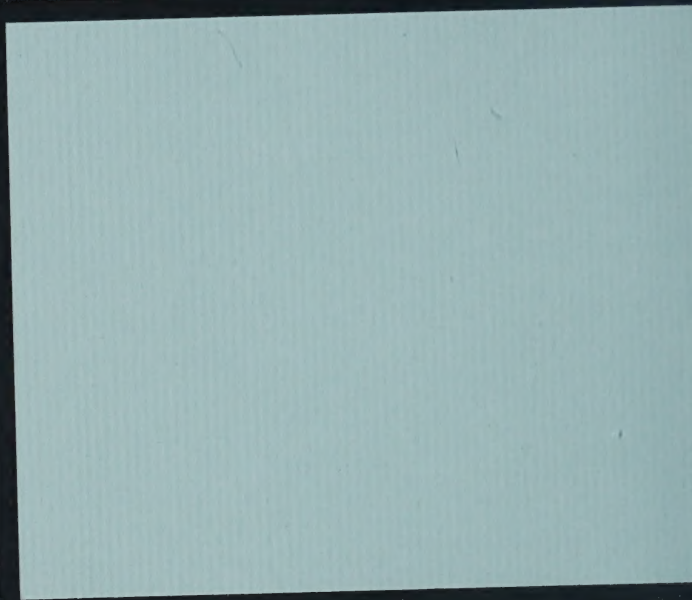

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town and School District Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the Collector.
4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$25,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from Taxes collected within the current municipal year.
5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.

6. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Report.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.
8. On petition of Donald Austin and ten other voters to see if the Town will vote to extend the water line six hundred and twenty feet up Dixon Avenue. For that purpose to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by the issuance of its bonds or notes to defray the cost of extension of mains and erection of other necessary facilities to provide an adequate system; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest to be borne by said bonds or notes; the denominations and form of said bonds or notes, the time and place of payment of principal and interest and terms of sale; and further to authorize the Selectmen to sign and affix the Seal of the Town of Newfields to said bonds or notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same.
9. On the petition of David H. Peaslee and twenty-three others to see if the Town will vote to spray the Town of Newfields at least twice a year for Mosquito Control and raise and appropriate funds for the same.
10. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This agency will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the Seacoast area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town. The agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of

local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the regional planning agency shall be from Newfields and shall be appointed by the Selectmen. A YES vote is in favor of joining the regional planning agency.

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of 25 cents per capita to finance studies to be conducted by the regional planning agency. These monies will be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the regional planning agency. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. A vote on this article is contingent upon Town Meeting approval of the prior article. A YES vote is in favor of appropriating a sum of money for the first year of operation of the regional planning agency.
12. To see what action the Town will take in the proposed changes in the Building Ordinances, the Zoning Ordinances and Land Use Ordinances.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for support of the Portsmouth Mental Health Clinic.
14. On petition of James P. Daley, Jr., and nine others to see what action the Town will take in regard to opening Old Lee Road making it subject to winter maintenance should any one decide to live there.
15. To see if the Town will vote to enact a leash law which would prohibit all dogs from running at large on public or private property other than (a) that land which is owned by the dog owner; (b) accompanied by a hunter according to the latest New Hampshire Fish and Game Laws; (c) restrained on a leash by owner or any authorized person.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for sidewalk repairs.
17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
(Business meeting to be held at 8 p.m.)

**REPORT OF THE
NEWFIELDS WATER BOARD**

During the summer months, both well areas were enclosed with cyclone fences by the New Hampshire Fence Company. Enough area was enclosed to protect the wells from vandalism and to provide an outside storage facility. The cost of the project was \$1,150.00 for both installations. The well house and well cover were scraped and painted at a cost of \$35.00. The work was done by W. R. Cronshaw.

The inside surface of the water tank was sand blasted and painted with four coats of vinyl paint. The outside surface was scraped, chipped, steel wire brushed, primed, painted one coat of metal protector paint and lettered. The total cost was \$5,465.00. The life expectancy of the interior of the tank using vinyl paint is double that of the lead based paints previously used.

At the town meeting of March, 1960, it was voted by the residents of Newfields to purchase water meters for installation throughout the water system. It was felt that this would result in a more equitable form of assessment. This year, the water board is acting upon that article, having determined that finances will permit it. Installation of the meters will commence early in 1970, however, use of the meters for purpose of assessment will begin some time after the last installation.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Property losses were kept to a minimum in 1969. Our records show a total of 12 calls in town for assistance from the Fire Department.

Out of town calls, Mutual Aid, included one to Epping, one to Newmarket, two to Stratham woods fire and lost child, three to Greenland, woods fire, house and barn; also we were called to assist in locating a lost girl.

Three Mutual Aid Drills were attended, one in Stratham, two at the Rockingham County Home and Hospital; two Parades, one at Kingston and one at Exeter. Also we attended a Demonstration put on by Mutual Aid during Fire Prevention Week.

In the future more Mutual Aid Drills are being planned as this is very good training for all firemen.

The new fire truck was put on order shortly after the 1969 Town Meeting. The contract called for delivery in approximately ten months.

I was at the American LaFrance Factory at Elmira, N.Y., in October. I was informed that the truck was scheduled to be delivered the first week in February, 1970. They are building and turning out fifty complete fire trucks a month; that is a lot of fire apparatus.

The Fire Department is planning to hold an open house at the station some time after the new truck arrives, therefore, I hope that everybody in town will take a little time to visit our station and see what we have to work with.

Remember we are a Volunteer Fire Department.

Again I wish to thank all members of the Fire Department, the Auxiliary and others who assisted in helping to keep our property losses down.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows:

Fire Permit

A **fire permit** is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be **prior to 9 a.m. and after 5 p.m.**

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200 fine, or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500 or one year's imprisonment.
3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland. Maximum fine is \$25.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual School District meeting was held at the Town Hall on March 10, 1969. District officers elected at the Town Meeting on March 11, 1969 were Lindsey R. Brigham, Moderator; Mary B. Hallinan, Clerk; Barbara Hallinan, Treasurer, and Dr. Charles Kurth, member of the School Board for three years.

The Board elected Robert L. Simpson as Chairman and Dr. Charles Kurth as Secretary.

Glendora Lawrence has been the Newfields representative on the AREA School Advisory Committee. This Committee meets several times a year, and is responsible for recommending improvements or changes in curriculum and other school programs and services at the Junior and Senior AREA Schools.

The Robert Lawrence Memorial Library increasingly plays a very important role in supplementing the educational program in our school. We are greatly appreciative of the efforts made by those who have assisted in improving our library facility.

This is a very significant year for the Newfields School in that it is the first time we have ever had a teacher for each grade. From an educational standpoint, this is a big step forward.

Our remedial reading program has been an integral part of our total educational offering. This program has meant a great deal to many of our Newfields youngsters.

On the recommendation of the superintendent of schools and the school principal, the Board made available some much-needed part-time clerical assistance. A recent State Department of Education policy statement indicated that a school the size of the Newfields School should have at least "half-time" clerical services.

We are very grateful to the P.-T.A. for their donation to have the pianos tuned. The soup and milk programs are also important contributions of this organization. The educational programs of the P.-T.A. provide an important and useful forum for teacher-parent discussion.

A great deal of maintenance work was done this summer at the school. Floors were refinished, three classrooms were painted, roof repairs were made, new television equipment was installed and much-needed plumbing work was accomplished. We appreciate the work being done by Raymond Marshall, school custodian, to better maintain our school plant. This is an area that the Board has been anxious to improve upon this year.

The audio-visual and office equipment was cleaned and serviced during the summer months.

The Board has introduced a School Board Newsletter that has been distributed several times this year. Initial reaction from the community has been most gratifying.

We are sincerely appreciative of the efforts of our school administrators, teaching staff, non-teaching staff and all who devoted their energies toward making the Newfields School one in which each youngster has the opportunity to successfully begin the process of working out his own rendezvous with destiny.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The new school year began with a Union-wide faculty meeting at the AREA Junior High School on Tuesday, September 2, 1969. Classes opened for instruction on Wednesday, September 3, 1969.

The Newfields School opened this year with 123 pupils, an increase of 3 pupils over the beginning of school a year ago. This represents a 2.4% increase compared with 4.3% a year ago. There are presently 36 Newfields pupils in the AREA Junior High School and 56 in the AREA High School.

Mr. Hackett reports a growing enrollment since the opening of school in September. The pupils, he describes as cooperative and helpful; their conduct and approach to learning reflects credit upon their community. The principal cites important progress in the area of remedial reading and the new report card system. Science continues to lack a defined articulated program, but adoption of the recently recommended Supervisory Union #16 science curriculum should resolve this problem. The library continues to be a great asset to the school. Mrs. Ruth Glenn and Mrs. Barbara Tebo have devoted many hours to the smooth functioning of the library.

Mr. Hackett extends his appreciation to the instructional staff for their energetic and purposeful teaching which has gone far in developing a strong school program for Newfields children. Appreciation is due as well to community acceptance of a new part-time school secretary; this has freed the principal from much paper work and permitted him to concentrate on his teaching and supervisory duties. Ready assistance from the P.T.A. and their many benefactions have again been invaluable to the school.

Two key persons who are of direct assistance to the Superintendent in providing leadership and supervision of the schools in Union 16 are the Teacher Consultant and the new Business Administrator. Their comments follow:

The role of the Teacher Consultant continues to be **one that encompasses many areas**. His activities include: observing and participating in classroom work; helping teachers and pupils with techniques, methods, materials, and other activities which affect the learning process; interpreting and using the findings of research; working with curriculum committees for future curriculum adoptions in our schools; encouraging pilot studies of promising new materials; appraising educational progress; and providing teachers with the latest information and ideas in multi-media techniques for classroom instruction.

Two major factors are affecting the learning processes in our schools today. The first is the concept that instruction is becoming more and more an individualized procedure; and, secondly, that multi-media techniques are taking an active role in the total instructional picture.

As Teacher Consultant, the above paragraph holds a major key to my work. We are living in the midst of a revolution in education, and curriculum is the most important battle line of that revolution. School curriculum in a democratic society is the result of a continuous interplay of ideas among individuals and groups of individuals who concern themselves with the future of society. We are using the curriculum study-committee technique in our schools. It is through this process that we have our present new modern math program, a changed social studies curriculum, a new parent report system, a transitional program for immature first graders, our present testing program, and we are currently completing an extensive study in science education, Grades 1 to 12.

"Involvement" is the key word. It does not just happen. It has been planned. Ideas are encouraged in committee work. The adoption and implementation of the new program as well as evaluation still remains a major function of the Teacher Consultant's role.

This new program is the result of "best judgments" of the committee members based on the evidence (data, opinions, research, study, pilot program) available at the time of the curriculum decision. The next step requires that the total staff be informed, and usually the Teacher Consultant becomes involved with an inservice program for the teachers before the new ideas come forth in the form of instruction to children in the classroom. Even after these decisions and implementations, the process continues.

This curriculum function requires active involvement by the Teacher Consultant. He has a key role to play all along the process of curriculum change and implementation. Therefore, I felt an explanation of this area of school work was important enough to share with you in this report. I will continue to spend as much time as possible working with curriculum committees; reviewing research; studying data; carrying out pilot studies; and providing teachers with ideas and materials for implementation of new programs in the schools of this Union.

FREDERICK B. KING.

I should like to say at the outset that I am very pleased to have been selected as your first Business Administrator in Union #16.

These first months have been taken with gradually moving into succeeding areas for which I am responsible in order to gain systematically a clear insight into the many and varied facets of the position. Dr. Adamo and Mrs. Collishaw have assisted me greatly in these first months and I give much credit to them for enabling me to "settle in" to the position with relative ease.

As Business Administrator my duties involve basically the following: accounting, preparation of budgets, purchasing, supervision of repairs and maintenance of school facilities, supervision of pupil transportation and lending assistance to the Supervisory Union and the School Districts comprising the Union in the administration of their business and financial affairs. I strongly feel that together with all the foregoing is the very critical responsibility to see that our school system is operated in the most efficient and economical manner possible. With the increasing demands being placed on property owners in the form of rising taxes, it becomes more essential than ever to get true value for every dollar spent.

One obvious area in which efficiency is demanded is that of purchasing. With this in mind I intend to involve the entire Union in as much group purchasing as is practical. Much of what we use in our schools can be readily standardized and purchased jointly. This applies to supplies and furniture alike.

Let me briefly cite an example. Classroom furniture is something which is required by all schools at one time or another. One district's requirements for classroom furniture would constitute a relatively small order and consequently would not provide that district with any degree of purchasing power. However, a combination of two or more such orders could negate the above disadvantage and place those districts collectively in a much more favorable position than any one individually would enjoy. I feel that this kind of thinking among all the districts can work to everyone's advantage.

Another area which can be critical to efficient management is that of maintenance of plant. With the assistance of the building principals, I hope to establish a

planned systematic maintenance program for all of our buildings. Hopefully this will allow School Boards to more accurately project their budgetary requirements in this area.

In summary, with the steady increase in all costs it is imperative that each school district continue to seek new methods of holding or reducing operating costs. One such way is through open communication and cooperation among individual districts in the Supervisory Union.

I look forward to serving your school system in the months and years ahead.

These estimated per pupil costs for 1969-70 are the basis for setting tuition rates for 1970-71; a rental charge is added to make up the total tuition. The new tuition rates for 1970-71 compare with the state estimated average per pupil costs of \$753 per High School pupil and \$653 per Junior High pupil exclusive of rental charges. This will mark the first occasion that Exeter tuition rates have exceeded the state average.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

To the Superintendent of Schools:

School Health Services in our towns have included two new programs this year. Along with our usual schedules of vision and hearing screening and referrals; physical examinations; dental hygiene and education; free summer dental program supported by the State Department, Division of Dental Public Health; Immunizations; Tuberculin testing for Grades 1 and 7, plus Staff; and the ever important Health Education, we have added a new service for age 4 and 5 pre-school children. This program embraces a double purpose of early detection of Lazy-eye and significant developmental lags, and was carried out in each town last June following the closing of schools. Although attendance was not as high as we hoped, we felt that the program was well worthwhile. Over 54 children in all attended and of these, 7 were appropriately referred for further evaluation and follow-up. Had these children not been discovered until a few months before entering Grade 1, their early school experience might very well prove less successful. With adjustment of dates and time we hope for better attendance at the next screening.

Another program which has closely involved the attention of your School Nurse along with Sister Marie Timothy of St. Michael School, Exeter, and members of the appointed Planning Committee, is an in-service training course for Professional Personnel entitled, "Recognition and Management of Children with Learning Disabilities within the Classroom." Over 220 educators from 40 towns are registered in this course and outstanding lecturers have contributed up to date, interesting and factual material each week. Through education only can we best expect profitable returns from our efforts to establish improved understanding and

management of special children in the classroom. If each member registered in this seminar gains a little better understanding of the children who are perplexing them in their classroom, and acquires more effective methods of helping these children, we may rightly feel that its benefits, by touching the lives and problems of innumerable children throughout our schools, can be realized. The preparation and organization of this program has involved many, many hours of several people's time and we are indebted to all who have contributed toward its promising results.

In December there was a spark of hope in the air for the possibility of a part-time assistant in this School Health Service. The spark, however, failed to develop into reality. Now covering 5 towns and 6 schools with an ever increasing enrollment creating a load far beyond the state recommendation, I found this decision something less than encouraging. While I am aware of the many demands and limited funds I do nevertheless, hope that another year new consideration may be given this need and money allocated for the purpose. Many hours have been contributed by School Health Volunteers and I cannot commend them enough for their efficient and most valuable help in the many ways they have served this Department.

Continued support of the School Board(s), Superintendent of Schools, the Principals and members of the Staff is greatly appreciated and has been most helpful to me in carrying out the School Health Program.
