, the Council has published NEWS FOR SELECTMEN, an informative report on local, regional, state and federal activities and trends. The Council is active on the state and national level through the NH Association of Regional Planning Commissions and the National Association of Regional Councils. We were very fortunate to have our former President and Jackson representative Oliver Nelson serve as the Chairman of the National Advisory Committee on Rural Development. This past summer, the Committee prepared a rural development strategy. The Council set up one of two in-state meetings to solicit views from the public on rural needs and practical solutions.

As in the past, the Council's major emphasis will continue to be technical assistance and information on matters of concern to local governments. The Council staff is always available to meet with local officials to discuss projects and needs of the towns.

On behalf of the Council and its Board of Directors, we thank you for your support during the past year and hope that the Town will continue to use the services of NCC during 1983. Please feel free to contact one of us or the Council staff in Franconia at 823-8108 or 823-5566.

UPDATING OF THE LITTLETON HISTORY

A project that had its inception in July of 1980 with the appointment of a three-member Littleton History Committee, and then was assured with the approval of a \$35,000 appropriation at the March 1981 Town Meeting, is moving ahead on its mission of updating the Littleton Town History. This is the first municipal effort of its kind since the original three-volume History which made its appearance in 1905.

More than 20 committees have completed their assignments, and their material has been made available for editing. It should be reiterated that all reports will appear as prepared in the newlycreated Archives to be located at the Littleton Area Historical Society's Museum, with as much of each report appearing in the finished book as space will permit.

Except for updating as required, the material will reflect the period 1905-1982. The History is scheduled to make its appearance in June of 1984 during the celebration of Littleton's Bicentennial Year.

We are continuing to work closely with the publishers, Phoenix Publishing of Canaan, N. H., and hope to have all edited material in their hands by June of 1983.

This is a tremendous undertaking, to reflect what must certainly be one of the most remarkable communities of its size to be found anywhere - for instance, are you aware that Littleton provides in excess of 300 business operations (exclusive of the professions)? The list of clubs and organizations is of the "endless" category. Again, if space allows, it is hoped to have several special categories such as ethnic groups, crime, etc. to embellish the standard material.

We take this opportunity to express our appreciation to everyone who has entered into the spirit of this community undertaking, not the least of whom are members of the staff of the Littleton Public Library, always ready and willing to be of helpful assistance.

We would urge anyone with a Littleton heritage or new-found interest to subscribe to the pre-publication price of \$25.00 to assure their being included among the 2,000 purchasers. There are a few of the \$100.00 books still available that will have particular lasting value because of their being individually numbered and personalized with name of the buyer. Books may be purchased through Lawrence M. Colby, Treasurer, or George E. McAvoy, Chairman of the Finance Committee. I suggest that prompt attention be given to this, as the final price may well reflect an increase.

LITTLETON AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT 1982

An extensive program of work was taken on by the Littleton Area Chamber of Commerce in 1982. Area promotion continued to be a major focal point for the endeavors of our Chamber. The first highlight of the year was the After Bite \$50,000 Trout Tournament which our Chamber of Commerce co-presented with the Littleton Hospital Auxiliary. Under the Chairmanship of Leonard Reed, the tournament achieved tremendous first year results in a multi-faceted area promotion. It was geared to stimulate the area economy in an off season period of time (before Memorial weekend) and expose our attractive White Mountain area. Sponsored by Tender Corporation and an Associate Sponsor. Indian Head Banks, 1310 registrations were received. These registrations helped produce an \$8,000. charitable gift to the Littleton Hospital, an \$8,000. gift to the Jimmy Fund with an additional \$1,000. contribution going to the N. H. Fish and Came Department. This \$1,000. gift was matched by a grant from the Federal Government for an additional \$3,000. Several thousand dollars in cash awards and prizes were presented. New England Power Company's Moore Dam, and cooperation, proved again to be a tremendous natural resource for our area communities.

Our Chamber continued to pursue the balance of its program of work for 1982 in producing SummerStreet '82 which brought thousands of area residents to our town to enjoy our Main Street's commercial attributes in a family oriented festival kicking off the beginning of summer. Ten days later our Chamber would again promote the Littleton area by producing one of New England's largest fireworks displays and Fourth of July celebrations at Remich Park.

Soon to follow was the N. H. Chrysler-Oodge International Regatta which brought thousands of spectators and visitors to the banks of New England Power reservoir in an off-season period of time. Under the direction of Chairman Robert Rylander who assumed chairmanship midway through 1982 from a retiring Edwin Harris, the Regatta again surpassed all expectations in stimulating the area economy with new tourist dollars. Estimates of the impact of this one weekend are in excess of one million dollars. The town of Littleton was only one of many area towns that reaped the benefits of this major New England event as neighboring communities felt the swell of visitors. Service stations, grocery stores, restaurants and lodging facilities marketed their products/services as though the weekend were an in season holiday. In just four years the Regatta has grown to become one of the top five New Hampshire events, as determined by the New Hampshire Office of Vacation and Travel. Two weeks later our Chamber produced its 13th Annual Art Show which brought 66 artists and craftsmen to our Main Street to display their fine works of art in the midst of any early fall foliage which helped to draw thousands of visitors to our community. Under the direction of Chairman Boyd Bush, the show took on several modifications in prize structure and registration fees which will encourage greater artist participation and future growth of this annual event.

Along with these major highlights, the Retail Division sponsored five promotions in the year 1982. Joan McDonald as the chairperson of this division, played a major role in leading these promotions which included "April Foolishness", "SummerStreet '82", "Sidewalk Sale", Moonlight Madness" and "Christmas Walk".

The Food and Lodging Division led by Barry Bliss as its President, became a more cohesive group in supporting the After Bite \$50,000 Trout Tournament with an Associate Sponsorship for the largest bass category, and produced a full page cooperative advertisement in the New England Skiers' Guide which has a circulation in excess of 200,000 readers.

The Business/Industrial Task Force led by Chairman Stephen Samaha continued to meet weekly collating area data, researching and investigating what can be done to work with existing businesses in the Littleton area in assisting their future growth while at the same time encouraging new and more business/industry to come to our area.

As this report outlines, our Chamber of Commerce has had a very busy year, and has been able to successfully accomplish many of its goals. We should be proud of these accomplishments as they lie in the past. However, we should be cautious not to rest on our laurels because there is so much yet to be done in using the Chamber as a vehicle to aggressively address different goals and objectives in the coming year(s). The volunteer effort and financial support by the membership and our community as this report outlines has been outstanding. Our Chamber should look forward with great optimism in assisting our area growth in the coming years as many natural and human resources are yet to be utilized.

As I resign, effective March 25, 1983, I reflect with great pride on all the goals accomplished, greatly due to the strong volunteer efforts. It has been a true pleasure in having the opportunity to work with all the Chamber Members, Board of Directors, and local and state officials.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSION REPORT

In March, 1982, I was elected to chair the Commission for the Whitefield Regional Airport Authority. In the past year the Commission accepted, with regret, the resignations of: John Gregory -Lancaster, William Mitchell - Whitefield, and Edgar Smith - Dalton. Two new members: Daniel Edgar - Littleton and Leigh White -Whitefield have since accepted membership on the Commission.

The most important event to occur this year was the final acceptance of the Airport Master Plan by the Town of Whitefield, the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission, and the Federal Aeronautics Administration, thus making the airport eligible for federal funding and grants. The Commission has engaged the firm of Oest Engineering Associates, Portland, Me., to design the planned improvements scheduled to begin in the Spring of 1983.

The Commission was very instrumental this past Summer in preventing the threatened ceasation of state-funded navigational aids located at the airport.

I think it important to point out the value of our regional airport to the North Country Economy. Among the regular corporate users of the facility are: Georgia-Pacific (Gilman Paper Mill), Diamond International (Groveton Papers), Burndy Corporation and others. These corporations employ thousands of people in the area; and with the emphasis today in developing industrial parks, a viable and modern airport facility is not only desirable, it is a must - to support and attract growth of industry to our region. To that end, a regional airport, such as ours, can be only as good as the support it receives from the communities it serves.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

In our continued effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we take this opportunity to reach you through your annual town/city report.

Budgeting becomes more complex each year due to variables and unfunded state mandates. Until authority accompanies funding, our local governments will have little control over spiralling taxes. Counties encounter funding problems similar to towns/cities. We are continually absorbing more costs of state/federal programs. This year local governments picked up a 25% increase in their share of the OAA/APTD/ICF grants. Child placement costs are increasing dramatically with the private foster homes rapidly being replaced by more expensive group homes, some costing \$25,000 to \$40,000 per year compared to private home rates of \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year.

Our new sewage system, tied in with Woodsville Precinct's treatment plant, was complete and operational in February 1982.

Many dollars are being saved in energy accounts through conservation measures. Fuel costs were reduced by 20% and electric costs by 8% in fiscal year ending June 30, 1982, saving \$41,800.

Finishing the second superior courtroom will cost approximately \$169,500. Bonding is approved and the project should be completed this spring.

The Jail & House of Correction had another busy year. Average census was 38. We continue to get inmates with mental or emotional problems requiring additional staff and medical treatment and higher medication costs. No change is foreseen in the admission pattern due to the continuing discharge policy of N.H. State Hospital. Pending legislation requiring more severe sentencing for some crimes will increase duration of stay and census, proportionately increasing the burden on correctional staff.

The County Farm is a productive asset to the County through participation in Extension and Conservation Service programs and by creating meaningful work for House of Correction inmates. Volume of milk remains constant although the revenue dropped slightly due to decrease in federal parity. Quality of the Holstein herd is excellent. Revenue from livestock sales grossed \$25,092 last fiscal year, and produce grossed \$40,016 for the Farm.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 AM at the Courthouse, 1:30 PM at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.

Snell, Vice Chairman Dorothy Campion, Clerk The Littleton Industrial Development Corporation is a non-profit organization, established through the efforts of the Littleton Chamber of Commerce and the town selectmen, as an entity to own and develop the Littleton Industrial Park and to take the responsibility to lead the town's effort to attract new and desirable industrial employers.

The year 1982 has been a time of recession, impacting local employment even more severely than past years, and causing LIDC to intensify its recruiting efforts. It has not been a year in which many employers were willing to talk of expansion, but LIDC has made some progress on this front while concentrating a great deal of effort in preparing our local resources so that we will be more competitive when the economy comes out of recession.

In 1982 LIDC added a new tenant to the park when Tender Corporation, a local employer, expanded and built an attractive new 15,000 square foot building that is visible from the interstate. Tender Corporation now employs 20 people, a 33% immediate increase in employment, and they have the space to accommodate an anticipated sizeable expansion in employment over the next few years.

Also in 1982 LIDC and the selectmen have developed plans for provision of necessary services (water, sewer, road, power) for an additional 60 acres of industrial land. A Federal grant of \$500,000 has been obtained to pay for two-thirds of the cost, contingent on town funding of \$242,000. If approved, this 60 acres could be available for new industry by 1984.

Kenneth Grout, owner of Tender Corporation, has been especially helpful in the past year by offering to build and lease a new building for prospective new industries. At his own expense, he has devoted time and money to promotional efforts to recruit industry, in a valuable supplement to LIDC's recruiting efforts, and we expect his activity to continue. Burndy Corp. has added several new product lines to the local plant, and their employment has increased again over the prior year.

LIDC has supported New Hampshire Highway Department plans to replace the Bridge Street Bridge (in 1987) and has worked with the industries located in that area and with the residents of South Street who are concerned about the amount of truck traffic on their street since the load limit on the bridge was reduced three years ago. In addition to providing relief for these nonpark industries, LIDC sees the new bridge as a significant long-term benefit for our Industrial Park, as we compete with other areas for the more attractive industrial employers.

LIDC has also initiated an effort to utilize the Kell-Tronics factory as "incubator" space, a resource to attract small and fledgling industries by offering smaller amounts of space at reasonable prices. Some of these industries could be expected to grow and flourish, providing future job opportunities without our having to go outside to recruit new employers.
