

TOWN WARRANT

March 1945

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Plainfield Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Treasurer, Tax Collector, one or more Highway Agents, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Library Trustees for three years and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay outstanding notes and interest.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay all other necessary town expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the town poor.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the amount of money required by law to secure State Aid on Class 5 highways plus any additional amounts necessary.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid and raise the sum of \$854.08 for said purpose and the State will contribute the sum of \$3416.32.

Article 7. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to assist citizens of Plainfield for a ward bed as needed in the Mary Hitchcock Hospital, Claremont Hospital or both, also to appoint a committee or make resolutions regarding the same. Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the use of the Health department.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundreth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1944 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to assist in the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1272.00 the same to be set aside for future State Road construction when State moneys become available.

Article 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sume of \$75.00 for the purpose of instituting proceedings in superior court for divesting the town of its interest in leased lands.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed by the Dumbarton Oaks Conference.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Dog Constable to collect a fee of \$1.00 for each dog license issued after June 1st, 1945.

Article 17. To see what compensation the Town will vote to allow the treasurer of the trustees of Trust Funds according to Chapter 51, Revised Laws of New Hampshire. Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes to be paid on or before one year; pursuant to the laws of 1917.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on all 1945 property taxes, paid on or before July 10th.

Article 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of Town Officers.

Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally and properly come before said meeting.

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REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE 1944 - 1945

Your school nurse is glad to report that better health, better personal hygiene, more interest in preventive and corrective dentistry was noted among the school children at annual health inspection.

There is a growing need for a broader and better distribution of dental care through our rural schools.

Sixty-three pupils attended the dental clinics, directed by Dr. William Stuart of Claremont, May 1, and 2 and August 21 and 22, 1944. Acknowledgment is due the local Red Cross for assistance, to friends and parents for aid and interest, and the cooperation from all the teachers.

Below is a summary of the defects found at the time of health inspection this year.

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

I submit herewith my eleventh annual report on the activities of the School Board, Superintendent, teachers and pupils, in the Plainfield School District for the past twelve months. This is the twenty-sixth such report since state wide supervision has been established in New Hampshire.

The usual list of those who are attending high school, the prize winners and the children graduated in June 1944 from our elementary school are attached.

Teachers

Two teacher changes are noted one in the Plainfield Plain Grammar School and one in the Willow Brook School. In the latter School Mrs. Marion Cutts Hall has been serving as teacher. Mrs. Hall had previously taught for a number of years in Plainfield and Lebanon. In the Plainfield Grammar School, Bertha Berry, who has taken the major part of her senior year at Keene Teacher's College and who will complete the work this summer is the new teacher.

School Buildings

At Meriden the interior and exterior of the building was cleaned and repainted. Ever since this building was erected the paint on the outside has given trouble by peeling. All loose paint was removed in the work last summer and a priming coat, largely of oil ,turpentine and white lead was applied. It was hoped that this would penetrate the wood sufficiently to make a binder for the final coats.

The interior of the East Plainfield School and the Methodist Hill School were both repainted. At the Methodist Hill School new storm windows have been put on the northwest side which should add something to the comfort in the winter. At Plainfield Plain new front steps were built. After school opened it was found necessary at this building to repair the furnace. Delay in securing parts retarded the efficiency of the furnace for the first three or four months but it is now in good repair. I recommend that we save enough out of our school balances so that we can, when peace comes put in a cement floor in the cellar of the Meriden School and install sinks at both the Meriden and Plain schools and the other buildings, if necessary, to facilitate the serving of noon luncheons.

Health

The opening of school was delayed last September for nine days in order to allay the fears of parents and citizens when the infantile paralysis epidemic was in nearby communities. This seemed like a considerate and wise move on the part of the School Board and it was expected that parents would co-operate in making up the work under a revised school calendar. In two schools cooperation has not been as high as it should be. These are Meriden and East Plainfield. In the New Hampshire School Laws the only reference to holidays is Memorial and Armistice Day. Any other holidays would be determined by vote of the School Board.

High School Pupils

The twelve or more children who attend Kimball Union Academy free of tuition charge reduces the cost of the district by nine or ten hundred dollars, depending on the average state cost per pupil on which the tuition charge is based. I would like to recommend that we use this money to further the opportunities of those children attending high schools giving practical arts courses, such as shop work, commerce, home economics and the like as well as the college preparatory course. This could be done through subsidizing the cost of transporting children to high school. The school law, at the present time, allows districts to raise money for this purpose. It has been talked of as a state aid project and it probably will be in the near future. This seems in line with the trend of the time, since the high school education these days is as necessary and more so, than was what was formerly known as the "common school" education.

Budget and State Aid


The budget for support of schools this year is higher than last, since we are not carrying over as large a balance, but it is lower than that of two years ago. State Aid will probably be in the same amount as in previous years. Teachers for elementary schools are very scarce and this must be taken into consideration when we think of finances for school purposes. These days the district that pays the better salary is the more likely to be assured of teachers.

Conclusion

I would recommend that we carry a sufficient balance in our school accounts so that we can make the indicated repairs at the Plain and Meriden Schools, as well as some playground equipment for all schools, whenever these materials become available. I recommend further that serious consideration be given to subsidizing the transportation of pupils to high schools.

I am grateful to the teachers and pupils who have helped in all of the things that have tended to make the schools better and run smoothly. I wish to express appreciation to the members of the School Board for their consideration and helpfulness.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
- 2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.

4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.

5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
